

CITY SCHOOLS WILL CLOSE YEAR'S WORK FRIDAY, MAY 20

Commencement To Be Featured By Musicals and Prominent Speak- ers

The Greenville City Schools will come to close on Friday night May 30. The commencement address will be delivered by Hon. Lewis W. Perrin, Mayor of Spartanburg, S. C., and the sermon to the Senior Class will be delivered by Dr. Milton A. Barber, rector of Christ's Episcopal church, Raleigh, N. C. The sermon will be preached in the High School auditorium on Sunday night, May 25 at eight o'clock. The address to the class and the graduating exercises will be held in the auditorium of the East Carolina Teachers College. The graduating exercises will be held in the college auditorium instead of the high school because of the fact that the graduating class is so large this year, and the school authorities felt that it would be best to have the exercises in a place large enough to take care of the parents of the members of the class and their friends. Heretofore only a very small percentage of the people who desired to do so, could obtain admittance to the exercises. The music for the Sunday night services will be furnished by the combined choirs of the city churches. This is a new idea also, but ought to prove a very attractive one. Friday morning, May 30, High School auditorium 10:30, the graduating exercises of the Seventh Grade graduates and their reception into the High School.

Sunday night, May 25, High School auditorium, 8 o'clock, Annual sermon to the Graduating Class, by The Rev. Milton A. Barber, rector of Christ Church, Raleigh.

Friday night, May 30, College auditorium, eight fifteen o'clock Annual address to graduating class, by Hon. Lewis W. Perrin, Spartanburg, South Carolina.

There is no charge for admission to any of the above mentioned exercises, and the friends of the school are invited and urged to be present.

EXPERT TO SPEAK HERE ON MONDAY ON BOLL WEEVIL

Meeting Will Be Held in Courthouse During Noon Recess of Court

Col. Harvie Jordan, secretary of the American Cotton Association at St. Matthews, S. C., will speak to the business men and farmers here, Monday next, May 19th at the noon recess in the courthouse. Col. Jordan will discuss the Boll Weevil situation as it affects Eastern North Carolina this year.

When the boll weevil made his first appearance across the border from Mexico, Col. Jordan was the man the government selected to go there to make an investigation as to what would be best to do. Col. Jordan after going there made a recommendation to the government that zone be established and that a quarantine law be put into effect immediately to check the onward march of the bug. But this was not done, and now the weevil has covered the entire cotton belt, leaving his foot prints in the cotton fields, bank of fices, merchants' books and in fact in every phase of business activity.

Since that time Col. Jordan has been a close student of his habits, means of livelihood, etc., a large part of this time working with the government. But for the past decade, he has been active in promoting plans to off set the effects the bug, through the American Cotton Association. Col. Jordan is coming on the invitation of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, and it is hoped that a large number of business men as well as farmers will attend the meeting Monday at noon at the court house. Don't miss this opportunity to get some real facts that will help you this season make more cotton than you might make otherwise.

35 Control Stations.

The Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, some time ago secured 35 boll weevil control stations from the American Cotton Association for the territory covered by that organization. Pitt county will have three of these stations; the Greenville Banking & Trust Co., and Blount Harvey Co., will conduct one jointly; the Bethel Banking & Trust Co., will have one and the Bank of Farmville and Citizens Bank of Farmville, one jointly. These demonstrations will consist of eight acres each. They will be supervised by a competent field man sent out by the American Cotton Association, assisted by workers of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce. Lessons will be given from time to time on the demonstration plot, to show the farmers how to poison the cotton properly and to encourage them to use better cultural methods. Notices will be sent out in advance of these field meetings so that as many farmers may be had as possible to witness the demonstrations. Everybody is invited to the meeting Monday at noon in the court house to hear Col. Jordan.

SAYS SUN YAT SEN, PRESIDENT CHINA, IS STILL LIVING

Confidential Secretary Informs Associated Press That Reports of Death Untrue

Hong Kong, China, May 16.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, president of the South China government, whose death was reported to have occurred Tuesday is alive and perfectly well his confidential secretary emphatically declared today to a representative of The Associated Press sent from Hong Kong to Sun's Canton headquarters as a result of rumors that have been circulated to the effect that the report of the death of the leader was untrue.

