BONUS PASSED OVER VETO

High School and College Out In Body At the Ham-Ramsay Evangelistic Meet Last Night

With the student bodies from both the college and the local High School swelling the attendance at the Tabernacle last night, both the attendance and the interest reached the high-water mark for the campaign thus far. Basing his discourse upon the experience of Daniel, the evangelist traced the history and experience of the noted biblical character and made telling application of the salient points to the modern boy and girl striving to attain a full developed manhood and womanhood. The message was received eagerly by the large audience and though long was delivered in a gripping and interesting style that completely forbade restlessness. At the conclusion of the message around 100 responded to Mr. Ham's invitation to the inquiry room where they later surrendered their lives to Christ, while practically the entire student body of the teacher's college gave Mr. Ham their hand in token of their desire for Christ to have full sway in their lives and future.

The musical program was the most inspiring of the series, the great chorus responding with spirit to the Chorister's leadership. The program was featured by a beautiful melody of old religious songs, feelingly and beautifully rendered by Mr. Edward W. Hearne. At the conclusion of the number, tears were in the eyes of the great majority of the hearers. Mr. Ramsay paid tribute to Mr. Hearne's determination announced on the preceding night, to devote his talents to the Lord's service.

Three special services will be held tomorrow and it is expected that tomorrow will be one of the greatest days in the religious history of the community.

The evangelistic party motored to Washington this morning immediately following the service at the Tabernacle and conducted a service in Washington this afternoon. They will return in time for the night service at the Tabernacle. Mr. Ham delivers a special message tonight on "Is Man Responsible for Being Damned?" in which he will deal with some of the heresies now widely prevalent.

In speaking on the "Test of Character" Mr. Ham said in part:

The world has established many false standards or tests of manhood. These who would glorify that physical man make muscular power the standard; but by that standard Jack Johnson would tower above Alexander Stevens, who was an invalid wheeled about in a wheel chair all his life, but who left an impress upon the institutions of his time equalled by few men. By that test Goliath of Gath would tower above David or St. Paul, both of whom were small men.

Others make money the test or standard by which they appraise manhood; but by that standard, Harry Thaw, the moral pervert, would because of his inherited millions, take precedence of most of the great men of our day in church, in state and in the realms of science and literature.

Others still judge a man by his clothes; but Oscar Wilde, also a moral pervert, or corrupt old Beau Brummel, would have been the most eminent men of their generations, by that standard.

Many make mental endowment the standard of manhood; but that also is a false standard. By it sexually corrupt men like Burns and Byron, both of whom were magnificently endowed mentally, and Bacon, so dis-honest financially and so richly endowed mentally that he was called "the ablest, wisest and meanest of men," would stand above men like Knox and Moody and Spurgeon.

No man's manhood, or character, can be known till it has been subjected to many tests.

The best way to study manhood is to study the characters of men as revealed in their careers. For the history of the great men who have dominated their nations and times. Here let us consider some sophorisms that will help us properly to appraise the manhood of the men we study. One of these is that reputation is what people say you are. Another is that "He that ruleth his own

OWNERSHIP MANY AUTOS IN STATE NOT REGISTERED

Sawyer Urges Immediate Registration; Greenville Be Branch License Bureau

Raleigh, May 17.—Automobile owners of North Carolina totaling 60,000, have not yet registered their cars under the ownership provisions according to State Motor Supervisor, J. E. Sawyer, who is also in charge of the license bureau of the Secretary of State office.

Each owner will be compelled to produce a title certificate before licenses will be issued for their cars for next year, Mr. Sawyer stated.

Several large shipments of license plates have been distributed to various sub-stations throughout the state and further plans are being perfected for the issuing of 300,000 automobile licenses for the coming year, it was announced. Branch offices are located at Wilmington, Kinston, North Wilkesboro, Charlotte, Greensboro, Asheville, Greenville, Fayetteville, Rocky Mount, Goldsboro, Henderson, New Bern and Wilson.

New licenses will not be issued prior to the date of expiration of the licenses now in use which is June 30, Mr. Sawyer said.

HOUSE REPASSES BILL AFTER BRIEF DEBATE

CHIEF FIGURES IN NEWS OF THE DAY.



Measure Adopted By Vote 313 to 78; Senate Will Probably Act On Bill Monday; Pou and Bulwinkle Speak In Behalf of Measure

Washington, May 17.—The House today passed the Soldiers' Bonus bill over President Coolidge veto.

