

TORNADO SWEEPS 3 SOUTHERN STATES

STATE MOURNS DEATH OF CARR

Died While Visiting His Daughter In Chicago After Short Illness

Durham, April 30.—From all sections of the south and nation messages of sympathy are pouring in this morning to the family of the late Julian S. Carr, who died last night while on a visit to his daughter, Mrs. H. C. Flowers, in Chicago.

All Durham mourns the loss of its most distinguished and best-beloved citizen, one who had given so generously of his time, of his energy and of his money for the upbuilding of his city.

The news of his death came as a great shock to his hosts of friends and acquaintances here. Few had known he was out of the city—fewer knew that he was ill in the western city where he was visiting.

A few days ago he had been a familiar figure on the city streets on his way to or from his office, greeting and being greeted always ready to "pass the time of day" with anyone—from the humblest to the greatest.

The universal subject on Durham's streets today in Durham's great loss, General Carr's death. Few could realize that the dapper little figure would be seen no more.

Perhaps nowhere in the city was the grief more poignant than in the ranks of those who worked for the General. The workers in his mill were today bowed by their loss.

General Carr left Durham last Saturday for Chicago. On the train he contracted influenza and was seriously ill on his arrival. His condition grew worse and yesterday specialists were called into consultation. They announced that he had developed pneumonia and that the illness was complicated by a heart affection, and expressed little hope that he would live through the night.

He died at 10:15 (Central time) last night.

The first news of General Carr's illness was received in the city at an early hour Tuesday evening. It stated that his condition was serious and that grave fears were entertained for his recovery. Communication was immediately established with Chicago over long distance telephone by one of the General's sons. Telegrams were sent at different periods during the night and all of them bore news of his serious condition.

Almost a month ago General Carr went to Washington, D. C., where his tonsils were removed. His throat never healed from the operation.

Up until the time of his last illness General Carr was in good health. He attended to the duties of his office every day, walking often times from his office in the heart of the business district to his home. For a man of his age he was extremely active and energetic.

The body is expected to be brought to Durham for burial, leaving Chicago sometime Wednesday. The funeral party will be met in Washington by members of the family, it is expected. Full details for the funeral will be made upon the arrival of the body in the city.

Surviving the deceased are three children, C. M. and Austin H. Carr, both of Durham, and Mrs. H. C. Flowers, of Chicago, Ill. Several grandchildren and numerous other relatives also survive, as so scores of friends from all walks of life in this city and other sections of the state and other states.

General Carr was born in Chapel Hill October 12, 1845, the son of Mr. and Mrs. John Wesley Carr.

He married Elizabeth Morehead, married to Henry Corwin Flower, of Chicago; Lalla Rooke, married to William F. Patton, of Pennsylvania; Julian S., Jr., Albert Marvin, Claiborne McDowell and Austin Heaton.

General Carr's wife died some years ago and two years ago his son, Julian S., Jr., and his daughter, Mrs. Patton, died. At that time he was desperately ill and not expected to live, but with the courage that always marked his career he recovered his accustomed vigor.

EVERETT REPORTED AS 'DOING WELL' AFTER OPERATION

SECRETARY OF STATE ON THE TABLE 3 HOURS

Condition at Noon Said to be Satisfactory— Still Under Anaesthetic

Raleigh, April 30.—Secretary of State W. N. Everett was operated on for appendicitis and other complications at the Charlotte Sanatorium at Charlotte this morning at 8:30.

His condition at noon, according to a long distance phone message to Governor Morrison, was considered by the hospital authorities as satisfactory.

Mr. Everett was on the operating table for three hours, it was stated, and was still under the influence of the anaesthetic at the time of the message.

Durham, April 30.—Memorial services of a most impressive nature were held yesterday in Craven Memorial hall by the entire Trinity College community in praise and appreciation of Joseph H. Ruff, late graduate manager of athletics and assistant professor of law.

Mr. Ruff died at John Hopkins hospital, Baltimore, Saturday, and was buried yesterday at his home in Tupelo, Mississippi.

