

MAKES FURTHER EFFORT POSTPONE JAP EXCLUSION

President Urges Conference to Allow Time For Negotiations

Washington, May 14. — Further steps were taken by the administration today to obtain postponement of Japanese exclusion.

With the immigration bill embodying the exclusion provision pending final action by the House, president Coolidge called a conference at the White House of Secretary Hughes and ranking House leaders of both parties.

The president it is understood presented again the administration's view that the Japanese exclusion should be postponed until diplomatic negotiations can be conducted with Japan. The negotiations and the basis of the anxiety also over the matter were set forth before the House members and Secretary Hughes.

Demand Vote On Muscle Shoals At This Congress

Washington, May 14. — Demand was made on the floor of the Senate today by Senators Shields, Democrat, Tennessee, and Heflin, Alabama for a vote on a measure for the development of Muscle Shoals at this session of Congress.

Chairman Norris, of the Senate Agriculture Committee, which has the question under consideration said that he favored a vote on the matter at this session of Congress and that no effort was being made to prevent one.

Shortage of Farm Labor Still Prevails Throughout State

Raleigh, May 14.—The shortage of farm labor still prevails over the state and unskilled labor is in demand for various kinds of work, according to the reports made by the branch offices of the State Federal Employment Service to Director M. L. Shipman. Domestic help is being placed more easily now than it was a few weeks ago, the reports say, and the spring projects offer a bright outlook for jobs.

During the week ending Saturday, May 10, the service had 855 registrations, referred 815 of these to the 915 requests for help and placed 732 in positions, the report states. There were 631 men and 224 women who registered; 650 men and 163 women who were referred; and 606 men and 126 women who were placed with the requests for 766 men and 150 women.

The department classified the placements as follows: Unskilled, 472; skilled, 103; domestic, 96; clerical and professional, 49; and industrial, 12.

The cities and their placements were stated to be: Asheville, men 78, women 35, total 113; Charlotte, 161, women 13, total 164; Greensboro, men 71, women 28, total 99; Raleigh, men 55, women, 25, total 80; Wilmington, men 134, women 5, total 139; and Winston-Salem, men 117, women 20 total 137.

Durham's Birth Rate 11 Above Death Rate

Durham, May 14.—The birth rate of this city for the month of April was 11 above the death rate, according to the vital statistics bureau of the Health department. The bureau statement says that there were 89 births, of which 54 were white and 35 were negroes, as compared with 78 deaths of which 26 were whites and 52 were negroes. Of the births, it was reported that three were still born, of which two were negroes and one was white.

The highest mortality rate was reported to be among persons between the age of 40 and 60 years, in which class 17 negroes and 5 whites died during the month of April. The table shows that during the month the following deaths occurred: Under one year of age, five whites and 9 negroes; one to five years, two whites and four negroes; five to 16 years, three negroes; 15 to 25 years, four whites and 7 negroes; 25 to 40 years, four whites and 6 negroes; 40 to 60 years, five whites and 17 negroes; over 60 years, 6 whites and 6 negroes.

A large audience last night heard Mr. Ham's gripping message on "Eternal Punishment" in which he set forth clearly the teachings of the scripture on this vital topic. Following the sermon quite a number responded to his invitation and went to the inquiry room for instruction and prayer.

An unexpected feature of the service last night was a visit from 75 Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. During the singing of the last song before the evangelist took the platform, the hooded figures marching in pairs and headed by their leader entered the building at the rear and marched rapidly down the center aisle, halting just before the platform. (Chorister Ramsey stopped the song in the midst of a verse and the leader of the Klan came to the platform and presented Mr. Ramsey with a note and a bag containing a contribution of \$276. Mr. Ramsey read the note in which the Klan expressed their loyalty to the cause of Jesus Christ and their wholehearted support of the work of the campaign now in progress. Following the reading of the letter the Knights marched rapidly out the front door followed by a rousing ovation from the great audience. Mr. Ham led in a fervent prayer for the members of the organization.

In his sermon last night Mr. Ham said in part:
The subject of Tuesday evening's discourse has been the cause of much controversy. Many have boldly affirmed a disbelief in the reality of any such places and others have sneeringly cast the thought aside. Still others are not bold enough to deny yet are not strongly convinced of the truthfulness of what they assert to as a doctrine; hence are lukewarm in their attitude. While another class strives to argue against hell and convince themselves of its non-existence because of anxiety over some loved one who is dead or one who is incorrigibly steeped in sin, or through personal dread of landing in the place.

