

DEMOCRATS WIN SEN. TAX FIGHT

With Aid of Republican Insurgents Two Compromise Proposals Defeated; Final Passage Expected Today

Washington, May 10. — Senate Democrats retained their income tax schedule in the revenue bill yesterday against two determined assaults by the Republican organizations as a measure was whipped into shape for final passage today. Before adjournment agreement was reached to conclude debate on the bill by 2 o'clock this afternoon.

Republicans offered two compromises on the Mellon sur-tax rates, but the Democratic-Republican Insurgent coalition defeated both. The last effort was on a schedule calling for the House sur-tax rates with a maximum of 37 1-2 per cent as against 40 per cent maximum in the Democratic plan. It was defeated, 46 to 39.

Democrats Win.

Chairman Smoot, of the Finance committee, first had proposed a maximum rate of 32 per cent as a compromise for the Mellon 25 per cent maximum, which was turned down, 47 to 36. There was no debate whatever on either proposition. The Democratic normal rates were re-affirmed without even a record vote.

Important among results of the Senate action were repeals of the tax on telephone, telegraph and leased wire messages, the five per cent tax on art works, the 2 1-2 per cent on automobile parts and accessories and the levy on drafts and notes.

A treasury proposal to limit tax deduction in relation to the income of the taxpayer from tax exempt securities was re-inserted by a vote of 45 to 40, but the proposal of Senator Reed, Republican, Pennsylvania, to prohibit issuance of tax exempt securities was defeated, 59 to 14.

OFFICER SEIZES \$15,000 'HOOTCH'

Newark, N. J., May 10.—Acting on what he declared was a tip from a mother which said that her daughter had been ruined by a "Gin" Federal Prohibition Officer Lafara, of New York district offices, today seized high grade liquors valued at \$15,000 at the plant of the Ritz Chemical company. Two men were arrested in connection with the liquor.

CUTTER RESCUES STRANDED YACHT

New Bern, May 10.—After rescuing a stranded yacht off the sands Long Shoals, the United States coast guard cutter, under the command of Captain H. G. Fisher, has returned to her dock in this city. The yacht was bound from Baltimore to Florida with the owner and a party of friends when it went aground. It was stated that it required two days in order to get the yacht off the sand. Captain Fisher said that it was only by the good work of his officers and men that stranded boat was relieved in the two days time.

Central Highway Near Completion

Raleigh, May 10.—The last link in the Central Highway lies between Smithfield and Salisbury and construction same has been started, according to information received at the office of the State Highway Commission here. The distance, it was said, is seven and one half miles and will be finished with plain concrete. When this stretch of road is finished it will link Smithfield and Rutherfordton, going by way of Charlotte, by a continuous hard surface road, a distance of 285 miles. This covers routes 10, 15, and 20.

The detour between Thomasville and Lexington will be opened on Sunday morning next, it was also announced at the highway office.

The traffic census, which is now being taken monthly by the maintenance division of the highway department has been announced. The heaviest traffic in the state was over the Charlotte to Gastonia road on route 20 of the sixth district on April 8 when 2,608 vehicles were registered. The May census will be taken on the fourteenth and the following census on June 8.

Bandits Make Getaway With \$20,000 Cash

Chicago, May 10.—Seven auto bandits held up the Chicago-Indiana post office early today and escaped with between \$25,000 and \$30,000 according to estimates of post office inspectors here. The money was being shipped by registered mail from the Federal Reserve Bank, here, to the United States National Bank of Indiana Harbor, East Chicago.

The money is believed to have been intended to meet at least one payroll as one shipment consisted of \$20,000. The robbers selected four registered pouches out of the 16 casks of mail and escaped.

MEMORIAL DAY IS OBSERVED WITH SPLENDID PROGRAM

Served Dinner at the Rotary Home by the Daughters of the Confederacy

Memorial Day an annual event which is always looked forward to with great expectation by the Confederate soldiers throughout the county was appropriately observed in Greenville today. The program began at 9:30 o'clock with the meeting of the Bryan Grimes Camp and was brought to a conclusion by an elaborate dinner served at the Rotary building by the Daughters of the Confederacy.

The day although featured by many events of interest was saddened by the missing of many familiar faces which were always present to take part in the ceremonies of the day, and who have since last memorial day answered the "last call" and passed on to their reward. It was estimated that the number of Veterans present would not exceed twenty-five.

The Veterans after the meeting, were placed in automobiles and escorted by the girl and boy scouts and the high school band proceeded to the Brick Tabernacle where they heard a splendid sermon by Evangelist Ham.