The service consisted of prayer by Dr. D. H. Scanlon, of the First Presbyterian church, of Durham, which Mr. Ruff attended; "In the Garden," sung by Trinity College Quartet; A Tribute, by Dr. W. W. Wamaker, dean; A sketch of Ruff's life, by Dr. Few, President; Solo: "One Sweet and Solemn Thought," by Miss Rosa Warren; and an appreciation of "Joe Ruff, as Soldier, Citizen, Lawyer and Alumnus," by H. G. Hedrick.

Unskilled Labor Is Scarce In Asheville

Raleigh, April 30.—The demand for unskilled labor over the state continues to increase, according to reports of the various State-Federal offices coming to the director of the Service, M. L. Shipman.

The reports show that there is the state-wide surplus of clerical and professional workers and in some places a surplus of certain classes of skilled labor, while in other places there is a good demand for some skilled labor.

Asheville reports that its shortage in unskilled labor has reached a point where it is to be considered "critical."

Greensboro reports that the activity in building and road construction had increased the labor demand to a great extent; but that the fair weather had brought a relief to the shortage of domestic help which the city was suffering the past few weeks.

The placements during the week ended April 26 exceeded those of the previous week by 118, according to the statements. Last the placements totaled 666 of which 529 were men and 137 were women while during the previous week there placed a total of 548.

Registrations during the last week numbered 749 of which 581 were men and 168 were women.

There were 874 requests for help and the department referred 770 applicants, there 584 men and 186 women.

The placements under the classification list of the department were as follows: Unskilled, 483; skilled, 131; domestic, 106; clerical and professional, 39; and industrial 7.

HAM-RAMSAY ANNOUNCE- MENTS.

One of the largest week night audiences which has yet attended a service at the Tabernacle was present last night and were rewarded with probably the most gripping and interesting message Mr. Ham has yet delivered when he spoke on "The Trial and Execution of Jesus Christ from a Legal Viewpoint." The speaker presented a mass of interesting and unusual material bearing upon this historic and vital event in so comprehensive and impressive a manner as to hold his audience undividedly for well over an hour.

The musical program last night was superior to any meeting of the series. The choir was on hand promptly at 7:30 and Chorister Ramsay plunged at once into some of the more pretentious and impressive choral numbers which he has introduced, the choir responding beautifully to his slightest whim in interpretation. Following the sermon Mr. Ramsay and Mr. Rodgers sang a most appropriate and effective duet "Will You Crown or Crucify Jesus" which added a fitting climax to the impressive discourse of the evangelist.

The sermon in part was as follows: We have heard much of the trial, conviction and execution of Jesus from a historical and a theological standpoint; we shall today consider these things from a legal standpoint.

Other great trials have excited the interest of the world; such as the trial of Socrates, the most spiritual of the ancient philosophers, for corrupting the youth of Athens; of Warren Hastings for maladministration of the government in India, in which Edmund Burke made his reputation as the greatest of English orators; of Charles I, and of Mary Queen of Scots and of Aaron Burr in this country.

Snatch Thief Robbed Nurse While Shopping

Durham, April 30.—Only two dollars was the reward that greeted a snatch thief here when he opened the purse that he grabbed away from a nurse while in one of the department stores.

According to the story told by the nurse, she was just leaving the store in company with another nurse and was holding a child in her arms, when the man ran up and grabbed the purse from her pocket.

She attempted to stop him but failed. She attracted the attention of a policeman who also gave chase to the thief, who succeeded in making good his escape.

There was only a two dollar bill in the purse the nurse said.

But all these sink into insignificance when compared with the trial of Jesus.

The two things to be considered by every court in the trial of a case, are the facts of the case and the law applicable thereto. For both of these we must in this case go to the Bible. The facts are given in the four gospels, and the law is found in the five books of Moses and the Talmud which is a sort of commentary on the Mosaic law, filling some four hundred volumes. For the authenticity of these authorities quote Greenleaf on Evidence, the leading treatise on that branch of law, so recognized by all our courts. Greenleaf says the facts as set forth in the four gospels will be received as good evidence in any of our courts, at least to the extent of throwing the burden of proof on those who might deny them, just as any other ancient documents apparently well authenticated and handed down from generation to generation by proper custodians are so received in all our courts.

