NEXT FISCAL YEAR TO
BE SIXTY MILLION LESS

President Coolidge Today Submits Budget for 1926 Accompanied By Special Message to Congress; Budget is \$59,225,931.72 Less Than This Year's Estimated Expenditures

Washington, Dec. 2.—President Coolidge informed Congress today that present estimates point to a surplus of revenues over expenditures of \$67,884,489 for the present fiscal year and of \$373,743,714 for the fiscal year 1926, but he advised against any further tax reduction until definite results from the present tax law are known.

"If we continue the campaign for economy, we will pave the way for a further reduction in taxes," the President said in a special message submitting the annual budget. "This reduction cannot be effected immediately. Before it is undertaken, we should know more definitely by actual operations what our revenues will be under our present tax law. But the knowledge of our revenue under the existing law will avail us nothing if we embark any new large expenditure program."

The President recalled his recommendation for a reduction in taxes and said that thus far in this fiscal year, previous calculations of the results had been born out. He declared a revision of the estimates for 1925 showed that receipts for the current year should approximate \$3,601,968,297 while the expenditures should not exceed \$3,534,083,808, and compared these with the estimates for the next fiscal year, transmitted in the budget showing probable receipts of \$3,641,295,992 and a probable cash disbursement by the Treasury of \$3,267,551,378 which will include some funds appropriated, but not all expended, in the current year.

In analyzing the estimates submitted the President said:

"For the national defense the estimate amount, to \$549,000,000, which is \$29,000,000 less than the amount available this current fiscal year. These figures do not include non-military items of the War and Navy Departments. This reduction made in accordance with my belief that we can have adequate national defense with a more modest outlay of the taxpayers' money. Further study may point the way to additional reduction without weakening our national defense, but rather perfecting it. This nation is at peace with the world. We no longer have international competition in naval construction of major units. We are concerned primarily with maintaining adequate preparedness. We should have adequate preparedness, in 1926 within the limits of the amount recommended."

"Aside from the important factor of training personnel our national defense is largely an industrial problem. Today the outstanding weakness in the industrial situation as it affects national defense is the inadequacy of facilities to supply air service needs. The airplane industry in this country at the present time is dependent almost entirely upon government business. To strengthen this industry is to strengthen our national defense. For the air service of the Army and Navy, and the Air Mail Service, the estimates, including contract authorizations amount to \$38,945,000. This contemplates an expenditure with the industries of \$18,287,000 for the procurement of airplanes, engines and accessories. The remaining \$20,658,000 is for maintenance, operation, experimentation and research. The amount of \$38,945,000, however, does not include all that will be available for this service in 1926. Amounts contributing to the air service carried in other estimates, and usable war supplies, will make a total availability conservatively estimated at \$65,000,000."

"The amount requested for national defense includes \$50,118,000 for the Army and Navy Reserves, National Guard, Citizens' Military Training Camps, and other civilian training activities."

"There is also included in the national defense estimates \$7,444,000 for increase of the Navy. This will provide for continuing work on the fleet submarines under construction and for beginning work on two of the four remaining fleet submarines

authorized in the 1916 program. With regard to the Navy estimates, legislation is now pending which provides for additional vessels, including gunboats for use on the Yantze river. Further estimates for increase in the Navy are dependent upon the enactment of this legislation. It will also be necessary to request of Congress legislation increasing the authorized cost of the two airplane carriers now under construction. If this is granted it will require funds for the next fiscal year not provided in the estimates contained in this Budget.

"For rivers and harbors \$56,237,600 is recommended. In this is included \$40,000,000 for maintenance and improvement of existing river and harbor works, \$10,500,000 for flood control on the Mississippi and Sacramento Rivers, and \$5,437,600 for the operation and maintenance of canals and the removal of wrecks and other obstructions. Of the \$40,000,000 for maintenance and improvement of rivers and harbors, \$21,973,915 is for new work and \$17,241,575 is for maintenance. This will make possible material progress on the most important projects approved by Congress."

"It is estimated that \$6,541,590 will be needed to complete Dam No. 2 at Muscle Shoals. Of this amount, \$3,501,200 will be required this year. This will be covered by a supplemental estimate for 1925. The balance—\$3,040,390 is provided for in these estimates."

