Japanese Stage Demonstrations Of Bitter Protest

JAP EXCLUSION BRINGS FORTH FIERY PROTEST

TOKIO, June 5.—25,000 persons heard fiery speeches and bitter resolutions of protest, resulting from the barring of Japanese from the United States under the recently enacted immigration bill, at meetings held here tonight.

HIGH POINT MAN IS KILLED LAST NIGHT

Police Believe Robbery Was Motive Behind Death of Amos Kearns

High Point, June 5.—The finding of a revolver 25 feet from the spot where the body of Amos V. Kearns, 24, of this city and Philadelphia, was found last night, caused police today to modify their theories that the man was murdered.

Chiefs of the department this morning expressed the opinion that Kearns had committed suicide, although the coroner last night stated that his examination indicated that death was probably not self-inflicted. This report last night together with the fact that the revolver was missing convinced the police that Kearns had been murdered.

It was stated that the young man's health had not been good and since the finding of the revolver his parents now believe with the police that their son killed himself.

High Point, June 5.—Discovery of Amos V. Kearns, 24, dead with a bullet wound through his heart near a local suburb settlement late last night set the police to close study of meagre clues as to the identity of the persons who fired the shot. Officers are confident that the case is one of murder.

Kearns parents reside here. The young man had been in the railway service with headquarters in Philadelphia for four years. He came home for a visit beginning May 14, his parents said.

When informed of the finding of their son's body, the parents said, he had some money and that he had cashed one or more checks for considerable amounts recently. They share the belief of police that the young man was slain with robbery as the motive.

A few days ago Kearns told his mother that he was considering purchasing a home here. Yesterday, his mother told the police, a short fat man called at the residence between one and two o'clock and asked for Amos Kearns. He left a message for Kearns to come to the house that he had purchased. So far as was known, the parent's said, he had not purchased a house.

The body was found shortly before midnight by frog hunters but was not moved until later in the night when the coroner from Greensboro had been summoned. Identification was made during the inquest. The young man's watch was on his person when he was examined but the considerable sum of money he was supposed to carry was not found.

MEMORIAL SERVICES FEATURE SESSIONS OF VETERANS TODAY

Annual Parade Tomorrow; M. R. Patterson Delivers Address

M. R. Patterson's Address.
Memphis, Tenn., June 5.—Memorial services under the direction of J. W. Beacham, Chaplain General of the United Confederate Veterans, and Mrs. A. McD. Wilson, President General of the Confederate Southern Memorial Association. Together with the business sessions for election of officers, selection of the 1925 reunion city and other business made up a busy day for the veterans and kindred organizations of the Confederate Veterans and Memorial Associations meeting in annual session here.

Today's session will clear the way for the annual parade of the veterans which will bring the reunion to a close tomorrow.

"It was southern born man, an American President, who pledged for the world war, success all the rich accumulations of our country's strength of men, money and led it to victory. Woodrow Wilson was born to die. When the war clouds rolled over the beleaguered earth in sulphurous and blackest dun, he was the beacon light on a hill to which the stricken nations turned like storm tossed mariners, and a thousand years hence his name will shine, and his spirit will walk the earth in glory and in light" said former Governor Malcolm R. Patterson, of Tennessee, speaking today, before the reunion of the United Confederate Veterans.

The tenor of Mr. Patterson's address was a thanksgiving that he is a southerner and of praise for the Southern soldier of the civil war whom he characterized as "man for man, the bravest and most unselfish soldier who ever marched to the front of battle."

"I know of no better reason he said why I should be selected for this address than that I am the son of a Confederate soldier and a Confederate mother, who cherished his lineage as a possession far above the distinction of inherited wealth and a richer jewel than any other earthly honor."

Honage to the women of the Confederacy was paid feelingly by Governor Patterson in giving them credit for the inspiration under which the Southern soldier fought.

"What rare and splendid women lived in those wonderful days that are passed," he said. "Probably there never was produced a finer type of womanhood than the Old South nourished and protected before the civil war. It was an era of courtesy and good breeding and virtue and Christian character. It was a time when knighthood was in flower and chivalry ruled the day, and yet when the test came, the time when souls were tried in the fiery furnace, these women who were protected, on whom even the winds of heaven were not allowed to blow too roughly, became more than Spartan in faith and courage. No wonder the Southern soldier was willing to fight and die with such an inspiration. I know how useless it is to inveigh against change or hope to stay the endless processes of time, but all this is not enough to deprive me of the wish that we had more than memories left of the individuality, the courage and the high-mindedness of the Old South, and beyond all else that more of the womanly dignity, the reserve and modesty of the Southern maid and matron had survived to this day and generation."

