Head of American Federation of Labor Rushed to San Antonio Hospital for Treatment

Laredo, Texas, Dec. 12.—Samuel Gompers, American Federation of Labor leader, was able to sit up on the side of his bed and take slight nourishment as his train left Laredo for San Antonio today.

Laredo, Texas, Dec. 12.—President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, arrived at the American border here at 7:30 this morning in a critical condition suffering from bronchial affections.

There was no occurrence on the trip which should have given rise to the erroneous reports of the death of Mr. Gompers, his secretary said.

STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION HOLDING SESSIONS IN RALEIGH TODAY

Body is Outlining Legislative Program to Be Presented in January; Will Seek \$35,000,000 Issue

Raleigh, Dec. 12.—The State Highway Commission met here this morning with Chairman Frank Page to discuss the needs of the Highway Department and draw plans for the legislative program to be presented to the North Carolina General Assembly in January 1925.

At one o'clock the commission was still in executive session and the progress of the meeting could not be ascertained but it had been previously stated it was expected request for a \$35,000,000 bond issue will be made of the legislature with which to carry out a more extensive program of road building now being planned by the road commission.

Raising of the gasoline and maintaining the present rate of auto license tax also expected to be acted upon by the commission. Chairman Page stated a few days ago should the \$35,000,000 bond issue be made it will be necessary to increase the gasoline tax and maintain the present rate of license tax in order to pay the interest on the bonds and retire the bonds when they become due.

It is expected that the commission will remain in session all day today and a part of tomorrow.