Shortly after convening at noon the bonus bill was taken up and it was announced by Representative Longworth that there would be only brief debate.

Chairman Madden, of the Appropriation Committee, opened the debate with a plea for support of the veto on economic grounds and got a smattering of applause from the Republican side.

"As chairman of the Appropriations Committee," he said, "I feel that I would be unjustified if I sought to curtail government expenditures and then turned around and voted to override the veto."

The passage of the bonus and other special appropriation bills pending will either destroy the plans for tax reduction or bring a huge Treasury deficit, Madden declared.

Entry as a law or the final defeat of the bill is now up to the Senate where a closer run is expected.

Urging repassage of the bill, Representative Pou, Democrat, North Carolina, declared that the "bonus" cannot be wrong when we attempt in a small way to compensate the service men who saved the civilization of the world.

Mr. Pou argued that workers at home were paid according to the service rendered and surely it cannot be capitalizing patriotism to pay the doughboys who we sent to the trenches. His declaration brought cheers from the Democratic side and some Republicans.

Representative Bulwinkle, Democrat, North Carolina, declared that the president had gone out of his way in charging that the former service men who favored the bonus were willing to sell their patriotism.

The House vote was 313 to 78, the bill thus receiving 52 more votes than the required two-thirds majority.

The present plan is to ask for action Monday in the Senate where the bonus bill of the last session of Congress finally went on the rocks after President Harding had vetoed it and it had been repassed by the House.

Advocates of the bonus still claim today that they have in the Senate three or four more than enough votes to make the present measure law.

It is estimated that the bill would cost at least \$2,280,000,000 and that it would require an appropriation the next fiscal year of \$152,000,000.

Coolidge Endorsed By Oregon Primary

Portland, Oregon, May 17.—Calvin Coolidge was endorsed for Republican nomination for president in yesterday's Oregon primary 597 of the state's precincts having reported 31,360 votes for him against 8,881 votes for delegates pledged to the candidacy of Hiram W. Johnson, Senator from California.

William G. McAdoo was unopposed in the state for the Democratic nomination.

Kentucky Derby Takes Place Today

Louisville, Ky., May 17.—The Forty-Nine year question of east meeting west for turf supremacy will come to a decision at historic Churchill Downs course today when twenty of the nations crack three year olds will face the barrier in the fiftieth annual renewal of the Kentucky Derby.

The race starts at 4:45 Central Standard Time.

The race, the total value of which is \$63,800, will be over the derby course of a mile and a quarter and the prize winner will receive \$53,800 in addition to a gold plate valued at \$5,000, while \$6,000 will go to the horse, \$3,000 to the third, and \$1,000 to the fourth.

Everett's Condition Much Improved

Charlotte, May 17.—Officials of the hospital here where Secretary of State W. N. Everett was operated upon, declared today that they were unable to say when Mr. Everett would be able to return to Raleigh.

He is up and going in and out of the hospital when he feels so inclined, they said, but the time of his leaving is still uncertain.

AROUND WORLD FLIERS REACH JAPAN SAFELY

Paramashiru Island, Kuriles, May 17.—Blazing a trail through skies never before invaded by aeroplanes, the three United States Army fliers reached the ice fringed remote bay bordering the arctic this morning thereby gaining for their country and themselves the distinction of being the first to have crossed the Pacific ocean by air.

Negotiating the hazardous hop of 878 miles from Attu Island in the Aleutian group the pilots, Lieutenants Smith, Wade and Nelson, fought the chilled arctic winds and snow storms that whipped their forces with lacerating ferocity.

Two of the planes landed in Kashiwada Bay and the third descended to the water off the nearby island of Shishu.

Fugitive Requests Pardon, Then Gets Cold Feet and Skips

Raleigh, May 17.—Paul Wolf, of Charlotte, who escaped from Mount Holly prison camp about a year ago, where he was serving a sentence for stealing an automobile, yesterday walked into the office of Governor Morrison in company with his mother and she announced to the governor's secretary that they wished to request a pardon for her son.

Mrs. Wolf related the story of her son's arrest, imprisonment and escape and said that he had been living in San Antonio, Texas. She stated that she had induced her son to return to the state and seek a pardon in person. Mrs. Wolf then turned and introduced her son to the secretary, William H. Richardson.

While Mr. Richardson was in the executive's private office explaining the situation to him, the young man evidently became uneasy as to what might be the outcome of his request and fearing that he might be returned to prison, walked out of the office and has not been yet located.

Mrs. Wolf remained in the office until Richardson had returned but said that she did not know where her son had gone. She returned to Charlotte last night by herself.