The part played by Southern men in the formation of the Republic was graphically portrayed by the speaker.

PROHIBITIONISTS OPEN NATIONAL CONVENTION

Casting Ballot for Either Republican or Democratic Party "Is Throwing Your Vote Away" Speaker Declares

Columbus, Ohio, June 5.—When the national convention of the Prohibition Party was called to order at 10:20 this morning, Dr. James Gibbert Mason, of New Jersey, in his opening prayer, asked divine guidance in "this crisis of our nation and party when the wicked was strong and corruption prevails in high places."

Law will continue to be flouted "so long as the people continue to cast their votes for liquor-controlled parties," and as the last two administrations have handled prohibition and "were found wanting," election of the prohibition ticket, "the only one which has ever stood for law and order is necessary to the extinction of the liquor traffic," H. P. Faris of Clinton, Mo., temporary chairman, asserted in the keynote address.

Casting a ballot for either the Republican or Democratic party "was throwing your vote away," Mr. Faris admonished those who desired a sincere enforcement of the 18th amendment. For once let us quit voting our prejudices; let us carry our religion with us and put it into the ballot box. The moral and political challenge of the present hour is the need of God and righteousness in the field of politics.

Special Officer Sent To Arrest Prisoner Escaped Chain Gang

Asheville, June 5.—A special deputy officer has been sent to Columbia, South Carolina, by the sheriff of Buncombe County to arrest and bring to this city W. F. Barnes, who escaped from the county chain gang several weeks ago and who was apprehended and taken to the jail in Columbia several days ago and is now being held for officers of this county.

Flavoring Extract Said to Be Cause of Salesman's Death

Fayetteville, June 5.—J. W. Young travelling salesman, found dead in his room in a local hotel here at 7 o'clock this morning, died as a result of acute dilation of the heart. According to the coroner's report, Young's death was due to excessive drinking of a flavoring extract.

Young had been registered at the hotel since May 29. His family is said to live in Ohio. His body was shipped to Greensboro this morning.

STATE BANKERS IN ANNUAL MEET IN ASHEVILLE

McRay and Lee Deliver Addresses On Water Power and Agricultural Situation

W. S. Lee Delivers Address.
Asheville, June 5.—The agricultural situation in the state is the chief problem at present and a solution must be found and worked out satisfactorily before progress comes in full measure. Hugh McRay, Wilmington, told members of the North Carolina Bankers Association this morning in annual convention here.

As a solution to the present agricultural condition McRay advocated abolishment of the tenant system and the establishment of small farms of 20 acres or thereabouts with the owner working the land, intensive cultivation, diversification of crops and more attention from big business to the needs of the farmer.

State of North Carolina still has undeveloped more than one million horsepower of waterpower which is equal to 8 million mechanical horsepower, W. S. Lee, Charlotte, and chief engineer of the Southern Power Company, told the North Carolina Bankers' Association at the annual convention here, today. Most of this power is located in the western part of the state, he said, and explained that it could be easily sent to all parts of the state by modern transmission. One dollar invested in hydro-electric power development is equal to six dollars invested in the industries that use the power, the speaker stated. He added that it was necessary for \$10,000,000 to be invested annually in the development of hydro-electric power so that it could keep pace with the growth of the state.

Mr. Lee asserted that if the water of the state was developed as it should be that the working power of North Carolina's population of 2,500,000 could be more than doubled. The history of the growth of mechanical man-power and horse-power was outlined by the speaker, from the single man-power many ages ago to the present time when the modern engine and turbines are used to produce enormous quantities of power all over the world.

It was pointed out by the speaker that the United States in the year 1920 used electrical energy amounting to more 41,000,000,000 kilowatt hours more than any other country in the world. The nearest competitor being Germany, with used power amounting to 8,600,000,000 kilowatt hours.

"It is our desire," the chief engineer declared, "that America be supreme in industrial development; and it is also our desire that American labor shall have ample work and ample remuneration for their work. America today has seven and one half to eight horse-power developed for every member of its population."