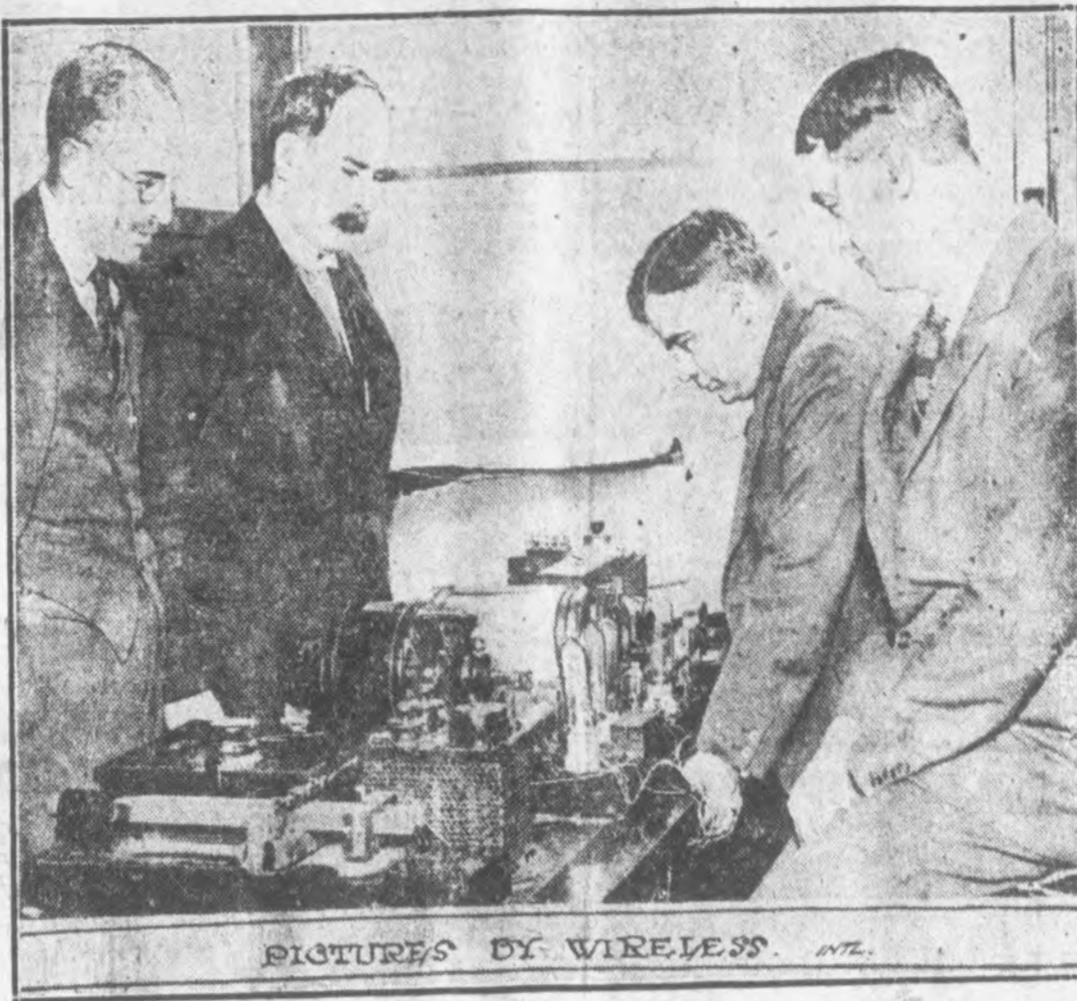

Witness Says Forbes Asked for Loan of \$5,000 to Send Wife to Europe

Chicago, Dec. 12.—Elias H. Mortimer, principal government witness in the Forbes-Thompson conspiracy trial, testified on cross examination today that Charles R. Forbes, former director of the Veterans' Bureau, approached him for a loan of \$5,000 on June 15, 1922 five days before he had testified previously he gave him \$5,000 cash in a Chicago hotel.

MORTIMER STILL ON CROSS EXAMINATION

He said that Forbes visited him in the Woodman Park Hotel, in Washington, and asked him to make the loan to help him finance his wife's visit to Europe. "I told him I did not have the money but I would see what I could do for him. I then told Thompson and Black what Forbes had said and then went back to Forbes and told him things could be fixed up."

INDUSTRIAL BANK FOR GREENVILLE IS BEING ORGANIZED

Head of Big Finance Corporation Is Here Looking After Organization of New Banking Institution

Mr. G. P. Hood, of Goldsboro, president of the Hood Finance Corporation and head of the Hood Plan Industrial Banks in this state has been in Greenville for several days organizing such a banking institution for this city.

The corporation has two plans of the loan system with small weekly or monthly payments, one through the commercial banks and the other through a banking institution for that purpose alone. Mr. Hood stated that Greenville was large enough for the latter plan and his efforts here at this time are in behalf of such a bank.

The new bank, which will be operated on a weekly or monthly loan basis, is not unlike the Morris plan bank, and will be known as the Hood Plan Industrial Bank.

Such banks have been organized throughout the state and the record being made by these institutions indicate that the Industrial Bank is no longer an experiment. Charlotte with a population of 50,000 has seven industrial banks and they loaned through this plan over \$75,000,000 during the last six months of 1923. Such a bank was opened in Elizabeth City in March of this year and already over 350 loans aggregating \$50,000 have been made and the institution has a reserve and undivided profits of more than \$2,500. Similar institutions were recently opened in Goldsboro and other places in this section.

Although Mr. Hood has been here only a few days he stated this morning that the proposition was receiving the hearty support of bankers and business men of the city and that at the present rate he would complete subscription of the capital stock within the next two or three days.

WITNESS SAYS FORBES ASKED FOR LOAN OF \$5,000 TO SEND WIFE TO EUROPE

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AMERICAN REPLY TO BRITISH NOTE HAS BEEN CABLED

Officials Decline Flatly to Divulge Contents of America's Reply to the Note Questioning Claims Rights

Washington, Dec. 12.—The American reply to the British note questioning the right of the United States to collect war claims from Germany out of the benefits received by that country under the Dawes' plan has been dispatched to Ambassador Kellogg at London for delivery to the foreign office.

It is expected that arrangements will be perfected to make public the exchanges on the question automatically in London and Washington. Meanwhile State Department officials decline flatly to comment on the note or even admit it has been placed on the cables for transmission to London.

Inquiry among government officials as to possibilities of submission of the question to an international court failed to reveal receipt by them of any intimation from British sources that a step was to be expected. Secretary Hughes believes the matter will be adjusted by the two governments in an entirely reasonable way.

