SHRINERS HOLD CEREMONIAL IN ROCKY MOUNT

Thousands of Visitors Attend Spring Ceremonial of Sudan Temple; Parade Main Feature of Day

Rocky Mount, May 22. — More than 3,500 nobles of the Ancient Arabic Order of Mystic Shrine had hitched their camels in Rocky Mount this morning when the program of the annual spring ceremonial of Sudan Temple got under way, the streets of the city a sea of bobbing fezes.

Shrine caravans composed of automobiles and special sleeping cars began pouring into the city late yesterday afternoon, but the real influx started at 9 o'clock last night when Potentate Foster, of Acca Temple, accompanied by his uniformed brigades arrived on a special train from Richmond.

Local Shriners bearing torches symbolizing the warmth of the city's greetings met the guests and headed the procession to a local warehouse where a pre-ceremonial dance was held. Large searchlights from the top of the city's tallest building played upon the procession as it moved through the streets.

The gathering here includes representatives from Sudan, Almas, Oasis, Omar, Acca, Kazim and Khedive temples.

At 11 o'clock there was a business session followed at noon by the parade which was the feature of the day. 15,000 citizens and visitors witnessed the parade.

Following the parade the shriners were initiated into the order.

At 2:30 the nobles reassembled at the warehouse where 140 candidates were initiated into the order.

At the morning business session Kaleb D. Bradham, of New Bern, was elected recorder and Raymond C. Dunn, of Enfield, was elected representative to the Imperial Council, both positions having been made vacant by the death of Dr. Joseph F. Rhem, of New Bern.

Raleigh, May 22. — Paul Wolf, the young escaped-prisoner who startled the Capital officials and employees here the other day when he walked into Governor's office in company with his mother and asked for a pardon, has voluntarily returned to prison, Superintendent George Pou has announced. Wolf escaped from the Mount Holly prison camp about a year ago where he was serving a term for stealing an automobile and had been at liberty about one year when he sought a pardon in person. It was said at the Capital that this was the first time in the recorded history of the state that a prisoner had appeared in person at the Executive's office to seek a pardon.

James Brown, a coal miner, has entered upon ten days' duty as Deputy King of Scotland and as Lord High Commissioner of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. While living in historic Holyrood Palace he takes precedence over every one in Scotland but the King. Park Benjamin, of New York City, brother-in-law of the late Enrico Caruso, has been jailed there for failure to pay alimony to his first wife. Ham-Ramsay Meeting To Close Next Sunday

The sixth and final week of the evangelist campaign is marking the high water mark in interest and results for not only this campaign, but also for the religious activity of this city for years past. Each morning at 8:15 from 100 to 175 business men of the city are gathering at the Pythian Hall for a thirty minute service in the opinion of many is the greatest and most inspirational result of the evangelist's preaching here. Mrs. Rickner Has Nervous Breakdown

Anniston, Ala., May 22. — Resumption of the trial today or Mrs. Evelyn Sue Rickner, on a charge of slaying her husband Lieutenant James C. Rickner, last June at Camp McClellan, depends upon the physical condition of the defendant who was rushed to a hospital following her collapse on the witness stand yesterday. She is reported to be suffering from a nervous breakdown.

Judge Clayton adjourned court to reassemble at 9 o'clock this morning. Mrs. Rickner, for two hours on the stand before her breakdown, told of her marriage to Rickner in 1923, of his going over seas and his alleged infidelity. She said he disliked children and threatened to leave her before their daughter, Marylyn, now five years old, was born. On his return he ignored her and when she came to Camp McClellan he refused to see her and told her to leave.

It was while she was leading up to the details of the shooting when she collapsed.

A plea of not guilty on grounds of insanity at time of the crime was entered by counsel for the defense.

AMERICAN FLIERS FINISH ANOTHER LEG WORLD FLIGHT

Airmen Accomplish 2-Day Task in One in Flight From Yotorofu to Kasumigaura

Kasumigaura, Japan, May 22. — This was a notable day for the American Army aviators who are circling the globe by air. Within 15 hours they drove down out of the bleak and wintry north Pacific where storm and fog hampered their progress for days, into a temperate clime where they will probably make up some of their lost time. They made the first landing that American aviators ever made in Japan and did two days task in one.

