

## PORT COMMISSION BILL BEFORE SENATE

## Fight On State Ship Line Gets Started Today

Port Commission Bill Formally Comes Up Before Senate; Amendment of Beaufort County Senator Would Provide for Eight Port Terminals in State

Raleigh, Aug. 14. — Picturing eastern North Carolina as now bound down by high freight rates and many farmers and business men on the verge of bankruptcy and declaring that the establishment of seaport facilities with the threat of establishing ship lines if needed, Senator Charles U. Harris, of Raleigh, pleaded with the Senate today to pass the Port Commission bill without a reference to the people.

He opened his debate on the amendment adopted by the Water Commerce Committee, deleting the referendum section of the bill as drawn by Attorney General Manning and introduced in the upper house.

Senator Harris was followed by Senators Sams and Delaney. Senator Sams asserted that the measure had become an issue and urged that it be left over until after election so that legislators who were elected on the issue could pass on it or refer it direct to the people.

Senator Harris, in his argument, stated that Governor Morrison had recommended a referendum because he feared that the General Assembly would not pass the bill without such a provision.

The Senator began his address by outlining the history of the legislation and the report of the commission upon which it was based. He predicted that if the question of the bonds issue for ships and ports were referred to the people that it would set a precedent from which future assemblies could not escape and that in the future bond issues would have to be referred to the people.

Senator Harris discussed the conditions in eastern North Carolina saying that there were two counties in Virginia which raised four million barrels of potatoes yearly that can ship to market at a profit as their freight rate is 50 cents a barrel to New York while farmers in North Carolina a short distance away must pay \$1.50 a barrel. He asserted that he had been told that farmers in 25 counties in eastern North Carolina would be unable to pay their tax bills this year because they have been unable to profitably market their crops.

"Suppose we say to these 25 eastern North Carolina counties that they shall have rates that are not discriminatory. The vacant lands in eastern North Carolina would again become tenanted. People of this section merely ask to be placed on an equal basis with other sections. They do not want to be favored. You'll see these people take heart and go forward if this thing is done. They are now under bondage from which they cannot move. Many are on the verge of bankruptcy because the freight rates are discriminatory. All of eastern North Carolina is being throttled by the railroads, all agree that water transportation is the only remedy but some say, 'Let's refer it to the people.' Why? Because Governor Morrison said so.

With all respect for all I'll say that's passing the buck. That's refusing to carry out your duty to the people. They expect you to study this question. They know you have more time and facilities for hearing the truth than they have."

Senator Sams presented the first argument for the referendum advocates declaring the ship commission had made a prima facie case but the question is of such importance, he said, that it would be better to wait four months for the people to pass upon it. "If the people can pass on it why not wait four months? There is too much division of opinion in this legislature which was not elect-

ed on this issue to pass it without a referendum. Where are we going to get the money to finance it? There should be provision for a sinking fund, the treasury is not in shape to care for a sinking fund. What harm will it do to discuss it before the people and let the next legislature, which it elected on the issue, pass it or let the people pass on it direct."

Senator Delaney told members that he had had courage to vote on millions of dollars worth of road bonds without a referendum to the people and that he retained the courage to vote likewise in this case. He stated that he did not fear the people if it were taken to them but that he did fear the crowds that had been robbing the state of millions of dollars. The Mecklenburg Senator declared that the people depended upon their elected representatives to handle such matters, for them and not refer such complicated matters as freight rates to them for decision. "We have been made responsible so let's not send it to the folks back home," he concluded.

Following the discussion of an hour and half the Senate adjourned until 8:30 tonight.

Raleigh, Aug. 14.—The Port Commission bill, the big measure for which the extraordinary session of the North Carolina General Assembly was called, was taken up in the Senate today. Lobbies and galleries were crowded to capacity when the hour for starting the debate which is expected to last for two or three days, approached.

It was expected that proponents of the bill, without a referendum clause, would take a full day to present their argument. The opposition is expected to take at least a day.

Senator Johnson, of Duplin county, offered an amendment to strike out of the Port Commission bill all clauses relating to the purchase of ships and to make the bond issue for \$7,000,000 instead of \$8,500,000.