After the services the parade formed again and passed to the cemetery where appropriate exercises were observed. The graves of the Veterans' comrades were decorated with a beautiful floral tribute. After the singing of a song, taps sounded and the march proceeded to the Rotary building where the Veterans and their wives were the guests of the Daughters of the Confederacy. An enjoyable hour was spent at the Rotary home and the soldiers of '61 exchanged greetings and spent many pleasant moments reminiscing over the events of the war between the States.

The Polish Cabinet, meeting in Warsaw, is considering measures to limit the freedom of speech of President Wojciechowski, who recently made speeches in Posen that were interpreted as recommending an Imperialistic policy. When Samuel Gompers, veteran president of the American Federation of Labor, attempted to address the convention of the International Ladies' Garment Workers' Union in Boston he was broken up by the meeting in disorder. George Bernard Shaw, addressing a Norwich, Eng., meeting of labor men, said he was an original Communist, who wished only a nice flat in the fashionable West End of London, a nice country estate, \$10,000 pocket money and a couple of motor cars and he would be contented. Angelo Milton Ellison, Greek protégé of the late Edward F. Searles, aged Methuen, Mass., millionaire recluse, has sued in New York City courts for the \$20,000,000 left by Searles to his secretary, Arthur T. Walker. Ellison declares he was promised by Searles that he would receive the estate, but that he got only \$10,000. Sensational developments are promised.

Japanese Exclusion To Be Effective July 1st

Washington, May 10.—The Japanese exclusion provision in the immigration bill will become effective July 1, 1924 under a new agreement reached today by the House and Senate conference. The compromise reached today is a substitute for that reported as the first

agreement of the conference which was reconsidered in deference to the wishes of President Coolidge.

The new action by the conference became necessary when the House yesterday refused to approve March 1, 1925, as the effective date.

KILLS HUSBAND, DAUGHTER AND TAKES OWN LIFE

Saltsville, Va., May 10.—Mrs. Rosa St. Clair 30 years old, shot and killed her husband, Robert T. St. Clair and their little two year old daughter early today and then turned the gun upon herself ending her own life according to information obtained from local authorities.

According to the story told the police, it is alleged that Clyde Jordan shot the young woman after they had quarrelled. It was said that the man and woman had been going with each other for some time.

Registration Books Will Close May 24

Every voter, in the coming primary of June 7th, and the general election to be held in November, must be registered on the registration books of Pitt county, as a condition preceding to voting.

Some voters do not realize the difference between being registered for a town, county or special elections. It is the purpose of those in authority, to have the voters understand, that those who are not already registered, on the general registration books, for Pitt County, must be so registered before the right to vote, may be exercised.

Registration on the books, for any town election, or a special election, will not entitle one to vote, in the general election, if not registered upon the books of the county. Under the present law, to be entitled to register, one must have been a bona fide resident of this state for twelve months; and of the precinct in which you vote, for a period of four months. However moving from one precinct to another, within a county, does not deprive one of voting in the one precinct, if he has not acquired the right to vote in the other.

The sermon followed a musical program which created an ideal atmosphere for the presentation of the message of the evening, so apropos were the messages of the songs selected, and so impressively were they rendered by the great chorus in perfect response to Chorister Ramsay's impelling leadership.

Although Mr. Ham extended no invitation last night, he announced that he would be in the inquiry room to give instruction to any who were interested enough to come in of their own volition and the deep interest with which the audience received the message was attested by the fact that around 50 voluntarily responded and went to the inquiry room after the service was dismissed. The service in the inquiry room was most impressive, quite a number giving testimony of their intention to live for Christ.

The prayer service at the Pythian Hall this morning was largely attended and was one of the most inspiring and effective of the series. The

young ladies prayer services under the direction of Mrs. Chandler are increasing in attendance and interest and promise to be a feature of the meetings.

Tomorrow afternoon Mr. Ham is to speak on "The Second Coming of Christ" one of his most gripping and vitally interesting messages and tonight he speaks on "The Days of Noah" in which he establishes the fact of the flood from a mass of evidence outside the Bible and discusses many interesting features of this great catastrophe in a helpful way.

N. C. C. W. Planning For Commencement

Mrs. B. B. Sugg of Greenville, N. C. alumnae chairman for this region, has just been informed by President Julius I. Foust of the North Carolina College for Women that the alumnae organization, represented on every continent excepting Australia, has notified him it intends making this year's commencement the most epochal in the history of the college.

The graduation exercises, June 3, will signalize the achievement of the \$250,000 goal for a student-alumnae building, alumnae leaders believe.

