

TOBACCO MARKETS OPEN S. CAROLINA

Legislature To Meet Thursday To Consider Ship Bill

Farmers Pleased
South Carolina
Tobacco Prices

The South Carolina tobacco market opened today with prices ranging from four to forty cents a pound. According to information from observers the grades this year are probably of the lowest quality ever offered at the opening sale and the prices are 15 to 25 per cent higher than on last year's opening day taking into consideration the quality of the offerings.

Reports from the various markets show an average offering in pounds with the grades low and prices ranging approximately the same. Farmers are reported to be well pleased with the prices they are receiving.

A report from Mullins says:

Market average about 15 cents. Offerings very common. Farmers fairly well pleased. From the Fairmont, N. C., market a private report reads:

Market opened with double sales. Receipts around 200,000 pounds. Prices on all grades of common tobacco 15 to 25 per cent higher than opening last year. 85 to 90 per cent of the offerings common primings. Never saw the farmers better pleased. Prices ranged from 4 cents to 39 cents. All of the companies bidding freely.

COUNCIL ADOPTS

Bulawayo, Southern Rhodesia.—Gold prospecting is very active throughout Rhodesia and so keen are the prospectors in pegging out claims that eight of them slept throughout the freezing cold one night on the site of a dead miner's forfeited gold claim, known as Mick's Luck, near Essex Vale, at one time the home of the famous explorer F. C. Selous.

Bethel Republican
Held for Extortion

Manning was carried before Commissioner W. C. Manning, of Williamston, where he was required to give bond of \$2,500 for his appearance August 13 for a preliminary hearing. The warrant on which Mr. Manning was arrested was sworn out before Commissioner W. P. Bachelor, of Raleigh.

Mr. Manning has gained prominence here as county chairman of the Republican party. He was a revenue officer until a little over a year ago. Two of his sons hold government jobs, W. H. Manning, postmaster here, and Roy Manning, deputy marshal at New Bern.

2257 City Licenses
For Automobiles Are
Granted Salisbury

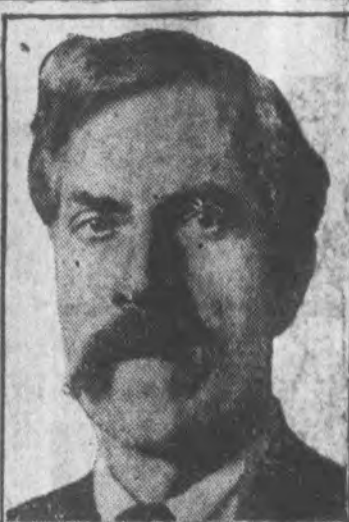
Salisbury, Aug. 5.—City Clerk C. G. Wells has announced that 2257 city licenses for automobiles have been issued during the first two months of the fiscal year which started on June 1 last. SAYS CRIME RESULT
OF DISEASED BRAINSDr. William Healy De-
clares That Observa-
tions in Court Room
Confirm His Opinions

Chicago, Aug. 5.—Dr. William Healy, of Boston, second psychiatrist testifying for the defense in the hearing to determine the punishment of Richard Loeb and Nathan Leopold, Jr., for the kidnapping and murder of Robert Franks, testified today that the crime was a direct result of Loeb's diseased motivation and that his observations of the youths in the court room had confirmed his opinion from examinations that they are mentally diseased.

Cross examination of Dr. Healy began by Robert Crowe, state attorney, seeking to bring out the basis of a "childish compact" between Loeb and Leopold and the hearing upon suggestion of the defense became silent, the witness testifying in a low voice only for the court and stenographers. The matter of which of the boys struck the fatal blow with the chisel remained a puzzle of the trial when Healy, on cross examination, after 15 minutes references to his notes on his examinations said that he had not been told which killed the Franks boy and he did not know.

GERMANY TO ACCEPT
DAWES PLAN SAYS
CHANCELLOR MARXHead of Delegates to
Conference Says That
Country Is Putting
Through Necessary
Legislation to Carry
Out Plan

London, Aug. 5.—At a plenary session this morning with Premier MacDonald presiding, the German delegates were formally handed a protocol embodying the program for putting the Dawes reparations report into effect. He asked the German representatives to study the report and be ready to express their opinions tomorrow.

The premier said he wanted to bring the conference to an end Friday night.

The session, which was held at the Premier's official residence Downing street, and lasted for thirty minutes, was opened by a welcome address delivered by Premier MacDonald.

The German delegation, headed by Chancellor Marx, Foreign Minister Stresemann and Finance Minister Lueder, arrived in London at 8:30 this morning fully prepared for the meeting having familiarized themselves with the action of the conference while enroute from Berlin. They were accompanied from Harwich by Dr. Gustav Saint Hamer, German Ambassador to London.

Replying to Mr. MacDonald's welcome, Chancellor Marx said the German government had accepted the Dawes plan and was putting through necessary legislation to make it effective. The German representative said he hoped to maintain the friendly spirits of the original experts and hoped the Allies would do the same.

