

CONFEREES AGREE ON TAX REDUCTION

Simmons Tax Plan Agreed Upon After Few Minor Changes

Corporation Tax and Publicity Proposals Stricken From Bill; Republican Leaders Express Belief That Measure Will Meet President's Approval

Washington, May 21.—Unanimous agreement was reached today by the conferees on the tax reduction bill. The Simmons' Democratic income tax rate schedule providing for a 40 per cent maximum surtax rate and a 50 per cent reduction in the normal tax on incomes under \$8,000 was accepted.

The Senate amendments providing for full publicity of income tax returns and for a tax on undistributed corporation profits were rejected. Hope was expressed by Republican organization leaders that the bill as now framed would meet the approval of President Coolidge who declared his opposition to both the publicity and corporation tax proposals which were eliminated.

The House provision for a 40 per cent increase in the existing estate tax and for imposition of a gift tax with rates similar to the estate tax rates were accepted.

Senate Democrats in yielding their proposals for substitution of the corporation tax and full publicity of tax returns explained that they did so with the expectation that the bill would not be objectionable to President Coolidge.

The House provision for a 25 per cent reduction in earned incomes was retained but the Senate amendment restricting the amount to which this cut applied to \$10,000 was accepted.

A compromise was reached on the cut in the jewelry tax. All articles selling for \$30 or less were exempted from the five per cent tax. The House had set this limit at \$50 and the Senate at \$25.

The Senate's proposal to exempt produce and merchandise brokers from the brokers tax and restore the full levy on billiard and pool tables and bowling alleys was approved.

North Carolina Nurses To Meet in Twin City

Winston-Salem, May 21.—Approximately 500 nurses are expected to attend the annual convention of the North Carolina Nurses Association which will be held in this city on May 27 next and continue through the 29, according to statements made by those in charge of the program and other arrangements for the meeting. A varied series of addresses and lectures pertaining to the work of the nurses, a number of social functions and business meetings of the Association have been scheduled for the three days that the members are in this city.

The convention will be preceded by a meeting of the state board of nurse examiners here on May 22 when more than 100 students will take the examination.

Bad Weather Holds Back Army Fliers

Tokio, May 21.—Messages received yesterday by the Associated Press from Minato indicated that the American Army Around the World Fliers had arrived there from Yotorofu Island, their second landing place in the Kurile Islands.

SENATE COMMITTEE TALKS WORLD COURT

Two Hours Discussion Results in No Decision on Important Points.

Washington, May 21.—The Senate Foreign Relations committee devoted two hours general discussion today to the World Court proposals but adjourned until tomorrow without reaching a decision on any important point.

Efforts to obtain the committee's immediate endorsement of proposals of Presidents Harding and Coolidge for membership in the present court with reservations resulted in failure. None of these present mentioned more than a "hope" of early action on any of the plans now pending.

ROAD SHOW OPENS WEEK OF JUNE 6

Many Unusual Demonstrations to Feature Show

Raleigh, May 21.—Several unusual demonstrations will feature the North Carolina Road Construction and Maintenance show which will be held in several cities of the state, during the week of June 3, judging from statements made at the office of the State Highway Department here.

The demonstrations will include every means that the state now uses in the construction of roads. Featured among them, however, will be, it was explained, the steam and gasoline power test. This test will be held at the fair grounds at Greensboro. A traction engine driven by steam and one driven by gasoline will be chained together rear end to rear end and they will start pulling in opposite directions. By this method, it was stated, the word engineers expect to determine which can out pull the other.

The adventurer will also come for his share of the affairs at the Greensboro exhibit and the opportunity to enjoy the thrills real sensation is open to the public, it was said. A manufacturer of wire fences, who claims that his fences will stand almost any pressure imaginable, is looking for persons who wish to ride in his automobile when he drives it against the strip of wire fence stretched up for this purpose. Mr. Charles Upham, director of the Road Show with offices at the Highway Commission office in Raleigh, will be glad to take the names of those who desire to ride in the test and demonstration car with the wire fence manufacturer.

Six large buses have been chartered to meet the special train from Washington that will bring the South American delegates to Raleigh, the officials say, and to carry them over the city then to Durham and Greensboro.

Washington, May 21.—The Senate Daugherty investigating committee was told today that representatives of the Department of Justice not only had sought to frame Senator Wheeler, the committee's prosecutor, but had spied on members and witnesses and had spirited away the famous diaries of Gaston B. Means, working with it as investigator.