Senator Johnson, of Beaufort county, offered an amendment requiring the building of terminals at Wilmington, Morehead City, New Bern, Washington Edenton, Belhaven, Elizabeth City and Swan Quarter.

It had been expected that Senator Harris, of Wake county, would open the discussion on the measure but Lieutenant Governor Cooper recognized Senator Johnson, of Beaufort county, who began the discussion of his amendment. After a short discussion of the Johnson amendment Senator Stubbs informed the chair that it had been agreed to discuss the committee amendment first. He was backed up in his statement by Senator Giles, opponent of the bill, and Senator Harris, of Wake county, opened the discussion.

Senator Harris stated in opening his argument that if the Harris-Bellamy-Brown amendment was defeated he would work as hard as he could to carry the measure in the election. He declared that Governor Morrison had urged a referendum because he feared that a direct action bill would not pass.

Berlin Bars Actors Under Three Berlin.—The chief of police has issued a decree prohibiting children under three years of age from acting in the movies. Special dispensations must be obtained for children more than three years of age, and even with this granted the children are prohibited from working for the movies before school and after 8 o'clock in the evening.

## WORLD FLIERS HOP OFF TOMORROW

Reykjavik, Iceland, Aug. 14.—The American Army around-the-world fliers will leave on their hazardous flight from the north east coast of Iceland to Greenland tomorrow if weather permits. The U. S. cruiser Richmond will leave here at 11 o'clock this morning to take up her position 670 miles off the coast of Iceland to await the passing of the fliers.

## ACCEPTANCE SPEECH TO BE DELIVERED BY COOLIDGE TONIGHT

## National Committee Estimates That Audience of Twenty-Five Million Will Hear Address

Washington, Aug. 14.—Ready for the launching of the national campaign, Republican leaders from every section of the nation were here today to hear President Coolidge outline his views of the campaign issued in his speech accepting the party's nomination as presidential candidate.

Mr. Coolidge will be formally notified of his nomination at exercises in the Memorial Continental Hall tonight at which time he will set forth the principles upon which he seeks election and set in motion his campaign which he plans to take to most parts of the country.

Under the direction of William M. Butler, chairman of the national committee, and James B. Reynolds, of Washington, in charge of plans for the ceremony, all arrangements have been completed for the exercises which begin at 8 o'clock tonight. Long distance telephones will carry the speakers voice to radio stations in every section of the country east of the Rocky Mountains and the national committee estimates that an audience of 25,000,000 will be enabled to hear the address despite the limited capacity of the hall.

## RED CROSS WORKER DELIVERS TALKS AT TEACHERS COLLEGE

## Field Representative Outlines Work Accomplished by Junior Red Cross

Miss Marion Crawford, of Norfolk, Field Representative of the Junior Red Cross work for the southern states, spent two mornings this week, Tuesday and Wednesday in East Carolina Teachers College presenting the work to the teachers attending the summer school.

She made a talk at the assembly exercises each day, kept an exhibit out for inspection in the main hall and held conferences.

Miss Crawford as a public speaker makes her cause convincing and attractive, both by force of her great interest in the Red Cross and by the unanswerable appeal of the cause itself. Her presentation to the students of the cause divided into two parts, first, the theory on which the Red Cross is basing its educational plan, and the second, the program of service or the practical application of the plan.

On the first day in giving the plan she showed that the Junior Red Cross is a tool for motivating and making function many of the ideas modern education advocates. She touched on the trend and ideals of modern education, and on some of the methods, showing how the Red Cross work projects give the children an opportunity for purposeful activity. Children are allowed participation in affairs, are not being trained solely for citizenship later, but are treated as little citizens today.

She contrasted this new ideal, which has conquered the world, with the old method, when the ideal was to make all alike, to when "students all came out like lead pencils sharpened the same way."

The great difficulty in the application of the new ideals is often due to lack of time or tools. She presented the Junior Red Cross as an intra and not as an extra, curricula activity. It is the vitamins in school dietetics.

She referred to the great work done by the Junior Red Cross during the war, when the money value was ten million dollars and the spiritual values could not be estimated. She explained the purpose of the past war plan in training for help, civic service an international co-operation.