"There is included in these estimates \$50,000,000 to be set aside in the adjusted service certificate fund established under the World War adjusted compensation act of May 19, 1924. This is for the second payment to the fund to be made January 1, 1926. For the first payment, due January 1, 1925, \$100,000,000 is included in the deficiency bill now under consideration by Congress. The applications from veterans so (Continued on page three).

PRESIDENT HOLDS
BREAKFAST CONFAB

Another group have been invited to breakfast tomorrow with the president.

Dial Would Repeal
Child Labor Law

Washington, Dec. 2.—An effort will be made by Senator Dial, Democrat, South Carolina, to repeal the child labor amendment to the constitution adopted at the last session of Congress.

Senator Dial has prepared a joint resolution which he expects to introduce today calling for the repeal of the proposed amendment.

A joint resolution was adopted last session authorizing an amendment to the constitution restricting child labor. The amendment has never been made effective awaiting ratification by three-fourths of the states.

Passage of the amendment was opposed by many southern Senators who claimed it would restrict southern industry and cause suffering among the poorer classes of the South.

Sunday School Institute
Being Conducted In
Presbyterian Church

Mr. Claude T. Carr, Synodical Superintendent of S. S. Work for North Carolina, arrived in the city yesterday to conduct a S. S. Institute at the Presbyterian church of this city. Last night Mr. Carr took up the fundamental principles of a really efficient school. He suggested instead of calling it S. S., we call it "A Church School for Religious Education." After discussing this, he took up the subject of whom is this school for "saying that it is for every member of the church, and any others who may be brought in from the outside who are not attending any other school. He discussed the different departments of the school and the interests of the children in each department, and how the teacher could reach these pupils through these natural interests.

Next, he took up the aims of the S. S. under this he gave four definite aims: To teach, to train, to save, and to develop Christian character.

He insisted that the teacher should put a high value on his or her work, remembering that this work is a serious part of the teacher's life, and that some child's salvation may depend on what is taught. He then suggested that every teacher should feel that he or she is called to teach, and to regard this calling as a sacred duty to be performed.

Coolidge Sends Several Score of Nominations Made During Recess to Congress

Washington, Dec. 2.—Several score of nominations many of them covering appointments during the recess of Congress were sent to the capitol today by President Coolidge. The nominations included those of Howard M. Gore, West Virginia, to become Secretary of Agriculture; Wilbur A. Carr, of New York, and John Van A. MacMurray, Assistant Secretaries of State; James Rockwell Sheffield, New York, Ambassador to Mexico; and Edgar A. Bancroft, Illinois, Ambassador to Japan. Other nominations included Assistant Attorney General William J. Donovan, of New York.

NEW MUSCLE SHOALS
BILL IS INTRODUCED
BY SEN. UNDERWOOD

Bill Designed to Take Place of Ford Offer Provides for Either Government or Private Operation

Washington, Dec. 2.—Senator Underwood, Democrat, Alabama, today presented a new plan for operation of Muscle Shoals.

He would dedicate the property to national defense, provide for either government or private operation for the production of nitrogen for explosives and fertilizer and call for construction of Dam Number 3.

The Alabama Senator led the fight for acceptance of Henry Ford's bid which has been withdrawn and his new plan contained in a bill introduced in the Senate today is designed to take the place of the Ford offer. Southern Senators are understood to be united behind the measure.

Under the bill either by government or private operation 40,000 tons of mixed nitrogen must be produced after the first three years for the manufacture of fertilizers and explosives. During the first year 10,000 tons must be produced, during the second year 20,000 tons must be produced, 30,000 tons must be produced in the third year and 40,000 tons annually thereafter.

Citizens' Committee
Prison Legislation
To Meet Friday

Greensboro, Dec. 2.—The Citizens' Committee of One Hundred will meet here on next Friday to take up the program of prison legislation to be presented to the 1925 General Assembly in January. The discussion will be led by Joseph Hyde Pratt and Dr. Harry Grane, A. M. Seales, chairman of the committee, will preside.

The committee, appointed to work out correctional and prison legislation, has been busy for more than a year. In the call for the meeting here it is pointed out that much legislation will be necessary before the prison system advocated by the Citizens' Committee is put into effect.

BACK MOVEMENT
FOR BRIDGE OVER
THE CHOWAN RIVER

Local Rotary Club Passes Resolution of Endorsement Last Night; Many Guests Present

Informal talks and music furnished much enjoyment at last night's Rotary meeting at which there were several local and out of town guests.