Taking off from the icy waters of Hitokappu Bay at 3 a. m. the aviators swooped down over Kushiro four hours and 50 minutes later, circling over the American destroyer, John B. Ford, on duty there in case the fliers needed aid, and then went on their way landing at Minato, on the north end of the island of Hondo, on which Tokyo is located. They landed at Minato at 10:40. At 12:30 p. m. they took the air again for the 350 mile hop to Kasumigaura where they arrived at 5:40 p. m.

It is the present expectation that the American fliers will not continue their flight until Sunday or later. They are to be received by the Prince regent at special audience on the occasion of the visit he is making to the aviation base, and their planes are to be gone over by the finest corps of mechanics that the navy has been able to assemble from among its air forces.

FARM RELIEF BILL IS BEFORE HOUSE

Supporters Are Unable to Predict Fate of the Measure

Washington, May 22. — The McNary-Haugen Farm Relief bill was again before the House today but leaders were somewhat at sea as to the probable fate of the measure.

Generally the leaders, or those in charge of the measure, have admitted their inability to make an accurate forecast due to the large number of members who have declined to commit themselves. The result, it was predicted, will be determined by a last minute line-up. Hope for a vote on the measure this week was practically abandoned by the failure of the House Tuesday night to muster a quorum to proceed with discussion of the bill, until over two hours had been spent in rounding up the absentees, and in consequence of calling off of the sessions planned for last night and tonight.

Memorial Exercises Be Held Greensboro On Friday, May 30

Greensboro, May 22. — Memorial exercises will be held on May 30 under the auspices of the local American Legion Post, it was announced at a meeting of the post here. R. H. Parker, of Enfield, will deliver the address of the occasion and special music with several vocal selections will be a part of the program.

The memorial services will not be limited to the soldiers of the city of Greensboro who gave their lives for their country, it was stated, but a wreath will be placed on the grave of every soldier that is buried in Guilford county.

Plans are now underway to ask the mayor of Greensboro to declare from 11 a. m. to 1 p. m. on May 30 a time of memorial respect and to seek to have the stores all close for those two hours.

The local post is fostering a plan to secure the records of all the Guilford county men served in the war and the picture of these who died in the service. Miss Nellie Rowe, city librarian is co-operating with the post and it was said that much progress had already been made along this line.

Strong Indications Mellon Will Urge Veto Of Tax Bill

Bill Ready for Final Legislation Today Will Be Presented to Senate Without Delay

Washington, May 22. — The tax reduction bill facing a welcome in almost every quarter is ready today for final legislative action. The report of adjustment of differences between the Senate and House unanimously adopted yesterday by conferees representing both chambers, went through the process of final drafting today and Chairman Snodgrass of the Senate Finance Committee expects to present it to the Senate without delay.

Strong indications were given at the Treasury Department today that Secretary Mellon would recommend veto of the tax reduction bill by the president when the measure is submitted to the Treasury for consideration and review.

High officials declared the bill to be very unsatisfactory to Secretary Mellon and a statement was made that he viewed it as a "most unfavorable piece of legislation." He believes all the provisions for reform of the tax system have been omitted and finds no justification for including of such provisions as the increased estate tax rates.

Fire Companies Now Preparing For Firemen's Drill

Henderson, May 22. — The volunteer and regular fire department of this city with the aid of several trucks are making preparations for their entry into the firemen's drill tournament to be held in High Point on July 15 to 17. Drills are being three mornings a week at 5:30 o'clock, with the engine truck and apparatus. This will be the first time in the history of the department that it has ever entered a meet with motor engines, it was explained, but in the old days they were often close contenders for honors in the horse races at the state meets.

