FUTURE BUSINESS PROSPECTS GOOD FIFTH DISTRICT

Favorable Throughout Fifth Federal Reserve District Except in Cotton and Tobacco Belts of Carolinas

Richmond, Va., Jan. 1. — Prospects for favorable future business are good in the Fifth Federal Reserve District, except in the cotton and tobacco belts, of the Carolinas and perhaps in the coastal region of West Virginia, according to the monthly review of business and agricultural conditions issued by the Reserve Bank here yesterday, for the month of November.

"The volume of business done in the Fifth Federal Reserve District during November was up to the seasonal average, although trade was somewhat spotted," says the report. Retail trade was better than in November 1923 in all of the large cities, but in the smaller centers, in which buying by farmers is of great importance, the volume of business this year fell behind that of last year. Doubtless because prospects for future business in agricultural sections are less promising than they were a year ago, country merchants are carrying smaller stock this fall and are very cautious in placing orders for future delivery. In consequence, the volume of wholesale trade is below that of last year, when the Fifth district farmers were receiving the benefits of good cotton and tobacco yields and prices.

"The agricultural outlook while still much below 1923, improved to some extent during November, chiefly due to good weather which enabled farmers to gather their crops under favorable conditions and caused more late cotton to open than has been the case in most years."

"The banks of the District as a class are in a strong position, and the deposit of customers are very high; debts to individual accounts are running above a year ago in the district as a whole; business failures are comparatively few and liabilities are low; labor is well employed for this season of the year; conditions in the textile industry are better than a few months ago and are still improving; world consumption of cotton is increasing materially; tobacco prices are higher than a year ago; crops are going into the winter in good condition; and building operation continue in large volume, with resulting prosperity for dealers in all kinds of building materials."

"On the whole prospects appear favorable for future business except in the cotton and tobacco sections of the Carolinas and perhaps the coastal regions of West Virginia."

"Between November 15 and December 15, this year, outstanding rediscounts for member banks continued to decline at the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond, dropping from a total of \$31,404,000 to \$29,681,000 but there was a further demand for currency to meet the holiday needs and the volume of Federal Reserve notes in actual circulation rose from \$85,097,000 to \$89,136,000. Member banks increased their reserve deposits during the month from \$63,446,000 to \$65,163,000 and the cash reserve of the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond rose from \$126,945,000 to \$130,386,000. As a result of the changes enumerated, the ratio of cash reserves to combined note and deposit liabilities rose from 32.67 per cent on November 15 to 34.18 per cent on December 15.

"A year ago the volume of credit extended to members by the Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond was much larger than the volume outstanding at present. On December 15, 1923, rediscounts held by the Reserve Bank totaled \$55,860,000 compared with \$29,681,000 on December 15, 1924. During the year circulation of Federal Reserve notes dropped from \$106,065,000 to \$89,136,000, while the volume of reserve deposits rose from \$61,968,000 to \$65,163,000 and the Reserve Bank's cash rose from \$116,016,000 to \$130,386,000. The reserve ratio of cash to combined note and deposit liabilities increased from 69. per cent on December 15, 1923 to 34.18 on December 15, 1924. Bank Embezzler Found After Fourteen Years.

THOMAS E. COOPER WILL TAKE APPEAL FROM CONVICTION

Yesterday Was Last Day Allowed Wilmington Banker to Raise \$165,000 to Escape Road Sentence

Wilmington, Jan. 1. — Attorneys for Thomas E. Cooper have announced that an appeal from his conviction on a charge of violating the state banking laws is being perfected.

Yesterday was the final day for making arrangements to reimburse the creditors of the Liberty Savings Bank for \$165,000 the bank owed, under a compromise laid down by Judge Grady which would have enabled Cooper to escape a seven year sentence on the roads.

Cooper, soon after the trial, announced that he could not raise the money.

NEW YEAR USHERED FOUR ARE KILLED IN IN GRAND STYLE CELEBRATING NEW YEAR'S IN CHICAGO

Despite Falling Temperature Thousands Throng Streets and Theatres in Carnival Spirit

New York, Jan. 1.—Large crowds despite the rapidly falling temperature, milled about the sidewalks of New York far into the early hours of New Year's Day in a carnival spirit tooting horns and ringing cowbells to make their greeting to the New Year audible above the shrill whistles and the church chimes.

In the theatrical district the mass of people was kept in motion by 300 extra policemen who were nearly overwhelmed when the theatres poured out their patrons at midnight. Other sections celebrated in a quieter fashion.

In the almost deserted financial district the chimes of old Trinity Church pealed out patriotic and sacred songs. On Fifth Avenue crowds gathered before St. Patrick's Cathedral to hear the chimes. Many more who did not brave the cold to celebrate in public listened in on various radio programs which included services in the Cathedral of St. John the Divine.

The fire department answered its first alarm when the year was but a minute old only to find it to be a false alarm.

Prohibition enforcement ranks were greatly reinforced but only one raid of consequence was made during the early morning hours when \$5,000 worth of liquors was seized in fashionable east side restaurant.