Upon being so emphatically assured that Mr. Sun was still alive the correspondent requested an interview with him. This request was denied, the correspondent cabled Hong Kong. The secretary said that Sun Yat Sen did not feel called upon to prove to anybody that he was not dead in view of the statements to the contrary issued by Mr. Sun's headquarters.

EXPLOSION OF GIFT PACKAGE INJURES THREE

Pekin China, May 16.—A box, which an unidentified messenger brought today as a gift to Dr. Wellington Koo, Chinese Foreign Minister, exploded and critically injured three servants whom the minister had ordered to open the box.

Dr. Koo, who was in another room in his residence when the explosion occurred, was unhurt.

According to the Nice correspondent of the Paris L'Auto, Suzanne Lenglen, world's champion woman tennis player, is ill with jaundice and will be unable to defend her three French championships. In a signed statement Rear Admiral W. F. Fullam, U. S. N., retired, declares there is nothing fundamentally wrong with the American surface fleet, which he says is not inferior to the British. Tonight the schools of the city will attend the service in a body to hear Mr. Ham's special message on "The Tests of Christian Character." This afternoon Mr. Ham is speaking to an audience of Women only on the spiritual problems of Womanhood.

Tomorrow afternoon the party is to motor to Washington where they will conduct a service at 2 o'clock.

Mr. Ham last night led up to his text with the statement that "Some things cannot be explained except from God's word. Many of you have loved ones who are just as near Hell as they are death and yet you sit here indifferent and unconcerned. How do you explain it? There can be but one explanation and that is that the 'strong man, well armed' is guarding his courts and his goods are in peace."

Advocates Claim Sufficient Votes to Over- ride Veto by President Who Characterized Bill as "Unsound Eco- nomically and Unjust"

Washington, May 16.—Characterized by President Coolidge as being unsound economically and having no moral justice, the Soldiers' Bonus bill will be taken up by the House tomorrow with advocates claiming more than the required two-thirds to override his veto.

Supporters in the Senate, which is expected to be called upon to act early next week if the measure is repassed by the House, today claimed enough ballots to make it a law.

Asserting that "we owe no bonus to able bodied veterans of the world war and that the nation is meeting its obligations to disabled veterans and the dependents of those who died," the president in his veto message declared "an adequate insurance" had already been provided and that the bill called for "gratuity which our country cannot afford" and "which the veterans as a whole do not want and which is opposed by all of our American principles."

Returned unsigned to the House where the measure originated, it was immediately taken up by its friends in an effort to over-ride the executive action, and only the counsel of leaders of both parties obtained a postponement of a vote until tomorrow.

The president in vetoing the measure issued his statement in a document of more than 2,000 words declared he could see no justification of the bill into law. "Our country cannot afford it. Our veterans as a whole do not want it, all our American principals are against it, there is no moral justification for it."

Proceeding in his discussion of the bill, Mr. Coolidge declared no bonus was owing to the able bodied veterans of the world war. "The gratitude of the nation to these veterans cannot be expressed in dollars and cents." The respect and honor of the country will rightly be theirs forever more, but patriotism can neither be bought nor sold; it is not for hire, nor sale; it is not material, but spiritual. To attempt to pay money for it is to offer it an unworthy indignation which cheapens, debases, and destroys it. "We must abandon our theory of patriotism, or abandon this bill."

The economy or financial grounds as expressed by the President, with an inference that should the bill become a law hope for tax reduction must be abandoned.

The government, he said had reached a financial condition which permitted of a reduction in taxation, but if this bill becomes a law, we wipe at once almost all the progress five years have accomplished in reducing the national debt.

The bill he argued would cost the country over a period of 20 years an additional average annual appropriation of nine hundred and fourteen million dollars and at the end of that time it would be necessary to sell for the public two and a half billion dollars in bonds—a major operation in finance, which he said might be disastrous at the time.