Negress Shot and Killed by Lover

Henderson, May 22. — Carrie Harris, negress, was shot and killed in front of a local laundry here, after she had been persuaded to leave the building by a man, supposed to be her lover. James McBride, is being held charged with the murder. The woman was badly cut before she was shot through the heart.

The Harris woman and McBride, it was said, were sweethearts and it is thought that jealousy prompted the killing. The man was arrested immediately after the shooting.

Make Change In Assembly Plans

Grand Rapids, May 22. — While the Presbyterian General Assembly now in session, with its nearly 1,000 commissioners, is of such a size as to tax the seating capacity of the average church, future general assemblies will be a less unwieldy body if the proposal presented today by a special committee on the reduction of the size of the general assembly becomes a church law. The report is signed by Dr. William L. McEwan of Pittsburgh, chairman. It recommends a change in the Presbyterian form of government which would reduce the membership of the general assembly approximately one-half.

The committee reviews what it terms inequalities and injustices in representation of the Presbyteries and proposed readjustments intended to prevent a lot of small presbyteries from having as large a representation in assembly as have the great presbyteries.

The purpose of the committee's proposal is to enable the assembly to meet in churches which it can not enter because of its size, to be entertained in smaller communities, and also to make the assembly more of a deliberative body and less of an expense to the denomination.

Employed Officers Conference to Hold Meeting Blue Ridge

Asheville, May 22. — The "Employed Officers" conference will hold its annual meeting at Blue Ridge, the Southern Y. M. C. A. assembly center, it has been announced here, the dates will be May 27 to 30. Dr. John R. Mott, head of the Y. M. C. A. of America, will be the principal speaker on the evening of the opening session. His subject, as announced, will be "The Triennial Survey." George W. Campbell of Chicago, will be the song leader for all the sessions.

Among the important meetings to be held during the convention, it was stated, will be session of the insurance alliance followed by a meeting of the participants in the retirement fund.

Philadelphia, May 22. — The world's heavy weight wrestling crown still rests upon the head of Ed (Strangler) Lewis who last night turned back one of his most formidable challengers Gardini, claimant of the Italian heavy weight championship.

YOUR VOTE AND YOU

If you were interested in a business you would not sit idle and allow someone else to choose persons to head your business, yet there are many people who care little or nothing about the selection of officials to head our county, state and national government which is the greatest known business and one in which we all have a duty to perform.

"I am not interested in politics" is a common remark and yet it is one of the greatest crimes against the citizenship granted by our Constitution.

As citizens we are responsible for the operation of the government's business and it is the duty of each to see that the proper persons are placed at the head of the different departments. So long as our people show little or no interest in politics just so long will our public officers be chosen by a small minority and just so long will corruption in government management prevail.

Saturday, June 7 is the date upon which the people of North Carolina will have the opportunity to vote for candidates to fill county, state and national offices. There are many candidates in the field and as is always the case some of these candidates are better qualified for offices than others. As a citizen it is your duty to study the character, records and qualifications of these candidates and on the day of the primary go to the polls and vote your convictions for the sake of a cleaner, better and more representative government.

ANTI-GLARE LAW NEEDED

Glaring headlights are still a common cause of accidents on highways.

All motorists should be courteous enough to dim lights if necessary when approaching another car.

Anti-glare laws need to be enforced and made more effective.

What is needed is more cooperation between motorists and more courtesy. Just because a man obtains possession of a motor car is no reason why he should lose any of those finer sensibilities which mark the gentleman.

PAYING THE PIPER

National affairs have taken that turn where they imperatively argue against the retention of our system of bestowing government honors upon those wealthy citizens who have contributed generously to the campaign fund of the party in power. Had there been no contributions to the last presidential campaign funds above the line of suspicion the nation would have been spared the disgrace of the Teapot Dome and Daugherty episodes.

Presidential campaigns are necessarily expensive and because of this the political parties have held no scruples against accepting, and perhaps even courting, large gifts from big business and the rich. It is very doubtful if national campaigns could be continued on the extravagant scale of the past should the "special" contributions be forbidden. It has not been shown, however, that it would be impossible to elect a president at less cost than heretofore.

