APPREHENSION AS
FRENCH WAR DEBT
NOW DIMINISHINGFinance Ministry De-
clares There Was No
Intention to Repudiate
Obligations to Ameri-
ca.

Washington, Dec. 30.—Unequivocal assurance from the French Embassy that France had no thought of disavowing her war debt to the United States had served largely today to mollify the wave of apprehension which enveloped the American capital on the heels of what was constructed as a hint from Paris of the possibility of such a course.

In reiterating the intention of their government to meet its obligations the embassy officials took occasion to explain the legal exactions concerning the new balance sheet recently given out by the French Ministry of Finance which by omitting all reference to the American debt appeared to have given rise to the concern here. Because it comes under the class of contemplated payments at an indefinite time and for which there has been no definite appropriation, the embassy declared, under a provision of the law preventing the inclusion of such items in the budget it was omitted.

Paris, Dec. 30.—Finance minister Clementel has no intention of proposing the pooling of the allied war debt. He merely mentioned it as a theoretical view in the recent inventory of France's financial position. This explanation was given by the Finance Minister in a statement today when he learned of the impression created by the inventory in the United States.

He declared he was the victim of the practice of quoting isolated passages without reference to the whole text.

Washington, Dec. 30.—President Coolidge has drawn no hasty conclusions of the recent swirl of developments surrounding the French war debt and sees no occasion for action of the American government on the basis of present advice.

The president is watching the situation closely, however, and should there be any indicative move by the French government to repudiate its obligations he might use the influence of the White House, strongly in his attitude toward the flotation of privation loans in this country. While there is no legal restraint giving the federal government authority over loans which foreign governments seek to place with private interests in this country the advice of Washington is usually sought by prospective investors and is usually sufficient to determine the fate of any such venture.

County Wide Tax
Election To Be Held
In Durham County

Durham, Dec. 30.—A county-wide tax election will be held within the next four months in this county, according to a resolution passed by the Durham County School Board in joint session with the City School Board here on December 23 last.

There are two purposes of the county-wide tax election, it was explained. These are given as the equalization of school taxes throughout the county and the equalization of districts affected by the recent extension of the city limits of Durham in order to make the city limits and the city district schools in the same scope.

The tax to be assessed is not to exceed 25 cents on each \$100 of property valuation.

10,000 Packages,
500,000 Letters Are
Handled at Durham

Durham, Dec. 30.—The post office here set at least a local during the holidays for handling mail, according to Postmaster Mason who states that he is conservative when he places the number packages handled by the office during the last three days before Christmas at 10,000 and the number letters at 500,000.

Urges Annulment of
Childless Marriages.

Dr. A. S. Pinto, city health commissioner of Omaha, Neb., has announced his belief—and is adhering firmly to it, despite a storm of protest—that childless marriages should be declared void after two years. Mrs. Pinto is one of those who takes issue with the Commissioner. She contends their marriage would have been one of those annulled had such regulations been effective for their first child was born more than two years after they had been married.

JAPANESE STEAMER
IS IN FLAMES OFF
CALIFORNIA COASTPassengers and Most of
Crew Taken From the
Vessel by Rescue Ship
Early Today

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 30.—The fire aboard the Japanese liner Cinyo Maru was reported worse and making headway at 10 o'clock this morning according to a message relayed to the Federal Steamship Company here from a passing steamer. The ship had picked up another call for assistance from the Cinyo.

Los Angeles, Cal., Dec. 30.—After fighting flames aboard the Japanese freighter Cinyo Maru throughout the night the remnant crew of 30 men left the vessel at daybreak today off the Mexican coast to board the rescue ship Julia Luckenbach, which previously had picked up 79 passengers and 73 members of the crew according to radio messages received here.

Only the captain and his officers remained aboard the ship at daybreak the passengers having been put off in life boats shortly after midnight.

COOLIDGE BOOM
FOR PRESIDENT
1928 LAUNCHEDFormer Treasury Sec-
retary Declares Presi-
dent Will Then Be
Seeking Only Second
Term

Omaha, Neb., Dec. 30.—A boom for president for Coolidge in 1928 was launched today by Leslie M. Shaw, former Secretary of the Treasury, in a speech prepared for delivery here before the Nebraska State Bar Association. It was launched in the course of a constitutional argument to show that the president would not then be running for a third term, a question which had its last public discussion during the candidacy of Theodore Roosevelt in 1912.