The opinions of man cannot be accepted as authority on this question. It is of too serious consequence and upon it too much depends. If there is no such place it is cruel to inflict torture upon sensitive, conscientious persons by causing false alarm. If there is a hell the most diabolically outrageous crime ever perpetrated by one person against another will fade into insignificance when compared to that of creating a false security with reference to this matter. If you are undecided and uncertain about the matter you will do far less harm to any one by causing a false alarm than by creating a false sense of security.

What I wish, and I believe you feel the same way, is to know the truth. Orthodox disciples have believed and taught in all ages that the unbeliever is committed to the everlasting torments of hell.

Christ Jesus was responsible for this belief. If it is not true and He has made a false impression; if intentionally you accuse Him of playing the role of mountebank and unworthy of our confidence and respect. If unintentional, then of being too weak and unreliable to trust, as He may also have misled us on any other question. But such a per-

son could never have inspired confidence, loyalty and love won by the Man of Galilee.

Two things I have noticed: (1) The person that is tenderfooted on hell is never very enthusiastic about the cross; (2) He who insistently denies the existence of hell generally is living a life, openly or secretly, whose latter end would be fortunate were his contentions correct.

God said to Adam and Eve concerning the forbidden fruit: "The day thou eatest thereof thou shalt surely die."

Satan said to them: "Thou shalt not surely die."

Christ says there is a sin beyond the pardoning mercy of God. "It shall never be forgiven him, neither in this age nor in that which is to come." Satan says there is no hell. This is not true.

Christ said there was a gulf between the saved and the lost—a great gulf—impassable gulf (Luke xvi:26). If there is no hell no such separation exists and this description is misleading.

Christ says the last state of a deliberately wicked man is worse than the first so also says the Holy Spirit. Now how can this be true without hell, as the last state must be either heaven or hell. If in heaven this is not true, if it ceases to exist, this is not true. If in hell this is true.

The Holy Spirit says that the wicked shall never see light and that for them is reserved the blackness of darkness forever (Ps. ix 1:19; Jude 13). Will you or Satan say this is a lie?

The Holy Spirit says that God will finally blot the wilful sinner out of the book of life (Ps. xx:15; Is. iv:3; Heb. xii:23; Rev. iii:5). If God has no intention of allowing any one to go to hell this is not true and God is only bluffing.

Death Not Annihilation.
Those who deny the hell into which the wicked are cast call the second death, interpret the term to mean annihilation or cessation of existence. The Scriptures speak of the saved as having everlasting life or a state of blissful endless existence.

The Scripture speak of the wicked as going into eternal death, everlasting shame, everlasting destruction, everlasting anguish, everlasting contempt.

Those who try to obliterate hell say that "aionios" (everlasting) does not mean endless but only a limited time. This word, rendered eternal or everlasting occurs 70 times in the New Testament. The everlasting fire (Matt. xviii:16). The word rendered "everlasting" (Matt. xxv:46—everlasting punishment) is the same word that is rendered "eternal" in Matt. xxv:46.

LANGLEY DRAWS TWO-YEAR TERM

Congressman Convicted in Connection With Whiskey Transactions Sentenced Tuesday

Civington, Ky., May 14.—Congressman John W. Langley, Kentucky, was sentenced to two years imprisonment in the Atlanta penitentiary yesterday by Federal Judge A. M. J. Cochran, following his conviction on the charge of conspiracy in connection with a whiskey transaction in 1921.

Likewise, Milton Lipschutz, Philadelphia, convicted with Langley, and Walter Carey, Canton, O., and M. E. Huth, Alliance, O., were sentenced to two years each in the same prison. Carey and Huth pleaded guilty during the trial.

Judge Cochran pronounced sentence after overruling motions for a new trial filed by attorneys for Langley and Lipschutz. After sentence was pronounced it was announced that an appeal would be taken and Langley and Lipschutz were released on bond.

The attorneys for Carey and Huth were unable to be in court and Judge Cochran released the defendants on their present bond for ten days until their attorneys could appear.