Most of those who contribute freely disclaim unworthy motives, and probably are without them. But it is within their power to make their disinterestedness as clear as daylight to everybody. They can do it by absolutely refusing to subscribe such large sums for the use in politics as too many of them have been in the habit of giving in past years. They have doubtless thought that they were recognizing an obligation to their party, but there is in reality a higher obligation which rests upon them. It is to the public.

Men of large wealth ought to feel that they have a special duty to do all that they can to maintain confidence in the purity of our public life and in the integrity of our government. If anybody suspects a mercenary taint upon either, much can be done to remove it by lessening the apparent influence of rich men in political parties. Let those in possession of great fortunes pass a self-denying ordinance; let them refuse to turn over money to a politician just because they have it in plenty and wish to be known as good-natured. They have their hands to a large extent upon the sources of corruption in public life, and should resolutely do their part in drying them up.

All but an insignificant minority of the novelists of today, it is believed began their writing careers with the desire to achieve fame or to satisfy a creative urge as the main incentive. The making of money through the sale of their books was a secondary consideration probably it was not until they had published one or two volumes that most of those who now depend upon their novels for a livelihood decided to make the writing of fiction their principal occupation.

Since fame, glory, and a place among the immortals of literature are the guerdons that have been most prominent in our novelist's minds there is a good deal of irony in the statement made by Simon L. Nye, president of the American Booksellers' Association at the annual convention of that organization in New York City that almost without exception a contemporary book of fiction, after having been published three months, is "practically dead, forgotten, awaiting removal to the bargain tables." Merit or like of it has nothing to do with the phenomenon; admirable novels may last no longer than poor ones.

There is something pathetic in the idea of a writer's putting the energy, the thought and feeling of a year or more into a work which, though excellent, should be so evanescent.

The situation directs attention to certain conditions of modern life which are not to our credit—the constant craving of the public for something new, even if the old is good and has not been utilized as it might be, and the tendency to follow a fad in an unreasoning way as a flock of sheep follow their leader.

Contemporary novels have become, from the bookseller's standpoint, perishable goods because the craze for novelty has advanced to the point where book buyers are not satisfied unless they can get fiction which is just off the press. Each wants to be able to talk about novels that are new and have not yet been much discussed. Literature suffers grievously as a result.

It suffers also from the fact that not merit so much as some lucky bit of advertising will frequently make a book a "best seller." The situation is the same in the field of fiction as in the field of popular music or the stage. How often have we seen a trashy song or a play of no special worth take the country by storm just because people had been led to believe it was a "hit." A poor novel may achieve "success" in the same way, and a good one be ignored.

Announcement that New York is to be made "dry" during the Democratic convention will tend to keep some away, if they believe the statement.

Sweden's Russian Trade Quickly Follows Treaty

Stockholm—A reduction by eight percent of the harbor dues of Swedish ships entering the port of Leningrad, a return to Swedish ownership of the embassy house in that city, and the appointment by each nation of official envoys to the other, are among the first results of the signing of the pact between Sweden and Russia, in which the Soviet is recognized as the government de jure.

While the treaty must be ratified by the Swedish Riksdag, the government, headed by prime Minister Trygger, has already promised recognition.

The treaty contains a clause granting each nation the most favored nation treatment, which does not depend upon ratification by the Riksdag. This has an important bearing on shipping privileges, as hitherto Swedish shipowners have been obliged to pay five times as high harbor dues as those from countries with which we have treaty relations.

The Swedish commercial and industrial world now looks forward to stabilization of the trade with Russia, which is a good market for Swedish products. Sweden also will be enabled to play an ever stronger role as a middleman between transatlantic exporters and Russian consumers.

FLEBIAN UNION BANNED FROM HORTICULTURAL SHOW

London—Onions may be good in salads, with bread and cheese, or for flavoring purposes, but the sensitive nostrils of the rulers of the Royal Horticultural Society don't like the odor of this useful vegetable and barred it from the next Chelsea Show, a society function, because of its "horrid smell."