Following the usual evening meal Rotarian Steve Gardner, of the Washington club favored those present with a vocal solo which was greatly enjoyed. Rotarian Edmund Harding, also of the Washington club, played the accompaniment. The next number on the program was the song, "Katie," very successfully presented to the club by Collin Stokes, of Ayden, assisted by W. H. Dall and W. H. Rogers, of the local club. By the time this song had been completed President R. H. Wright was of the opinion that for the time being the club could stand no more music so the program was shifted to the Rotary Call, everyone present being required to state his name, occupation and what he disliked most to do. When the roll call was over it was the opinion the more of those present disliked getting up on a cold morning more than anything else.

Mr. J. N. Thomas, of Washington and Lee University, addressed the club on the Lee Memorial School of Journalism. Reviewing the life of the great General, the speaker set forth some of his ideals and the sacrifices that had been made that these ideals might be fulfilled. A southern school of journalism was one of the ideals of Robert E. Lee, hence the school now being established is to be dedicated as a memorial to him, said the speaker. Mr. Thomas went into details as to how the school was being sponsored by the newspapers of the South and what such an institution would mean not only to the South but to the whole country. Mr. Thomas' talk was instructive and was greatly enjoyed.

Rotarian J. E. Winslow, president of the recently organized Scout Council, spoke to the club on the council and what it means to the community and asked that committees be appointed to help carry on the work in raising the necessary funds to make the organization permanent. A committee was appointed to aid in this work.

The club unanimously adopted a resolution endorsing the movement now on foot to petition the next General Assembly for an appropriation to construct a bridge over Chowan river to furnish a southern outlet for territory on the north side. A committee was appointed to draw up these resolutions and forward same to New Bern where a meeting for discussion of the subject is to be held tomorrow.

A resolution was also adopted urging Congress to make greater appropriations for the Department of Fisheries for use in this state.

Major B. L. Wilson, U. S. A., one of the guests of the club, made a short talk in which he praised the progressive spirit which he found prevailing in this community, saying that it made his heart glad to boast the fact that he was a native of Greenville.

TO PROHIBIT PRINTING
OF INCOME TAX RETURNS
IS UNCONSTITUTIONALNEW INDICTMENTS
RETURNED MONDAY
IN NORWOOD CASE

Indictments With More Specific Counts Returned Against These Officials of Salisbury Bank

Greensboro, Dec. 2.—Indictments more specific than those returned here a year ago were brought in late Monday by a federal grand jury against J. D. Norwood, J. K. Doughton and Moses L. Jackson, officials and directors of the Peoples National Bank, of Salisbury for violation of the national banking laws involving a large sum.

J. K. Doughton and J. D. Norwood are indicted individually and M. L. Jackson is indicted jointly with each of the other officers. In the Doughton indictment there are five counts based on alleged irregularities during 1922 and early in 1923. Against Norwood individually there is one count involving \$15,000. Against Doughton and Norwood there are six specific counts. Against Doughton and Jackson there are five counts.

The new indictments it was said would have about the same effect as eliminating those previously secured although the others will remain on the docket until the formal taking of not prusses is gone through with. The cases will not be tried during the present term but will be heard at a special term early in February it was said by federal officials today.

ROBINSON LOSES
SUIT AGAINST BANK

Prominent Figure in Mysterious Blackmail Case Fails to Recover From Midland Bank

London, Dec. 2.—Justice Darling today returned a judgment in favor of the Midland Bank in the suit brought against the bank by Charles E. Robinson, former bookmaker. Mr. Robinson's suit was for the recovery of 125,000 pounds which he alleges the bank owed him on account of settlement with Mr. A., an unnamed Indian potentate who had become intimate with his wife.

The bank asserted the money had never been received for Robinson and also alleged that the plaintiff was a party to a blackmail scheme to obtain money from the mysterious Mr. A. and therefore was not entitled to recover.

The jury was instructed to clear Mr. Robinson and his wife of the allegation that they were parties to a conspiracy.

Period of Activity
Issuance of Reports
State Departments

Raleigh, Dec. 2.—The next thirty days will be a period of activity in the issuance of reports by the state departments. Virtually every department head is now engaged in putting the finishing touches on his report and sending copy to the printer.

Germany Want: Radio Fans.

Berlin, Dec. 2.—To get distrustful German villagers acquainted with the novelty of radio entertainment, and to induce them to buy sets of their own, the postal authorities contemplate the temporary installation of loudspeaker sets in the social halls or inns of every German village, free of charge. Besides entertainment, news of the day and market reports of special interest for farmers will be broadcast.

