

PRESIDENT SIGNS THE IMMIGRATION BILL

House Approves Conference Tax Reduction Measure

IMMIGRATION BILL IS SIGNED BY PRESIDENT COOLIDGE THIS A. M.

Executive Issues Statement That Bill Signed Because Present Law Expires June 30; Voices Opposition to Jap Exclusion Provision

Washington, May 26.—The Immigration bill was signed today by President Coolidge.

Despite the provision for Japanese exclusion effective July 1, which was put into the measure over his vigorous protest the president decided because of their considerations to give the executive approval necessary to spread the legislation on the statute books. He pointed out that in as much as the present immigration law expires June 30, that veto might make it necessary to rush through an emergency measure during the closing hours of this session of Congress. Such action would not be practical in the tangled legislative situation and certainly any emergency provision would be set back by many attempts to amend and possibly blocked altogether, he pointed out.

As soon as he had affixed his signature to the measure the president began the preparation of a statement expressing his regret at the failure of Congress to effect a longer delay of Japanese exclusion. His signature was affixed to the bill after he had conferred with Secretary Hughes and devoted a week to the study of the measure and the reports made on it by the State and Labor departments. His statement declared that he approved the bill because it was necessary considering it as a whole and the imperative need of the country for a measure of its general character. If the exclusion provision had stood alone he would have disapproved it without hesitation, the statement declared.

2000 Veterans Ask To Benefit by Bonus Insurance Bill

Asheville, May 26.—Veterans of the World War, numbering approximately 2,000 who are residents of Ashe county, will benefit by the recent passage by Congress of the "Soldier Bonus Insurance Bill" it was stated at the local post of American Legion. A number of the veterans of the county will receive only the minimum bonus of \$50, it was stated, but the majority of them will profit to a much greater extent by the insurance feature.

It is estimated by the officials of the local post that at least 600 of the veterans served overseas and will therefore have the days they served rated at \$1.25 each towards a paid-up insurance policy.

Henderson, May 26.—One person is dead and two others are today recovering from injuries resulting from a collision between two automobiles six miles from here last night. Joe Pridden, was fatally hurt, Al Riggan sustained a broken arm and Annie Dickerson was severely cut about the face and head.

The collision occurred when Riggan, who was driving attempted to pass another car, his car colliding with a third car parked on the side of the road.

Riggan is held under \$250 bond for his appearance in Superior court in connection with the accident and the girl is held under \$250 bond as a witness.

Pridden died upon the operating table in a local hospital. He was under bond to appear in United States District court in Raleigh this week on a prohibition charge.

Presbyterians of Country May Unite

Grand Rapids, Mich., May 26.—Definite indications of the reunion of the two groups of Presbyterian in the country were seen today in the announcement that Dr. Thornton Whaling, moderator of the Presbyterian church of the United States (South) will pay a friendly visit tomorrow to the 136th General Assembly of Presbyterian Church of America now in session here. This is the first time that a moderator of the Southern church has ever visited the assembly of the parent body.

That Dr. Whaling's visit may strengthen the cause of the Fundamentalists was indicated by Dr. Clarence E. McCartney, moderator of the assembly here. He said that the greatest barrier heretofore to the reunion of the two groups has been the suspicion on the part of the Southern Assembly of orthodoxy in the Northern Church.

Warsaw.—Polish exports are increasing. Official data published by the Polish Statistical Bureau shows that while in 1922 Poland exported goods valued at 655,150,000 gold francs, in 1923 its exports were 1,195,586,000 gold francs.

Trinity Student Instantly Killed

DURHAM, May 26.—Bynum Belots, Trinity College student, whose home was in Asheville, was instantly killed here early today when he jumped from a Southern passenger train at the West Durham station. According to Robert Burch, also a student of Trinity, and a fellow passenger of Belote, the two had decided to jump from the train at the West Durham station to avoid the trip from Durham back to the college. Trinity is located in West Durham and the train on which they were passengers does not stop at that station.

Burch said he saw Belote leap from the train but that because of the speed of the train he decided not to jump off but remained aboard until he reached Durham.

Police rushed Belote to a local hospital, but it was found that he had died instantly. His body was badly mangled.

Agriculture Com. Will Reconsider Action Ford Bid

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The Senate Agriculture committee today reconsidered its vote of last Wednesday on the Ford bid for Muscle Shoals on the grounds that it did not represent the true sentiment of the Senate Agriculture committee. It was explained that some of the Senators confused the meaning of the vote and therefore another vote has been ordered for tomorrow.