ALVIN OWSLEY WILL SEEK NOMINATION AS VICE PRESIDENT

Former Head of American Legion Announces Candidacy for Democratic Nomination

Kerney, Nebraska, May 17.—Alvin M. Owsley of Dallas, Texas, and past national commander of the American Legion, will seek the Democratic vice presidential nomination if he is endorsed by the Texas convention, according to advices received by the local American Legion post today.

In his message Mr. Owsley indicated that he was not affiliated with any other candidate but that he was prompted to enter the race because he desires to become vice president and believed that "with the help and advice of the million men who have once helped me I would make good."

Pat Harrison Named Temporary Chairman Of Convention

New York, May 17.—Senator Pat Harrison, Mississippi, was today unanimously chosen temporary chairman of the Democratic National convention to be held in New York next month.

DAWES BOOMED FOR VICE PRESIDENT ON REPUBLICAN TICKET

Chicago, May 17.—The first public booming of Brigadier General Charles G. Dawes former director of the budget and chairman of the committee of experts, for the Republican nomination as vice president has been started here. Thousands of placards bearing likenesses of President Coolidge and Dawes have been mailed.

Raleigh Police Dig Up 'Hootch'

Raleigh, May 17.—Police of this city are searching for Allen Penny, negro, who is alleged had buried in his back yard in a wooden box 35 half gallon jars of whiskey. The backyard, it was reported gave no evidence of the hidden contraband and it was only through "tip" that the police knew about the hidden liquor. Penny's wife expressed surprise that there was anything hidden in the yard and said that she knew nothing about the "stuff." The whiskey was carried to headquarters while the police continued the search for the supposed hider of the whiskey.

Seventy Applicants for Superintendency

Salisbury, May 17.—The elimination of the 70 applicants for the position of superintendent of the schools of this city has brought the remaining number to be considered down to 12 and the city board of schools will meet on Tuesday next to select the new superintendent. The 12 remaining applicants will visit Salisbury and be interviewed personally by the board, Colonel A. H. Boyden, chairman of the board stated.

Applicants came from states from Virginia to Texas, it was said, and it was pointed out that this shows how people in the educational field in other state feel about schools in North Carolina. The superintendency of the Salisbury City Schools was made vacant by the resignation of T. Wingate Andrews, who was also secretary of the school board. Mr. Andrews has accepted the superintendency of the High Point schools and goes to that city on July 1 next.

Markets

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, May 17.—Fundamentally the position of cotton remains strong, for while domestic textile conditions are unsatisfactory, the textile situation abroad seems to be in a health condition, as noted by the continuance of a good export demand for raw cotton, and by foreign spinners takings more than last year of the American product.

The only unfavorable feature of importance at the moment is the fear of the Senate over-riding the President's veto by passing the Soldier Bonus Bill, but there is a good chance of the veto being sustained, as pressure is being brought to bear on Washington by the commercial and industrial interests of the country.

Following in the wake of the recent short period of better weather inland, the weather Bureau predicts increasing cloudiness and unsettled weather for the West Gulf district, probably showers and cooler North portion, fair for the Eastern half of the best.

Aside of results to come of the veto on the Bonus measure, and the uncertainty of the weather, developments in the cotton market next week are likely to be bullish. Indications are that exports from the United States will continue free, as the quantity on shipboard at all United States ports yesterday awaiting clearance, was 72,000 bales vs. only 37,000 last year, week and statistics next Friday, including spinners takings will probably be bullish and the trade will likely commence to discount the first crop condition report of the season to be issued June second, which owing to the reported detrimental effect of the continued cool weather in the cotton region, is generally expected to be bullish.

The market was lower today because of easier cables than expected and uncertainty as to the disposition to be made of the Washington Bonus Bill, but values recovered somewhat in consequence of less favorable weather being predicted for West of the Mississippi River. We are disposed to entertain favorable opinion of the cotton market and favor buying, particularly on depressions of importance.

GOVERNMENT OPENS SCHOOL FOR ONE ALASKAN FAMILY

Seattle.—Uncle Sam has opened a school to give an education to one family of 15 boys and girls, the largest in Alaska, according to Jonathan Wagner, chief of the Alaska division of the United States Bureau of Education, who stopped in Seattle en route to his headquarters in the Northern Territory.

"Nikaly, Indian chief of the Knik tribe of Central Alaska, heads the largest family in the territory," declared Mr. Wagner. "Owing to a government ruling a school must be provided where there are 15 or more persons in one district."