One of the witnesses, W. O. Duckstein, said that he knew about the whole proceeding because his wife was a secret agent of the Department of Justice, and that she had identified in his presence the records of Means after they had been secured by a ruse.

Duckstein described an espionage system of great proportions, which he said had been thrown about the committee's operations, directed by H. C. Todd, special assistant to Attorney General Daugherty.

He said that a crew of detectives used in the case had come largely from New York and were directed by two men by the names of Petit and O'Brien.

Their activities included wire tapping and many other methods of obtaining information. The purposes had been described by Petit and O'Brien as including the framing of Senator Wheeler, who was later indicated in Montana, and the railroad of Gaston B. Means to the penitentiary, declared Duckstein.

Another witness R. P. Burness, special Department of Justice agent testified that he and five associates had constituted the force assigned to shadow Means.

Duckstein said it was Petit and O'Brien who got Means' diaries which he had declared would substantiate his stories of money payments to Jess Smith. The two men, Duckstein said, had called him and his wife from their home one night and taken them into an automobile where they opened three suitcases containing little black books which Mrs. Duckstein identified as the diaries and files belonging to Means. Petit and O'Brien said there were going to take the books to New York to Todd, he said.

When asked why he did not report the incident he replied that he and his wife had considered it a matter that was being handled under the direction of the Attorney General.

THAW IS ARRESTED AGAIN IN NEW YORK

Pleads Not Guilty to Three Charges and Released on Bail \$10,000

New York, May 21.—Harry K. Thaw is held in bail again today after a few hours of absolute freedom. He pleaded guilty to two indictments charging the kidnapping of Frederick Gump, Jr., in 1916 and second degree assault and was placed under \$10,000 bond. Soon after he left the court room another indictment charging conspiracy to take Gump, then 16 years old, out of the jurisdiction of the court after the alleged attack was discovered. Thaw returned to court and pleaded not guilty to this charge also. He was placed in the custody of his counsel and bail will be arranged today.

Indications are that Gump, now married and living in California, will not come here to testify against Thaw in which case it will be impossible to bring the case to trial.

INJURED ENGINEER DIES IN HOSPITAL

With Death of O'Daniel Toll of Wreck Sunday Reaches Seven

Raleigh, May 21.—W. V. O'Daniel, engineer on the Seaboard Air Line train 44, died late yesterday afternoon at a local hospital where he was carried last Sunday following the wreck of two trains near Apex. O'Daniel was in the engine cab and seeing that a head on collision was unavoidable, jumped from the engine and crushed his head upon a cross tie.

The death of O'Daniel brings the total dead resulting from the wreck up to seven.

O'Daniel is survived by his wife and a small son.

Berry, Raleigh, (re-elected); Grand Treasurer, M. L. Shipman, re-elected.

Appointee officers will be named by the Grand Master it was announced in time for their installation with other officers tomorrow morning.

The meeting was followed by a barbecue at the State Fair grounds. Greensboro was selected as the place for the 1925 annual convention of the Grand Lodge.

Stone Gateway to Be Presented By Davidson Seniors

Davidson, May 21.—A stone gateway will be the parting gift of the 1924 graduating class of Davidson College to the institution; it has been announced here by the officers of the class. The gateway will be placed at the northwest corner of the campus and will have a well planned approach it was explained. The presentation of the farewell gift will be made during the Commencement season by R. R. Jones, of El Paso, Texas, president of the Senior Class.

The architect is now completing plans for the approach of the gateway, which, it is said, will harmonize with the new buildings on the campus and the new walks being constructed on the campus. It has been the custom for a number of years for each graduating class to give some parting remembrance to the college and this usually takes the form of some needed improvement on the campus. The students and officials of the school considered the present gift particularly appropriate, it was said, because of the new entrance to the campus from the recently constructed Davidson College Highway, which bounds the west.

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33 1-3 PER CENT. LEADERSHIP

Although there is little doubt that President Coolidge will receive the Republican nomination for president the overriding of the bonus shows that the president has the support of only one-third of his party. Commenting on the situation the New York World says:

There are fifty-one Republicans in the Senate. Seventeen of them, exactly one-third, followed the leadership of President Coolidge on his greatest fighting issue, the bonus.

Of these seventeen, the financial Northeast furnished eleven. But even in this home territory the showing is pitiable. His own State, Vermont, gave him one of its two Republican Senators, and Lodge denied him Massachusetts. Maine gave him one out of two. New Hampshire and Pennsylvania were faithful. Connecticut rejected him entirely.