In attacking the legitimacy of the trial of Jesus, I deny the legality of the tribunal before which He was tried. (Continued on page 5)

SPREADS DESTRUCTION ACROSS WIDE SECTION

GOVERNOR M'CRAY ON WAY TO SERVE TERM IN PRISON

GIVEN TEN YEARS IN FEDERAL PRISON

Sentenced Monday To Long Term and Heavy Fine for Defrauding Through Mails — Re- signed Tuesday

Indianapolis, Indiana, April 30.—Warren T. McCrory retired today as governor of Indiana, his resignation tendered yesterday following his conviction Monday, being effective from 10 o'clock this morning.

McCrory was sentenced before Judge Albert B. Anderson of the U. S. District court to serve ten years in the Federal prison at Atlanta and to pay a fine of \$10,000 on charges of using the mails in furtherance of a scheme to defraud.

He will start on his way to Atlanta at 3:20 this afternoon in company with several other prisoners.

Cecil to Apply For American Citizenship

Asheville, April 30.—The Honorable John Francis Amherst Cecil, whose marriage to Miss Cornelia Vanderbilt was solemnized yesterday, and who has announced his resignation as First Secretary of the British Embassy at Washington, will make application for naturalization as an American citizen at the proper time, according to a member of the Vanderbilt family.

Mr. and Mrs. Cecil will make their home at Baltimore and he will devote his time to the management of the large Vanderbilt estate.

No Hope of Finding Any Living Miners

Wheeling, W. Va., April 30.—Bodies of 79 victims of the explosion and fire in the Benwood mine of the Wheeling Steel Corporation Monday have been located by the rescuers.

This leaves 32 of the 111 miners who were entombed still unrecovered. Experts from the federal Bureau of Mines, who are directing the search express themselves as having no hope that any living miners will be found.

American Red Cross In a New Activity

Atlanta, Ga., April 30.—The assistance of the American Red Cross has been solicited in the search for Mrs. Edna Mingo Bush, wife of Arthur J. Bush, of Spartanburg, S. C., who mysteriously disappeared from her home several weeks ago and has not been heard from since.

After arranging pillows in her bed to make it appear someone was sleeping there, Mrs. Bush quietly left her home in the middle of the night. All efforts to locate her have proven futile.

A note was found next day in which she said she could not live under the constant dread of an operation and was going to drown herself.

Careful investigation by Spartanburg officials has led to the conclusion that Mrs. Bush is still alive, and a diligent search is being made to locate her.

The 730 Red Cross chapters in the South have been asked to aid in the search and to report any news of her whereabouts immediately to Southern Division Headquarters in Atlanta.

Mrs. Bush is described as thirty-five years old, five feet seven inches tall, weighs 112 pounds, brown hair, blue eyes, and walks with a short, quick step. She is well educated an interesting talker, and very industrious, the description states.

A dozen towns in three states bore the brunt of a tornado which swept in a north-easterly direction from Alabama to South Carolina during this morning.

Thirty or more deaths have been reported besides scores of injured and it is conservatively thought that property damage will exceed two million dollars.

The following reports have been received, but lines of communication are down in all directions from the path of the storm. Roads are blocked in many cases and it will be some time before accurate details of loss of lives and property are available.

Franklin Roosevelt To Conduct Race For Gov. "Al" Smith

New York, April 30.—Franklin D. Roosevelt, formerly assistant secretary of the navy under the Wilson administration was chosen chairman of a committee to conduct the candidacy of Governor Alfred E. Smith, of New York, for nomination for president at the National Democratic Convention.

First Boll Weevils This Year Reported

Raleigh, April 30.—The first boll weevils of the year have been found, according to Franklin Sherman, chief of Entomology for the Experiment Station, who is in receipt of two specimens, one from near Fayetteville, the other from the Field Station at Aberdeen.

The first was said to have been taken from the man's back while he was in the field supervising the planting of cotton, the latter was reported to have been found by the workers of the Experiment Station while they were jarring insects from a peach tree.

Fourteen other specimens, thought to have been boll weevils, have been previously received this year, it was stated, but so far these last two were the first real boll weevils.

During the last two years, the department of Agriculture, has requested that farmers and others interested send in first living boll weevil specimens which might be found under any conditions and later to send in specimen found on young cotton.

These facts, he said, are desired from all parts of the cotton growing area of the state, in order to determine the seasonal activities of the insect.