ROCKY MOUNT MAN COMMITS SUICIDE

Textile Worker Attacks Son-in-Law and Then Shoots Himself

Rocky Mount, June 5.—After attacking Charlie Price, who married his step daughter two days ago, which marriage he is alleged to have vigorously opposed, and after slashing him about the arms and shoulders, Emmett Koonce, 37, textile worker, who moved to this city from Kinston, killed himself on the sidewalk near his home last night by blowing off one side of his face with a shot gun, according to police who investigated the affair.

The attack upon Price, the police said, occurred at the home of Koonce where the couple had been invited by the step father of the bride who advised them that he was not mad that he had something to give them. Upon arrival of the couple at the house, Koonce is alleged to have pounced upon Price with a knife. The couple fled from the house and the father, according to police, secured a shot gun and pursued them. They took refuge in a nearby house and it was on the sidewalk outside this structure that Koonce killed himself.

Price was taken to a hospital but was dismissed after his wounds had been dressed.

Negotiation of Leases to Sinclair and Doheny Described as Flagrant Disregard of Law; Doheny and Roosevelt Exonerated by Report

Washington, June 5.—Flagrant disregard of law in connection with negotiation of the Sinclair and Doheny oil reserve leases was charged in the report to the Senate today prepared for the oil committee by its prosecutor, Senator Walsh, Democrat, Montana.

The executive order by which President Harding transferred the naval oil reserves from the Navy to Interior Department was held in the report to have been illegal. The manner in which the leases were negotiated secretly by former Secretary Fall were described as "in disregard of the statutes."

The leases themselves were declared indefensible and based upon policies which Congress alone has authority to determine.

Fall's acceptance of the \$100,000 from Doheny was characterized as in the last degree reprehensible although no opinion was expressed as to whether the payment was in fact a loan. Shipment by Harry F. Sinclair a consignment of blooded cattle to Fall's New Mexico ranch and Sinclair's subsequent employment of Fall after he left the Cabinet were cited without comment. Likewise, without comment, the report related how Sinclair had expended \$1,000,000 to clear Teapot Dome of conflicting claims.

Former Secretary Denby, of the Navy Department, and Assistant Secretary Roosevelt were exonerated "from any part whatever in the negotiations leading up to the leases."

The report declared that despite diligent inquiry the committee found no facts of sufficient importance to report in support of rumors that public officials had speculated in stocks including the Sinclair and Doheny companies.

Similarly the report said evidence failed to establish the existence of any conspiracy between oil operatives and others in the Republican National Convention of 1920 for exploitation of public resources.

Only a passing reference was made concerning statements by which it was sought to connect Edward B. McLean with \$100,000 payment to Fall and no opinion on that subject was expressed.

COOLIDGE RECOMMENDS REPEAL OF LAW GRANTING LEASES OF PUBLIC LANDS

Washington, June 5.—President Coolidge has recommended the repeal of the law under which the Secretary of Interior is authorized to grant certain persons and corporations permits to explore or lease certain lands in the Red River, Oklahoma, section.

CLUB WOMAN WILL SEEK NEW ARMS CONFERENCE

Los Angeles, June 5.—Mrs. Thos. G. Winter, president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, in biennial session here, has announced that she will ask the convention to petition President Coolidge to call a new international conference of world forces to further limit armaments.

LIBERALS AT WORK FOR FREEDOM OF SOVIET PRISONERS

Berlin, June 4.—Maria Spiridonova was saved from the gallows in 1906 by a world-wide protest.

The czar's government did not dare execute the 18-year-old girl in the face of universal protest against the abuse she had suffered at the hands of brutal soldiers, and she was sent to Siberia for life.

With the abdication of the czar Spiridonova returned to Russia to become an effective leader of the peasants. But she soon ran foul of the Bolshevik leaders with whom she tried to work, and now another world-wide movement has been launched to rescue her from Soviet imprisonment and make it possible for her to leave Russia and regain her health in some quiet land.

The International Workers Association is behind the movement to effect the release of Spiridonova and also hundreds of other revolutionists, socialists and workers who are in Soviet prisons and concentration camps. A general appeal has been made to all labor and revolutionary organizations throughout the world to help in the campaign for the release of non-partisan revolutionists held in Russian prisons.

Social revolutionists, anarchists, syndicalists and various other sorts of so-called "leftists" and "reds" are joining the movement and understanding their appeals in terms which denounce the communist regime in Russia as a dictatorship over the proletariat rather than a dictatorship of the proletariat.

