CHICAGO CUBS BOY CATCHER CLIMBS TO HIGH PLACE RAPIDLY

New York, Dec. 23.—Few persons who have picked 1924 All-Star National League teams, or "All" combinations from both leagues, have left off Charles Leo Harnett, sensational young catcher of the Chicago Cubs.

Harnett, who is only 24, attained fame this year with a fine record of 100 catches. He batted over .300, slugged out 17 two-baggers and 10 home runs. His speed of foot, an unusual asset for a backstop, was shown by his theft of ten bases.

When Grover Alexander, one of the greatest pitchers of all time, started his sensational comeback early last season, he chose Harnett as his regular receiving mate. The young catcher was given much credit for his handling of the veteran until Alex suffered an injury that forced him to the bench. Incidentally, Harnett and Alexander were buddies with the A. E. F. in France.

Harnett was first as a first string catcher with the Cubs in competition with another star, O'Farrell. The younger man's batting was the deciding factor in his favor.

Harnett was born in Millville, Mass., and started his diamond career with the Worcester Club of the Eastern League in 1921. He worked only one year in the minors before he was purchased by the Cubs, with whom he started the 1922 season. He was in only 51 games the first season, 65 in 1923 and 121 in the campaign recently closed.

Harnett was developed by Bill Kiffin, Cubs manager, who formerly was one of the best catchers in the game.

WOMAN'S PLUCKY BATTLE RESULTS IN DEATH BIG OWL

Tacoma.—A great owl that had long been killing poultry and wild game near South Bend, Wash., was caught and slain as a result of the pluck of Mrs. W. A. Wilson.

The woman, who lives on a ranch, heard a hen making a commotion, and she saw a great horned owl attacking it. She ran out, grasped the owl and held on to it despite wounds from its talons and beak. She called her husband, who killed the marauder. It measured four feet five inches across the wings.

ABUSE OF PRIVILEGE MAY LIMIT POLISH LEGISLATORS' FREE RIDES

Warsaw.—The 411 deputies and 111 senators all enjoy the privilege of free travel on Polish railways. In this way a good part of the time of Polish deputies is spent in trips all over the country, having no relation what ever to legislative duties.

Objections having been raised in parliament to the privilege, it is believed that Poland will eventually now free passage of members of parliament only when they are proceeding to or coming from the capital.

BERLIN FIXES HOURS OF LABOR FOR SELF-SUPPORTING STUDENTS

Berlin.—Students earning their livelihood will not be allowed to work longer than four hours daily for their support, according to Dr. Koeth, the retiring president of Berlin university. Because of the belief that close connection with more or less radical workmen might "impregnate" the young students with socialist ideas, the problem of the poor student, forced to work his way through university, has worried the president.

PALMAS ISLAND PROSPERS DESPITE DISPUTED TITLE

Manila.—The Netherlands and the United States are still disputing the possession of Palmas Island, the most southerly island of the Philippine archipelago, about 150 miles south of Mindanao. The Netherlands, however, are in control of the tiny speck of land, which was ceded to the United States by Spain under the treaty of Paris.

The affairs of the island are administered by the government of Java, and excellent progress has been made in the establishment of schools and the building of roads.

GROUPE OF CALIFORNIANS SOUGHT TO LEASE ALASKA FROM RUSSIA, HE SAYS

Seattle, Dec.—Information that the government purchase of Alaska in 1897 was completed only after a San Francisco, Calif., company had been offered a lease of the territory, has been revealed in an interview with the late Quentin Cole, former United States Senator, according to Professor Edmund S. Meany of the University of Washington.

Professor Meany said the interview was obtained last year by Victor Egan, a former member of Washington faculty. The purchase was made as an alternative to the lease. Mr. Cole told Mr. Farrar that in March, 1897, he negotiated with Baron Stecki, minister plenipotentiary of the Russian government, for the lease of Alaska by the San Francisco Company.

EMANCIPATION ASS'N. CELEBRATE ANNIVERSARY LINCOLN PROCLAMATION

Winston-Salem, Dec. 9.—The Emancipation Association of North Carolina will celebrate the sixty-second anniversary of Lincoln's emancipation proclamation at the Fourteenth Street School for negroes here on January 1, it has been announced by Professor R. W. Brown, president of the association.

The program for the celebration has not yet been completed, but it was stated that there will be several speakers of prominence, to appear before the association meeting to which the public is invited. This celebration is, always well attended, it was said, and is an occasion of much interest by the public as well as the members of the association.

Officers of the association are R. W. Brown, president; Oscar L. Foy, secretary; Rev. J. H. Curry, treasurer; J. W. Lewis, chorister, and Rev. H. M. Mills, chaplain.

WASHINGTON SCHOOLS FACE WEALTH FOR YEARS TO COME

Tacoma.—A great fund, ultimately to amount to \$100,000,000, is being built up for the schools of the state of Washington. It is called "the permanent school fund" and is protected by law so that it can never be touched; the interest alone will be

used to help maintain the schools. The fund now amounts to more than \$22,000,000 and is invested in bonds. The money has come from the sale of school lands of the state, and only slightly more than one-fourth of the lands have been transferred. These lands, some of them covered with timber as good as can be found in the nation, are continually rising in value. Clark V. Savidge, state commissioner of public

lands, estimates that the school endowment will exceed \$100,000,000 when all the lands have been sold. The state has reserved all mineral, gas and oil rights that may be involved, and this is expected to be a source of large revenue to the schools of the future.