Each year there are many reports, it was explained, but in most cases of winter or early spring findings, they prove to be insects entirely different from the boll weevil and not harmful to cotton.

In 1900 North Carolina produced about 30 million bushels of corn which had been increased to about 55 million bushels by 1920.

Anderson, S. C., April 30.—Three persons are known to be dead and more than a score injured as the result of a tornado which destroyed 50 houses in the village at Riverside Mill here early today, and which also damaged the mill building.

Property damage is estimated to exceed \$500,000.

The tornado swept over the southern part of the city in which there are many negro homes and in which the mill village is located.

It is feared that much further damage has been done as all wires are down and it is impossible to find how far the "twister's" effects were felt. Principle damage to the mill was the destruction of the third story which consisted of the card and twisting departments.

Trinity street school had its roof blown off but no one was hurt as the storm struck before the time for anyone to be in the building.

Anderson, S. C., April 30.—The death toll was placed at nine by the latest reports from stricken area.

Opelika, Ala., April 30.—Four negroes were killed, five others known to be injured and five houses destroyed by tornado which swept this section early this morning. Loss in livestock unknown. Wires down in all directions.

The storm was very violent but lasted only a few minutes.

Greenville, Ala., April 30.—Four persons injured and two persons missing is the toll of the wind storm which swept this section early this morning. Property damage already reported exceeds \$150,000, but there were no known deaths.

Reports incomplete as wires are down in many sections.

Autongville, Ala., April 30.—Twenty houses and barns and a heavy loss in livestock was caused by a tornado which swept over here at 2:45 this morning. Methodist church was badly damaged by the wind.

No deaths have been reported.

Auburn, Ala., April 30.—A "twister" dipped down to earth about two miles south of here and cut a swath half a mile wide over a tract of valuable timber. One negro child is reported dead and other persons injured.

Property damage large but no estimate yet made.

Macon, Ga., April 30.—Three are dead and a dozen injured, several seriously, by tornado which passed a few miles south of here shortly before 10 o'clock. The dead are: Mrs. Leonard Holt and six-months old baby, and an unidentified negro.

Spartanburg, S. C., April 30.—Walnut Grove, a small town 13 miles south of here, received the full force of a tornado about 10 o'clock this morning. Several persons were killed and injured but all wires are down and there is no communication with the stricken district.

Red Cross nurses and all available doctors left for Walnut Grove as soon as the news was received.

A whole family, consisting of father, mother and four children were killed when their home was blown down.

Lawrenceville, Ga., April 30.—Six others were injured and a number of residences demolished; a mill was partly destroyed with a property loss estimated in excess of \$200,000 by tornado, which struck about 6 a. m. and lasted for a few minutes. The Second Baptist church was wrecked.

The charming custom has been revived in some of our colleges for girls.

If the impulse to celebrate is strong, and none of the aforementioned practices or associations of the day makes an appeal, it can be commemorated as the anniversary of the battle of Manila Bay. Twenty-six years ago tomorrow George Dewey won his glorious victory.

IS IT A BOOMERANG?

"Republican Congressional candidates, especially in the mid-West and far West, will have the difficulty of their campaigns increased by the propaganda to make President Coolidge appear better than his associates in the national regime. That is the strategy that seems to have found favor with his managers and some others of his spokesmen."—(From Washington Correspondence.)

Apparently it is the belief of the promoters of Mr. Coolidge's campaign that he must be segregated and differentiated from the Republicans who have served in President Harding's cabinet and in the Congress since 1921, so that he will escape the popular condemnation which has been passed on them.

The more the President is exalted above the other candidates of his party, the less desirable they will be made to appear in the eyes of the voters.

This attempt to save the President at the expense of his associates on the Republican ticket in the various states is not likely to result as his managers now expect.

It is predicted that there will be much bitterness among Republican Congressional aspirants when they begin to see and feel the effect of this strategy, and the regret which the movement for Mr. Coolidge's nomination has already caused many of them will turn to open deprecation.

SINCERITY

Endorsement of the Ways and Means Committee of the House of Representatives of a Constitutional amendment to end the future issuance of tax-free bonds should meet with approval.

If reduced surtax is one means of keeping a larger share of capital actively engaged in business, elimination of tax-exempt securities is another.

