POSTAL SALARIES INCREASE VETOED

Largest Vote In History Of State Will Be Polled Today

Coolidge Returns Postal Increase Bill Unsigned

WASHINGTON, June 7.—The postal salaries increase bill was vetoed by President Coolidge today with a declaration that government extravagance must stop.

The bill was returned to the Senate with a message objecting to the legislation because it made no provision for raising the approximately \$68,000,000 from postal revenues.

Approval was given by the President to the provision added to the bill to regulate campaign expenditures and a statement was made that he would approve that section of the measure if it stood alone.

GOV. LOCKE CRAIG SLOWLY SINKING

Members Of Former Governor's Family Called to Bedside

Asheville, June 7.—Members of the family of former Governor Locke Craig have been called to the Craig home on Swannanoah River as the Governor's condition became more critical today.

During the past few days the former governor has been declining members of the family stated. Mr. Craig for the past year has made a heroic struggle for his life. He is reported to be sinking today but is still conscious.

Gallert Dies While Out On Campaign

Rutherfordton, June 7.—Ex-Senator Solomon Gallert died suddenly six miles east of here at 11 o'clock today. He was out campaigning when his coupe stuck in a mud hole and he over-exerted himself. He called a neighbor to help him and died soon after the neighbor arrived. He has complained of not feeling well for a week or more but has been making a strenuous campaign as he was candidate for the legislature and would have been voted on in tomorrow's primary had he lived. His chances for election were good. He had two opponents.

Mr. Gallert came to this county 35 years ago and had made good. He was 57 years old. He was a member of the legislature about 1898 and 1906-08, and a member of the State senate 1920-22 and was on Governor Glenn's staff.

He was county attorney and was formerly a member of the State Democratic Executive Committee. He was active in the practice and in politics. He was a Junior, Mason, K. of P., and a Shriner. He was a native of Waterville, Maine, and a college graduate.

He had never married. His brother in New York City was notified of his death and he will arrive here tomorrow to arrange for the funeral.

Mr. Gallert was one of the best known citizens of Rutherford county. He has always been active in public life and his place will be hard to fill.

The cabinet was completed January 6. Each member wrote an individual resignation which the Premier took with him when he motored from the cabinet meeting to the Imperial Palace.

High Point, June 7.—Reward of \$900 has been offered for the arrest and conviction of the murderer of Amos Kearns, High Point man, whose body was found in the outskirts of the city Wednesday night.

Abandoning the suicide theory the police are today continuing their investigation into the death of young Kearns.

Estimates of the dead vary from 8 to 15 persons but it was stated today that a re-check of the 41 men working in the colliery would be necessary to determine the exact number of fatalities.

PROMINENT GREENE COUNTY MAN DIES

W. A. Darden, Sr., Dies After Week's Illness; Interment Takes Place Tomorrow

Mr. W. A. Darden, Sr., 70, died at 2 o'clock this morning at his home in Greene county after a week's illness from erysipelas. Funeral services will be conducted from his late home tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock, interment following in the family burying ground.

Mr. Darden was one of Greene county's most prominent and influential citizens. He was well known throughout the state being very popular with a large number of friends. He was a prosperous planter and held in high esteem in business and religious circles. Mr. Darden was always interested in those things which helped towards the improvement of his state and county and devoted his efforts to every worthy cause. He was never happier than when helping those less fortunate than himself. He will be missed not only by the people of his community but by friends throughout the state. The deceased is survived by his widow who was Miss Olivia Carr, two sons, William A. Darden, Jr., of Greenville, and Fred Darden; two stepsons, Robert and John Coward, of Ayden.

WOMEN CONVICT ONE OF SEX FOR MURDER

London, June 6.—A coroner's jury composed entirely of women, today returned a verdict of murder against a woman who had entered a suicide pact with a man and who had attempted to carry out the pact by inhaling illuminating gas in company with him. The man died but the woman recovered and was brought to trial.

Japanese Stage Anti-American Demonstration

TOKIO, June 7.—Ruffians broke up the Saturday night dance at the Imperial Hotel tonight which was attended by many members of the foreign community, with demonstrations opposing the exclusion clause of the new American immigration law.

Entering when the dance was at its height 30 ronin (political ruffians) took possession of the dance floor, made a number of bitter and profane speeches and then danced about the floor with naked swords drawn. Two American women fainted. Police made no move to prevent the demonstrations, although it was stated from reliable sources that they had known of the plans for the demonstration since 3 o'clock this afternoon.

It was learned from authoritative Japanese sources, those friendly with the Americans, that tonight's demonstration was only a part of a larger affair planned with the intention to evict all Americans from the country.

Vernacular papers had apparently been informed of the demonstration in advance and had flash light photographers stationed at advantageous places to snap pictures of the affair.

The demonstration brought the Anti-American feeling closer to the Americans than it has ever come before.

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Record Vote Is Expected In The Primary Today

Much Interest Prevails in Outcome of Today's State-Wide Primaries; Voters Express Preference for Governor and Other State Offices; Pitt County to Elect Sheriff, Judge and Other Officers; Congressional Ticket Center of Activity

State Election.

Raleigh, June 7.—With generally fair weather prevailing throughout the state members of the Democratic party in North Carolina today at the 1,729 polling places designated their preference for candidates for the general election in November.

There are candidates for Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Commissioner of Agriculture, Commissioner of Labor and Printing, Attorney General, Insurance Commissioner and Congress from the First and Ninth Congressional Districts, other candidates having been unopposed and nomination certified.