At tomorrow night's session the order of the Temple will be conferred by the degree team of Bethlehem Commandry, of Greenville.

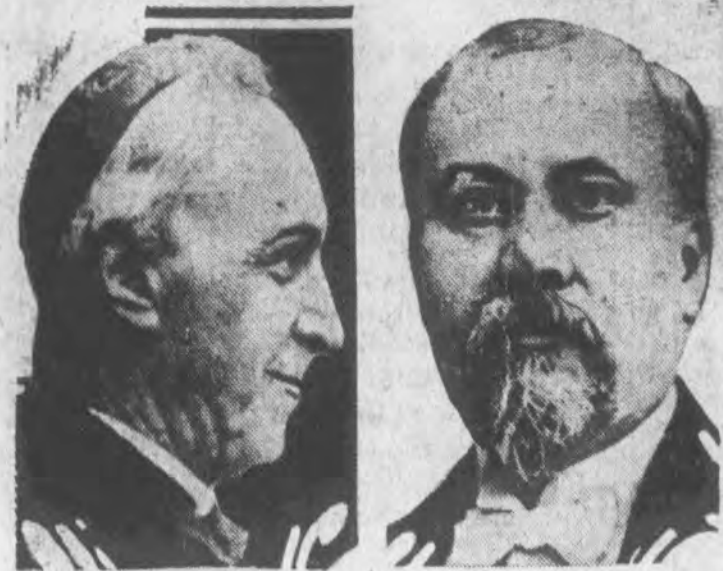

The French election for the Chamber of Deputies was a great victory for the French Democrats, or Left Wing, the Bloc National, which dictated France's aggressive policy, being beaten. Premier Raymond Poincaré, it is believed, must change his policies or suffer defeat in the new Chamber. Congressman Victor Berger, Socialist, of Wisconsin, is urging President Coolidge to call a new conference to revise the Versailles Treaty to conform to Woodrow Wilson's "fourteen points." The belief that radio waves move as fast as light and electricity is disputed by Captain T. J. J. See, professor of mathematics in the U. S. Navy and Government astronomer at Mare Island Navy Yard, California, who declares radio is held back by the earth's attraction, moving 165,000 miles a second to 186,000 miles for light and electricity. Debaters of Wake Forest College To Debate in Atlanta

Wake Forest, May 14.—M. G. Stamey of Asheville and S. W. Lamb of Wake Forest, Wake Forest College debaters, on Tuesday night, May 13, met Mercer University debaters before the Southern Baptist convention in Atlanta. The contest will mark the sixth appearance of Wake Forest debaters before the convention, three out of five of the contests already held resulting in a victory for the North Carolina college. M. G. Stamey captain of this year's team was a member of last year's team which won over William Jewel College at Kansas City. Stamey is also captain of the Wake Forest baseball team and was forced to leave the team while on its northern tour in order to participate in the convention debate.

Mr. Lamb is also an experienced debater. The Wake Forest speakers will discuss the negative side of the question resolved "That Congress Should Enact a National Marriage and Divorce Law."

It was explained, and the poultry will be weighed on scales furnished by a local feed store and operated by a representative of the buyer and the farmer.

SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION OPENS IN ATLANTA TODAY

Nearly 6,000 Representing All Southern States in Attendance At 69th Annual Session

Atlanta, May 14.—Dr. George W. McDaniel, Richmond, Va., was elected president of the Southern Baptist Convention at the opening session here today over Dr. Z. T. Cody, Greenville, South Carolina, and Dr. J. D. Mell, Athens, Ga.

The vote was McDaniel 1687, Mell 748, Cody 659.

H. C. Moore, Nashville, and Joseph Henry Burnett, Murfreesboro, Tennessee, were elected secretaries, George W. N. Norton, Louisville, Ky., treasurer, and W. P. Harvey, Harrodsburg, Ky., auditor.

Atlanta, May 14.—The Sixty-Ninth annual session of the Southern Baptist Convention opened today with upwards of 6,000 in attendance from Maryland, Mississippi, Oklahoma, Kentucky, Texas, North and South Carolina, Florida, Arkansas, Georgia, District of Columbia, Illinois, Tennessee, Virginia, Alabama, New Mexico and Missouri. Fraternal delegates from the Northern Baptist Convention are also here.

