Congleton; S. O. Worthington succeeds S. L. Bridgers as chaplain; A. B. Corey was re-elected service officer, which G. C. Webb succeeds James Allen, sergeant at arms.

Plans for the club house were discussed and a committee appointed to make final arrangements. Over \$600.00 were pledged at last night's meeting.

A public installation of officers will feature the December meeting of the Post.

Baby Clinic Held in Bethel Friday

One of the very best clinics that the Maternity and Infancy unit of the Pitt County Health Department has had so far was held in Bethel on Friday, November 14th.

The Health Officer Dr. C. L. Outland, with Dr. Byrd of the State Board of Health, assisted by Drs. Garrington and Hemmingway examined forty-five babies under six years of age, and advised the mothers in regard to any condition needing treatment. The plan of the work is to simply advise at the clinics. The mothers are urged to take their babies to their family physicians for any treatments which may be necessary. The Woman's Club of the town of Bethel assisted in this clinic and due recognition is given for their valuable service. It is planned to make this a regular monthly clinic and the doctors of Bethel will hold it.

The county Maternity and Infancy nurse, Miss Lillie Fontress, will be in the field from time to time and is always ready and prepared to give mothers advice in regard to their children. The idea in putting this work on is to try to find defects and have them corrected before the children enter school so that when they start to school they are ready to go on with their work without being handicapped.

This week a clinic will be held in Grifton and one in Greenville shortly. Already we have had clinics in Farmville and Ayden.

CARDINAL LOGUE PRIMATE, IRELAND DIED EARLY TODAY

Deceased Cardinal Was Great Admirer of American Institution

Belfast, Ireland, Nov. 19.—Cardinal Logue, Primate of Ireland, is dead. Death occurred at 6 o'clock this morning. He died at his residence in Armagh.

There has been no previous intimation of the Cardinal's illness and news of his death has caused great shock throughout Ireland.

Arch Bishop O'Donnell the Cardinal's co-adjutor, who lives at Dundalk, has left for the late cardinal's home.

Cardinal Logue was a great admirer of the American institution although he disliked its republican principles which he discussed freely with the late Colonel Roosevelt on one or two visits to America.

Coming Congress May Not Act Upon Farm Relief Legislation

Washington, Nov. 19.—Early action at the coming short session of Congress on farm relief legislation appeared improbable today in view of announcement by farm bloc leaders that the agricultural repression has been somewhat relieved and the decision of the agriculture commission named by President Coolidge to investigate and recommend steps for stabilizing industry to recess after today's session for three or four weeks.

Representative Tincher, Republican of Kansas, spokesman for the House farm bloc, announced after a conference with Senator Curtis, Republican of the same state, that no effort would be made to press farm legislation at the impending session before the president's commission reports.

Expect Early Action in Income Tax Cases

Washington, Nov. 19.—The right of newspapers to publish income tax returns made public under the 1924 Revenue Act is to be determined by court action in a number of cases covering various aspects of the question.

The names of the newspapers involved still were withheld today and other specific information is being kept secret at the Department of Justice.

Indications were however that in at least one of the cases indictment is expected this week or early next week.

CALIFORNIA FACES CIVIL WAR AS RESULT WATERCONTROVERSY

Authorities Declare Owens Valley Situation Cannot Be Settled Without Loss Life and Property

Independence, Cal., Nov. 19.—Friction between two types of passive resistance incident to the seizure south of here of the Los Angeles aqueduct threatens to plunge this part of California into civil war Inyo county authorities said today.

Since they diverted the Los Angeles chief source of water supply into Owens Lake last Sunday, approximately 100 Owens Valley ranchers have waited quietly unarmed for forces to oust them. Los Angeles in turn, has contented itself with court action. The ranchers, according to authorities, are now in no mood to give up their fight.

"I am thoroughly convinced that unless troops intervene there will be amazing loss of life and destruction of property," said Jesse Hesman, district attorney.

Sheriff Collins, of Inyo county said, "I am powerless. If I attempt to move the ranchers it will mean the loss of life and the dynamiting of miles of the aqueduct. The ranchers are not armed now but I know that enough arms are available in the valley to supply 175 men and women with weapons within an hour. At least a score of women are holding themselves in readiness to bear arms and they are not novices. They can shoot straight."

Unskilled Labor Continues in Demand Throughout the State

Raleigh, Nov. 19.—Unskilled labor continues to be in demand throughout the state while skilled labor with the exception of a demand for brick layers in Charlotte, goes into the surplus column, according to the report of the State-Federal employment service for the week ending, Saturday, November 15, made public here today. However the boom in placements started some eight weeks ago is still on the go and the number was kept above the 600 mark during the past with a total number of placements of 638 of which 514 were men and 124 were women.

