## O. MAX GARDNER IS CHOSEN HEAD STATE AGRICUL. SOCIETY

## Fate of Annual State Fair Hangs in Bal- ance; Raleigh Urges Society to Continue Operation

Raleigh, Dec. 16.—O. Max Gardner, of Shelby, was elected president of the North Carolina Agriculture Society at its annual meeting here today to succeed Mrs. Edith Vanderbilt who retires after three years in that capacity. Four vice-presidents elected were Secretary of State W. N. Everett, Joseph Hyde Pratt, Commissioner of Agriculture W. A. Graham and Joseph E. Pogue, Henry M. London, of Raleigh, was re-elected secretary.

A short discussion was held on the proposed offer by the society to State College of the fair grounds on the condition that the fair be operated for 10 years and that the state assume a debt of approximately \$60,000. The City of Raleigh, holding an interest in the fair grounds, opposed the release of the property by the society unless a reversionary clause was placed in the transfer deeds assuring the return of the property to the city so that the perpetuity of the fair grounds operation would be established.

J. H. Bailey, speaking for the Raleigh Chamber of Commerce stated that the main cause of the society's giving up the operation of the annual state fair is that which the society could not get the Chamber of Commerce to lend the society \$60,000, the amount of the debt, or \$75,000 if necessary provided the society would operate the fair. In case of such a loan the fair grounds would be given as security, he said. The offer met with the approval of a number of members of the society and was referred to the new executive committee on motion by General Albert Cox. The new executive committee is yet to be appointed by President Gardner.

A rising vote of thanks was given Mrs. Vanderbilt, retiring president, for the work of the society in promotion of agriculture throughout the state. The executive committee was also directed to present the retiring president with a token of esteem from the society.

## House Urges Wilbur Seek Reappointment Lejeune Head Marines

Washington, Dec. 16.—The House Naval Committee today appointed three members to urge Secretary Wilbur to recommend to President Coolidge that he reappoint Major General J. A. Lejeune as commander of the Marine Corps for the next four years.

Washington, Dec. 16.—Representative Langley, of Kentucky, who was arrested Saturday night for intoxication, has returned to his home in Pikeville without making any statement as to the case. Representative Langley has been in ill health for some time and his physicians advised his return home, his office announced.

## France Has Not Made Definite Proposal As To Funding War Debt

Washington, Dec. 16.—Representative Crisp, Democrat, Georgia, member of the American Debt Funding Commission, announced formally today in the House that no concrete proposal for funding the French war debt to the United States had been brought to the American Commission by any official of France.

## SIX PERSONS DIE IN TENEMENT FIRE NEW YORK TODAY

## Five of Victims Believed to Be Women Who Were Trapped on Up- per Floors of Building

New York, Dec. 16.—Six persons are known to have perished in a fire which swept through a brick tenement house, off upper Fifth Avenue early today. The bodies have been recovered. At least three others were seriously burned by the flames which drove a score of families into the streets.

Five of the dead are believed to be women trapped on the upper floors of the house. Firemen made heroic efforts to rescue them from the fire which was discovered by a patrolman shortly after 3 o'clock. The tenants were awakened by the beating of a police club against their doors.

## Anderson Declares Trinity Will Gain By Changing Name

Nashville, Tennessee, Dec. 16.—Giving it as his opinion that Trinity College, Durham, N. C., should change its name to meet the conditions whereby it will be the beneficiary of the Duke millions, Dr. Stone-wall Anderson, general secretary of the Board of Education, M. E. Church South, says that the Trinity College will have nothing to lose and much to gain by this course.

"The establishment of the \$40,000,000 foundation fund for educational purposes on the part of James B. Duke is praise-worthy and should receive the commendation of all good men," asserted the Board secretary. "Mr. Duke is one of the few Southern men who have given munificently to educational and charitable purposes. It is a great example for other wealthy men in the South."