Business Conditions Reported Complex By Reserve Bank

Review of Situation Issued by Fifth Federal Reserve Bank Notes Both Unfavorable and Favorable Indications in Industry.

Richmond, Va., April 30.—The business situation, at the middle of April, of the Fifth Federal Reserve District was complex, both favorable and unfavorable factors being discernible, according to the monthly review issued by the Fifth Federal Reserve Bank of this city.

In comparison with the corresponding period last year, when business was developing a speculative tendency, March business this year was marked by conservatism at best and by distinct hesitancy in several important lines, says the review.

The greatest contrast between business in March 1923 and March 1924 is in the Fifth District is seen in the textile industry, which is at present operating on restricted time and without sufficient orders to absorb even the limited output of the mills. While at this season last year the mills were running full time and had sufficient orders on hand for several months.

"It is gratifying to find, however, that an examination of the favorable factors plainly visible in the Fifth District shows that they outweigh the unfavorable ones the review states."

"The banks as a whole in the district are in a position to finance the year's normal needs without strain, and the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond has extended liberal credits and is in almost the same position it occupied a year ago. The volume of business as by debits to individual accounts in clearing house banks, in the District was greater during the four weeks ending April 9, 1924, than during either of the four-week periods ending March 12, 1924, and April 11, 1923.

"Cotton prices have recently shown a rising tendency, and foreign demand for cotton appears to be gradually improving. Virginia's tobacco yield turned out larger than last fall's estimates.

Building operations continue at all near record levels, with no signs as yet that any material decline is impending, and dealers in all kinds of building materials are enjoying a large volume of business.

New Immigration Plan To Include Families

Cleveland.—Wives or husbands and unmarried minor children of resident citizens would be admitted into the United States without being counted in the immigration quota of their country, in the report of the Immigration committee of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce, whose recommendations are to be made at its convention here May 6-8.

Immigration certificates, or consular quota certificates, would be issued at the monthly rate of one-tenth of the annual quota to prospective immigrants who make formal application and who present credentials showing they are admissible, under another recommendation in the report.

The system of selection would permit entrance to those qualified mentally, morally and physically, regardless of race and nationality. The report says the present quota law, after being modified, should be reenacted for a definite term of years. During this time it proposes that a federal board make a study of the effects of the immigration law both in the United States and abroad.

"This commission also should have power to devise and supervise a method of selective immigration—administration of the law, however, remaining in the immigration service as at present—and to make recommendations to the President for raising or lowering the quota within limits to be fixed by congress," the report reads. "The committee believes," continues the report, "the present base year of 1910 should be retained during the brief period of the quota law's extension both in order that experience during the last three years may be comparable with that during the next three to five years, and in order to avoid raising the troublesome question of discrimination."

tried the legality of His arrest, the legality of the indictment against Him, the legality of the procedure, the legality of the judgment, the legality of the sentence and the legality of the execution of the sentence.

The Court Without Jurisdiction.

At the foundation of every case lies the jurisdiction of the court. The Great Sanhedrin of the Jews was the supreme court of the nation. It was composed of three chambers of 23 members each—23 priests, 23 scribes and 23 elders—and two high priests as presiding officers. Like our legislatures, each chamber was supposed to sit and deliberate separately and come to its own decision, independent of the others, and all must then meet and if possible adjust any differences.

The qualifications of the members of this court were as follows: They must be familiar with the law, (the Mosaic law); familiar with many languages, since every person must be tried in his own language; free of haughtiness, have popular favor, strong in character, free of immorality; must be married and a father of children; neither he nor any relative must have any interest in the result of the trial, and he must serve without pay.

Few, if any, of these judges were thus qualified. Most of them had bought their seats on the court by bribery, many of them were immoral, all of them were prejudiced and had, at a meeting in September and again in the February prior to the trial, which was April 6, A. D. 30, formed and expressed the opinion that Jesus ought to be put to death.

The Indictment Illegal.

I charge that the indictment was illegal because it was brought against Him by the very tribunal before whom He was tried. Who ever heard of a judge finding a bill of indictment? It is impossible to do so without prejudging the case. The indictment should have been quashed because it was vague and charged no particular act constituting the offense, but simply alleged the offense itself. Suppose an indictment simply charged a man with murder, but did not allege any particular act constituting murder, how long would it stand?