First on the program this morning was the election of officers followed by the annual report and address of Dr. E. Y. Mullins, of Louisville, Ky., president of the convention. Dr. Mullins has previously announced that he would not be a candidate for reelection and those most prominently mentioned to succeed him include Dr. George W. McDaniel, Richmond, Va., Dr. Z. T. Cody, Greenville, S. C.; John T. Mell, Athens, Ga.

More than 4,000 delegates to the convention, who assembled in a laymen's meeting last night heard speakers condemn the Modernists and Fundamentalists controversy and urged entry of the United States into the League of Nations. The gathering also passed resolutions condemning the anti-prohibition bills now before Congress, seeking modifications of the Volstead Act, and called upon Congress to strengthen instead of weaken the prohibition laws.

Making a strong plea for the successful culmination of the \$75,000,000 Campaign, President E. Y. Mullins in his address, called upon the churches of the South to gather up in the remaining months of the campaign all the energies in their power and to go forth to a great victory.

"We have made great gains," Dr. Mullins said. "Some one says the most depressing expression in the English language is the phrase 'I cannot' and that the most inspiring phrase is 'I can'. We have learned the meaning of both and a new sense of power has come beyond all questions."

Declaring that the attention of mankind has been challenged by a sublime undertaking and daring commitment of faith, the speaker asserted that the denomination has come into a new sense of unity, power and a new position of influence in the world, through the measure of success already achieved in the campaign.

The raising of the \$75,000,000 was begun at a convention held here in 1919. It closes on November 30, 1924.

"We are at a great hour Dr. Mullins said. May God give us the spirit of sacrifice."

In a discourse devoted largely to the mission of the Southern Baptist Convention, Dr. Mullins restated the aims of the denomination, those that had been undertaken already and those planned for the future. He declared the convention should strive for a demonstration of success of religious democracy on the largest scale known in Christianity, for the campaign funds which are devoted to all missionary objects are the works that will do our mission. "Ours is a crucial test," he declared.

Japan Imports Glider.
Tokio, May 14.—A 13-meter glider is to be imported from France by the aviation experimental bureau of the Imperial University. A French expert will accompany the machine and instruct Japanese airmen in its navigation.

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A BANKRUPT'S REVENGE

Even though they might not care to give it their indorsement as a regular practice, honest folk will not be wanting in sympathy for the unusual course taken by a Hagerstown (Md.) meat dealer to explain his insolvency. Smarting under the sting of having been forced into bankruptcy, the man posted on his front door a list of persons who he declared owed him money and stated that if they had paid their debts he would have been able to pay his. "These people forced me into bankruptcy," said the sign over the names.

In the list, says the correspondent reporting the affair, were the names of some of the prominent housewives of Hagerstown. They were naturally but not righteously indignant, and about 20 of the women stormed the shop and tore the sign down.

Of course it was humiliating to them to have their names exposed to the public gaze in this unpleasant way; yet, if the butcher told the truth—as he probably did—their shame was not undeserved. The bankrupt suffered worse than humiliation; he lost his business as a result of extending credit to persons who failed to meet their obligations; and he can hardly be blamed for wanting to share his humiliation with those responsible for it.

The incident is illuminating as an example of the manner in which petty defalcations in the aggregate affect business. Probably none of the butcher's debtors owed him more than a few dollars each. Yet in their total these bad debts ruined him, and his insolvency in turn will prove at least slightly embarrassing to his creditors. Misplaced trust may cause annoyance to far more than those directly concerned. Happily most people pay their debts; otherwise it would be impossible to do business on a credit system, and without credit commerce would languish.

The Maryland housewives whose names were made public as defaulters are angry

now; but no doubt down in their hearts they are also a little remorseful. They have been taught what the consequences of not paying even small debts may be. If they are more conscientious in meeting their obligations promptly hereafter the butcher's revenge will have served a good purpose.

THE QUEST CONTINUES

The scientific world is anticipating many archaeological discoveries by the American expedition which will set out this month with Roy Chapman Andrews as its head to uncover the origin of man in the paleolithic rock of the Gobi desert of Asia. In this same desert Andrews, on an earlier expedition, found the bones of prehistoric animals and the giant eggs of the dinosaur. It is on the findings of the dinosaur eggs that he mainly bases his hope of finding the original man within the next five years.