AMERICAN FLIERS
REACH REYKJAVIKPlanes Chicago and
New Orleans Hop Off
From Hoefn Horna-
fjord This Morning

London, Aug. 5.—The American Army around-the-world fliers have been sighted at Reykjavik, Iceland, according to a news agency's report.

Hoefn Hornafjord, Iceland, Aug. 5.—The American Army airplanes on the world flight hopped off from Hoefn Hornafjord at 9:15 o'clock this morning for Reykjavik on the west coast of Iceland.

The United States cruiser Raleigh which has been stationed here attending the fliers proceeded to sea with her destination probably Reykjavik where Lieutenant Lowell J. Smith, flight commander, will decide on further plans for the flight.

At 10:25 the planes passed Skaffaros, 70 miles west of Hoefn Hornafjord flying in a strong gale.

It was the best day since the Raleigh arrived here, the sun shining brightly over the glaciers and no trace of fog. From the north was a stiff breeze which was felt would somehow impede the progress of the planes but reports from the destroyers stationed along the route indicated excellent visibility with a generally calm sea.

As on the day that the planes arrived here, the entire population of the little village gathered today to wave farewell to the fliers and the only hotel in the town was filled to overflowing with farmers from up country to wish the birdmen good luck.

NEGOTIATIONS
ON ANGLO-BRITISH
HAVE COLLAPSEDRefusal of Russia to Ac-
cept Certain Provis-
ions of Projected
Treaty Brings Negoti-
ations to an End

London, Aug. 5.—Negotiations between representatives of Great Britain and Soviet Russia have broken down and the projected treaty will not be signed, it was announced today by the foreign office.

The British and Russian delegates were in session all night until 7:15 this morning, the announcement said.

The Soviet representatives were unable to accept the amendment and the concessions offered regarding article 14 of the draft treaty. No agreement could be reached, it was stated, and negotiations broke down.

London, Aug. 5.—The Anglo-Russian treaty negotiations collapsed according to authoritative information, on refusal of Soviet representatives to accept articles of the agreement which they insisted left the way open for England eventually to demand compensation for foreign property nationalized by the Soviet government. In other words, the explanation runs, it was a clash between communism and capitalism, although there had been many evasive discussions of other features of article 14 which the Russians found objectionable.

Greenville-Washington
Road Completed; Will
Be Opened Early Date

The hard surfaced road between Greenville and Washington has been completed, with the exception of two bridges, and will be opened to the public within two months time.

Work on this road has been progressing rapidly and every effort has been put forth to push it to completion. It is one of the most traveled roads in the county and leads to Choccolocco, Grimesland and Washington. The pavement was announced finished Saturday, but the bridges have not been completed and until they are opened the traveling public will use the detour which has been used heretofore.

With the completion of this road Pitt county will have one of the most perfect road systems in the state and can boast of "All paved roads lead to Greenville."

Raleigh, Aug. 5.—Governor Cameron Morrison was today back in his office ready for the battle over the ship and port commission bill which is scheduled to open Thursday when a special session of the General Assembly convenes.

The governor returned to Raleigh last night from Asheville where he has been spending a brief vacation.

Governor Morrison today declined to comment upon the situation regarding the proposed \$8,500,000 bond issue for fostering water transportation to and from North Carolina seaports. A series of conferences, however, were scheduled.

That the fight over the ports bill will be a strenuous one is indicated by close observers by the fact that some members do not believe a bond issue for this purpose to be constitutional.

The governor last night received the backing of John W. Bailey, who was defeated in the June primary for Democratic nomination for governor. Mr. Bailey in a prepared statement declared he was in favor of at least one port terminal in the state and the acquisition of an east and west railroad independent of the north and south lines. Mr. Bailey's statement was opposed to a referendum on the question. He declared it should be sent back to the commission with that body empowered to act.

The former candidate declared he did not believe the development of the seaports alone could accomplish the objective desired. "They might afford some slight relief on the coast," he said, "and near it but we must seek relief for the people throughout the commonwealth. As I see it, we must have at least one port terminal and an east and west railroad independent of the north and south lines."

CLAIM ROBBERY
MOTIVE KILLINGMexican Officials Ex-
press Disbelief That
Recent Controversy
Responsible for Death
of British Subject

Mexico City, Aug. 5.—Belief by the Mexican government that robbery was the principle motive in the killing of Mrs. Rosalie Evans, British subject who was shot to death from ambush Saturday night, as reiterated by an official foreign office bulletin relative to the case issued late last night.

Officials expressed disbelief that the crime was the result of the agrarian agitation aimed at forcing Mrs. Evans to consent to division of her estate in legal proceedings which had become an incident between the Mexican and British governments although this possibility is conceded.

SUSPENSION BRIDGE AT PHILADELPHIA IS NEAR COMPLETION

Philadelphia, Aug. 1.—Construction work on the great Delaware river suspension bridge, according to officials of the commission directing its erection, is keeping pace with the schedule set by the engineers who designed it, making it probable that July 4, 1926, the centennial of the signing of the Declaration of Independence, will see the new artery of traffic opened between Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

The bridge, with a span of 1,750 feet between towers, according to the engineers, will be the largest of its kind in the world. More than a mile and a half in total length, its towers, already in place, reach 385 feet above the surface of the Delaware River.