In the whole country west of Harrisburg, Mr. Coolidge lined up six Republicans. In the whole Middle West territory he found two Republicans to agree with him.

On the Pacific Coast he found none.

This was the vote taken three weeks before the Republican Convention at which Mr. Coolidge will be acclaimed almost unanimously the peerless leader of his party. This was a vote taken on a measure which both Harding and Coolidge have vetoed. This was the Republican vote on a measure which a Republican President described last Wednesday as:

Not in harmony with recognized principles of Government finance; saying that there is no moral justification for it, and that it may be disastrous, and that

we must either abandon our theory of patriotism or abandon this bill.

Two-thirds of his party in the Senate combined five days later to administer the most crushing defeat suffered to any President in

recent history.

The disaster which has befallen Mr. Coolidge on the eve of the campaign proves certain things quite definitely about him, his party and the relation between them. It proves that Mr. Coolidge is not a political leader; that the long record of hesitation and evasion over Denby, over Daugherty, over Japanese exclusion, over the bonus itself, for that matter, has robbed him of commanding influence over the actual bosses and managers of his own party. He is to be nominated, but he is neither feared, respected nor obeyed, and the same sinister forces which set up a puppet President in 1920 are at the same game in 1924.

The result proves that Mr. Coolidge's personal character does not determine the result. It is the party organization, with Coolidge as an ornamental facade, which rules in Washington and seeks re-election.

It is that organization, claiming to be only 30 per cent. corrupt under Harding, which has now shown itself to be just 33 1-3 per cent. faithful to Coolidge.

THE THIRD PARTY CANDIDATE

There is now a pretty definite prospect that Senator LaFollette will head an independent ticket in the forthcoming campaign, even if he is unable to tour the country and make speeches. This word comes from persons intimate with Mr. LaFollette, and it is part of his plan to make no announcement until after the Republican national convention.

There is a general demand among Republicans farmers in the Northwest for LaFollette's candidacy. They are ready to desert their own party. They claim that President Coolidge has the viewpoint of New England and has neither acquaintance nor sympathy with the problems and difficulties of western agriculture.

James R. Howard, former president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, the not friendly to LaFollette, is convinced, he says, that the Wisconsin Senator will be found as a candidate against Mr. Coolidge next November. In that event, Mr. Howard says, the President will lose Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, the Dakotas, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, Iowa, and Washington.

Defeat or postponement of agricultural legislation upon which the heart of the West is set will be a further advantage to LaFollette and a corresponding detriment to Mr. Coolidge.

And Republican leaders friendly to the President are unwilling to enact such legislation before their national convention. They fear that it will offend the big special interests which have been objecting heretofore to the Government's extending any further financial help to farmers.

PAINTERS ARE GIVEN DOUBLE WAGE IN RESTORATION TOKIO

Tokio.—Nearly all classes of skilled labor are receiving higher pay during the reconstruction period in Tokio, but none have profited more than painters.

Before the great earthquake and fire of September 1, the Japanese were noted for the lack of paint outside and inside their houses. With the construction of thousands of temporary buildings, however, mostly of lumber, there has been a great increase in the use of paint.

Painters are now paid as high as 8 yen a day, approximately double their pre-quake wages. Carpenters and masons also share in the reconstruction prosperity but to a small degree, their wages averaging about 5 yen a day.

Aged Cow Still Useful

Beacon, Cal.—A Jersey cow owned by a local dairyman is 32 years old, and listed as one of the most aged Jerseys in America, yet she gives evidence of good years to come. She recently dropped her twenty-second calf. She gives four gallons of milk, and produces more than 40 pounds of butter fat monthly.

GIANT POWER PLANT PLANNED TO SERVE ALL EASTERN JAPAN

Tokio.—An electric generating plant, to cost \$23,000,000 will be completed on the Shinano river, in the mountainous district 100 miles northwest of Tokio, according to an announcement by the department of railways.

This plant is to furnish power for distribution over all the east-central portion of Japan, feeding the electrical services of Tokio and also supplying power for the Tokio railway, which connects the capital with Osaka and Kobe, and which is to be electrified within the next few years.

Huntley Gordon Does Big Part In "Wanters"

After years of sincere effort and hard work, Huntley Gordon, one of the notable cast in John M. Stahl's "The Wanters," a First National picture, has finally hit his stride and is now recognized as one of the most popular leading men in pictures.