There have been skulls, jaws, bones, skeletons and fossils of early man found in many parts of Europe and Asia, giving an almost unbroken knowledge of man's existence and development since about 550,000 B. C., but the archaeologists are not content. They are not looking for the fabled "missing link" but for the man whom they believe lived on this earth before there had been an ape evolved.

The Gobi desert has been fixed by Andrews as the birthplace of man because of archaeological evidence that the dinosaur, whose eggs he found in the Gobi desert, and the first man were products of the same age and lie buried in the same rock strata awaiting the spade of the archaeologist to find them. The dinosaur has already been exhumed. Andrews says nothing is impossible, not even the finding of the father of all mankind.

CAPTIVE BALLOON TELLS ATLANTA WHEN THEY PLAY

Atlanta, Spiller's Field. Atlanta, newest athletic park and the home of the Crackers, the Atlanta Southern Association baseball team, is in many ways one of the most unique fields of its kind in the south.

While built primarily for baseball field, it is readily convertible into a field stadium or arena for any athletic purpose. It covers a space of ten acres, and is ten minutes trolley ride from Five Points, the center of the city.

The plant cost \$185,000 complete, the land on which it is situated being valued by R. J. Spiller at \$225,000 additional. The grandstand normally seats 9,500 persons and the bleachers 4,450. There is standing room in the grandstand to accommodate 2,000 more without causing inconvenience to those who are seated. If it should become necessary within the next five years, the seating capacity can be increased to 32,000 more. In case of larger crowds at some special event there is ample room for the construction of temporary seating arrangements.

A luxurious rest room for women has been equipped, and a competent paid-in attendance constantly during all events at the field.

Lighting arrangements have been installed so that prize fights and other events may take place at night. It is proposed to hold the projected Stribling-McTigue fight at Spiller Field as a kind of christening of night events.

If it is desired to hold a pageant, this can be done by utilizing huge flood lights that are to be placed at strategic positions about the field.

Another unusual feature centers about the Jim Crow Law, which necessitates seating arrangements for negroes separate from white people. Some of the most enthusiastic and vociferous rooters in the south are negroes, whose fog-horn voices can be heard above any din. For negroes, Mr. Spiller has provided a separate grandstand. There are also separate bleachers for negroes.

On days when the Crackers are entertaining a visiting team, a silvery looking captive balloon 30 feet in diameter hovers about 250 to 300 feet above the field. It is said this balloon has been seen as far as 20 miles away with field glasses. When there is no balloon, there is to be no game that day.

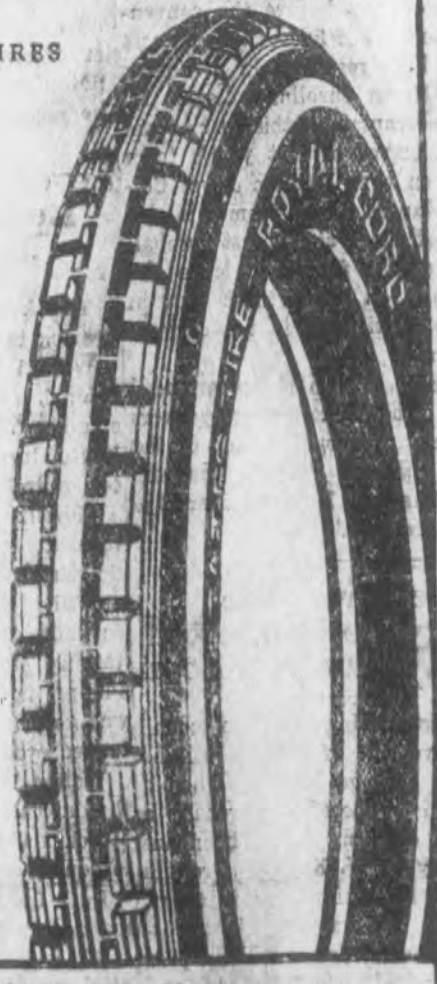

WEATHER AND CROP
GOVERNMENT REPORT

Washington, May 14.—Rainfall was generally light to moderate over the cotton belt, though heavy rains occurred in Northeast portion and planting made very good progress in most districts except the latter part of the week in Northeast. Entirely too cool for germination of late planted and for growth of early planted cotton and progress was generally good. Stands irregular in Texas, where general condition rather poor to fair, though cultivation and chipping made very good progress. Weevil appearing on lower coast. Deterioration occurred in Oklahoma, where unusually cool, causing seed to rot and heavy replanting necessary.