"Drifters" are frequenting the offices of the Service over the state, the compiled report shows, but despite this difficult factor, business of the department continues to operate to the satisfaction of the employer. Registrations totaled 782 of which 589 were men and 195 were women, says the report while there were requests for 650 men and 140 women or a total of 790 persons. To these were referred 548 men and 154 women or a total of 702 applicants.

Classification of placements were given to be skilled 70; unskilled, 429, clerical, 32; industrial, 1; and domestic, 106.

Placements by cities were stated as follows: Asheville, 109; Charlotte, 91; Greensboro, 109; Raleigh, 83; Wilmington, 127; and Winston-Salem, 119.

Wilmington reports a bright outlook for the coming week and month as that office already has a number of requests for unskilled laborers for construction work to start soon. Winston-Salem also reports a bright outlook on the same conditions.

Clerical workers remain in the surplus column as usual with Winston-Salem reporting many young girls seeking employment in that line of work.

Shipping Board Freighter Reported As Safe Now

Boston, Nov. 19.—The navy yard here received a message today that the Shipping Board freighter West Inskip, bound from Antwerp to Boston was proceeding toward Boston. The vessel's S. O. S. call at midnight was explained as due to engine trouble which had now been repaired.

AN ATTEMPT TO KILL HEAD EGYPT ARMY MADE THIS MORNING

Bombs Thrown at Major General Sir Lee Stack As He Drove From War Ministry

Cairo, Egypt, Nov. 19.—Two bombs, one of which exploded were thrown at Major General Sir Lee Stack, sirdar of the Egyptian army, while he was driving from the War Ministry today. General Stack was also attacked with revolver shots and badly wounded in the stomach three bullets striking him. He was immediately removed to a hospital.

Beside General Stack, his Aide, his chauffeur and a policeman were hit.

The assailant made his escape. The attack began with the throwing of a bomb which hit General Stack's motor as he was driving in it from the War Ministry. The bomb hit the machine but failed to explode falling into the gutter. The assailant ran after the car firing with a revolver. The bullets began to fly so thick and fast that a passerby in a passing street car were forced to take cover.

MOTION PICTURE PRODUCER DEAD

Thomas H. Ince, Famous Producer, Died of Heart Attack This Morning

Hollywood, Cal., Nov. 19.—Thomas H. Ince, nationally known motion picture producer died of heart trouble at 5:30 this morning at his home in the Hollywood foothills, it was announced at his Culver City studio.

He became ill on a trip to San Diego and was taken from the train at Delmar Monday night and brought to his home here last night. The attack was sudden, he having been active in his motion picture work up until the time he was stricken.

Athens Authorities War On Salonica Profiteers, Report

Salonica.—The prison population of Salonica has been considerably increased in the past few months by the application of a drastic anti-profiteering law by the war department at Athens.

The scale of prices in Salonica is determined twice a week at a meeting of the price commission, made up of merchants selected by the Chamber of Commerce. The schedules permit profits of from five percent on flour and sugar to 20 percent on silks, luxury furniture, fancy leather goods and perfumes.

This schedule of profits is enforced by the police, under the orders of the price commission. The police are under the command of the war department, and soldiers are available in case the police are unable to do their work.

The price commission superintends the purity of foods, as well as the price at which they are sold. Recently a miller accused of adulterating wheat flour with corn was tried and found guilty by the price commission functioning as a court. He was fined one million drachmae and sentenced to six months in jail.

Lumberton Man Arrested Today on Bigamy Charge

Moultrie, Ga., Nov. 19.—Austin Walters, tobacco buyer, of Lumberton, North Carolina, was arrested today on a charge of bigamy. The warrant was sworn out by D. W. Franks, father of Lulu Franks, whom Walters is charged with marrying in New Bern, N. C., on November 6, although he is alleged to have a living undivorced wife in London.

Dr. Hubert Potat Named On Masonic Service Commission

Wake Forest, Nov. 19.—At a meeting of the Masonic Service Association in Chicago last week Dr. H. M. Potat, head of the Latin department in Wake Forest College and former grand master of the Masonic order of North Carolina, was named as representative from the South Atlantic States on the executive commission of the body. Even men representing the masonic order over the United States make up the commission. North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia, West Virginia, District of Columbia, Maryland, and Delaware comprise the territory represented by Dr. Potat. The Wake Forest man was also named on the executive committee of three.

SCHOOLBOY KILLED, MANY HURT WHEN TRUCK OVERTURNS

Spartanburg, S. C., Nov. 19.—A 10 year old school boy was killed and five other children were seriously injured when the bus in which 25 school children were riding overturned near Saluda, North Carolina, late yesterday afternoon according to reports received here.