Arrest and Preliminary Trial Illegal. I next charge that the arrest of Jesus under this indictment was illegal. For He was arrested at midnight, by an accomplice (Judas) and a traitor (Judas); whereas under the Jewish law no person could be arrested after sundown nor by an accomplice or a treacherous colleague.

I also charge that His examining trial, or preliminary trial before the high priest, was illegal, because no trial could be held at night, nor on the same day of the arrest, nor was any such thing as a preliminary trial known in the legal procedure of the Jews.

The Main Trial Illegal.

Next I charge that the final or main trial was illegal because it was held before the morning sacrifice; was held the day before the Sabbath, which was against the law; was held on the last day of the feast of the Passover and the first day of the feast of unleavened bread; whereas it was not lawful to hold a trial on any feast day; and because it was finished the same day it was commenced, which was not permitted.

He was charged with blasphemy, by the presiding judge, because He said He was the Son of God. He could have proven that He was the Son of God by their own prophets. He could have shown that He was to be born in Bethlehem, and He was; that He was to be born of a virgin, and He was; that He was to be born of the house of David, and He was; that He was to be born before the scepter departed from Judah, and He was; that Elias must first come, and he did; that His ministry must begin in Galilee, and it did; that He was to perform many miracles, and He did; that He should ride into Jerusalem on the foal of an ass, and He did; that He should be betrayed by a disciple for 30 pieces of silver and a potter's field should be bought with them, and all these things had happened; that He should be despised and rejected of men, and He was; that He should be called out of Egypt, and He was; that He should be the seed of a woman not man, and He was.

But they had absolutely no witness against Him save Himself, and that could not be concealed; because under the Jewish law a plea of guilty was not allowed. The woman of Samaria, whom He met at Jacob's well, was probably the only witness who had ever heard Him say He was the Son of God, up to the time of the trial, except His disciples, and they were accounted false.

Sentence and Execution Illegal.

I charge that His sentence was illegal for these reasons: It was based on uncorroborated evidence; whereas according to Jewish law two or three witnesses were necessary. It was pronounced by a unanimous vote, and that rendered it void; because the Jewish law assumed that such a con-

ference would be due to prejudice. It was pronounced the same day as the trial and in a forbidden place, a private house; whereas the law required the court to separate after the first day and fast and pray and come together the next day and reconsider the matter, and all sentences must be pronounced in the court chamber not in the palace of the priest. The balloting was irregular, because it should have been after the morning sacrifice and in the presence of the witnesses. The judges were disqualified for reasons already given.

Finally I charge that the execution of the sentence was illegal, because it was based on an illegal sentence, was on the same day as the trial, and was not by the witnesses in the case, which the Jewish law required.

Roman Law Equally Farcial.

Up to this point we have considered only the trial of Jesus by the Jews in their own supreme court. But at that time Judea, together with the rest of the world, was under Roman domination, and the judgments of their courts could not be executed until confirmed by the Roman governor of the province. His name was Pontius Pilate. He was the son of an apostate Jew, a native of Spain, who had married an illegitimate child of an impure daughter of Tiberius Caesar, emperor of Rome, and had been made governor of Judea to set the girl away from the emperor's court.

So the Jews hustled Jesus before Pilate to have the death sentence of their court approved by him. But mark now that while they had tried and condemned Him on a charge of blasphemy, an offense unknown to pagan Rome, they did not ask Pilate to confirm the sentence on that ground, because they knew he would care nothing about that. Probably he was a blasphemer himself.

But they brought entirely new and different charges against Him before Pilate. They charged that He had "perverted the nation, forbidding to give tribute to Caesar, saying that He himself is Christ a king." Suppose your court of criminal appeals were asked to review a capital case tried in your district court and find that the charges on which the man had been convicted here; how long would it take them to throw the case out of court?

But Pilate took up the case and soon found that the witnesses as to the first two charges contradicted each other. As to the last charge, Pilate took Jesus in his office to examine him privately. There Jesus explained to him that His kingdom was not of this world, but purely a spiritual kingdom. And, of course, Pilate could see that such a claim was not treason to Caesar.

Acquitted But Not Discharged.