"Several years ago Nikaly and his family, which was slightly smaller in number then, settled near the Matanuska coal fields. No natives had previously located in that district. But when Nikaly's family increased to 15 the government was compelled to establish a school for the chief's benefit."

EXCLUSIVE CLUB DOORS OPEN TO DENIM CLAD LABORERS

London.—The Carlton Club, said to be the most exclusive club in the world, a citadel of aloofness which hitherto the most of the land, has opened its doors as a host to a party of 30 laborers. These men have been engaged for the last year in refacing the front of the club house in Pall Mall.

Lord Younger, as chairman of the house committee, presided at the luncheon and delivered a short speech in which he said the time had arrived for a more congenial feeling between various classes of Englishmen, and closer cooperation for the good of the empire.

The Carlton Club is the only London Club which does not admit some strangers.

Model Villas to House Olympiad Contestants

Colombes, France.—The "Olympic Village" destined to house the athletes and representatives of the various nations competing in the 1924 games who may wish to avail themselves of its modest but hygienic and up-to-date accommodation, has just been completed and turned over to the French Olympic committee by the contractors.

Built about a hundred yards away from the stadium, the village is composed of a series of villas of two and four rooms each. It provides accommodation for 300 athletes. Up to the present only Japan has officially notified the committee that its entire team would stop there.

Teams of other nations, however, for which housing accommodation has been arranged elsewhere, have retained some villas where the men who are to compete on the following day will remain overnight. The United States has asked for four, Great Britain three, Italy two, and Finland Spain and Belgium one each.

Supplied with all the modern comforts, shower baths and hygienic apparatus the villas, tastefully decorated and painted in bright colors, will provide a healthful home for the athletes while presenting a picturesque and agreeable aspect.

Reading rooms, lounge and restaurant, post office and telegraph, a bank, a safe, two barber shops, all bordering upon "Avenue Pierre de Coubertin"—the main street of the village, named after the president of the International Olympic committee—are some of the conveniences which will be placed at the disposal of the foreign athletes.

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Four Murder Cases In One Term Court

Wentworth, May 16.—Ninety four cases appeared on the docket of the Superior Court when it convened here this week for a fourteen day session with Judge T. D. Bryson, presiding. The first work of the court was to instruct the Grand Jury and to take a stand for high ideals of government, local and otherwise. E. B. King of Leaksville, was named foreman of the jury.

Of the ninety four cases on the docket, 39 of them were for violation of the prohibition laws, and four were murder cases.