"I notice that Mr. Duke in his gift made provision for \$6,000,000 to be used for the establishment of university as a memorial to his father, Washington Duke. It further provides that Trinity College may become the beneficiary of this fund and of other funds provided by trust on condition that its name be changed to Duke University and its plans enlarged so as to become a university in fact."

"I do not know the minds of the trustees and of the alumni and friends of the institution, but I do think that Trinity should meet the conditions of being the beneficiary of Mr. Duke's great gift. Trinity College is already a great institution and owes its greatness largely to the Duke family. Washington Duke was benefactor of the college during his lifetime, and since his death members of his family have given generously to the college. In my judgment Trinity will give up nothing by changing its name to Washington Duke University."

## FARMER HELD FOR KILLING OWN SON

## Greene County Farmer Claims That Gun Was Accidentally Dis- charged But Is Held By Coroner

Snow Hill, Dec. 15.—The 14-year-old son of Ed Goff was killed by his father this morning about 9 o'clock at the family home about six miles from Snow Hill on the old Kinston Road. A jury impaneled by Dr. W. E. Dawson, coroner, found that the boy was killed by his father and directed that the father be held for the grand jury.

Goff claimed that the killing was an accident. He said he was trying to see if the gun was loaded and it went off accidentally, the load taking effect in the side of the boy.

The lad, who had been sitting before the fire place, leaped to his feet and ran out on the porch. There he fell dead. The father, according to the younger children, followed the boy to the porch and tried to lift him to his feet and failing in that carried him to a bed.

The principal witnesses before the jury of inquest were the three smaller children, Lois, Charlie and Marion. Charlie said that his father pointed the gun at his mother to scare her and that it went off and the load hit his older brother who was beyond his mother. Mrs. Goff claimed to have had her attention directed to something else just at the moment and not to know exactly how the shooting occurred.

News of the affair quickly reached the county seat and Sheriff E. A. Rarberry and Deputy Sheriff F. C. Carraway hurried to the scene of the killing. Goff made no resistance. The Sheriff took him in charge, bringing him here and placing him in the county jail.

The man showed some evidences of having been drinking. Eight or ten gallons of moonshine whiskey was found in the woods near the Goff dwelling. Bloody finger prints were found on the bag containing the liquor and the theory of the officers is that Goff carried the whiskey out after he had placed the lifeless body of his son on the bed.

## Two Confederate Vets Dead, Two Others Are Injured in Fire Today

Beauvoir, Miss., Dec. 16.—Two Confederate Veterans were burned to death and two others were injured when fire destroyed a dormitory of the Jefferson Davis Soldiers' Home at 2:30 this morning.

The dead are J. F. Sharpe, 78, Columbus, Miss., and J. P. Hunter, 80, Laurel, Miss.

Twenty men were asleep in the one story frame building when the structure was discovered in flames. Volunteers fought their way through the smoke and flame, and carried the veterans to safety. Sharpe and Hunter could not be reached and their charred bodies were found in bed later.

The origin of the fire has not been determined but it is believed to have been due to an open fireplace.

## BALTIMORE JUDGE TAX PUBLICATION IS WITHIN THE LAW

## Federal Judge Soper Sustains Demurer of Baltimore Post in In- dictment for Publish- ing Income Tax Re- turns

Baltimore, Dec. 16.—Federal Judge Morris A. Soper today sustained the demurer of the Baltimore Post to indictment charging illegal publication of tax returns. United States Attorney Woodcock, who handled the case for the government, said the question of an appeal would be decided by the Department of Justice at Washington.

The demurer admitted the facts set forth in the indictment that the Post published the tax payments of the five persons named therein but contended that no law was violated. Judge Soper held that by the act of 1924 it was plain that Congress had determined to abandon the policy of secrecy from the general public concerning the amount of taxes paid.

Washington, Dec. 16.—The United States Attorney at Baltimore will be instructed immediately to file an appeal from the ruling of Federal Judge Soper in the Baltimore Daily Post tax publication case.

