PRESIDENT GETS IN LANDLORD-TENANT WAR WASHINGTON

President Urges That Congress Regulate Rentals Throughout Permanent Commission

Washington, Jan. 8.—President Coolidge at the November election was given a four years extension of his lease on the White House but nevertheless he is having plenty of trouble these days with Washington landlords.

By initiating steps to bring about permanent government regulations of rentals in the District of Columbia, Mr. Coolidge has brought down upon his head the wrath of Washington's real estate men, developments which of late have threatened to crowd from the front pages of Washington's newspapers discussions of the French debt question, postal pay bill and the state of the navy representing however, only a new phase in the merry little war which has been going on for several years between Washington landlords and tenants.

The contest has developed during the fall to a point of near riot at public meetings held by the Tenants League. Members of the league accused the real estate men of hiring agents to break up their meetings and the owners of the rental property charged the league with "Bolshevism."

President Coolidge entered the lists about two weeks ago on the side of the tenants by requesting Richard S. Whaley, chairman of the District of Columbia Rent Commission, to draw up regulatory bill based on the police power of the federal government to maintain sanitary and moral conditions in the district. When Mr. Whaley completed his bill the president sent it to Congress without passing on its merits but with a request that it be given serious consideration. The bill would create permanent commission to regulate the rentals and would provide that rentals charged in excess of those established by the commission would subject the owner of the property, to either or both fine and imprisonment.

The bill has produced an effect upon the real estate men comparable to the bull and the red flag. They have through newspaper advertisements and various organizations criticized the president for interfering as they claim in the matter and for making radical assault on the fundamental rights of the property owners.

The president finally consented to conferences with a representative of the local interests and with Lee Thompson Smith, of New York, president of the Building Owners Association. Mr. Smith, after the conference, gave out a statement that the president had told him he was not convinced legislation was necessary and that he was not familiar with the pending bill. This statement met with a response from the White House that the president stood where he had always stood and that no more real estate men interested in defeating the legislation would be granted a conference. The president also holds that increased rentals here would necessitate a demand for increased salaries of government employees and this would lead to a general wage increase and advance the cost of living all over the country.

ENGLAND OPPOSES GUN ELEVATION ON AMERICAN SHIPS

Secretary Hughes Takes Japanese View That Gun Elevation Program is Not Violation of Treaty

Washington, Jan. 8.—Secretary Hughes in a letter read today to the House Naval Committee took the position that the elevation of guns on American battleships would not violate the treaty although such might have the unfortunate effect of tending to promote naval competition.

The letter also recited that while Great Britain advanced the view that the alterations proposed would violate the treaty, Japan took the opposite view.

Mr. Hughes wrote the committee in response to the resolution asking whether any protest against the elevation program had been made by foreign powers. The British Ambassador, he said, on March 15, 1923, had brought up the subject. He earnestly appealed to the State Department against any alterations in the present gun elevation giving positive assurances that such alterations had not been made on any British capital ship after it was commissioned. Mr. Hughes said. The British view, the secretary said, was that the changes proposed in the American ships would constitute major operations prohibited by the treaty. Mr. Hughes agrees with the Japanese opinion that such changes should be regarded as minor alterations and not in violation of the treaty but added that he realized it might tend toward a revival of competition out of harmony with the well established position of the United States.

LAW ENFORCEMENT DISCUSSED WHITE HOUSE BREAKFAST

Group of Citizens Solicit Aid of President and Governors in Carrying Out Law Enforcement

Washington, Jan. 8.—Law enforcement was discussed today around the White House breakfast table. The president's guests were Judge Elbert H. Gary, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., and other members of the special committee representing the National Citizens' Committee of One Thousand on law enforcement which yesterday in New York closed its annual meeting with the adoption of a resolution to be presented to the president and the governors of the various states.

The resolution requested the president and governors to urge all officials "of every rank and classification, appointive or elective, to join them by their precept and personal example and so far as they could by active participation in all administrative efforts to maintain among the citizens of our republic a high determination to obey and enforce the laws of the land."

Fish Oil, Deodorized.
Seattle, Wash. — Discovery that fish oils can be deodorized by passing hydrogen, nitrogen or carbon dioxide gas through them has been announced by Dr. H. K. Benson, professor of chemical engineering in the University of Washington. This eliminates an objection to paints made with fish oils, of which there is a large potential production in the Pacific northwest. Such paints are declared to have unusual durability.

NAMES WOMEN JUSTICES TO AID "MA" FERGUSON.

To make "Ma" Ferguson feel at home as the first woman Governor of Texas, Governor Pat M. Neff, who retires this month after four years in office, has named three women as special justices of the State Supreme Court to try the case of Johnson vs. Darr, an El Paso litigation involving the Woodmen of the World, disqualifying the three regular male justices from sitting in the case. The women he named are: Mrs. Hortense Ward, of Houston, one of "Ma" Ferguson's chief advisers; Mrs. Nellie Robertson, of Grapeland, County Attorney of Hood County, and Mrs. Edith Wilkins, of Dallas, practicing attorney and the first and only woman member of the State House of Representatives. This is the first time in American history an entire court has been made up of women.

DELAY ACTION ON DEBT SITUATION

Secretary Mellon Will Not Call Commission to Consider Clementel Note at Present

Washington, Jan. 8.—Secretary Mellon indicated today that he would delay for the present at least calling the debt commission to consider the informal suggestion of Finance Minister Clementel in connection with the French debt.

