GEN ASSEMBLY GETS UNDER WAY SHORTLY AFTER NOON TODAY

Burgwyn Is Elected President Pro Tem of Senate and Pharr is Speaker of the House

Raleigh, Jan. 7.—The General Assembly of North Carolina convened in biennial session here today for 60 days.

The Senate got under way first when the gavel of the president called the body to order at 12:35 o'clock. Lieutenant Governor W. B. Cooper was in the chair. The House got under way a minute later with E. A. Lasseiter presiding over the initial ceremonies.

The Reverend M. T. Flyer, presiding elder of the Methodist Conference, delivered the opening prayer in the Senate and the members were sworn into office by Chief Justice Hoke, of the North Carolina Supreme Court. The Senate immediately got down to business, the president calling for the nomination of a President Pro Tem. Senator W. H. S. Burgwyn, of Northampton, was nominated by the Democrats and there was no opposition. The roll call on the election then began.

The opening prayer in the House was delivered by Dr. Charles L. Graves, pastor of the Tabernacle Baptist Church of Raleigh. Associate Justice Heriot Clarkson, of the Supreme Court, administered the oath of office to the members, and the House proceeded to business, the speaker calling for nomination for the office of speaker. Walter Murphy, of Rowan, nominated Edgar W. Pharr, of Mecklenburg, and I. G. Grier, of Caswell, placed Presley Brown, of Wilkes, in nomination as the Republican candidate. The roll call began after several representatives had seconded the nominations.

The first names called on the roll was Miss Julia Alexander, Mecklenburg, the only woman member of the legislature. She cast her vote for Pharr. Brown, the Republican nominee, cast his vote for Pharr. The result of the roll call in the two houses was that Pharr was elected Speaker of the House and Burgwyn President Pro Tem of the Senate. Pharr was sworn in by Associate Justice Clarkson.

Senator Burgwyn was not present to receive his election as president pro tem. He left the city last night after the caucus at which he was unanimously nominated, because of the death of a relative.

Lieutenant Governor Cooper indicated he would turn over the chair to the president pro tem upon his return. Lieutenant Governor-elect J. Elmer Long will not mount the rostrum until the inauguration of state officers next Wednesday. After receiving four local bills the House adjourned until two o'clock and the Senate a few minutes before that hour.

Registered Package Containing \$6,000 Found Beside Tracks

Thomasville, Jan. 7.—For four days a package containing \$6,300 has lain beside the Southern Railway tracks here near the railroad station. Yesterday C. C. Pritchard, freight agent picked it up. Examination showed the package to contain some gold and \$5,000 in paper money and that it was registered and addressed to the Federal Reserve Bank in Richmond. The only explanation advanced as to the presence of the package was that it had been placed in a mail bag and hung on a mail crane from which fast through trains pick up mail and the bag had ripped allowing the package to drop to the ground.

City and County Evangelical Revival Begins Gastonia Feb

Gastonia, Jan. 7.—A city and county wide evangelical revival will begin in Gastonia on Sunday, February 1, it has been announced. The campaign will be sponsored by the local ministerial association.

Rev. George T. Stephens, a native of Toronto, Canada, and well known in the South, will have charge of the services. All plans for the spreading of the servicethroughout the county have been completed and there will be a union headquarters in one of the downtown local buildings.

Youth, 17, Admits Killing Mother

Although he steadfastly declined to say why he shot his sick parent while the other members of the family made merry on the floor below, relatives say it was because she refused his demand for \$50.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCK FELT NEW ENGLAND

Harvard Station Records Tremor of Considerable Intensity and 15 Seconds Duration

Boston, Jan. 7.—An earth tremor lasting 15 seconds and of considerable intensity was recorded at 8:07 this morning at the Harvard seismographical station.

Because of some storm or disturbance off shore at the time it was not possible to estimate the distance of the tremor, officials said, but the direction was believed to be north.

The tremor was distinctly felt at Brockton, Haverhill, Lowell and Lawrence and in southern New Hampshire. Rumbles accompanying the shock sounded like thunder.

290 Publications With 2,266,216 Circulation in North Carolina

Raleigh, Jan. 7.—North Carolina has 290 newspapers, monthlies, quarterlies and other classes of publications with a total circulation of 2,266,216, according to the 34th report of the Department of Labor and Printing, Commissioner M. L. Shipman tonight issued the chapter of his report dealing with newspapers and periodicals. The report will go to the Governor and General Assembly.