She began the program of service presented in the second talk, by enumerating the things done in the North Carolina schools, especially in Pitt county and Greenville. There are 60,000 members in the schools in the state. The purpose is largely teaching citizenship through service.

The program of service is in two parts, local and foreign. The work done in this state ranges all the way from a broad health program, including milk inspection and preparing luncheons, furnishing rooms in hospitals, working for the poor of the community, making scrap books to send to the crippled children in the orthopedic hospital at Gastonia, and to the soldiers at Oteen, to sending things to children in foreign lands.

The foreign work includes the exchange of booklets of scenes and experiences, toys and other things with children in other lands, so there will be greater understanding and therefore less possibility of war.

The exhibit was made up of samples of the work done by children. There were scrapbooks, descriptive booklets, Red Cross kits, toys, dolls, baskets, mats, garments, socks and stockings, all made by children in various parts of the world. The labels on the articles revealed the fact that they were from Poland, Czechoslovakia, Jugoslavia, Russia, Roumania, France, Belgium, Vienna, Italy, Hawaii and New Zealand. One can easily see what fine practical lessons in Geography a child can get from this exchange of articles.

When one realizes there are 60,000 school children in the work these are in the hands of 30,000 teachers

The Communist movement in Bulgaria is making rapid strides under the direction of Moscow, and King Boris is taking stringent measures to protect his frontier. ## Senator Squires Wants Some 'Time' In Senate Chamber

Raleigh, Aug. 14. — Besides introducing several bills of local and state-wide interest today and indulging in a debate over his bill drawn up to prohibit the destruction of flowers and woods along the public highways of the state, Senator Squires of Caldwell, created much amusement when he introduced a resolution calling upon the President of the Senate to make "diligent investigation" as to who removed the clock from the wall of the Chamber and to see that it was returned immediately.

The Senator argued that without the faithful old time piece in sight that many of the members would be inclined to lengthen their "orations," a thing, which the Senator said, was "very much not to be desired."

The resolution met approval throughout the Chamber but no action was taken after the President informed the Senator from Caldwell that the clock had been removed during the days of the "renovation period" and it was not of such condition and appearance that it could very well be replaced in the now so beautiful Chamber and that on the other hand there was a deficiency in the funds for such purposes which prevented the purchase of a new one.

## NIAGARA FALLS CHURCH BOMBED

Niagara Falls, Aug. 14.—The First Baptist Church was bombed today the explosion wrecking the interior of the structure. Windows in business establishments along a block of Main street were broken by the jar.

## HUGHES DECLARES THAT DAWES PLAN WILL BE ACCEPTED

## Expresses Opinion That Acceptance Does Not Hinge Upon Date of Evacuation of Ruhr

New York, Aug. 14.—Secretary of State Hughes returning today on the President Harding after a month's visit to Europe, expressed belief that the Dawes reparations report would be accepted by all powers concerned and would be put into effect very soon.

Mr. Hughes said that in his opinion the acceptance of the Dawes plan did not hinge upon the date of the evacuation of the Rhineland which is reported today to have caused a split in the German and French representatives at the London conference.

"Acceptance of the report will not hinge upon any such question," Mr. Hughes said. "Unquestionably the report will be accepted."

Referring to dispatches stating that newspapers of Soviet Russia had charged that his visit to Europe was solely for the purpose of preventing European countries from entering relations with the Russian government Mr. Hughes said, "I did not discuss Russian affairs over there."

Secretary Hughes said there was no truth in the report that Myron Herrick, American Ambassador to France, would soon resign.

## Bills Are Passed Vindicating Bonds

Raleigh, Aug. 14.—The Senate passed and sent to the House today bills to validate Brunswick county bonds and to validate Duplin County Road bonds.

House bills passed and ordered enrolled for ratification include one validating Battleboro school bonds.

## New Ass't. Attorney General Appointed

Washington, Aug. 14.—William J. Donovan, of Buffalo, N. Y., was appointed today as an Assistant Attorney General to succeed Earl J. Davis, of Michigan, resigned. Donovan is now serving as United States Attorney for the western district of New York.