London, Dec. 12.—The American reply to the British note of December 4, which itself answered the American note regarding reparations for war claims, was received by the British government this morning. It is not to be touched, however, until the arrival of Foreign Secretary Chamberlain from Rome. Mr. Chamberlain is expected to reach London Saturday night.

London papers are unanimously supporting Chancellor Excchequer Churchill in his announcement that if continental nations paying their war debt to the United States they would be expected to make proportionate payments on their obligations to Great Britain.

Just at the moment when everyone was being regaled with information that Great Britain was paying her debts but nobody was paying her, came from Warsaw the announcement that Poland had consolidated her war debt with great Britain on terms similar to those obtained by both Great Britain and Poland in funding their debts to the United States. The Polish debt, however, only amounts to 4,500 pounds.

The Morning Post declares the country is coming to the conclusion that the problems of the war debts can be solved only by frank consultation of all parties concerned as to the willingness to form a general pool. It may not be at a distant date that another great international conference may be summoned to consider the question as we hope president Coolidge may see his way to invite the participants to Washington, the paper continues. As a preliminary if such a conference should be summoned it is hoped that some far reaching step will be taken by Europe for putting its own house in order.

The dinner was arranged for by the men of the church and Sunday School and all the friends (both from the ministry and the laity) of Dr. Plemons were invited to attend.

Dr. Plemons leaves Greenville Monday, December 15, to accept a Church in Brinkley, Arkansas and from the general tone of the meeting last night the Pastor and his wife will take with them the prayers of a multitude of friends who not only honor them but who also love them dearly.

The dinner, which was a sumptuous turkey repast, was served by the women of the church and was declared by such an eminent authority as the young Mr. W. S. SINKING RUM BOAT
REVEALED HISTORY
ROMANTIC CAREER

San Pedro, Calif.—With the sinking of the rum ship *Guilla*, off the coast of Northern California recently, it was revealed here that the vessel and a history of romance and adventure and was said once to have been owned by a king of Spain. Here is her history as told on "the beach."

When built 40 years ago for the Spanish king, the graceful clipper yacht, equipped with gold fitting and priceless draperies, was the envy of European royalty.

From the service of the king the vessel passed to that of an English merchant prince, then successively to war service, to a band of British adventurers who called her the *Frontiersman*, and finally, after the adventurers went bankrupt at San Pedro, into the liquor trade. She was not wanted by the legitimate lines of shipping, because she was a coal burning vessel on an oil burning coast.

Her decks equipped with machine guns to keep away hifiackers, she sailed for Havana under the new name of *Guilla* ran out of fuel off the west coast of Mexico. Her cabin was torn down and fed to the boiler fires, and as a last resort part of her rum cargo was fed to the flames a bottle at a time.

At Escondido, Lower California, 35 tons of coal were obtained, and the crew prayed that this fuel would take them to Vancouver. But her progress was retarded by a storm, and again the *Guilla* ran out of coal. She floundered at sea, a forbidden visitor to the nearby California shores which alone could give her aid.

The one-time royal clipper yacht went to the bottom, an abandoned dum runner, scuttled by her crew, reports say.

All the members of the crew were rescued by a passing ship and were brought to San Francisco.

Buyers of Winter
Furs Should Be Ever
Alert, Says Report

Olympia, Wash.—Fur-bearing animals the world over are steadily decreasing in number, but it will be possible to purchase some 30 varieties on the market by name at least, as long as there are plenty of rabbits, hares and muskrats obtainable, according to officials of the federal biological survey here. The survey is undertaking a campaign against the misnaming of furs, the movement having been started to protect the public against unscrupulous dealers.

Hares and rabbits, say the officials, are being sold under the names of American seal, Arctic seal, Cape seal, cat, chinchilla, clipped seal, coney, crmine, fox, French sable, Geller seal, La Meuse seal, new seal, Baltic fox, Baltic seal, muskrat, northern seal, Polar seal, Semense seal and sable. Muskrat appears on the market, it is claimed, under such alluring titles as Aleutian seal, electric seal, Hudson Bay seal, mole, real seal, Red liver seal, river mink, river sable and Russian otter.