From then on he was kept busy practically all of the time, but he wasn't satisfied. He got a good salary, was given leads and good parts, but his work was running on a dead level and he really wasn't getting anywhere. Finally he was called to Los Angeles from New York to play an important role in "The Famous Mrs. Fair." Inspired by the change, Fred Niblo's direction and the nature of the character, he gave such a wonderful performance that Louis B. Mayer immediately placed him under a long-term starring contract.

Now Huntley Gordon is spoken of as having "arrived," and his work gets better with every picture. One of the conditions under which John M. Stahl consented to make "The Wanters" for Mr. Mayer was that he could have Gordon for the part of the aristocratic Theodore Van Plet in this coming First National special which will soon be shown at White's theatre, Thursday and his success in the role more than justifies the great confidence placed in him.

SOVIET EXPERIMENT COLLAPSE AMONG PORTUGUESE PEASANT

Lisbon.—A curious story of the peaceful establishment and equally peaceful death of a kind of Soviet republic, in the San Gregorio parish of Portugal, is told by the newspaper Seculo.

San Gregorio is a wine growing district and is most intensively cultivated. Nearly all the laborers also are small landowners and cultivators, but notwithstanding their general well-being their exactions in wages, hours of labor and extra privileges grew to onerous that the big landowners finally agreed to put thoroughgoing communism into effect. The land was turned over to the whole population with the condition that the proceeds were to be divided between labor and owner.

As a result offers for allotments of land poured in and now the new landlords are trying to regain their old status of laborers sure of day wages. The new tenants invoked the high

cost of labor and living, and all the old complaints, to excuse offers of about one-third less than the land is really worth, and the scheme has collapsed.

OBSCENE BOOK TRAFFIC TREATY RATIFIED BY TWO MORE STATES

Geneva.—The Irish Free State, which was elected a member of the League of Nations last September, has just ratified its first league convention. Michael McWhite, the permanent Irish representative here, has informed the secretariat that the Dublin government has officially approved the treaty for the suppression of the traffic in obscene publications.

Ruchdi Bey, the Turkish minister at Berne, also has notified the league that he has been authorized to sign this convention in behalf of Turkey. Turkey is expected to apply for league membership as soon as the great powers have completed their ratification of the Lausanne treaty.

