HARRISON DECLARES REPUBLICAN VICTORY CAN MEAN ONLY CHAOS

Republican Nominee for Senate Charges the Party With Straying From Principles of Founders

Chicago, Oct. 3.—Senator Pat Harrison, Democrat, Mississippi, in an address prepared for delivery today before the Executive Club said that Colonel George Harvey, former Ambassador to Great Britain recently wrote an editorial in a Washington newspaper headed "Coolidge or Chaos" but that if the Republican presidential nominee should be elected it would be Coolidge and Chaos. The election of Robert M. LaFollette would also be followed by chaos, he asserted.

"Since the third day of August 1923 the government has floundered in a whirlpool of cross currents and diverse policies," declared the speaker, "because the lack of courage and leadership of the president has been defied by leaders of his own party in Congress in practically every instance. Whenever he woke from his sleeping silence and whispered suggestion, to Congress for action it was defied. Whenever Congress passed what in their judgment was fair, just and wise legislation, it met with a paper veto of the president. There has been a lack of co-operation between the Republican nominee and his party that has no counter part in the history of our government," said Mr. Harrison. "There is not a person in our country who does not know of the last 14 months in which we have had Coolidge and chaos. I shall pass without discussing the chaos that would follow for every interest in America if he is elected president. It is suffice to say that the same lack of co-operation between the executive and Congress would follow. The only safe and sane policy for the American electorate to ensue is to elect Davis together with a Democratic Congress. No political party in all ages has presented such purpose and unity of action as did the Democratic minority in the Senate and House last Congress. If the record in the interest of honest business and the promotion of the interests of the farmer, laboring people and consumer is to be compensated, then this militant minority should grow into a real co-ordination of high purposed majority."

Mrs. Turnage is survived by her husband, one daughter, Mrs. W. E. Brown, Atlanta, Ga., two sons, L. E. Turnage, Roanoke, Va., and Sam I. Turnage, of Wilson.

ATTACKING FORCES ARE BATTERING WAY TOWARD SHANGHAI

Defending Forces Fall Back Two Miles Before Onslaught of Ki-angsu Armies

Shanghai, Oct. 3.—An offensive for which the invading Ki-angsu forces attempting to take Shanghai have been gathering men and munitions for three days, started last night southwest of Sunkiang at a point 45 miles south of Shanghai.

The defending Chekiang troops were forced to retreat two miles to new positions after intensive firing in which both sides employed artillery.

According to an observer, the Chekiang troops were pushed back to a position 5 miles southwest of Sunkiang. The railway station at Sunkiang last night was a bedlam of terrorized residents the remnants of thousands of refugees, who had previously fled to Shanghai.

FLOODS SWEEP AWAY SOUTHERN BRIDGE

Coast Line, Southern Trains Are Rerouted From Goldsboro Because of Washouts

Goldsboro, Oct. 3.—As a result of the washing away of several culverts near the Neuse river bridge four miles south of here, Atlantic Coast Line trains are being detoured today via Wilson and Fayetteville to Wilmington.

The water of the river has risen 35 feet during the past few days but the crest of the flood was reached last night and the water is slowly receding today.

Goldsboro, Oct. 3.—All the Southern Railway trains are being detoured today over the Atlantic Coast Line railroad via Contentnea and Selma as a result of a concrete bridge over Little River a mile west of this city being washed away last night. Four carloads of coal and stone placed upon the bridge to hold it in place were also swept away. Railroad officials said today it would probably be several days before the trains resumed their normal routes.

Negro Arrested Near Henderson Today for Murder in Georgia

Henderson, Oct. 3.—T. S. Kendrick, negro, was arrested at Greystone, near here, late yesterday afternoon on a bench warrant charging murder, sworn out by Sheriff J. C. Plunkett, of Augusta, Ga. The killing is said to have taken place in Augusta, November 5, 1922. It was not learned here today who Kendrick was charged with murdering. Georgia authorities have been notified of the arrest.