Mrs. Mabel Walker Willebrandt, assistant attorney general, explained that the department had no other interest in the question other than that of determining exactly what Congress had intended to do.

## DEATH TOLL FROM POISON WHISKEY MOUNTS TO NINE

## 67 Others, 12 of Whom Are Expected to Die; Are In Hospitals From Drinking Poison Whis- key

New York, Dec. 16.—The death toll of poisoned liquor during the past three days mounted to nine with the death of Abraham Botnoy, in a Brooklyn hospital today. Sixty-seven other poison victims are in Bellevue Hospital and 12 of them are not expected to live. Several others may be blinded.

The death list so far for December is 25. Federal Prohibition officials say the presence of the poison liquor is due to the embargo against smuggling whiskey into the country that has been established off the coast by the Coast Guard patrols.

Two of the poison liquor victims to die in the past three days were women.

## Manager of Raleigh Baseball Team Will Be Married Dec. 27

Raleigh, Dec. 16.—Invitations have been received in this city announcing the approaching marriage of Van Duke Duncan, manager and part owner of the Raleigh baseball club, to Miss Elizabeth Moore, of Baskerville, Va. The wedding will take place on December 27.

Mr. Duncan is a graduate of the University of North Carolina, a native of Clayton and has managed the Raleigh baseball club for the past two years.

## INVESTIGATION OF FEDERAL PEN. MAY CAUSE CLEAN HOUSE

## Assistant Attorney General Arrives in At- lanta to Aid in Investi- gation of Personnel

Atlanta, Dec. 16.—Interest in an investigation which may result in a general house cleaning among officials of the Federal Penitentiary here today centered around the arrival here of Assistant Attorney General W. J. Donovan, from Washington, and the meeting of the Federal Grand Jury.

The Assistant Attorney General expected to confer with District Attorney Hager who on last night stated he had not received official reports on the situation at the prison during the day. T. B. White, representative of the Bureau of Investigation of the Department of Justice remained in charge of the prison to day as temporary successor to A. E. Sartain, deposed warden.

Sartain, whose resignation followed close that of D. J. Allen, prison purchasing agent, last week his silence in a public statement in which he declared he had been discharged solely for the purpose of paying off old scores on the part of certain individuals. The individuals were not named by him he said because he desired to remain silent regarding them at present.

"My resignation was requested by Attorney General Stone on the ground that I was too lenient with bootlegger inmates of the prison," he said. "Several investigators have been conducting inquiries of the prison" he continued, by methods that were unfair. The men who conducted these investigations are not trained prison investigators, but are unscrupulous bootlegger chasers and they got so much as I served me. During a period of two months," Sartain continued, "my mail was opened regularly before I received it and my telephone was tapped. My private bank account had also been checked up," he declared.

Washington, Dec. 16.—A resolution proposing a constitutional amendment providing for election of the president by a plurality of electors rather than a majority was introduced today by Senator Johnson, Republican, California, candidate for Republican presidential nomination in the last pre-convention campaign.

## MOODY TRAINED BIBLE STUDENTS LABOR IN ALL PARTS OF WORLD

Chicago.—Moody Bible institute, since its foundation in 1886, has trained and sent to foreign mission fields, 1,252 men and women, 917 whom still are in active service, according to a report of the institute. Within the last few months, 60 of the Moody students have sailed to foreign field, under the direction of 27 boards. Forty-five are now under appointment, with as many more having made application. Ten thousand other Moody students have been sent to all parts of the world as apotors, evangelists, Bible teachers, and rescue mission workers.

## HISTORIC OXFORD TO BE HOME SILVER FOXES FROM CANADA

London, England's first venture in silver fox farming is to get under way shortly, and already 29 pair of foxes have been brought here from Canada and installed on a plot of ground near Oxford.