## FRENCH, GERMANS DISAGREE OVER THE EVACUATION DATE

## Deadlock Between the French and German Delegates Imperils the Success of Conference

London, Aug. 14.—The deadlock between the French and German delegates on the question as to the time limit for the evacuation of the Ruhr is imperiling the success of the international conference it was indicated today after a hurried session in Downing Street between French, Belgian and German premiers had failed to produce tangible results. The delegates hope and expect, however, that the American or British will intervene and save the program which must be agreed upon to institute the Dawes plan.

An official bulletin given out announced that members of the cabinet were in full accord with the attitude taken by the German delegates in London.

After a meeting with Premier Herriot, of France, Premier Theunis, of Belgium, and Chancellor Marx, of Germany, which lasted for 20 minutes, American Ambassador Frank B. Kellogg and American representative James A. Logan, rushed to the American Embassy and joined Owen D. Young and other experts on the Dawes plan to consider what action to take to solve the new complications.

The Germans returned to their hotel and directed a cable to Berlin carrying the news of the unfavorable turn in the conference to members of the German cabinet at the other end of the wire.

Upon his return to his hotel after this morning's conference Premier Herriot said, "The Allies are with us and we are in complete control of the situation."

## Terrell Wins Out Arkansas Governor

Little Rock, Ark., Aug. 14.—Leo Cazort, nearest opponent to Tom J. Terrell, contestant for the Democratic nomination for governor of Arkansas, has conceded Terrell's nomination according to a statement published in the Arkansas Democrat today.

## Justices of Peace To Be Appointed 2 Years Bladen Co.

Raleigh, Aug. 14.—Two new justices of the Peace in Bladen county would be appointed for the next two years under a bill introduced in the House. The specified that H. F. Little and H. J. White shall be the justices.

## GOVERNMENT PLANS TO EXTEND INDIANS' NIGHT SCHOOL SYSTEM

Washington.—Extension of night schools for adult Indians, given a trial at the Vamori school of the Panago Indians in southern Arizona and at the Turtle Mountain Reservation in North Dakota, is planned by the Bureau of Indian Affairs. The evening school in Papago county, Ariz., was opened at the request of Mathias Hendricks, a Papago chief, who attended the school himself and encouraged others to do so.

Instruction is given at the schools two evenings a week and the course consists of work in the primary grades, with the older Indians being taught the English language. Scholars range in age from 18 to 50.

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## TAKING A CHANCE

Thousands of lives are sacrificed, billions of dollars in property is lost and untold suffering is caused annually by carelessness and negligence. In spite of "safety first," "cross crossings cautiously," "watch your step," "stop, look and listen" and traffic signs and campaigns the toll increases year after year.

To be careless seems to be instinctive and to be careful is manifestly unnatural for mankind. Sometimes it is thoughtlessness or absentmindedness, but more often it is pure carelessness. Too often man learns after it is too late. It is another case where the sin is not in the sinking but in being caught. Perhaps it is because man is a natural-born gambler that he continues to "take a chance."

Some of the more "popular" chances people take during the course of a day are stepping off the curb without first looking for traffic, crossing the street in the middle of the block, speeding across highway intersections, throwing matches and cigarettes into wastebaskets, corners and leaves, driving over grade crossings without stopping to look and listen and leaving ignition keys in parked automobiles and house doors unlocked.

Another less serious demonstration of the human trait of carelessness is that of littering the streets and other public property with debris. Even where waste receptacles are supplied persons habitually drop their cast-off papers and other odds-and-ends upon the sidewalks, pavements, parkways and greens. The public spends millions annually for public buildings for the public to mutilate. The taxpayer forgets that he pays for his own vandalism and carelessness.

Legislation has proven itself quack medicine for the endemic carelessness and education thus far has wrought relatively few cures among the army of the chancetakers and thoughtless.

## AN IMMIGRATION PROBLEM

The Yankee farmer of the stubborn New England soil is rapidly being supplanted by Central Europeans. The New England farm—cradle of American traditions and ideals—is abandoned to immigrants and the traditions and ideals of Europe. What a strange sight to see a farmhouse in Massachusetts from which American patriots have been sent forth since Revolutionary times now the seat of the labors of swarthy-skinned Italians, Poles or Portuguese.

