COOPER DRAWS SENTENCE EIGHT YEARS

Egypt Must Pay For Death Of Governor General

THOMAS E. COOPER, FOUND GUILTY OF VIOLATION OF THE STATE BANKING LAWS

**Banker Must Reimburse
Creditors and Depositors
of Defunct Bank
\$155,000 and Meet
Other Conditions Or
Serve on Roads**

Wilmington, Nov. 22.—Thomas E. Cooper, president of the defunct Liberty Savings Bank, was today sentenced by Judge Henry A. Grady in Superior Court here, to serve eight years on the roads of New Hanover county. He was found guilty of violating the state banking laws by a jury this morning.

Judge Grady in imposing the sentence agreed to withhold the capias until December 30 if Cooper would comply with the following conditions: That Cooper shall before December 30 reimburse creditors and depositors of the Liberty Savings Bank of an amount involving approximately \$155,000 and providing he will resign at once from the Board of Education of New Hanover county.

Judge Grady fixed Cooper's appearance bond at \$25,000.

Wilmington, Nov. 22.—Thomas E. Cooper, former president of the defunct Liberty Savings Bank, of this city today was found guilty of violation of the state banking laws by a jury in Superior Court.

Joseph C. Kourk, former cashier of the bank, on trial jointly with Cooper was acquitted.

Judge Henry A. Grady, who presided at the trial announced that sentence would be imposed at 2:30 this afternoon.

The jury held that Cooper was guilty on four misdemeanor counts in connection with transactions in handling the affairs of the defunct Liberty Savings Bank. A Kourk was indicted on the same counts and the cases were tried together the jury finding the former cashier not guilty.

Cooper, the brother of Lieutenant Governor W. B. Cooper, was president of the Liberty Bank which closed its doors about two years ago. He had also been connected with the Merchants' Bank, of Raleigh, and the Commercial National Bank, of Wilmington.

The case went to the jury at 5:30 yesterday afternoon after a trial that lasted for nearly two weeks. It deliberated until 11:30 last night when Judge Grady ordered it locked up for the night.

This morning after a short period of deliberation an agreement was reached and the verdict announced in open court.

The state in the long drawn-out trial subjected Cooper to a grueling cross examination for more than three days. The prosecution contended that Cooper, as president of the bank, had violated the state banking laws by making loans when the reserves of the bank were below the amount required by law.

Judge, Sheriff and Solicitor Are Held For Federal Court

Charlottesville, Va., Nov. 22.—Don Chafin, sheriff of Logan county; Judge Robert Bland of state circuit court which includes Logan county in its jurisdiction, and John Chafin, cousin of the sheriff and prosecuting attorney for the county, are held by Federal Judge George W. McClintock today under bonds of \$100,000 for hearing December 11 on indictments returned yesterday charging interference with federal court witnesses.

Head Alaskan Bureau Dies in Washington

Washington, Nov. 22.—Alfred Brooks, chief of the Alaskan bureau of Geological Survey for the past 20 years, died here today. He was 64 years old.

GOVERNOR-ELECT GORE SELECTED TO SUCCEED LATE SECY. WALLACE

Washington, Nov. 22.—Howard M. Gore, of West Virginia, today was appointed Secretary of Agriculture to succeed the late Henry C. Wallace.

Mr. Gore, who has been acting Secretary, can serve only until March 4 when he becomes governor of his home state.

PAMLICO COUNCIL SCOUTS ORGANIZED ON FRIDAY NIGHT

J. E. Winslow Elected President; Council Embraces Counties of Martin, Pitt, Beaufort

Last night at Washington, the Pamlico Council of the Boy Scouts of America was organized with J. E. Winslow of Greenville as President of the Council. The other officers are as follows: Vice Presidents, Coolidge Morris, of Washington, representing Beaufort county, John Holmes, of Farmville, representing Pitt county; Rev. Mr. Pardo, of Williamston, representing Martin county; Secretary H. C. Miller, of Washington, treasurer J. D. Webb, Washington, member of National Council Boy Scouts of America, Dr. Cecil Garrington, Bethel; Scout Commissioner, Todd Maxwell, Washington.

President Winslow appointed Mr. Guy Smith, of Greenville, as chairman of the Council Finance Committee.

This newly formed Pamlico Council embraces the counties of Martin, Pitt and Beaufort. A charter will be secured from the National headquarters, and scouting in this district will be placed on the plane that it should be placed on. This plan is being worked successfully throughout the state and south. At the present time, Lenoir, Wayne and Johnston counties comprise the Tarboro Council. Wilson, Nash and Edgecombe form another. These districts employ a full time Scout Executive. The business of this executive is to see to it that Scoutmasters are being trained all the time in the various communities, thereby assuring a community of leadership for its boys all the time. It is also his job to do active Scout work with the different troops, meeting them at their troop meetings, carrying on all the regular scout work in the fall and winter, and then in the summer seeing to it that all scouts are provided with a summer camp.