No fault is found with names that merely fail to call attention to the fact that a particular fur comes from the back of a cat, rabbit or hare, but objection is made, the officials explain to fake names meant to deceive the buyer and to induce him to pay an unfairly high price.

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WHY NOT GREENVILLE?

In event that Trinity College declines the conditions upon which is based the gift of James B. Duke and it becomes necessary to establish a new institution, Duke University, why should it not be in Greenville? Should the establishment of the new institution become necessary it should be in the eastern section of the state, there being at present no university or men's college east of Raleigh, and the advantages offered by Greenville as the home of such a university are unsurpassed by any town or city in the state.

The achievements and wonderful growth of the East Carolina Teachers College since its establishment here about fifteen years ago demonstrates the many advantages for educational institutions offered by the section and especially by this city. From the standpoint of location, health, religion, and morality as well as industrially Greenville and Pitt county rank high among the counties of the state and it is these things that should be taken into consideration in allocating educational institutions.

Already other sections of the state are ready to offer considerations to procure the new university in event it is established. Charlotte has already offered a site of fifty acres for the institution. If eastern North Carolina is to reach the greatest heights of achieve-

ment, within its borders there must be institutions of learning and it is time the citizens and civic organizations of Greenville were getting busy. As stated above Greenville is unsurpassed as a desirable location for the Duke University. Ideal sites are available and other considerations can be offered when it becomes necessary.

If Trinity College accepts the terms of Mr. Duke's offer by changing its name to Duke University, all well and good, but in event of contrary action by the board of trustees of the college and the establishment of the university elsewhere, Why not in Greenville?

THE INDUSTRIAL BANK

That Greenville is to have an industrial bank is news that is welcomed by citizens of this community and especially those persons of moderate means. In places where such institutions are in operation records show that business has been stimulated because of the funds for trading made available through the weekly or monthly loan plan.

In brief the industrial banking plan means just this: If a young man working on a salary, but with good credit standing in the community, through sickness or other unavoidable cause, finds himself in debt and wishes to borrow the amount of a month's salary to tide him over and save him embarrassment until he can catch up, he can borrow this amount from the industrial bank and pay it back at the rate of \$2 per week on each \$100, or if he receives his pay by the month he can make monthly payments on his loan.

Such banks make loans for all purposes from \$5 up payable at 50c or more a week according to the amount borrowed. The new bank will also specialize in selling local securities on a weekly or monthly installment basis, thus encouraging thrift on the part of the city's wage earners. Another activity of the bank will be the discounting of paper for business houses selling their wares on the installment plan, the merchant being able to realize immediately upon his sales and the purchaser paying installments to the bank instead of the concern from which the purchase is made.

The project for such a banking institution in Greenville has received hearty support. Early establishment of the institution will be welcomed by all.

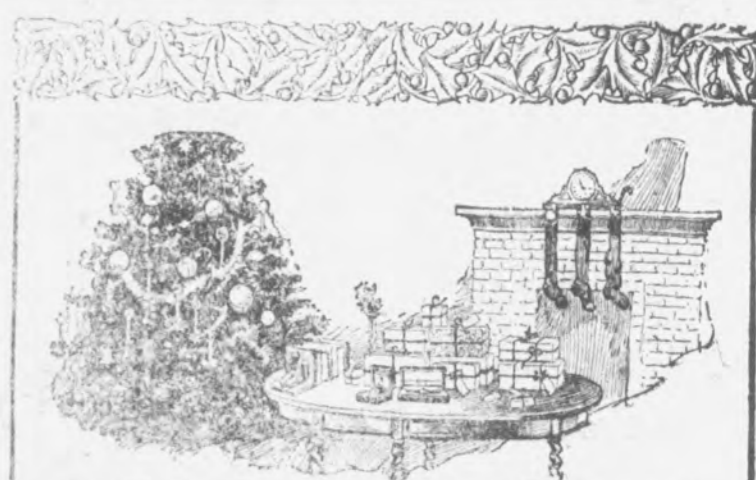
