

FEDERATED CLUBS CONVENTION OPENS SECOND DAY MEET

Committee Reports and Election of Offi- cers Feature Morning Session

Raleigh, May 8.—The principal feature of this morning's session of the state Federation of Women's Clubs was the election of three new officers. These were Mrs. Fred Bahnsen, Winston-Salem first vice-president; Mrs. E. L. McKee, Sylva, recording secretary; and Mrs. R. D. W. Connor, Chapel Hill, treasurer. These are the only officers that were to be elected this year.

Raleigh, May 8.—A series of breakfast conferences here this morning completed much work of the convention of the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs before the general session opened at 9 o'clock.

Groups which considered problems of the convention in various hotel private dining rooms included Home Economics, Art, Music, Division of Education, Conservation and Library Extension departments.

After the assembly singing at the opening of the general meeting the convention began the second full day's program. Half the district presidents read their reports the other half having placed their reports before the convention at yesterday's session.

Among the reports this morning were Home Economics, by Mrs. Rosalind A. Redfern; Library Extension by Miss Mary Devane; and Social Service by Mrs. Charles E. Quinlan. A message from the North Carolina Social Service conference was brought to the convention by Miss Minnie Harmon, executive secretary of the conference and a report from the General Federation was read by Miss Margaret Lovell Gibson. Following these other reports were presented as follows: Southeastern counties, Mrs. Sidney Cooper; Committee on International Relations, Miss Gertrude Weil; Stories and Poems from the Old North State, Mrs. S. E. Leavitt; Co-operative Effort between the Home Bureau and the State Federation, Mrs. Rosalind Redfern; Home Demonstration Work, Mrs. James S. McKinsey.

Shortly before noon was the report of the nomination committee followed by the election of officers. Various other reports will be heard at the afternoon session.

Two Conventions Meet In Raleigh Middle of June

Raleigh, May 8.—The Southern Group of Securities Commissioners, consisting of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Tennessee, and Virginia, will hold its annual convention in Raleigh on June 16 and 17, according to State Insurance Commissioner Stacey Wade. Mr. Wade is president of the Group and T. B. Conner, chairman of the Georgia State Securities Commission is secretary.

The North Carolina Building Loan League will hold its annual meeting in Raleigh during June 17, 18, 19, according to J. C. Allison of this city. It was stated that the two meetings were arranged so that the organizations could have one day of joint meetings.

Mr. Wade announced that he was arranging to have a joint session of the Southern Group of Securities with the North Carolina Investment Bankers Association.

Agriculture Dept. To Install Market Wires Over State

Raleigh, May 8.—Commissioner of Agriculture W. A. Graham has announced that beginning immediately a market wire will go from the Division of Markets to every strawberry shipping point. In return arrangements have been made by Mr. Ross, chief of the Markets Division, for telegrams to come to the bureau from each shipping point. This improved service, Mr. Graham announced, will be followed up through the other marketing sections in seasons of their respective crops.

Secret of Jehosephat's Early Success Was Revealed Last Evening In Powerful Sermon

Declares That Profess- ing Christians Are Re- sponsible for Indiffer- ence of Unconverted Masses; Another Im- pressive Service Held in Pythian Hall

A good audience heard Evangelist Ham last night deliver another of his challenging messages to the compromising, lukewarm, fruitless Christian. Speaking from the text "Shouldst Thou Help the Wicked?" and basing his application upon a running narrative of the experience of Jehosephat, Mr. Ham clearly indicated his conviction that the professing Christians of Greenville because of their indifference and unconcern, are largely responsible for the indifference of the unconverted masses here.

The message was gripping throughout and left a profound impression.

Another deeply impressive service was held this morning at the Pythian hall. Chorister Ramsay spoke briefly at this morning's service and a spirit of deep concern for the un-saved in this community manifested itself. In the opinion of many these early morning services are the most helpful and inspirational of the series.

"If you are a Christian you must separate yourself from everything that has the appearance of evil," Mr. Ham said last night. "You must separate yourself from all things in the past. That was the secret of Jehosephat's early success and rise in power; he separated himself from all his ungodly neighbors and associated only with the children of God. Saul never became great until he separated himself from his past life. This can be said of almost every great man."

"Refusal to encourage the enemies of God is to bring condemnation upon them. Today people pay attention to the ungodly and reap the results. If your conduct is opposite from your preaching, then your mouth is shut against those who are not Christians. God asks, 'Will thou be a friend to mine enemies?' The friend of the world is the enemy of God."

