

MAY DAY REVELS GREATLY ENJOYED TEACHERS COLLEGE

Pageant Directed By Miss Tolleson of Physical Education Department

The May Day revels at East Carolina Teachers College Monday afternoon were entrancingly beautiful. The maze of color and rhythm in the symbolic dances made the spectators feel as if they were in Fairy Land. They had no difficulty whatever in following the nature legends in the Pageant of the Seasons so smoothly did the movement run.

Following several days of inclement weather, and in the face of threatening clouds the campus was thronged with visitors from Greenville and from out of town who watched the whole performance through with the closest attention.

In this pageant the cycle of the year with its changing seasons was portrayed by symbolic dances and pantomime. Autumn with Jack Frost, the Snowbirds preceding Winter, in its whirlwind of white, the Bluebirds and Spring with Daffodils, Violets and Narcissus, an interlude of rain and storm, the Rainbow bringing in Butterflies and Crows followed by Vegetables with a horde of Grasshoppers; Summer with its gift of flowers all danced and sang across the green of the campus in a rhythmic picture of charm and delighted the eye.

The Pageant was a summing up of the work of the Physical Education Department during the year, and was directed by Miss Dorothy Tolleson of the Department of Physical Education. The various college classes participated, as well as the children of the Training School department under the direction of their teachers.

The costumes which were beautiful in their finish and variety were designed as stage projects under the direction of Miss Tarpley of the Home Economics Department and made by the girls themselves and the students in the Training School department.

All that was shown was an outgrowth of the regular work of the year, both in the college proper and in the training school.

Miss Mary Lou, a member of the Senior-Norman class, played the accompaniments throughout.

Miss Helen Knott was crowned Queen of the May by the president of the college. Miss Knott was chosen by her schoolmates as the best all round college student. Her attendants were the presidents of the various organizations.

The Court Jester, Miss Nettie Taylor, came in advance of the Royal procession and remained on the green throughout the whole performance. Her original antics contributed greatly to the enjoyment of the spectators.

In solo dancing, Miss Elizabeth Morris, is Jack Frost, Miss Helen Vinarski as King Sol, Miss Nancy Brantley as Narcissus, Miss Isa Gordon Tucker as Lightning, Miss Pearl White as the Rainbow, and Miss Lillian Leary as the Wild Rose were well high perfect in their parts.

The group dancing by college classes, and by different grades from the Training School fitted well into the scheme of things, and carried on the movement without a break. There was no confusion. The children kept their places as spectators until time for them to appear, and moved into their part of the Pageant without any disturbance or confusion.

There has hardly been a more beautiful sight on the campus than the golden haired queen with her attractively costumed attendants as they stood around the throne presiding over the revels.

In connection with the exercises the basketball trophy was awarded by President Wright to the first year normal class. The other athletic tournaments had not been concluded on account of the inclement weather last week, and will be played off later.

Congressman Convicted of Conspiracy

CONVICT LANGLEY OF CONSPIRACY IN WHISKEY DEALS

Attorneys for Kentucky Congressman File Motion for Appeal

Washington, May 13.—The case of Representative John W. Langley, Republican, Kentucky, who was found guilty yesterday, by Federal court in Kentucky, of conspiracy in connection with whiskey transactions was taken up today by the House committee named to investigate the charges made against him.

Covington, Ky., May 13.—Attorneys representing Congressman John W. Langley, Kentucky, who was found guilty by a jury in Federal court of conspiracy to sell and transport liquor, appeared before Judge Cochran today and announced they would appeal the case. Judge Cochran gave them until one o'clock to prepare their motion for appeal. Attorneys for Milton K. Lipschitz, of Philadelphia, co-defendant of Langley, who likewise was found guilty, also announced intentions to appeal from the verdict.

It is expected that Judge Cochran will immediately pass upon the motion and if it is overruled will pass sentence.

Gaston Farmers Protest Against Examination Fee

Gastonia, May 13.—Protest against the inspection fee will be the subject of a mass meeting that has been called by the dairymen of the city and county which will be held Saturday. The city council recently enacted an ordinance called for the inspection of milk and meat cows of the city and of those in county who did business in the city, and provided for an assessed fee of 50 cents per cow. As a whole the dairymen do not object to having their cows or milk inspected, it was said, but the objection was to the fee of inspecting each animal especially as the idea did not originate with the dairymen. It is claimed by the dealers that their milk and other products have been giving satisfaction.

Issues Challenge For Repeal Two Thirds Rule

Chicago, May 13.—A challenge for supporters of William G. McAdoo for Democratic presidential nomination to go on record in favor of repealing the Democratic convention rule requiring a two-thirds majority for nomination has been issued by George Brennan, Illinois Democratic leader.