At the meeting last night there were twenty-five men present, most of whom were business men. They were there from all sections of the counties. The action of the men in going that far to the meeting, and from their talk at the meeting, it was very evident that all of them are keenly interested in the future of the boys and girls of these counties, and are eager to see that the Scouting program is put across. Mr. Guy Smith is the chairman for Greenville.

MYSTERY IN PASTOR'S WIFE'S DEATH IN FURNACE

Great mystery surrounds the finding of the charred body of Mrs. C. V. Sheatsley, wife of the pastor of a Columbus, Ohio, Lutheran church, in a burning furnace, the furnace door being closed. Dr. Sheatsley, at first charging murder, finally indicated his belief that his wife, stirred by religious fervor, had purged herself of fancied sins through the ordeal of fire, as practiced by the ancients of Europe. He said knowledge she gained during eight months in India, when he did missionary work there, may have shown her the ability of human beings, through religious fanaticism, to make their bodies practically insensible to pain. A strange episode in the woman's death was the admission of her sixteen-year-old son, Clarence, that he saw his mother's body in the furnace, but said nothing about it until his father found the body. Several matters of minor importance were discussed and passed upon, after which the meeting adjourned to meet again in regular session in December.

Girl Injured in Jump From Senate Office Bldg. Early Today

Washington, Nov. 22.—Early morning passersby the Senate office building today say a young woman came hurtling through a window and plunged 15 feet to the pavement below. She suffered a compound fracture of the leg and was taken to a hospital where she refused to give her name.

Those who witnessed the plunge said a man's face appeared at the window and that when the young woman was picked up she exclaimed: "Oh, Why did he make me jump?" Police held for investigation John C. Dugan, an employee in the offices of Senator Lenroot, of Wisconsin. The Senator is out of the city.

The young woman is said to have tried to get out of the window when the knock of a capital police was heard at the door. Dugan was later released on a nominal bond.

CHEMIST EXPLODES SUICIDE THEORY IN OHIO MYSTERY

Declares Examination of Woman's Body Shows Death Before It Was Placed in the Furnace

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 22.—County Prosecutor John R. King was in a closed conference here today with experts who examined the vital organs of Mrs. Addie Sheatsley, wife of Rev. C. V. Sheatsley, whose body was found in the furnace of her home, and with city detectives who have been aiding in the investigation of the case. The prosecutor said he hoped to be able to announce a definite procedure after the conference.

Conferring with King was C. F. Long, chemist who reported yesterday after examining the lungs of the woman that he was convinced that her dead body had been put into the heating plant. There was no trace of carbon monoxide gas or ashes in the lungs as would have been the case if she had crawled into the furnace.

FUNERAL SERVICES FOR MRS. HARDING ARE TO BE SIMPLE

Guard of Honor for Her Late Husband to Also Act At Ceremonies for Mrs. Harding

Marion, Ohio, Nov. 22.—Funeral services Monday afternoon at the Epworth Methodist Church for Mrs. Florence Kling Harding, who died yesterday, will be simple. This announcement was made today by George B. Christian, former secretary to President Harding and life long friend of the family, who is in charge of the funeral arrangements. Tentative funeral plans, he said, include the singing of "The End of A Perfect Day" by the Columbus Republican Glee Club, which while Mr. Harding was president, was heard often at the White House on special occasions.

Honorary pall bearers will be officials of the government from Washington, whose names have not been announced. Active pall bearers will include old friends of the Harding family.

Word was received today from Rockledge, Fla., that Mrs. D. B. Kling, sister-in-law of Mrs. Harding, and her daughter, Louise, who is seriously ill, would not be able to come here for the services. Mr. Kling arrived in Marion last week to be at the bedside of his sister.

Washington, Nov. 22.—A detachment of 100 men with necessary officers has been ordered from Fort Hayes, Columbus, Ohio, by the War Department for duty in connection with the funeral of Mrs. Florence Kling Harding. The detachment will arrive in Marion Monday morning traveling in army trucks.

The War Department also announced that the detachment of 25 men and one officer, who have been on duty at the tomb of President Harding, would serve as a guard of honor during the funeral ceremonies for Mrs. Harding.

Prayer Services Will Be Held At Courthouse Tonight

Prayer services will be conducted in the court house this evening at 7:30 o'clock. The leader will be Mr. K. W. Cobb assisted by other members of the Federation. The public is invited.