The executive asserted that the disabled veterans were being given training for trades, and assurance had already approved for the care of all disabled veterans.

"We have no money to bestow upon a class of people that is not taken from the people as a whole."

"Our first consideration must be for the nation as a whole. This outweighs in importance the consideration of the class, and the latter must yield to the former."

At the morning meeting which was followed by a picnic on the college grounds. The Grand Lodge of North Carolina paraded from the Masonic hall to the new building where the ceremonies were held. High Point, May 16.—Several hundred persons including Methodist and Masons from all over the state attending the exercises of the laying of the cornerstone to the new Point College, here Wednesday. The laying of the cornerstone took place at 1:45 with J. L. Everett, Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of North Carolina of A. F. and A. M. in charge of the ceremonies.

"Education Day" was celebrated and an extensive program of educational promotion and entertainment was carried out. Dr. H. L. Freeman, president of Adrian College, Michigan was the principal speaker.

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WORTHWHILE TRAINING

A few days ago three boy scouts were playing in an excavation near Jamiaca, N. Y. when a cave in completely buried one of the lads.

In absence of tools with which to remove the earth from their playmate the other boys began immediately digging with their hands. First one of the feet of their comrade was located and from this they estimated where to reach his head and it was here that they began to dig. After several minutes they were successful in uncovering his head and shoulders and one of the lads employing the methods of resuscitation that had been taught him as a scout began the work of reviving his unconscious comrade while the other continued to remove the dirt from him.

After about twenty minutes their efforts were successful and together they helped the boy to get home.

It was stated that had it not been for the knowledge of resuscitation that no doubt the patient would have smothered before aid could have been summoned.

This incident illustrates clearly the value of the training that Boy Scouts get and is just one of the many reasons why everyone should be willing and anxious to give their moral and financial support to such a great movement.

THE HOME

President Coolidge, in his address opening the observance of Better Homes Week, did well to emphasize the spiritual as well as the material side of the subject. It goes without saying that a home that is comfortable and

attractive contributes to the happiness of those who occupy it. Those back of the movement which is taking on extra activities this week, are rendering a most important service in promoting the education of the people as to the type of homes which should be built and the manner in which they should be equipped. The Reflector has emphasized that there could be no more practical philanthropy than the building of comfortable and attractive houses to be sold or rented at moderate prices. After paying a tribute to those who are trying to meet the demand for better houses, the president impresses that in the accomplishment of this an important step will have been taken toward improvement of the well-being of the nation. Continuing:

The American home is the source of our National well-being. In its high traditions of service and integrity are fostered. From the home there migrate respect for the rights of others and the habit of co-operating for worthy ends. Through sharing its common enterprises and common sacrifices the child develops that sturdiness of character which distinguishes the manhood and womanhood of our land.

Thus, we are reminded that home-builders are not alone those whose materials are wood, brick, stone and marble. Good fathers and mothers add immeasurably to the structure by the inculcation of ideals and the spirit of love. Contentment is the great end sought. Down through the centuries there has come to us: "Better is a dinner of herbs where love is, than a stalled ox and hatred therewith." The good home takes hold of the heart. It becomes a part of the lives of its occupants. Nothing can efface its charms.

Let thought be given to the home in all its phases. Whether a palace or a cottage, if either lacks the right spirit in its occupants it will be but a house. It takes love and kindness to make a home of it.

COTTON LETTER.

New Orleans, May 16.—Climate developments over night having been more favorable than generally expected, no rain of consequence west of the Mississippi river with moderate to heavy showers in the South Atlantic, but no frost in the Southwest and prospects for better weather inland market ruled easier today.

The weather Bureau predicts fair and warmer weather for nearly all sections of the cotton region tonight and Saturday. Dr. warm weather is desired throughout the belt to permit satisfactory germination of late planted seed, and to force growth of youth cotton.

Larger spinners takings for week than generally looked for, 207,000 bales against 181,000 last year; occasioned a temporary hurry in values but offerings increased on the bulge, causing market to rule easier again.