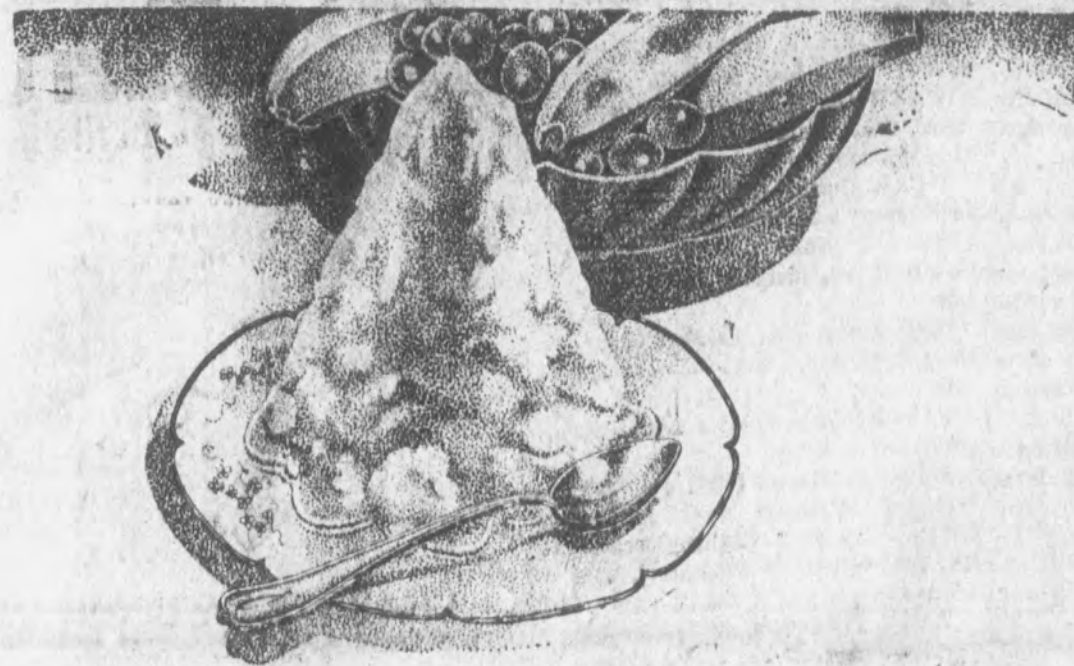

GOVERNMENT WEEKLY WEATHER & CROP REPORT

Washington, May 21.—Cool nights were unfavorable over the cotton belt. Condition of cotton, rather poor in nearly all sections, though some early cotton reported in fairly good condition. Stands irregular, much late cotton failed to germinate. Progress was excellent in extreme southern Texas with condition fair to very good. Elsewhere progress and condition were rather poor to only fair on account of cool nights, with rain needed in some parts and warm, dry weather elsewhere. Cotton made poor progress in Oklahoma, germination unsatisfactory. Deterioration occurred in Arkansas, condition of early cotton, fair and of later planted, very poor. In the central parts of the belt, progress was poor to fairly good. Much replanting necessary, warm weather much needed.

Progress and condition in Georgia rather poor. Planting nearly finished in the Carolinas, but progress poor. Poor in Tennessee. Much cotton remains to be planted in Virginia. Planting progressing in far southwest condition satisfactory.

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, May 21.—The trend of values appears upward in anticipation of the continuance of free exports from the U. S., more wet weather inland, prospects of bullish spinners takings for week Friday, and probably a bullish crop condition government report June second.

There was a further sharp advance in market today, as result of rather general light to moderate rains inland, more favorable prospects for a reduction in income taxes and because of a bullish weekly weather and crop government review.

Washington advises that the conferees on the tax bill have reached a complete agreement income tax proposals, which it is thought, will be acceptable to the president, in which case a reduction in Federal taxes would be assured before Congress adjourns next month.

There are indications for somewhat better weather in the western half of the belt, but more rain is probable east of the Mississippi river. Manchester trade advices are encouraging China raising bids for shettings, but as yet no important transactions have materialized.

Meanwhile the New York dry goods market remains dull but steady with some business doing. For some time past Europe has been taking the bulk of the cotton from the available and promises to continue to take freely in the future, which more than offsets the stagnation in America.

Compared with last year, exports from the U. S. since Friday total 57,000 bales against 20,000; since August first 5,128,000 against 4,198,000 leaving stock at all U. S. ports 366,000 against 405,000 one year ago.

In addition there is on shipboard at New Orleans today awaiting to be exported 29,000 bales against 13,000 last year, at Galveston 15,000 against 11,000 and there are persistent rumors of large shipments in the near future from Gulf and South Atlantic ports to Russia.

Germany Buying Dried Fruit.

San Francisco.—A sudden heavy demand for dried fruit has come to central California from Germany. Since Jan. 1 German imports of dried prunes, peaches and apricots have been increasingly heavy. Before the war Germany was one of California's heaviest buyers of fruit, but in recent years her purchases dropped virtually to zero.

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Kitchen Adventures Thrill Her



Stage adventure is nothing to the kitchen variety, thinks Edna Starck, a charming exponent of both varieties. Miss Starck who impersonates "Adventure" in the Popular Magazine scene of "Artists and Models" finds an even greater thrill in the culinary adventure of inventing new dishes, for which, it must be said, she has no difficulty in finding an audience as appreciative as in the theatre. Miss Starck is an expert at that rather difficult but delectable edifice, Cheese Fondue. Her method is this.

2 tablespoonsful of flour, 1/2 cup of grated cheese, 1 tablespoonful of crisco, 2 eggs, salt, pepper and red pepper, and 1/2 cup of milk. Melt the crisco, add flour, then add the milk gradually. Stir till they boil, cool a little, add the cheese and yolks and seasonings. Fold in the whites stiffly beaten. Pour into a greased soufflé tin. Bake 20 minutes in a hot oven. Fold a napkin round and serve hot on toast.

TIN CANS AND PACKING BOXES MAKE THE MISSIONARY FURNITURE

Chicago.—Salvaged packing boxes and tin containers usually a problem in disposal for the family, are worked into substantial pieces of furniture and household utilities in the missionary manual training department of Moody Bible Institute here.

Where the municipal dump would have been the richer, the missionary in isolated places probably received another piece or two for his comfort and it is to them that most of the output goes at no expense. It serves

another purpose, the institute points out, that of demonstrating to the native the value of thrift.

Rome Pilgrims Travel in Autos. Cologne.—Cologne and the Rhine Valley recently sent a pilgrimage to Rome which made a much faster trip than the wayfarers who made the same journey in the Middle Ages under Emperor Henry IV. Neither did the pilgrims go barefooted and bareheaded.
