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STATE SHIP BILL INTRODUCED TODAY BY WAKE SENATOR

Both Branches of Legislature Pass First Bills Today; House Adjourns Out of Respect for Late Congressman Claude Kitchen; Public Hearings on Ship Bill to Be Held Tuesday

Raleigh, Aug. 9.—The State Ship and Port bill was introduced in the Senate today by Senator Charles U. Harris, of Wake County.

Accompanying the ship and port bill was a resolution endorsing the recommendation of the Ship and Water Transportation Commission of acquisition of an east and west railroad line. This completes the introduction of the bills for which the special session was called by Governor Morrison.

Accompanying the bill was a notice in behalf of Senator Harris, Bellamy and Brown, who will jointly have charge of the measure, that they will seek to have the provision in the bill calling for a referendum stricken out.

Accompanying the bill was a statement addressed to the president of the Senate saying "The bill just sent forward was prepared by Attorney General Manning at the request of Governor Morrison. It contains a section providing for a referendum. I want to give notice that Senator Brown, Senator Bellamy and myself will urge the committee to which this bill is referred to amend the bill striking out the provision for a referendum."

The House during its 45 minutes session this morning passed and sent to the senate this morning five local bills and passed eight bond issue bills on their second readings. The House adjourned at 11 o'clock until 8:30 Monday night. 27 more bills today were added to the 49 introduced in the House yesterday. The most important of the measures was introduced by Representative John W. King, of Greensboro, calling for regulation of bus and truck lines over the improved highways of the state.

As soon as the House adjourned the Finance Committee met and ordered a favorable report on the bill repealing the highway bond sinking fund amendment measure carrying with it a substitute amendment. These were designed to carry out one of the matters for which the extraordinary session of the assembly was called.

Four educational bills were favorably reported to the House, one providing for use of funds appropriated for vocational education work; one creating an educational finance committee; one increasing the freddie county board of education from three to five members; one granting Forsyth county board of education members mileage when on duty.

The Pensions Committee reported bills granting pensions to three persons.

The House adjourned today in memory of the late Congressman Claude Kitchen, passing a joint resolution to that effect and sending it to the Senate which did not convene until 11 o'clock.

Senate Session.

The Senate today passed four bills the first since convening in extra session, while 12 were introduced.

The four bills passed were one giving power of eminent domain to the school board in the town of Albemarle; one amending the Consolidated Statutes relative to the sale of land for assets; one a substitute amendment to the Consolidated Statutes relative to the payment by clerks of funds for the use of indigent and needy children; and one amending the charter of the town of Landis.

After the state ship and water transportation bill and joint bill relative to the Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railroad was introduced by Senator Harris, of Wake County, and was referred to the committee 1,000 copies of the former bill and 400 copies of the latter were ordered printed and placed upon the desks by Monday morning.

The chief bill discussed in the Senate today was that introduced yesterday by Senator Vassar, relative to enlargement of the duties of coroners. The committee recommended—

State Will Investigate Conditions Penitentiary As Result Of Charges

Released Convicts Tell Story of Mistreatment of Prisoners in State Institution; Declare Inmates Are Given Poor Food and Excessive Punishment; Investigation Soon

Raleigh, Aug. 9.—An investigation into the conditions in the North Carolina State Penitentiary here will be undertaken sometime during the extra session of the legislature, as a result of charges of two released prisoners published here, it was indicated today by Representative Matthews, of Mecklenburg county, chairman of the House Committee on Penitentiaries.

The charges published here today were that the food served was very bad, that sick prisoners were badly treated and chained to their beds and other charges of bad treatment were made.

Representative Matthews, discussing the charges of former convicts said, that regardless of whether or not the charges were true he believed that it was well to look into them.

"I believe it will be well to have an investigation to see whether there is any foundation to the charges and if we find anything wrong correct it."

The Charlotte representative said he would not fix a date for the investigation of the prison so that the authorities would not know when to expect the investigating committee. It was indicated, however, that it would be made during the special session of the legislature.

The story of conditions at the prison was told by M. B. Phillips who finished a three year term on Tuesday for forgery.

"I believe Superintendent Pou is a good man, but they don't let him know half the stuff that goes on in the prison. The prisoners can't get to see Pou and Captain Busbee runs the place just as he pleases," Phillips said.

"The sick prisoners have the worst of it and the hospital is the worst place in the whole prison. They don't like to have the prisoners sick and they won't let them stay in the hospital unless they are desperately sick. If they are so sick they have to stay in their chain them to the beds. Usually they put them out of the hospital after they've been there a day or so no matter how bad off they are."