Ruling Handed Down
By Judge Reeves in
Case of Kansas City
Publisher; Govern-
ment Will Appeal

Kansas City, Dec. 2.—Federal Judge Alva S. Reeves today sustained the demurrers of Walter S. Dickey, owner and editor of the Kansas City Post Journal and Ralph Ellis general managing editor, to indictment charging alleged illegal publication of income tax returns.

The clause in the law holding publication of the income tax returns as illegal, Judge Reeves said in announcing his decision, is in violation of the first amendment to the federal constitution relative to the freedom of the press.

Senator James A. Reed, representing the defense, yesterday also argued that the section prohibiting the publication of income tax returns was in violation of the constitution. "If a newspaper owner can be sent to jail for printing the mere fact that John Jones paid an income tax of \$1,000 or any other amount, then it is time to haul down the American flag," declared Senator Reed.

Washington, Dec. 2.—The government is prepared to appeal the decision of Federal Judge Reeves in the Kansas City case today in the income tax publication case.

It is planned to have the case taken to the Supreme Court, but the method has not been determined pending study of the case by the Attorney General.

No formal comment will be made here until decision is reached.

Prof. Leon Meadows
Conducts Y. W. C. A.
Services at College

Professor Leon R. Meadows conducted the Y. W. C. A. service of East Carolina Teachers College Sunday evening.

He brought out the thought that there must be an ulterior motive in each person's life other than personal gain. "No Matter What We Do If We Do Not Win Souls We Have Done Nothing."

He stated that every young man or young woman above the age of twenty-one should make a will. It is wise to learn some advice such as the first item of Governor Jarvis' will: I commit my soul unto the God who gave it trusting that he will accept it.

He warned the young women to choose their intimate friends most carefully. The influence of a friend may be degrading or uplifting but the tendency to pull one down seems to be stronger. College associates play a great part in life after leaving college.

The personality of the teacher means much more than the subject. "Choose your teachers instead of the subjects if possible." He said also that it is wise to consider some work outside the class room.

He urged the young women to use their time wisely. National things can be regained but time which is God-given cannot be replaced.

American Engineers
Start to Rebuild
Japanese Bridges

Tokio.—An American company has obtained the contract for two of the most important pieces of engineering in the Tokyo reconstruction program. The Foundation Company of New York will build the foundations for two bridges over the Sunida River which will replace those destroyed in the earthquake of 1923. These are the Etai and Kiyosu bridges. The contract amounts to about \$2,000,000. It calls for the foundations to start 80 feet under water, work being done by the compressed air diving system. L. R. Craft and N. Englander, New York Engineers, are in Tokio to superintend the work, which is expected to take about three years. Japanese engineers estimate that with their methods it would require six years.

Here are the first photographs to reach America of the principals in the famous London blackmail case, in which Charles Ernest Robinson, an English bookmaker, sued the Midland Bank for \$750,000, alleging a check made to his order by "Mr. A." an Indian potentate whose name was withheld for reasons of state, had been paid to other persons. It was revealed that "Mr. A." who is reported in London to be Rajah Sir Hari Singh, son of the fabulously rich Maharajah of Kashmir, had been trapped in a Paris hotel with Mrs. Robinson, by Montague Noel Newton, who posed as Robinson. The case was heard before Mr. Justice Darling, in London, the bank being represented by Sir John Simon, while Earl Halsbury appeared for Robinson.

COMPOSER SAYS THE COST OF LESSONS HAMPERS STUDENTS

Frankfort, Dec.—Native musicians will never have a fair opportunity in the United States until the cost of musical education is reduced in America, according to Simon Bacharoff, the Chicago composer who is in Germany arranging for the production of his new grand opera "Sakura."

"We should have government and city support for music schools and opera houses in the United States," said Mr. Bacharoff, "and I believe such public spirited citizens as General Dawes will eventually bring about the establishment of schools of that character, where poor, but talented, young Americans may get their musical education at small cost. A school, such as the Berlin Musical High School, would be a boon to hundreds of young Americans who are struggling to become artists."

"In Berlin school German pupils have tuition for about \$50 a year, and foreigners pay about twice that amount. Only youngsters who are well rounded in music are taken, and the course in the school is ordinarily three years. Most of the pupils have had at least five years of training before they enter the Berlin school."