Since July 6, 1918, Maria Spiridonova has been in disfavor with the Bolshevik government. When she returned from 11 years of Siberian exile she was welcomed as a tender of the Soviet regime until the ratification of the Brest-Litovsk Treaty, which she denounced as inimical to the interests of the peasants.

With many other Left Social revolutionists she was arrested after the murder of Count Mierbach, the German ambassador, and her life since has been one of constant persecution, according to the organizations which are seeking Maria's release.

MOONSHINE IN IRELAND ALMOST AN OPEN TRADE

Dublin.—The manufacture of pot-teen, or illicit whiskey in the Free State has grown from an occasional adventure into an industry. The loss in revenue is much the least part of the consequent damage. The matter has been the subject of numerous denunciations by the bishops, and many crimes are attributed to the effect of this fiery spirit on young men. But the real extent of the evil has never been so fully set out as in "The Irish Statesman," a weekly journal founded by Sir Horace Plunkett with the subscription of American friends.

A writer in the current issue explains that the industry has baffled the efforts of the government to suppress it. The profits are widely distributed. Masters trading openly as such sell the materials to local shopkeepers who supply the pot-teen makers. Railway companies carry tons of corn into the remotest parts of Connaught and every railway official, says the writer, knows that the consignments are for shopkeepers who supply the pot-teen makers.

"The whole population is aware of this industry, and scarcely one in a hundred will give information regarding the illegal end of it."

The liquor is sold at 75 cents a pint, and is used at wakes and weddings. All night spears have become common in country districts. The licensing laws do not afford the means of dealing adequately with the traffic, and it is suggested that they be strengthened so as to make the mere possession of pot-teen an offense liable to imprisonment.

AIR POSTMAN IN ALASKA RAPIDLY GROWING RICH

Fairbanks, Alaska.—Carl B. Eielson, the postman flying between this city and McGrath, Alaska, a distance of 350 miles, is one of the best paid men in the aerial mail service, according to the local postmaster.

Eielson receives \$2 a mile or about \$200 an hour. The government furnishes the plane and pays for repairs. Eielson purchases the gasoline and oil and provides the field and hangar. He made his first flight in 1917 at Riverside, Cal., while a cadet in the army air service.

Van Cleef Delivers Address 1st National Foreign Trade Confab

Boston, June 4.—The need for an immediate solution of the problem of securing a career for young Americans in the foreign trade field was emphasized, at the Eleventh National Foreign Trade Convention, during the session this afternoon on Education for Foreign Trade, by Eugene Van Cleef, Chairman of the Foreign Trade Division of the College of Commerce and Journalism, of the Ohio State University.

Mr. Van Cleef said: "Either business men of the United States wish the universities to train men in preparation for the foreign field, or they do not."

"Should we offer a single course of 46 months in the general field of foreign trade as merely a cultural course for those training for domestic business, or should we offer a full four-year curriculum, as some of us are now doing, in the belief that the United States is as surely headed for an increasingly active part in foreign trade and policies, as that on the morrow the sun will rise again?"

"Corporations engaged in selling abroad do not give sufficient consideration to the problem of training men to carry on the work. This is mistake. Foreign trade should be in the hands of men who have studied its principles and its technique, and have a proper appreciation of its possibilities. Universities are preparing just such men. They are not being turned out by the wholesale, but they are being selected. The supply of trained students is available. We ask you, do you or do you want these men?"

"It takes a stout heart, good red American blood, nerves that do not flinch, and a spirit that can never be dampened to engage upon such a career. But that describes the men today who are training in the interests of American business. They are no mollycoddles. But they cannot live on promises. It is to your interest to help solve the problems of putting the foreign trade student to work."

Women Closely Watch Weight.
New Castle, Pa.—Women weigh themselves more frequently than

men, the New Castle City council has discovered. Penny weighing machines maintained by the city disclosed this fact when the receipts were counted. Machines located where women use them showed nearly four times as much income as those more available for the use of men.

730 Persons Placed In Employment In State During Week

Raleigh, June 4.—The total number of persons placed in employment during the week ended Saturday, 31, according to the compiled reports of the various sub-offices throughout the state made to Commissioner of Labor and Printing M. L. Shipman who is director of the State-Federal Employment Service, was 730 of which 606 were men and 124 were women. This report shows brought the number of placements by the Service for the month ended on the same day up to 1919 of which 2,393 were men and 526 were women.