Fall River sales of print cloths for the week were estimated at only 15,000 per cent the smallest of the season comparing with 30,000 last week.

Rumor has it that 15,000 to 25,000 bales are headed for New York to deliver on May contracts in the northern market. Additional tenders of about 2900 bales were made there today.

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TWO OLD BUGABOOS WILL BE BURIED IN MADISON S. GARDEN

New York.—When the National Democratic Convention shall have named its presidential ticket in Madison Square Garden and adjourned, observers predict it also will have buried two political bugaboos that have kept national political conventions from New York for 56 years.

"They are 'Tammany Hall' and 'Wall Street.' 'What?' ran the old fears, 'hold a national convention, where our delegates would be exposed to the sinister wiles of Tammany? Invite them to enter the sphere of the influence of Wall Street? Never; and place but New York.'

Those who went from this city to Washington to bid for the convention this year met and, to their surprise, overcame those objections. Now Tammany and Wall Street feel it their duty to demonstrate to expected visitors that they never were as bad as they were painted.

Tammany points to her picturesque and patriotic origin, admits she sowed a few wild oats in the 'Boss Tweed' days of the last century, and claims she now has become a sedate and law-abiding political and welfare organization.

The name, 'Tamanend' (the affable), and the ritual were taken from the Delaware Indians by a group of Whigs who, in 1789, organized for social rights as opposed to federalism, and to counteract the revolutionary war officers' order of the 'Society of the Cincinnati,' which was headed by George Washington. Though they sometimes were called 'Sons of St. Tammany' or 'The Columbian Order,' they always designated their

headquarters as wigwams and their members as grand sachems, sagamores, wiskinskies and braves.

Gradually the organization attained political power. Then, in 1842, began the series of gang demonstrations which, culminating in 1870 in exposure of the huge graft ring of the Grand Sachem, William Marcy Tweed, welded to Tammany the stigma 'corrupt.'

Two generations have entered the game of politics since then. Tammany claims to have kept pace with the purification process the game has undergone. She still has her thousands of members, her 13 tepees and her big wigwam on Fourteenth Street, the one dedicated during the last national party convention here in 1868. She still helps the destitute, and plays politics.

Wall Street holds that she, too, has been maligned by tradition. She will show them, first of all, that Wall Street as generally applied, is a misnomer, that the Street actually is just a short, crooked lane flanked by ordinary business structures, a lane with the East River at one end and historic Trinity Church at the other, where the pioneers of American commerce hung out their shingles, and where their sons carry on.

She will demonstrate to the visitors that big finance isn't centered in Wall Street, that all lower Manhattan, all New York, in fact, is the home of big finance. And she will seek to show that this city is merely the reservoir for the mighty streams of American capital, rather than a web set to catch and hold the dollars of the nation.

Managers of the convention, as well as local financiers, intend to let each delegate see for himself so that he may return to his native hearth and lay low the 'Wicked Wall Street' fantasy.

The New York Stock Exchange, the Consolidated, and the New York Curb Market, the nation's three greatest security markets, will join the 12 biggest commodity trading organizations, 100

of the country's biggest banks, and most of the noted brokerage houses, in throwing open their doors to convention visitors.

GERMANY LOSES MAN POWER BY EXTENDED IMMIGRATION

Berlin.—Germany had six percent less population at the beginning of 1924 than it had at the beginning of 1913, according to the estimates of the German statistical office. The total population is now placed at 63,500,000.

An analysis of the figures shows the decrease in man power has been more marked than the general decline. There are now seven percent fewer men between the ages of 15 and 65, and the number of able-bodied men between 20 and 45 has been dropped 13 percent. Also the proportion of children under ten has dropped from 33 percent to 18 percent.

Emigration is making violent reductions in population of the very character that Germany needs most for reconstruction. Discussing the migration of the sturdiest of Germany's young farmers, industrial workers, tradesmen and technicians, Dr. Berger, counselor to the cabinet on subjects relating to emigration, says Germany's ability to reconstruct itself speedily is being undermined by the flight to the new world.

