WORLD COURT FAVORABLY REPORTED

May Call Special Legislature To Consider Ship Report

RESOLUTION FAVORING ENTRANCE TO WORLD COURT WAS ADOPTED

Washington, May 24.—Adhesion of the United States to the permanent Court of International Justice was endorsed in a resolution reported today by the Foreign Relations Committee.

The resolution adopted by the committee follows closely the composite proposal put forward by Senator Pepper, Republican, Pennsylvania.

The committee's action brings the World Court technically before the Senate for the first time. In all quarters little hope is expressed for a vote on the measure during the present session of Congress.

Before taking up the lan eventually reported the committee voted down 10 to 8 the proposal prepared by Senator Swanson, Democrat, Virginia, which comparatively substantiated the proposals presented to Congress by Presidents Harding and Coolidge.

The vote on the Pepper plan was 10 to 6; all Republican members except Senator Johnson, California, being recorded in favor of the measure and all the Democrats presenting the opposition.

The proposal of Chairman Lodge, which would have set up an entirely new court was withdrawn by the author before the committee had opportunity to vote upon it.

Ham-Ramsay Services Which Have Been In Progress Six Weeks Closes Here Tomorrow

Picturing God as a God of love just as much as he has in the past painted Him as a God of consuming fire, Evangelist Ham pleaded with three thousand people Friday evening to hear God's call and let His love be the controlling factor in their lives realizing that this love is just as much a positive factor in their being as breath itself.

The message was sterling in its picturization and the simplicity of the appeal made the sermon all the more impressive. There was hardly a dry eye in the vast assemblage when the minister finished his story of God's enduring, ever-enduring love that had caused the Heavenly Father to give His only Son to the cruel world that they might take Him and use and abuse Him as they did sinners on earth. Men would wonder, he told the audience as to why God would allow Christ to suffer in this way, but they failed to realize that God is more loving in allowing punishment to come upon His children than He is in letting them go without rebuke.

"What must I do to be saved" was Mr. Ham's subject at the tabernacle Friday morning before a large crowd. He based his strong sermon on the experience of Paul and Silas when the jailer asked them the question about salvation. The evangelist reviewed the Biblical incident and summed up with the injunction that to repent and believe is the requisite of salvation.

Mr. Ham's discourse Tuesday night was from the text in I John 4:8, "God is Love."

FAMILY OF SLAIN BOY THREATENED IF HUNT CONTINUES

Father of Slain Boy Says He Will Give Million Dollars to Solve Crime

Chicago, May 24.—A police guard was hurriedly thrown about the home of Jacob Franks, father of the 13 year old Robert Franks, slain by kidnapers, after new threats of violence had been reported to the state attorney by members of the family.

Anonymous telephone calls to the Franks residence, the father reported, warned of further outrage; if the hunt for the slayers was continued.

Chief of Police and Chief of detectives issued a joint statement this afternoon predicting pointed developments in the mystery within a few hours.

Chicago, May 24.—Science today had satisfied authorities that Robert Franks, 13 years old son of a Chicago millionaire, was killed by suffocation when he was kidnapped for ransom and science too had pointed the way to identification of the owner of the peculiar spectacles found near the swamp where young Franks' body was found in a culvert. They were such as are ordinarily worn by a woman.

Coroner Wolf announced that the boy was a victim of suffocation after his chemists had found no external causes of death and no metallic poisons and concluded that a hand or cloth was thrust over the nose and mouth which brought death.

The spectacles were narrow from temple to temple, comparative straight bows, concave lenses, and intended for street wear for a far sighted person were made to order from a special prescription a Chicago optician declared. The wearer, either a woman or man, is of a nervous erratic tendency, rather intellectual, temperamental and is one leading a sedentary life. The person, he added, has a long rather than round head with a short reach from temples to ears and narrow frontal. The lenses are specially ground, he said.

While Chief Hughes has asked help from everybody in Chicago who might have any facts or ideas regarding the case, Jacob Franks, father of the boy, has voiced an untiring determination to find the slayers. "It will spend \$1,000,000 to solve the crime," he said. "Money means nothing to me now."

Ship Commission Recomends State Owned Boat Line

Report calls for appropriation of \$8,500,000 for Terminals, ships and railroad Action will Free state from freight rate discrimination.