"Furthermore, the accomplishment will mark the first organized effort of the alumnae and North Carolina citizens for definitely constructive assistance to a college that has effectively and quietly served the citizenship of the state continuously for 32 years," says the alumnae statement.

Otto Wood and J. H. Starnes Take Revolver From Overseer and Force Him to Accompany Them Through Gate; Governor Offers Reward

Raleigh, May 10. — Otto Wood, serving 30 years sentence for the murder of A. W. Kaplan, Greensboro pawnbroker, and J. H. Starnes, under sentence of five years, who made their escape from the state prison here early today after taking a pistol away from an overseer and forcing him at the point of the revolver to accompany them into an auto and out of the prison grounds, were still at large at noon.

Early today while the other prisoners were at breakfast overseer, D. L. Partin, escorted three prisoners into the chair factory of the Starnes into the chair factory of the prison to distribute cane for the use of the convicts who work there. Shortly after they had entered the factory Wood, Starnes and Sydney Gupton picked up knives used in the factory and Wood grabbed Partin around the body taking his revolver from the overseer's pocket. The prisoners then told Partin if he made any outcry they would kill him. Starnes poked the pistol into Partin's ribs and ordered him to lead them to the prison garage. Gupton, according to prison officials got "cold feet" and declined to go further with his companions.

The other two secured the automobile of Dr. Normand, prison physician. The two convicts then forced the overseer into the automobile with them. Wood took the wheel and the car was passed by the gatemen out of the prison grounds. Being accustomed to see prisoners carried in and out of the grounds to stations and the farms the passing of the car created no suspicion on the part of the gateman. As Wood drove the car Starnes held the point of the revolver in Partin's side.

Wood drove the car to a place near the Seaboard shops at the north side of the city where Partin was ordered to get out. As soon as the pair had disappeared, Partin made his way to the nearest telephone and informed Warden Busbee who immediately sent guards in search of the escaped prisoners and wired scores of towns and cities in the state to be on the lookout for the men.

After leaving the Seaboard shops the prisoners started toward Durham. Three miles west of Raleigh they met a negro driving a large truck belonging to a local bakery. Stopping the truck the convicts at the point of revolver forced the negro to turn the truck over to them. Prison authorities found the truck abandoned near Nelson 15 miles west of Raleigh at 11:30 o'clock. No trace of the missing convicts was found. A party of guards augmented by scores of citizens are scouring the countryside for the desperadoes.

Governor Morrison has offered a reward of \$400 for the capture of Wood and \$100 for that of Starnes. The prison has offered an additional \$100 for each of the men.

STRANGER GETS LIFT ALSO JAIL

Fayetteville, May 10.—Fate played a part in the results of a stranger's day of work near here when deputy U. S. Marshal Carter was driving along the road and offered the stranger a ride. The stranger accepted but insisted upon riding in the rear seat despite the urging invitation of the Marshal Carter for him to sit of the front seat. This action augmented by several whiffs of corn whiskey aroused the marshal's suspicion and when within a few miles of town he told the man he would have to leave the car then as he (Carter) was going to stop at his home. Before the man left he was searched and found to be carrying three bottles of whiskey. Mr. Carter did not stop at his home but brought the man to this city where he is now in jail pending trial.

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MOTHER'S DAY TOMORROW

Mother's day will be observed with a touching form of sanctity tomorrow. It ought to be, among terrestrials there is none to whom a higher reverence is due from son and daughter. The pity is that a true conception of mother, too frequently comes only after she is gone.

But Mother's Day is both for living and the dead. A very hallowed memory is the legacy of one; a very tender affection the bequest of the other. No child capable of retaining mother love will fail to show it on her day. It calls for no ostentatious display of devotion. A seemingly insignificant thing will be much to her. A letter home, a grateful attitude, a frank affection will mean worlds to the living mother.

One of the finest concepts of human relations is back of the Mother's Day observance. It cannot be soiled readily. It is the special privilege of none; the common possession of all. Few are immune to its appeal. It exhales wholesomeness and soothes the soul.

THE CONFEDERATE VETERAN

The gathering of the old soldiers here today was indeed an inspiring scene. The part that these now bent figures played in the building of the great South can well be imagined through perusal of accurate history of the various localities. They fought for a cause which they thought to be right and just and it

is fitting that on this day each year we should pay homage to those who fell in the cause and those who still remain to live over again and again the memories of those eventful days under Lee and Jackson.