Mr. Brennan's challenge follows the claim made yesterday at Nashville, Tenn., by David L. Rockwell, McAdoo's manager, that at the New York convention the former Secretary of Treasury will receive 648 1-2 or 100 more than a majority of the convention votes.

"If figures cited by Rockwell are correct," Brennan said, "Mr. McAdoo should insist upon repeal of the two thirds rule."

Urges Restoration Robt.E. Lee Mansion

Washington, May 13.—Restoration of the Robert E. Lee mansion at Arlington cemetery as nearly as practicable to its condition prior to the Civil War, was proposed today in a resolution by Representative Cramton, Republican, Michigan.

The Secretary of War would be authorized under the resolution to reassemble furniture used in the mansion prior to the war wherever possible and to replace missing articles by reproduction.

Mr. Cramton said that restoration of the mansion would emphasize the better understanding between the North and South and at the same time pay tribute to a great American.

Fayetteville Man Killed

Fayetteville, May 13.—"Bill" Tola, Fayetteville boy, former sailor, was cut to death here last night. "Red" Oliver, Fort Bragg soldier, is being held charged with the killing.

According to Tola's statement, to police before his death, he asked the soldier for some money which he claimed was owed to him. Oliver cursed him, he said, and an encounter followed. He said that during the encounter Oliver drew a knife and cut him in the stomach and then in the back.

Tola was taken to Pittman hospital and died two hours after the operation.

Oliver was arrested shortly afterward and is held in the stockade at Fort Bragg.

RETAIN CONTROL TAX CONFEREES

Washington, May 13.—Republicans retained control of the conferees on the tax reduction bill through appointment today by the Senate of three Republicans and two Democrats the same ratio as that fixed by the House.

Pointing out that the bill as passed by the Senate was modeled on the Democratic plan the main provision of which has been opposed by the Republican organization, Senator Simmons, North Carolina, ranking Democrat on the Finance Committee, had suggested the appointment of three Democrats and two Republicans.

Senator Simmons said he would accept the membership named by the Senate but if the Democratic sections in the bill were not protected he would ask for the discharge of the Senate conferees and the appointment of a Democratic majority.

Campaign to Raise \$7,500,000 to Follow \$75,000,000 Drive

Atlanta, May 13.—Another campaign to obtain \$7,500,000 in 1925 for southwide causes of missions, education and benevolence, is to begin immediately after the close of the \$75,000,000 campaign in December was made known today by officials of the Southern Baptist convention which opens its sessions here tomorrow.

The amount to be raised will be distributed as follows: Foreign Missions 45 per cent, Home Missions 23 per cent, Christian Education 20 per cent and Ministerial Relief 12 per cent.

Court Martialed, Then Executed

Mexico City, May 13.—General Fortunato Maycotte one of the leading military commanders of the De La Huerta rebels, was executed after a court martial at Poohutla Caseca, yesterday, according to a report to the war department from General Alberto Guajardo.

With him were executed his chief of staff, Leovi Gildo, Captain Adila and Manuel Flores.

Former Kaiser and Princess Hermine To Visit In Silesia

New York, May 13.—Former Kaiser Wilhelm and Princess Hermine, his wife, left Doorn today for Seabor, Silesia ostensibly to spend a vacation with her minor children according to a wireless broadcast from Nauen, Germany and picked up by the New York World, that paper states today.

Poincare Ministry to Step Out June 4

Paris, May 13.—Premier Poincare and his recently re-organized ministry will step from power June 4. The premier interpreted the majority given the parties of the Left in Sunday's parliamentary elections as a repudiation of his government and forthwith decided to resign. The decision was ratified at the Council of Ministers held here today.

The new Chamber of Deputies will meet June 2 to elect its president, officials and secretary and then adjourn until June 4 when the new president will deliver the opening address.

Senate Sustains Presidential Veto Of The Pension Bill

Washington, May 13.—President Coolidge's veto of the Bureau pension bill was sustained by the Senate today. The vote to over-ride was 53 to 28 or one less than the two thirds required.

The action crowned the success of the success of the first attempt of Mr. Coolidge to block legislation by exercise of his veto power. Like President Harding he disapproved the bill because of the expense involved.

The measure would have granted pension increases to veterans of several wars.

President Southern Gov. China Reported Dead, Brain Fever

Hong Kong, May 13.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, president of the southern government of China is seriously ill with brain fever but there has been no confirmation of his death which has been reported.

Coal Mine In Operation at Empire Exhibition, Said

London.—A "life sized" coal mine actually underground and demonstrating coal mining as conducted in Wales and Scotland, is one of the interesting educational exhibits at the British Empire Exhibition which is now in full swing.

The "Palace of Neptune" is another of the amusement park attractions which, under a Coney Island title, affords a remarkable exhibit of strange denizens of the seas.