While he does not advocate the restriction of emigration, he sug-

gests that the social condition of the working class must be raised so as to make it more inviting for the workers to remain in Germany.

NOTORIOUS WOMAN CRIMINAL POSES AS MAN STAR BOARDER

Berlin.—Herr von Waranowski lived for many months in a Berlin boarding house and enjoyed the reputation of a model roomer. He was polite, considerate and always prompt in the payment of his rent, and no one in the house ever even suspected that this young man was a woman, the notorious Clara Wittig, with a criminal record.

One of the woman lodgers was amazed one night to find Waranowski standing over her bed with a revolver in his hand, demanding her valuables. She visited and robbed all the other lodgers before disappearing. The police caught the culprit, and thus was her identity revealed.

Baseball on the Bosphorus.

Constantinople.—A baseball league is being organized by the Americans of Constantinople. It will be a four team league from the employees of the American Express Company, Standard Oil Company, Robert College and the U. S. Station ship Scorpion. Seven nationalities are represented in the Robert College team.

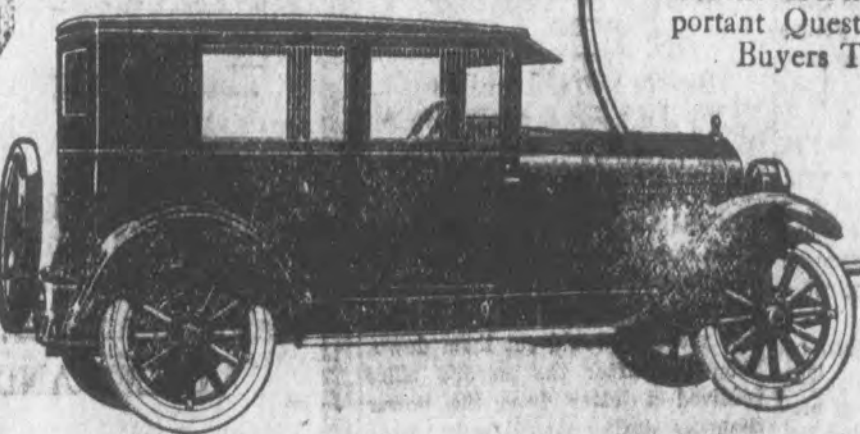

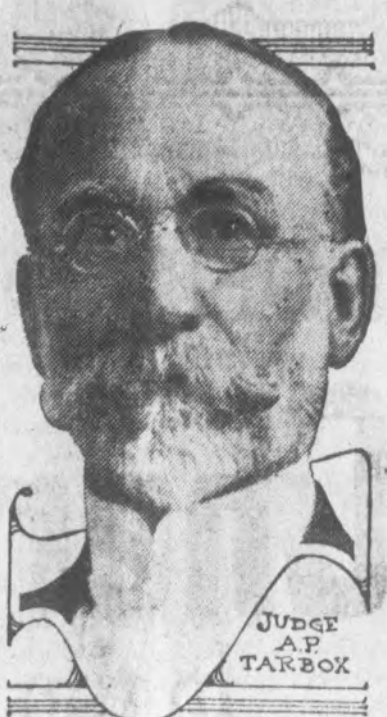

ADULT EDUCATION FOR FOREIGNERS IS AIM OF LIBRARIES

Chicago—With the grant of \$26,000 made by the Carnegie Corporation to the American Library Association for the study in adult education and other library data, headquarters here believe that the step about to be undertaken will have a pronounced influence on the future and their service as educational centers.

Reports from libraries throughout the country, where this service already has been started on a measured scale show possibilities of becoming a means of self-education, Americanization, technical, mechanical and cultural development and helpful source to ward and understood citizenship. A summary of the report follows:

In Seattle, the Public Library begins its Americanization work at the detention quarters of Immigration Service. The men and women there now are largely Russians, professional men and women, musicians, artists, artisans, ex-nobles. By installing a collection of books there it provides an opportunity for the eager, hopeful newcomers to learn something about America and the English language. Foreigners not detained are reached through the churches; talks by the librarians at night schools; distribution of circulars about the library in 13 foreign languages; through naturalization officials paid through the foreign press. Laborers, housewives, engineers, singers, lawyers and architects, says the librarian, kneel before the shelves of "Easy books for foreigners."