RECEPTION AT WHITE HOUSE IS FEATURE OF NEW YEAR'S DAY

Thousands Gather To Extend Greetings to President and First Lady of Land

Washington, Jan. 1.—The doors of the White House were opened today for the customary New Year's reception. For three and a half hours from 11 to 2:30 o'clock the White House was given over to the high and low, rich and poor who gathered there to extend their greetings to the president and his wife.

The order of the reception followed that laid down years ago starting with members of the cabinet and their wives and continuing with diplomatic corps, supreme court members and other branches of the judiciary, members of Congress, army, navy and marine corps, and heads of other departments and then the general public.

The reception, as usual, was the feature of New Year's Day celebration in Washington.

Seretary of State and Mrs. Hughes were guests at the customary breakfast of the Pan American Union and members of the diplomatic corps.

Congress is not in session today and government departments are closed for the holiday.

The capital lay under a four inch blanket of snow today.

Italian Steamer In Distress Off Coast

New York, Jan. 1.—An S. O. S. call from an Italian steamer in distress off the coast somewhere between Cape May and Cape Hatteras was received at the naval wireless station here today. The air was cleared of all radio broadcasting for a period of 20 minutes but no further message was received. The call was heard at 12:30 o'clock.

Rome Out for Revenue.

Rome.—The Roman who is sufficiently well-to-do to employ domestic servants is henceforth to be taxed by the city on his affluence. One male servant costs his employer 60 lire a year; 100 for a second servant and 160 for a third. On female servants the tax is 20 lire for one, and for each additional helper 40 lire.

With Exception of Four Accidental Deaths Officials Report Unusually Orderly Celebration

Chicago, Jan. 1.—Four persons were slain and one was probably fatally injured during New Year's celebration here last night. Outside these the celebration was quiet, there being only two arrests for drunkenness.

Packed hotel dining rooms, cabarets and restaurants and thousands of private parties heralded the birth of the New Year. In spite of the hilarity and the reported flow of liquor in all sections, city police said there was little disorder. Prohibition agents reported the usual distribution of liquor but those drinking did so on the quiet and the passing of the flask and bottle to the mouths was not so much in evidence as in years past.

Stray bullets probably fired by persons joining in the celebration were declared responsible for the death of four men. A passenger on a suburban train was shot and died on the train, the bullet coming through a window at 12:01 o'clock. Another was shot to death in his home three minutes later, this bullet also coming through a window. Two others were found dead from bullet wounds, on the streets while one woman was wounded as she sat in her home. A crashed window pane explained how the bullet got in.

GOV. ALFRED SMITH INAUGURATED FOR THIRD TERM TODAY

Second Executive to Serve Three Terms Inaugurated on Hundredth Anniversary of Similar Event

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 1.—Alfred E. Smith was inaugurated Governor of New York today for the third time. The second chief executive in 100 years to be honored with three terms of office, he was confronted when he took the oath of office today by New York's first woman Secretary of State Mrs. Florence E. Snapp, of Syracuse. One hundred years ago today DeWitt Clinton, the only other governor to hold office more than two terms, was sworn in for a third term.

In his inaugural address the governor dwelt chiefly upon the pride he felt in the honor which was his and he recalled the similarity of the event with the inauguration of Governor Clinton.

In the annual parade 600 National Guardsmen and members of the New York State Naval Militia and several scores of members of the New York City police Department and its hand headed by the chief executive proceeded to the capitol as the band played "Sidewalks of New York" again and again.

Owners Greensboro Baseball Club Give Up Their Franchise

Greensboro, Jan. 1.—Seven players accompanied the local franchise in the Piedmont League when it was surrendered to President Brauhm at midnight last night.

Unwillingness on the part of the men who have been backing the club the former season to continue their support resulted in the franchise being given up.

Automobile Thefts In Asheville Near The Hundred Mark

Asheville, Jan. 1.—The wave of burglaries that has swept over this city during the past two months continued last night when a local cafe was robbed and an automobile was stolen. Only \$20 was lost by the cafe.

The total number of automobile thefts in Asheville for the past two months is 88.

SEEK YEAR PERIOD AS TRYOUT FOR THE POSTAL INCREASES FEW CHANGES MADE BY BUSINESS FIRMS FOR THE NEW YEAR

Amendments Reapportioning Increase In Rates on Various Classes of Mail Now Being Prepared

Washington, Jan. 1.—Amendments to the administration postal pay and rate increase bill were in preparations today by Chairman Moses of the Senate Post Office subcommittee to re-apportion the rate increases recommended by the Post Office Department.

At the suggestion of the joint Senate and House subcommittee which concluded its hearings yesterday re-allocation of the proposed rate increases among the various classes of mails is under consideration with the form and amount and re-apportionment yet to be decided.

Senator Moses expects to submit an amendment of this nature at a meeting of the Senate subcommittee tomorrow. The committee also is expected to reach a definite decision at the meeting on a general understanding, it was announced by Senator Moses, to make the proposed salaries rate increase for one year with opportunity which that would afford for further hearings with a view of recommending permanent rate increase legislation next session.

