COOLIDGE ORDERS AN INVESTIGATION IN PENNSYLVANIA

Directs Attorney General to Investigate Charges of Corruption of the Federal Office Holders

Washington, Sept. 26.—President Coolidge has turned over to Attorney General Stone for investigation the charges of the Law Enforcement League of Philadelphia that there is political corruption all down the line in Pennsylvania of federal office holders.

Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 26.—The statement which the Law Enforcement League made in a telegram to President Coolidge that it was in possession of defined and documentary evidence charging political corruption all down the line in the state of Pennsylvania by federal office holders and that it is the worst spot in the Union, is being investigated by United States Attorney General Stone by direction of President Coolidge according to information given out here today.

Deputy Fire Marshal Sherwood Brockwell will be one of the participants in the observance, it was announced, he making a trip to the city especially for that purpose.

ZR-3 WILL SOON CROSS ATLANTIC

Giant Dirigible Built for United States Government Given Enthusiastic Greeting Over Berlin

Berlin, Sept. 26.—Not since the mobilization days of 1914 have the streets of Berlin witnessed such an enthusiastic demonstration of patriotism as that which greeted the ZR-3 when the giant dirigible, set off against the early pale grey sky, majestically floated into the view of the multitudes who jammed the streets, public squares and haunts of every section of the capital this morning. From soon after dawn the crowds had been gathering to await a chance to greet the great airship built by the Zeppelin Works for the United States to be consigned to that country after a trans-Atlantic flight to Lakehurst, N. J.

Krouse Is Charged With Manslaughter Under \$500 Bond

Mr. C. M. Krouse, a young white man of this city, was arrested Wednesday on a charge of manslaughter and released under a \$500 bond for his appearance before Magistrate B. F. Tyson next Thursday morning, October 2, at 11 o'clock.

The arrest was made shortly after Mr. Krouse was dismissed from the Pitt Community hospital where he had been confined for the past several days suffering from injuries received in an automobile accident. At the same time Robert Dixon, 15, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Dixon, received fatal injuries death being instantaneous.

Mr. Krouse accompanied by young Dixon was out riding at the time of the accident. As they reached the railroad the automobile was struck by a shifting engine. Krouse who was driving managed to escape with minor injuries while the car with young Dixon was carried by the engine for a distance of several feet.

According to reports Mr. Krouse declares that he failed to see the engine until he was within six feet of it and was struck before he could stop. It is a miracle that he escaped the wreckage, but in some way he succeeded in jumping clear of the tracks before the engine struck the car.

Mr. Krouse has only been in Greenville for a short while being in the employ of the Pitt Motor Company. During his stay in Greenville he has made many friends.

Germany Protests Against French Levy Of Excessive Duties

Paris, Sept. 26.—The German Charge d'Affaires here today presented to the French government Germany's official protest against the French decree imposing a 26 per cent import duty on all goods from Germany dating from October 1. It is Germany's intention to try to induce France to cancel the levy it was made known in Berlin Tuesday.

Raleigh, Sept. 26.—The funeral of Audrey Trent, 11 years old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Trent, of this city, who died at one o'clock yesterday 30 minutes after being struck by an automobile, will be held here tomorrow afternoon at the First Baptist Church.

According to witnesses the little girl was standing with her bicycle in the center of the street waiting for traffic to clear when she was struck by an automobile which was being towed by a truck. The truck turned the corner and the towline broke the auto continuing on toward the little girl. The negro who was steering the automobile is being held pending investigation.

ROOSEVELT TENDERS HIS RESIGNATION AS SECRETARY OF NAVY

Will Leave Tonight for Oyster Bay to Prepare for His Campaign for Governor

Washington, Sept. 26.—Theodore Roosevelt, who was nominated yesterday as Republican candidate for governor of New York, called President Coolidge this morning and formally presented his resignation as Assistant Secretary of the Navy. The President immediately accepted the resignation.

An unparalleled majority for the Republican ticket for Coolidge was predicted by Roosevelt.

He will leave Washington tonight for Oyster Bay where he will be formally notified of his nomination Wednesday. As Roosevelt left the White House he met Edward A. Simmons, New York publisher, and during the conversation Simmons wrote out a check described as the first campaign contribution for the Republicans in New York.

Returning to the Navy Department Colonel Roosevelt began at once the tasks of clearing his desk. An impromptu reception followed as a line of officials and civilians who have been associated with Mr. Roosevelt for the past four years formed in his offices to present their felicitations.

Mrs. Roosevelt expects to accompany her husband on his tours of the state.