Many Matters of Importance Disposed of; Donate \$100 for Decorating Streets of City During Fair Week

The Board of Aldermen met in regular session last night with the Mayor and all aldermen present, and among other things the following matters were considered and acted upon:

Rebate allowed J. L. Starkey on taxes paid on property located beyond the corporate limits of the town.

On petition of Charlie Adams, secretary, Pitt County Fair Association, \$100.00 was donated for decorating the streets for Pitt County Fair.

Attorney L. W. Gaylord, appearing for L. L. Hegner, requested the repeal of ordinance prohibiting Gasoline filling stations in the Fire District, and that permit be granted to erect filling station on the Munford property at Five Points. The motion that the request be granted upon being put to a vote, received one vote in the affirmative and seven in the negative, and was declared a loss.

C. O. Brown and Dr. L. C. Skinner, appeared and verbally petitioned for sewer on Biltmore street, stating that they would arrange for a loan of sufficient funds to the town with which to put in sewer requested. On motion the petition was granted.

C. T. Munford appeared with a petition for sewer in East Greenville on Second street, and from Second street to Third street. The matter was referred to the Sewer Committee, with power to act.

Request by W. H. Rogers, speaking for the American Legion that the Legion be allowed to insert holes in sidewalk for flag staffs, was granted.

COOLIDGE BELONGS TO WALL STREET MACHINE DECLARES BROOKHART

JAPAN TO WITHHOLD ADOPTION PROTOCOL

Government Will Give Careful Study to Conditions Before Acting Upon League Pact

Tokio, Oct. 3.—Adoption of the protocol of compulsory arbitration and security by the League of Nations Assembly now in session at Geneva does not conclude the question so far as Japan is concerned. Although it is gratifying to Japan to learn of the acceptance by the league of Baron Adachi's views, the government reserves a final decision on ratification until a thorough study has been given the subject it was stated by high official quarters here today. There is reason to believe today that Japanese interest, in China and not the immigration question will prove the greatest factor influencing the government's decision on the protocol in the last analysis.

Negroes Arrested For Robbing Store of L. B. McCormick

Joe Williams and William Davis, colored, are in the Pitt county jail awaiting trial charged with larceny. On the night of September 29, the store and cafe of Mr. L. B. McCormick was broken into and robbed of merchandise. The matter was reported to the police department and a search for the guilty parties was started immediately.

Williams and Davis with the stolen goods were located in Bethel. When questioned they stated that their homes were in Elizabeth City. They will be given a hearing Saturday morning.

Krause Given A Preliminary Hearing Thursday Morning

C. M. Krouse charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Robert Dixon, 15, which occurred a few days ago when the automobile which Mr. Krouse was driving, was struck by a shifting engine at the Norfolk and Southern crossing, was given a preliminary hearing yesterday afternoon and bound over to Superior Court which convenes on October 27th, under a bond of \$500.

At the time of the accident Mr. Krouse suffered injuries which kept him confined in the local hospital for several days.

Several witnesses were examined yesterday. Mr. Krouse did not take the stand.

Mayor D. M. Clark is counsel for the defendant.

Mississippi Senator Says Lack of Cooperation Between President and Party Spells Disaster for Country

Emmettsburg, Iowa, Oct. 3.—Senator Smith Brookhart, storm center in Iowa politics since his election two years ago, who early this week denounced Charles G. Dawes, Republican vice presidential candidate, formally opened his campaign for reelection today with an address in which he attacked President Coolidge and the machine party leaders. Replying to reports that he would support the presidential candidacy of Robert M. LaFollette, Brookhart said he had never had a thought of leaving the Republican party. The Republican party, Brookhart charged, has strayed from the ideals of its founders while the machine organization has refused to recognize the will of the people.

