

HEAVY FIGHTING VICINITY OF SHANGHAI

Defense In Chicago Murder Case To Spring Surprise

Forty Thousand
Troops Clash In
China Civil War

Competent Eye Witnesses to Battle Between Chinese Provincial Forces Declare the Two Days' Fighting Has No Material Gains for Either Side; French and English Troops Land in Shanghai

Shanghai, Sept. 4.—Chang Esoulin, military governor of Manchuria, has issued an ultimatum to the Peking government declaring that unless it stops its attacks on General Lu Lung Tsiang, Chang himself will mediate by force, says a Japanese news agency dispatch from Peking.

Shanghai, Sept. 4.—After 24 hours of fighting within 15 miles of the coveted city of Shanghai, forces of General Lu Lung Hsiang, ruler of the territory, repulsed the armies of General Chi Shihshun, and gained about two miles according to a statement issued by the headquarters of the defense commission of Shanghai. Many casualties were reported.

Shanghai, crowded with foreigners who huddled into the city from the firing line, today viewed the opening of hostilities with apprehension and fear that the battle line might come closer to the city before nightfall.

The engagement now in progress, is becoming general in the area from the line of the Shanghai-Nanking railway to the coast and heavy cannonading along the railway line was reported.

The temperament of the foreign governments toward the Chinese provincial civil warfare was indicated yesterday when several contingents of British marines landed in the foreign section of Shanghai and 400 French sailors were sent ashore from war craft now in the harbor here. The French troops supplemented the volunteer company on duty to defend the French settlements in any possible emergency.

Shanghai, China, Sept. 4, 6 p. m.—Though troops estimated to number 40,000 battled through this sunshiny day competent eye witnesses declared tonight that neither side made any material gains in the fighting.

The battle front today extended from the line of the Shanghai-Nanking railway to Yangtze river about 18 miles from Shanghai at its nearest point and 25 miles at its most distant point.

Lugwa headquarters of the Ceking troops defending Shanghai claimed gains in the Hwangtu sector on the railway and in the Liuh sector on the coast. Both sides reported that they had added reinforcements to their fighting forces during the day.

Firing was continuous today, the second day of the fighting, from 6 a. m. on. When Kiangsu troops opened the attack only about a thousand defenders were holding the Chekiang lines. Trucks were pressed into service to rush troops and ammunition to the front and the movement forward of reinforcements continued all day.

BODY AUGUSTA GIRL COOPER DESIRES
IS FOUND IN RIVER AN EARLY TRIAL

One Man Arrested on Murder Charge; Other Arrests Expected

Sandersville, Ga., Sept. 4.—Eugene Snider, of Mitchell, Glascock county, Ga., is being held in Washington county jail here today charged with murder in connection with the finding of the body of Hattie Wimberly, of Augusta, Ga., in the Ogeechee river. Other arrests are expected momentarily.

The coroner's jury adjourned yesterday after a partial investigation, in which the arrest of Snider was authorized, to meet again today.

The body of the girl, who was about 22 years old, was discovered yesterday by a farmer. Three men of the town are reported to have driven hurriedly away in automobiles about the time of the finding of the body.

A gunshot wound in the right chest probably produced the death of the girl according to physicians. Her skull was also crushed.

WORLD FLIERS TO
MAKE HOP BOSTON
DURING FRIDAY

Fliers Receive Great Welcome Upon Arrival Pictou, Nova Scotia. Lieut. Wade Joins His Comrades for Final Flights

Pictou, Nova Scotia, Sept. 4.—Balked in their plans to get away to Boston today the United States Army world circling aviators are getting ready to take off tomorrow morning if weather permits.

With more than 22,000 miles of their flight completed they are eager to get back upon the soil of the United States and begin the transcontinental tour which will mark their triumphant home-coming.

Lieutenant Leigh Wade and Lieutenant H. H. Ogden, with a new plane to replace the one lost on the hop from Iceland, have rejoined their comrades and will leave with them to complete the flight back to the Pacific coast.

Lieutenants Lowell H. Smith and Erik Nelson and their assistants Lieutenants Leslie Arnold and John Harding, Jr., decided before their hop here from Hawkes Bay, Nova Scotia, yesterday that they would continue on to Boston for the night's rest but circumstances including the breaking of a spreader bar on Lieutenant Smith's plane made it impossible to repair and refuel and all the planes in time to complete the hop before dark.