LONGSWORTH WOULD NOT SHOW FAVORS TO THE INSURGENTS

Washington, Nov. 22.—Representative Longworth, of Ohio, the Republican House leader, came out today in favor of restricting consideration heretofore given insurgent Republicans in the House.

Note to Egyptian Premier Demands Indemnity of 500,000 Pounds Sterling and Other Considerations To gether With Proper Apology

Cairo, Egypt, Nov. 22.—A British note handed to Cagford Pasha, Egyptian Premier, today demands proper apology in connection with the killing of Major General Sir Lee Stack and an indemnity of 500,000 pounds sterling.

The note also demands the prohibition of political demonstrations and the withdrawal of Egyptian officers and units from the Sudan, the Sudanese troops to come under control of the Sudan government proper.

Cairo, Egypt, Nov. 22.—The body of Major General Sir Lee Stack, Governor-General of Sudan and sirdar of the Egyptian army, victim of assassins, was buried today amid scenes made impressive by military display and solemnity.

Crowds which lined the streets were held back by troops.

Valetta, Malta, Nov. 22.—The First Battalion of the East Lancashire Regiment has been suddenly ordered to Egypt and will sail on Wednesday.

London, Nov. 22.—A special dispatch from Cairo says that one of the alleged assassins of Sir Lee Stack has been arrested after the confession of a taxi driver who was held following the shooting.

Woman Faces Charges Bigamy and Shooting Newly Wedded Hubby

Camden, N. J., Nov. 22.—Held for arraignment on a charge of shooting her husband, Anthony Hyski, Camden policeman Mrs. Maud Hyski, 34, was faced today with an additional charge of bigamy.

Fred Kriedler, 40 years old, of South Camden, informed police headquarters that the woman was his wife and had deserted him and their two children two years ago. He said she had not been divorced.

Mrs. Hyski is said to have admitted that she accidentally shot Hyski during a quarrel.

According to police she married Hyski at Elkton, Md., three months ago.

Byrd Announces He Will Be Candidate For Governor of Va.

Richmond, Nov. 22.—State Senator Henry Flood Byrd, of Winchester, today announced formally that he would be a candidate for Democratic nomination for governor subject to the Democratic primary to be held in Aug. 1925.

Nephew of Former Governor of Florida Was Shot to Death

Orlando, Fla., Nov. 22.—N. B. Broward, nephew of former Governor Broward and son of Malcolm Broward, of Jacksonville, was shot and killed early today in the home of Hal K. Cady. Cady was placed under arrest.

According to the police three shots were fired one of them striking Mrs. Cady on the cheek. The sheriff refused to let any one see Cady until after inquest which is scheduled for this afternoon.

The sheriff said, however, that Cady was in no condition to talk and seemed in a daze. "He did not know he had shot his wife until I told him," said the sheriff nor did he seem to know he had shot Broward. He seemed to think Broward had killed himself when he slipped on a rug. Cady said they had been scuffling and showed me a place on his chest somewhat bruised and said Broward had bitten him there.

Broward formerly lived in Jacksonville but recently had been living here with his sister, Mrs. Leroy Giles. It is said that his wife lives in Jacksonville and they have two children.