Referring to his own particular differences with the leaders of his party, Senator Brookhart said although he had been nominated by 200,000 Republicans without a machine and without money and was opposed by Wall Street's money and President Coolidge's power, his nomination had never been recognized by Coolidge as the voice of the Republicans in Iowa. Senator Brookhart declared Republican leaders had refused him favors because he differed from their policies on so many occasions and named a dozen issues. "I belong to the farm bloc and President Coolidge belongs to the Wall Street bloc," he declared in designating Coolidge as the machine candidate. "I have never had a thought of leaving the Republican party," he said. "My whole sole is wrapped up in the principles of Lincoln and Roosevelt. I will fight any leaders who seek to divert the party from these great principles. The issue now arises in Iowa whether the principles of the Republican party are to be determined by the voters themselves or by a small group of crooked irresponsible dictators, set up by the non-partisan league of Wall Street. This group has attacked me with renewed venom, therefore I wish to restate my position and reform my lines for a finished fight to oust this gang from control of the Republican party."

In reviewing his nomination the Senator said he had been supported principally by farmers and laboring people and had been denounced as radical by the president and his supporters. "The Republican State convention, dominated by the Coolidge machine, fought and insulted me and Coolidge newspapers all over the state with a few exceptions have bolted me and continued to denounce me and my platform approved by the voters," he declared.

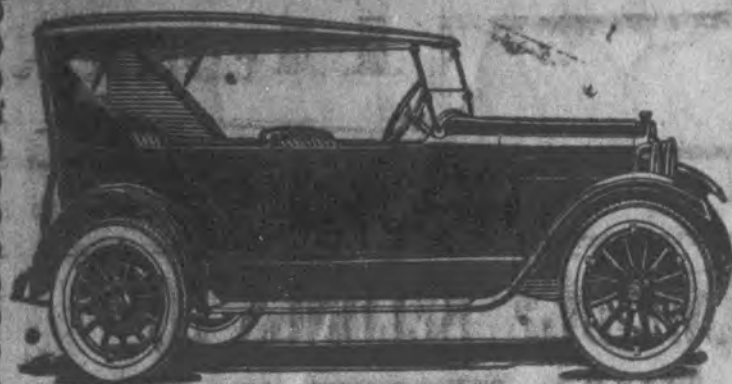
158 High School Students Gastonia In College Now

of making same into a play ground for High School girls, and that for this purpose the bill boards now located on this property be removed, was granted, and the clerk directed to notify the owners of bill boards to remove same.

Petition for curb and gutter on Cotanch street from Ninth street to 14th street being found to be signed by a sufficient number of representatives, the majority of the foot frontage, was granted, and the curb and gutter ordered put in.

Petition for curb and gutter over the town branch from 5th street to the present terminus of the culvert between Evans street and Cotanch street, was referred to the street committee for further investigation and report.

Ordinance was read and adopted regulating weights and measures of coal, copies of which will be published.

Alderman Rowlett, chairman of the fire committee in making his report for said committee, recommended five additional fire alarm boxes, and 500 feet of fire hose. Report adopted, and purchasing agent directed to make the purchase recommended.

Alderman Rowlett, for the fire committee, requested that provision be made for the celebration and demonstration of fire prevention week, and that an appropriation of \$25.00 be allowed for this purpose. On motion request was allowed, and said appropriation made.

E. W. Harvey petitioned that permit be granted the Coast Line Railroad, to extend side track across 12th street. Petition was granted.

Alderman C. S. Graves, reporting for the cemetery committee, requested that the committee be granted until the next regular meeting of board to make report, for the reason that the committee wanted to view other sites offered, and give a

hearing to the Woman's Club and other organizations of the town as well as individual citizens who might be interested, and desire to be heard, stating that the committee had made investigation and would be open to hearings up to the time of the next regular meeting of the board, which is the first Thursday in November, at which time a final hearing will be had for the benefit of the whole board. Committee's report was adopted.

Motion adopted that the condition of the hedge around the High School building, with special reference to the dangers of driving around corner on account of condition of said hedge. After considerable discussion, motion was unanimously adopted that Mr. Rose and the school board be notified to trim hedge down to a height of 4 feet within a period of 30 days, and that if this was not done by the school authorities, that the town authorities would proceed to cut hedge accordingly.