The 420 miles trip from Hawkes Bay requiring 6 hours and 26 minutes was made under generally favorable conditions for this region although the airmen were somewhat delayed by occasional rain squalls and head winds. There was no fog and visibility was good.

The aviators were the recipients of a great popular and official welcome from the Nova Scotians and were taken in a triumphant procession through the streets.

New York, Sept. 4.—William G. McAdoo's brother, Malcolm, has become an official member of the LaFollette-Wheeler forces. His appointment as treasurer of the state committee was announced today by the LaFollette-Wheeler headquarters. He was chosen for the position last night by a unanimous vote of the committee.

"I am heartily glad to align myself with a genuine progressive movement in American politics and will do my part in carrying it over," Mr. McAdoo said.

Mr. McAdoo denied he was "bolting" the Democratic party because his brother was defeated for the Democratic presidential nomination, adding:

"Since I have attained my majority I have voted for nine presidents, three of whom were Democrats and six Republicans. If I am a bolter I am a bolter from both parties. I would have no self respect, if I voted for either of the old parties this year."

BELGIAN TROOPS
EVACUATING RUHR

Brussels, Belgium, Sept. 4.—The Belgian military evacuation of the Ruhr begins tonight with the withdrawal of a battalion of the 16th artillery which will rejoin the garrison at Tienen. Other units will be taken out from time to time. Orders from the government for the withdrawal of special branches such as heavy artillery, tanks and aviation have already been issued. Retirement of these armies constitute the first stage of the evacuation.

The second stage will be removal of the infantry which will be brought back by entire regiments instead of by battalions.

England Gives Books to Japan. London, Sept. 4.—By passing the diplomatic and consular vote the House of Commons sanctioned a gift by the British government of \$125,000 for the purchase of books in Great Britain for the Tokio Imperial University.

The library of the university was destroyed in the earthquake of last year, and this gift is in restitution.

Defense Counsel Will
Ask to Change Guilty
Plea to Not Guilty if
Judge Caverly Gives
Death Sentence; May
Declare Boys Have Be-
come Insane Since the
Trial

Chicago, Sept. 4.—In event of an unfavorable decision by Judge John R. Caverly in the kidnapping-murder case of Nathan Leopold, Jr., and Richard Loeb, defense attorneys are understood to have under consideration two surprise moves by which they hope to carry on their battle to save the lives of the two boys.

The first would be the filing of a petition in a court of equal jurisdiction setting forth that the boys have become insane since the trial. This petition would ask that a jury be called to determine their mental condition.

The other move is understood to involve two steps, one before and the other after sentence is pronounced. The first step would be the presentation of a petition asking Judge Caverly to allow the withdrawal of the plea of guilty now entered that it may be changed to a plea of not guilty. The second step would be a trial by jury.

OLIVER GIVES ADVICE CONCERNING CHICKS

Raleigh, Sept. 4. — When open range is not possible for hens being raised, the year should be divided into two lots so that green food can be grown on one lot while the other lot is being grazed by the fowls in the advice given poultry raisers by Allen G. Oliver, in charge of the office of the Poultry Extension Division. The hens should be turned into the lots when the grass is two or three inches high thereby affording plenty of succulent feed for the fowls the year round if the rotation is kept up, says Mr. Oliver. The poultry may be turned in with the cow, he adds, but not with the pigs for as a rule pigs and chickens do not get along well together.

"There are times when the poultry do some harm to the crops," Mr. Oliver asserted, "but after the crops have gotten a good start this does not very often the case. After corn is a foot high it affords an excellent grazing ground for chickens, and

they in turn help the corn by killing all the insects.

"Thickly sown crops in rotation lots furnished good shade and they should be suited to the plant condition of the section of the country as well as the time of the year.

"From April 1 to July 1 on one yard should be sown oats, chard, or lettuce, clover, vetch, or sunflowers of cowpeas, while on the other yard should be sown winter rye, winter vetch, sweet clover, and various green crops.