Considerable replanting also in parts of Arkansas, while conditions were generally unsatisfactory for germination on and growth throughout the central states of the belt.

Planting nearly completed in Georgia and chipping finished in south, where crops are in very good condition.

Stands fair to very good in South Carolina, though germination irregular in some sections and latter part of week unfavorable for planting and germination in North Carolina and Virginia. High temperatures were beneficial in the far Southwestern states.

strued as meaning everlasting when applied to the future life of belief-punishment, why should it be consents, or to God, or joy, or heaven? Now the soft-headed dupe may be satisfied with such word-juggling as indulged in by those who are trying to do away with hell, but the thoughtful person will not be convinced by such methods.

Some have allayed their fears by concluding there is no literal fire in hell, but that the Bible only uses a figure and that after all it is not as bad as the thought of fire would make it. I am often asked whether I believe in a hell of literal fire. That question is just another one of the devil's traps. When he starts out to defend a cause he always begins by asking questions. When he came to Eve in the garden he asked her if God had forbidden her to eat of any tree in the garden. You say that fire is the evolution of light and heat caused by the combustion of bodies. Well what is that? The Indians could produce fire by rubbing two pieces of wood together. What sort of stuff set the wood afire? Fire appeared from somewhere. Houses have caught fire from an electric wire, hence electricity has fire in it. I have knocked my knife and flint rock together and made fire. So fire is either in the rock or the steel. I have heard of a barn full of new hay burning because of fire started in the hay. I have seen a load of slacked lime under a drenching rain set a wagon bed afire. So fire may be produced by adding water to burnt limestone rock.

God too Good to Permit Suffering. Another objection is that God is too good to permit such suffering.

If evidence can be produced to prove such statement, well and good but the mere assertion is not enough to justify us in taking a chance of landing there. Where did you learn of God's goodness? From the Bible?

Bible—His love and goodness did not prevent Him from driving Adam and Eve out of the garden and leaving them and their descendants to battle with difficulties, dangers and death.

His goodness did not save the generations of Noah that perished in the flood.

His goodness did not save the people of Sodom and Gomorrah, not even Lot's family; not did it save the descendants of Abraham 225 years of the most rigorous bondage and cruel tyranny under the ambitious monarchs of Egypt. Neither did it save the rebellious multitudes who were slain during the wilderness journeys. His goodness and love did not save the man who picked up sticks on Sunday nor the ones who sinned with Midian. It did not save Israel from going into captivity nor Juda from Babylonian oppression, nor Jerusalem, the city He wept over, from the Roman army. Old men were knocked in the head, women ripped open, children torn to pieces, maidens ravished and multitudes starved. And there are hundreds of thousands of other Bible examples.

History—It did not save Pompeii and other cities which were destroyed by Vesuvius nor the 160,000 who died at the eruption of Mt. Pelee. Nor did it protect the millions who have died from storms and earthquakes, pestilence and famine annually. Behold this slaughter of the age by unnecessary battles! Was God's goodness sufficient to save innocent sufferers such as the women and children?

God was not too good to let our ancestors eat their own corpses while suffering from starvation in Virginia. I stood yonder in Algiers and saw those images of men and women who were encased while alive in plaster paris during that terrible persecution of the Moors.

God has permitted the most terrible suffering that can be imagined by man. While in the Orient, I saw a colony of lepers decaying with that loathsome disease. Some of their hands were eaten off and nothing but stumps, some with feet eaten off, and some with part of their face gone.