Motion unanimously adopted that the condition of the alley between Evans and Washington

street, and running through 4th street to 5th street, to-wit, the mud hole in said alley be declared a nuisance, and that the persons owning said alley be required to move said nuisance by filling up said mud hole by putting in sufficient drain pipes to carry the water off, within 30 days after notice, and that if this is not done, the town to proceed to remove said nuisance and prorate expense of same to the property owners, to be collected as taxes.

PROGRESS LEVELS FAMOUS BUILDINGS NEAR CHARING CROSS

London, Oct. 1.—The changes of time and the steady blows of the pickaxe have sent another London landmark to destruction in a cloud of dust. This was the building at 34 Cockspur Street which for generations housed the establishment of a famous London clockmaker.

Fixed to the front of this building was a great white-faced clock surrounded by a time-ball, and very old Londoners recall that riding to the war office of a morning from his home in Piccadilly, the Duke of Wellington would draw rein to correct his timepiece by the one which hung out high over the street. And now the old clock with its time-ball, which became a landmark to Londoners of a succeeding generation who, on foot or on buses, could view it from the far side of Trafalgar Square, has disappeared with the demolition of which it was so long a part.

The passage of time has brought strange changes to this part of London which became known as Charing Cross after King Edward I erected a Gothic cross there to mark the spot where his Queen's coffin rested in the thirteenth century, when the royal funeral procession halted on its way to Westminster Abbey.

Why Cockspur Street came to be so named no antiquary appears to be able to say for certain. Conjecture has it that it was because of a fancied connection with the 'mew', adjoining the celebrated 'Cock Tavern' where Samuel Pepys, who described it in his diary as "a great ordinary mightily cried up," dined Mrs. Turner, Betty and Talbot Pepys, Sir Dennis Gauden, and Gibson, and they were "mighty merry, this house being famous for meat and particularly pease-porridge."

In later days Tobias Smollett was in the habit of frequenting "a small tavern in the corner of Cockspur Street" called the Golden Ball, "where we had a frugal supper and a little punch, as the finances of none of the company were in very good order."

Irish Free State Imports \$109.387,465 More Exports

Dublin, Oct. 3.—The total value of the imports of the Irish Free State during the first six months of this year was about \$167,391,000, while the value of the exports was \$109,387,465.

Of the exports, Great Britain took nearly \$18,500,000, and Northern Ireland a little more than \$15,000,000. United States is third on the list of recipients of Free State products, the total being \$489,000. From America the Free State took goods to the value of \$8,956,755, or nearly 20 times as much as it sold to America.

The Free State exports consisted for the greatest part of cattle, sheep, pigs, butter and eggs. In the six months the Free State bought nearly \$3,000,000 worth of touring motor cars.

GEISHA GIRLS WANT TO AID NATION'S AVIATION PROGRAM

Tokio, Oct. 2.—Public interest in aviation in Japan, stimulated by the flights of American, British and French aviators to and across Japan during recent months, and also by the army and navy propaganda for larger air forces, is turning into practical contributions to the cause of aviation expansion.

There have been several contributions for this purpose recently, and not long ago 15 geisha girls, living in the fashionable Shimabashi geisha district, applied for membership in the Imperial Aviation association, the organization which is fostering civilian support for the army and navy expansion programs. The girls sent a note to the association's headquarters saying they wanted to see aviation in Japan developed enough to make possible a Japanese flight around the world.

Venerable English Fanes Succumb To Wood Boredoms

Peterborough, England, Oct. 2.—Peterborough Cathedral, the great Norman fane which was spared by Henry VIII when he was demolishing church property because it held the grave of his first wife, the ill-starred Katharine of Aragon, has fallen a victim of the death-watch beetle.

The 800th anniversary of the foundation of this structure, whose west front has often been described as the finest portico in Europe, was celebrated ten years ago. Now it has been discovered that the death-watch beetle, for how long it is unknown, has been silently eating away the interior of the great oaken beams in the roof spaces of the choir, nave and transepts. So great have been the beetle's ravages that the whole roof structure is in danger of collapse.

