M'LEAN DEFEATS BAILEY FOR GOVERNOR

A. C. Jackson to Continue As Sheriff of Pitt County

McLeans Majority For Governor Is Fifty Thousand

Incomplete Returns From All Over State Indicate Second Primaries for Lieutenant Governor, Commissioner Agriculture, Attorney General, Commissioner Labor and Printing

Raleigh, June 9.—Second primaries will probably be held in North Carolina to decide the Democratic party's nomination for at least three offices.

With slightly more than one third of the 1719 precincts in the state heard from at noon today unofficial figures compiled here indicate second primaries for Attorney General, Commissioner of Agriculture and Commissioner of Labor and Printing with a possibility of the two leading candidates for Lieutenant Governor also holding a run off race.

Raleigh, June 9.—A. W. McLean increased his lead over J. W. Bailey for Democratic nomination for governor as returns trickled in today.

McLean's majority had reached 52,553 on returns tabulated from 1,039 out of the 1719 precincts in the state at two o'clock this afternoon, the vote being McLean 109,893; Bailey 57,340.

Returns from 622 precincts in the state for Commissioner of Agriculture give Graham 39,849; Latham, 30,368; Parker, 12,994.

Returns from 615 precincts out of the state's 1710 for Attorney General give Brummitt 32,061; Nash 22,382; Ross, 29,806.

610 precincts for State Auditor give Durham 48,410; Cook 38,365.

Bailey Concedes Election.
Raleigh, June 9.—J. W. Bailey in a formal statement here today admitted defeat for the Democratic nomination for governor by Angus W. McLean of Lumberton.

In his statement which reviewed his candidacy Mr. Bailey expressed for Mr. McLean and his associates utmost success in the fall election.

He expressed his gratitude to his supporters and announced his continued support of the Democratic cause and that he would vote the full Democratic ticket as he has always done since he became of age.

EXPRESS RATES BE READJUSTED

Washington, June 9.—Express rates throughout the country were ordered readjusted today by the Interstate Commerce Commission which granted authority for a general increase in the eastern zone of approximately eight percent while slight reductions were ordered for the west and south.

INSURGENTS URGE DENOUNCEMENT OF FALL, DAUGHERTY

Statement Says Former Attorney General and Interior Secretary Should Be Forever Barred From Public Office; Special Session of Congress Urged

Cleveland, Ohio, June 9.—Insurgent Republicans acting through the Wisconsin delegation will ask the Republican National Convention to formally condemn the acts of Harry M. Daugherty as Attorney General and Albert B. Fall as Secretary of Interior.

This disclosure is in the official platform for the insurgents made public today by Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., son of the Wisconsin Senator.

The statement says further that Fall and Daugherty should be forever debarred from holding any position of honor and trust as a gift of either the Republican party or any future Republican administration.

The insurgents would also have President Coolidge call an extraordinary session of Congress on Monday, July 7, 1924, for consideration of emergency legislation for relief of agriculture; to provide funds for amending the rate making section of the transportation act looking to relief from the extortionate railroad rates; for reclamation relief legislation extending the time for payment by farmers on government reclamation projects.

SOUTH SEA EXPEDITION PLANS TO FILM TREE-CLIMBING FISH

Chicago—A species of fish which climbs trees and jumps into the air after grasshoppers and bugs is the unsuspecting all-star cast of a prospective movie thriller, which "The South Sea Island Research Company," headed by former Mayor William Hale Thompson, expects to find on Daat Island, north of Australia.

The expedition is scheduled to leave here July 4 for the announced purpose of putting this and other South Sea animals into a feature picture.

Daat Island before the war was owned by Capt. Albert J. Duken, of German birth, who will pilot the 14,000 mile cruise, and whose story was responsible for the company's organization.

The craft to carry the expedition is of the Norwegian lifeboat type, with a 50 h. p. gas engine. The crew will consist of six men. The route will be through the Chicago River to the Mississippi, New Orleans and the Panama Canal to the Pacific Ocean.

Returns Indicate Only One Second Primary On County Ticket; County Gives Majorities to McLean for Governor and Warren for Congress

WARREN CARRIES FIRST DISTRICT BY LARGE MAJORITY

Incomplete Returns Indicate That Lindsay C. Warren, Washington, to Represent District In Congress

In a four cornered race for representative from the First Congressional District to the Sixty Ninth Congress Lindsay Warren apparently received an overwhelming majority over his three opponents E. Y. Aydtlett, S. M. Mann and E. J. Griffin.

Although complete returns from throughout the district are not yet available scattered returns indicate large majorities for Warren from most of the counties including Martin, Beaufort, Pitt, Dare, Tyrell and Hertford for Warren and those in close touch with the situation estimate a total majority of 7,000 to 10,000 in the district.

Aydtlett, Warren's most formidable opponent is said to have carried Pasquotank and Camden counties.

G. O. P. CONVENTION OPENS TOMORROW

Cleveland, June 9.—Political celebrities in American public life, as well as notable figures from abroad, will attend the Republican national convention which convenes here June 10, either as delegates or as guests. Arrangements for seating the prominent visitors who are not delegates are being made by David W. Mulvane, Kansas, chairman of the national committee on arrangements, who has compiled a list of the notables who are to be the guests of the Republican party.

Polling approximately 5,500 votes the greatest number ever polled in the county, citizens of Pitt county Saturday designated their preference of nominees for state district and county officials for the general elections in November.

Out of the county ticket there was only one contest in which the leading candidate did not receive a majority necessitating a second primary, this being for the office of Judge of County Court. Darden led the ticket with James L. Evans second. No statement has yet been made as to whether Evans will call for a second primary.