So he came out into the presence of the accusing Jews and tells them that he finds "No fault at all in the man." That would have ended the matter and would have ended it had Pilate been a sane enough man. It was an acquittal and should have been followed by the discharge of the prisoner.

But the rabble knew Pilate. They had browbeaten him before, and so they insisted. Finally somebody said he was a Galilean, and Pilate seized on this information as an excuse for sending Jesus to Herod, the Roman tetrarch of Galilee. There was no le-

gal ground for that step. For the offense with which Jesus was accused had been committed in Jerusalem, and that was not under Herod's jurisdiction. Herod was then in Judea.

After ascertaining that he did not have jurisdiction, Herod scourged Jesus and put a mock robe of purple on Him, a crown of thorns on His head, and a broken reed for a mock scepter in His hand, and sent Him, back to Pilate. In other words, though this old reprobate found that he had jurisdiction of the prisoner, he proceeded to have Him cruelly whipped and mocked and sends Him back to the proper authorities to deal with the case.

Pilate again went thoroughly into the merits of the case and again found Jesus not guilty, and so stated, and asked the mob to let him release Jesus rather than Barabbas; whereas he should have released Him on his own judgment of acquittal.

A Craven's Cowardly Surrender.

Finally the craven Pilate, being unable to quiet the mob by any of his hypocritical schemes, delivers Jesus to the mob to be lynched under the auspices of Roman tyranny, bringing upon that great empire a darkened sun and moral degradation deeper than ever.

But that broken reed became the mightiest scepter ever wielded, and that crown of thorns the kingliest crown ever worn; while the public sentiment which acclaimed Him a popular hero on week and crucified Him the next, branded itself with everlasting infamy.

In his last days the great Napoleon said, "Nebuchadnezzar, Cyrus, Alexander, Caesar, Charlemagne and I founded great empires on force and all of them have perished from earth, while Jesus, the lowly Galilean, founded an empire on love, and for 18 centuries it has survived without an army or navy or cabinet, and today is stronger than ever, and millions would die for him. Tell me He was not divine! He must have been."

Nicodemus, Joseph and Yourself.

But Pilate was not alone in his infamy. Both Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea were members of the Sanhedrin, and either could have saved Jesus. Joseph was richer than John D. Rockefeller and he could have bought the entire court, body, soul and breeches.

Commencing in the siege and capture of Jerusalem 36 years later when 1,100,000 Jews, no doubt some of that mob among them, were slain by the Romans under Titus, and Jewish women roasted and ate their own infants, and the temple was razed and has never been rebuilt, on down through twenty centuries of persecution and slaughter, pestilence and scourge that people have had the blood of Jesus visited upon their heads.

Even now, the awful devastation in Poland is due to that fearful imprecation of their ancestors calling down upon their devoted heads the blood of Jesus. Then making an application of the lessons to be drawn from the message, the evangelist said:

But no people are so guilty of the blood of Jesus as those who crucify Him afresh in this age of the gospel of grace. He needs now as never before new converts to bear loving testimony of His saving power.

For Jesus still is on trial, and His shall it be?

The reason the Jewish rulers thirsted for the blood of Jesus was that He had scourged their money changers out of the temple and denounced their sins of selfishness, greed and hypocrisy.

Jesus found himself in the hands of bitterly prejudiced enemies and death. In other words, they determined before a corrupt political boss, with- out the ghost of a show. Paul at-

tempted his case to Rome, because he knew he could not get a fair trial in Jerusalem.

In February, six weeks before the arrest of Jesus, the Sanhedrin had met secretly and decided that it was necessary to put Him to death. 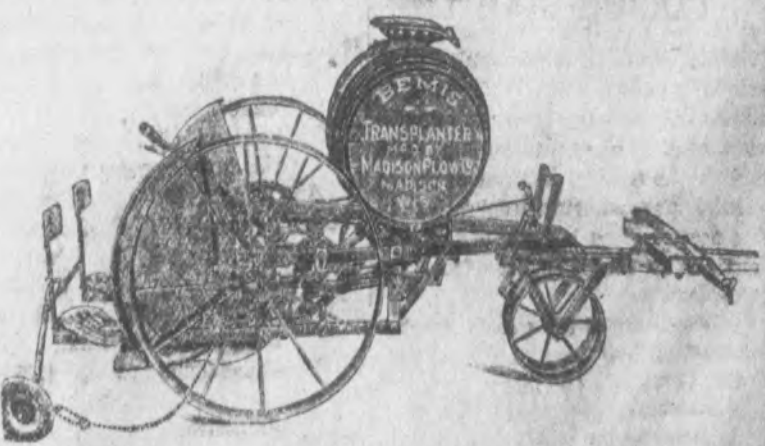