Raleigh, May 24.—Recommendation that the state enter into the ship line and water terminal business was made here late yesterday by the state ship and water transportation body authorized by the 1923 legislature to study the subject in its report to the council of state and Governor Morrison.

The committee recommended in its report submitted after 15 months consideration and study, that a port commission of five members be appointed by the legislature "vested with full authority to select sites, construct port terminals with all necessary equipment in both and that the commission be given full power to handle freight and traffic disputes through a special traffic organization.

The commission further recommended that seven million dollars be appropriated by the legislature to be used by the port commission and that an additional million and a half be put at its disposal to lease and operate ships, if in its opinion, adequate shipping is not made available by private enterprises.

The commission further recommended the purchase of the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley for a trunk line from the Cape Fear to the middle west or otherwise provide such a trunk line.

Answering the questions propounded to it by the legislature in erecting the commission the members asserted that they believed it imperative for the good of the state that a mari-time industry be created on the waters of the state and that said industry will be both profitable in itself and will tend to reduce the freight rate throughout the state and place said freight rates on a parity of those of other states and localities. The commission believed this can be accomplished and without the state embarking on the shipping business.

The commission finds that coast-wise ships and inland freight boats of varying types can at this time be purchased at a very reasonable

price and believes that if private enterprise does not provide adequate shipping service the state could undertake such purchase and to the advantage of the people.

"Docks wharves and landing places asserted the commission in its conclusions, are available at some 25 or 30 towns in the state and the commission has been tendered sites through gifts at Southport, Wilmington, New Bern, Morehead City and Manteo.

Docks and wharves are available in ports outside the state on equal terms for all ship interests.

Governor Morrison in receiving the report, asserted that this alone of the major propositions he has undertaken during his administration, remains to be completed. He said he was gratified with the report and that if the council of state allowed him to and that reaction of the people showed that prompt action was wanted he would call a special session of the legislature.

"I confidently expect," he asserted, "that this thing will be put through before the first frost is on the leaves."

The commission found that the state was being discriminated against in the matter of freight rates and asserted that this discrimination would continue until the state itself relieved the situation. The report suggested that the recommendations included therein would prove the most effective method of putting an end to the discrimination that it found to exist. The freight rate situation in North Carolina was discussed extensively in the report. Backing up its contention with numerous exhibits and comparisons the report declared that North Carolina was being exploited by the railroads for the benefit of cities and ports in other states and that on several occasions when boat lines had been put into operation in the state in opposition to the railroads that they had bought up the stock and in a short while had discontinued operations of the lines.

Dr. J.E.W. Cook Emphasizes Two Big Features Connected With Ham-Ramsay Services

To the Editor of the Daily Reflector, Dear Sir:

Permit me through your valuable columns, to emphasize two features connected with the Ham-Ramsay meetings, now drawing to a close in our city, which, in my opinion, ought to be perpetuated.

1. The Business Men's Morning Prayer Meeting will, I sincerely hope be continued. This meeting has been a wonderful exhibition of the power of Jesus to forgive sins, and an up-to-date proof of every promise He made respecting His gift of the Holy Ghost. The same is probably true of the other prayer groups instituted during the mission, but not having attended them, I cannot speak from personal knowledge.

2. The United Choir should not be allowed to disband. Our community will lose a valuable asset if the choir is permitted to disperse.

We have too little music in our city as it is. I suggest that the choir be organized into a Choral Society, under the leadership of any, Professor Rose, and that its services be secured for all civic and communal occasions. During the summer they could rehearse some Oratorio, like Handel's "Messiah," and one concert would raise the expenses of the production. (An orchestra is well on its way, and should be united to the choir from the start.

Prayer and Praise will make Greenville the happiest place to live in this side of Heaven, and if these organizations can be continued, the Ham-Ramsay revival will have blessed our city for years to come with unspeakable blessing.

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CIVILIZATION'S PRICE

Human existence may be divided into two eras—the pre-taxation age and the taxation age. It requires no historian to remind us that this is the age of taxation and the historians have provided us little information concerning the pre-taxation period. We have no record of a civilization of which taxation was not a component part.

Taxes are burdensome and will become more burdensome as civilization becomes more complicated and the needs of humanity become greater. Our civilization manifestly has given us the choice between itself with taxation and no taxes with no civilization. We won't surrender the comforts of our civilization so we must tolerate taxes.