"From July 1 to October 1 the crop of the first yard should be fed while on yard two, buckwheat, and turnips be grown. From October 1 to April 1. The crops should consist of crimson clover, winter rye and vetch.

HIGHLY PLEASES LARGE AUDIENCE

From Statesville, Sept. 4. — Labor unions in the world's great democracies are founding, upon newly forged pillars of great political, economic and financial power, an enlightened civilization, Peter J. Brady, president of the Federation Bank of New York, and envoy of the American Federation of Labor declared today in an address before the British Trades Union Congress.

The cornerstones of this civilization, said Mr. Brady, would rest in a British Commonwealth of Nations, an American Commonwealth of States, and a United States of Europe.

Bringing to this 56th congress of British labor organizations the cordial greetings of the trade union movement in America, the president of the A. F. of L.'s most representative bank in his country said he came here also to "knit more closely the bonds of understanding between the workers of Great Britain and America."

For, he said, the great allied debts still existing, the new reparations agreement and the prospect that American investors would shortly be called upon to loan many more millions to European nations "link us more closely than ever, with your fate."

Mr. Brady praised British labor for its course in politics. American labor too, was making itself felt in politics of its nation, he said. But, as he pointed out, the differences between England's "tight little island" and America's aggregation of state sovereignties obliged labor in his country to accomplish its ends with the aid of all parties, rather than through one purely labor party. He called America "a Babel of nationalities."

As for the A. F. of L. policy toward other international organizations of workers, that was controlled by the democratic system of autonomy which prohibited the A. F. of L. from dictating to its unions. As Mr. Brady said, "it gets its mandate from its affiliated members." If the international relationships that were broken off during the World War, he said:

"We are still eager to restore fraternal relationships when it can be brought about on a practical basis; to jointly solve the pressing problems confronting the workers of all nations. We believe in such international kinship, for we hold that the trade unions of the world are the only substantial bulwarks against Kaiserism or Bolshevism or however we term the form of despotism as yet to overthrow democratic institutions."

Mr. Brady went on to describe the vast accumulation of labor capital as represented by workers' savings deposited in labor controlled banks in the last 4-12 years.

"If we can poll our votes to get control of government," he asked; "if we can unite our economic power to impress industry, can we not, by combining our savings, small individually, but bulking enormously large in the aggregate, make finance responsive to the will of those who produce the world's wealth? We think it can be done, and so do the workers of America."

"We have 33 labor banks with resources of \$125,000,000—but a drop in the bucket of what our trade union banks are capable of accumulating. We have five million trade unionists. Each year \$25,000,000,000 is paid our industrial workers and from six to seven billion dollars is saved in various ways. It is this large sum which labor banks hope eventually to control."

"There is no peace, declared Mr. Brady, discussing the reparations agreement. "The armistice was signed and peace declared. It was followed by a six-year purgatory."

"More men are under arms than before the war. Only lately have the six years of conferences borne fruit—whether the poison apples of the next World War or the wholesome fruit of World Peace, none can tell."

"They say America won the war. No one won the war, least of all America. The powers still owe us 12 billion dollars for financial cooperation. The American investor is to be called upon to loan them billions more."

"The American bankers advance money to pay the German indemnity, then look to Germany to repay the American investor after France already has the money. What folly if the spending of this money will inevitably lead to bigger armies, bigger navies and final obliteration of the civilized world."

The most hopeful portent, said Mr. Brady, has been the "vision and achievement of the new leaders of the British and French governments within the last six months." He held forth the prospect that "with the growing power of labor and strengthened future civilization."

FUTILITY OF WARNINGS

In order to diminish the number of crossing accidents the railways of the country united in a campaign of warning against the dangers that attend lack of caution in crossing railroads at grade. The peril was sought to be impressed in many different ways in the hope that fatalities and injuries from this cause would be reduced, if not be practically eliminated. Notwithstanding the effort made records of the Pennsylvania System show that in the first three months of the campaign accidents at crossings of tracks of that corporation, instead of being lessened, increased 30 per cent in comparison with the same period a year ago.

This would seem to indicate that warnings are not heeded, that such efforts are useless. Perhaps the prominence given to the matter may have inspired the reckless to take it as a dare. In the major portion of the accidents automobiles were involved, which leads the officials of the Pennsylvania System to express the opinion that the "large increase in these casualties is chargeable almost entirely to growth in the reckless and inexperienced driving of automobiles."