On the first occasion the Ford bid was voted down 10 to 6 and supporters of Senator Norris won by the same count the question of closing the hearings of continuing them until tonight.

Republican Leaders Join With Democratic Line-Up for Measure; Few Republicans Will Sustain President if he Vetoes

Washington, May 26.—The conference tax bill already passed by the Senate was today approved by the House.

Providing for reduction in taxes of almost every federal tax payer the measure now goes to President Coolidge. It carries a 25 per cent reduction in income taxes payable this year and permanent revision downward of the income rates, repeals miscellaneous sales taxes and a 25 per cent reduction on earned incomes of \$10,000 and under.

Although there is expression of some doubt as to President Coolidge's attitude to the measure in view of Treasury Department opposition and the provision for limited publicity of tax returns and increase of the estate tax rate. Republican leaders in both Senate and House have joined with the Democratic line-up in support of the measure.

In the brief debate there developed opposition in the Republican ranks to even limited publicity of tax returns and several announced that if the bill was vetoed they would vote to sustain such action.

Former Officer Is Captured While Watching Still

New Bern, May 26.—Former Deputy Sheriff Robert Ross, who several months ago was convicted of assaulting an aged negro near here has just been arrested while watching a still in operation near Havelock. He was taken into custody by Federal and county officers.

On information received, Sheriff W. W. Whitford and the Federal agents went to the scene and after slipping past a bull dog that was apparently put out as a guard, they surrounded Ross and closed in on him, it was explained. He made no resistance, and seemed only disturbed because his pleasure of watching the liquor drip from the coil into a container was interrupted, the officers said.

The still was of 50 gallons capacity and there was about 15 gallons of whiskey and several hundred gallons of beer in storage nearby, which the officers confiscated.

Ross was released after it was discovered that it was impossible to give a hearing at the time. He is now out on bond pending his hearing which has been set for Monday.

Greenville, though established years and years ago, is today a new town spiritually compared to what it was just a few weeks ago. When the Ham-Ramsay party arrived in Greenville there was skepticism as to what the outcome would be, but, as the meeting progressed, those who went to scoff remained after the services to pray and during the latter days of the great revival there has been a heretofore unbelievable change in the community and today the movement for Jesus Christ is gaining momentum and spreading throughout the section. Each morning business men are spending their first half hour in a prayer meeting for the Glory of GOD and those who have occasion to visit business houses during the day say that since the movement began that they find an entirely different atmosphere there than before. The attendance at these early morning meetings has steadily increased and at the forming of the Men's Federation of Christian Workers this morning more than three hundred were present to offer freely their services to the work of Christianity.

In other words, the unbelievable has come to pass in Greenville and from the seeds of Christianity and Brotherly Love sown by this great Prophet of God, the community will reap the harvest for generations to come.

New Orleans, La., May 26—All the glory in the final liquidation of the May position in American markets, trading in the current months having ceased at noon in the local market today, went to the longs who have managed the campaign so successfully.

As to the final struggle for control of the market in July, leaders on both sides will be occupied from now on in their plans for future operations that will bring the season to a close. What was thought would be the "Happy dumping ground," July may prove to be the "promised land."

Meanwhile future weather and crop accounts, as well as international trade developments, will have to be reckoned with. So far as Europe is concerned, economics seem to be constantly improving, but the presidential election in the United States next November makes the domestic trade situation uncertain, though hopeful.

More unfavorable crop weather in the interior over the week-end especially west of the Mississippi River, particularly in Texas, in connection with additional private monthly cotton crop reports most of which were bullish, influenced a further sharp advance in market today.

As yet the weather remains unsettled in nearly all sections of the belt with the probability of more rain in nearly all sections of belt, colder for northern portion of the southwest, whereas dry warm weather is desired everywhere.

Returns to commercial appraisal Memphis, Tennessee average the condition of crop at 68.1 indicated crop 12,500, bales.

Clement Curtis Co. 66.3 indicated crop, 11,450,000.

Local commission houses 66.6 indicated crop 11,000.

Gosho Company 66.1 indicated crop 11,107,000, while it was rumored that the national ginners association will report a condition of between 67 and 68.

Much importance will be attached to the disposition to be made of the cotton delivered and to be delivered on May contracts. If the cotton is shipped to domestic mills or exported, the July position would likely become very strong.

In the meantime the trade has to reckon with possible weather developments of the near and distant future, and the uncertainty at tending the government first crop condition report of the season due June second.

The Weather

Temperatures were below normal during the last two days except along the Gulf coast, where they were seasonable or slightly higher. Minima ranged from 36 degrees in the extreme north to 76 degrees on the Texas coast.
