Another large and enthusiastic response was accorded the appeal of Evangelist M. F. Ham last night at the tabernacle following his effective and convincing sermon on "Excuses" in which he dealt with many of the common excuses offered today for a failure to accept the Christian's obligations. Pointing out that "Excuses are justifications dressed up," the evangelist proceeded to deal separately with each excuse, completely demolishing each in turn and again threw the challenge into the face of his hearers as to what they would do with Christ with the result that some seventy-five persons, among them some of the most prominent among the unchurched element in the city, responded readily to the evangelist's invitation to the inquiry room for prayer and instruction and later surrendered unreservedly to the Master. The service was considered one of the most telling and fruitful of the series by local religious leaders and it is felt by many that the effects of last night's service will long be felt in the lives and hearts of those present.

An unusual feature of the service last night took place when the evangelist first mounted the rostrum and drew from a paper sack just handed him by Rev. V. P. Scoville, some ten or twelve decks of playing cards which had been turned into the pastor by some of the church members who have been indulging in this popular form of amusement, but who took that method of serving notice that they planned to put their time and influence to a better purpose from hence forth. Mr. Ham commented upon the move and stated that he would gladly take care of additional contributions of this nature and took occasion to offer the suggestion that still others might take advantage of the opportunity to clear their influence of such impediments pointing out that "cards have been in bad company for so long that one has to lower one's self to associate with them" and urging that everyone refuse to lend their endorsement to evils that were wrecking the lives of hundreds every day.

Special services are announced for the remainder of the week and much interest is being displayed in making the few remaining services of this great soul saving effort the most fruitful and telling of the series. Special attention is called to the dress Monday evening at which time service for Saturday morning when the

Mr. Ham will speak on the Bible teaching concerning "Heaven." He especially urges that all the older folks and the shut-ins and invalids be provided ways to get to the tabernacle for this special message. On Sunday, the final day of the campaign, three special messages are announced and it is expected that the capacity of the great auditorium will be completely overtaxed with the crowds that will come in for the closing day.

American Navy Second Place in Fighting Strength

Washington, May 23.—The American navy was given second place in fighting strength in comparison with those of Great Britain and Japan in an analysis submitted to the House Naval committee by Secretary Willbur today.

Instead of the 5-5-5 ratio fixed by the Washington Arms Conference the present ratio not considering strategic location of well equipped naval bases is 5-4-3 with sea forces of Great Britain, United States and Japan ranking in the order named.

Carl White Will Be Tried for Murder of Wife and Children

Taylorsville, May 23.—Carl White, who it is alleged killed his wife and children at their home about seven miles from here on the Taylorsville-Lenoir road, nearly seven years ago, will be brought back and tried for murder at the September term of the Alexander County Superior Court, according to a statement issued at the sheriff's office here. The accused has been in an asylum for the criminal insane since the killing occurred. Though the Grand Jury returned an indictment against him charging murder, no action has been taken to bring him to trial until recently when Sheriff Robinet to Raleigh to bring the man back to this county.

It was decided by the sheriff and asylum officials that White should remain there until time for the trial.

Previous to the tragedy, it is said that White had shown no signs of insanity but his friends claim that he had always acted peculiarly. He is said to have killed his wife and two children with a shot gun by beating them over their heads.

CHICAGO BOY MURDERED BY KIDNAPPERS

Body of Lad Discovered While Parents Arranging to Pay \$10,000 Ransom.

Chicago, May 23.—The kidnapping and ransom theory connected with the mysterious death of 14 years old Robert Frank came to the fore again today when coroner's chemist declared that there was no evidence of a degenerate attack as announced by officials earlier in the day.

Chicago, May 23.—Slain while kidnapers demanded \$10,000 ransom, the nude body of Robert Franks, 14 years old son of Jacob Franks, millionaire watch manufacturer found yesterday in a railroad in a railroad culvert five miles from his home, brought to light what police deem to be the strangest and most mysterious homicide in the history of Chicago.

Unaware that the body of an unidentified boy found early yesterday was their son, the Franks were arranging to carry out the kidnapers' demands which had been received neatly typewritten special delivery letter.

Hours after recovery of the body the boy's uncle went to the morgue and identified it. Coroner Physician Springer declared definitely today that the boy was the victim of degenerate attack. Physicians did not state, however, their belief as to the exact cause of his death.

Three instructors of Harvard school, a private institution where the boy was a pupil, Walter Wilson, mathematics instructor, Richard P. Williams, athletic instructor, and Mot Mitchell, English instructor, were questioned in detail concerning the boy. Three small bottles, found in the home of Williams, the athletic instructor, were seized by the officers. Williams said they contained a part of a solution he used to rub the boys down after gymnastics.

Dr. W. D. McBally, coroner's chemist, examined the boy's vital organs and announced that discoloration of the lips might indicate poisoning; likewise, he said there were indications of the presence of acid in the stomach. "From present indications I believe this to be the cause of death" he announced.