The Chicago Public Library has established a readers' bureau, whose function is to increase the usefulness of the library to men and women who wish to continue their education out of school. This bureau prepares the outlines for the study of any (non-vocational) subject for patrons interested in following a definite course of reading. The library undertakes to supply the books prescribed in each course in consecutive order and at proper intervals. So eager were the people for this service that within a few weeks after the first announcement was made the publicity was stopped and the library concentrated its efforts on catching up with the requests already made.

The Detroit and Buffalo Public Libraries and probably others are rendering a similar service. Cleveland Public Library has an adult education assistant in its school department, whose function is to make the appropriate connections between the library and the adult education classes in the city.

"In visualizing the Adult Education Department we have in mind not only adults in the strict sense, but all boys and girls and men and women out of school," said the secretary.

OLYMPIC GAMES OWE THEIR INITIATION TO THIS FRENCHMAN

New York, May 15.—Contrary to the generally accepted opinion, it was France and a Frenchman and not Greece and a Greek who primarily advocated the re-establishment of the Olympic Games. The modern Olympiad, fashioned after the ancient classics of Greece, was first suggested to the modern world by Baron Pierre de Coubertin, a young Parisian who, in the spring of 1893, took steps to bring back the games which predominated when Sparta and Athens were centers of the ancient world.

On Baron de Coubertin's initiative, representatives of the athletic organizations of various nations assembled in Paris on July 16, 1894 and created the original constitution of the international Olympic committee and subsequently formed the international body. This committee was entrusted with the task of arranging Olympic games at regular intervals and at various places in the civilized world. Baron de Coubertin is the present head of the International Olympic Game committee.

Classic soil was chosen as the scene of the first modern Olympics, an honor legitimately demanded by the home of the classic games. Athens, Greece, in 1896, saw the first Olympic meeting of the athletes of the modern world. Four years later the scene shifted to Paris. In 1904 St. Louis entertained the athletes of the world in the third meet. In 1908 London played host and in 1912 Stockholm staged the international classic. The 1916 meet was postponed when the modern world was engaged in the most bitter war of its existence, but the games were continued in 1920 when the war clouds had cleared and Antwerp staged the most representative meet of the series.

In 1906 there arose in Greece a wish to have a permanent home for the games in the country of their origin. As a result a meet was held in Athens two years after the St. Louis games. This was to be continued every four years between the official international games, but the International Committee ruled that the games should be held only every four years at different places in the civilized world, and the Athenians abandoned their plans after the 1906 meet.

Up until the Stockholm meet in 1912 the games had been predominated by American athletes, the color-bearers of Uncle Sam taking a far more prominent part than athletes from any other nation. In 1923 the games assumed their first real international aspect when virtually every civilized nation in the world was represented and the competition was correspondingly keener.

In 1920 at Antwerp this international aspect was even more marked, and at Paris this year the number of na-

tions and athletes competing is expected to exceed by far any previous set of games.

TOPING WOMEN AROUSING IRE OF OLD TIME GERMAN EDITOR

Leipzig.—The women of Germany 200 years ago spent too much time taking snuff, sitting about drinking beer and wine and indulging in games of chance, according to old

files resurrected recently of the first women's magazine to be published in this country. The magazine, known as The Critic, also took the women to task for gossiping which, it was pointed out, did harm to themselves and to the community as well. The magazine was a weekly edited by Johann Christoph Gottsched, one of Germany's best known authors and critics of the times. In its initial number the editor stated that the publication stood for higher ideals

of womanhood generally, and advocated the idea that wives dedicate themselves to motherhood and their homes. The magazine was devoted to society news and other columns to humor and cooking recipes and reading matter intended to appeal to the women of those times.

Later issues contained lengthy articles protesting against boys and girls reading trashy books, and original stories intended to aid in the uplift movement which had been

started to educate the young people were given prominence in issues over a long period.