The dean of the Cathedral has launched an appeal for \$50,000 to remedy the defect. Probably an even greater sum will be needed for the work. This is not the first ancient English structure to be endangered by the death-watch beetle. Its ravages have been discovered in dozens of the old Tudor and Norman roofs. Westminster Hall, built by William Rufus, was reopened only last year, having been closed for eight years while craftsmen replaced the work of the mediaeval carpenters which had been gradually eaten away by the destructive beetle.

The roof of Henry VIII's banqueting hall at Hampton Court Palace is now undergoing similar treatment for the same defect. It all shows what constant vigilance has to be exercised in preserving and renewing the ancient English fabrics. There is hardly an English cathedral which has not a force of masons constantly at work replacing decayed and weather-worn stone.

BUENOS AIRES RESPONDS FREELY TO BUY ZANNI NEW SEAPLANE

Buenos Aires, Oct. 2.—Patriotic enthusiasm over the around-the-world flight of the Argentine aviator, Major Pedro Zanni, was so great that when it was announced that funds were needed to purchase another seaplane for his transatlantic flight, it only took a few days to collect a "barrel" of money.

The barrel was placed at a busy street corner where people could drop in their contributions. When opened at a theatre before a larger audience it was found to contain nearly 60,000 pesos, mostly in peso bills. Subscriptions opened by news papers raised the sum to 100,000 pesos, nearly all of it having been collected after the loss of Zanni's land plane at Haoni, and where it was not certain whether he would continue his flight after arriving in Japan.

KNOCKING DOWN STRAWMEN

Republican campaign orators do not dare to discuss the chief issue of this campaign—Honest Government versus Corrupt Government—because to do so would involve discussion of all of the scandalous events and corrupt transactions of the Harding-Coolidge administration.

They do not dare to discuss the traffic issue, which Mr. Coolidge has declared in favor of, because to do so would be to admit the Republican administration's responsibility for the scandals and corrupt practices. They prefer to repeat Mr. Coolidge's statement that "guilt is personal," which is in conflict with "party responsibility."

They do not dare to discuss the tariff issue in detail, because that would show that the protected interests are permitted under the Fordney-McCumber tariff bill to tax the people \$6,000,000,000 annually, and that they actually levy a tax of \$4,000,000,000, of which \$3,500,000,000 goes into the pockets of the protected interests—a sum larger than the cost of running the entire government.

They do not dare to discuss the question of income taxation and recent tax legislation, because that would involve an admission that the tax reduction granted by the Sixty-seventh and the Sixty-eighth Congresses was a Democratic reduction, brought about by the combined effort of Democrats and Progressive Republicans.

Unable to discuss the real issues of the campaign because all the facts and logic are against them, they resort to the time-worn method of creating fictitious issues and manufacturing strawmen who can easily be knocked over or torn to pieces. For instance, Mr. Herbert Hoover is raising denunciations of government ownership, which is not an issue, and for which no one is seriously contending. Candidate Coolidge and Candidate Dawes are attacking imaginary enemies of the Constitution, while the worst that has been proposed by any one has been to add another amendment to the nineteen amendments already adopted—a slow and uncertain process.

Before the campaign is over we may confidently expect that these reactionary spokesmen will administer a rebuke to someone, or who expresses a doubt about the nebular

hypothesis—anything to avoid discussing the issues of the campaign about which the people are thinking, and which so vitally affect their welfare.

TWO SIDES

There are two sides to every question. This is just as true in advertising as in an argument. In advertising there is the side of the advertiser and the side of the public.

From the viewpoint of the advertiser in the newspaper, advertising is a means of increasing his volume of business. Commercial development has made advertising as necessary to retail business as customers. Without customers the advertiser could not remain in business, so he advertises to attract customers.

The other side of the question is that of the public. To the public newspaper advertising means the bringing of the store show cases to the office and living room. It is a service extended to the public by the advertiser, because it aids the customer in ascertaining where that which is wanted can be purchased at the most advantageous price. Newspaper advertising has abolished shop-searching. To save time for the shopper lengthens his day.

So although there are two sides to newspaper advertising, there is no disagreement between the two. Finding that advertising serves the public as well as business the merchant has two reasons instead of one for advertising, and the customer learns that the most progressive merchants are the most extensive advertisers, so there is a double attraction. By the nature of business, if advertising didn't help the buying public it could not help the advertiser.