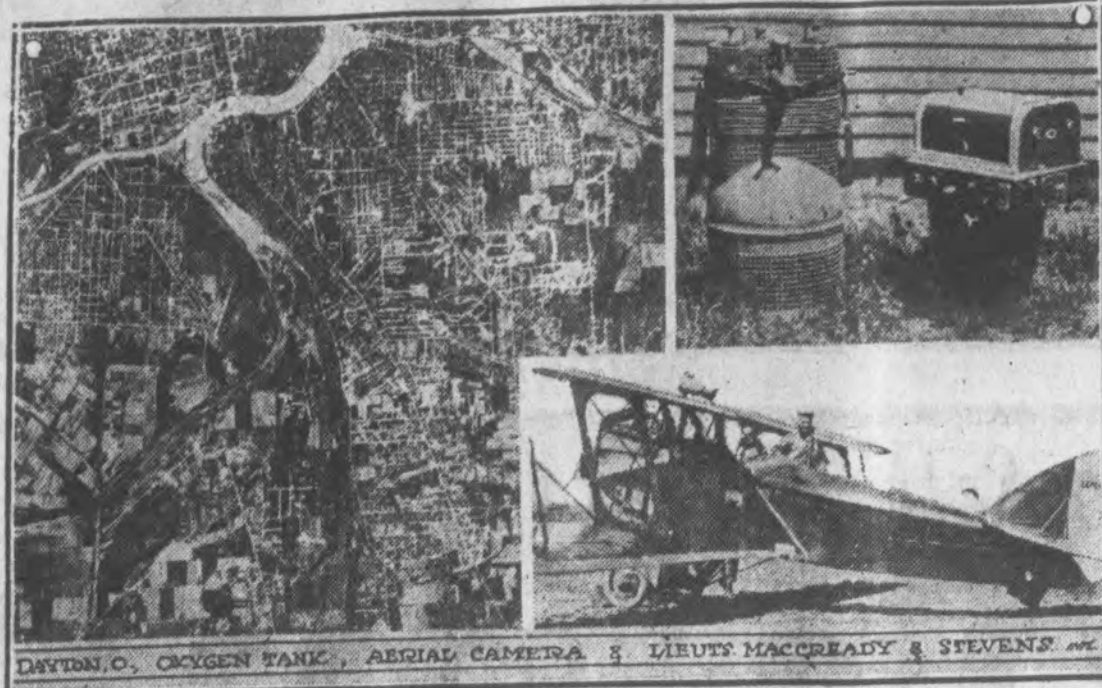

Mother Seals Are Tender in Teaching Youngsters to Swim

Niulchik, Alaska.—Material discipline is as pronounced among the seal families as among human beings, according to men who have spent many years along the shores of Cook Inlet and have studied aquatic life there.

From the time a baby seal is laid snugly within a bed of dry seaweed until he receives a final spanking and is directed to rustle for himself, he is subjected to unrelenting discipline. Contrary to popular belief, a baby seal is as helpless in the water at birth as a human baby would be. It must be taught to swim and instructed in all the lore of seal life, including how to hunt food and escape its enemies.

Charles Coach, who has made seal hunting a business for years, says he has watched a mother seal teaching her baby to swim. The mother would flounder out on the rookery, gather the baby under her flipper and slip carefully into the water. Suspending the baby on her flipper, she would bark, grunt, whine and wheedle to indicate what was desired. If the baby refused to perform, it was effectively spanked with the mother's flipper. The young seal gradually learns to swim by floundering a few strokes at a time, with the mother snatching it from danger every time it becomes exhausted or starts to sink.

Some of the beach combers adopt baby seals as pets. They become as faithful as dogs and, if one decides to banish them, are as hard to get rid of as cats. An instance was cited where a baby seal was taken out to sea in the hope that it would reunite with its herd. About midnight there was a plaintive wail at the cabin door. Like the traditional cat, the seal had come back. He howled until he was admitted to the family circle and fed a piece of fish.

Women Won't Leave Him Alone

NO WORLD PEACE UNTIL 1945 PREDICTS PORTUGUESE MAN

Lisbon.—Joao Ferraz, who poses as a prophet, predicts terrifying events for Portugal and the rest of the world during the present year and for the next 20 years.

Last November Ferraz foretold great floods in this country, and the inundations during March certainly fulfilled his predictions. The rivers Tagus, Douro, and Mondego have submerged whole districts and placed villages and towns under water. Cottages have been swept away, vineyards and crops ruined and many lives lost.

Now Ferraz says this is nothing to what is to come. He predicts no peace in the world until 1945. This year more thrones will be overthrown, tremendous earthquakes will occur, and storms at sea will sink many ships. There will be revolutions and civil and international wars, northern Europe being the scene of the principal occurrence. In conclusion, he exhorts people all over the world to kill dogs or "the new paper" will not have space to hold the cases of hydrophobia that will occur.

CLASSIC MARATHON RACE IS THE CROWN OF ATHLETICS

New York.—A silver cup donated by an enthusiastic Frenchman to a runner able to negotiate the marathon distance "without dying as a result," was responsible for the revival of this classic event, considered today the feature of the Olympic Games and the crowning exhibition of athletic prowess.

The marathon, 42 2/3 kilometers or 26 miles 385 yards, takes its name from the title of the ancient battle of that name, and its distance that over which the runner with news of victory travelled to waiting Athens.

M. Michel Breal, a young Frenchman, advanced the plan to put such a race on the program when Baron Pierre de Coubertin first suggested the revival of the Olympic games. The first race, held at the 1896

games at Athens, was won by a Greek shepherd named Spiridon Louys, who fasted for two days and spent the nights after his triumph in prayer before holy pictures.

Astonishing tales of human endurance have been told about athletes who have won honors in this long gruel. In Antwerp in 1920, Hannes Kolehmainen, a Finn, won first honors in the Olympic record time of 2 hours, 32 minutes, 35 4/5 seconds, crossing the finish line 13 1/5 sec-

onds ahead of J. Lossman of Estonia. Four minutes behind Lossman came a young Italian, A. Valerio who, upon crossing the finish line, turned about and surrounded the spectators by turning a double somersault to prove his physical condition. A Broos, a Belgian, followed the Italian to the tape and then made an extra lap of the big track carrying a shield with his national colors.

