SHIP QUESTION GOES TO VOTE OF PEOPLE

Greenville Is Chosen As Eastern Distributing Center

Special Session Completes Work For Which Called

With Passage of the Port Bill By House and Repeal of Amendment Relative to Highway Bonds Sinking Fund and Adoption of Substitute Amendment, Special Session of Legislature Marks Time While Measures Are Prepared for Ratification

Raleigh, Aug. 20. — The North Carolina General Assembly today completed the work for which it was called into special session, having handled the port development legislation on the basis of the report of the State Ship and Water Transportation Commission and the repeal of an amendment to the Constitution dealing with the inviolability of the sinking fund of the state and the passage of a substitute amendment.

In the House the port commission bill was passed as sent to it by the Senate and ordered enrolled for ratification.

In the Senate the repeal of the amendment exempting gasoline and automobile license taxes from the sinking fund was passed and the substitute amendment ordered engrossed.

Both bodies will handle local matters and mark time while the bills passed are being engrossed and returned for final action.

The port commission bill passed the House of Representatives today by a vote of 96 to 0. The measure provides for the creation of a port commission to be in charge of port development and a referendum of the question of issuing \$8,500,000 bonds for port development and the purchase and operation of ship lines if the latter step is deemed necessary.

A bill incorporating four miles of railroad in Surry county under the name of the North Carolina-Virginia Railroad Company was passed by the House and sent to the Senate by special messenger. The bill did not pass, however, until there had been some debate on the constitutionality of granting a special charter.

A bill increasing the salary of the office of deputy in the office of the Sheriff of Warren county \$25 per month was passed under suspension of the rules. The same course was taken in the passage of a bill providing for a special Law Enforcement officer for Pender county and also a Pender county bill to regulate toll bridges.

The Vance county highway commissioners' salary was increased and he was empowered to take over work on certain roads under a bill passed under suspension of the rules.

There was protest from some of the members over the suspension of the rules for the passage of so many bills just introduced and as a result the House refused to suspend the rules to pass a bill introduced by Representative Williams, of Craven county, providing that any Craven county officer who may become intoxicated during his term of office shall be removed. The bill went to the calendar committee.

The Cape Fear and Yadkin Valley Railroad resolution was taken up this morning on motion of Representative T. C. Bowie, of Ashe county. A fight on the measure was immediately started. The resolution which passed the Senate providing for a commission to investigate the possibilities of buying the road and pushing certain suits for recovery of the line by the state which built it.

the purchase of any railroad by the state. While the state owns many railroads they are all operated by outside of the state companies, said Mr. Murphy. Representative Wright, of Guilford county, declared that the resolution did not commit the state to anything. He said it merely provided for laying the facts before the legislature of 1925 that the people should have. Mr. Murphy said he felt the state could await the outcome of present litigation and that he was opposed to anything that might lead to the state trying to buy railroad.

Mr. Wright asked that the bill be read explaining that it merely provided for an investigation. Representative Towns, of Harnett, asked if such a resolution passed in 1923 did not provide for a commission to investigate and employ counsel to sue for recovery of the road. Representative Bowie explained that this resolution enlarges the powers of the commission created in 1923. Representative Wickel, of Lincoln county, declared that it looked like keeping bad faith with the 1923 commission. Representative Everett, of Durham, declared that the north and south lines had done all they could to shut out east and west lines. He also said it was always well to be ready to compromise if necessary.

Following the debate the resolution was passed as sent to the House by the Senate.

Five Women Break Jail In Asheville This Morning

Asheville, Aug. 20. — Cutting through the bars of a window in the county jail by means of a saw, believed to have been smuggled in by friends from the outside, five women, three white and two negroes, escaped early this morning.

One of the white women later surrendered to city police saying she did not want to leave the city.

The fugitives dropped 10 feet to the ground, climbed a 15 feet iron fence which surrounds the jail lot, and made good their getaway.

The white women were Marie Powers, Callie Hensley and Lucille Hart. It was the Hart woman who reconsidered after she had gained her freedom and went to police headquarters and surrendered. She had been slightly injured.

The delivery is supposed to have taken place about three o'clock.