"Think of the difference in cost for students in Germany and America. Skilled teachers in the United States charge advanced pupils \$20, \$25 or even \$50 a lesson. When one considers that most really gifted pupils in the United States cannot afford to pay even \$2 a lesson and are often earning all their educational funds, it is little wonder that American students become discouraged. We can educate our American singers and musicians in the United States better than it can be done here, and by so doing we can lay the foundation for a real American type of music and divorce ourselves from European standards."

COST TO OPERATE GOVT NEXT FISCAL YEAR WILL BE SIXTY MILLION LESS

far have been below the estimated number which the records indicate as entitled to the benefits of the act. If the two appropriations recommended made, it is estimated there will be a sufficient amount in the fund on January 1, 1926, to meet the demands of the act. Should the number of applications increase beyond what present experience indicates as probable, there will be ample time to submit a supplemental estimate for the additional amount necessary before that date.

"For federal aid to states the estimates provide in excess of \$109,000,000. These subsidies are prescribed by law. I am convinced that the broadening of this field of activity is detrimental both to Federal and state government. Efficiency of Federal operations is impaired as their scope is unduly enlarged. Efficiency of State governments is impaired as they relinquish, and turn over to the federal government responsibilities which are rightfully theirs. I am opposed to any expansion of these subsidies. My conviction is they can be curtailed with benefit to both the federal and state governments.

"For reclamation purposes I am recommending \$9,777,257 for 1926. It is highly desirable that the Congress, as a basis for this and other future reclamation expenditures, enact the legislation embodying new reclamation policies proposed in H. R. 9611. Sixty-eighth Congress, first session.

"The gross public debt was reduced \$1,098,894,375 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1924, and stood at \$21,250,812,989 on the latter date. This reduction was accomplished through (1) the application of the sinking fund and other public debt requirements required to be made to be made from ordinary receipts, aggregating \$457,999,750; (2) a reduction in the general fund balance of \$135,527,639; and (3) the use of the entire surplus of \$505,366,986. The annual interest charges on the debt represented by this reduction are equivalent to over \$45,000,000.

"The total reduction in the debt since the high point of \$26,594,000,000 on August 31, 1919, amounted to \$5,343,000,000 at the close of the last fiscal year. This total reduction has effected a saving in interest amounting to approximately \$225,000,000 annually, a saving which equals nearly one-third of the total annual pre-war expenditures of the government.

"The fixed-debt charges are included in the regular Budget of the Government under a definite plan worked out soon after the close of the war for the gradual retirement of the public debt, and must be met before the Budget can balance. The most important of these fixed-debt charges is the cumulative sinking fund provided in the Victory Liberty Loan act. Retirements through this fund during the past fiscal year were about \$296,000,000. The next items in size among the fixed-debt charges

are the retirements of securities received from foreign governments under debt settlements and the purchases and retirements of securities from foreign repayments. These continuing reductions of the public debt have a very material effect in maintaining high prices for Liberty bonds. They permit the issuance of new government securities for temporary and for refunding purposes at low interest rates, with consequent further economy in government expenditures. Interest paid in the fiscal year 1924 amounted to \$940,000,000. It is estimated that this item will be \$865,000,000 in 1925 and \$830,000,000 in 1926. This saving of \$110,000,000 in two years is the result of the reduction in the amount of the debt and decrease in the average rate of interest paid. The sinking fund is a part of the contract between the United States and the holder of the United States obligation, and, therefore, can not in good faith be changed. The continual steady effect of these debt reducing factors is to cut down the largest single item of government expenditure, and permit further reductions in the burden of taxation.

"During the last session of Congress a bill was introduced authorizing a yearly appropriation of not exceeding \$10,000,000 for a progressive building program in the District of Columbia. This bill has my endorsement. I earnestly recommend its enactment by Congress.

"I have recently appointed a commission to investigate agricultural conditions. The purpose of this was to determine what action, through legislation or otherwise, should be taken to place agriculture on a basis of economic equality with other industries. The findings and recommendations of the commission are for the use of the Congress. I mention this commission here for the reason that I will shortly submit to the Congress an estimate of appropriation to meet the expenses of the commission.