ORCHESTRA PLAYED 2,778 TIMES IN SIX DAY DANCING MATCH

Breslau, Germany.—Police officials of Breslau have issued an order forbidding a repetition of the six-day dance which was recently completed in this city. Twelve couples participated, and alternated just as bicycle races. Forty-six dancing teachers acted as referees and were on watch in relays. The dancing course was 200 yards long.

The shimmy was the waltz dance with the contestants, and two hands which played alternately supplied 1,286 shimmies during the contest. The java was next in popularity, with 862. There were 4 tangoes and 98 Boston waltzes. The contestants objected strongly to Boston, as they said the waltz made the musicians sleepy and they played so sluggishly that there was little inspiration for the tired dancers.

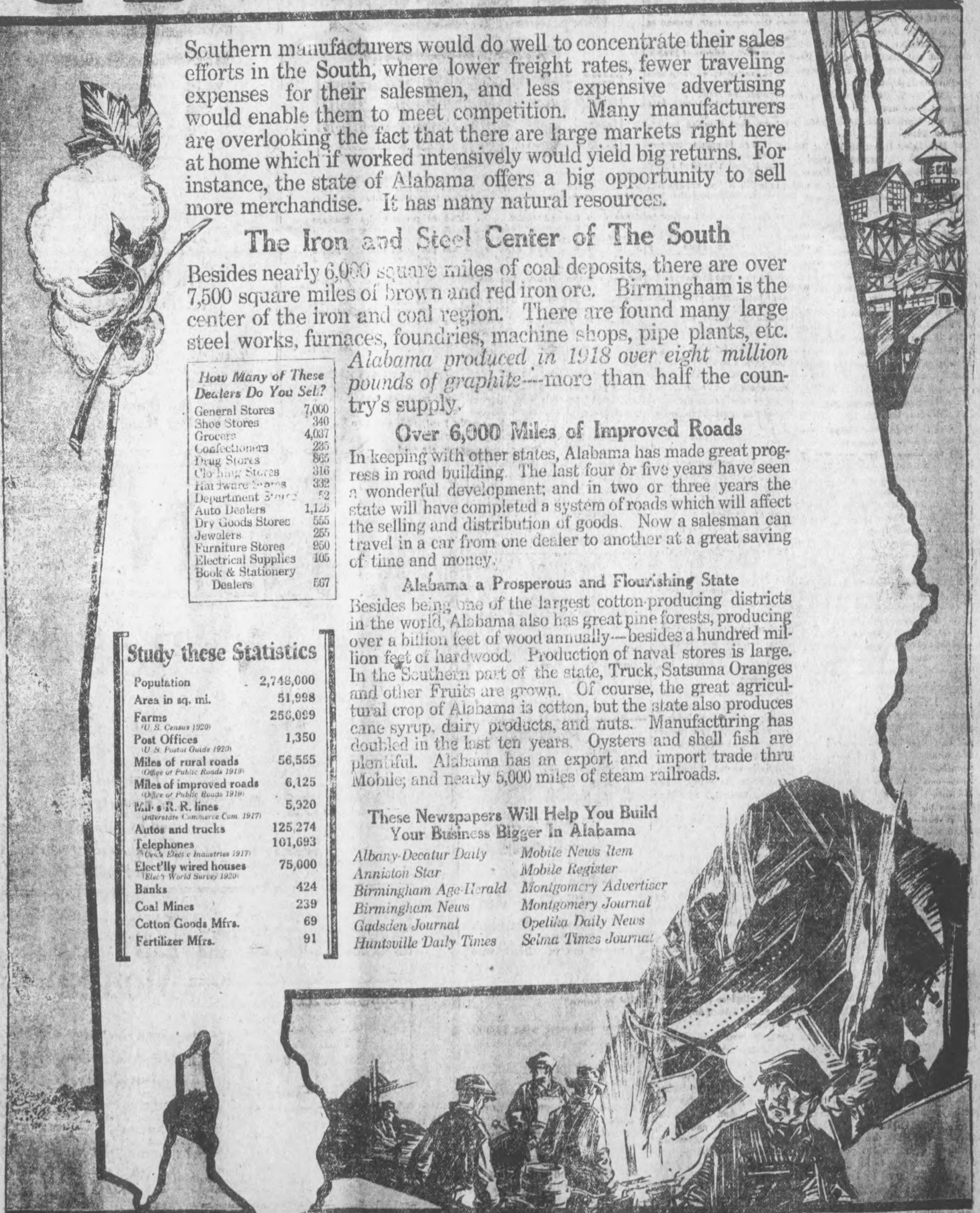