It is the plan of administration leaders who believe President Coolidge's veto of the postal salaries bill will be sustained, to have the new double barreled bill before the Senate by Tuesday when the vote will be taken on the veto.

Candition of Mrs. McLean Reported As Serious Today

Lumberton, Jan. 1.—The condition of Mrs. Angus W. McLean, wife of the governor-elect, who is ill at her home here with bronchial pneumonia, was said this morning to be serious. Mrs. McLean had contracted influenza several days ago and pneumonia developed yesterday.

New Year Greeted By Fireworks From Top Pike's Peak

Colorado Springs, Jan. 1.—Fighting their way through a snow storm borne on the wings of a mountain gale five intrepid climbers scaled the treacherous heights of Pike's Peak yesterday to uphold the traditions of the Adaman Club, an organization which for years has celebrated the coming of each New Year by staging a display of fireworks from the brow of the peak.

SPECIAL COURT TO TRY COOPERS

February 5 Set as Date for Trial of Lieutenant Governor and Brother for Violating Banking Laws

Raleigh, Jan. 1.—W. B. Cooper, Lieutenant Governor of North Carolina, and his brother, Thomas E. Cooper, will go on trial in Federal Court in Wilmington on February 5 to answer to charges of violating the National Banking Laws.

A special term of court will be held for the trial. The indictment grew out of the failure of the Commercial National Bank of Wilmington.

Seek to Attach the Property of Mayor of Hendersonville

Hendersonville, Jan. 1.—Attachment proceedings against the property of Sam Y. Bryson, mayor of Hendersonville, were started following filing of a suit against him yesterday by W. R. Brooks, asking for \$50,000 damages for the alleged alienation of the affections of the plaintiff's wife.

Mayor Bryson, who is still in Asheville because of the tense situation existing between the parties had nothing to say today concerning the suit which had been expected since Brooks shot three times at Bryson as the mayor was making a hurried exit from the home of Brooks last Saturday night.

CERTIFICATES TO VETERANS LATE WAR MAILED OUT TODAY

Mails Today Are Carrying 600,000 Certificates of Adjusted Compensation to All Parts Country

Washington, Jan. 1. — Speeding through mail channels today to beneficiaries of the Soldiers' Bonus Act, were approximately 600,000 adjusted service certificates representing \$750,000,000 of adjusted compensation voted by Congress for veterans of the world war.

The accumulation of certificates which had been piled up for 30 days was put into the mails at midnight as the first distribution of benefits under the bonus act. The law provided that certificates should not be issued before January 1 and as promptly as the New Year began more than 250 sacks of mail were moved to railroad stations for transmission to various parts of the country.

The new year also found ready in the bureau \$30,000 in checks for amounts of \$50 or less representing the cash payments for soldiers who served only a short period, but the law requires that these not be mailed until March 1. Payment on the certificates also cannot be made before that date except in cases of veterans who have died and whose beneficiaries will receive immediate payment upon application.

Sleeping Sickness Cases Alarm British Doctors

London. — Medical officers of Great Britain are becoming somewhat uneasy at the steady increase in the number of cases of sleeping sickness recorded.

Official statistics show that from January 1 to November 15 of this year more cases of the disease were reported in England and Wales than in the five years of 1919-1923, the figures for 1919-23 being 4,380 and for this year 4,747.

In the past eight weeks there have been 377 notifications of the disease. In the corresponding eight weeks of last year the number was only 38. According to the ministry of health the cause of this increase has not yet been definitely determined, and although several remedies have been tried with some measure of success, there is yet a specific cure for the disease itself.

Huge Sums Paid to Ease Traffic

London, Dec. 31.—The widening of the Strand, in the heart of London, is an expensive proceeding, according to H. H. Gordon, a former London county councillor. He places the cost at \$25,000,000 a mile. Traffic congestion makes the operation necessary.

Chilapas Counts Four Governors

Mexico City. — The state of Chilapas has set record for governors, according to information available at the department of the interior, where the names of four claimants who are attempting to exercise their authority are given. Each is supported by a band of followers, and is determined not to be ousted.

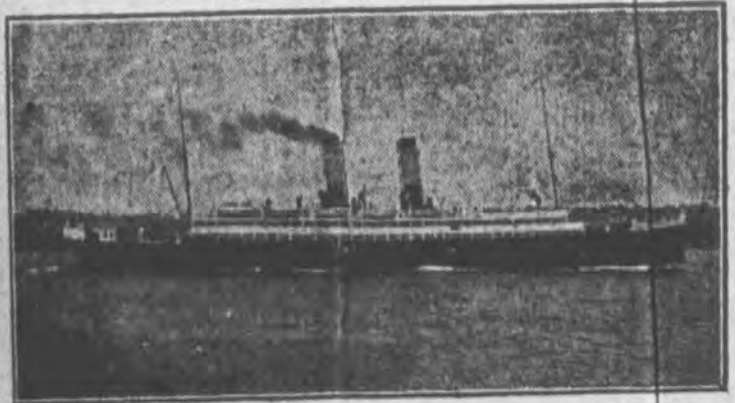