The disappointing result of the campaign, if the experience of the Pennsylvania is indicative of the general effect, points to the conclusion that there is a percentage of the population not amenable to warning. If people insist on rushing into danger they are exercising their free will, though it is regrettable that they are not the only sufferers because of their want of caution.

BELITTLING THE GREAT

Belittling criticism seems to be the lot of the great dead. It was more than 400 years ago that Christopher Columbus ventured forth on the quest perilous and returned from beyond the Old World's horizon to report the discovery of uncharted lands inhabited by strange peoples and teeming with vast resources. Now delvers into the past claim that this discovery was an accident; that he found more than he was looking for; that his theory was a subsequent product of his mind and not the motivating conviction that spurred him on. Why raise quibbles at this late day? No matter whether Columbus fully visioned his enterprise before he put it

through or not, he none the less served the world by his venture—and opened up a new world to civilization. He possessed the courage that did not balk at traversing unknown seas peopled by imaginations of that day with monsters and horrors. He had the seaman-ship that enabled him to set a new record for navigation. His achievement was great enough in itself to be above belittlement at this late day.

THE SHUT UP LEAGUE

One of New York's quantity production critics of the arts proposes that a Shut Up League be organized on Broadway. The conceit is intended to eliminate verbal competition of theatrical audiences with paid performers on the stage, and to do away with ill-timed applause that forces the player to step out of character in incongruous acknowledgement, or to repeat a song or shuffle which bored a majority of the audience completely in its first rendition.

Nashville, Tenn., Sept. 4.—A portrait of the late Queen Victoria presented by the present Queen of England to Fisk University, and a pair of silk stockings worn by Queen Victoria and in need of darning, are among the gifts which the Fisk University Jubilee Singers have brought back to their alma mater from a concert tour of England this summer.

CALIFORNIA MAN FINDS TRACES OF GONE CIVILIZATION

Visalia, Cal., Sept. 4.—Archaeologists of the University of California are to be invented by W. H. Hart, a pioneer resident of Woodlake, Tulare county, to go with him back into the Tehum valley country in the high Sierras, to inspect a recent discovery that the mountaineer believes indicate that some unknown race preceded even the Indians in that country. Pending the visit of scientists, Hart is guarding his secret and has told few people of the location of his find.

In the heavily wooded and rocky section within walking distance of General Grant National Park, Hart says, he uncovered a considerable deposit of flint entirely unknown to Tulare county mountaineers. Flint cut into shapes and sizes somewhat resembling broken weapons of warfare and possible bits of some ancient pottery like wise different from that known to have been made by the Indians, caused the finder to look further and he now believes his discoveries were merely surface indications of what may be found beneath the layer of six feet of soil which covers the small area. He made no attempt to disturb the search to what might be seen upon the surface.

Five small stones resembling diamonds were picked up. Two of these Hart had tested by a San Francisco jewel expert who, he says, pronounced them real diamonds of rare excellence. If they are real diamonds, he declares, they are the only ones ever found, far back in the Sierra Nevada mountains, and he believes they must have been brought into that section by some age-old civilization which frequented the region.

Hart has lived for 55 years in these mountains, has made a study of the Indians who used to live there, their habits and customs. He is convinced they cannot be responsible for the articles he discovered.

