SAYS MELLON PARTY TO LIQUOR DEALS

Chicago Murder Suspect Is Located In Kentucky

MEANS AGAIN ON STAND IN SENATE PROBE

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Gaston B. Means told the Senate Daugherty Committee today that he received from Jess Smith in 1922 certain documents purported to show that Secretary Mellon had agreed to issue a batch of whiskey withdrawal permits in return for money which was to go toward the payment of the deficit of the Republican National Committee. The alleged arrangement, the witness said, was with a man by the name of Rex Sheldon, who was to receive the permits and pay over the money. He added that according to the story, Senator Bursum, New Mexico, and Fred Upham of the Republican National Committee, went to Mellon's office regarding the matter.

Later, he said, Bursum denied that he had any part in such a plan and said he had sent Sheldon to the Treasury Secretary just as he would have any other man not knowing his purpose?

Secretary Mellon, Means asserted, himself told H. L. Scaife, Department of Justice man, about arrangement in September 1922. Afterwards, the witness went on, regarding a conference with a man named Stevens, bookkeeper of La Monagnes, in New York, involving Mr. Upham and the whole whiskey ring.

Washington, May 29.—Gaston B. Means, detective, former government investigator, and one time international spy, took the stand again today before the Senate Daugherty committee to give additional details of his story that he carried protection money in huge amounts to Jess Smith, dead companion of former Attorney General Daugherty.

His story ended, he will go to New York for trial next week on charges of taking money from bootleggers, in the prosecution of which he has promised to "ask no quarters or give no quarters."

Means repeated his assertion that in the summer of 1922 Smith had asked him on the strength of a letter from President Harding to investigate the liquor situation. He worked some time he said on such an inquiry in New York.

Senator Wheeler then asked if he had had anything to do with oil. "I did," replied Means. "The department assigned me to investigate some oil matters in February 1922." He went on to say that Richard Cole, oil man, came to Washington to entertain a number of Senators.

Asked if Cole was attorney for Estaban Cantu, who was planning a revolution in Lower California, Mexico, he replied: "He was more a promoter. He had a lot of correspondence with the association for protection of American Rights in Mexico. That body had no other purpose than to create agitation and if necessary revolution in Mexico."

Nobles of Mystic Shrine to Descend On Kansas City

Kansas City.—Lavish preparations for the tidal wave of Shriners, expected to sweep into Kansas City for the Fiftieth Imperial Session of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, June 3-5, are being made by the nobles of Ararat Temple here. "Hang Your Hat with Ararat" is the slogan broadcast, which the convention committee expects to be taken advantage of by 35,000 wearers of the fez.

More than \$300,000 is being expended on decorations, entertainments and features. Between 80 and 90 temples will send their uniformed bodies.

"Pullman cities" will be set up in the railroad yards to house delegations coming on their own special trains. City water and electric lights will be installed, and restaurant and dining car service will be provided conveniently close to the cars.

Length of Document Will Cause Several Days' Delay in Presentation to State Department

Washington, May 29.—The Japanese protest against the new immigration law reached the Japanese Embassy here today by cable. Because of the great length of the document some time will be required to decide and study it before it is formally presented to the State Department.

Meantime Ambassador Hanihara will make no appointment to see Secretary Hughes for the purpose of presenting his government's views.

Embassy officials appear doubtful that the communication can be put into shape for presentation today. They have declined to discuss the note in any way. They described it as "very long."

Mr. Hughes conferred at length during the day with President Coolidge but indications are that no authoritative comment on the Japanese attitude will be forthcoming until the government is ready to reply to Tokio.

HOFFMAN DRAWS LIFE SENTENCE

Convicted of Murder of Woman on Lonely Staten Island Road

New York, May 29.—Harry L. Hoffman, charged with the slaying of Mrs. Maude A. Bauer, on a lonely Staten Island road, was found guilty of second degree murder early today and sentenced to serve 20 years to life imprisonment in Sing Sing. Hoffman, on his way to the prison van after sentence had been imposed passed within a few feet of District Attorney Fack and shrieked: "Now you and your lying witnesses can divide up your reward. I am innocent and you know it."

Later Hoffman collapsed in his cell and wept.

THREE TRAINMEN KILLED IN WRECK THIS MORNING

Chattanooga, Tenn., May 29.—Three trainmen, all of Chattanooga, were killed at 2 o'clock this morning when a Southern Railroad train was derailed near Rockwood, Tenn.