This has raised the ire of gardeners generally, and the Fruit Grower particularly, which in its current issue says:

"An onion smell is, at any rate, a healthy smell and ought to rejoice and satisfy the sense or the real horticulturalist as readily as the aroma from the finest attar of roses."

SAMOAN CHIEFTAINS REHEARSE THEIR OWN FUNERAL OBSEQUIES

PAGO PAGO, American Samoa.—Samoans of rank often hold rehearsals of their own funeral obsequies. Many chiefs have built their sepulchres to be certain of a comfortable and becoming resting place.

When a Samoan chief desires to review his funeral rites, he announces his intention to his family. The first selects and appoints his successor in title, and assures himself that after his death there will be no opposition to the new chief from members of the family. Preparations for the death ceremonies then are made. The retiring chief goes through a figurative death looking on at the tribal mourning and feasting.

A few years ago a leading orator named Maseo decided it was time to die, and attended a rehearsal of his funeral. He still lives, walking about with a stately air and looking hearty for an old man. He spends most of his time reading his Bible and attending church services. He refuses to take part in affairs of a temporal nature connected with his family or village. He is a veritable example of a "living corpse."

The Samoans show great reverence for their dead. The ceremonies attending the death of even a person of low rank are elaborate and expensive to the family of the deceased.

In the days before the introduction of Christianity, in 1890, and for many years afterwards, when the Samoans worshipped their tutelary gods, there was greater funeral ostentation than at present. Members of the family held vigil over the body, fasting in silence for several days. The body was wrapped in many folds of native tappa cloth, and to relieve any cadaverous appearance the face was tinged with tumeric. Outside the house, all the night before the funeral, there was lamentation and gashing of bodies with knives and stones, while the people kept up a dirge. Relatives and friends brought presents of fine mats or expensive cloths which were piled on the corpse, so that the spirit of the departed would be justified in carrying to the unknown world the tidings of his importance on earth.

During the funeral of a chief, the villagers barricaded all roads, cutting down breadfruit trees and coconut palms. After the funeral there was prolonged feasting, all the pigs and poultry of the deceased chief's family being slaughtered. Sometimes the feasting lasted 15 days. Fine mats were distributed among the visiting relatives, and this ceremony was not without occasional bitterness, as the different ones contrived by strategy to obtain the oldest and hence most important mats.

The burial ceremonies of today are not much different. A departed chief is given a Christian burial with the blessings of the One True God invoked instead of that of the tutelary gods of old. The custom of cutting down valuable trees for barricades and the traditional self-mutilation are prohibited under a law passed by the American government in 1905. In place of the nocturnal dirge of primitive chants, the people sing Christian hymns. The feasting and the distribution of meat were adhered to. The relatives go to great expense in buying foreign food, such as kigs of salt beef, cases of canned beef, tins of salmon and hard bread, to supplement the supply of native pigs.

Vogues In Foods Too, Says Fashion Writer



THERE are vogues in foods, as well as in clothes, according to Ruth Stuyvesant, well known New York fashion editor, who in the intervals of interpreting to her readers the vagaries of the mode, finds time to philosophize on culinary matters.

"Take carrots, for instance," said Miss Stuyvesant, sitting down to the word. "Have you noticed the sudden wave of popularity for this vegetable? This is probably due to the enthusiasm of the beauty experts, from whose writings one gathers that it was and drop by spoonfuls into hot or cold soups, or as a garnish for the famous judgement of Paris, the first beauty contest on record. Be that as it may, carrots merit all the good things one can say of them, as I am going to give you a favorite recipe of mine for Carrot Fritters. Take 1 cup carrots, 1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 2-3 cup milk, and beat until smooth. Force the carrots through a sieve before adding. Beat thoroughly. Drop by spoonfuls into hot oil. Drain and serve hot.

