THIRTEEN LOSE LIVES BEFORE ONRUSH OF LIME MUCK WHEN DAM BREAKS

Holston River Valley, Virginia, Laid Waste When Reservoir of Mathieson Alkali Works Gives Way

Richmond, Va., Dec. 26.—Four more bodies were found today in the muck from the dam which broke Wednesday night flooding the lower section of Saltville, according to a long distance telephone call today to the Associated Press from Saltville.

The finding of these bodies brought the number of dead to 13 and seven persons are still missing.

Saltville, Va., Dec. 26.—With nine bodies thus far recovered and six or seven persons still missing search for the victims continued today in the area of Holston River valley laid waste by a flood of lime muck released by the breaking Wednesday night of the dam at the Mathieson Alkali Works.

While more than a score of injured lay in improvised hospitals today searchers continued to fight their way through stretches of lime mud deposited by the torrent.

Four or five of the injured are not expected to live. Many are suffering from pneumonia as a result of exposure and burns.

Several bodies recovered had been carried six miles below the dam in Tumbling Creek.

Belief that some of the missing still lay buried under the avalanche of mud standing waist high in places has kept the searchers at their task for more than 36 hours.

The river valley today with its deep fair of lime mud had the appearance of an ice gorge. Houses were crushed and crushed by the weight of the reservoir mixture and automobiles covered almost to their tops presented a scene of desolation.

Most of the victims were attending a Christmas Eve party at the home of Harry Brater, the house nearest the dam. With only a minute's warning of deafening roar as the dam broke the merry-makers were trapped without a chance to save themselves.

Control Commission Discovers Arms Depot In Berlin, Says Echo.

Paris, Dec. 26.—Officers from the Inter-Allied Control Commission have discovered in Berlin a depot of rifle and machine gun barrels the Echo de Paris learns from "an incontrovertible informant" in Germany.

An inventory now being taken has accounted for 49,000 barrels and it is expected the total will reach 100,000. The depot was found in a cunningly devised hiding place.

Architects Working Final Plans Junior Order Orphan's Home

High Point, Dec. 26.—Architects of this city are working on the final plans for five of the buildings to be erected at Lexington as the National Junior Order Orphan's Home. It has been announced here. The National Council of the Junior O. U. A. M. and the North Carolina State Department of that fraternity are co-operating in the erection of the home.

The first payment by the North Carolina department to the funds for the home was made some weeks ago, it was said, and other funds are expected from this state soon.

The newly-elected president has always been an active worker in the club and, according to the members, is expected to lead the organization to great advances in its general work during the coming year.

FATE OF KID M'COY IN HANDS OF JURY

Los Angeles, Dec. 26.—The jury which will decide whether Norman Selby, the Kid McCoy of pugilistic fame, killed Mrs. Theresa Mors in the apartment in which they lived as Mr. and Mrs. N. Shields, or whether she committed suicide, today attempts to prevent her, as claimed by the former fighter, today received instructions from the presiding judge and retired to consider the case.

Should the jury acquit McCoy he still faces several other indictments charging robbery, and an attempt to murder which grew out of a hold-up and shooting orgy in the Mors antique shop the morning after Mrs. Mors had died of bullet wounds.

Woman Takes Wild Ride When Train Crashes Into Auto

Indianapolis, Ind., Dec. 26.—Thrown onto the pilot of the Knickerbocker Special, the last "Big Four" passenger train, after the train had crashed into the automobile in which she was riding, killed one and injured three members of her family, Mrs. Kenneth Clark, 18, of this city had a 12 mile ride last night until she fell from the train into a ditch near Okladon, Ind. Although unconscious when she was found a short time later by a farmer, she was not seriously injured.

A baby, 22 months old, was hurled from automobile when it was struck by the train, but escaped unhurt. Mrs. Clark's mother-in-law was killed in the crash.

Name of Norwegian Capital Will Be Changed New Year's

Christiania, Norway, Dec. 26.—The name of Christiania which the capital of Norway has borne for 300 years will be replaced January 1 by Oslo, the ancient name by which the city was known for 900 years.

900 years ago King Harold III founded Oslo. Then 600 years later this city on the Fjord that winds down to the Skaggerack, lay in ashes. King Christian, then ruler of Norway and Denmark, founded a new town across the bay calling it Christiania. The two cities grew up side by side until they were one and on New Year's Day the ancient designation Oslo will be restored.

Allies Not to Evacuate Cologne Bridgehead

Paris, Dec. 26.—The Allied Council of Ambassadors at its meeting here tomorrow is expected to confirm the decision taken by the British and French governments not to evacuate the Cologne bridgehead on January 10.

The ambassadors in addition, it is forecasted, will send a memorandum to Berlin explaining the decision.

TRIAL FOR CANCELLATION OF TEAPOT DOME OIL LEASES CONTINUED UNTIL MARCH 9

Cheyenne, Wyoming, Dec. 26.—Judge T. Blake Kennedy this morning granted a continuance until March 9 of the trial of the government's suit in equity for annulment of the Mammoth Oil Company's lease on Teapot Dome oil reservation.

POISONED WHISKEY TAKES MORE LIVES IN NEW YORK CITY

New York, Dec. 26.—Three men are dead and 31 others are in Bellevue Hospital and the police court calendars are crowded as a result of drinking yesterday in this city in celebration of Christmas.

In addition to the dead and sick between 40 and 50 persons are in the accident ward of the hospital suffering from injuries received in fights or falls due to liquor.

Yesterday fatalities increased to 34 the number of deaths in this city from poisoned liquor during the month.