The dead are Charles E. Dudley, engineer; Oscar Holland, fireman; Herman W. Potter, brakeman.

METHODISTS DEFEAT PROPOSED CHANGE OF DIVORCE LAWS

Change Would Have Made All Marriages With One Exception Legal

Springfield, Mass., May 29.—A proposal for drastic changes regarding divorce in the Methodist Episcopal Church was defeated by 10 votes at the closing session of the General Conference here when the vote on the proposal was 300 for adoption and 310 against it.

The present law forbids ministers from marrying divorced persons when husband or wife is living unless that person is the innocent party to a divorce on grounds of adultery.

The change would have made legal all marriages except those of the guilty parties in divorces for adultery.

MORRISON SPEAKS TO KENTUCKY GOOD ROAD ASSOCIATION

Outlines Plans By Which North Carolina Built Its System

Louisville, Ky., May 29.—"When the 'Pay as You Go' system resulted in a few roads of faulty construction, patched roads and unsuitable bridges in North Carolina that state voted \$65,000,000 road bonds," Governor Cameron Morrison said here last night, "and we built, I believe, the finest system of highways in the Republic."

Governor Morrison spoke at the banquet of the Kentucky Good Roads Association which concluded a convention here last night at which an organization was formed to work up interest in a proposed \$75,000,000 state bond issue to be submitted to Kentucky voters for approval November.

"The North Carolina road system was built," Governor Morrison said, "by revenue derived from motor vehicles the interest being paid and a sinking fund created without placing one dollar of tax on property."

After outlining the benefits which he said had been accrued to the citizenry of North Carolina from good roads he described also improvements in educational charity and penal institutions.

Suspected of Connection With Kidnapping and Murder of Robert Franks, C. F. Heath Disappears From Chicago After Attempting Suicide; Found Unconscious in Louisville Today

Louisville, Ky., May 29.—C. F. Heath, Chicago druggist, was found in an unconscious condition at a rooming house here today and taken to a hospital where he is in a critical condition.

Police said that the man was suspected of being implicated in the kidnapping and slaying of Robert Franks, in Chicago, basing the statement upon information from the hospital that Heath had confessed.

Inquiry at the hospital revealed that he had made no statement concerning the case and authorities had apparently misunderstood the message physicians said.

Chicago, Ill., May 29.—Charles F. Heath, former druggist, watched in a Louisville, Kentucky, hospital suspected in connection with the kidnapping and murder of Robert Franks 13 years old son of a Chicago millionaire, disappeared from a hospital here last Sunday after he had apparently attempted to end his life. Detectives were seeking him when he vanished.

Heath had swallowed a sleep producing drug Sunday but when detectives sought him next day he had disappeared from Mercy hospital.

He formerly had a drug store less than two miles from the Franks home.

PROMINENT FRENCH STATESMAN DIES

Pierre Paul Cambon, Former Ambassador to London, Died At Paris Home Last Night

Paris, May 29.—Pierre Paul Cambon, former French Ambassador to London died at his home here last night.

Pierre Paul Cambon, eminent French statesman and diplomat, won international fame in the early days of the present century for his efforts in behalf of the Anglo-French agreement of April 8, 1904, when the powerful and far-reaching Entente Cordiale was born.

Paul Cambon was one of three brothers, all of whom were conspicuous in French diplomatic affairs at the same time. Jules Cambon, later the best known of the three, was ambassador to Washington; Paul was accredited to London, and the third brother was in a similar post at Constantinople.

M. Paul Cambon was born January 20, 1843. He was called to the Parisian bar some 20 years later, and after 10 years of administrative work in various government departments, was transferred to the diplomatic service and appointed minister plenipotentiary at Tunis. In 1886 he became French ambassador to Madrid and two years later went to Constantinople in the same capacity. In 1898 he presented his credentials as ambassador to the court of St. James.

He was still in London when, six years later, the relations between England and France had reached a critical stage over the Fashoda incident in Egypt.

Paul Cambon acted as intermediary during the negotiations, and it was largely through him that the many difficulties were ironed out. The announcement had been reached, came suddenly late in 1904, and astounded the entire world.