"There was an old man at the prison named Horemackel from down near New Bern. He had a bad case of hemorrhoids. They treated him for a while and then they made him go back to work in the chair factory. The old man couldn't work. He was in too much pain. He'd squirm in his chair and wherever he sat he'd leave signs of blood and pus. He got worse and after a while at dinner time he'd go out to a little place he had and lie down. One day he went out there and lay down and died. The blood and corruption oozed through his trousers and the flies clustered about his body."

"There was a young fellow named Walter Foster who was sick in the hospital and they wouldn't give him nothing to eat but predigested beef in water three times a day. He nearly starved to death and some of his friends smuggled him some food. He was sick and hungry and he ate too much and got worse. He was given an enema but instead of using soap in the water the man who gave it used a patented washing powder they used in cleaning floors. It burned his stomach so that he nearly died. For weeks he passed blood."

"As a rule, if anybody is sick the doctor just looks at him and says give him a dose of salts. They use this coarse horse salts that comes in barrels. Sometimes they give the prisoners castor oil. A pint is considered a proper dose."

"The food at the prison is pretty bad. Sundays and Wednesdays are beef days. I never got but one decent piece of beef while I was there and that was when they killed the bull on Thanksgiving Day. They buy it in town and bring it out. It is left hanging around and it is not unusual to see the green flies on it."

"They don't flog out at the prison any more. They use the dark cell for punishment. They put them in there for from one to eight days on bread and water. When they feed the prisoners they bring the water first and let them drink as much as they want. Then they wait ten minutes or so and let them have the bread. It is almost impossible to eat the

bread without any water at all to go with it.

"Over at Tom Peebles' camp they have got a 'horse's tail' to punish the prisoners with. It's a sort of mask that's all full of hair. The prisoners who get in the dark cell have to wear it all the time except when they are eating. You can't open your mouth without getting it full of hair."

"They've got other ways of punishing, too. If a prisoner breaks a rule they may put a chain and iron block on him. Sometimes they double shackle them with chains on their hands and feet and they have to go everywhere with the chains on."

"There are all sorts of punishment for breaking the rules. I know they have got to punish the fellows who break the rules but the way they do don't make the prisoners any better. It makes them hate the whole system."

"And if the people in charge of the prisoners obeyed the laws they could make the prisoners obey better. The prisoners are supposed to get legal holidays off but they hardly ever do. Maybe you remember when they said Arthur Bender, Paul Jacobs and Robert L. Tyson got drunk off shalac when they were painting. They got drunk all right but they didn't get drunk off shalac. They got drunk off whiskey that they stole from a wardrobe in the prison. There's a nigger prisoner out there that steals wine and stuff and sells it to the prisoners. I bought a quart of wine from him that he'd stolen and paid him fifty cents for it. Dave Evans was the nigger's name."

Phillips said whenever there was an investigation at the prison things were "all diked up" for the occasion. He said that some time ago when a party of newspaper men came to the prison at Pou's request to look the place over that Pou arranged everything the day before.

"The day before they came he had a lot of the fellows in the A grade clothes up to his office for a conference. They were Clay Fitzgerald, Ed Alexander, Bill Citizen and others. Pou told them what to do and the next day he had them posted all over the place. Whenever the newspaper men went anywhere they were the ones they talked to. It was all fixed up and they told the editors everything was fine. I wish I'd had a chance. I'd have told them something."

Phillips whose home is in Charlotte, was sentenced to from two and a half to three years on a charge of forgery in Winston-Salem in 1922. He is a small man and a partial paralytic. He is working in Raleigh at present and plans to go to Washington, D. C., to work later.

Wilson Tobacco Market Is Getting Ready for Opening

Wilson, Aug. 9.—Tobacco market officials and warehouse managers here are making arrangements for the opening of the tobacco market which has been announced as September 2 next. Plans are underway, it was said, to have the quitable sales system instead of the quadruple as used last year.

Operators are predicting good prices for the coming market as well as good grades of tobacco. An additional warehouse has been added to the list of five which this city harbored last year. The new warehouse is a well constructed brick building and is now nearing completion. The contractors state that they expect to have the house completed by the time the market opens.

New Plane for Wade Enroute Nova Scotia

Quincy, Mass., Aug. 9.—The plane Boston II, bound for Nova Scotia, as a relief plane to enable Lieutenant Leigh Wade to participate in the last part of the world flight, left Squantum Air Station at 8:15 this morning. Lieutenant McDonald planned to fly to Bar Harbor, Maine, thence to Pictou, Nova Scotia. The weather conditions were ideal for the flight.

Forty Thousand Homes Are Inundated In Japan

Tokio, Aug. 9.—Seventy-three persons are known to be dead and 57 missing as a result of the overflowing of the Tamsui river in northern Formosa, according to advices received here today.