American Legion Seeks to Locate Graves of Comrades

As May 30th 1924 draws near the attention of the Pitt County Post of the American Legion is taken with the proper ceremonies necessary to pay tribute to their deceased buddies. Chicago, May 23.—William G. McAdoo declared last night that the sending of the Tennessee delegation to the Democratic National instructed for him had assured him of the presidential nomination.

"Tennessee tells the story," he said in the statement. "My opponents centered their fight in that state. My friends won a fair contest. We needed only that state to be sure of victory. My nomination now seems assured."

Dapper Dan Collins to be Brought Back to United States

Paris, May 23.—"Dapper Dan" Collins will sail for the United States from Harve aboard the liner Paris May 31 in the custody of New York detectives. Collins extradition was based on the charge of his being a fugitive from justice having fled from New York state while conviction of grand larceny against him there was being appealed.

Walsh Wants To Pay Soldiers Cash

Washington, May 23.—The first move to modify the four days old Soldiers' Bonus law was made today when Senator Walsh, Republican, Massachusetts proposed an amendment substituting a cash payment instead of insurance on the same per diem basis now contained in the bill. It is estimated that the government would save one billion dollars if the change is approved.

New Parliament to be Inaugurated in Rome Tomorrow

Rome, Italy, May 23.—Members of the New Italian Chamber of Deputies are arriving in Rome today from all provinces in great numbers for the inauguration of the new parliament tomorrow which promises to be an unusually striking ceremony. Premier Mussolini is personally supervising all preparations.

Raleigh, May 23.—Various organizations have paid tribute to the memory of the late Chief Justice Clark by holding meetings, issuing resolutions, and taking other steps to show respect to his memory. The Wake County Bar Association held a special session, attended by members of the Supreme Court, and many visiting lawyers. A resolution was passed bemoaning the death of the jurist, paying tribute to his ability and record of service to his state and expressing the deepest of sympathy to the family. Copies of the resolution were sent the family.

The Raleigh League of Women voters also met in special session for purpose of passing resolutions on the death of Judge Clark. The resolution was prepared by Mrs. Palmer Jerman, Dr. Dixon Carroll, and Miss Sally Dortch. It expressed the tribute of the League and the men of the state for what the deceased had done for them, told of his great life, expressed regret at his passing and sympathy to the family.

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PUTTING THE BLAME ON CONGRESS

In addition to the propaganda recently undertaken to make President Coolidge appear better than his party, there is also an active campaign to give him prestige by destroying the repute of the Republican Congress. These latest tactics in the President's behalf are explained as due to the consciousness of his political managers that it is necessary not only to sunder him from former official associates who have been stained by recent scandals but to acquit him also of responsibility for the failure of Congress to enact the program which big special interests have been furthering.

This plan of blaming congress for the delay and defeat of certain legislation which these special interests want as well as for the passage of other measures to which they objected has been encouraged if not inspired by the spokesmen of these powerful groups. At a recent meeting of Bankers in New York one of them coupled Bolshevism and Congress as twin menaces. Elbert H. Gary, chairman of the board of the U. S. Steel Corporation, previously had declared that the worst thing in the country is "the American Congress." The Literary Digest, one of the most persistent and partisan of the propagandises for the "Mellon plan" is now conducting an assault on Congress, presumably in pursuance of the new purpose to salvage the President at the expense of his Republican co-partners in the legislative branch.

The Literary Digest sought the views of

many persons regarding the "breakdown" of Congress, taking care that the bankers and mouthpieces of the special interests should be heard first. It is inferred from the opinions of many of these critics of the Republican Congress that the rejection of the "Mellon plan" and the investigation of the scandals in the very household of the Administration where the chief cause of their grievance, and that if Secretary Mellon's scheme of taxation had been adopted and there had been no exposures of Cabinet officers there would now be praise instead of censure.

It is this sort of strategy by which the candidacy of President Coolidge is being promoted. Even Republican leaders are being sacrificed to make the election safe for Mr. Coolidge. The Republican campaign is thus taking the form of a crusade for the personal advancement of the President, without reference to the consequences to individual Republican candidates. It is for that reason observers believe, that the present officials of the Republican National Committee are being retired in favor of Mr. Coolidge's own friends and managers.

Farmers Making Progress in the Field Since Recent Rains

Raleigh, May 22.—After several days of delay, caused by the rains, most of the farmers are getting a good start in their fields again, according to an observation report made by Frank Parker, State Agricultural Statistician after a personal tour of some parts of the state. It is evident, says the report, that much cotton acreage is being substituted for tobacco.