JAPAN BEGINS ELECTRIFICATION OF IMPORTANT RAILWAY LINES

Tokio.—The ambitious plans of the Imperial Government Railways of Japan for the substitution of electricity for steam power on all the government railways of the country will begin to be put into effect this year. Appointment of an electrification bureau within the railways department marks an actual beginning of the program.

The railways department will begin electrification with the Takaido railway, the line connecting Tokio with Kobe. During the fiscal year 1924-25 it is planned to electrify the Tokaido from Tokio as far as Kozu, 50 miles to the southwest, and also the branch line to Yokosuka, the naval base on Togo Bay. American equipment will be largely used in the electrification scheme.

MOUNT OLIVE NEGRO KILLED AT SAW MILL

Goldboro, May 20.—Willie Cox, a colored man, working in the saw mill of D. B. Sasser at Mt. Olive, was instantly killed. Cox became entangled in a belt which ran some two or three feet from the ground, was instantly snatched into contact with the shafting, around which his body was whirled with great rapidity. He was dead before the machinery could be stopped. Repetition of warnings had been given to his employees by Mr. Sasser regarding this menace which it was impossible to eliminate.

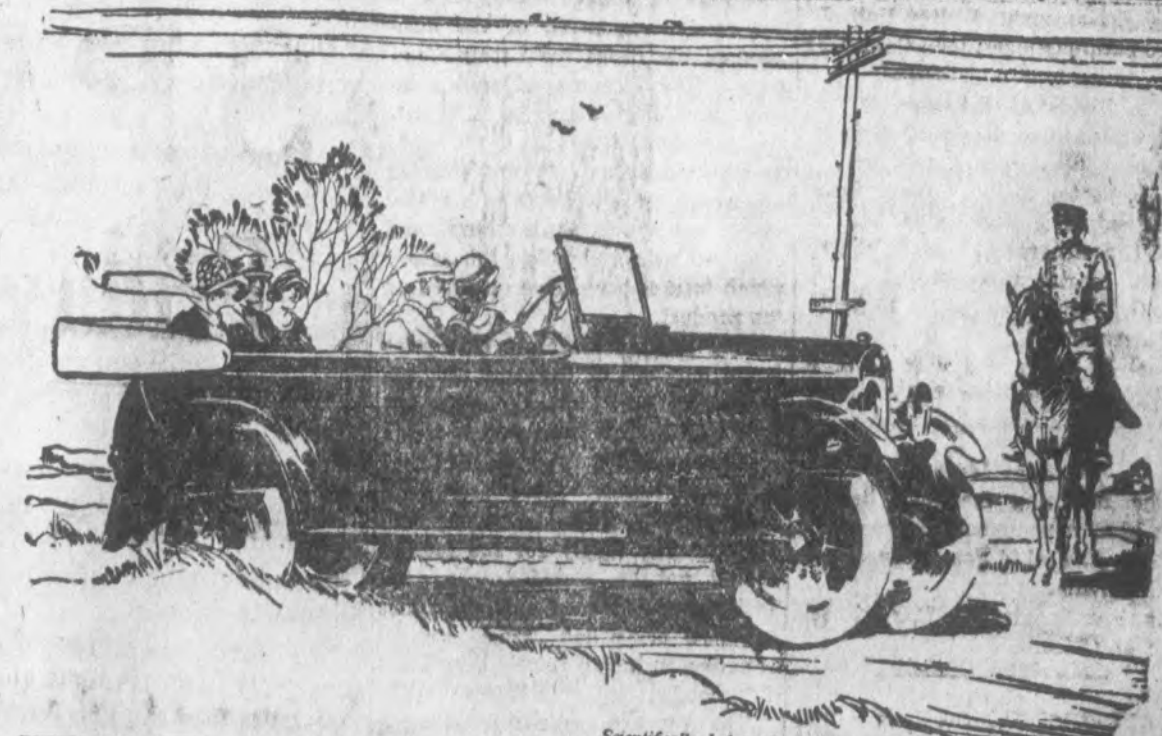

POLICE OF NEW YORK PLAN CAREFULLY FOR COMING CONVENTION

New York.—Every bureau of the New York police and fire departments, with the exception of marine, rum and harbor patrols, will contribute units for the protection of life and property and the regulation of traffic during the Democratic National Convention in June.