LOCUST PLAGUE IN GERMANY USED SOURCE OIL FERTILIZER

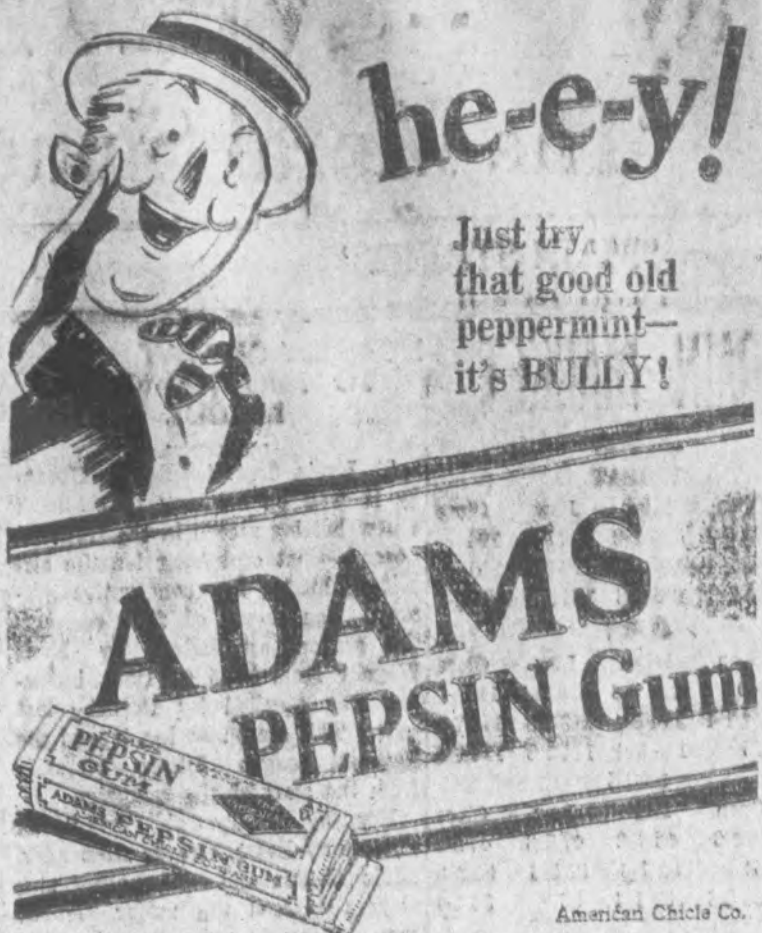
Bocholt, Germany, Sept. 3.—A plague of locusts has brought a new industry to this region where the insects have been gathered by the ton and oil extracted from their bodies. The locusts came over the frontier from Holland, by countless billions, and were caught by women and boys with great baskets.

The oil is intended for airplane motors and is said to be particularly adaptable for winter flying because it does not congeal in low temperatures. Good, fat locusts retailed at about one fourth of a cent a pound. After the insects passed through the oil extraction process the refuse was used as fertilizer.