The basis of the treaty provided for the French surrender to England of certain long standing rights in Egypt, while England conceded that France occupied a privileged position in Morocco. Aside from settling

SWEAR OUT WARRANTS AGAINST THEMSELVES

North Wilkesboro, May 29.—Judge E. Yates Webb, while presiding in the federal court this morning at Wilkesboro, received the shock of his life when J. W. Shephard, H. W. Walsh and T. A. Walsh, of the Ferguson neighborhood of this county, were brought to trial. It developed on investigation that the defendants were their own prosecutors, having come yesterday into the office of District Attorney Linney and swore out a charge against themselves for making whiskey.

There was no evidence against them either in federal or State courts and no report charging them with the manufacture of liquor. They stated that their conscience had been hurting them and that they wanted to square off their record and make a new start. It developed that they did not know each other as being in the whiskey business.

Judge Webb suspended sentence till next court with the understanding that the defendants are to appear with two good witnesses from their community to testify to their good behavior, remarking that this was one case where truth was stranger than fiction.

"GOOD TIMES" CONTINUE

The proverb "Where there is smoke there must be fire" obviously does not apply to the talk of panic now heard on the streets. Street conversation is usually the "smoke" of the accident or condition, but in this instance there appears to be only a smudge of smoke and no fire. There is a lot of gossip about hard times but no cause for either the gossip or the hard times.

On the whole business seems to be normal and to be improving. There was a slump in the automobile trade and textile reports were not encouraging in certain summer merchandise. The steel business is feeling a seasonal depression of little magnitude that may change for the better over night. The railroads have suffered but little from this retrenchment.

An entirely different aspect of business conditions is afforded by an examination into financial and retail records. The federal reserve announces an appreciable improvement in bank clearings over last year and reserve favorable reports concerning the retail trade. Bank clearings also substantiate assurance of a healthy improvement in the financial status in agricultural centers.

Whether one takes the hysterical or the level-headed view of business conditions, it cannot be overlooked by the most pessimistic that the building season is only beginning, that the harvest season is approaching with prospects of good crops and fair prices and that the nation's industries have begun the production of merchandise to meet fall and winter demands. Another sign of prosperity is the demand of agriculture for more labor at a material increase in wages, both of which are being met.

If there is any unemployment it is restricted to localities and is not so critical that it can not be absorbed by shortages elsewhere. Rumors of panic are usually prevalent in the United States in the fall and winter and are least frequent in the spring. Why such rumors should be afloat this spring, when conditions are so generally favorable, will remain a mystery to those intimate with actual conditions.

COCOS ISLAND TREASURE HUNT FAILS TO FIND THE HIDDEN GOLD

Vancouver, B. C.—Reports received here indicate that the efforts of the little steamer Ganner, which sailed from Vancouver last winter for Cocos Island in the Indian Ocean in search of chests of gold supposed to have been hidden in that vicinity by revolutionaries many years ago, have been unsuccessful.

The expedition carried all necessary working implements, including a metal detector, an invention of a Vancouver man. The detector was truthful in pointing to metal, great masses of which were uncovered. But it was the debris of some previous treasure-hunting expedition, iron shovels, tin canse, wheelbarrows, pick-axes and so fourth.

The search was pressed until supplies ran low, forcing the fortune-hunters to sail for Vancouver. They are expected here late in May.

TRIBESMAN'S REVERENCE SAVES BONES OF THE HAWAIIAN CHIEFTAIN

Honolulu.—The wheels of progress were halted here recently while enforced homage was paid by workmen to the memory of an all but forgotten chieftain of Hawaii, and the desecration of his ashes was rendered impossible.

In the path of a dredger which has been constructing a drainage canal there stood a house inhabited by an old Hawaiian and his wife. They were warned to vacate as the dredger approached their small holding.

They refused to leave. After several days of argument it was found that their refusal was based upon the fact that their house was on an old burial ground and that the bones of a great chief and a dozen of his relatives were underground.

BANDITRY BLOSSOMS IN MANCHURIA WITH ADVENT OF SUMMER

Harbin, Manchuria.—The notorious bandits of Manchuria, called in Chinese "Hunhuts" or Red Beards, have begun to reappear with the advent of warm weather. Their favorite field of operations is along the 900-mile line of the Chinese Eastern railway, among the prosperous settlements populated by Russian railway employees and Chinese farmers.