The publishing business, according to Mr. Shipman, is experiencing its period of greatest prosperity thus far in North Carolina. Though there have been some changes in ownership and a few minor consolidations during the past year, the newspapers, generally speaking, start 1925 with a bright future before them. During 1924, a number of the publications have materially improved their plants, some have opened up new buildings with enlarged press and distribution facilities and others have, with the same equipment as previously, spread their influence by increase of circulation.

Two hundred and eighty-five typesetting machines are employed in the various newspaper publishing houses of the State according to the report. The average working day for the men employed on the machines is eight and 58-60 hours, indicating full time employment of the machine personnel. Approximately 1,786 persons are employed in the publishing of the newspapers and periodicals, with an average annual payroll of \$2,584,551.

Declare Nation Has Nothing to Fear Over Navy's Condition

Washington, Jan. 7.—After examining Secretary Wilbur and other high officials of the Navy Department the Senate Naval Appropriations Committee concurs in the view of the House committee that the country need not be alarmed about reports that the American navy has fallen below the 5-5-3 ratio.

FINANCE COMMITTEE ASKS FIVE MILLIONS FOR EDUCATION FUND

Also Ask for Revaluation to Assure Equal Distribution of School Tax Burden

Raleigh, Jan. 7.—Appropriation of practically five and one-half million dollars by the State of North Carolina to correct the inequalities in county taxation for public instruction for the school years ending in 1926 and 1927 is urged by the Educational Finance Commission in its report which was completed yesterday. The actual sum asked is \$5,450,000.

What is probably more important than the request for the five million and one-half dollars is the call on the General Assembly to pass what will amount to another revaluation act which will do away with the discrepancy now existing in tax rates in different North Carolina counties.

"The Commission realizes that the method provided for in the foregoing bill for the distribution of the Equalizing Fund will not be altogether equitable," declares the report, "for the reason that property is assessed in some counties at a higher percentage of its valuation than similar property is assessed in other counties. The Commission thinks that in order to remove this inequality, it will be necessary for the Legislature to provide for the proper equalization of values throughout the State, and recommends that proper legislation to this end be enacted."

The Commission, which was created at the special session of the General Assembly held during August, consists of N. A. Townsend, chairman, Walter H. Woodson, Robert T. Wilson, Emmett Bellamy, T. C. Bowie, Clayton Moore, and Carroll P. Rogers.

In its recommendations the commission stands squarely behind the recommendations made by A. T. Allen, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, in his recent report to Governor Cameron Morrison insofar as his ideas on the equalization fund. It is true that Superintendent Allen recommended an appropriation of \$2,650,000 for the year 1925, \$50,000 more than the amount recommended by the finance commission, but the increase recommended by the commission for the year 1927, which amounts to \$2,850,000 is expected to "equalize" this shortcoming.

The \$50,000 will come out of the amount recommended by Superintendent Allen to be set apart in 1926 for equalizing the salaries of the teachers. In the matter of equalizing transportation of school children and the stimulating fund, the commission meets the requests of the Superintendent more than all the way.

Conference of Allied Finance Ministers Lasts For But Forty Minutes

Paris, Jan. 7.—The conference of Allied Finance Ministers began at 3:15 this afternoon in the French Foreign Office and concluded 40 minutes later. Frank B. Kellogg, American Ambassador to Great Britain and James A. Logan, American representative with the Reparations Commission, were present along with Ambassador Myron T. Herrick and representatives of the American government.

Approve Provision To Maintain Army at Present Strength

Washington, Jan. 7.—The House today approved the provision of the war Department's bill for the maintenance of the regular army at its present strength of 12,000 officers and 119,000 men.

McArthur to Command 4th Army Corps Area

Washington, Jan. 7.—Brigadier General Douglas MacArthur will be assigned to command the Fourth Army Corps Area with headquarters at Atlanta. Brigadier General Albert J. Bowley, of Fort Bragg, it is present temporary commander of the area.

LT. GOVERNOR, GOVERNOR, SENATOR WITHIN WEEK

Hartford, Conn., Jan. 7.—Colonel Hiram Bingham, former Yale professor, at present lieutenant governor and United States Senator-elect, will be inaugurated governor today. He expects to resign the governorship tomorrow and proceed to Washington to qualify as a member of the Senate, succeeding the late Senator Brandegee. John Trumbull will become lieutenant governor this afternoon and governor tomorrow.