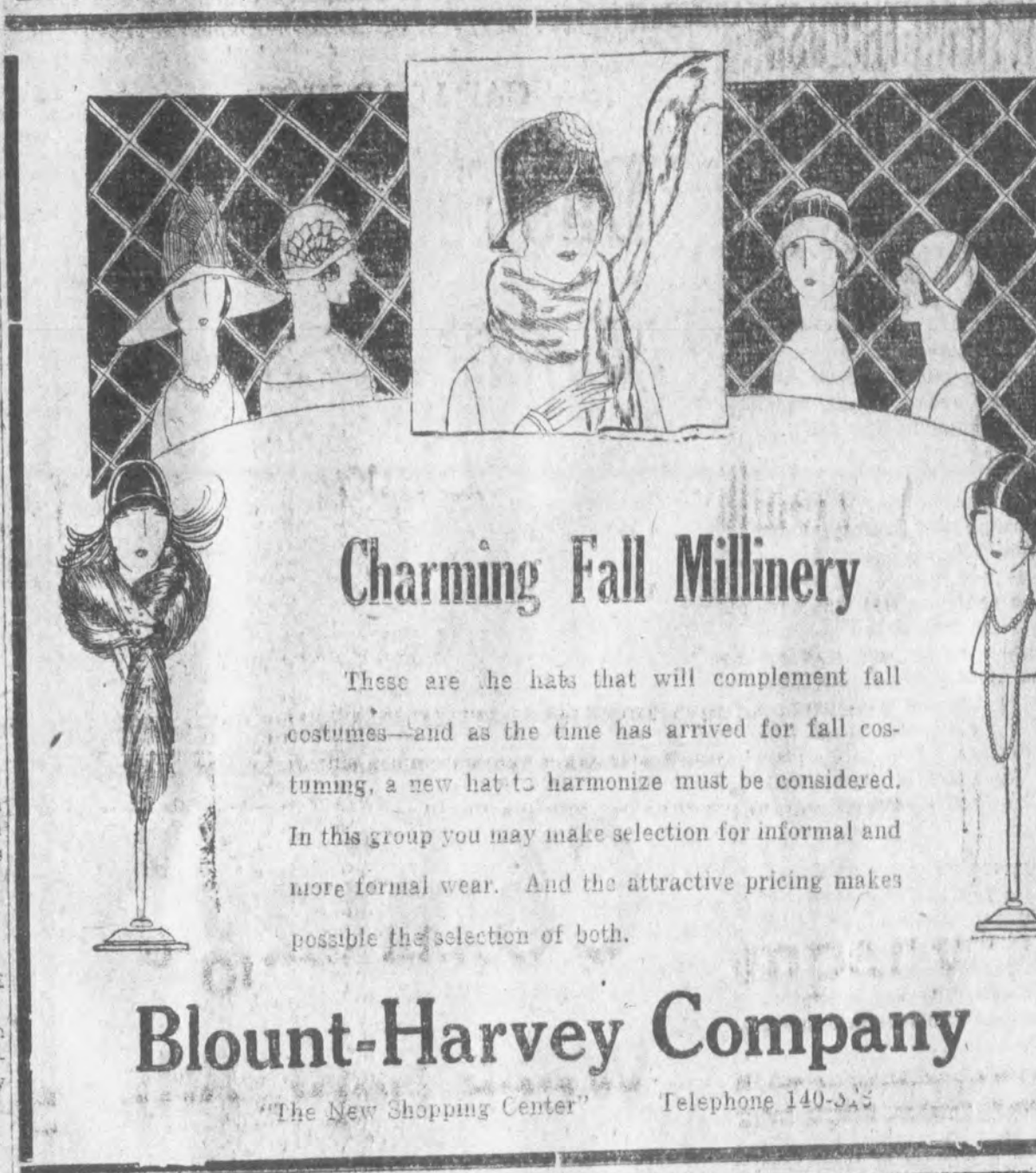

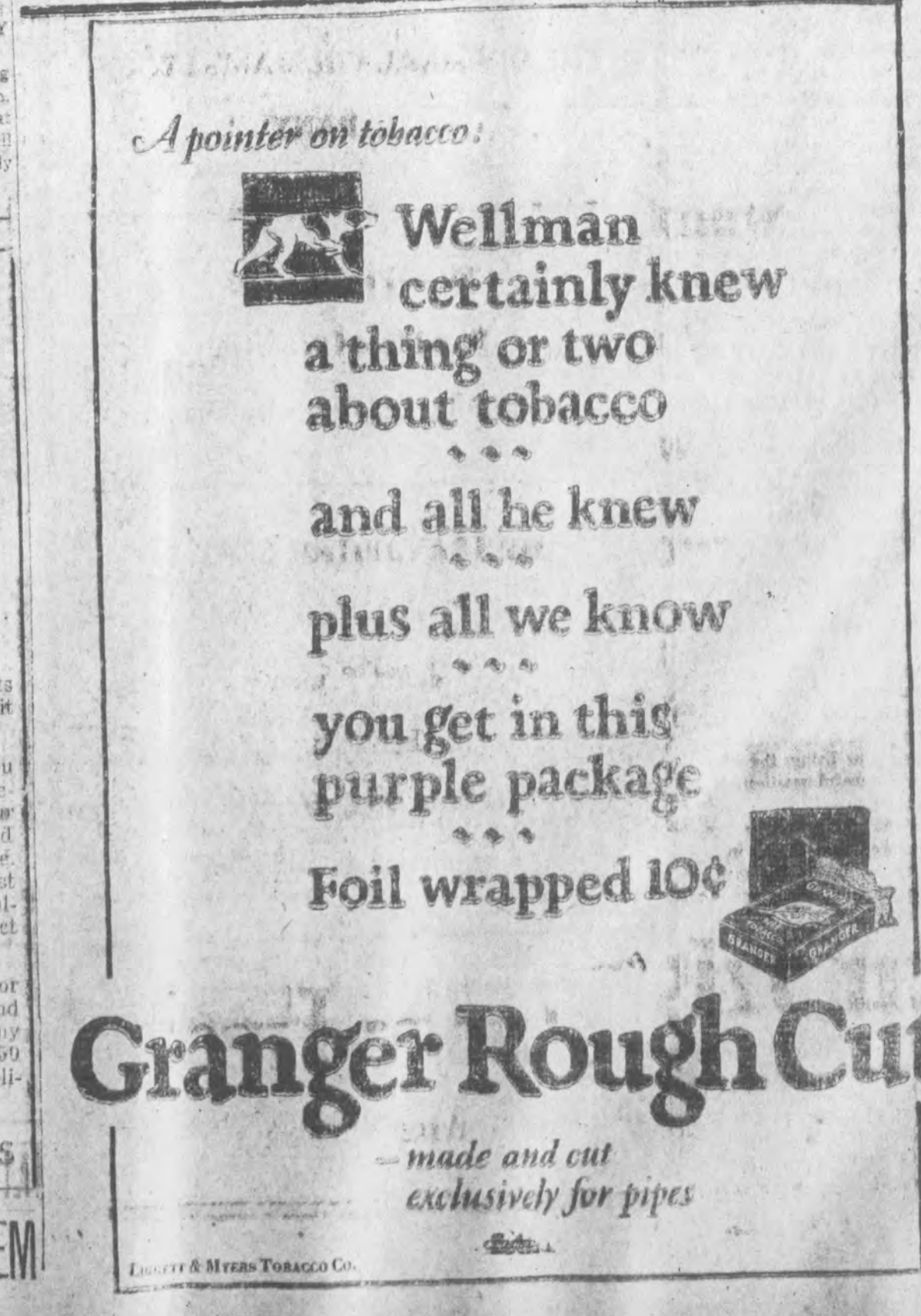

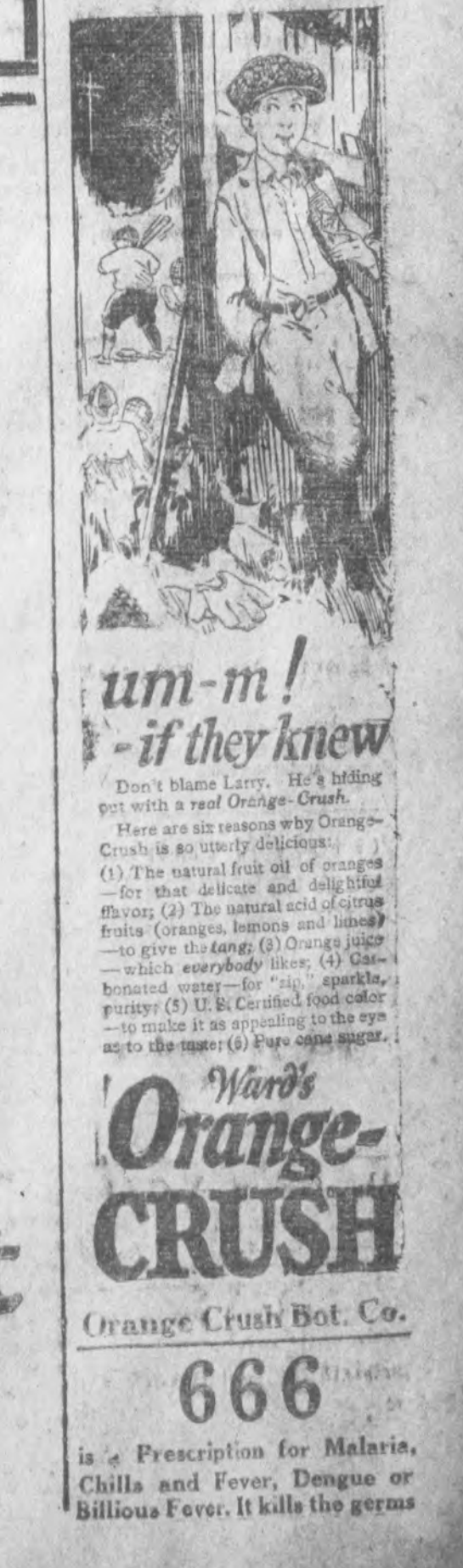

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, Sept. 4.—The market was dull but steady and within a narrow range today. Except for the wake of more rain in the western half of the belt, weather conditions were favorable especially for pickings, ginnings and marketings, as no rain of consequence was reported and temperatures were lower.