Howard Thompson, 10 years old, was killed instantly when caught in the wreckage of the heavy machine. Those seriously injured were Grady Glenn, Rogers Foster, Jenny Bishop and George Smith, all under 12 years old. A number of others received painful but not serious injuries.

Ralph Talant, who was driving the bus, disappeared after the accident and searchers had found no trace of him, it was reported.

All the children attended the Tryon Mountain school.

McAllister Acquitted of Murder Indictment

New York, Nov. 19.—Robert F. McAllister, former national indoor sports champion, today was acquitted on a murder indictment growing out of the shooting of Vincent Figliera last August. The jury deliberated only 23 minutes.

Mrs. Harding "Quite Weak and Exhausted"

Marion, Ohio, Nov. 19.—Mrs. Warren G. Harding, was "quite weak and exhausted" said a bulletin issued this morning by her physician. He said Mrs. Harding was taking a little nourishment but that her heart action was poor.

Frogs Delay Storcks.

Rositten, Prussia.—The storcks of eastern Prussia have as yet given no indication of starting their regular southern migration, and the time of their customary departure is well past.

The abundance of frogs along the shores of the Baltic is given as the reason for the strange behavior of the birds.

Arbitration treaties with Germany and Norway have been signed, and others probably will follow soon.

Chicago, Nov. 19.—The condition of General Charles G. Dawes, vice-president elect, who is recovering from an operation, continues to improve, according to announcement of his surgeon. All danger is now passed and the patient may be able to leave the hospital next week, the report said.

PRESIDENT OF U. D. C. ADDRESSES MEETING AT TODAY'S SESSION

Educational Work By Daughters is Most Important of Undertakings, She Declares

Savannah, Ga., Nov. 19.—Submission of her report by Mrs. Frank Harold, of Americus, Ga., president general, in which educational work was stressed and delivery of an address by Hollins Randolph, of Atlanta, president of the Stone Mountain Memorial Association, were the principal features of today's business session of the United Daughters of Confederacy Thirty First Annual Convention.

On introducing her report Mrs. Harold called attention to the convention of the organization held here 10 years ago adding that "marvelous growth and development and added strength" had been accomplished since then.

"Probably the most important part of our work as an organization" she continued, is that which touches upon the education of children.

are to see the ideals for which we stand made permanent and our work go forward we must instruct our children during their early years of life. Thus will be build the future of the association, the future of the south in history and civilization. Last year the amount for educational work reported by your chairman of education of the organization was \$304,000 she pointed out. The speaker called attention to the fact that \$10,000 left organization by Hector W. Church, a Union soldier, for commemoration of General Robert E. Lee, General Jubal Early, General John Gordon and President Jefferson Davis, had been divided into scholarship funds. An additional \$2,000 had been donated by the organization and the Hector W. Church scholarship created; she said.

"Your Recording Secretary reports 38 new chapters have been organized and chartered during 1924," she continued. Four of the chapters, were in North Carolina.

Mrs. Harold in speaking of the work of the Children of the Confederacy, under the direction of Mrs. Charles Wallace, third vice president general, declared that the results showed constructive and energetic service fully worthy of "our unstinted support." "Fifty nine new chapters and 2,661 new members, were added to the ranks of the Children of the Confederacy during the year," she said.

In mentioning the growth of the organization Mrs. Harold said there are now chapters in 58 states and one in Paris, France.

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The provisions concerning rules and constitution of the arbitration committee in the agreement with Norway are drawn up in conformity with Sweden's proposal before the League of Nations in 1920. The two parties pledge themselves to submit to a permanent conciliation committee all disputes of whatever nature which cannot, within a reasonable period, be settled through the usual diplomatic channels and which are not to be submitted to the permanent International Court.

The Swedish treaty with Germany is similar but has a codicil to the effect that in case Germany joins the permanent Court of International Arbitration at the Hague or becomes a member of the League of Nations the settlement of disputes shall be transferred to the world court.

British Employers Decry the Handicap Imposed by Drink

London—While it is generally admitted that drunkenness has greatly decreased in Great Britain since 1914 there is still much room for improvement, according to some of the country's employers of labor.

At a luncheon of the Business Mens (National Commercial Temperance) League, Sir Dyon Mallinson, head of a firm of cotton brokers, said England could be the envy of the world but for the handicap imposed by the drink habit. Sir R. Murray Hyslop, an employer of 40,000 workers, testified to the extremely practical work of the National Commercial Temperance League.