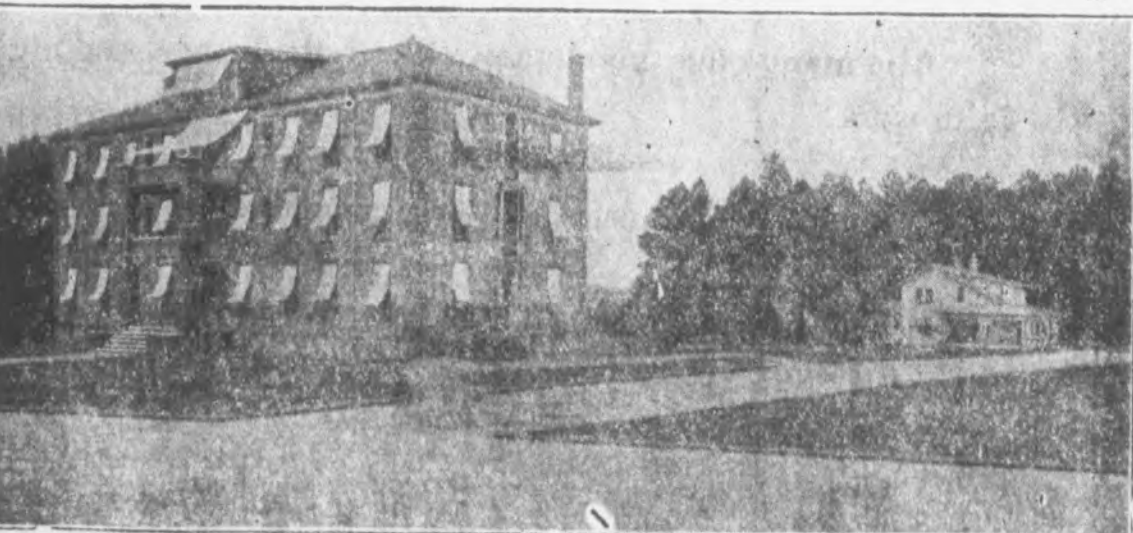

Miss Harriett Elliott Addresses Students At Teachers College

Miss Harriett Elliott, professor of Home Economics in North Carolina College for Women, spoke to the students of East Carolina Teachers College yesterday morning on the "changed attitude towards women." impressing upon the young women their responsibility and opportunity because of the change. Her clear logic her forceful presentation, and her fine personality made deep impression on the young women.

She urged them to become intelligent students of government. The old idea that women can not learn government has been dispelled long ago, and with it the idea that men are born knowing politics, although there are still people laboring under that delusion. The new psychology is casting aside those preconceived notions and prejudices.

Knowledge of government does

not strike like lightning, it comes as the result of study and interest. She declared that she is not interested in the untalented woman in politics or in the spectacular woman, but she is interested in the trained woman who takes intelligent interest in politics.

She impressed upon them the serious and solemn duty of voting, of expressing themselves at the polls, knowing what they are doing and for whom they are voting. She warned them against voting for a woman just because she is a woman.

As women experience politics, more, know more about problems of government, more and more will be elected. There is no reason why a woman shouldn't aspire to anything she wants, and why she should not get it. She declared the article appearing on women telling what women are thinking about, show only that the writer knows neither women nor their thoughts.

She referred to the article in Atlantic monthly by a woman who traveled across the country to find out whether or not women are talking about politics. This contained the startling statement that no woman talked about politics unless the subject was introduced by the writer. Miss Elliott's explanation of this is that politics has not yet become a vital part of a woman's experience.

She closed by urging the young women to make a positive and definite study of government so that they can take an intelligent interest in politics. There is no telling what contribution women will make in the next fifty years.

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, Nov. 22.—Following yesterday's bearish influence of the cotton market, traders today had to contend with the uncertainty attending position developments next Monday which will be the first December notice day in New Orleans and New York. The certificated stock here yesterday was 37,406 bales and was 184,704 bales in New York of 20 instant. Heavy tenders are predicted in both markets, and while it is rumored that the notices will likely be stopped here the disposition to be made of the notices in New York is uncertain.

Because of the continuance of favorable weather in the southwest, there is a disposition to increase crop estimates. In this connection yesterday's government crop forecast by states which showed a larger crop for Texas by 200,000 bales compared with two weeks ago and a larger estimate by 90,000 bales for Oklahoma and 330,000 larger for Arkansas and 50,000 larger for Louisiana than two weeks ago, is significant and attributed to improvement of the top crop, the result of the continuance of unusually favorable weather for harvesting and maturing of late cotton.

Whatever effect December tenders next Monday have on the market, the impression prevails that after notice day is out of the way, values will improve again. While it is possible for market to do better after next Monday, increasing crop ideas have to be reckoned with as well as the probability of the world's visible of American cotton which is already 4,035,000 bales vs. only 2,953,000 last year, continuing to increase for some weeks to come, perhaps to a greater extent than for the corresponding period last season.

Meanwhile the more favorable general trade reports and the continuance of large exports of raw cotton from the United States may serve as a sustaining feature, especially if the export demand improves. Today's advances from the interior were to effect that the inland spot situation was firmer, with the basis somewhat higher with a good demand in evidence. 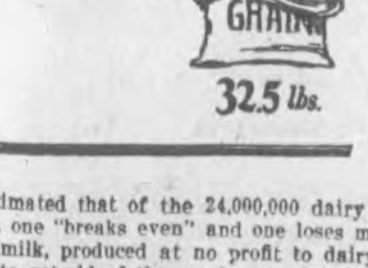

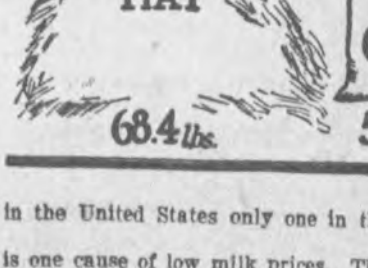

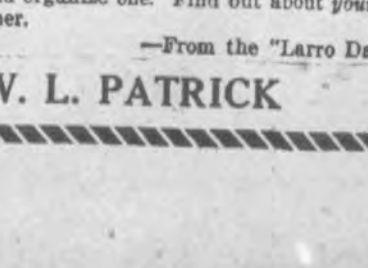