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REVULSION

The slaying of the Franks boy in Chicago is tributed by all to the workings of two insane youths. It seems impossible that such a crime could have been committed under modern civilization, except by madmen or in the name of war.

Within recorded history there have been periods when the taking of human life was considered a lesser offense than disrespect for crowned heads and established religions. Millions were slaughtered and tortured to death both lords and subjects in the sacred names of sovereignty, religion and liberty as deliberately and as methodically as was the Franks boy murdered by the two Chicago law students.

That our civilization is not wholly a failure here are those who have said it is a total failure. It is proven to the satisfaction of the multitude by the repulsion and horror with which the public received the story of the Chicago slaying; with which the public receives the story of all murders and fatal accidents, and with which the public contemplates capital punishment.

The primitive minded have complained that modern civilization is rearing a world of chicken-hearted men and weaker women. It

is to be hoped that there is some grounds for their complaint. Will humanity be any the worse off if it loses its thirst for human blood? Will the world be any worse off if it cannot gaze upon bloodshed, either illegal or legalized? It is to be lamented that civilization may develop a race of men and women who cannot fight and will not kill? What will be lost to the world if deadly weapons become obsolete through disuse? Is it not to just this that all humanity is coming? Have not the lexicographers said as much in the word "humane"? Is not the growing opposition to capital punishment and a war glowing testimonial of this tendency?

HE PEDDLED FISH

A Virginian of humble origin was wont to speak of himself as an F. F. V. Finally one of the aristocracy of the State of Presidents took him to task and told him that he was not entitled to refer to himself as one of the first families of Virginia.

The accused one replied, "Those initials stand for 'Former Fish Vendor.' And that is what I was."

People used to pay more attention to lineage than they do today. That is particularly true in the newer sections of the country. Perhaps one reason why we are losing our fondness for family trees is because we are becoming so conglomerate a social mixture that our family trees have lost their symmetry.

One is apt to receive disappointments and decided shocks if one digs too deep into one's ancestral past. Man is born to folly as the sparks fly upward, and that applies to our ancestors, too.

One fellow who had heard that there was a royal strain in his family started to run it down and found that it led to the illegitimate son of an English king.

Another son of a family well-known in America carried forebears murdered his old mother, and right there he lost interest in historical research.

There was a family in New England that had inherited a magnificent uniform, evidently the habit of a person of high rank. The time came when they were financially able to take the uniform to Europe and have it analyzed and classified. When they returned they were singularly silent about the matter. They had discovered it was a footman's outfit.

There are some sections, and some planes of society in the United States where one needs the right line of ancestors to gain a foothold, and where money and personal ability are not worth as much as the right sort of a grandfather.

But that is not general. The aristocracy coming to the front today is composed of people who have done things or are doing things rather than those who chanced to be born into certain families.

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Too Much Publicity Caused George To Leave Rumania
Bucharest.—Kings and queens do not have it all their own ways in these days after the war. Queen Marie of Rumania, while in Paris got a sharp reminder of that fact when she was notified in a private dispatch that the government had invited her son-in-law, ex-King George of Greece, to leave Rumania as soon as he conveniently could.

The invitation was the result of ex-King George's issuance of a public statement to the effect that whatever the Greek republicans now in power would like him to do, he had no intention of doing it. He added that the throne of Greece was his children's and he did not intend to abdicate, either in his own name or in the name of the family.

The matter became something of an international incident when an official in the Rumanian press bureau transmitted the item abroad by radio.

This constructive incorrectness on the part of the Rumanian government so deeply agitated the Greek minister here that he wired his immediate resignation to Athens and it was forthwith accepted.

Premier Bratianu of Rumania, however, made no delay in admitting that an impolite thing had been done, a thing that smacked of interference in the internal affairs of Greece. Then followed the pressing invitation to ex-King George to leave Rumania and the unofficial transmission of the fact to Queen Marie in Paris.

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, June 9.—Climate conditions in the cotton region having been more favorable than generally expected over the week-end, market was lower today.

There was some uneasiness concerning international politics and some disappointments as regards the tariff commission's report, which stated that the depression in the cotton manufacturing industry has been found by the commission to be practically world-wide in scope with indication for immediate improvement and that the commission felt unwarranted in making recommendations for a readjustment of the tariff on imports of cotton goods which was sought by the new England mills.

The weather bureau reported higher temperatures in the cotton belt and scattered showers mostly light in Southwestern districts and northern Oklahoma Sunday and moderate to heavy showers Monday in Oklahoma, light in Arkansas, northern Mississippi and at widely scattered stations eastward to the coast.

Press advices from the north are to effect that finances of the country are sound and the adjournment of Congress has created a better feeling by the removal of danger of hostile legislation, while money continues to rule easy.

So far this week, or since last Wednesday, the weather in the cotton region has been more favorable for progress of the crop, especially in Texas, and it is likely that Wednesday's weekly weather and crop government report will be favorable, at least as a whole.

Looking ahead, the weather outlook is not so favorable, except for Texas; as showers are probable for nearly all sections of the cotton belt, cooler for northern portion of the southwest.

On the other hand, chances are that the Census Bureau will show consumption of lint cotton in the United States during May to be much smaller than last year's 621,000 bales. In advance of the census report due next Saturday it is probable that the National Ginners Association will make its usual monthly consumption estimate.

While the weather has been more favorable as a whole of late, we doubt if the crop has made anything better than slow progress, which would not be very encouraging considering its very low condition 65.6 on May 25th. H. & B. BEER.