American civilization is a valued treasure but is not being offered to the public at bargain prices. Our federal taxes for governmental purposes are inconsiderable but for war purposes are oppressive. Few institutions of our civilization are untaxed by the federal government in the name of the World War, which was a product of our civilization. The federal government, national highways, national park and reserves, the army and navy, the diplomatic service are all quite necessary to our civilization and must be paid for with taxes. We pay state taxes for good roads, school administration, agricultural extension, state government and other attributes of civilization which none would willingly forgo. Then there are county taxes for the administration of our courts of justice, for roads, schools and the preservation of the records of civilization and its institutions. Municipal taxes broke much complaint, but without them we would have no paved streets, fire and police protection, municipal government and sanitation. Everywhere there is discontent with increasing school taxes, but the demands for education are becoming greater and greater under

our civilization.

Many are the blessings of civilization but they must be paid for in taxes.

PASS THE TAX BILL

It is no model Tax Bill which the conferees of the Senate and the House have agreed upon, but it is a Tax Bill which can and should be passed.

The Norris plan of giving publicity to tax returns, with its cordial invitation to all manner of petty inquisition and business blackmail, has been lifted from the bill.

Its stepbrother, the Jones plan of taxing undistributed corporation profits on the easy-going basis of paying no attention to the amount of capital a corporation has invested likewise disappears.

The rates adopted for income taxes are substantially the Simmons Democratic rate—lower than the figures in the Mellon plan for all incomes up to \$70,000 a year; higher for incomes which run beyond that figure.

As it stands the bill is both workable and useful. It is useful because it actually brings substantial tax relief after all these months of toasting it. It is workable because, in spite of the inroads which the Bonus Bill will make upon the Treasury, there is surplus revenue enough to make the cuts effective. At worst the new rates will leave only a small revenue deficit, and there are worse things in national finance than a small deficit when congress is in a mood for rollicking expenditure.

What we have is a much-badgered piece of legislation which brings genuine tax relief which is better drawn in its administrative provisions than any of its predecessors and which closes a number of those loopholes which have proved inviting to the tax-evader.

That the bill draws a still inadequate distinction between earned and unearned incomes, that it does nothing to break the strangle-hold of tax exemption on our national fiscal system and that it is the child of frantic bargain and not statesmanship may be considered details.

This is a better Tax Bill than we have reason to expect of a leaderless Administration which works on the principle of standing near a tree and waiting for a flash of lightning; and on that premise it deserves to pass.

Markets

(Furnished by James William Cobb)

New Orleans, La., May 24.—The old saying, "Never bull the end of a short crop." Looks as though it will not hold good this year since the May position has absorbed all offerings of spots and futures on a scale-up.

What has taken place in the current months will likely prove to have been only a skirmish since the probable real battle of bales will take place in July.

Nearly all the stock in New York has been delivered on May contracts in that market and it is expected that nearly all of the certificated stock in the New Orleans market, now numbering 11,994 bales, perhaps a larger amount, will have been delivered on May contracts this month.

That being the case it remains to be seen what disposition is to be made of the cotton received on May contracts in the American markets. If the cotton is to be shipped to Europe or to domestic spinners, the supply situation in the New Orleans, New York the contracts markets would likely become acute. Most of the cotton received in March contracts was exported and it is likely that the same thing will happen as regards cotton received on May contracts.

When 10,800,000 bales have come into sight and the insight to yesterday was 10,639,000 of which 93,000 was marketed during the week the trade will be obliged at so early in the spring to draw against last year's carry over in the interior which on July 31st last year was only 44416 000 bales against 1,276,000 year before last as the South Texas crop is reported backward, with only some few blooms showing up whereas talk of new bales in the not far distant future should be going the rounds.

Minimum temperatures in the northern portion of the western half of the belt continue below normal with scattered showers, locally heavy in Oklahoma, Arkansas and Tennessee. Cooler weather still is predicted for the south west tonight but warmer Sunday and showers are probable in south Texas where not wanted and in some sections of the Mississippi Valley and South Atlantic districts.