DIAL WITHDRAWS HIS SENATE SPEECH OF LAST SATURDAY

South Carolina Senator's Criticism of Party Draws FORTH TONGUE Lashing From Leaders

Washington, Jan. 7.—After a tongue-lashing by leaders of his party in the Senate, Senator Dial, Democrat, South Carolina, today withdrew from the senate record the address made last Saturday blaming the Democratic members of Congress for the party's defeat last November.

Senator Robinson, Arkansas, Democratic floor leader, declared Senator Dial's speech was a deliberate affront to his colleagues, a dishonoring of the constituency which honored him with election and a befouling of his own nest.

The debate started when Senator Dial asked permission to correct the record of the speech in certain details. Senators Robinson and Smith, the other Senator from South Carolina, suggested that Dial might do well to withdraw the entire speech.

Senator Dial said he only wished to withdraw those remarks which seemed to infer the Democrats lost the election because they ought to have lost it and those which referred to political sabotage.

ANOTHER INQUIRY FOLLOWS PROBE OF M'CLINTOCK DEATH

Judge Olson Demands Examination of Body of Former Physician of Millionaire Orphan

Chicago, Jan. 7.—Investigation into the death of William Nelson McClintock, "Millionaire Orphan," today was extended into an inquiry into the death of Oscar Olson, his physician three years ago as a result of testimony by Harry Olson, chief justice of municipal court at the coroner's inquest yesterday.

Olson, who instigated the investigation of McClintock's death, demanded an examination of the body of Dr. Olson, his brother, who was visited, he said, a short time before his death by William D. Shepherd, father of McClintock and chief heir to McClintock's \$1,500,000 estate.

In his story to the coroner's jury Judge Olson declared the death of his brother occurred under circumstances demanding scientific inquiries, that the death in 1909 of Mrs. McClintock, mother of the "Millionaire Orphan" occurred in such a manner as to cause him to refuse to be a pall-bearer at her funeral and that the state attorney had not followed the case of McClintock's death as scrupulously as it warranted.

Shepherd issued a statement last night which characterized Olson's (Continued on page six.)

SEN. LADD ASSAILS REPUBLICAN CHIEFS FOR THEIR ACTIONS

Declares Leaders Are Departing From Principles of Old Party Dragging it Down From Heights

Washington, Jan. 7.—A sharp arraignment of the present leadership of the Republican party was made in the Senate yesterday by Senator Ladd, Republican, of North Dakota, in a carefully prepared address dealing with the action of the Republican Senate conference in reading himself and Senators LaFollette, Wisconsin; Frazier, North Dakota and Brookhart, Iowa, out of the party councils.

Asserting that the curtain had not yet rung down on this act of the "conference," Senator Ladd charged that "the camp followers of the Republican party have become the vanguard of the new Republican party—leading it backward and downward from the heights where Lincoln left it when he fell."

Drunk with power and forgetting its traditions, he said, the Republican party has proceeded to a surrender of the nation's taxing power to "tariff magnates"; has squandered its natural resources and public lands; made ventures in imperialism for the sake of "partisan satrapies" and transformed the government "of the people, by the people and for the people" into "a government of the masses by the masses."

"If to be a Republican," he said, "I am to accept and ratify, defend and promote a political policy for party that exists in the accomplishments of these results—without protest—without exhausting my abilities to correct these fatal errors of the past and prevent their repetition in the future, then I cannot be a Republican."

"If the election of a Republican as President with a reliable working majority in Congress means nothing more than an extension for four years of an unlimited license to plunder the American people, then I cannot be a Republican."

"If the transfer of billions of capital values from the farms and producers of America to the swollen fortunes of monopoly within three weeks' time is a triumph of the Republican party, then, indeed, is the party of Lincoln doomed."

Setting themselves up as judges of party loyalty, Senator Ladd said his duty first was to the people of North Dakota and that he would continue to serve them. He denied that the representatives of Massachusetts, New Jersey or Pennsylvania should dictate the limits of his party loyalty.

Efforts Being Made For Gastonia Be Host Order of De Moley

Gastonia, Jan. 7.—Plans are now underway for Gastonia to be host to the first state meet of the Order of DeMolay, junior Masonic order throughout the entire world. In the early part of March next. Officials of the local lodge, of the senior Masons and the junior Masons are making efforts to have the state meet held here, and hope to have a large attendance from throughout North Carolina.

The Gastonia lodge of the Order of DeMolay was organized on January 10, 1924. It now had 70 members, it was stated. It is understood that the Charlotte lodge will assist the Gastonia lodge in getting the state meet which would last for two or three days, according to present plans.