Washington Baffled By Discovery Tunnels

Washington, Sept. 26.—Tales of German spies, dark underground passages and mysterious goings on floated over Washington today following the discovery of a series of tunnels in the northwestern section close by the embassies and legations. A passing truck uncovered the entrance.

The discovery of German newspapers dated during the war period of 1917-18 brought to mind immediately the spy scares of those days and furnished some people explanations of possible values of many persons then sought. Others said the tunnels dated back to the civil war and might have been used in recent years for some of Washington's liquor supply. Still others claimed that it was nothing more than an abandoned building operation and the fact that it was formerly owned by a German chemist was nothing more than a coincidence.

Applications of Southern Railway to Be Heard Oct. 9

Raleigh, Sept. 26.—Hearings will be held by the Corporation Commission upon the application of the Southern Railway to discontinue trains numbers 108, 107, 113, 114 and to substitute on train daily in each direction between Keyville and Durham, on Thursday, October 9 at 10 a. m., it has been announced at the office of the commission here. The case was first brought before the commission on July 1 last at which time objection was made by a number citizens along the lines and the case was continued.

At the same time it was also announced that the hearing on the application of the Seaboard Airline to discontinue trains numbers 31 and 34 between Charlotte and Rutherfordton, would be held on Friday, October 10 at 10 a. m.

Hearing dates were set for two cases. These were: Edgerton Concrete Products of Wilson against the Eight Long Lines which concerns the concrete building tile between points in North Carolina. This is an exception to the order of September 2, last and will be here on Wednesday, October 8 at 10 a. m. Community Refrigerating Company, of Burlington against the Piedmont Power Company of Burlington, regarding rates for current. Time set for hearing is Thursday, October 9 at 3 p. m.

High Water Mark Along Cape Lookout Extended 1,700 Feet

Wilmington, Sept. 24.—The high water mark of the coast along Cape Lookout and the nearby inlet has extended seaward 1,700 feet since 1917 when the breakwater was completed, according to reports of C. ANY HONEST MAN WOULD DO

Grand High Priests Butler and Mondell, Slep, and the other lesser Priests of the Republican Great Sanherdrin tell us that Coolidge is the issue and that he ought to be elected because he has "character" and "honesty."

Since when did these homely virtues become the sole qualification for the high office of President? There never was, is not now, and never will be, it is reasonable to assume, a President of the United States who was not personally honest.

If that be the sole measure of a man's fitness for the office, we may as well apply the civil service test, have the applicants file their certificates of good character, and fill the job without all the noise, expense and upheaval of a political campaign every four years.

EATING YOUR CAKE AND HAVING IT TOO

"Living cost not increased by tariff," says the Republican Campaign Book of 1924 in its index, and in discussing the tariff elsewhere tells us "***** there had been a decrease in prices during the last year, throughout which the Fordney-McCumber tariff was in full force." A few lines further along, it says "the tariff cannot be held responsible for any increase in the price of particular goods since September, 1922," when the Fordney-McCumber act became effective. Again it says, speaking of the duty on sugar, "the tariff had nothing at all to do with the price advance."

The author of the above quoted lines must not have been the same individual as the

author of the chapter on "The Farmer and the Tariff" for he said, among other things: "Tariff kept price of wheat in American market above that in Canada;" "tariff kept prices of dairy products above those elsewhere in the world;" "tariff gave the United States potato grower better prices than his foreign competitor;" "sheep industry saved by tariff;" "wool growing industry faced ruin until tariff was enacted" and, "Briefly, ***** it operated to maintain a higher level of prices in the United States, for all kinds of agricultural products, than in any other country of the world."

And now, since the wooden handle has been welded to the silver spoon, since the sea is dry and the earth is wet, the sun shines by night and the moon by day, we know that black is white and that the tariff raises prices and lowers the cost of living.

"BEST MINDS" SOMETIMES CHANGE

Six months ago, President Coolidge and Secretary Mellon were denouncing the Senate Couzens Committee's proposal to investigate the Income Tax and Prohibition law Enforcement unit of the Treasury Department as an "unwarranted intrusion."

Now, Secretary Mellon is offering to cooperate with the Couzens Committee in such an investigation, and Senator Couzens, after a visit to the White House, tells Washington newspaper correspondents the President thinks the investigation may "be constructive."

What has transpired to make an inquiry that was an "unwarranted intrusion" six months ago "constructive" now?

The answer is easy: Senator Couzens has announced that the committee will not begin its investigation for another six weeks, or until after the November election.

A pre-election investigation is an "intrusion," but a post-election investigation is "constructive."

