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EQUALITY IN DEBT-COLLECTING

The Administration has made known its policy on several points which have arisen in the discussion of the funding of the European debts. First, it flatly denies the statement frequently made in Great Britain that Mr. Baldwin when he was in Washington obtained a promise that the British settlement would be revised if any other nation were given easier terms. Second, the Administration affirms the right of the American Government to make any sort of settlement it chooses with each nation, thus confirming the belief, based on the President's message, that the Administration contemplates a more favorable settlement with France. Third, it is announced that the British settlement is regarded as a closed matter.

In the strict letter of the law this is all correct enough, and if nothing else is worth considering except our legal rights there is nothing further to be said. But whether we like it or not, whether the Administration considers it relevant or not, debts of this magnitude contracted as these debts were, involving the taxation of whole nations over two or

generations, raise questions of policy which cannot be ignored. They are not merely commercial debts. They are not even ordinary peace-time governmental debts. Historically, psychologically and morally they are not isolated debts but integral parts of the vast interlocking structure of war and post-war finance. The United States cannot afford to dismiss as of no account all these considerations.

The issue at the bottom of the whole controversy is this: Shall interrelated payments be based on the principle of equality, each nation paying its creditors on the same terms, or shall each creditor make the best terms he can for himself, on the principle of the debtor's ability and willingness to pay him?

The second principle is the one now adopted by the Administration. It consists of separate settlements with each debtor nation regardless of the other creditors, and separate terms for each debtor nation regardless of the terms given other debtors. This was not, The World believes, the intent of Congress when it created the Debt Funding Commission. Nor will the principle have the approval of the American people when its practical results and moral significance are recognized.

For, granting our legal right to do what we choose, the unequal treatment of great powers in the collection of debts incurred in a common cause is objectionable. It establishes invidious distinctions between the credit of great nations. It cannot help producing resentment in the nations that have to pay the most, and it must produce a bad conscience in the nation collecting the debt.

A great international debt of this kind must rest finally on moral consent. Every attempt should be made to base it on willing moral consent. That can be done only if it is based on a simple rule of justice which all the world accepts. That rule in this case is the principle of equality. Any other principle applied to this intricate problem will cost us more in misunderstanding than we collect under it in dollars.—N. Y. World.

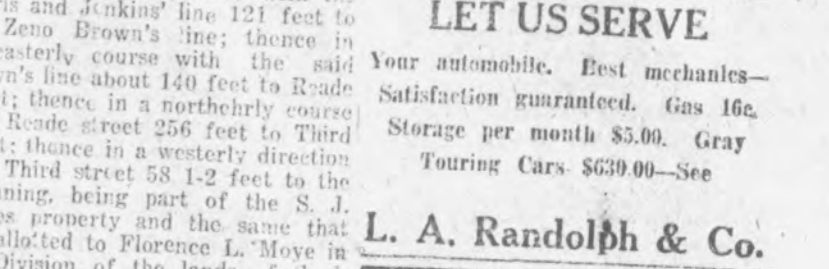

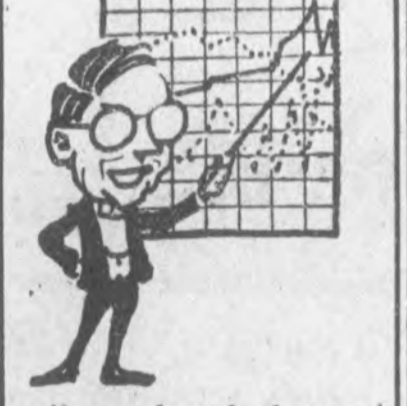

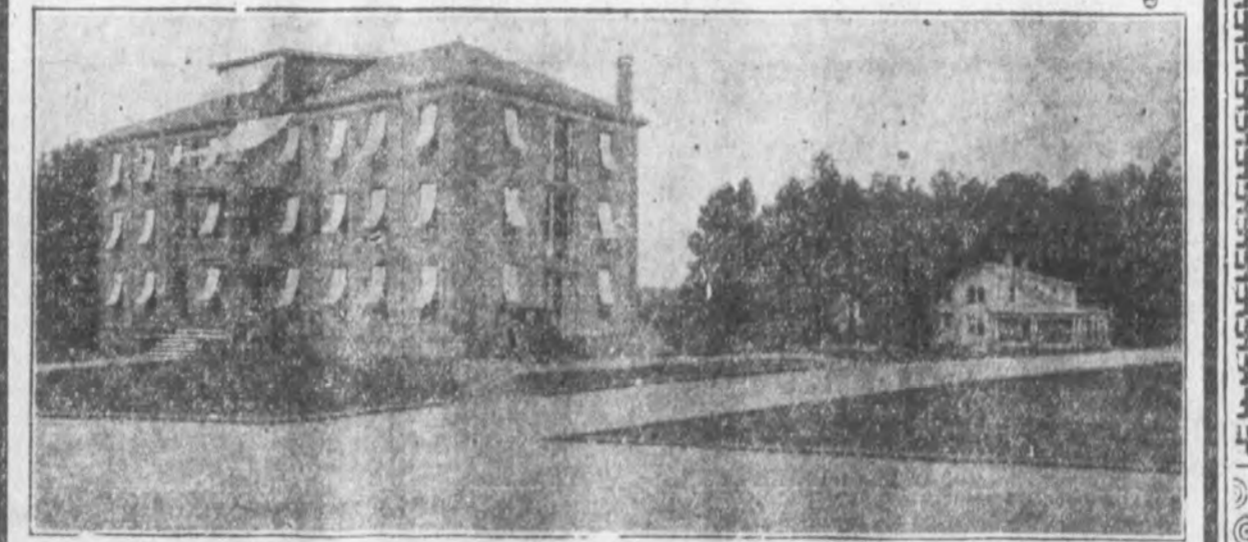