170 Homes and 39 Business Houses Erected Gastonia '24

Gastonia, Jan. 7.—The past year was one of progress in the building field for Gastonia. One hundred and seventy new homes and 39 business houses were erected in this city during the year 1924, according to figures computed by City Manager David L. Struthers. The total value of permits amounted to \$1,130,205, the manager stated, which was an increase over the amount of the permits issued in 1923.

MEXICAN BUDGETS TAXED HEAVILY FOR SUPPORT OF ARMY

Mexico City.—Mexico's financial obligations total \$818,020,015 in American money, it is stated in a report just made public by the minority members of the chamber of deputies budget commission.

Appealing for careful consideration of appropriations for 1925 the minority commissioners, who belong to the United Radical bloc, assert that the time has come for the removal of the tax levying power from the hands of the chief executive. For half a century, they declare, the people of Mexico, through their representatives have been deprived by revolution and civil strife of the right to levy taxes and spend their revenues.

In outlining the history of Mexican public finances during the last 100 years, the minority commission's study points out that budget deficits have been the cancer which has sapped the government's financial strength and constantly added to its indebtedness.

The war department is credited with having taken the lion's share of the government's receipts. From 1918 to 1922, the percentage of budget total devoted to military necessities fluctuated between 69 and 70. Second only in importance was the part devoted to the services on the public debt, which was allotted \$59,500,000 in 1923 and 1924, although the De la Huerta revolution of Dec. 1923, forced the suspension of payments. The item in the 1924 budget for public debt service, however, was \$31,000,000, or 25 per cent of the total.

The budget now in the making, the report continues, must accept a deficit of \$3,500,000 from last year which increases by presidential decree in various items brings up to nearly \$4,500,000. This, added to the principal and accrued interest represented under the Lamont Agreement covering the external debt and other obligations guaranteed by the government amounting to \$700,500,000; the internal banking debt; the debt assumed in taking over the Tehuantepec railway; unpaid salaries of federal employees, and approved claims for revolutionary damages already totaling \$47,000,000, make a grand total of \$808,070,015.

It is this amount the minority report asks congress and the executive to consider in framing the 1925 budget.

RADIO CUTS DEEP INTO PROFITS OF GERMAN SINGERS

Dresden.—Another concert season like the present and German artists will be ruined, in the opinion of Dr. Rudolf Cahn-Speyer, chairman of the executive council of the Federation of Concert-Giving Musicians of Germany. Three factors are blamed for the unfavorable condition of the concert market: the radio, an indifferent public, and an unjust system of taxation.

From the moment the government lowered the fee for radio service to 50 cents a month, there was a sharp increase in the number of subscribers. From 7,500 the number rose to 500,000 within half a year. "One can easily understand," Dr. Cahn-Speyer observes, "that with a large part of the public the difference both in quality and rendition between a concert in a hall and one heard over the radio is not sufficient to outweigh the comfort of hearing a concert within one's own home. The latter involves no necessity to dress up or leave the house, and enables one to smoke cigar or sip a cup of coffee while listening."

The indifference of the public to good concerts, in Dr. Cahn-Speyer's opinion, is evidenced by the fact that concerts even of big stars are seldom sold out, and that complimentary tickets are no longer being used.

The state is unduly severe on the artist in matters of taxation, Dr. Cahn-Speyer holds. On all box office receipts he must pay both a turn-over and a luxury tax. These receipts are, as a matter of fact, never enough to pay for the costs involved in giving a concert, save in the cases of stars of the first magnitude. Most artists pay a considerable sum of money out of their own pockets for the pleasure of giving a concert, since it is essential to their further artistic career that they have a number of musical criticisms from the metropolitan press to their credit. Even on free tickets a luxury tax is exacted. In any commercial business free tickets would be exempt from taxation, but the poor artist is gouged for them by the tax officials.

FAILURES STIMULATE EXPERT WORKERS TO CAST PERFECT LENS

Washington.—Twice in the last five months have scientists and workmen at the Bureau of Standards endeavored to produce a 60 inch disc of perfect optical glass, and twice have they failed to accomplish this very difficult task. Undismayed, they are preparing for the third effort. It can be done, for in Germany a 72 inch disc was once brought into existence and Dr. G. K. Burgess, director of the bureau, will continue until success crowns his labors. Then he will have a prize indeed, and an American university will be provided with a five foot reflector about which to build a wonderfully efficient telescope for astronomical observation.