Conditions have altogether changed since the day when these sons of the South withdrew from the union and took up arms against their brothers of the north. In intervening years of reconstruction and industry in the south the once existing enmity has gradually been forgotten and as the ranks of grey grow thinner each year so is the memory of the cause that prompted the fray buried in the archives of the past.

The south loves these old veterans who fought for a cause they thought to be right, and her people pay homage to them each succeeding year, thankful that they have been preserved as living memorials of the bloody conflict which bound together in everlasting union the states of this great country of ours.

Senator Lodge apparently intended to lay low on the World Court subject and keep it pigeonholed had not the president and Secretary Hughes in an effort to shift attention from domestic corruption begun to devote the majority of their speeches to our foreign relations and the need of a world court. Under the Democratic Administration foreign alliances were very obnoxious to Senator Lodge but it seems now that he has been forced to advocate the immediate establishment of a World Court or appear to be taking opposite sides from that of his administration leader.

With the primaries just four weeks from today and the ideal weather for setting out tobacco here there is considerable work going on in both political and tobacco fields in Pitt County.

Many things have been forgotten at various times including the scheduled execution of a prisoner in one of the southern states but the latest is that a nearby town forgot to hold its municipal elections on the first Monday in May. Evidently there was no superfluity of candidates for the offices.

With the resignation of William J. Burns it seems that resignations have not entirely gone out of style. At any rate there were several more resignations that might be welcomed by the people.

SPECIAL EDUCATION
FOR FOREIGN TRADE
GOAL OF EXPORTERS

New York, May 9.—For the first time in the history of American foreign trade, business men, students, and heads of college and university departments of foreign trade courses, will be brought together at the Eleventh National Foreign Trade Convention in Boston, June 4, 5 and 6, for the purpose of improving the foreign trade career.

Announcement was made yesterday of the program which has been arranged for a review of this situation, with an attempt to reform student courses in a practical manner to the profit of both employer and foreign worker.

Investigation of this career, which has been made during the past winter by the National Foreign Trade Council, the organizer of the Boston convention, has revealed a lack of co-ordination between employers and the sixty odd universities and colleges in the United States training men for a foreign trade career.

It is stated, on the one hand, that there are many thousands of positions in the overseas business of the some twenty-odd thousand American foreign trade business organizations, but that to date no adequate means has been evolved for finding out what the employers require in making a fit man for a fit job.

The importance of this subject, education for foreign trade, in respect to the entire convention, is shown by the fact that this subject will lead the entire group session program, beginning the afternoon of the first day of the convention.

State Committee
Settles Dispute Over
Chairmanship

Greensboro, May 10.—The controversy over the chairmanship of the Guilford County Committee in which Kenneth Brim and H. H. Evans, both of this city, were the two factors of dispute, was settled today by W. G. Brahmham of Durham, chairman of the North Carolina Republican Executive Committee, in favor of Mr. Brim. Brim was elected county chairman during the first part of the year. At a later meeting Brim was unseated and Evans was elected. The supporters of Brim appealed to the state chairman, contending that Brim was the regular elected leader. The state chairman ruled that the latter meeting was irregular.

Romantic Story Screened on Banks of Stanislaus River in California.

from the 73rd Psalm in which the Psalmist bewails the fact that the wicked prosper in their ungodliness while the servant of God is left to suffer, and in reading the lesson frequently interpolated the reading with illuminating commentaries on the text of the scripture.

In introducing his subject, Mr. Ham stated that he was going to deal with one of the greatest mysteries that thoughtful and intelligent men have ever had to deal with and that this mystery was responsible for more "honest" skeptics than probably any other one cause namely: If there is a God, why will He permit and tolerate the arrogance of the ungodly toward His own people and why will He even prosper them in their lives of sin?

"God spoke to His people in every generation of history from Adam to Malachi through special messengers," said Mr. Ham, "and then for a period of 300 years the heavens became silent, only to be broken when God sent His angels to Elizabeth and Mary and the Bethlehem shepherds to announce the coming of the Prince of Peace. Then for a short period God again spoke in various ways to His people, but in 42 A. D. on the occasion of the liberation of Simon Peter for the last time, the silence of heaven began again and has continued from that day to this, despite all manner of persecutions and sufferings that God's people have had to suffer. In the first three centuries over 450 million Christians were murdered or suffered horrible deaths from persecutions; in every age since then there have been martyrs to the cause of Christianity who have suffered useless and cruel persecutions and death and God has remained silent and permitted it all. Even today missionaries go to foreign fields with the story of Christ and are rewarded with pain and suffering and death and never a word from God. Great and mighty armies, because of the lust and greed of selfish men have marched to the groans of helpless orphans and suffering widows, and have pillaged and wasted in a most useless and criminal manner and yet God sits and sees and permits it all. Is it any wonder that some of the greatest scholars of the world say skeptically, 'If there is a God, why did He permit the German war lords to perpetrate the world war?' If tonight the skeletons of those who lost their lives in that war were to begin marching by this tabernacle it would take them four months, marching 20 abreast, to pass this spot and yet God saw fit to permit that useless and cruel waste of life with never a protest. Yes, I say with the skeptic, that if the Christians cannot explain this silence then there is ground for his skepticism, but thank God, the Christian can explain this mystery and, if he knows his Bible, he need not be afraid to face any question, however perplexing."