Approximately 40,000 homes were inundated of which 3,000 were destroyed while thousands were rendered homeless including 7,000 in the city of Taihoku.

It is expected that the casualty list will grow when complete reports are received from the districts of Taihoku and Giran which were the chief sufferers.

THE LOCAL KIWANIS CLUB FOSTERS COLORED HOSPITAL FOR CITY

Not only the Christian people of the town, but everybody has come to realize that a hospital for colored people in Greenville is an immediate and absolute necessity.

The Greenville Kiwanis Club is so thoroughly imbued with this idea that several weeks ago the Club began to devise ways and means by which such a hospital can be put into operation. Every detail concerning the question has been arranged save one; namely the financing of the proposition.

Provided the financing can be procured the following plan will be put into execution immediately:

1. The leasing of the Bernard House near the corner of First and Evans Streets, with an agreement to lease other houses contiguous thereto should additional units for the colored hospital become necessary.
2. A colored graduate nurse of stability and satisfactory training who has had experience in the administration and management of hospitals has been procured to take charge of the institution.

The Kiwanis Club has enough confidence in the people of Greenville to believe that individuals will furnish a sufficiency of furniture, bed clothing and laundry to put the institution into operation. It also believes that the Christian people of Greenville will be willing to federate and finance the hospital by a monthly payment into the colored hospital account, which payment is to be secured from all of the white churches in the town.

Acting on this conviction the Club has appointed Marvin Blount to arrange with the Methodist Church for a monthly donation of \$20.00 for this purpose.

E. W. Griffin is to procure \$15.00 per month from the Immanuel Baptist Church.

Ed Rawl is to procure \$15.00 per month from the Memorial Baptist Church.

W. H. Woodard is to procure \$15.00 per month from the Christian Church.

J. F. Harrington is to procure

\$10.00 per month from the Freewill Baptist Church.

Mrs. Lottie Coover is to procure \$10.00 per month from the Catholic Church.

L. C. Skinner is to procure \$10.00 per month from the Episcopal Church.

Noah Williams is to procure \$10.00 per month from the Holiness Church.

Mrs. Nana Brown is to procure \$10.00 per month from the Primitive Baptist Church.

This money is to be paid over on the first of each month to the Welfare Officer. He is to pay over such a part of it from month to month as is necessary to keep the hospital going.

The Kiwanis Club is depending upon the colored people of the town, and most particularly the colored churches and lodges to procure a sufficient sum of money each month to maintain whatever indigent colored patients the hospital may be called upon to care for.

The Pitt Community Hospital has agreed to give the use of their sterilizing plant, operating rooms, X-ray and pathological laboratories in order that the colored hospital may get service with as little expense as possible.

This hospital will be superintended and managed in its entirety by Frances Hopkins, a graduate nurse, bred and born in the town of Greenville. The hospital will be opened for receiving patients so soon as the above described financial plan can be put into execution and it is hoped that this can be accomplished not later than September 1.

Here is a wonderful opportunity for the continued practice of a practical Christianity. The Kiwanis Club has all confidence in the above plans because they know it is a thing that every real Christian in the town of Greenville will be glad to open a heart and a pocket book, to assure its operation and uninterrupted continuance.

The ministers of the town of Greenville are urged by the Kiwanis Club to make mention of this undertaking from their pulpits tomorrow.

Negro Confesses Connection With Murder Chauffeur

Charlotte, Aug. 9.—Kenneth Hale, one of the two negroes sought in connection with the killing near Lexington, of Charles Garwood, taxi driver, was arrested here early today and was said by officers to have admitted implicitly the crime. His statement also implicated John Leak, another negro, who fled when officers surprised the two negroes as they de-mounted from a freight train here. Hale lost his nerve when officers ordered them to submit to arrest but Leak took flight into a nearby swamp. He is being sought without bloodhounds.

After Hale was brought to headquarters here he frankly discussed the homicide. He admitted that he was one of the negro occupants of the car, the attempted robbery of Garwood culminating in the assault which resulted in Garwood being fatally beaten over the head with an iron bar. His companion struck the fatal blow, declared Hale.

Raleigh, Aug. 9.—Representative Thomas P. Baumgardner of Stanley county wanted the Australian ballot system in his county. Then the representative found that printing shops close to home could do the job in ten-point. Now he is seeking to have it fixed so some other type will be legal and has introduced a bill to that effect.

Flight Supply Ship Is Held Fast In Ice

On Board the Gertrudask, Near Angmagalik, Greenland, by Wireless, Aug. 8.—Since caught in the ice near Angmagalik early last week the Danish government steamer Gertrudask, supply ship for the east Greenland station of the American world flight party, has drifted with the ice to 65 miles south of Angmagalik. It will be impossible for her to escape until the ice spreads.