Secretary of the Navy Wilbur makes speech to the Laundry Owners' Association in Washington. A good place for laundrymen to work, and a very proper place for the Secretary to take the administration's linen.

Even Harry Daugherty has rushed to the defense of the Constitution, which shows that the Constitution is in no need of friends.

Secretary Wilbur has now joined the "Keep Quiet With Coolidge Club," of which the President is a life member. Former Secretaries Fall and Denby are charter members, still in good standing, but Harry Daugherty has been kicked out for talking.

Speaker Gillett says the corruption in the Harding-Coolidge administration was an "accident." The people will take out an insurance policy against another such accident when they go to the polls Nov. 4, next.

It is confidently predicted that Secretary of the Navy Wilbur will not be a member of the Cabinet after March 4, next, regardless of who is President.

"Never was a party entitled to confront an election with more pride and confidence than we this year," asserted Speaker Gillett in his speech before the Massachusetts G. O. P. convention. Reversing the old order, this is pride after a Fall.

British Troops Suppress Arabas Transjordan

Jerusalem, Oct. 3. — The fierce Wahabites of the desert are again on the war-path and affairs in the land beyond Jordan are in a turmoil. It is reported that 10,000 of these Bedouin Arabs arrived within three hours of Amman, the seat of Emir Abdallah's government, when they were met by British airplanes and armored cars and mowed down by the hundreds, before they turned their horses' heads toward the desert from which they came. It was only the arrival of the British forces from Palestine that saved the Emir's government from being completely wiped out, and all trans-Jordania from being over-run by these men of the desert who behead men, women and children.

In the three short years of its existence the Sharif's government, under the direction of his son Abdallah, has demonstrated its incapacity. As far as peace and safety are concerned, the land was probably better off under the Turks. It is reported, when two men have a difference, that the first man to reach the Emir and place his hand inside the Emir's belt, according to an ancient custom, thereby gains the protection of the prince, and the other man can do nothing against him.

The English government already has cut to one-half its appropriation for the support of the Sharif's government, as it found that most of the money was used for the support of the royal retinue without any reference to the needs of the country.

The Wahabites are the reform party of the Arab Mohammedans. They do not smoke or drink coffee, nor do they reverence holy places. They live in tents and are strictly nomadic. They are violently opposed to the government of King Hussein and wish to overthrow him and make their own chief king of all Arabia.

This is not the first time that the British forces in Palestine have had to go to the support of the inefficient government beyond Jordan.

Naval Schools in South Will Open This Month

Washington, Oct. 3. — The first courses in the newly established schools for reserve naval officers will be operative in October at George Washington University, Washington, D. C., and St. John's College, Annapolis, Md., with half a dozen institutions in line for similar co-operative effort. Among those proffering assistance is the University of Seattle.

Planned along the general line of the R. O. T. C. of the army, the navy schools are designed to furnish select and trained material for the commissioned reserve. It is expected that the privilege of participating in the practice cruise made each summer by the academy classes to European ports will be a strong incentive to civilian students.

The courses will cover the regular four year tuition of the college student, at least three hours a week on naval subjects being required the first year. Subjects included in this classification will be credited toward the university degree.

Students electing the naval course will be enrolled as midshipmen, naval reserve and upon completion will be commissioned as reserve ensigns. While on active duty the midshipmen will receive the pay of their grade, amounting to \$39.00 per month. The first uniform outfit will be furnished gratis. Upon graduation, the officer will receive two months' full pay annually, regardless of whether called to duty or not.

Stamp Collectors Flock to Send Letters on ZR-3

Friedrichshafen, Oct. 3. — In his flights across the Atlantic the ZR-3 will carry 200 pounds of mail which has accumulated at the Friedrichshafen post office since last July, when the German postal authorities made the first announcement that post cards and letters might be sent to North and South America and Canada by the dirigible route. The mail will be made up chiefly of cards and letters sent at the request of the collectors of postage stamps. In many instances Americans in Germany have sent letters addressed to themselves.