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, April 30.—Except for the possibility of frost tonight in Oklahoma, North Arkansas and in the Texas panhandle, the weather outlook of the cotton region is more favorable, generally fair except probable showers in the Carolinas tonight.
Nevertheless the market ruled comparatively steady owing to reports of destructive tornadoes in several Southern states, reports of the high cool winds in the Southwest injuring young cotton, necessitating replanting in some sections and because of the continuance of large exports from the United States.
The summary of the weekly weather and crop review was hardly as favorable as generally looked for.
Exports from the United States:
Today 30,000 vs. 8,000; since Friday 81,000 vs. 29,000.
Since Aug. 1, 4,892,000 vs. 4,000,000.
Of the 30,000 bales exported from the United States today, 29,000 were for Germany. Prospects are for the continuance of free exports to Europe from America.

Nights too cold for germination of cotton in eastern portion of belt, while heavy rains and cool weather latter part of week were unfavorable in northwestern portion, otherwise conditions were generally favorable.
Very good progress was made in planting cotton, which extended to northern limits in all sections. Germination of late planted and progress of early planted were very good in Texas and chopping and cultivation advanced in Southern portion.
Heavy rains and cool weather latter part of week in Oklahoma were unfavorable, probably necessitating considerable replanting. Conditions were generally favorable for cotton in Arkansas and early planted has a good stand.
Warmth and ample moisture were beneficial in Louisiana, most of cotton seeded in Central and Southern portions of East Gulf States.
Planting is half done in Tenn and chopping is in progress in Southern Alabama and Georgia, where stands are mostly good. Nights were too cool for best germination and growth in the South Atlantic area.

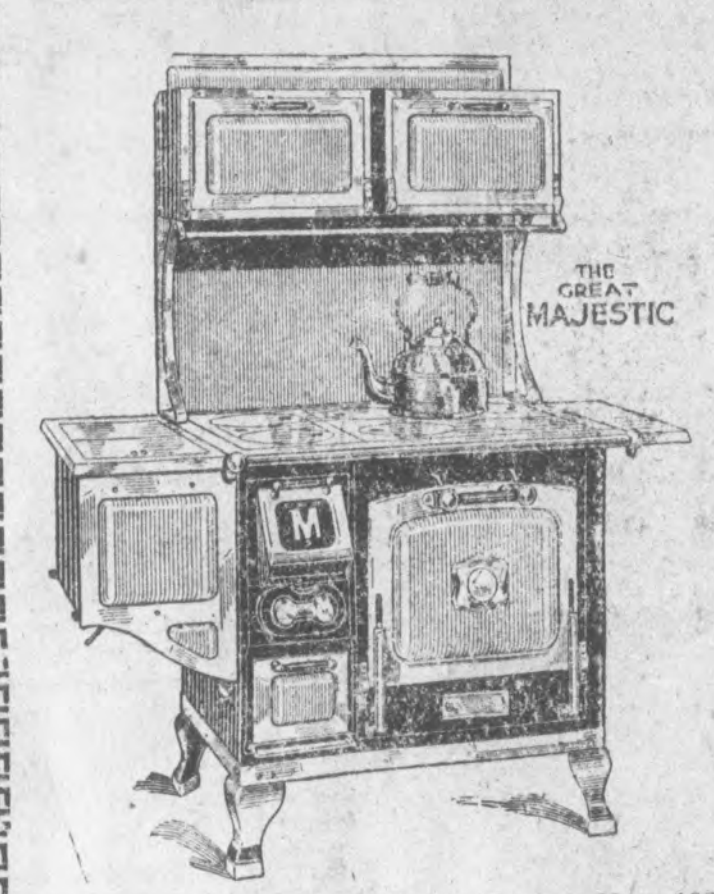