Under a system drafted by Police Commissioner Enright, Madison Square Garden, the adjacent park, where thousands of non-delegates are expected to hear the convention proceedings by radio, and the surrounding district for blocks in each direction, are to become almost a restricted area during the convention period.

This system will be put into effect without adding a single man to the existing force of 15,000. "Given time to make our plans," the Commissioner told Stanley J. Quinn, directing vice-president of the local non-partisan National Convention Committee of 500, "we can cope with 200,000 visitors without calling for reinforcements. In fact, it will be easier for us to maintain order and avoid traffic congestion for this convention than it often is to perform such duties at the scene of a championship prize fight, or a world's series of baseball, a big fire, a spectacular accident, a sensational crime, a demonstrative political mass meeting, or on any occasion when comparatively small crowds gather spontaneously."

Commissioner Enright has not disclosed his plans in detail. The general program, however, provides first of all for absolute safety to delegates and seatholders within the convention and along the routes from the various delegations' hotel headquarters to Madison Square Garden.

Each of the numerous entrances to the Garden will be closely guarded, underground as well as a street level. Streets leading to the auditorium will be roped off for two or more blocks, so that only such traffic, vehicle and foot, as is identified with the convention can pass through the lines.

Uniformed police and plainclothes men will be scattered among seatholders at the Garden, throughout Madison Square Park and over all that section, on the lookout for ticket scalpers, panhandlers, gamblers, swindlers, pickpockets and such products of the underworld as prey upon humanity whenever it gathers in large numbers.

"Camera eye" men from headquarters will be there, on the lookout for faces pictured in the rogues' gallery; the throngs spotting criminals of their sex and male "mashers," patrol wagons will be stationed on readily accessible side streets.

Fire Commissioner Drennan also has his plans for the convention worked out. Inspectors will superintend the \$50,000 alterations to the auditorium interior, guarding against the accidental installation of fire hazards, the blocking of fire escapes and the construction of fire traps.

Firemen will be on duty in the Garden and in surrounding structures throughout the convention inspecting fire-fighting facilities, tramping out carelessly tossed cigars and cigarettes and keeping aisles and exits cleared. A traffic policeman will be detailed to each fire hydrant. Emergency apparatus, fire aid units and ambulances will be kept in readiness everywhere.

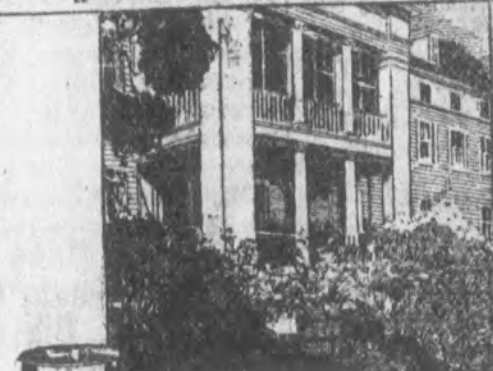

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, May 22.—The undertone of market remains steady notwithstanding considerable realizing by satisfied longs and the further tenders of cotton on May contracts in American markets today.

The firmness of the May position, which has absorbed heavy tenders especially in New York, reflects the scarcity of raw cotton and firmness in the spot department.

Unexpected showers in South Texas and more rain in the South Atlantic, in connection with temperatures below normal in the interior, was a sustaining feature as were prospects for unsettled weather in the southwest instead of needed dry, warm weather.

New York reports cotton good as quiet but steady and Manchester reports yarns quiet but steady cloths firm.

A minus correction of 2,833 bales was made today in the stock at New York, exported but not previously deducted, leaving the total stock there today at 56,000 bales against 58,833 one year ago.

Rumor has it that a bullish private crop condition report will be issued tomorrow. Numerous private monthly crop reports are due in advance of the June second Bureau crop condition report.