"We are now in the fourth year of our campaign for reduction in the cost of government. Our aim is to reduce the burden of taxes. In this we have been successful. For those things which we are now required to do we are fast reducing our expenditures to a minimum consistent with efficient service. We have before us an estimated surplus of \$67,000,000 for the current fiscal year and \$373,000,000 for the next fiscal year. Shall we embark upon new projects involving expenditures which will prevent the accumulation of these expected surpluses, or shall we continue the campaign for economy? I am for economy. If we continue the campaign for economy we will pave the way for further reduction in taxes. This reduction can not be effected immediately. Before it is undertaken we should know more definitely by actual operation what our revenues will be under our present tax law. But the knowledge of our revenue under the existing law will avail us nothing if we embark upon any new large expenditure program."

IS THE RED CROSS TO CONTINUE?

Greenville has this year for the first time since the World War fallen down completely on the annual Red Cross Roll Call only about \$200 having been subscribed to date.

Announcement was made this morning by those in charge of the drive that a final effort to raise the necessary funds would be made tomorrow and upon the success of tomorrow's solicitations depends whether or not Greenville and Pitt County are to have a Red Cross field secretary.

The work that has been accomplished in this community in the past few years through the local branch of the Red Cross speaks for itself and everyone agrees that the funds given to the organization have been well spent.

It is now up to the citizens of the community to decide whether or not this great work is to continue. If you have not already answered the call do so at once that we may be

enabled to enjoy better living conditions through the aid and efforts of the Red Cross.

BUY CHRISTMAS SEALS

In preparation for the Seventeenth Annual Christmas Seal Sale for this year the National Tuberculosis Association printed 1,250,000,000 Christmas Seals—a billion and a quarter! The North Carolina Tuberculosis Association ordered, and place on sale from now until Christmas, fifteen million of these Seals. The Seals are sold at one cent each in order that every one, no matter how limited his resources, may have an opportunity to help fight against tuberculosis. If the entire quota for North Carolina is sold the funds realized would be sufficient to provide sanatorium treatment for 400 patients for eight months. The economic value of the lives thus saved would be \$3,200,000,000; and this does not take into account factors which cannot be estimated in financial terms. This is, indeed, a gratifying return on the money invested.

The Christmas Seal does more than simply help those who are stricken with tuberculosis. By its educational message it throws the safeguard of knowledge around the home and place of business, and prevents as well as cures tuberculosis.

The Christmas Seal builds more substantially than erecting a temporary defense against an insidious foe. It takes the child when its mind is plastic, and inculcates good health habits in the daily routine. This is done through the medium of the Modern Health Crusade which is conducted by the North Carolina Tuberculosis Association in the schools of North Carolina. Hundreds of dollars have been spent in this way but the value of the work will mount into thousands as the death-rate from tuberculosis declines, still further and the general good health curve ascends.

Legislation Regarding Trucks on Highways Expected Be Enacted

Raleigh, Dec. 2.—Legislation looking the regulation of passenger buses and freight trucks on the highways of the state is certain to be enacted at the next session of the General Assembly, but meantime efforts are being made to keep the drivers within bounds. The busses now being used seat between 25 and 50 passengers, and are so heavy that they cannot be brought to a stop as quickly as the ordinary heavy automobile.

This fact was brought to the forefront the past week when a passenger bus and a light car collided only to be run into a few minutes later by a bus of another line, which skidded when the driver attempted to stop.

At a meeting of drivers held in this city during the past week, rules were laid down for their guidance and insurance men, who wrote casualty policies on the machines of company assured the drivers that the insurance company had fifteen men riding the busses of this line alone checking up on the drivers. They warned that if they exceeded the thirty-mile speed limit of the state law, that the insurance would be withdrawn and the guilty driver lose his job.

Horse That Could Not Be Sold Causes Upset German Track

Berlin, Nov. 29.—Thousands of spectators were "absolutely stunned and numerous bookmakers sent into a state of confusion," to quote Berlin sport writers, when Pan Robert, "dark horse" from Austria, at the fashionable Brunewald track, won by a length from a field of 12, most of which were "favorites," at 2,243 gold marks to 10. Herman Roller, the owner, for months, has had Pan Robert up for sale at 3,000 marks, but there were no takers.

The race was the windup of the fall season and all the prize winners of running races for months had been entered. There were no big bets on Pan Robert, the owner himself being dubious of his horse's performances. The bets all told amounted to but 310 gold marks and were divided among the "small fry", in five and ten mark bets. It was the first race that Alfred Bleuler, who rode Pan

White Flour Is Condemned Now As Cause of Bad Teeth

London.—Modern men have jaws that are too small, and white flour is responsible for this deformity, according to Sir Harry Baldwin who recently addressed the Medical Officers of Schools Associations on the necessity for the more general use of whole-wheat bread among growing children.