Taken as a whole this feature of exhibition is on a larger scale than London ever has seen. The park was designed by experts and covers over 40 acres. The booths, exhibits and shows have been built in groups and each has a special design. One is called "Toyland" and is on a House-that-Jack-built plan, with gigantic wooden soldiers as supporting columns. Then there is the "Alice in Wonderland" section; the "Garden of Flowers" and many others in addition to the usual water and dry chutes, crazy racers, Ferris wheels and dance halls without end.

Orthopedic Board Meets in Gastonia

Gastonia, May 13.—The Board of directors of the North Carolina Orthopedic Hospital met for its annual conference here and considered the proposed outline of work for the coming year. One of the important features of the meeting was the presentation by H. L. Stanton supervisor of vocational education in North Carolina, of a plan for the extension of the work of the hospital so as to include adult cripples.

The plan for the extension of the hospital includes a new ward for adult cripples where it was pointed out that many persons could be treated and brought to such physical condition that the educational department could then take them over and be of assistance to them. It was requested that sufficient funds for this ward and its operation be included in the hospital's budget and presented to the legislature. The matter was favorably received by the trustees and they promised to give it due consideration.

Profits in Whaling Revive Long Neglected Industry

Madrid, Whaling as an industry has been so profitable in Spain that several new companies are being formed to carry on whaling expeditions. The first station at Algeciras, established and managed by British capital, has been successful in the past year that the same operators will establish another base in the north of Spain. Other companies under Spanish control have already selected operating bases and are purchasing equipment.

Meanwhile the sardine fishing industry is in a precarious condition owing to the distance from the shore at which the fish are caught, and the Galician fisherman who have hitherto been engaged in it are turning their attention to cod. A Spanish commission has been sent to Newfoundland to study the methods of cod-fishing in use in those waters.

ESCAPED CONVICTS TO BE RETURNED TO RALEIGH TOMORROW

Wood and Starnes Captured in Roanoke, Va. Late Yesterday

Roanoke, Va., May 13.—C. H. (Otto) Wood and J. H. Starnes, who escaped from North Carolina state penitentiary last Saturday and were captured here yesterday following an exciting chase on the part of local policemen are being held in the city jail here today for North Carolina authorities who have telegraphed that they will come for the fugitives tomorrow.

Raleigh, May 13.—Indictments charging robbery, theft of automobiles, assault with deadly weapon, breaking jail and other offenses will be asked of the grand jury against Otto Wood and J. H. Starnes, prisoners who escaped from the state prison here Saturday and were captured last night in Roanoke, Va., when they are returned to this state, it was stated by Superintendent Geo. Ross Pou today.

Just what time the prisoners will be returned cannot be determined, Mr. Pou stated, as he has not yet received a reply to his request that Roanoke police bring the prisoners to Raleigh through the country under heavy guard.

C. H. (Otto) Wood was serving a 30 year sentence for the murder of a Greensboro pawnbroker and J. H. Starnes was serving a five years' sentence for larceny in Winston-Salem. The two prisoners Saturday morning after overpowering Overseer D. H. Paffin and forcing him to accompany them out of the prison grounds in an automobile stolen from the prison garage, made their escape in the direction of Durham.

Enroute to Durham the desperadoes held up a negro driving a light truck and forced him to turn the truck over to them. Later in the day searching parties found the truck abandoned but no trace of the prisoners could be found.

Early Sunday morning the escaped convicts were reported to have held up and robbed a Durham man and after forcing him to accompany them to a spot near Greensboro they bound him to a tree and escaped in his automobile. Reaching Winston-Salem they called at the house where Wood's wife was staying and he forced her and their little daughter to accompany him and his companion.

Late yesterday afternoon they were located in Roanoke Va., and after an exciting chase were captured and jailed by a posse of Roanoke police and detectives.

Superintendent Pou today thanked the state bureau of the Associated Press for the aid given officials during the search for the prisoners. The bureau followed closely the movement of the men and it was through information from this source that they were apprehended.

Tagore Denies Reported Displeasure With America

Rangoon, India.—Sir Rabindranath Tagore, noted Bengali writer and educator who in 1913 was awarded the Noble Prize for Literature, repudiates the recently circulated report which quoted him as saying that he did not intend to visit America again because he was disgusted with American materialism.

"It would be childish for me to make such a statement," the poet said. "If I do not visit America again it will be because of my advancing age, not because of any dislike of Americans. Many of my best friends are in America. While I did not find in America all that I had hoped to find, it was a false statement which credited me with not wanting to return."

Dr. Tagore, who was here on his way to China, has been welcomed and feted by all communities, in a manner comparable only to the visits of the Prince of Wales and the Viceroy.

Dr. Tagore, with several of his professors, has been invited to give a course of lectures in Peking. He plans to visit also Japan, Indo-China, Cambodia, Siam and Java. His object in this tour is to re-establish cultural and spiritual connection with India, and to revive the study of Buddhist and Sanskrit literature as a bond of unity between India and these countries.