"When President Coolidge receives the nomination four years hence," said Shaw, "it must not be claimed he is seeking a third term. Neither should the fact that the sad death of President Harding thrust unexpected burdens upon his ample shoulders, be a handicap against a second term."

Hendersonville Mayor
Remains In Asheville
Pending Compromise

Asheville, Dec. 30.—With Sam Y. Bryson, mayor of Hendersonville, still living at an Asheville hotel while his attorneys are seeking to reach a compromise with Bonnie Brooks, Hendersonville barber, who police allege, opened fire on the mayor Saturday night as the latter retreated from Brooks' home, Dr. W. R. Kirk is acting mayor of Hendersonville.

Brooks' attorneys said he expects to file suit against Bryson for the alienation of his wife's affections and suit also against Mrs. Brooks for divorce.

Counsel in this city today said all efforts to reach a compromise with Brooks had failed. Meanwhile Mayor Bryson refuses to talk about the case. He is said to be registered at a local hotel under an assumed name. Brooks surprised Bryson in his home Saturday night and opened fire upon him the latter quickly retreated. Bryson has not yet announced whether he will continue as mayor and the Board of Aldermen has stated they will take no action until legal action has developed.

TRINITY COLLEGE
FORMALLY BECOMES
DUKE UNIVERSITYAmend Charter Chang-
ing Name of College
Approved by Secre-
tary of State This Af-
ternoon

Raleigh, Dec. 30.—Trinity College at Durham officially became Duke University shortly after noon today. At that time Joseph H. Brown, of Raleigh, chairman of the board of trustees, presented to Secretary of State W. N. Everett the amended charter of the institution changing the name to Duke University. Mr. Everett approved the change without delay completing the necessary legal steps incident to acceptance by Trinity of the major place in the \$40,000,000 trust fund created by James B. Duke, for education, charity and religion in North Carolina and South Carolina.

The registration of the change of name confirmed the action of the Trinity Board of Trustees yesterday when it decided to comply with the requirements laid down by Mr. Duke in order to obtain \$5,000,000 immediately for building purposes and receive thereafter 32 per cent of the fund created by Mr. Duke.

COOLIDGE HOPEFUL
FOR DISARMAMENT
CONFAB NEXT YEARWill Exert Influence to
Bring About Naval
Conference As Soon
As Time is Ripe

Washington, Dec. 30.—President Coolidge is hopeful but not certain that it will be possible to hold another international naval disarmament conference within another year.

Whenever the time for such a conference is propitious Mr. Coolidge will exert his influence to bring it about but at the present juncture he is unable to determine when the conference might be called with a fair prospect of success.

M'COY TO APPEAL
TO HIGHER COURTJury in Murder Trial of
Former Pugilist Re-
turn Verdict of Man-
slaughter After 78
Hours

Los Angeles, Dec. 30.—Kid McCoy, former star of the prize ring was found guilty of manslaughter carrying a penalty of from one to 10 years imprisonment by a jury of nine women and three men which reported yesterday after 78 hours consideration of the case.

McCoy was charged with the murder of Mrs. Theresa W. Mors.

The jury foreman stated that the verdict was a compromise but McCoy declared he had not obtained justice.

"If I am not guilty as charged I am not guilty at all" he said. The defense attorneys sharing his view announced that notice of appeal would be filed on Friday when McCoy is sentenced.

NAVAL COMMITTEE
ORDERS AN INQUIRY
INTO NAVY'S NEEDSMeasure Providing In-
vestigation Adopted
By House Committee
Today After Stormy
Session

Washington, Dec. 30.—Investigation into the needs of the navy was decided upon by the House Naval Committee at a stormy session today. A motion was adopted to call Secretary Wilbur before the committee on January 8 to make such recommendations as he might deem expedient.

Chairman Butler announced during the discussions that he had been informed unofficially that President Coolidge expected a conference to be held within the year looking to further naval disarmament.

It was at the suggestion of Mr. Butler that the motion for the inquiry was made. It was said that the committee supported the motion because its chairman had been charged with attempting to override the will of the full committee.

As adopted the motion represents a compromise between those desiring to take up a bill proposing a naval building program and members who sought to have the committee to direct its attention to a measure designed to adjust existing irregularities in the naval establishment.