FOUR LOSE LIVES FROM ACCIDENTS IN GREENSBORO

Greensboro, Dec. 26.—Four lives were lost in accidents here yesterday and last night. J. D. Powell, 33, of Ahoskie, died soon after a passenger train had struck his automobile at a street crossing here last night. A negro man and negro woman were killed when their automobile rolled over the Greensboro-Burlington road. A third negro was instantly killed when he was run over by an automobile driven by G. C. Brown, of Sumnerfield, on the Guilford Battle Ground.

Roach Farrar Porter to Remain In State Service

Raleigh, Dec. 26.—Roach Farrar, the long service porter of the Governor's office, recently came into the outside public eye by news articles that told of his service under several governors and by the fact that he will be one of the few of the offices forces of the changing administration, and departments that will remain. Pascual Williams, the porter of the office of the Secretary of State, a much younger man and who won fame on the battle fields of France as a sergeant, tried to cut down Roach's popularity by capturing a desperate rodent that had menaced the feminine employees of the Secretary's office and for which he was duly presented to the public.

Negro Woman Was Murdered In Gastonia Last Night

Gastonia, Dec. 26.—Mattie Mills, an aged negro woman, was found dead in the street near her home here today shot through the head. Robbery is supposed to have been the motive. Police have found no clues.

Found Dead in Car Parked Beside Road

Oxford, Dec. 26.—Clyde Cannady, 28, was found dead sitting in his automobile near Blackman's Bridge, 12 miles from here, yesterday morning. Robbery is believed to have been the motive as the pockets of the victim were turned out when found.

Two More Weekly Newspapers Are to Enter Field Soon

Durham, Dec. 26.—Following the entrance of the Durham County Progress, a weekly newspaper, into the field last Friday, announcement has been made by W. W. Weaver, president and manager of the Durham Publishing Company, that two other weekly newspapers are to be established in the coming month.

One of these papers will be published in and for Orange county and the other in Alamance county. The weeklies will be devoted to the interests of the counties at large and particularly of the rural communities, the announcement states.

According to Mr. Weaver, it is the purpose of the Durham Publishing Company to establish and operate a chain of these weeklies throughout this section of the state.

HEARINGS CONTINUE ON POSTAL INCREASE

Washington, Dec. 26.—Pressing ahead with its hearings on the administration's postal rate increase bill with a view of completing its work this week, the joint committee of the Senate and House today heard representatives of publishing interests present their arguments against the increase in second class rates.

The hearings have developed opposition from these interests as the second class rate embraces newspapers and magazines. Their contention is that this class of mail now bears too much of the general post office expense.

The committee plans to report the bill to the Senate immediately after the Christmas recess and before the president's veto of the Postal Salaries Increase bill is called up by unanimous consent on January 5.

Student Government Inaugurated Senior High School Raleigh

Raleigh, Dec. 26.—Student government has been inaugurated in the Senior High School of Raleigh. It has been enforced about a week and since its inauguration the students have voluntarily given up the shooting of fire crackers around the building and other improvements have been noted. INVESTIGATING DEATH OF WILLIAM NELSON M'CLINTOCK

Chicago, Dec. 26.—Further investigations into the death of William Nelson McClintock "Millionaire Orphan" waited today for reports of pathologists who examined his exhumed body for possible discovery of poison traces and also the arrival here of William Sheppard, lawyer-chemist and chief heir to the estate.

Mr. Sheppard at whose home McClintock died on December 4 and whose wife was McClintock's guardian until he became of age last spring left for Chicago today. He will be questioned by the state attorney when he arrives here.

The investigation into the death of McClintock was started when certain unnamed persons expressed dissatisfaction with the physicians report that death was the result of typhoid fever.

Christmas Tree in State Department Of Statistics

Raleigh, Dec. 26.—Santa Claus arrived early in the State Department Statistics this year and gave the detail and figure chasing employees who work under Frank Parker, State Statistician, a Christmas tree on Tuesday. The employees of the office presented their chief with an engraved silver flashlight so that he could find any missing figures. Rhodes, assistant statistician, who removed the fits from the gayly decorated tree and presented them with glowing speeches of eulogy to the members of the office force. Every member remembered every other member, there being eight persons and sixty-four gifts.

Joint Funeral Services Held Today for Victims of Oklahoma's Worst Christmas Tragedy

Hobart, Oklahoma, Dec. 26.—All of the 33 victims of the fire which destroyed the school house during a Christmas Eve meeting having been identified the people of Babbs Switch settlement today set about the sad work of interment.

Plans for using a common grave were abandoned last night when the identity of all the victims was established. Joint funeral services for 16 of the dead will be held this afternoon followed by burial in individual graves. The remaining seven victims of the fire will be buried probably tomorrow.

Twenty persons injured in the fire are still in a hospital and six of them are expected to recover. A committee of Hobart citizens has been appointed to provide for the children orphaned by the fire and to work toward the rehabilitation of the home life of Babbs Switch. A movement is under way to raise funds for a monument to those who were killed in Oklahoma's worst Christmas tragedy.

Authorities said they expected to take no action toward investigating the cause of Hobart's worst fire. Vigilance of the school trustees in placing wire netting at the windows to keep out vandals was held chiefly responsible for the heavy loss of life. Could the windows of the one story structure been used as a means of exit all of the 200 persons in the building could have escaped it is believed. As it was the door was the door was the only exit and there was such a rush to it that persons further away had little chance of escape as the fire starting from a candle on a Christmas tree swept through the small structure.

The public generally will take all these protestations of humility with a grain of salt, knowing it has been the habit of these leaders to jump into the political arena at any time and offer to take charge of state or national affairs.

The November election was such a condemnation of bloc, class and special interest politics that belated modesty of any class organization seems too much like a compulsory flare of virtue assumed for the time being.