The cold of the winter serves to keep these bandits more or less quiescent, maintaining themselves as best they can on booty acquired during the summer season. Nevertheless, they do not find it necessary to hide in the mountains or forests during their period of inactivity. On the contrary they mingle freely in the life of the towns as peaceable citizens, sometimes occupying themselves with some petty trade, or begging in the streets.

Occasionally one chance to be recognized, in which case punishment is swift and sure at the hands of an executioner who wields a two-handed sword, or in a locality dominated by the military, before a firing squad. In either case the occasion is public.

The severity of their punishment when caught suggests the fear with which the populace regards the bandits, and there is plenty of reason for this. In the summer they actually terrorize the railway towns, levy taxes on the lumber concessionaires, fight battles with the troops, and are too often successful, and interrupt navigation on the rivers. They operate in well armed disciplined bands and thus far opposition to them has met with doubtful success. Railway guards exist but are poorly armed and poorly organized, so that railway employees living along the line are resigning their posts and moving to places of safety.

Work in the lumber concessions becomes intermittent in the summer because of frequent attacks, capture of employees, heavy taxes and forest fires of suspected origin. Steamers and junks on the rivers are occasionally fired at, boarded and plundered.

No remedy is as yet suggested. Troops have been used against the bandits but never in sufficient

numbers to accomplish anything, and in the opinion of observers they never will be exterminated by force of arms so long as present political conditions continue.

American Medical Men to Hold Annual Session

Chicago.—The forward strides of the science of medicine in the last year will be surveyed by thousands of American physicians who will attend the annual session of the American Medical Association, to be held on the Municipal Pier the week of June 2.

Various state and national health associations will have statistical and public health displays. The federal government will be represented in three exhibits, given by the departments of agriculture, interior, and public health.

The official scientific meetings will be divided into 16 sections covering all of the medical specialties. In the section on medicine, special attention is to be paid to progress in the treatment of diabetes with insulin, and to the treatment of heart disease and closely related conditions. In the section on surgery, virtually every field of operation on the human body will be discussed. Obstetricians, eye, nose and throat specialists and authorities on the disease of children will reflect their progress in addresses and clinics.

The sections on the use of drugs and on preventive and industrial medicine will confine one meeting to discussions on modern methods of resuscitation after gas poisoning and electric shock, and also on the prevention of lead poisoning in modern industries.

Two other sessions will be concerned with modern anesthesia, including papers on painless childbirth and the use of ethylene. Another special meeting will be devoted to the more advanced aspects of the use of the X-ray. The program includes about three hundred papers. Many distinguished medical men of foreign countries will be present and each will bring an important record of medical achievement.

FIVE MEN KILLED DAILY. AVERAGE IN BRITISH MINES

London.—Herbert Smith, president of the Miners Federation, gave some statistics regarding fatalities in the coal mines of Britain, little known to the average person, in his opening speech at the miners' wages inquiry.

In 1923, he said, 212,256 men were disabled for more than seven days, and in addition 1,297 lives were lost. These figures mean that every working day more than five persons were killed. Every 215,000 tons of coal raised was stained with

one man's blood. Every working day 850 men were injured.

"If the victims of accidents in the mines," Mr. Smith continued, "were marshalled in one procession, four men in a rank and each rank one and a half yards apart, they would have a procession of 45 miles. Every 15 yards of that tragic march they would have an ambulance containing a man who was seriously injured and every 61 yards a hearse. This is part of the miner's wages, part of the price he pays in the struggle with natural forces that people may have coal and he and his family

A First Aid Instructor in high schools industrial plants, or boys and girls scouts groups.

The institute is to be conducted at cost, the faculty serving without remuneration. Registration fee is \$5 and will cover all incidental expenses. Board and lodging is \$15 which will be collected on arrival at camp and which will include all meals. There is no other expense attached to the institute excepting nominal fees for First Aid Text

BOOK, Advanced First Aid Medal, Life Saving insignia such as emblem and demallion.

The registration fee must accompany the application, which is to be sent Southern Division, Life Saving and First Aid Service, by June 1st, at latest for consideration.

A list of necessary supplies will be furnished on application to the Secretary of the Red Cross, Greenville.

It is hoped that not a few will be in a position to take advantage of this opportunity and any person who will guarantee to assist in the instruction of First Aid in the schools of Pitt County next year, and who will

endeavor to create an interest in life saving, may have a part or whole of their expenses paid by the local Chapter. This is considered a legitimate expenditure of Chapter funds and any person wishing to take advantage of this offer will please get in touch with the Secretary of the Pitt County Chapter of the Red Cross and the matter can be taken up with the executive board.