To cast such a disc calls for 5,000 pounds of raw material, compounded with almost unearthly exactitude. Each ingredient must be absolutely pure: glass, silicon, sand and chemical. The peculiar property of optical glass is to transmit light rays absolutely without distortion. When finally evolved it must be clear of every clouding, discoloration, or visual obstruction. Furthermore, it must be uniform of a single density throughout. The ingredients are mixed by machinery, given their primary coalescing in the preliminary furnace, and then for five weeks are passed from furnace to furnace, under graduated heats, and never even momentarily unwatched. When the ingredients have reached a maximum of heat and fusion, the first cooling begins. The unborn lens, tublike in shape, is examined and tested and then there is a further reheating, softening it sufficiently to be oiled into a mould.

In the two previous attempts the workers have gotten it just to this stage. Then the clay canldron which has had to go through the heats with its glassy content has failed. The first structure was too weak, and the glass flowed out. The next container was too strong. It refused to crack away in the cooling period at the proper point and the glass inside it cracked instead. The next one is being identically built up to have a strong midway between that developed by its predecessors.

The previous attempts, although failures from the standpoint of the ultimate goal, have produced large quantities of very usable optical glass. Out

of the spoiled but crystalline heap there can be taken and prepared hundreds of tiny lenses to be used for gun sights, range finders, binoculars, small telescopes, cameras and microscopes.

HOLLAND WILL JOIN NEW YORK IN CELEBRATING TERCENTURY

The Hague, Holland. — Preparations for Holland's participation in the forthcoming tercentenary celebrations commemorating the founding of New Amsterdam (New York) are already afoot according to a report of the Nederlandsch-Amerikaansche Fundatie, a sister organization of the Netherland-America Foundation of New York.

The chief aim of the Dutch fundati is the promotion of closer intellectual ties between Holland and the United States. The report, reviewing the past year's activities, says the fundati has been able to give social and business introductions to many prominent American visitors to this country.

A system of mutual collaboration by arrangement with Netherlands

American Chamber of Commerce, the Dutch Emigration Bureau and the Tourists' Association has given excellent results, the report says. One section of the fundati devotes itself to the translation of Dutch literature into English for circulation in America.

MODEL PRISONER WINS PARDON OF KING BORIS

Sofia.—On the ground that he has become a good workman since he was arrested for murder and sentenced to death, King Boris, has refused to confirm a prisoner's death sentence. This attitude he has maintained despite the insistence of the judicial and police authorities that the interests of the state would be best served by the carrying out of the death penalty.

In explaining his decision the king said: "How can I consent to the taking of the life of this prisoner, when he has shown enough moral power to become an exemplary workman since his imprisonment?"

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, Jan. 7.—The cotton market ruled somewhat lower today owing to easier cables than due.

Weekly weather returns to the Government indicated that very little farm work was done in the cotton region the past week and while the soil is wet in eastern and coastal sections of Texas, it is dry elsewhere in the state. Plowing made slow progress.

Fall River advised that indications are that sales of print cloth this week will likely exceed 100,000 pieces. Silv. will likely exceed 100,000 pieces. Sales last week were about 35,000 pieces.

Dallas Texas reported that the rainfall in that territory since September 1 is only 8 inches against 37 inches for the same period last season.

As yet there are no decided indications for rain in Texas where a general heavy rain is needed to put the soil in condition for plowing.

It is generally agreed that there will probably be a reduction in this year's cotton acreage owing to price being about 11 cents or 85¢ per bale lower than at this time one year ago and because of the very high prices prevailing for grain, especially corn, which will make it imperative for the south to plant a large acreage for food stuffs.

This is a feature of the situation that the trade has to reckon with and if the rains delay much longer in making their appearance in Texas, they will come at planting time, and if excessive, as they are usually in the spring the decrease in the cotton acreage may be all the greater.

Farm labor in the cotton region will be taken to its utmost during the next few months in its effort to plant for a large grain crop and to try and make another good cotton crop, but at present the outlook is anything but favorable.

As to the weevil our Oklahoma City correspondent wired today "Notwithstanding the coldest December weather for years, and zero and below temperatures, weevil in the observation case at the state capitol are still alive. The percent of emergence, however, not yet announced."

Spinners takings for the week on Friday will likely be bullish and the census December consumption report for the United States due about 14th inst. will probably be bullish. Returns run against 464,000 for December last year, whereas was 402,000 for November of this season.