The two hundredth anniversary of the founding of The Critic is to be celebrated here this summer.

Funeral of Veteran Held In Asheville

Asheville, May 15.—The funeral of W. G. Barrett, 93, a Confederate veteran, who died here Monday, was

held from the residence of his daughter, Mrs. M. E. Meadow, Wednesday afternoon. Mr. Barrett had lived in Asheville for 14 years, coming here from Georgia, where he was a farmer before and after the War Between the States. He is survived by a sister, Mrs. Clara McNish of Johnson City, Tenn., two daughters, Mrs. M. R. Meadows, of Asheville, and Mrs. Mary Fore, of Windale, 15 grandchildren and 33 great grandchildren.

He said in part:
"Beginning with the 14th verse of this chapter is an account of the casting out of the devil of the dumb men, so that the dumb spake, and the charge by the Pharisees that Jesus had cast the devil out by Beelzebub, the prince of the devils, where upon Jesus told them that if Satan cast out Satan, hell would become a house divided against itself and could not stand, but would come to desolation. But the fact that devils were being cast out was an evident fact that a stronger than the devil had come, even the kingdom of God.
Here were two antagonistic forces lined up against each other, Christ and Satan, and we see the leading church members, the Pharisees, lined up against Christ. Jesus told them, 'That he that is not for me is against me, and he that gathereth not with me scattereth.' Every man is either leading men heavenward or hellward. Lined up with Christ or Satan. Every person is either Christ possessed or Satan possessed.
The Bible says Satan is the prince of the air, the prince of darkness or the prince of the world. No man has ever been able to overcome him in his own strength. He was stronger than the faith of Abraham, the father of the faithful; for he tripped up Abraham four times in his life. He was stronger than the meekness, for he tempted Moses to such anger and disobedience as barred him from entrance into the land of promise, and on a former occasion provoked him to the murder of an Egyptian. He was stronger than the purity of David, man that was so pure before he encountered Satan that he was a man after God's own heart. He was stronger than the courage of Peter the boldest of all the disciples; for he made Peter desert his Lord in the hour of trial and to cover and lie when accused by a little maid. He is stronger than any human being that ever lived, save alone the Son of God.
And Satan is not only strong and cunning, and fascinating; but he is wise enough to know that a clean, moral, influential man can be used by him to accomplish much more harm than a disreputable cast away. Hence when he carries a man on the

downward road till he loses character and influence and literally becomes worse than the devil wants him to be, he deserts him and looks for another victim. Not finding him he goes back to see if the heart he has been reformed and cleaned up, and the character restored so that he will be of use to him again; then he goes and gets seven companion devils to keep him company, and the eight hold high carnival in the life of the reformed but unregenerate man, and he is worse off than ever; for he has eight devils instead of one. You will not be safe if you simply reform and do not take Christ into your heart.

Now this strong man's palace is the hearts of the unconverted people; and his goods that "are kept in peace" are the souls of those same people. And there is no other explanation possible of the astounding indifference of lost men and women of this world who are in perfect peace through traveling the downward road to hell just as certainly as they are traveling toward the grave. The spell of the devil's peace is upon them.

And no being could be more cunning and skillful than this being of marvelous intelligence and power. In devising means of lulling people to a false sense of security that brings peace. He knows that men will resort to any sort of narcotic to escape pain of the body. The tendency has grown till men will not longer endure pain. And while the chemists have been busy compounding dope for bodily pains, the devil has been equally busy inventing dope for the easing of heartache and the quieting of disturbed consciences.

The devil's dope takes many forms. He has a sedative suited to every emergency and appealing to every human disposition and weakness. He knows men better than they know themselves. He skillfully uses the theatre, the movie, the dance, the pool hall, the skating rink, all sorts of foolish games in your homes and revelry and diversions to keep people from thinking on things spiritual and eternal. He uses worldly pleasures to take your affection from heavenly delights. He keeps your mind absorbed with things material to keep you from things spiritual.