Returns to the Memphis Commercial Appeal average condition at 60.7 indicating a yield of 13,918,000 bales exclusive of linters and returns to the southern prods to average condition at 60.9.

Additional monthly private crop reports are due in advance of next Monday's crop forecast. The average of private reports issued so far as to condition is 61.4 indicated yield 12,857,000 exclusive of linters. The government crop forecast as of Aug. 16, issued on 23rd instant was for a production of 12,956,000 bales exclusive of linters. Alexandria, Egypt, advised that an official estimate as to Egypt condition crop this year's is 1,400,000 to 1,500,000 bales of fine hundred pounds gross weight against 1,213,000 bales last season.

Texas points reported basis as generally firmer today with demand fairly good and that farmers show some disposition to hold for higher prices.

London reported that the master spinners' Federation decided to continue practically half time another month.

New York wired: With Monday's crop report pending, trading in cotton goods will be confined to small lots but that agents and jobbers are optimistic as to the outlook because retail trade continues good with reported frequent and that there is more interest apparent in all lines.

Spinners takings by the world of American cotton for week tomorrow will run against 163,000 bales last year. Last week they were 145,000 against 107,000 last year.

PAGEANT DEPICTING GROWTH METHODISM FEATURE CONFAB

Knoxville, Tenn., Sept. 4.—A pageant depicting the early history and the growth of Methodism in the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, for the past 100 years, will be a feature of the annual meeting of the conference in this city on October 3 next, under the plans made public here today by the committee in charge of centennial celebration of the conference which will take place at the same time. Sharing the interest of the pageant, the Western North Carolina conference will have a representative to set forth the part that western North Carolina played in building Methodism in the section included in the Holston conference. Until 1890 the western North Carolina conference was included in the Holston conference. Rev. C. M. Pickens, of Albemarle, N. C., has been delegated to read a paper before the conference.

The pageant will come as the climax to the one hundredth session of the Holston conference. Dr. J. S. French, of Bristol, Va., is chairman of the centennial committee and leading men and women throughout the conference will take part in the celebration.

All the living governors of Tennessee, North Carolina, Georgia and Virginia, have been invited to participate and a number of them have signified their intentions of attending, it was said.

The pageant is called "One Hundred Years On the Saddle Bay Trail" and was written by Mrs. C. W. Turpin, head of the secular press bureau of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, with offices in Nashville, and who during the summer months conducts the work from the Southern Methodist Assembly grounds at Lake Junaluska, N. C. Mrs. Turpin is the author of other religious pageants.

SPECIALIST SAYS AMERICANS SHRINK WITH SPEEDY LIFE

Detroit, Sept. 4.—People of America have lost two inches in stature since the Civil War, according to Dr. John Harvey Kellogg, dietician and superintendent of the Battle Creek Sanitarium.

"Stunted growth is resulting from our modern 'eat and run' habits," Dr. Kellogg said. "The American public give little or no thought to the proper consumption of food. Our modern business activities are so hurried and intense as to allow no consideration for the most important element of healthful living, the proper selection and careful mastication of food consumed."

"The stature of the American people has dropped two inches in the last 60 years, due to the modern American custom of bolting our food like pythons."

"Food is fuel to the body and poor fuel means a deficient output of energy just as too much fuel chokes the fire of health and retards normal development."

"A height in stature of over six feet prevailed in the early sixties, today the average normal height in stature of the American people is much below six feet, a condition attributable to our modern quick lunch counters and hurried mode of liv-

St. Louis, Sept. 4.—Rogers Hornsby is well on his way to establish a new batting record in the National League—that of having led the circuit in hitting five consecutive seasons. The record of four consecutive seasons established by Hans Wagner from 1906 to 1909, inclusive, was equalled by Hornsby last year. This season he has topped the National League hitters virtually from the start of the campaign.

Hornsby, like Ty Cobb, Trig Specker, Johnny Evers, Grover Alexander, Eddie Collins and many other star players entered the major league company merely as a prospect and at little expense to his club. He is said to have cost the Cardinals only \$500 when he was purchased from the Lennison, Texas, club. He proved

this ability as an infielder and batter his second year in fast company and has been doing it since.