"The church has made its greatest growth in numbers when it was most corrupt, when it used force by the sword to convert entire nations. When church people begin to get lax and preachers get less severe and plain in their preaching, then great swarms of the worldly will swarm in to the church."

"So Jehosephat began to get lax and began to play the fool. After his son, the crown prince, grew up, he allowed him to go down and court and marry the daughter of wicked King Ahab and his wife Jezebel. So it is nowadays. When the children grow up and get out in society then parents begin to complain about how plainly the pastor preaches. They want the soft pedal upon those things."

Sim a Gradual Process.

"Jehosephat went farther away from God. We gradually sink down into sin. It is a gradual process of departing from God. We deceive ourselves, and nothing is more tragic than the deceit of the human heart. 'There is a way that seemeth right to man, but leadeth to death and destruction.' The mind of man is never right. Man's thoughts are not like God's. The majority of people do not know they are lost until they wake up in hell. You will forget that such a man as I ever lived when you face eternity without God."

"Jehosephat next accepted an invitation to attend a big banquet given by King Ahab. You had better look out when you begin to banquet with God's enemies. Sampson had a big time at his first banquet, but look at him in his last one. What a contrast. The tide turns and the judgment of God begins to come on."

"There will be a time when you compromisers will not have a friend. I am always afraid of the world's friendship. God is the only one you can trust. Walk steadily with God. You can't bid God speed to the pagan six days a week and worship God on the seventh."

"The world will try to bribe you to shut your mouth against the things you know to be wrong. When you begin to accept good treatment from God's enemies, you are lost. If you would be as eager for your

SHIP COMMISSION READY TO REPORT

Report On Proposed State Ship Line To Be Handed to Governor Upon His Return to Raleigh

Raleigh, May 8.—The report of the Ship and Water Transportation Commission will not be given to the public until it is first submitted to Governor Morrison Chairman R. M. Miller, Jr., of Charlotte, stated here this morning. The commission is meeting here today. Mr. Miller did not say whether or not the commission was ready with its report but it was learned from well informed circles that it will be handed to the governor upon his return from Winston-Salem where he is filling a speaking engagement today.

The Ship and Water Transportation act passed by the legislature of 1923 was for inquiry as to the desirability of a state owned ship line and the building of docks and port facilities as advocated by Governor Morrison in his message to the General Assembly.

Lodge Proposes New World Court

Washington, May 8.—Establishment of a world court at the Hague to which the United States could adhere was proposed today in a resolution introduced by Senator Lodge, Massachusetts, chairman of the Foreign Relations committee.

For the purpose of creating the new tribunal President Coolidge would be respectfully requested to propose the calling of a third Hague international conference. The resolution embodied complete plans for the proposed court. It would be composed of 16 judges, four of them deputies, to be selected by an electoral commission. The commission would consist of a general committee composed of representatives designated by the signatory powers and a special commission of representatives designated by the United States, British Empire, Italy, Japan together with five other signatory powers which powers will be selected by the signatory powers by a majority vote from time to time.

Senate Attacks Postponement Jap Exclusion

Washington, May 8.—The Senate heatedly debated the immigration bill today with both Democrats and Republicans spokesmen bitterly assailing the conference's report postponing the Jap exclusion.

Senator Robinson, Arkansas, Democratic leader, opened the attack and was joined immediately by Borah, of Idaho, and Johnson, of California, Republicans.

Washington, May 8.—Congressman William C. Hammer, Democrat, North Carolina, objected to being called a "garrulous old grandmother" by Representative Blanton, Texas, in a meeting of the House District of Columbia Committee this morning and it took a good deal of effort by the other members of the committee to keep them apart.

Hammer first let fly a folding chair and when it did not reach its mark he grabbed the bulky District of Columbia appropriations bill. The men lunged at each other across the stable but were kept apart by the other committee members and when the committee meeting closed it was with a handshake.

The disagreement arose over the calling of a committee meeting.

Wheeler Opposes Modification Of Prohibition Law

Washington, May 8.—Modification of the prohibition laws was vigorously opposed today by a delegation headed by Wayne B. Wheeler, general counsel for the Anti-Saloon League, that appeared before the House Judiciary committee. The committee has under consideration a number of bills which would permit 2.75 per cent beer.

"Foes of prohibition use these bills as a camouflage in order to make impossible the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment" Wheeler charged.

Washington, May 8.—In a committee room destitute of spectators the practical details of oil production on Teapot Dome and Elk Hill was described today for the Senate oil committee by Foster H. Bain, director of Bureau of Mines.