Apparently the trade has set on expectations for a bullish government crop condition report second perhaps lower than last years 71 which would compare with the ten year average of 72.8.

er turning down and destroying that which God was endeavoring to do and having been responsible for leading men into sin and keeping them in sin until their death, yet God in his goodness has been bearing with you. Men who have been long in sin have found God just as ready and willing to receive them and forgive, as the man who has never strayed from God very far. It is illustrated in the story of the man who went to work at the eleventh hour, receiving the same wage as those who had borne the heat of the day.

"We also see the love of God in his limitations. When God first put Adam and Eve on earth he laced restrictions on them. He forbade them to eat of the fruit of the tree. Eve did not understand that limitation as a manifestation of love. Young people do not always recognize the parent's love when they forbid them doing certain things and put restrictions on them. The prattling child understands why its mother told it to leave the fire alone after it has been burned once. After all Eve found out it was God's love that had dealt with her. Satan is always telling you how God has forbidden you the pleasant things.

"Some people have thought they should have gotten certain knowledge by indulging in certain sins. Eve would have gotten the same knowledge had she obeyed God, with out the smirch of sin upon her; but she was not patient to find out God's way.

"How many a father has been misguided by that lie which crept out of hell, that the boy should know something of the evils of this world to make him strong. You had just as well argue that I could break my arm and let it heal up and be strong er for the experience. No person ever came to a knowledge of sin by experiencing it who was the same in character afterwards. Sin never leaves a man the same.

"You will find men who have left the greatest stamp upon the world are men who have never drunk at the fountain of dissipation. God never has put a premium on sin. You are no better prepared to serve God by having learned of sin experimentally. Some men who have gone into sin may have learned their weakness thereby and been taught to lean heavier upon God in the end; but there has never been a man but regrets the years spent in sin which have brought limitations to his life of usefulness.

"How many women and girls today are living in sin and shame with wrecked lives because they allowed themselves to be led into an experimental knowledge of sin. They thought they could go so far, and after having had a little fun and learned its ways would turn from sin. God teaches prohibition and when a man steps across one of his laws he will learn that he suffers for it.

"On my father's farm there was a deep sinkhole. We decided to put a ten rail commandment around that hole. These rails said to the little pigs, the shoats, the sheep, calves, colts, horses and cows, 'Thou shalt not fall into that sink hole.' But one old sow with a long nose persistently rooted at the bottom until she broke the first two commandments and fell into the hole. Some ten days later when we found her she was too near starved to death to stand on her feet. I said, 'You old fool, if you had stayed where we put you, you would not have suffered so.' And I never see a man suffering from sin but what I think of that old hog, and think what he might have escaped had he obeyed God.

"Every limitation God has placed around you is because He knows the danger and has chosen best for you. You feel like because God has put a ban on such worldly amusements as you are indulging in is the unjust and depriving you of pleasure. But if you will look at the question in all sincerity you will see that it is to save you from the wreckage that has come to the multitudes who have gone into the pleasure of this world and ended in dissipation. God knows the human soul better than you do because he made it, and he in his great infinite love, has planned for its best interests in placing restrictions and limitations upon you.

"Could you read some of the pitiful, pleading letters I have received in your city from heart broken individuals you would know that God was using love in warning you against some of your indulgences, knowledge that there awaits you an awful reaping time of sorrow and remorse.

"You may think it is depriving your children of pleasure when you deny them the 'movies' and theatres, but you will be saving them and yourself a reaping of lust, hatred and perhaps murder in their lives because of the influence upon

their developing brains of what they see pictured on the screen. God never took from you that which you consider pleasure, but what you will later see it is the very thing that would rob you of a more valuable eternal pleasure. If you expect to enjoy the pleasure of sin you may also expect to reap the harvest of sin—corruption, grief, sorrow in your latter days. Just one act of sin, crossing limitations just once, may be responsible for bringing remorse into your life through all your days on earth. You may repent in bitter tears, but therewithal of that sin may be engraved into life beyond effacing.

"God's love is also manifested in his wrath. That is hard to understand, but is none the less true. It was his love that slew three thousand Israelites in the wilderness; it was his love that slew Ananias and Sapphira; it was his love that forbade Moses entering the promised land because of one act of disobedience.

"I believe God loves some children so much that he has taken them away from your homes that they might be saved in infancy instead of growing into maturity and going to hell. And that same love is manifested for you that he might turn your hearts to follow where the child has gone.