Spinners takings for week tomorrow will likely be bullish again as returns will against only 147,000 last year, whereas they were 207,000 bales last week.

Compared with last season, exports from the U. S. thus far this week total 61,000 against 25,000; since August first 5,132,000 against 4,198,000, leaving stock at United States ports today 368,000 bales against 403,000.

Final liquidation of the May position in New York tomorrow may be productive of some interesting developments. Final liquidation of the current month is set for next Monday in New Orleans when trading in May will cease at noon.

We favor buying, especially on depressions until after the government crop report, the first of the season is issued on June second.

History Northwest To Be Theme of Pageant

Walla Walla, Wash.—The romantic history of the Pacific northwest, from the advent of the Lewis and Clark exploration party in 1805 to the building of the first western railroad in 1875, will be re-enacted in a huge community drama here May 28 and 29.

"How the West Was Won" is the title of the pioneer pageant. Last year it attracted an attendance of 30,000. This year, with a cast of 3,200, an even more ambitious production has been planned. The pageant is entirely a community enterprise, with residents of the Walla Walla Valley and the neighboring states of Oregon and Idaho participating. The cast includes 80 adult chorists, 600 juvenile singers, 400 dancers, 250 Indians, a band and an orchestra. Scores of persons in the cast are descendants of the pioneers who enacted the original drama.

The pageant opens with the coming of the Lewis and Clark party, followed closely by the Hudson's Bay Company fur traders and the Marcus Whitman missionary party. The great wagon train of 1943, with its hundreds of emigrants who decided the ownership of the Pacific northwest in favor of the United States, will be shown, and the Whitman massacre of November 29 and 30, 1847, will be presented in symbolism by 400 dancers. The Great Council of 1855 will be depicted by 250 Indians.

Women Police on Increase

Geneva.—Women police are increasing throughout the world, notably in the United States and Great Britain, according to an investigation made by the permanent League of Nations commission for the suppression of the international traffic in women and children. The commission voiced its satisfaction at this development, recording its opinion that the appointment of women as members of police forces would have a beneficial effect in the protection of the interests of women and children throughout the world.

U. S. Courts Revoke Coolidge Pardon.

Phillip I. Grossman, Chicago saloon keeper, sentenced to jail for one year for contempt of court by Judge Landis for refusing to obey an order not to sell more liquor, and who was pardoned by President Coolidge, was rearrested and put in jail when the United States District Court ruled that the President was without pardon power in contempt cases.

TWELVE MILE LIMIT TREATY WAS HELPED BY FREE STATE

Dublin.—The prolonged debates in the Dail on the liquor treaty between Great Britain and the United States brought out the fact that during the progress of the negotiations the Free State was consulted at every stage; that it had some influence in modifying the proposals originally made, and that Sir Auckland Geddes' signature was on behalf of the Free State as well as of Britain. There was not in any section of the Dail any opposition to the terms of the treaty itself.

The Labor party, which voted solidly against endorsing the treaty, made plain that its objections were on constitutional grounds, and did not imply any hostility to the treaty itself or any sympathy with the bootlegger. There was unanimity that it was Ireland's duty to aid the United States in every way, and there were several pronouncements regretting the maintenance of the three mile limit and approving its extension to

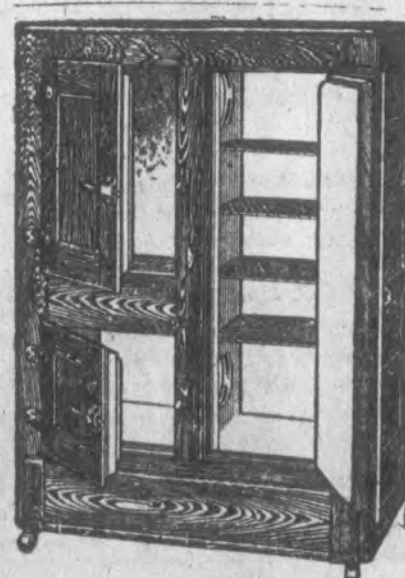