America is the haven of immigrants. It was settled by emigrants from Europe and has ever welcomed to its shores those who come for the purpose of becoming Americans. So the tragedy of the New England occupation is that the remnant of the native-born Yankee farmers is retreating before the advance of the immigrant farmers without inculcating in these latter Yankee ideals and traditions. The Central European farmer-immigrant has that sturdiness necessary to cultivate the unfriendly soil of the New England states so economically the country will not lose by his presence. But left to colonize by themselves they may prove difficult in assimilation.

The United States must guard against the carrying out effect of Europe's hope of colonization in America. Americans must prevent the establishment of strictly foreign settlements and districts. The immigrant can be made a good neighbor, but left to build his own communities he remains forever a foreigner.

## NOT SHOCKING ENOUGH

If the term "shocking" were applied to the statistics of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, showing that 8,100 persons lost their lives in motor accidents in this country during the first six months of 1924, some cynic might inquire, "Shocking to whom?" and proceed to demonstrate through the processes of cold logic that neither motorists, the authorities nor the general public seemingly have been sufficiently shocked by the situation to take any steps for its amelioration. However, it is appalling to most persons to consider this accident death toll of forty-four daily, on the average, for a half-year.

A Boston paper reports the result of an analysis of the causes of automobile accidents made by a Massachusetts expert. Of 550 fatalities, 218 were caused by "unjustified speeding, too fast for conditions," and 122 by "inattention." Of 1,000 non-fatal accidents, speeding caused 412 and inattention 150. There are drivers who proceed on the principle that because the law permits thirty miles an hour, except in the downtown district, therefore it is safe to go at the rate, at any time, everywhere else. Such failure to exercise common sense and adapt the speed to conditions of traffic and roadway is responsible for many disasters.

### LOCAL FIRM PRAISES WORK OF CITY POLICE

Dear Sir:  
Feeling that public officials should receive the praise that is justly due them we take this method to thank publicly the police force of Greenville for their untiring and efficient efforts in our behalf in connection with recent thefts from our store and also of an automobile from us.

About two weeks ago we had stolen from our store dresses valued at a considerable amount. On the following Saturday persons who were under slight suspicion as being the same who had committed the theft entered our store presumably for the purpose of shopping. The police were immediately notified of the presence of the suspects and although they had only a supposition upon which to base their case they landed it admirably, and within an hour's time the guilty parties had confessed to the theft and were lodged in jail and the stolen property was returned to us. On the following Monday the parties were carried into the court and through efforts of the police were sentenced to 18 months in jail.

On the night of the twelfth of August an automobile parked beside our store was stolen between seven and nine thirty o'clock. The following morning the city police were notified of the theft and within less than twenty four hours the car was found and returned to us. The thieves of the car have not yet been apprehended but the authorities have information which will lead to the early arrest of the criminals.

It is with a feeling of appreciation for the efficient officers with which we are blessed that we desire to express publicly our thanks and ask that you publish same in order that the people of our community may know the calibre of the men to whom we are entrusting our safety.