Life Saving and First Aid are important phases of Red Cross work and it is hoped that more activity along that line will be the program of Pitt County in the future.

Women Campaign to Save Fur Producing Animals, Report

New York.—A campaign to restrict the power of Dame Fashion, who for "mere decoration compels the extermination of whole species of fur-bearing animals," was launched tonight by the American Blue Cross Society with headquarters at Springfield, Mass., and the New York Women's League for Animals.

Underskirts of monkey fur, fans of ermine tails and lace, the paradox which when closed appears to be a bunch of folded ermine with an ornament of tortoise shell that represents the kitten's nose, are listed by the societies as bizarre fads which are causing needless destruction and cruelty.

The Blue Cross campaign against the summer fur craze a year ago was effective. Miss Maud Phillips of Springfield, president of the society, said, but the fashion of wearing furs for mere decoration has increased "that fur is being cut and handled as if it were fabric and not the God-given skin of an animal."

NoVELTIES like the ermine cape, described as having a "wide rippling circular flounce that begins at the neckline and runs all the way around a train-like back," or white fox fur collars to set off organdy are denounced as wholly unnecessary fads.

The societies urge nation-wide participation in the campaign by clubs and associations and legislation prohibiting the setting of traps except during a short season when fur is at its best.

Among the officers of both organizations which are taking an active interest in the drive are Mrs. Edith Wharton, Mrs. Lewis Gouveneur Morris, Mrs. Frederick W. Vanderbilt, Mrs. Harry G. Fisk and Mrs. M. Orme Wilson.

FOUR FORMOSAN GIRLS SEEK DEATH SUICIDE PACT

Taipei, Formosa.—A suicide pact among four young girls of one of the aboriginal Formosan tribes in the interior of this island, resulting in the death of two of the covenanters has brought to light an invasion of modern ideas even into that fastness of savage life.

The four girls, between 15 and 18 years old, all had had modern education in schools established by the Japanese. They had heard something about the right of women to decide for themselves in regard to marriage, an entirely new idea in the community in which they were reared. When the parents of one tried to force her into an unwelcome marriage the four agreed to die together. They tried hanging. Two succeeded, but the trees selected by the others broke under their weight and they lived.