Although interest is keen in all contests the battle between A. W. McLean, Lumberton and Josiah W. Bailey, Raleigh, for nomination for governor held the center of the stage. Active campaigns have been waged by both candidates and it is expected that the fair weather, making road travel possible, will result in a large rural vote with a total in the state being the heaviest in history.

The morning began with rain in Wilmington and New Bern. Only one point in the state, Salisbury, reported threats of rain where cloudy and sultry weather was reported early this morning.

Polls opened throughout the state at 4:57 a. m. and will close at 7:28 p. m.

Local interest in Wake county though high in the race for governor, centered somewhat in the legislative nominees there being 10 candidates seeking to represent Wake county in the House of Representatives.

The sudden death of former Senator Gallert, of Rutherfordton, yesterday removed from the contest one of the leading men in western North Carolina.

Both Bailey and McLean factions claimed that estimates at noon showed their favorite to be in the lead.

A dispatch at noon from Lumberton from McLean's publicity agent placed his majority at 6,000 in Roberson county and at least 2,000 in New Hanover. McLean lives in Roberson where yesterday he made a complete swing of the county.

The dispatch said that heavy vote was reported in the Seventh, Eighth, Ninth and Tenth Congressional districts and McLean managers in those districts have wired optimistic reports that the vote at noon portends a tremendous McLean majority. The dispatch also claims the Fifth district and good news from the First, Second, Third and Fourth. McLean men are confident that Bailey will not carry a single Congressional in the state the dispatch said.

At Bailey headquarters in Raleigh it was stated that only a few reports had been received from over the state at noon but that these indicated that Bailey was leading his opponent by a large majority. One report, the statement asserted, was that Bailey was sweeping a large portion of Roberson county, the home of McLean. In Wake county, Bailey's home county, it was stated that in Raleigh the candidate maintained an overwhelming lead in every precinct in Raleigh and that in the country districts he was leading by a three to one vote.

County Election.

With the first peep of dawn candidates and their supporters began to gather around the thirteen polling places in Pitt county today and since voting began there has been a continuous procession to and from the polls indicating the largest vote ever cast in the history of Pitt county.

While there is considerable interest in the gubernatorial race, and other state offices chief interest is in the nomination of a Congressman from the First District and in the contest for the offices of sheriff and judge of county court.

In the race for Congress is Lindsey Warren, E. F. Audick, of Mann and E. J. Griffin. Although no definite estimate as to the outcome could be made early this afternoon, those in close touch with the voting expressed opinion that the fight was between Warren and Audick with the vote slightly in favor of the former.

In the gubernatorial race both McLean and Bailey followers are claiming the honors each side however admitting that the race appears to be close.

No estimate in the contest for county judge by L. G. Cooper, James L. Evans, and W. A. Darden has been made but it is generally conceded that there will be a second primary.

In the race for sheriff between Amos C. Jackson, R. E. Corbett and R. L. Jones there is also possibility of a second primary with the Jackson supporters claiming the plurality.

IF BOYS ESCAPE MURDER CHARGE THEY WILL BE TRIED FOR KIDNAPPING

Chicago, June 7.—Should Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb, millionaires' sons, indicted for the kidnapping and murder of Robert Frank, 13 years old son of another Chicago millionaire, escape capital punishment in their trial for murder they will be tried again on the kidnapping indictment according to a statement by Robert E. Crowe, state's attorney, today.

Plans are going forward for two distinct prosecutions.

KILL A CROW OR PAY A FINE IS CONSTANTINOPLE NOBLE ORDINANCE

Constantinople.—To relieve the city and its suburbs of a destructive plague of crows the authorities are issuing free powder and shot, and every male citizen is required to present at least one dead crow to the nearest police station or pay a fine of 125 piastres.

Always present in large numbers this year these crows, or more precisely rooks, have become a pest and have done much damage. They have ravaged the truck gardens around the city and on the Prinkipos Islands, those beautiful resorts in the Sea of Marmora, they have caused a water famine. The water supply of the islands is solely from cisterns and the birds have so fouled the roofs as to make the water unpotable.

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NEW WORLDS FOR OLD

In their efforts to put into the curriculum something vital, educational authorities are turning more and more to the subject of geography. Not merely in the grammar grades do we find it now receiving more attention than it used to get, but even in the high schools and colleges it is being made an attractive feature of the course of study.

But the material which is now being offered in the geography class is not the uninteresting body of facts it was in the days when the chief object of the teacher seemed to be to have her pupils know the length of all the rivers in the world, and the altitude of all the mountain peaks. It is small wonder that the children often wearied of this sort of educational setting-up exercise. Why bother at the age of 12 with "bounding" Utah, and make the cornering of this fact a momentous educational process in the life of the child? Utah will always stay where it is now, and if for any conceivable reason we must know what state is to the east of it, that information is to be had at any time for the mere turning of a few pages.

The geography of today is a more humanized study than was its predecessor. We are coming to see the foreign countries in addition to harboring mountains and rivers and lakes, are filled also with people. These people are busy making things and they want some things that other peoples make. These people who live in the other countries believe things which in some cases are different from things which we believe. They follow customs which seem to us very strange at times. Some of them speak a language which is not like the one we speak.

More and more it is to be this material which is to be used in the study of geography, if some educators who have looked into this question are to have their way. It will bring about, they say, a better understanding among nations; it will make for sympathy and a liberal outlook on the part of the students. The emphasis is to be put on the people and their ways of living and thinking, and on their physical environment, which was once about all there was to the study of geography. And so it will come about in the end that instead of finishing his course in geography in the seventh or eighth grade, the student will continue it through the high school and even in college. For when it is looked at in this light, there is no end to the educational material offered by the study of geography.