The shortage of unskilled labor continues throughout the state though several points report improvement in this class of labor, says the report; however farm labor is still in great demand and it a number places road and other construction work takes any unskilled labor that might be persuaded to go to the farm. A few places report a surplus of skilled labor such as carpenters and brick masons.

Asheville is reported as being flooded with domestic and hotel workers as well having a surplus of clerical workers.

What? Salem, Charlotte, Wilmington report a surplus of clerical forces.

Greensboro reports that the textile situation is not good and a surplus of trade mechanics and an extra large surplus of clerical workers and salespeople, due, it is said, to the closing of school.

Registrations for the week just ended total 911 of which 682 were for men and 229 were for women while there were request for 830 men and women.

Placements for the week were classified as follows: Unskilled 514, skilled 71; clerical and professional 44; industrial 8; and domestic 93.

GAME WARDENS KEEP GOING WITH THE MERCURY AT 78 BELOW

Anchorage, Alaska.—Frank Dufresne, fur warden at Nome, and his trail assistant, Fay Delceze, a noted northern dog musher, encountered some of the coldest weather known in the territory during a trip last winter to the north of the Arctic Circle.

Leaving Nome on the 1,474-mile journey, the two first traveled to Safety, then to Bluff, across Norton Sound to the reindeer station; thence to Unalakleet and Kaltag, up the Yukon River to Nulato and on to Koyukuk. From Koyukuk they followed the military telegraph line and the Yukon River to Louden, Ruby, Kokrine, Birch and Fort Gibbon. They next struck north to Alaknuk, swinging west in a circle to Shungnak and down the Kobuk River to Noorvik, Kotzebue, Keewalik, Candie and overland to Norton Sound and Nome.

For ten days at one stretch the mercury registered from 62 to 78 degrees below zero, according to Dufresne.

"An interesting fact," said Dufresne, "is that when the thermometer registers 60 degrees below or colder animal life ceases to move and burrows into the snow, remaining there until the weather warms up."

CHARTS SHOW FISHERMEN WHERE TO GET FULL NETS

Los Angeles.—New bathymetric charts, compiled by the hydrographic office of the United States navy, show fishermen how to locate fishing banks according to C. S. Bauder, deputy fish and game commissioner, who says this system has revolutionized the industry.

These charts accounts for the big catches now being made off the southern California coast, in Mr. Bauder's opinion.

From San Francisco to Point Descanso, below San Diego, destroyers charted the ocean bottom, extending 100 miles out from the coast. Approximately 34,000 square miles were mapped.

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"WAIT! YOU MAY LOSE"

The third "careful crossing" campaign conducted by the railroads opened with June and will run until the close of September. By reiteration it is hoped that the peril which lurks about every crossing may be more generally impressed and the accidents be reduced in number. It is noted that in 25 years the population has increased 68 per cent, but the fatal crossing accidents have increased 345 per cent and injuries to persons 625 per cent. In the six years from 1917 to 1922 inclusive there was an average of 1,800 deaths and 4,900 injuries each year from this cause. Eighty-four per cent of the accidents last year involved motor cars.

It is due to the great increase in the automobile traffic that accidents have grown. So many more people using the roads and crossings together with increase in the number of trains augment the possibility of accident. Then failure to "stop, look and listen" completes the setting for an accident.

There are two ways in which the accidents may be reduced. Elimination of crossings would remove the peril, but the stupendous cost estimated at \$19,000,000,000, puts the completion of such a movement far in the future. Elimination is progressing but is slow, necessarily. Caution on the part of those who have occasion to cross a railroad at a grade would remove the major portion of the peril.

Because there is want of caution on the part of a small minority accidents occur. If each person possessed realization of self-interest there would be little need for these safety campaigns. And those who need the warning the worst are the hardest to impress. The new slogan "Wait! You May Lose" involves an important truth and should be self-enforcing, but there are those who will continue on the theory that the warning is for others. It is a difficult matter to impress the need for caution on those who manifest no personal interest in it. That is why these campaigns appear to be so meagerly fruitful for results.