The evangelist then explained that there have been a number of erroneous and confusing solutions to this mystery advanced from different sources and in this connection he continued in part:

Has Purpose With Jew.

"Some have advanced the theory that God is through dealing with the Jew, that his purpose for the Jew has been accomplished and hence God has no more to say. This, however, is not to be supported either from prophecy or providence. The prophecies of the Bible clearly show that God has yet a great purpose for the Jew and that His dealings with that wonderful nation have just begun.

"Others claim that the church and Christianity have failed and that God is through with them, but I deny that theory and no man that knows his New Testament would make such a contention. God is through with some things that the present day regards as Christianity but this age has misinterpreted Christianity.

"Still others maintain that the church and the gospel are gradually conquering and that they will ultimately overcome all these difficulties without any direct action from God and that the Kingdom of God will be established on earth before Christ returns again to the earth. Such a contention merely displays a wilful blindness to or an absolute ignorance of the actual facts which go to show that the apostle Paul alone converted more people to Christ in his day proportionately than the church is converting today.

Then others have resorted to the explanation that man is not a creation of God's and that therefore he can not expect to hear God speak. In other words they resort to Darwin's theory of the origin of man. That system of philosophy led its author into the wilderness of despair and materialistic atheism and will lead every one else to that or destructive criticism and yet will not explain the great mystery. What then is the explanation?

Man's Own Fault

"God has tested man under every dispensation of history until now, and in each of them man has failed—and in each of them God has failed despite the fact that God spoke to him, cared for and gave signs of His power, and finally man even went so far as to crucify His only Son when He came to earth to minister to man. Now God has withdrawn from the earth—He has pronounced sentence on the earth for crucifying His Son, but He has declared an armistice, and has suspended judgment in order that He might give man one more chance. He has called man to surrender on the terms of the cross and He has left the cross with its blazing message of His love and its open show of man's hatred of God to be His last final message to this world. God has spoken—it is now for man to answer the question, 'What will you do with Jesus and His cross?' The silence of God during this dispensation of grace is a tribute to the cross of Calvary and is calculated to keep from marring the effect and influence of that cross.

"Then God is letting man learn through experience that he cannot get along without God. Man's histories have been filled with great recitals of wonderful deeds and marvelous achievements but in fact his history is one continuous story of blood, blood, blood and conflict and suffering. Even today 5,000 are starving in one country while in this country foodstuffs and necessities of life are in many places going to waste, a silent testimony to the fact that man has not the ability even to feed himself. God is showing us our weakness by leaving us to reap the reward of our boasting and arrogance and stupendous conceit.

"Then God is keeping silent that He might show His power in grace through faith. God is going to make fools of us by the foolishness of preaching—the preaching of the cross—He is using some of the weakest men today just as He did the apostles. They were men who didn't have influence enough to keep out of jail but who had power enough to turn the world upside down and they did it just by the power of God working through grace.

"God is exactly in the position of a father who in reproving his child, tells him that he has spoken for the last time; He cannot speak again without speaking in judgment. When God speaks again, brother, it will be in judgment and your only hope is in that last message of love that was given this old world on Calvary's Cross. Accept that message or you are too late. This long silence is like that lull that comes just before the storm. Soon the storm will break in all its fury and your only refuge is in the Cross. Brother, the question, the supreme question, for you tonight is, 'What shall I do with Jesus and his cross?'"

MAY DAY AT COLLEGE

A pageant of the seasons will be presented by East Carolina Teachers College and Model School, under the supervision of the Department of Physical Education, Monday Afternoon, May 12, at 4 o'clock on the front campus.

The Public is Invited.

First comes the Royal Procession, then the crowning of the Queen of May and the awarding of Athletic Trophies.

These May Day revels and the pageant which follows are given in honor of the Queen of May. In this pageant the cycle of the year, with its changing seasons, is portrayed by symbolic dance and pantomime.