In recent weeks the crowds, that once packed the rooms where the hearings have been held, have steadily dwindled and today for the first time since the committee began its public hearings no one was present except members of the committee and newspaper men.

Today's session was the first session held for a week.

Greensboro, May 8.—Pursuing its avowed policy of advancing the interests of the Carolinas, the Carolina Motor Club has added to its departmental activity the "Department of Carolinas Publicity." J. Vear Mann, former secretary of the Southern Pines Chamber of Commerce Southern inns, N. C., is the director of this new department and assumed his new duties yesterday. The work will include the dissemination of information of all types regarding roads, resorts, routes, week-end trips and various phases of publicity for the Carolinas in newspapers and periodicals. He will also have charge of the Carolina Motorist, official organ of the club and of the Carolinas Automotive Trade Association.

TWO CO-DEFENDANTS OF JOHN W. LANGLEY ENTER GUILTY PLEA

Sentence Withheld Un- til After Congress- man's Trial

Covington, Ky., May 8.—Walter B. Carey, Canton, Ohio, and M. E. Huth, Alliance, Ohio, two of the four co-defendants of Congressman John W. Langley on trial in Federal court here charged with conspiracy to defraud the government through whiskey transactions in 1921, reversed their pleas of "Not guilty" and entered formal pleas of "Guilty" when court convened today.

Motion by W. K. Gray, of Philadelphia, representing Milton Lipschutz, of Philadelphia, and other defendants, that all the testimony concerning Huth and Carey be stricken out was overruled. Huth and Carey were removed from the court room to prepare bonds. It is understood that they will not be sentenced until after the trial.

Student - Alumnae To Launch Campaign For New Building

Raleigh, May 8.—At a signal flash in every county in the state will launch the intensive period of the campaign for a \$250,000 student-alumnae building for the North Carolina College for Women, located at Greensboro.

The drive will continue through the 24th, with local members of the state committee of 100 co-operating with citizen groups to put across each county or district quota.

In view of the illness of Secretary of State W. N. Everett, honorary state chairman, the duty of heading the state-wide drive in the intensive period devolves upon Mrs. Julius W. Coon, of Greensboro, state executive chairman for the alumnae of the college, who has associated with her educational leaders, active alumnae and influential citizens in every community in the state.

Educators in various states have indicated that they will be watching the outcome of the campaign.

METHODIST SOUTH WILL CONSIDER THE UNIFICATION PLAN

Nashville, Tenn., May 8.—A special session of the Southern Methodist College of Bishops is expected to open here today or tomorrow to consider the action taken by the Methodist Episcopal General Conference at Springfield, Mass., yesterday, although Senior Bishop W. A. Candler has not yet issued a call for such a meeting.

Raleigh, May 8.—Governor Cameron Morrison last night issued a proclamation calling upon the people of the state to observe Sunday, May 11, as Mothers Day in both the home and churches.

The proclamation follows "I earnestly request that wherever it is possible children visit their mothers next Sunday and where this is not possible that they write them letters, also that every North Carolinian wear a flower in honor of his or her mother whether she be living or dead."

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THE VALUE OF KNOWLEDGE

In Calcutta, India, eight hundred telephones went out of commission with one stroke of the ax, as an ignorant coolie, making an excavation, mistook a telephone cable for the root of a tree.

The telephone lines were immediately repaired, of course. It took the services of many skilled men for many hours, patiently to sort out the wires and match each with each. Meanwhile eight hundred telephone users went without the easy intercommunication which the telephone affords. What tragedies were thus caused will never be known. All that is reported is that in one instance, ignorance voided the work of many hours, and that many more were required to repair the damage.

In the long run, ignorance never wins over knowledge. But it is the greatest weapon of ignorance that it may strike swiftly and do much damage in a little time. One ignorant law maker may stop the wheels of progress for months; one ignorant school teacher may retard for years the development of minds of fifty pupils; one ignorant action may undo the careful plans of philanthropy.

Had the coolie known what a telephone cable was he would not have cut through it. Did the ignorant teacher know better he would not hurt the little minds in his charge. Had the ignorant law maker been educated or had another and wiser choice been made at election, necessary legislation would not have been blocked.

Education, knowledge, information, power to understand, and once again, education, are our needs! The children of today are the citizens of tomorrow. The knowledge they gain today will be used in governing themselves tomorrow. Let us, all of us who claim some small measure of wisdom as our part of life's winnings, see to it that the most precious gift of man to man, of father to child, of government to citizen, be given in full measure, pressed down and running over; let us give our children the best of school, the best of teaching, the best of knowledge, that when they, too, become men and women, they may be among those who repair the telephone, not those who cut communication.