The 40 animals, which will be used for breeding purposes, are valued at \$40,000. The promoter of the enterprise, a former Canadian army officer, believes that the climate of England is ideally suited to the raising of silver foxes, and hopes to expand his farm to include several hundred foxes within the next year or so.

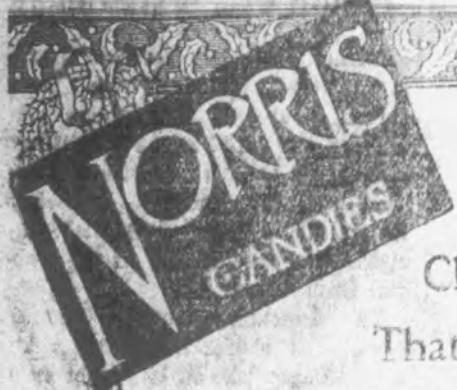

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### POSTAL SALARIES AND REVENUES

While newspapers throughout the country do not oppose the passage of the postal salaries increase bill, whereby postal employees might be enabled to live according to the standards that their positions require, and while they do not oppose a revision in rates on all classes of mail in order to make the increase in such salaries possible, the papers do contend that the revisions in rates should be worked out on a business-like basis and the rate increased in the various departments according to the deficits caused by that department taking into consideration the importance of the mail matter distributed through each department.

Reviewing the situation and in answer to Senator Reed's statement that newspapers of the country would fight against overriding the president's veto of the salaries increase bill if the measure were coupled with the rate revision bill the Virginian Pilot says:

"There is unanswerable logic in the contention of President Coolidge and Postmaster General New that the proposed increase in postal salaries should be matched with rate increases large enough to make the Postoffice Department a self-sustaining institution. A public transportation service, whether privately operated or operated by the Government, should pay its own way. The only way to bring this about is to make a fair distribution of the operating burden among the different classes of traffic.

"In his new recommendations to Congress, Postmaster General New proposes rate increases for every classification except letter mail. Newspapers and periodicals are to be made to contribute an additional \$10,876,000. This item alone, thinks Senator Reed, of Missouri, is sufficient to prevent the passing of the vetoed postal salary increase bill over the President's objections, if the salary bill is made dependent on the rate increase bill.

"You will then have every newspaper in the country, or practically all of them, here fighting to override the veto." So Senator Reed warns.

"Senator Reed's suggestion that the newspapers are fatally against any upward revision of second class rates and therefore one of the chief obstacles to the Postmaster General's plan for making his department self-sustaining, needs correction. What the newspapers are against is a raising of second class rates that cannot be justified by a business-like statement of real handling costs. They are also against the business of recouping a deficit by increasing the tariff on the distribution of news, advertisements and information, while the parcels post distribution of merchandise is cheerfully carried on at a loss. In the absence of a full statement of the cost-ascertainment process, it is not to be accepted that the \$12,000,000 additional revenue which the Postmaster General proposes to derive from an increase in parcels post rates completely wipes out the parcels post deficit. Whatever may be said in extenuation of the practice of partially-subsidizing certain classes of mail service on the ground of encouraging the prompt and inexpensive dissemination of information and intelligence, nothing can be said in favor of subsidizing the distribution of merchandise. Here the Government comes into competition with private transportation companies. It is an important economic function of the parcels post to set a transportation-at-cost standard which private transportation companies must approximate or lose business. The parcels post becomes a destructive economic factor when its rates are fixed on a below-cost basis.

"The newspapers seek no subsidies. They are entitled to special protection against discrimination because of the peculiar part they play in the rapid dissemination of intelligence, and in the maintenance of the alert public opinion that is or ought to be the product of this dissemination. They are not protected against this discrimination when they are unscientifically lumped with long tons of 'smelly story' magazines and made to contribute to the burden of carrying this garbage thousands of miles from the point at which it is spewed up.