For every 20 shillings spent on education in England, this speaker said, 70 shillings was spent on drink. Drunkenness had decreased, but the picture was marred by the fact that clubs had sprung up where public houses had disappeared. He expressed admiration for America's courage in adopting prohibition.

membership of the National Association at Women's Clubs have appealed to the Reichstag for modification of the German marriage and divorce laws. The petition especially asks a modification of the clause of the divorce law which provides that insanity shall be a ground for divorce only after it has continued for three years during the marriage, and has been pronounced incurable by experts.

Divorce on the ground of "mutual agreement," or "insuperable aversion," is also advocated by the clubwomen in cases where a couple has been married for five years and has lived apart for two years.

THREE-ROUND BOXING MATCHES APPARENTLY POPULAR IN DENVER

Denver, Colo.—Denver is said to be the only city that has three-round boxing. Longer distance bouts, ten, twelve and fifteen-round affairs, were offered until about two years ago, when District Attorney Phillip Van Cise clamped down the lid on such contests. Later he granted permission for three-round matches, allowing a fourth round if necessary to determine a victor.

The district attorney warned the promoters that contestants must not be paid more than \$35. Mills longer than four rounds or those where the pugilists receive more than the stipulated amount he construes as "prize fights." Two hundred Swiss waiters will be sent to certain approved London and English resort hotels with the definite idea of learning the English language and methods, and a similar number of English waiters will be sent to Switzerland. It is possible that all classes of hotel servants, including cooks and chambermaids, will be included in this year's quota.