KREISLER'S PEACE PLAN

Fritz Kreisler, world-famous violinist, has appealed to the world from mid-ocean to buy and destroy the formula for the "death ray," for which its inventor claims terrifying powers of death and destruction. The Austrian violinist implores the inventor and the public to make impossible the employment in war of any such fiendish instrument as the "death ray."

Doubly significant is the appeal of Kreisler because of his Austrian nativity. Germany and her Austrian ally have been blamed for the world war. The conversion of Austria to peace would be a notable advance toward perpetual world peace and Kreisler has often spoken for and from his people.

Much mystery still surrounds the formula for the "death ray" and as yet the world has been offered no proof of the powers claimed for it. Whether this demoniac ray will strike death to all that comes within its light is not as vitally important to humanity as its application. The discovery and its discoverer will be acclaimed boons to civilization if the ray is employed in easing the burden of mankind, but civilization should never forgive the inventor of the "death ray" if it is found that he has sold his formula to those bent on human destruction.

A ray with the supernatural powers claimed for the "death ray" would be of inestimable value in agricultural powers claimed for the extermination of insects and for other air fumigation purposes. Scientific research should not be retarded by the threat of war. Humanity can prevent war just as it can prevent the production of a "death ray" if it so saw fit. Peace and war have ever been rival suitors for the hand of science. Let the people bind peace and science in eternal wedlock, for war once divorced from science will not endure.

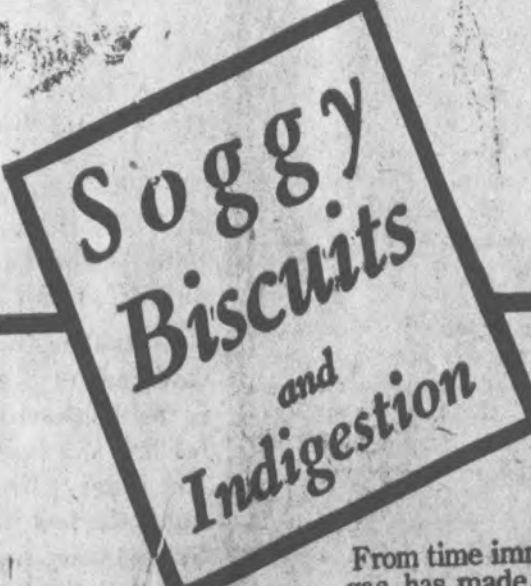

The Daily Cotton Better.
New Orleans, La., June 5.—Market experienced a temporary rally this morning owing prospects for less favorable weather in the cotton region probably showers in nearly all sections of the belt but heavy realizing — and some short selling occasioned a sharp decline there decline thereafter.

The late weakness was attributed to liquidation in July which described the whole list.

Cables were unfavorable affected by more favorable crop accounts from the south but Liverpool reported spinners calling heavily.

There is not much heard as was the case with May of a possible squeeze in July notwithstanding stocks being small and the new crop southwest Texas reported late.

In event of there being no attempt to squeeze July the course of values will be governed by legitimate conditions such as trade demand and from the crop.

Southwest Texas reports no forward business of consequence for July shipments due mainly to shipper being indisposed to offer because of lateness of the crop in that sections as receipts of new crop cotton are expected to be very light. On the other hand owing to the premium of July over Oct, the trade may refrain from buying new crop cotton that is the actual export for August and future shipments.

Meanwhile the trade will have to get along with the remnant of the old crop, the supply of which is hearing exhaustion especially in the interior and the long purchases of new crop cotton are deferred, the greater will the demand likely be eventually.

Instead of generally fair warm weather continuing inland which is needed to permit favorable progress for growing crop showery weather is predicted for nearly all sections of the cotton region.

Compared with last year exports from the United States since Friday, Total 48,000 bales against 39,000 since August first 5,241,000 against 4,284,000 leaving stock at all United States ports today 359,000 bales against 364,000 one year ago.

Commenting this week the Liverpool cotton exchange will be closed on closed Saturday's during the summer.

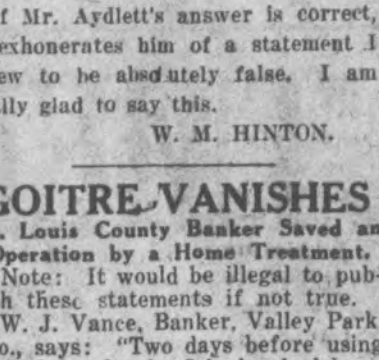