A SUMMERTIME DANGER

With the approach of the summer camping and vacation season, it is timely that health officials are issuing warnings regarding the danger which may be met in the use of water for drinking and cooking purposes, which in spring or other places.

Frequent tests of drinking water in cities and towns where water systems are maintained have practically eliminated any danger of typhoid fever from this source, but this can not be said of the water that is commonly found in camping places, especially if these places are used infrequently, and care has not been taken to examine the water supply.

Water found in summer camps may be clear as crystal yet it may contain germs which may have serious effects upon the person drinking it. Springs which appear to have their origin in safe places may be infected with germs from a source that is not easily discovered.

Tourists and others who yield to the temptation to drink from a spring that appears to be entirely safe may take into their system the germs of typhoid fever, thereby running risk of long illness or possible fatal results. It is better to be thirsty for a half hour longer until an approved source of drinking water may be reached.

It is wise not to take chances on contracting dangerous diseases when the exercises of judgment in keeping with medical knowledge may save lives, or at least avoid serious illness.

Samoan Boxer-Oarsman, Becomes Chief of Big Tribe

India's Need is Science, Says Lord Leverhulme

Calcutta.—More science and less politics, this is the remedy prescribed for India by Viscount Leverhulme who recently arrived here from England. He was optimistic regarding India's future, but condemned the policy of tariff protection as economically unsound.

"I don't think the people of India are suited to working in factories," Lord Leverhulme said. "They seem to be built for the open air. Industry in concentrated form is more suited to a temperate climate."

"One thing India does want badly is the application of science, engineering and business principles. More science and less politics, I should say, are the great needs of India. If the applied scientific principles to her agriculture, the increased yield would bring her wealth and prosperity. It would lap up her unemployed and bring her the contentment which she seeks politically."

"But if the government of India puts on protection, up will go the cost of living. A low cost of living lies at the root of a people's well-being. If living is made dearer, a vicious circle will be created."

"I believe with President Coolidge that the business of a manufacturer is not altogether to produce goods, but that it is also to produce men. I do not claim for co-partnership that it will decrease strikes and create contentment. But I do claim that it produces men, creates ambition and arouses interest and energy."