"Attached to my car was the 'crop meter' and this being the first time that one of the new inventions was ever used by this department, a preliminary report is offered," said Mr. Parker. "Many farmers could not understand how we could arrive at the acreages or trends by measuring only the 'road' front of the field. One familiar with averages realizes that a large number of fields, if measured on a constant side, will average approximately equal on all sides. The 12 items being measured on this trip were Legume, hays, tobacco, fruit and truck, oats, wheat, corn, cotton, woodland, plowed but apparently not planted, idle (not yet broken), urban and all other road frontage.

"To give an idea of the capacity

of this crop meter, which replaces the speedometer, it has the trip and total mileage indicators in addition to the 12 crop keys.

"While cotton and tobacco were the principal crops from Raleigh to Troy, clovers and small grains were the more common in Stanly and Cabarrus counties. All crop growths are late. Small grains are low in height. The fall sown oats are very poor in stands, while the spring crop is unusually good. Wheat is good. Clovers are fair to good. Tobacco is just being transplanted to the fields, but the conditions are good for this purpose. Cotton is having the worse time and much replanting is expected. Dewberries and peaches promise big crops."

Springfield Mass., May 23.—The following resolution on war was presented to the Methodist Episcopal General Conference here today by a special committee: "Millions of our fellowmen have died heroically in war. We are determined to outlaw the whole war system."

Markets

New Orleans, May 23: Market erratic today, for while a couple of bullish private monthly crop reports were issued and less favorable weather indicated for nearly all sections of belt, there was more disposition to realize, especially on bulges, and to enter into new commitments. Prior to the recent setback to the low crop, occasioned mainly by low temperatures, traders were inclined to sell October above 24 cents, especially around the 25 cent level. Now that October is up to above 25 cents, traders hesitated to buy, preferring to wait further climatic developments and their effect on the coming crop.

Today a prominent New York house issued a report averaging the condition of the crop at 67 and estimated the acreage at 39,100,000 acres, indicating a yield of only 11,750,000 bales and a local prominent commission house issued a report averaging the condition of the plant at only 66.4, and estimated the increase in acreage at only 3 per cent. Last year government returns as of May 25th averaged the condition of the crop at 71 and the ten year and the ten year average for this year is 72.8.

Advices from the interior are generally to effect that dry warm weather is essential in nearly all districts of the cotton region to permit germination and growth of crop to make satisfactory progress.

Instead of the needed dry, warm weather, the weather Bureau predicts probably showers over the greater portion of the belt and colder for northern portion of the western belt.

Today the May position in New York expired, remaining strong until the very end. Trading in May will cease in New Orleans at noon next Monday, and while a comparatively large volume of cotton is expected to be tendered, the impression prevails that the cotton will be cared for.

In another ten days or so, all of last year's crop, including linters, will probably have been marketed, as the movement into sight to date is 10,682,000 bales, after which the trade will be making inroads on last year's carry-over in the interior, which was only 416,000 bales against 1,276,000 year before last, while the south Texas crop, where early reports are usually obtained is reported backward.

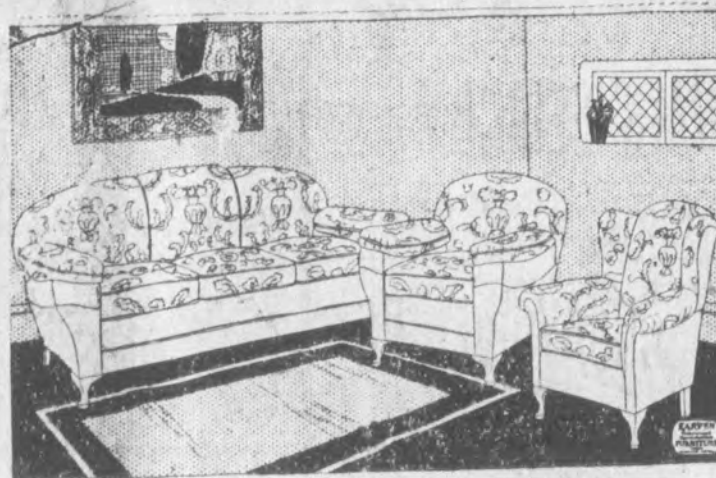

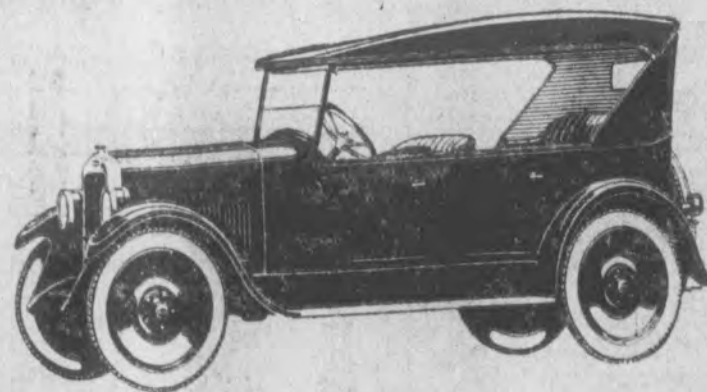