**INURED TO BOMB
OUTRAGES LISBON
LIVES UNCONCERNED**

Lisbon, Dec. 23.—Lisbon has been the scene of many bomb outrages during the last two months, but the ravages are altering the appearance of the central part of the city. In all the principal streets there are ruined shops and blackened piles of stone marking the scene of each explosion while neighboring buildings show shattered windows and cracked walls. It is all the work of communists, and just at present the strikes of barbers and waiters afford them an excuse for this destruction. The explosions occur almost nightly, and cafes, hotels and barber shops are the chief sufferers. Dynamite and nitro-glycerine are used. The bombs are set off

secretly under the eyes of the police. The originals are seldom caught. Arrestation in the form of assassination, and as a result the officers of the law are apathetic. The activity of these agitators does not end with bomb explosions. To them is attributed by the public a recent series of railroad accidents, including a derailment in which there were 30 casualties. In spite of the fact that a Lisbon crowd nearly lynched two alleged communists the other day, arrested for exploding a bomb, the people of this city have grown to accept these outrages. They do not even seem interested. There are places where it rains every day, they say, others where thunderstorms are frequent; in Lisbon there are daily bomb outrages.

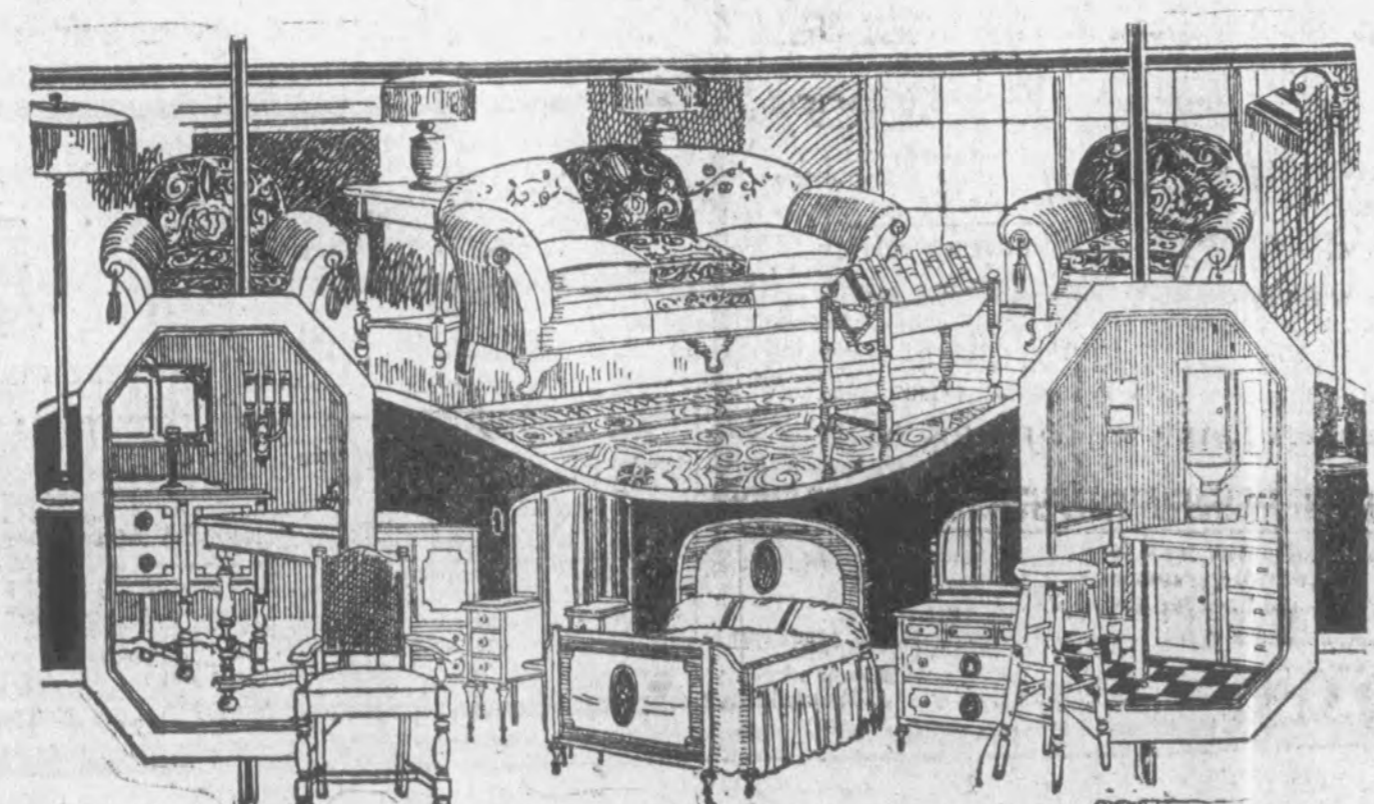