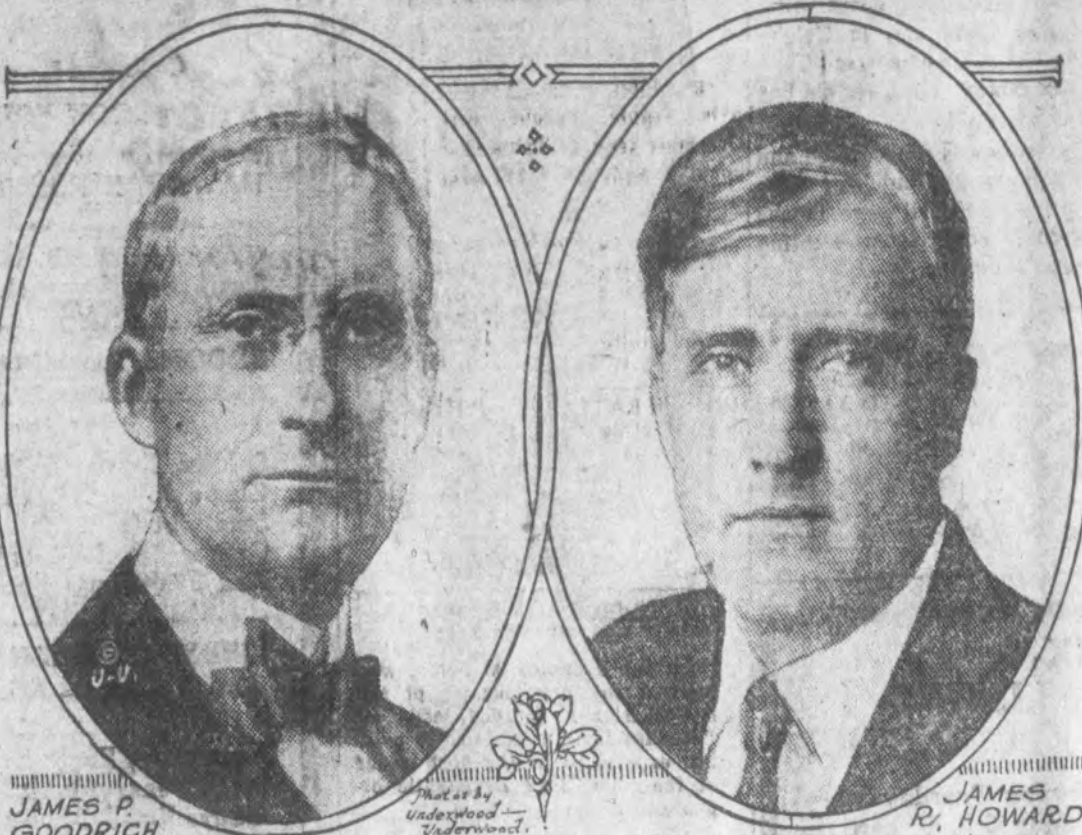

Plan Now Under Consideration Will Save \$360,000,000 Annually For Midwest in Freight Tariffs

James P. Goodrich, former governor of Indiana, and James R. Howard, former president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, are two of the men who will serve under the chairmanship of Herbert Hoover, Secretary of Commerce, in an attempt to secure a deepening of the St. Lawrence waterway that, according to engineers and economists, will save the American farmer upwards of \$360,000,000 a year.

Five cents a bushel saved on wheat shipments to New England, New York and Europe; cheap shipment of phosphates to the mid-western farmer, and a general pulling together commercially of the Great Lakes territory and the Atlantic seaboard are expected

from the proposed improvement. It is proposed to decrease the number of locks along the St. Lawrence route from 40 to 13, to improve the remaining locks and to deepen the channel so as to permit ocean-going steamers free access from the Great Lakes to the Atlantic. Secretary Hoover has been working three years in furtherance of the plan. He maintains that the estimated saving of five cents a bushel on grain will give the mid-western farmer a first-rate margin to fight with in the markets of the world, and that such basically sound help is properly within the province of government and should draw the support of all Americans.

The St. Lawrence project con-

stitutes one of a series, including the Colorado River irrigation scheme, the attempt to organize against extremes in the business cycle, the superpower co-operation recently agreed upon in the East and the vast simplification reforms suggested to manufacturers by the Department of Commerce, which Mr. Hoover believes are sound steps toward permanent prosperity.

Others who will serve on the St. Lawrence Commission of the United States include Charles P. Craig, secretary, Great Lakes-St. Lawrence Tidewater Association, Stephen D. Davis, well-known New Mexico attorney, William C. Breed, James E. Davidson, James D. Noonan and Charles L. Allen.

ENGLISH CITY'S REFUSE DUMP NETS A BIG REVENUE BY SALVAGE

Birmingham, England.—This city is now recovering products from its refuse heaps every year worth \$180,000. A few years ago the city built a salvage plant at a cost of \$2,000,000. This will be paid for in a few years, after which the profits will be used for the reduction of the city debt, says a report of the committee responsible for the building of the plant. The city also saves \$260,000 annually which it formerly used to dispose of the refuse.

Birmingham has a population of 913,438. The salvage plant last year produced 25 tons of pure tin, 5,000 tons of fat, and several boat-loads of fertilizer. Food for pigs and poultry and oil products for candle and soap making also were sold, and the clinkers and stone were used for repairing roads.

FRENCH FEAR OF EARTHQUAKES PREVENTS NEW TOKIO EMBASSY

Paris.—The prevalence of earthquakes in Japan is given as the reason for the decision of the French government to abandon the plan of erecting an embassy building in Tokio. A bill recently introduced in the French Chamber, and sponsored by the government, asks authority to sell the site purchased in 1912.

The bill reads "The entanglement which has brought desolation to Japan has demonstrated the inopportunities of erecting so important a