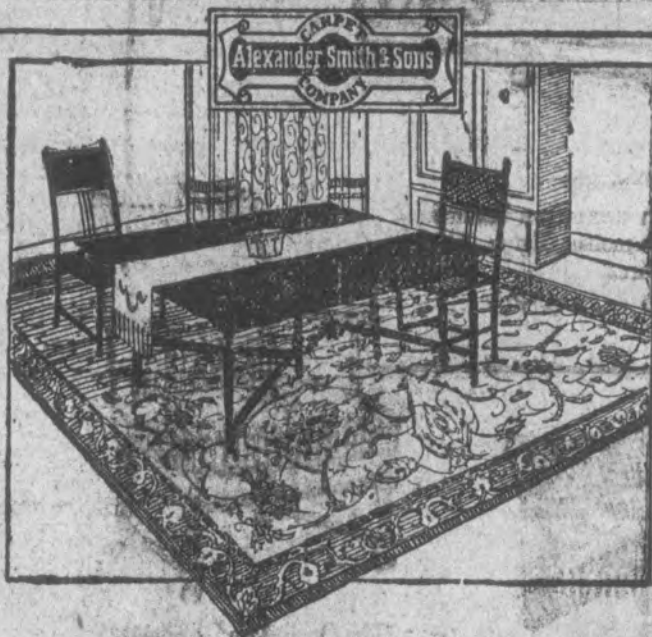

EDUCATION ONLY WAY TO STOP EYE MISHAPS, REPORT

New York, Oct. 2.—The greatest possibilities for the elimination of the unnecessary eye hazards of industrial occupations lie in education, according to the National Committee for the Prevention of Blindness, which has been studying the question of eye hazards over a period of two years. The committee's labors have extended into practically every industry and every state in the union, and its report is a document of 250 pages. "There should be education of the state as to its moral and economic obligations," the report declares. "Education of the employer as to the desirability, from his own point of view, of supplying adequate protection for the eyes of his employees; and education of the employee, particularly the old-fashioned and so-called hard-boiled employee, as to the necessity of using that protection when it is provided."

"Some states do not yet require even the reporting of industrial accidents. Others require such reports, but make no effort to set up safety standards of lighting and sanitation codes for the guidance or observance of their industries."

Discussing the necessity for education of the employer, the committee says:

"Many employers of labor still need to be convinced that it is cheaper to prevent eye accidents than to pay for them; that it is false economy to use cheap goggles; that the wearing of goggles or other head protection in dangerous operations should be made an absolute condition of employment. Except in comparatively few cases, the prevention of accidents is considered of secondary importance."

"The result of this situation is that for every plant doing effective safety

work a hundred are shirking their responsibility. Indeed few employers are giving as serious attention to accidents—their cost, the possibility of preventing them, and the profits which can be made through such preventive work, as to the cost of labor, raw materials and other items in the manufacturing process."

Developing the idea that it is cheaper to prevent accidents than to pay for them, the committee says:

"The report growing out of the survey of waste in industry, which was conducted by the Federated American Engineering Societies, shows an estimated loss of 158,000,000 days as the result of non-fatal accidents occurring in industry in one year. On the extremely conservative estimate of \$1.50 a day as the average compensation paid to workmen for the time lost due to accidents, there is a loss to employers of \$237,000,000 a year as the result of non-fatal accidents alone. It is conservatively estimated, also, that eye accidents constitute 10 per cent of all non-fatal industrial accidents. On the basis of these estimates it appears that the loss to industry through eye accidents, is in excess of \$23,000,000 yearly. No employer or industrial manager who is aware of these facts will question the assertion that it is cheaper to prevent eye accidents than to pay for them."

In the case of the employee, particularly the older employee, the committee points out that "it is necessary to overcome the resistance against goggle wearing resulting from many years of working without such protection; it is necessary to overcome, in many cases, false pride and the belief that the wearing of goggles is an indication of cowardice or of approaching old age; it is necessary, most of all, to overcome the reluctance to try something new."