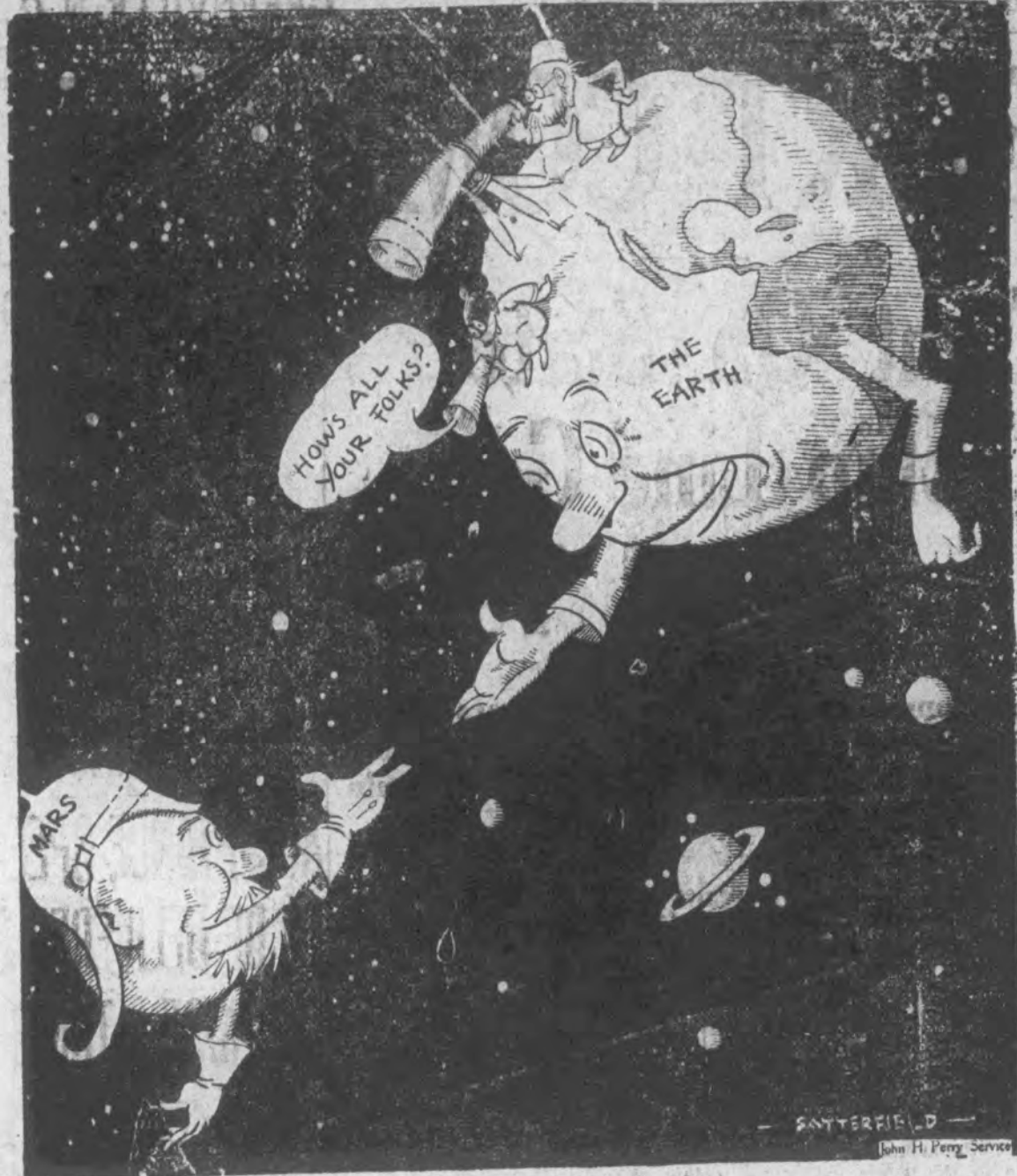

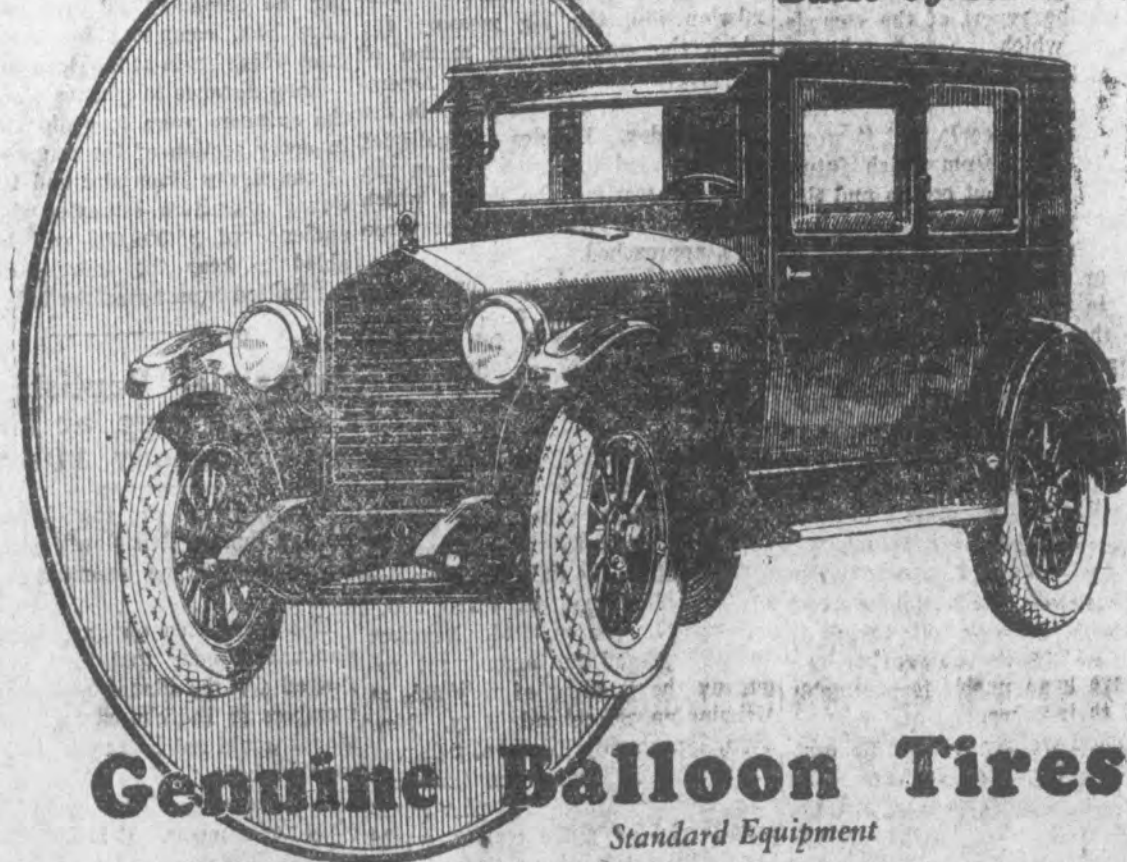

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, Aug. 14.—The more favorable news of the day, as regards rejections, report having it that Germany accepted French proposals, served to offset the depressing influences of Texas rains, market, in consequence, ruling steadier and somewhat higher.

Official returns show about 50 per cent of reporting stations in Texas had light to heavy rains, nearly all districts in all sections of the state, reporting moisture. Indications are favorable for more rain in the Western half of the belt, including Texas.

Returns to the Census Bureau denote that consumption during July in the United States, including linters, was only 388,000 bales vs. 599,000 last year, for 12 months, 6,220,000 against 7,312,000. Stocks July 31 in Mfls 720,000 vs. 1,004,000 last year, in public storage 674,000 against 939,000, making total stock in United States 1,394,000 vs. 2,033,000. Active spindles in operation during July this year were only 27,710,000 compared with 34,244,000 last year.