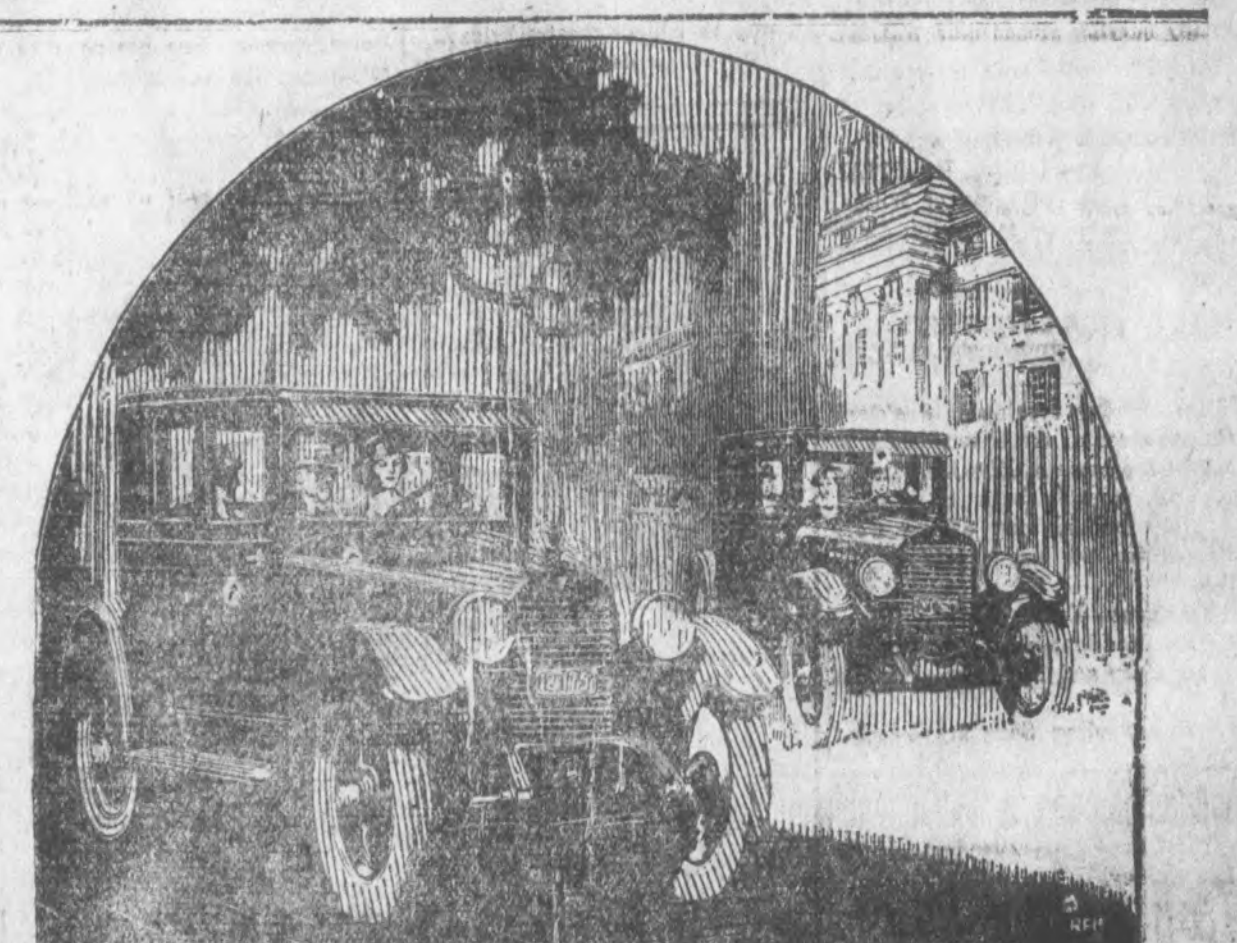

MAYOR PRAISES RIDING SCHOOL

It is to be noted with a great deal of interest that Mr. Cliff Maddrey has established in Greenville a riding school and stables under the name of Greenville Saddle Stables at Savage's stable, corner of Fifth and Co-tanch streets. Mr. Maddrey's stables consist of twelve very fine saddle horses, all of which are well broke and gaited, being so gentle that even a child would not be in danger in the saddle. However, in connection with the stables Mr. Maddrey has established a riding school, in which he instructs pupils consisting of children as well as grown people in the art of horsemanship, and for this instruction makes no charge in addition to the regular rental of the horse at a very moderate rate per hour.

While horses have somewhat gone out of style and the sport of horsemanship has been to a great extent substituted for golf, tennis, etc., it is by no means a lost art and there is really no form of sport or exercise that exactly takes its place.

The invigoration derived from an early morning ride is a natural stimulant to both brain and body and is far more valuable than other forms of exercise of violent type.

Therefore, it is to be hoped that the people of Greenville will show the proper appreciation of this new acquisition and of Mr. Maddrey's efforts to establish a permanent riding stable, which will furnish a form of recreation that will prove to be very beneficial, once the habit of a daily horsemanship ride is established.

Although horsemanship riding in Greenville has but recently been renewed as a popular sport, it is one of the oldest, most popular forms of pleasurable exercise known. In the days of Feudal Europe and when Knighthood was in flower, every knight had his charger and the ladies their mounts. Even today England's Prince of Wales is a great lover of the sport, and although he has had many a tumble, sticks to his horsemanship riding in preference to any of the many other sports offered him.