DECISION REACHED HOLD INTER-ALLIED DEBT CONFERENCE

Decision to Hold Conference Announced by Premier Herriot Prior to Departure From London Today

London, Aug. 9.—A conference on the question of inter-allied debts will be held in the near future it has been definitely decided, Premier Herriot of France announced today just before he left for Paris to confer with his cabinet on the workings of the Inter-Allied Conference.

The French delegates had been working persistently to bring about such an inter-allied debt discussion since the opening of the present conference.

It is understood that it has not yet been decided whether the new conference will be held in Paris or London. It was emphasized that the United States representatives were not parties to the decision to hold the debt parties.

Tom Gibbons Knocks Out English Opponent in the Third Round

Wembley Stadium, England, Aug. 9.—Tommy Gibbons, American light heavy weight boxer, knocked out Jack Bloomfield, British aspirant for heavy weight honors, in the third round of their scheduled 20 rounds bout here this afternoon.

The bell saved Bloomfield from a knockout in the second round. The American floored his opponent three times in the second round and when the bell sounded the Britisher's seconds had to drag him limp from through the ropes to a chair for the intermission.

Bloomfield went into the third round groggy and Gibbons floored him with a left to the head and a right to the chin. The Britisher went down for the count of four and got up with his nose bleeding and staggering. Gibbons laced into Bloomfield with ferocious hooks to the head as soon as he got on his feet and dropped him with a left for the count.

Urges That High Point Accept \$2,000 Offered by Harmon Foundation

High Point, Aug. 9.—Joseph Cox, president of the local Chamber of Commerce and A. E. Tate, chairman of the Civic Committee of the local Chamber of Commerce, are making efforts to have the city accept the gift of \$2,000 offered by the Harmon Foundation of New York City for the erection of a playground in this city.

The offer is made by the Foundation upon the conditions that the playgrounds be made permanent and that it shall forever bear the name of "Harmon Field," and that the offer be accepted immediately. Prerequisites to the securing of such an offer are that the town be of a population exceeding 3,000 and that it has increased its population at least 30 per cent since 1900. These conditions are all fully met, it was stated.

The officers of the Chamber of Commerce and Secretary Edgar Hartley of the Y. M. C. A. have all expressed the belief that High Point was in great need of a playground and have indicated their determination in having the offer accepted.

Yesterday's government forecast for a yield of 12,351,000 bales ex-

clusive of linters has had the effect of making sentiment less bullish. In fact, many large dealers now entertain bearish ideas as to the probable course of values.

Bearish sentiment has been made more pronounced by the publication of government "pars" for August 16th, which are higher than those for August 1st as noted by the following comparative: Virginia 321 against 314; North Carolina 354 vs. 341; South Carolina 298 vs. 279; Georgia 215 vs. 188, Florida 150 vs. 134; Alabama vs. 194; Mississippi 235 vs. 221; Louisiana 224 vs. 293; Texas 223 vs. 202; Oklahoma 196; Arkansas 215 vs. 227; Tennessee 245 vs. 236; Missouri 335 vs. 328; New Mexico vs. 265; Arizona 334 vs. 331; California 299 vs. 292.

During today's late session market bulged again as result of the absence of rain so far in Texas, and owing to reports from that state that deterioration was increasing which shows how sensitive market is to adverse weather conditions in that important state, but at this writing the outlook is for more favorable weather for the western half of the belt, especially the northern portion where showers and lower temperatures are likely in the immediate future.

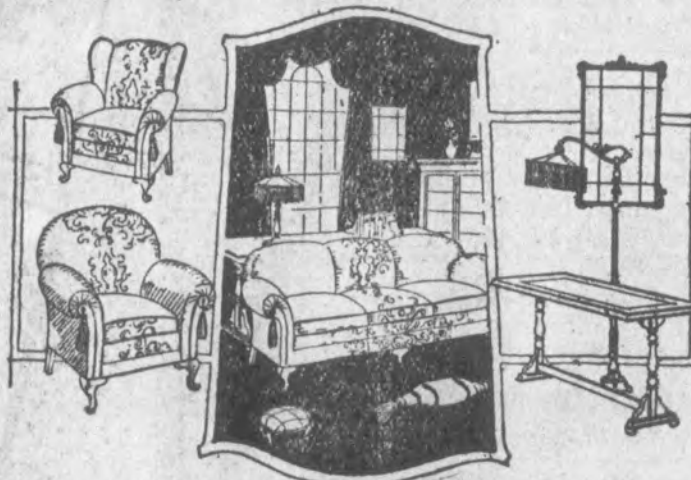