H. Q. Harsh, Secretary of the National Civil Service Reform League, makes the charge that appointees in the Prohibition Law Enforcement Unit of the Treasury Department are "chosen ***** on account of political influence and indorsements" and that many of the agents are no more fit for the jobs than a "corrupt ward politician is to be a bishop." Mr. Harsh's charge is one of a number of things the administration would rather keep quiet about until the election is over.

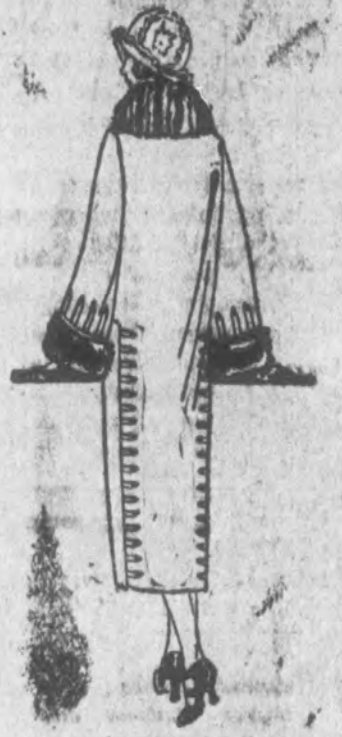

COTTON LETTER.

New Orleans, Sept. 26.—The cotton market scored a further important advance today as result of additional heavy rains in the South Atlantic states and prospects for showers and colder weather for the southwest. A revision in sentiment has taken place since yesterday due to the bullish construction placed on the government pars for the Oct. 8 Bureau forecast and because of less favorable crop accounts from the east half of the belt. The local weather Bureau reported moderate to heavy rains fell in the Atlantic states with one to four inches locally in the eastern and central portion Alabama.

In event of the government reporting a deterioration of 2 points for the last half of September the indicated crop would likely be somewhat smaller than the 12,596,000 forecasted on 23rd. If the deterioration is three or four points the indicated yield would be all the smaller by 234,000 to 468,000 bales. A further downward revision in the prospective crop to the extent of 468,000 would reduce the indicated yield to about 12,128,000 whereas the trade was talking of around 13,000,000 recently.

Such an important change in crop prospects are possible, if not probable, since the deterioration for the first half of September was 3.9 points. This development has changed the entire complexion of the prospective supply situation, creating a bullish temper in the market which was evidently oversold and accounts for the recent rapid advance in

values during the past 48 hours. A change of sentiment has also taken place in domestic textile circles, also abroad, Liverpool cabling. Spinners calling cotton largely in Liverpool. Jobbers buying. Hard to counteract prevailing bullish feeling. With prospects of wet, colder weather coming on the western half of the belt, and rains continuing in the South Atlantic, the weather outlook is unfavorable.

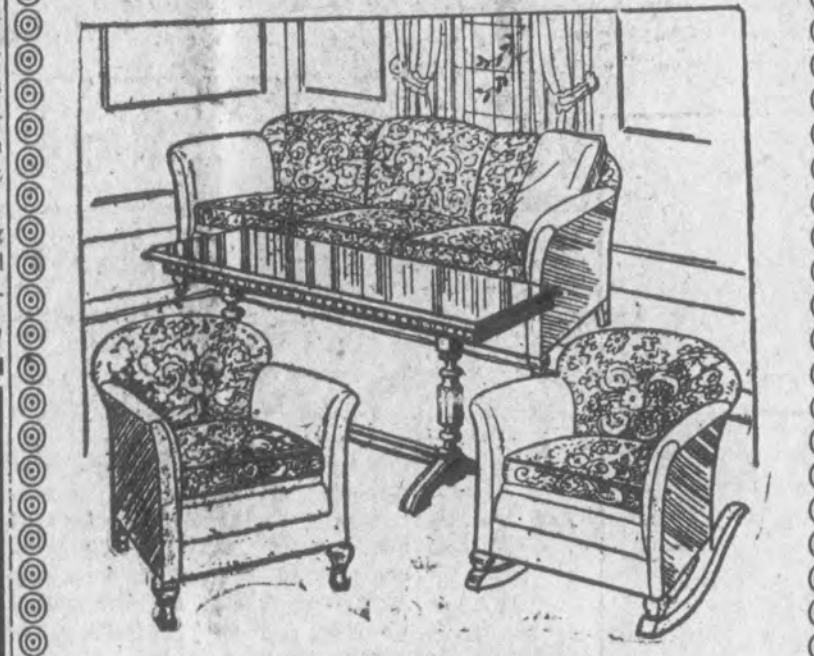