But for romantic adventure on horseback we do not have to go back to ancient Europe, for every school child can tell about the "Midnight Ride of Paul Revere," the exploits of "Jeb" Stewart's cavalry and the picked horsemen of Mosby and Forrest, as well as the stirring times following the Civil War when the Ku Klux all rode white horses. And even since those memorable days many can recall the thrilling instances and excitement created by the riding tournaments, when men rode like demons and took all kinds of chances on horseback in an effort to win the privilege of crowning the Queen. Those who are old enough to remember always refer to the times as "those good old days" when riding was an art and love and romance reigned supreme.

Anyway, in this day of speed greed and ease, for a real sport with a thrill and a kick to it, horsemanship riding is quite the thing, in fact it is the "Sport of the Kings," which Mr. Maddrey is giving the rest of us plain folks the opportunity to enjoy.

PETERSON'S CAMPAIGN

GAINING GREAT HEADWAY

O. J. Peterson, the veteran teacher and editor, who is a candidate for Commissioner of Labor and Printing, was in Greenville today, and expressed much gratification at the progress of his campaign. Mr. Peterson declares he found practically no opposition in Fayetteville, Wilmington, New Bern, Goldsboro and Kinston. The leadership of the party and all other citizens met in a dozen counties, with very few exceptions, have given him assurances of support, while not a half dozen have expressed themselves positively for any opponent.

Mr. Peterson is much pleased at the unanimity of the support given him in the sections where he is best known. But progress is not confined to the southeast. Several papers in the central part of the state have come out squarely for him, among them the Monroe Journal, whose brilliant editor, Mr. R. F. Mr. Peterson cites his experience in New Bern Tuesday as typical of the triumphant progress of his campaign. At breakfast, for a starter, the most distinguished jurist of Eastern North Carolina told the Sampson County candidate that he had told his wife a few days before that he was going to vote for Peterson. To close the day, the Sun-Journal came out with a half-column editorial endorsement of Peterson from the pen of Editor J. B. Dawson, while during the hours between he was receiving assurances of support from scores of the best citizens of the town, including A. D. Ward, Judge Guilan and men of their like.

A day in Wilmington, last week, was similar, when J. O. Carr, Judge Rountree and other political and business leaders, including the county officers, capoured his cause.

There is no doubt that he is running like forty, but he is anxious for the good Democrats of P.M. to align themselves fully with him. He wants the solid east, as he has, already, the solid southeast.

COTTON LETTER

Washington, D. C., May 7.—Rather too cool for best growth of cotton while heavy rains first part of week delayed planting in central and eastern portion of the belt, otherwise planting made very good progress.

Cotton made poor progress in Texas on account of cool nights, stands are irregular in central and northern portions, but general condition of the crop is fairly good. Early cotton has a fair stand in Okla. Planting underway in all sections this work nearly completed in most parts of Arkansas where early stands range from rather poor to every good. Cotton was mostly favored by the weather in Louisiana except nights rather cool, but sunshine and warm weather are needed in Texas, conditions were fairly favorable for cotton in Mississippi with irregular stands in Alabama planting further delayed in northern Georgia, elsewhere weather more favorable but growth was poor and much replanting necessary. Stands general very good in South Carolina and reports from North Carolina are favorable, though rain is needed for germination for most section, planting well underway in Virginia and the far western cotton states.

PANK PERSUADES THE POPPY TO DIVULGE BEAUTY AT NIGHT

San Francisco.—Thanks to Luce, Burbank, the plant wizard of Santa Rosa, Cal., the wild poppies of California for the first time are gracing social functions at night with their petals open. Heretofore the golden petals closed themselves at sundown.

A San Francisco matron recently complained to Mr. Burbank that it was a shame poppies had to go to sleep so early in the evening. Mr. Burbank experimented, and as a result he gave her this advice:

Stalk the poppies to their lair just before daybreaks, while their petals still are closed. Then place the flowers for the day. In the evening the flowers, put in water and exposed to the warm air of a drawing room, will yawn gratefully, open their petals and expand their loveliness for all beholders.

He said the same treatment could be adapted for other night-closing flowers.

neighbor's salvation as you are his friendship the world would be different.

"These things called 'worthy causes' are traps to get Christians off the track. Do not compromise with a worthy cause. Sin is often disguised in the form of some worthy cause. Do not line yourself up with anything that would hurt God.