God's goodness has not saved our own America from suffering. Think of the war between the states, the San Francisco earthquake, the Galveston flood. Have you thought of the 300,000 girls in the country who are enslaved by the white slave traffickers, the fifty or seventy-five thousand added each year and the 50,000 that go annually to the potter's field? Do you see the 120,000 drunkards who go annually to the drunkard's grave. And have you thought of our packed prisons and hospitals and asylums? In disastrous fires women and children have been burned by the thousands and in one school-house fire 500 little children perished. A Sunday School picnic boat with 1,000 children aboard burned in the Hudson. Have you thought of the good people who suffer an entire lifetime? To convince us that God is too good to permit suffering, my friends you will have to submit evi-

Visiting Nurses Fight Epidemic Diseases by Caring for Sick As They Spread Doctrine of Health



During the first two months of this year 424,986 visits were made by nurses representing the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company to care for acute cases of illness among the company's policyholders. These visits were made to 109,395 individuals living in the 8,955 towns and cities scattered throughout the United States and Canada where this nursing service is available.

In support of the nursing service the Metropolitan distributes through its agency machinery a large quantity of educational health and general welfare literature. This literature has especially to do with the care and welfare of children. The distribution was made directly by the agent or through the co-operation of schools, health officials and social agencies. During the sixty-day period 6,320,651 pieces were given to the public, or an average of slightly more than 100,000 a day.

The Welfare Division of the company, which directs the nursing service and the distribution of literature, has carried on an extensive educational program during this period. The diphtheria movement was conducted in co-operation with local health officials in many places. Of seventy-two campaigns for diphtheria prevention in which the company participated, twenty-



six were originated by company agents. The division keeps close record of epidemic conditions developing in any community and immediately furnishes to its agents in that community the special literature describing the proper precautions. In order to promote health teaching in the elementary schools the company offered fifty scholarship prizes of \$500 each for the teachers doing the best health teaching for the current school year. The contest is being conducted through the American Child Health Association. A total of 1,754 teachers in 53 cities are entered.

History responds to prophecy just like wax in a seal. Of all the critics, not one has ever been able to tear down the Bible.

This Bible has more to say about hell than about heaven. I can find a better description of hell than heaven. It tells very little about what they are doing in heaven, but it uncaps hell and tells us what they are thinking, what they are doing and what they are saying. When Paul was caught up into heaven, he came back and gave us just enough to whet our appetite and leave us hungry. Jesus Himself said more about hell than all the other prophets and apostles put together, but He did not say as much as He could for He had tasted it.

Man's Nature Demands It.

Another reason for hell, the very nature of man demands it. There is no congeniality between the rich and poor, the illiterate and learned, the good and bad, pure and impure, and holy and unholy, neither could there be any congeniality between the regenerate and unregenerate. There is many a man in town tonight that had rather be in some of your hell holes than down here in a prayer meeting. If your pastors want to know why so many people don't go to church it is because they are lost and the food you give them is too good for their nature. They had rather go down into the cess-

poils of sin and drink the sediment of his old world. Whosoever the carcass is, the eagle will be. You cannot take a hog and make him enjoy a parlor. You put him on your velvet carpet and set him up to your table of dainties and leave the back door open and see if he doesn't walk out and choose a pair of dishwater out of a trough in the backyard.

If death is going to change us, why all this travail, toil and worry about the souls of men? If I thought that I don't know but what I would get my gun and start out. Death changes no man as far as giving him a new nature and new birth, for there isn't a line of Scripture that tells us we will have a chance after death comes upon us.

What Christ Says. The man who thinks there is no hell while he is faring sumptuously and living off the fat of the land, forgets nine tenths of the world have more hell than anything else. If there is no devil and hell, who is carrying on the work of the devil? But, friends, there is. The rich man lifted up his eyes in hell. You say that is a parable. Who said it was? Jesus didn't. There isn't a parable in this Bible that gives a man's name. Not it was an actual historic occurrence.

I believe Lazarus lived and lay at the rich man's door, ate crumbs the dogs licked his sores, and when death came was carried up to heaven by angels. I believe the rich man has been in hell these 2,000 years begging for mercy. He had everything to live for and nothing to die for. No angel bands to sing and light his way to the mansions above, but the black-winged angel to bear his soul and the doomed of hell to greet him as he entered the flames of torment. Only a little while and we hear him crying: "Father Abraham, have mercy." He did not beg for mercy when it could be obtained. "Send Lazarus." Oh, how humiliating to have to ask Lazarus for a drop of water.

The wicked shall be turned into hell. Where the worm dieth not and the fire is not quenched. Eternal fire which is prepared for the devil and his angels. And be tormented with fire and brimstone and the smoke of their torment goeth up for ever and forever and they have no rest day or night.