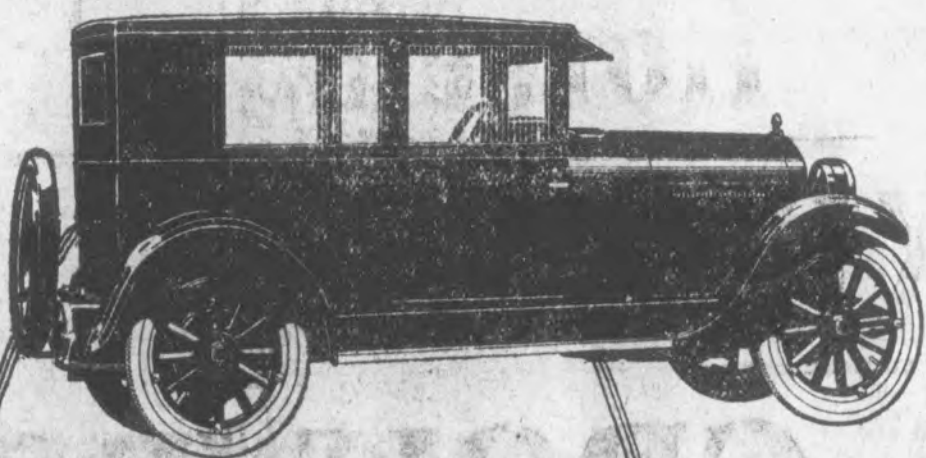

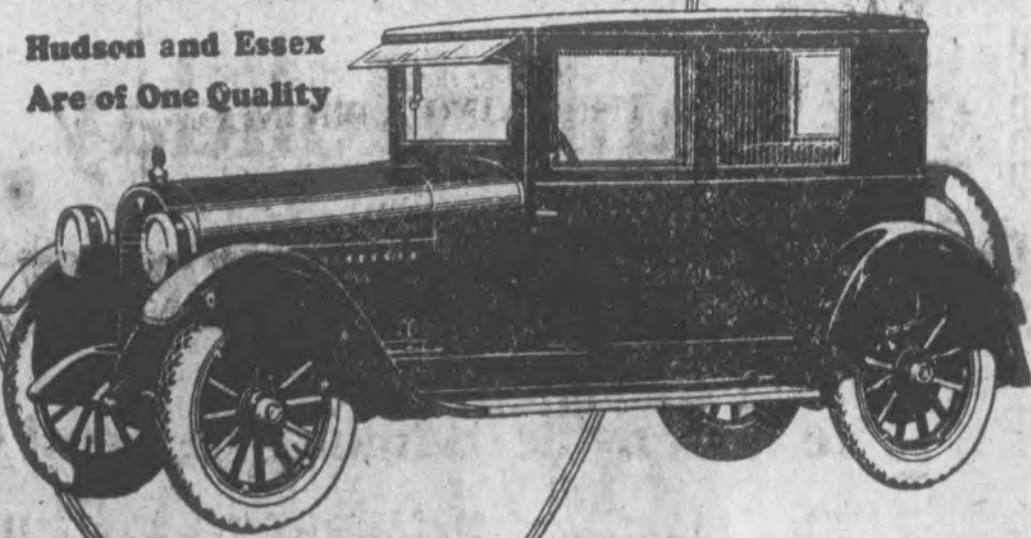

Exports from Galveston to Europe today 3,000 other ports to hear from against 4,000 from all ports this date last year.

Robertstown, Texas, Heavy rains this section this morning.

Two inches rain, not much rain this section.

Crops getting in bad condition. Smeton, Texas, Heavy rain this morning. Grass and Weevils eating cotton. Cotton will make too large a stalk. Navasota, Texas—Crop out look very poor not improving, 75 percent late. Grasshopper very bad. Stands poor to fair. Cultivation not good. Outlook discouraging acreage unchanged. Condition about 62. Crop 4 weeks late.

New Orleans, La., May 29.—Although cables were easier than due and notwithstanding liquidation by longs having continued today, market did more than hold its own because of the continuance of unsettled weather inland and prospects for more rain in nearly all sections of the cotton region and lower temperatures for the northern portion of the belt.

Chances are that a government crop condition report next Monday or about 67 is discounted making it likely for market to decline in event of the bureau being 68 or higher, perhaps advance in event of the condition being 66 or lower. Returns will compare with 71 last year and the 10 year average of 72.8.

The government report will be released at 11 a. m. standard eastern time or at 10 a. m. New Orleans and in addition to reporting on the condition of the crop will issue a revised report on last year's acreage, planted and picked.

Ordinary initial crop reports of the season are not looked upon as important since good weather in June would probably cause much improvement in the outlook for the growing crop but the strong statistical position of cotton in the south and elsewhere makes manipulation possible of the July option.

The crop is generally reported backward especially in the early producing sections of southwest Texas and the further rains of late in the Rio Grande section will tend to delay growth and maturity of the plant in that usually early district. Meanwhile exports from the United States continue free, Friday 47,000 against 31,000 last year, thus far this season 5,187,000 against 4,297,000 and prospects are that end of month clearances this week will be comparatively large as there is on shipboard at Galveston and New Orleans today 50,000 bales against 31,000 one year ago and there is an additional 7,000 aboard ship at Houston.

Spinners taking for week tomorrow will likely be less than last year's 197,000 since they were only 176,000 last week but week end figures are not likely to exert much influence on values because of all interest at moment being centered in next Monday's government crop report.

these cardinal points, the treaty also wound up many other matters of controversy between the two nations. The treaty was hailed as the "Entente Cordiale," or the vehicle by which France and England were brought together into close political alliance. Hardly less important to Europe was the fact that Russia came indirectly into the agreement through her previously existing alliance with France, hence King Edward's original purpose of uniting the three countries through such a treaty was accomplished.

M. Cambon negotiated and signed the final draft after DeLasse and Lansdowne had agreed upon the essential terms. While its importance was not underestimated even

at that time, there were perhaps none who foresaw the tremendous effect the Entente Cordiale would have ten years later, when the world war swept over Europe.

M. Cambon came prominently to the front in 1914, and played an important part in frustrating the efforts of Germany to separate France and Great Britain on the eve of the great struggle. He resigned his post in November, 1920.