CITY EXTENDING SEWERAGE SYSTEM

Construction Work Is Now Under Way On Several Streets; Other Additions Will Be Made Soon

Greenville has let contracts for additional sewerage work in the city which will cost approximately \$60,000. The extensions will cover portions of Cotanch, Evans, Washington, First and Clark streets and Bonners Lane. Mr. H. L. Rivers, of this city, has been awarded the contract for the engineering work and the installation work will be carried on by the city construction force.

The first of the work will be that in the vicinity of First and Evans Sts., on account of the lack of sewerage facilities for the negro hospital now under construction.

As soon as this program of extension is completed other extensions of the city sewerage system will be made, it has been announced.

High Point Paper Suspends Operations

High Point, Aug. 20. — The High Point Morning Herald, published here for the past year, announced today that it would suspend publication for ten days or two weeks pending reorganization.

Lack of capital and poor business management have made suspension necessary, says the announcement, published in the front page of today's edition of the Morning Herald. The paper announced that the reorganization process would be started immediately.

Bandits Escape \$150,000 Jewelry Daylight Holdup

Boston, Aug. 20. — Diamonds and jewelry valued at \$150,000 were stolen when four men held up the clerks in the store of Karl H. Shniier, diamond merchant, here today. One man remained in the automobile, two covered the three clerks with revolvers while the fourth picked up the jewelry trays which had just been removed from the safe.

House Containing 15 Acres Tobacco Destroyed by Fire

A pack house containing fifteen acres of tobacco belonging to Mr. Joel Patrick, who resides near Ayden, was totally destroyed by fire last night, Jonas Lee, negro, is being held for investigation as it is believed by many that he set fire to the pack house. Mr. Patrick's loss will amount to several thousand dollars with no insurance.

From information Mr. Patrick and the negro had had a few words over a crop of tobacco which Lee had tended and which he had given up. After the quarrel the negro left and had not been seen in the immediate vicinity of Mr. Patrick's home until after the fire last night.

The loss of the pack house and tobacco is a great blow to Mr. Patrick and his friends regret to hear of the great loss.

Robersonville To Receive Current From Local Plant

Negotiations between the Water and Light Commission of this city and the town of Robersonville have culminated in the closing of a contract for the local power plant to furnish current to that city. Mr. M. Swartz, superintendent of the Greenville Water and Light Plant, stated this morning that erection work had already begun on the line to Robersonville and that it was hoped to be completed in time to turn the current on by October 1 or at an early date thereafter.

Robersonville will be the third place outside of Greenville that receives its electric current from the local plant, Winterville and Bethel both having been connected with this city for some time. Recently there have been improvements at the plant which make possible the furnishing of current to every town in the county with enough surplus to meet any local needs for several years.

Among the improvements was the recent installation of a new 1,250 K-W turbine which doubles the capacity of the plant. This turbine is of the newest type and operates upon an average saving of one ton of coal for every 24 hours. All of the installation work was carried on by the engineers and force of the local plant without the aid of outside experts, and at a great saving to the town.

National Biscuit Co. Will Establish Branch This City

Work on Building to House New Industry Begun Today; Establishment of Greenville Branch Will Mean Coming of Many New Residents to City; Greenville Ideally Situated as Eastern Carolina Distributing Center; Other Concerns Expected to Establish Here in Near Future

Construction Work Begun Today on Building for the Branch of the National Biscuit Company to be Established Here as a Distribution Point for Eastern North Carolina.

After almost a year of survey and careful consideration the concern chose Greenville on account of its central location and hard surfaced roads in all directions, territory east of Raleigh and south of Norfolk and negotiations for the building were completed a few days ago and work was begun today.

The building being erected by Messrs. R. D. and Sam Harrington who have purchased an entire block on Virginia Avenue just opposite the Imperial Tobacco Company, is to be modern in every respect and will cost approximately \$30,000. Already a contract has been made with the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad Company for the laying of sidetracks along the property and this will be ready for use by the time the building is completed which will be within ninety days according to information received today.

Upon establishment of its branch here the biscuit company will ship to Greenville daily in large quantities from their bakeries, and a large fleet of trucks will serve eastern North Carolina from this point. The concern at the start will operate a force of about 100 persons, it is stated, which will mean the coming of new citizens to Greenville.