British board of trade report for July: Exports of yarn pounds, 13,000,000 vs. 9,514,400. Exports of cloth yards, 384,090,000 vs. 316,083,600.

While the British board of trade returns made a favorable showing for July, returns to the Census Bureau made an unfavorable exhibit as to the domestic textile situation, with no indications for an important change for the better in the near future as noted by the comparatively small number of spindles in operation in the United States last month: 28,710,000 vs. 34,244,000 last year. Recently Oklahoma has had much rain and the coming of moisture to numerous districts in the drought areas of Texas will be of benefit, especially where the precipitation has been moderate to heavy, although more rain would be beneficial in nearly all sections of the state.

A sustaining feature of the market is the small available supply on hand, but as the new crop is beginning to open rapidly, especially east of the Mississippi river where it is maturing earlier than last year, supplies will increase in the near future.

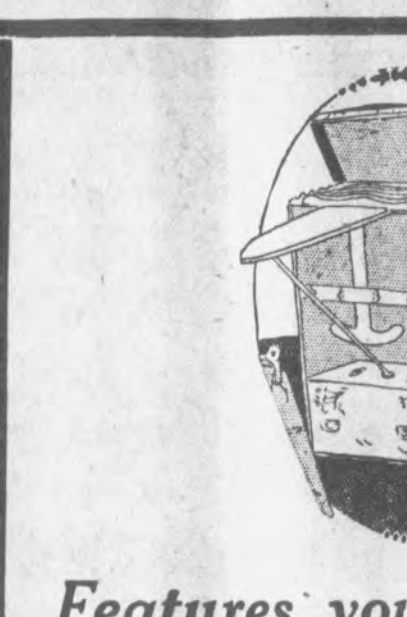