Occasionally, too, a few benefits from taxes can be traced by the person who is not wholly committed to pessimism.

COTTON STANDARD REVISION

PROPOSED AS AN ECONOMY

Chicago. — If consumers of cotton goods desire maximum wear out of their sheeting, belting, canvas and tires, cotton standards should be revised to include tensile strength in classing cotton for market, according to results of a 15-year field and technical study on the subject, announced by the Bureau of Industrial Research here.

Existing cotton standards also are responsible for much of the child labor in cotton fields and much illiteracy in cotton growing states, a report argues. Study of cotton fiber in the survey provided data which agreed in condemning the present mixture of unripe with ripe cotton in most of the bales which are ginned and shipped, the report added.

TRAIN "SHELL SHOCK" IS NEW DISEASE OF LONDON COMMUTERS

London. — The daily journey to town from the more distant suburbs leads in many instances eventually to "train shell shock," according to medical experts.

The injury develops very gradually, and is caused by the swaying and jolting of the train, the continuous change of scene compelling the adjustment of the eyes, and the noises which trouble the ears, all of which produce a state of semi-stupor. The results are irritability, uncertainty of judgment, failure of memory, loss of appetite, worrying about trifles and incapacity to attend to business.

It takes years to develop this neuritis, and the only real cure is a complete rest and the abandonment of the daily journey.

The Grimesland School closed last Friday. The program for the day was enjoyed by all who were present. The morning program consisted of the class day exercises, and two addresses, one by Hon. E. F. Aydtlett and another by Prof. R. C. Deal. In the afternoon there was a ball game between Gold Point and Grimesland, while the evening program was a Negro Minstrel presented by the High School.

Mr. Aydtlett spoke to the parents and students of citizenship and that which goes to make a citizen. He made it clear to his hearers that since we have a representative system of government, we as citizens are responsible for it being good or bad. He says that it is the duty of the citizens to place in office men who will do their duty and serve without showing partiality to any one.

Prof. Deal, made a comparison of the children of his childhood days and of the children of today. He denied the expression which we so often hear, "The world is getting worse." He says that no generation has ever been brighter or better than the present one. Mr. Deal's address of which was full of humor as well as truth, was enjoyed and appreciated by the entire audience.

In the afternoon Grimesland won its first ball game of this season. By the score 12 to 6. OPPORTUNITY TO ATTEND SUMMER TRAINING CAMP

If the Army Appropriation bill which is now before the Senate for final consideration is passed, it will enable the Commanding General of the Fourth Corps Area to accept applicants up to the age of thirty-one years, provided they have had previous military training, and are educationally qualified to become officers in the officer's reserve corps. In this connection, it will be the policy of the Commanding General, Fourth Corps Area, to select only those applicants whom it is thought would be best qualified mentally, morally and physically, and those to whom the service would offer an urgent appeal.

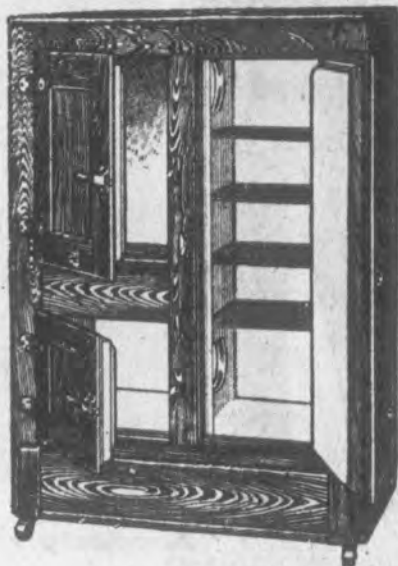

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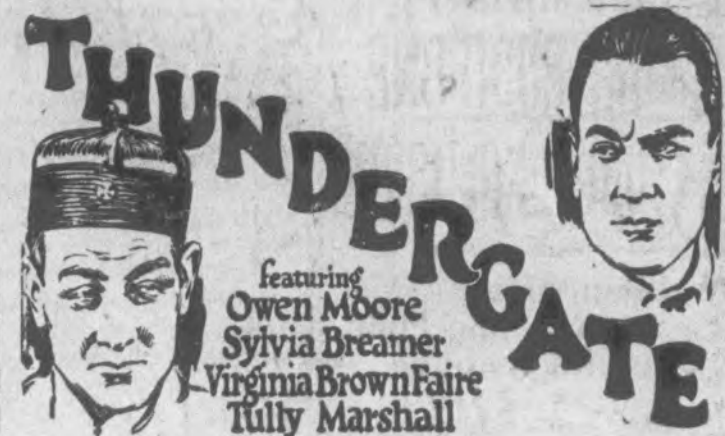
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