According to authoritative information the coming of the National Biscuit Company to Greenville is only the beginning in making Greenville the distribution center of eastern North Carolina. It was stated that there are other concerns who have been considering locating here that have been awaiting the outcome of the survey of the biscuit company as to advantages of the city from the standpoint of location and facilities for distribution.

Mr. J. D. Smith Died At His Home Near Greenville Monday

Mr. J. D. Smith died at his home near Greenville, Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock after an illness of several days from a stroke of apoplexy. The interment took place yesterday afternoon in the burying ground on Mr. Gus Forbes farm.

Mr. Smith was one of the county's most prominent farmers. He was held in high esteem by people throughout the county. About two years ago he suffered a stroke of paralysis since which time he has been in failing health.

The deceased is survived by his widow, three daughters, Mrs. Arthur Evans, Mrs. Jarvis Stokes, Miss Lucy Smith, four sons, Messrs. Arthur, Rodolph, J. D., Jr., and Aubrey Smith.

NEGRO WANTED IN COUNTY FOR LARCENY ARRESTED IN KINSTON

John Wilkes, negro, charged with stealing seed cotton from the late Mr. R. A. Nichols, about a year ago was arrested in Kinston Monday by Officer Whitehurst, brought to Greenville and placed in jail.

Wilkes after stealing the cotton left for parts unknown and no one knew who the thief was until a friend "squealed" on him. Efforts have been made to apprehend him but the officers failed in the undertaking. On Saturday night it was learned that the negro was in Beaver Dam township and efforts were made to arrest him. In the raid a regular free for all fight took place and Wilkes received bullet wounds in his right shoulder and right hip. He, however, succeeded in making his escape and was arrested in Kinston Monday.

He is now in jail and is being given medical attention.

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BETTER AMERICANS

America's experience in the great war, which brought the nation to realize its strength, also gave it to know its weakness. Draft statistics that show America's great man power also show a large percentage of youth educationally and physically defective. To profit by realization of weakness thus driven home is the object of the administration's plan, through the war department, to organize governmental and non-governmental agencies to remedy such defects of American youth as are curable.

The educational defects brought out by statistics are, of course, remediable instruction if properly directed, can be relied on to rout such ignorance. Physical defects, noted in the official records, are to a large extent also eradicable. The more than 20 per cent of young American recorded in draft statistics as illiterate—with the corresponding ignorance of American ideals—was more than 24 per cent too high. It is for those who take their citizenship seriously to cooperate with the government in its attempt to drive out this ignorance that it may be followed by clear understanding of American institutions, which is essential to true patriotism.

The war record also shows that 50 per cent of American youth are physically defective. While physical defects can not be wholly

eliminated, this appalling percentage can be substantially reduced by proper training and care. To reduce such defects to a minimum is a duty of citizenship and of government. The administration is working toward fulfillment of its part of this duty through training camps and through efforts to enlist non-governmental agencies in the work of physical betterment.

A movement is under way to establish an internationally-owned observatory and wireless station on the shores of Baffin Bay to furnish weather reports to all the nations of the northern hemisphere. Government officials in Washington are enthusiastic over the plan, and there is every indication that it will shortly materialize.

The value of the official weather reports can hardly be exaggerated. They are indispensable to mariners and to agriculturists. The new service for aircraft is a more recent addition, and as time goes on other fields are sure to develop where weather reports are absolutely essential.

Government weather reports are not yet absolutely accurate, however, despite the fact that all governments deriving benefits from the service. New Orleans, Aug. 20.—The market maintained a steady undercurrent today due to shorts covering, private ad vices of weevil and worms appearing in scattered districts of the belt and because of the uncertainty attending the movement of a tropical disturbance in the south Atlantic oceans which is expected to pass near or north of Great Abaco Island, Bahamas by or during Thursday night which is about 150 miles east of the east Florida coast. The weekly weather and crop government report was generally considered as a standoff, reporting temperatures averaged seasonable over most of the cotton belt, that rainfall was local in character, though beneficial showers fell, in portions of the Mississippi Valley states and locally in western portion of the belt. If the tropical storm keeps out to sea it is likely to prove more beneficial than otherwise in view of it being rain to the south Atlantic states where moisture is needed in Alabama, Georgia sections of the Carolinas.