NEW PRESIDENT OF
LABOR FEDERATION
TOOK OFFICE TODAYDeclares Resolutions of
Recent General Con-
vention Will Guide His
Administration

Washington, Dec. 30.—William Green, newly elected president of the American Federation of Labor, signaled his formal induction into office today by issuing a statement in which he reaffirmed the Federation's purposes in conducting a never ending fight for full and complete recognition of principles of collective bargaining for justice, decent wages, tolerance and humane conditions of employment.

He added that the resolution of the Federation's general convention at El Paso last month touching upon political action, recognition of Soviet Russia, prohibition and the Howell-Barkley bill would be the guide of his administration.

Coolidge Approves
Plan for Awarding
Around World Fliers

Washington, Dec. 30.—President Coolidge will approve the plan of awarding the army world fliers as drafted by the general staff and endorsed by Secretary Weeks, although he had hoped that the plan might provide more generous treatment for the aviators.

Anniversary Jan. 1

Winston-Salem, Dec. 30.—The North Carolina Emancipation Association will celebrate the 62nd anniversary of President Lincoln's emancipation proclamation at the Fourteenth Street School on Thursday, January 1, 1925. The white people of the community have been invited to attend.

Dr. G. J. Thomas, pastor of the Wentz Memorial Congregational Church, will deliver the principal address of the extensive program, while Dr. J. Clyde McKnight will read the emancipation proclamation. The long musical program will be under the direction of J. W. Lewis. Officers of the Association are: B. W. Brown, president; O. L. Foy, secretary; and Rev. J. H. Curtis, treasurer.

Received Blows in Lieu
of Wedding Gifts

Mrs. Nina Nedorovitz, pretty Russian girl, married Ignatz Nedorovitz, a New York furrier, to escape deportation as an alien and because she believed him a man of wealth, she declared in her suit for divorce in San Francisco. Instead of promised gifts she received beatings, the first on her wedding day, she told a Judge. The divorce was granted.

ENGLAND IS URGED
TO WITHDRAW HER
POTATO EMBARGOAmerica Asks That Her
Products Be Accord-
ed Same Treatment as
Those of Canada

Washington, Dec. 30.—The American Embassy in London has been instructed to make representations to the British government against the recent order prohibiting the importation of American potatoes into England and Wales on account of the potato bug.

Announcement of the departments action was made today by Secretary Hughes in a letter to Senator Hale, Republican, Maine, who had asked that steps be taken to protect the interests of American growers in Maine and elsewhere.

Great Britain will be asked to accord the American grown potatoes the same treatment as that given shipments from Canada to the British Isles, since investigations have shown that the potato bug is found throughout Canada.

DEATH OF NEW YORK
COUPLE IS MYSTERYCouple Found Dead in
Midst of Christmas
Decorations and Pres-
ents in Hollywood
Apartment

Hollywood, Cal., Dec. 30.—The bodies of Mr. and Mrs. Milton Holly, said to have been well to do farmers residents of New York, were found in their bungalow apartment here last night lying in the midst of Christmas decorations and presents. The cause of their deaths is a mystery.

They apparently had been dead since Christmas night when they were last seen by Theodore Covel who told police he was the nephew of Holly and that his uncle's only other relatives were two nieces in New York.

Covel hooted the theory that Holly and his wife had ended their lives by poison although the preliminary examination indicated that they might have died of poisoning. Police said gas could not have killed them since the fire was still burning in the gas grate when the bodies were found and the ventilation seemed satisfactory. An autopsy will be held.

LAWYERS FOR LOEB
AND LEOPOLD WILL
RECEIVE \$150,000Defense Counsel in the
Franks Case Com-
promise With Parents
of Defendants for
\$150,000 Fees

Chicago, Dec. 30.—The lawyers who saved Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb from the gallows after they had pleaded guilty to the kidnapping and killing of Robert Franks, will receive \$150,000 it became known today.

Clarence Darrow, veteran criminal lawyer and Benjamin and Walter Bachrach, brothers, will share in the fee though the proportion of division has not been made public.

The lawyers, it was stated asked for \$200,000 at the conclusion of the trial and although the Leopold family made no objection the Loeb family thought the amount excessive. After some discussion \$150,000 was agreed upon.

The agreement is to be submitted to the Chicago Bar Association for approval.

Club Work Proves
Most Successful
Ever Carried Out

Raleigh, Dec. 30.—Results secured in club work for 1924, when completed will undoubtedly show it to be one of the most successful so far carried out in North Carolina, according to an announcement at the office of the Extension Division of the North Carolina State College of Agriculture.