The speaker declared that with the small jaw was widespread, and of comparatively recent origin. The removal of vitamins from flour, he continued, in order to produce white bread was a vicious practice which must be abolished. Otherwise children, especially the children of poor families which cannot afford a great variety of food, will continue to be underfed.

Dr. C. Shelley said, at the same meeting, that in his opinion the use of the word "offal" to describe the part of the wheat which is discarded in making white flour, has been

responsible for the prejudice against flour which is not white. This unfortunate term used by millers has given rise to the opinion that non-white flour is not clean.

Dr. G. Friend, medical officer at Christ's Hospital, Hordsham, said that in experiments in feeding boys on white bread and stone-milled or whole-wheat bread, he had demonstrated that the use of whole-wheat bread reduced the decay of teeth by 50 percent.

A baker, M. Carter, addressed the meeting and assured the doctors that bakers would be very happy to make whole-wheat bread, as it is much easier to prepare than white bread, but he said the public demands white bread, especially customers of the poorer classes.

BABY SKYSCRAPERS ARE BEGINNING TO SHOW THEMSELVES ON RHINE

Cologne—Cologne and Dusseldorf both on the Rhine about 50 miles apart, have engaged in a race to see which city will build the tallest

called skyscraper. Dusseldorf started the movement last year, soon after the French occupied the Rhur, completing an 11 story office building which is pointed to with pride by the citizens as the tallest building in Germany. Cologne, occupied by British troops was determined not to be outdone. Last summer Cologne began work on a 12 story building and recently the Dusseldorfer, announced that their 11 story pride is to have two floors added to it as soon as the Cologne skyscraper reaches 12.

While the Cologne-Dusseldorf controversy was at its height, Hamburg quickly began work on an office building which is planned to reach 14 stories.

Roadside Farmers Breed Hens Wise To Automobiles

Bloomsburg, Pa., Dec.—Although the reason a chicken crosses the road never has been settled to the satisfaction of everyone, the fact that most fowls attempt to get on the other side of the highway is responsible for

thousands of dollars loss to farmers in this part of the state, and many other sections.

"Automobile mortality" is one of the chief sources of loss to poultrymen, it is declared, and two protective steps are being taken. One is the removal of the chicken pens to points far distant from the road, and the other the breeding of birds that have shown, under observation, a readiness to stay on their own side of the road when an automobile comes along.

Tests made with nearly 100 flocks of a certain breed revealed that a half dozen chickens which went across the road. With other breeds there were less than a half dozen of entire flocks along the road which did not try to cross. Some of the farmers are not slow to realize the difference and are turning to those breeds which "stay put" and avoid the losses.

On farms along main highways the losses to flocks from motor cars has been as high as 25 per cent. In some cases a single passing automobile has killed four chickens.

UNEMPLOYED WORKERS IN IRELAND AND GREAT BRITAIN SHOW INCREASE

London.—Nearly 11 percent of workers in Great Britain and Ireland were unemployed on September 28, according to figures published by the Ministry of Labor Gazette. The number of applicants for employment registered at the employment exchanges had grown from 1,152,000 at the end of August to 1,205,000 on September 29.

The Gazette also records another advance of four points in the cost of living on October 1, the index figures being 76 against 72 on September 1 and 69 on June 1. These figures indicate a percentage advance in prices over the pre-war level.