Oakland, Calif.—The oldest voter registered in Alameda county for the

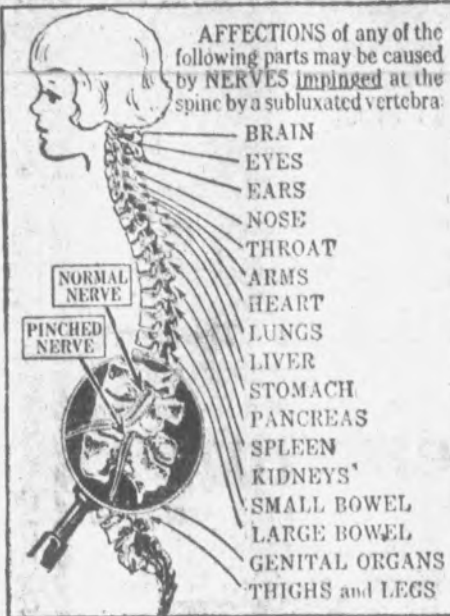

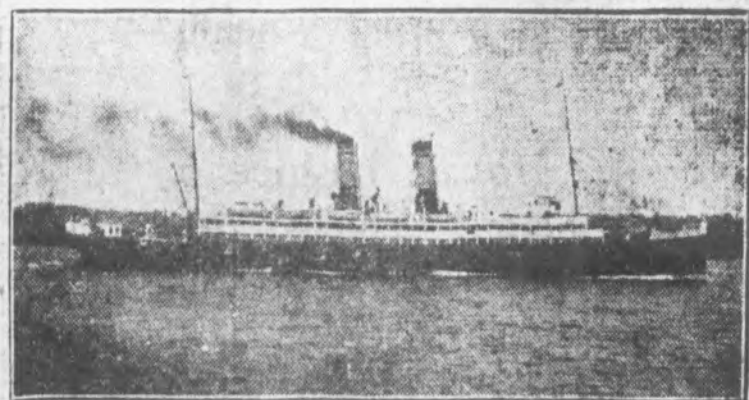

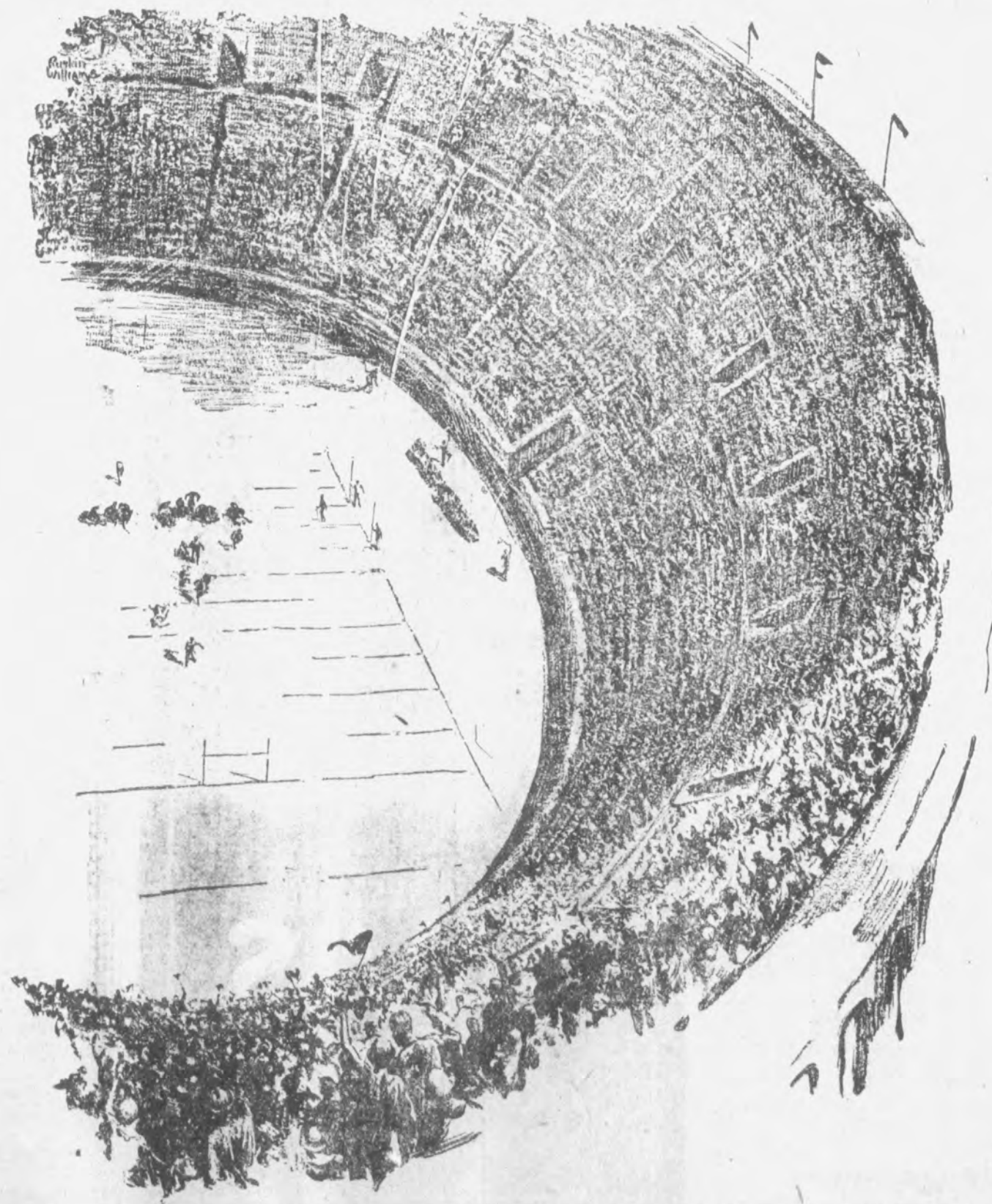

Washington wires—"Final crop estimate will be issued as usual Dec. 8th. New Orleans exports today 27,000 vs. 6,000. New Orleans cotton easier owing realizing. Semi-weekly. Receipts 218,000 vs. 140,000 shipments 711,000 vs. 115,000. Stocks increased 7,000 vs. 25,000. Total stock 974,000 vs. 816,000. In face of heavy receipts inland, interior stocks increased for week only 7,000 vs. 25,000 last year and 21,000 in 1922 owing heavy shipments nearly 100,000 larger than last year, indicating heavy movements in transit to domestic mills and to tide water for export.

Dallas, Texas—Plenty of cotton still to be picked between Houston and Dallas. Top crops has opened and will amount to considerable.

Cotton receipts at all ports 64,123 vs. 37,270 since Aug first 4,228,748 vs. 3,396,836. Exports 26,519 vs. 5,633 since Aug first 2,705,542 vs. 2,172,428. menaced and crop totals already have been greatly reduced, it was pointed out during the discussions, because many villages and individuals who have been awarded lands have been unable to work them as a result of inability to buy machinery and finance themselves until their first crops are sold. Thus great districts, once productive, are now neglected and abandoned, notably in the state of Morelos, once one of the richest states in the republic.

SWEDISH-AMERICAN MADE INCREASES ON BOTH SIDES

Stockholm.—American imports to Sweden have increased from about 10 per cent of the country's total before the war to 25 percent for 1923. The 1923 imports amounted to 213,700,000 crowns.

Among the largest imports from the United States are automobiles, which last year amounted to about 23,000,000 crowns in value, while percol and tires imported represented twice that sum.

The Swedish exports to the United States have also increased from about 4 percent of the total Swedish exports in 1913 to 11 percent last year, amounting to 128,000,000 crowns. Paper, the principal item of export to the United States, is now eight times as much as exported in 1913.