"You cannot compromise God's truth. The Bible will save itself; it does not take you to compromise for it. Do not join in with unbelievers and infidels. When you begin to get help from an enemy of God you are gone.

"The German army in its prime was never so dangerous as the dangerous teachings that are now coming out from Germany. They are the deliberate plans of the anti-Christians. They present the broad way, and it is the broad way that leads to hell.

No Compromise.

Ahab and Jehoshaphat got together and planned to take Ramothgilead. Just like all false prophets, the prophets of Ahab declared that success would crown their journey, but even at that Jehoshaphat was doubtful. So he sent for Micaiah, a prophet of God, who told Ahab that he would never return alive.

"False prophets always tell you just what you want to hear. When the true prophets preach the truth you don't like it. God sent me here to preach to the rich, poor, high, low, laborer, and capitalist.

"When a doctor examines me, I want the truth. If I have a dangerous malady, I want to know it. Just the same, I don't want a lying preacher, one that preaches to please. I want one like Micaiah, who declared to Ahab: 'I will say what God tells me to say, the false prophets cry 'Peace, peace' when there is no peace. They lead us astray. Satan is the master deceiver.

"When one of the prophets of Ahab struck Micaiah in the presence of Jehoshaphat, and placed him in prison, Jehoshaphat did not open his mouth or raise his hand. He stood by and let the prophet of God be insulted without offering a protest. One day you are going to stand in judgment with your garments soaked in the blood of your fellows. Your silence is consent to the action of the sinners around you. You, a profess-

ed follower of God, hold your mouth shut when a prophet of God is being insulted.

"God's people should walk separate from the world. When you become a Christian, you can't walk as you once walked. The least misstep of the Christian might mean a lost soul. There is more danger in you who are traitors to the Christian religion than all the drunkards and thieves in the world. We can get out of the way of the thieves and drunkards, but it is harder to get away from the influence of the misstepping Christian. I am more afraid of the preacher who has gone astray than any other person.

"Your influence is going to count in this world for either good or bad. Some day you will have to meet God and account for your influence.

The evangelist last evening came out strong against any type of compromise with evil. As an example he cited Sunday baseball and Sunday motion pictures. He pointed out in one instance where the baseball club managers in two Texas cities made it a custom to give free baseball passes to the ministers, thus closing their mouths forever against Sunday baseball. This form of compromising with evil was declared by the evangelist to be especially dangerous. He declared that in some instances motion picture house operators in cities where Sunday shows are exhibited offer ladies of the evangelist party theatre tickets, an effort to compromise the evangelist against preaching against the Sunday showing of pictures and bad pictures in general.

Rev. Mr. Ham brought out that the Christian boy, by not coming out strongly and taking a definite stand against evil practices, has a damaging influence. By silence he virtually shows his approval, the preacher declared.

Wild Beasts Kill Natives and Cattle In Rhodesia, Said

London.—Farm houses in the bush bordering on the northern Rhodesian frontier have recently been in a state of siege owing to the activities of lions. The animals have come out of the jungle in daylight and attacked the farm animals, carrying off many of them. In some cases the natives working on the farms have been attacked, and several have been killed. The lions are often joined by leopards

and have appeared in such numbers that the settlers are forced to go about only in large groups and to keep a constant guard over their families and stock.

The wife of a railroad employee reports a thrilling adventure in this connection. Mrs. Mclean left her home at Garuso on a bicycle to visit

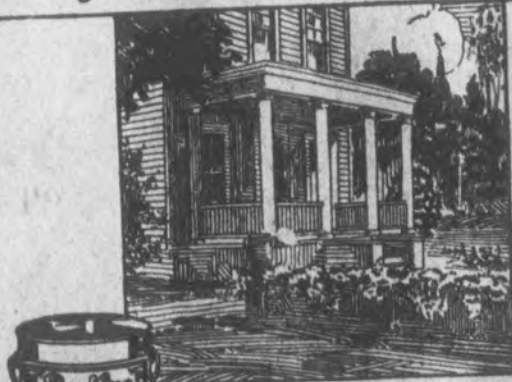
neighbors. Reaching a river she found two large lions on the bank. She was so near that she could not retreat and prepared to fight for her life, but at the first shot the animals ran. She then proceeded and shortly came across a big leopard eating an ox. The leopard also made a hasty getaway, but followed Mrs.

Mclean for some time.

Arriving at the farm she found it had been attacked for several weeks by the animals, and many cattle had been lost. Next day she was escorted back to her home by a neighbor and ten natives who, on leaving Mrs. Mclean, found they had been tracked all the way by lions.