"God's wrath may seem to fall upon certain characters in a community, cutting them off in their sins but it is because of his love for the souls of the community who are being damned by the influence of such a character. You can always see where punishment is because of love. Some of your homes should have a good sized hickory stick hung on the wall under the motto: 'I need thee every hour.'

"I went swimming on Sunday once and was severely punished by my father in a way I did not care to go again. The next Sunday the same boys went again and three of them were drowned. Had my father not put his limitations on me I might have been one of the three drowned. If you look after your children as you should in early life you would not suffer over their conduct in later life.

"Real love prompts warning. If you churches loved your members as you once loved them you would discipline them as you once did. The very fact that you do not is responsible for worldliness in the church and our members will land in hell. That is not love. No man has warned like God, because no one loves like God. But the greatest revelation of God's love was manifested in the gift of his only begotten Son. God suffered more than Jesus in that sacrifice. Is there a father or mother who would not rather suffer than see your children suffer? God gave that Son to a horrible death, a horrible tragedy, and even turned his face from the scene in his anguish. And that love was manifest that you might have eternal life. 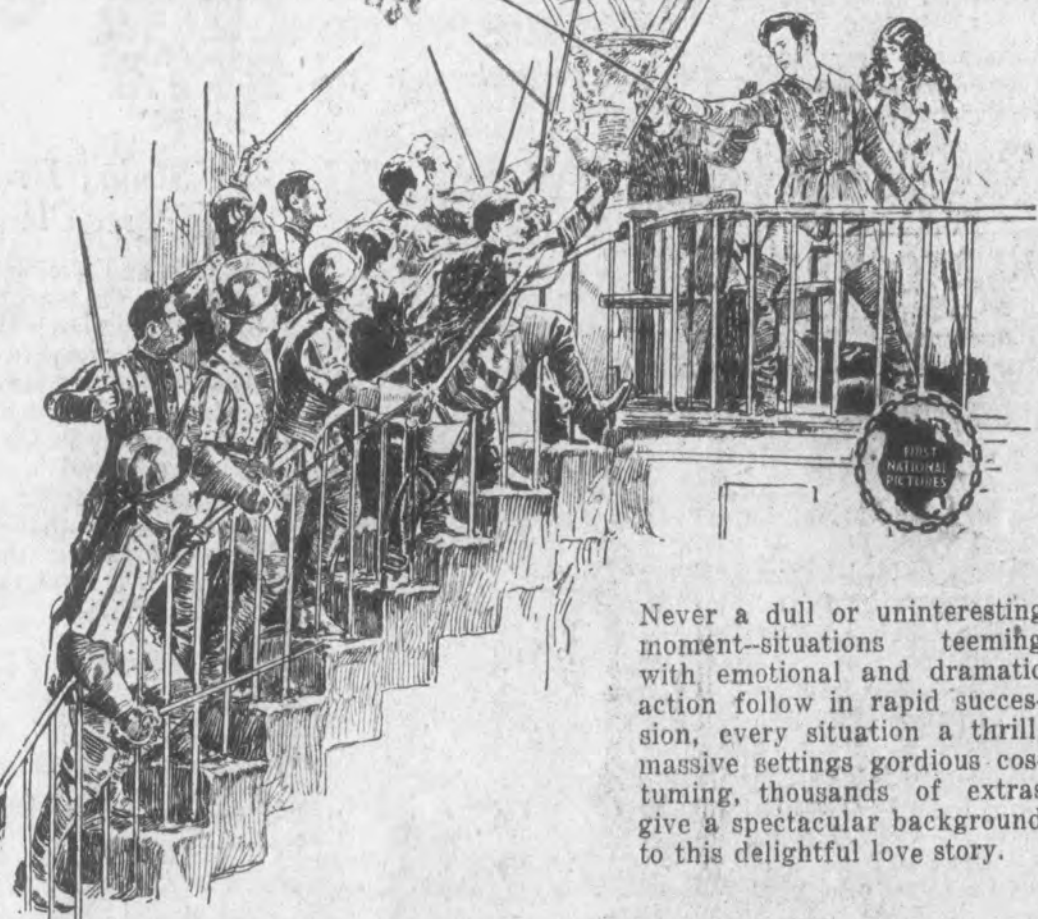