Draped from the monster cables, each of which will be 291-2 inches thick, the floor of the bridge is to be 135 feet above high water, providing passage for the largest craft without altering their top hamper.

The bridge will be 125 feet wide and will accommodate four tracks of trolley and rapid transit lines and a roadway for six lines of vehicles. Two walks for pedestrians will be built above the roadway. The cost of the project is estimated at \$32,783,000, divided between Philadelphia and Camden, and the states of Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

At its present stage, the structure presents the appearance of a bridge without a floor. The towers and anchorage are in position, and the two shores linked by temporary cables on which a narrow footpath for workmen has been laid. Both shores of the river are alive with the sound of the clatter of machinery, the grind of concrete mixers and the sharp exhaust of hoisting engines. Tons of concrete are being poured daily in the construction of the great anchorages. A wide swath has been cut into the heart of Philadelphia and the way for the approaches to the bridge. Historic churches and buildings have been moved or demolished to make way for this twentieth century project.

Berlin Zoo Augmented By Abyssinian Animals

Hamburg.—The strangest cargo unloaded here in years was taken off the Norwegian freighter Randsford recently. It was a consignment of animals from Abyssinia for the Berlin zoo.
The cargo included dromedaries, jackals, panthers, leopards, 30 large apes, 24 porcupines, giant turtles with a combined weight of 2,500 pounds, and 80 smaller animals of prey of various descriptions.
The unloading proved no easy matter. The camels, for instance, simply lay down on the upper deck and refused to walk down the gangway. They finally had to be lifted off bodily with the aid of pulleys and cranes. A leopard managed to give a vicious blow with his paw at one of the expert tamers of the zoo who had been hired to assist. A long scar on his forehead bears evidence that the leopard aimed straight. Every animal had to be inspected by an official veterinary was allowed to land.

Negro Hospital Assn. Offered Site For Bldg. Greensboro

Greensboro, Aug. 4.—A tract of land located in the eastern part of the city has been offered to the Negro Hospital association for a site of the new building that the association plans to erect in the near future, according to an announcement made to the board at a general meeting here yesterday. The land which is said to be well adapted for a hospital, has not yet been accepted but it was understood that it would be within the very near future.

No definite financial report was made at the meeting but statements by members of the board of the interest of various persons was said to have pleased the board and officers very much.

It was decided by the board that from now on a monthly meeting of that body should be held.

At the same time it was announced that the new charter had been received since the last meeting and it was explained in detail.

New officers were elected. They were:

Dr. C. W. Banner, president; Chas. H. Ireland, vice-president; Dr. S. P. Sebastian, secretary; and R. G. Vaughn, treasurer.

London.—The three Fiji chiefs, Vail, Sukuma and Rabici, who have been visiting London for two months to pay their respects and that of their peoples to the King of England, their overlord, have only one complaint to register. There are too many people about.

"They get in the way when you walk," says Vail, "you can't go straight like you can in Fiji and you have to keep hopping about unless you want to get trampled upon."

COTTON LETTER.

New Orleans, Aug. 5.—Altho cases were easier than due and additional private crop reports indicated a yield of about 500,000 bales larger than indicated by the government two weeks ago, the market ruled comparatively steady because of the continuance of the drought over the western half of the belt, especially in Texas, where only scattered light showers occurred at a few stations in southern portion of the state.

Returns to the New Orleans Times Picayune averaged the condition of cotton at 68, indicating a yield of 12,425,000 bales, and returns to the Southern Products Co. averaged the condition of the plant at 67.8 pointing to a production of 12,440,000 bales.

The average of 14 private crop condition reports is 68.2, highest 70.5, lowest 66 and the average of 14 private yield estimate is 12,284,000 bales, highest 12,718,000 bales lowest 11,499,000. Returns to the government, as of July 16 averaged the condition of the crop at 68.5 indicating a yield of 11,984,000 bales. Linters not included.

Were it not for the uncertainty of the future as regards the final outcome of the crop, market would probably be high enough, but the western half of the belt, particularly Texas, is in the throes of a protracted drought and there is no telling how long the hot dry parching weather will continue. If a general heavy rain was had over the western half of the belt, especially in Texas, there would be every assurance for a good crop this year, as the present outlook in the eastern half of the belt is generally favorable, particularly in Georgia.

At the moment the future of the Texas crop is hanging in the balance much depending on whether or not that state is favored with needed moisture in the near future.

To give an idea as to what damage the continuance of a drought throughout August in Texas can inflict it is only necessary to refer to results of last year's drought, which is reflected in the following comparative. Average condition Texas July 25 1923, 71; Aug. 25th 1923 55; Oklahoma July 25th 63; Aug. 25th, 1923 46. H. & B. BEER.