"The newspapers will welcome a scientific revision of the postal rates that will truly make each class pay its own way. An overhauling of the parcel post rates with this purpose in mind, has been long overdue. Overdue, also, is a study of the part played in the postoffice deficit by the tons of franked matter that official Washington daily puts in the mails—most of it, as everybody knows, destined for the junkman. If every Government department were required to stamp its outgoing 'literature' it would make for a wholesome curtailment of waste distribution, and a better understanding of Postoffice Department economics."

## PUBLIC FORUM

TO THE EDITOR OF THE DAILY REFLECTOR.

Thank you for your editorial yesterday concerning the condition of our streets from lack of sweeping. By this editorial you have unmistakably expressed an appreciation of the cleanliness of our streets prior to this time and since the sweeper was purchased in 1920.

For the benefit of your information as well as that of the public, we wish to state that for the past 45 days we have had to go back to the old hand method of cleaning the streets, as it was done prior to the purchase of the sweeper, which at the time of its purchase caused quite a bit of criticism. The reason for having to revert to the old method of cleaning the streets is that the sweeper having been operated continuously for 4 years, was badly in need of repairs and overhauling. Therefore, the sweeper either had to be discarded and a new sweeper costing \$7500.00 purchased or the old sweeper laid up for overhauling and the installation of new parts which had worn out, and of necessity they had to be ordered from Elgin, Illinois.

Through no fault of ours there has been some delay in receiving the necessary parts, but we hope within a few days, possibly the later part of this week, to have the sweeper back on the job in practically a new condition and at a cost not exceeding \$1500.00, thus saving the taxpayers \$6000.00, besides a still greater delay which is always incident to the purchase of a new machine of this sort, as they can not be received some months after purchasing.

We agree with you that clean streets are one of the best advertisements and assets a town can have and correspondingly dirty streets are repulsive to ourselves and detrimental in the eyes of visitors, hence one of the prides of this administration has been cleanliness. In not knowing the facts your criticism was a just one which we always welcome, and we reiterate our appreciation of your having noticed the absence of the sweeper from the condition of the streets as cleaned under the old method, although you did not do so for some 45 days. Of course we did not expect you to notice the absence of the sweeper itself, as the sweeping is done between the hours of 1 and 5 a. m.

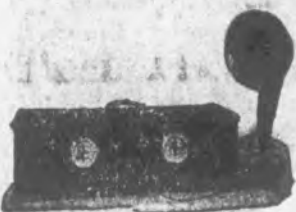

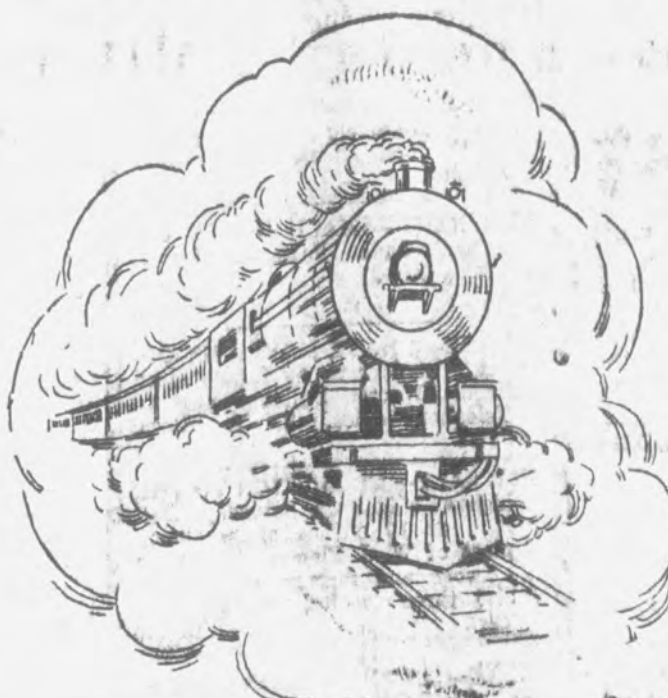