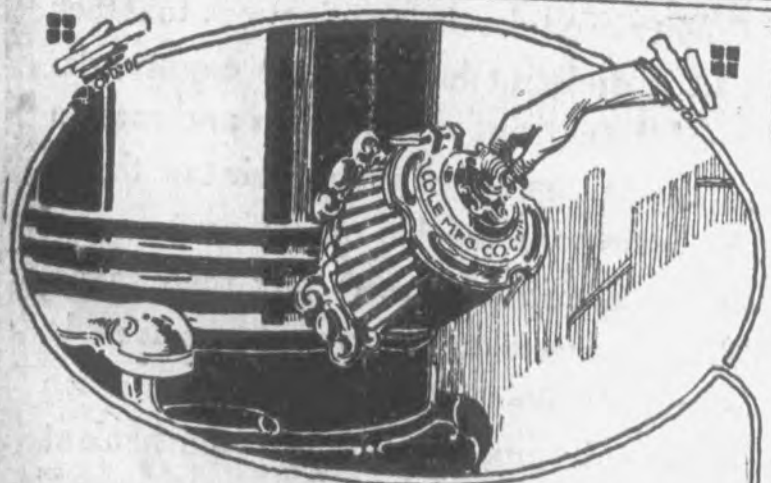

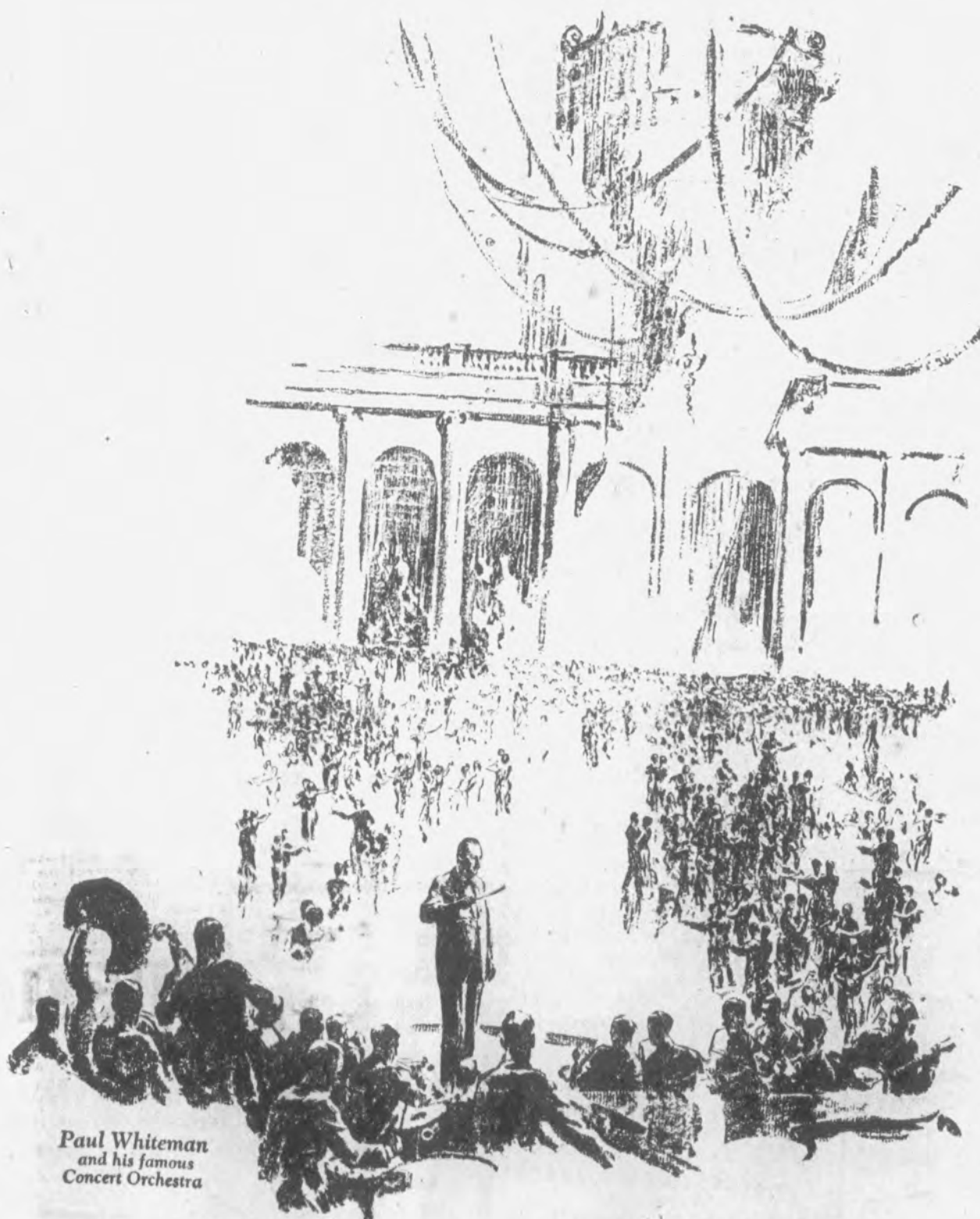