A record not attained in any previous year has been established during this year, it is pointed out, in the number of counties carrying out an extension program for juniors; in the number of clubs organized; the enrollment of members; the number of meetings held; and the average attendance maintained.

Along with this, and in spite of the fact that this has been the poorest crop year experienced in this state in quite a while, says the announcement, the club members as a whole, as indicated by the results so far compiled, have made good records in all lines of their work. The calf club work has been just about doubled in the year, it is said, and the prospects are that North Carolina calf club members will receive over \$200 from the American Jersey Cattle Club in prize money to be awarded for achievement in six counties in this state.

It is expected that the 239 cotton club members in 23 counties of the state will average more than twice as large a per acre yield as the adults, while the pig club work is finally on solid foundation with a large number club members feeding a systematic basis for economic pork production.

Referring to the corn clubs, the announcement stated that in one county seven corn club boys produced yields ranging from 60 to 107 bushels per acre while in other counties boys produced as high as 100 bushels per acre. The announcement also pointed out the potato record of Bill Leadbetter of Buncombe county who produced 344 bushels on one acre at a cost of \$87 and a profit of \$257 and that of Walter Cochran who produced 360 bushels of potatoes at a cost of \$97 with a net profit of \$263.

Spencer Railroad
Shops Re-opened
Monday Morning

Spencer, Dec. 30.—The Spencer railroad shops re-opened Monday morning and the 500 men who had been off the payroll for the past week returned to their jobs. The loss in pay incident to the Christmas holidays was for six days and, eliminating Christmas Day which would have been a holiday under any circumstances, only five days' time was lost.

The return of the men to work disposed of reports which had gained local circulation to the effect that all of the men would not be re-employed after the holidays.

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THE SCOUT COUNCIL

To everyone and more especially those interested in boys' work, the announcement that the Scout Executive for the Pamlico District Council of Boy Scouts has arrived and active operation of scout work will begin on January 1, is welcome news.

As expressed by Mr. Wilcox, the scout executive, the purposes of the organization are character building and physical development of the boy and it is upon these two important factors that rests the future of our community and nation.

The cooperation given the scout movement by the citizens will show to what extent we are interested in our future welfare.

WHERE IS THE MIDDLEMAN?

In response to recent editorials asking why work on Greenville's playground was begun and then halted, we have been informed by members of the Kiwanis Club, which organization agreed to see to the equipping of the playground, that that organization is ready to carry out its part of the program as soon as the town completes its part by putting the grounds in readiness for the equipment.

Upon inquiring of city officials why this preliminary work was not carried to completion so that the playground could soon become a reality, we are informed that the city's obligation was to culvert the branch through the property, which has already been done.

Just who agreed to do the filling and grading necessary before equipment can be placed upon the site, no one seems to know, but there must have been a middleman somewhere or else there was a big gap left between the beginning and completion of the playground.

The playground situation now is just this: the town, according to the understanding of its officials, has completed its work, yet the work has not reached the stage where the Kiwanis Club agreed to take hold, and in the meantime the children of the city continue to play in the streets.

Whatever organization or individual it was that agreed to carry on the go-between part of the program should get busy with its work so that the playground can be completed before spring. If this so-called middleman has never been a reality and this phase of the work was merely an oversight in mapping out the program, let some of the civic organizations take hold and carry on until the property is in condition for the placing of the equipment.

Bertie County Is Making Preparations Mammoth Barbecue

Windsor, Dec. 30.—Bertie county is making preparations for a mammoth barbecue to be held here Wednesday, December 31, to which all people of Northeastern North Carolina have been invited to attend and discuss plans for the campaign to be carried on for the erection of a bridge across the lower Chowan river.

According to those promoting the plans, this would be a vital link in the South Atlantic Coastal Highway and efforts are being made to have the civic clubs of all the cities along the line to send delegation to the barbecue to boost the proposed bridge. Other mass meetings are proposed to secure the voice of the people before the General Assembly in 1925 to request an appropriation for this bridge.

The need of a bridge in this location is pointed to with emphasis by Secretary Job of the Elizabeth City Chamber of Commerce who cites the revenue taken in by the ferries operating across the river now. He states that the ferries operating between Edenton to Mackeys and Eden House average a \$1,000 weekly income and that they carry about 55 cars a day and charge a toll of \$2 including the passengers on the average.

Mr. Mob asserted that officials in Washington, who follow the traffic conditions, estimate that 500,000 automobiles carrying tourists will leave that city for the South during the coming year. It is further pointed out that these officials expect that 90 per cent of these tourists will use the South Atlantic Coastal Highway because there are no hills to climb, no large cities with complicated traffic to pass through, and the historic and scenic attractions are numerous.

Furniture Exposition to Be Held in High Point January 1931

High Point, Dec. 30.—The problem of housing the furniture buyers who will attend the annual Southern Furniture Exposition here on January 19-31 is engaging the attention of Chamber of Commerce officials. F. J. Sizemore, secretary, is now listing private residences in which one or more rooms may be secured for the period.

Due to the large number, which attend the exposition yearly, it is stated that the local hotel accommodations are not sufficient. Heretofore a number of the furniture buyers have made their headquarters at Greensboro or Winston-Salem and journeyed here each day.

The city already is beginning to prepare for the exposition. Every foot of display space in the big furniture exposition building has been leased and great loads of furniture are daily being unloaded and put into place. Estimate world production cotton this year 23,300,000 vs. 19,300,000; last year an increase over last year of four million bales of which increase 1,025,000 is in the U. S., 822,000 in India and 187,000 in Egypt.

The large crop in India does not seem to be burdensome since the price of India cotton this season is relatively much cheaper than American and the American products is about 11 cent per pound cheaper than one year ago.

The following from New York:—High hopes for 1925 in some cases amounting to conviction that it may prove the greatest year in the history of American business are held by various leaders in business, industrial and financial activities here.

Judge Gary chairman of the Board of Directors of U. S. Steel Corp., is quoted to effect that if the administration and business interests of the country cooperate with President Coolidge the year 1925 should show the highest and most satisfactory prosperity in the whole history of the United States.

Chicago reported that the many people who have made big money in grain and stocks have turned to cotton because of its relative cheapness compared with most other commodities.

These developments are making the crop of about 14,000,000 including linters easily to handle and to dispose of which is of financial benefit to the south.

Compared with last year, stock on shipboard at Galveston yesterday 102,000 bales vs. 89,000 at New Orleans 78,000 against 44,000.

Southern spots yesterday were five to fifty points up, Texas markets five to twenty higher; sales increasing, all told 43,693 vs. 16,677 Saturday.

Cables, weather condition, trade advices and spot news have to be reckoned with.

Sentiment remains rather divided but apparently more bullish than otherwise. Favor buying particularly on depressions for the present.

Chicago.—Wheat decrease 2,332,000 corn increase 2,638,000 oats increase 2,528,000 Rye increase 726,000. Total later or as soon as wire conditions permit.

November was another prosperous month for the St. Louis and San Francisco R. R. earnings for November showed an increase of \$391,000 over same month last year.

The year will close with the copper metal market at the best price in almost eighteen months. The demand seems to be on the increase.

566,100,000 Eggs Layed by 6,000,000 Hens During Year

Raleigh, Dec. 30.—Approximately 566,100,000 eggs were layed by the 6,000,000 hens in North Carolina during the past year, according to V. W. Lewis, livestock marketing specialist of the North Carolina extension division. Five and one half million of this hen population live in the rural districts, it was said, while the other half million live in the backyards of city homes. Eleven per cent of 660,000 of these hens Mr. Lewis terms "aristocrats," that is bred poultry that will lay 170 eggs per year. The other 89 per cent he calls "poletariat" as they will lay only 85 eggs each per year. According to the specialist, this amount will average only 221 eggs each for the 2,559,123 people in the state during the year.

Wake Forest Has Nine Games On Football Schedule

Wake Forest, Dec. 30.—Wake Forest College has nine games on its 1925 football schedule, according to the announcements of the athletic authorities here. The season is opened at home with the same team with which the season was opened in 1924 the University of North Carolina. The season closes with a game with the University of South Carolina at Columbia, South Carolina.

ENGINEERING COMPANY TO SEEK TREASURE IN MEDITERRANEAN SEA

Tokio.—An agreement covering a treasure hunt at the bottom of the sea has been made by the Pelagic Ocean Engineering Works of Japan with the Tokio Marine Insurance Company. It has to do with \$500,000 in English gold coin, which went to the bottom of the Mediterranean Sea when the Nippon Yusen Kaisha liner Yasaka Maru was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine in 1917. The specie belonged to the Yokohama Specie Bank, but is now the property of the insurance company, which paid full insurance on the loss to the bank. It is agreed that if the engineering company recovers the specie it shall retain 80 percent, returning 20 percent to the insurance company.