The secretary declined to indicate whether he would reply to the French official's note or to say what the next move would be.

NATIONAL BANK BUYS BUILDING AT FIVE POINTS

Purchase Made to Provide Larger Quarters for Future Expansion, Officials Say

Announcement was made this morning of the purchase by the National Bank of Greenville, the Higgs-Harde and Laughinghouse building located at Five Points and known as the National Bank Building. The transaction was closed at a consideration of \$84,000.

In making the announcement of the purchase this morning bank officials stated that the bank was rapidly outgrowing its present quarters and that the purchase was made to assure quarters for the future, it being the intention of the bank eventually to occupy the entire first floor of the building.

Transfer of possession of the building will become effective on February 1, it was stated.

The structure, which was built a few years ago by Messrs E. B. Higgs, D. W. Hardee and Dr. Charles O'H. Laughinghouse, is of four stories containing about 70 rooms and offices. The first floor of the building is now occupied by The National Bank, The Sanitary Barber Shop and Laughinghouse-Morton Music Company, while the upper floors are divided into offices.

WHEDBEE TO APPEAR FOR LENOIR SHERIFF

Will Assist Other Prominent Counsel in Case County Commissioners vs. Taylor

It was announced here last night that the Association of Sheriffs of North Carolina had engaged Judge Harry W. Whedbee of Greenville, to represent Sheriff Arden W. Taylor, of Lenoir county, in probable litigation growing out of the action of county commissioners in declaring the sheriff short in his accounts, the latter's failure to make settlement as per the figures of an audit firm hired by the commissioners, and in the forthcoming suit against the commissioners on the part of Mr. Taylor, said to be of a civil and criminal nature.

Judge Whedbee is reputed to be one of the best lawyers of this part of the State. He served on the bench for a number of years before retiring to engage in the practice of law in Greenville.

The Association of Sheriffs of North Carolina was formed last summer in Raleigh. Sheriff Taylor is a member, it is understood.

Big Salary of Little Avail.

ORGANIZATION OF INDUSTRIAL BANK HERE PERFECTED

New Banking Institution Will Begin Operations February 2; J. E. Winslow is President

At a meeting of the incorporators and stock holders, in the City Hall last night, the organization of The Hood System Industrial Bank for Greenville was perfected, officers and directors were elected and efforts will be made to have the new institution in operation by Monday February 2.

At the outset last night W. H. Woodard, was chosen temporary chairman and W. R. Willis, temporary secretary of the meeting. The next business taken up by the stockholders was the reading and adoption of the charter and by-laws.

It being decided that the new institution should have a board of directors of nine members, the stockholders elected eight of these members leaving one vacancy to be filled by appointment by the board later. Those elected directors were: W. E. Hooker, J. E. Winslow, W. H. Woodard, M. K. Blount, W. R. Willis, J. K. Brown, F. J. Forbes and Z. V. Murphy.

Following the stockholders' meeting the board of directors held its first meeting and elected J. E. Winslow president of the bank and W. E. Hooker, vice president. The board will hold another meeting next Friday night at which time a cashier will be employed and decision as to a location for the new institution and an opening date will be reached. It was stated by members of the board following the meeting that efforts would be made to procure a location and get the business in operation by Monday, February 2, if possible.

Mr. Guiney P. Hood, of Goldsboro, organizer of the new banking institution, made a short address before the stockholders' meeting last night. In his talk Mr. Hood reviewed the wonderful record being made by the Hood Bank, at Elizabeth City, organized nine months ago. He also stated that like institutions were now being organized in Kinston, Rocky Mount and Durham. Mr. Hood is very optimistic for the success of the bank here.

Japan Seeks Economies.

Tokio.—Thirty-eight thousand government employees are to be discharged in the execution of the Kato ministry's program of retrenchment, the details of which are now being worked out by the cabinet. Officials of higher rank to be let out number 2,000, while 18,000 are of lesser standing such as employees of government arsenals and works.

Colds Cost England \$100,000,000

London.—The costliest disease in England, in the aggregate, is the common cold, and the 60,000,000 to \$80,000,000 cases of sniffles that will develop in British heads during the winter will cost in the neighborhood of \$100,000,000, according to a London Medical Health Officer.

GOV MORRISON WILL ADDRESS ASSEMBLY

Standing Committees for Senate and House Named Today; Several Bills Introduced

Raleigh, Jan. 8.—Governor Cameron Morrison will address the General Assembly in joint session tomorrow at noon.

Announcing his decision to accept the invitation extended him in a joint resolution passed today the governor stated that he had not meant to convey the impression that he would not address the body at all before retiring from office but that he would not make any recommendations. A joint resolution inviting the governor to appear tomorrow at noon introduced in the House by Representative Graham, of Orange county, was passed unanimously and the Senate concurred a short while afterward.

Both House and Senate committees were announced today after one or two minor bills were introduced and the two houses recessed shortly after 11 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Senators Gaston, of Gaston, Burgwyn and Grady were sworn in this morning. In addition Senator Burgwyn took the oath of office of President Pro Tem of the Senate.

As a compliment to Governor-elect Angus W. McLean, Senator Johnston, of Roberson county, introduced a resolution making January 14 a legal holiday in that county for this year only. Following a short recess just before noon Lieutenant Governor W. B. Cooper turned over to the new President Pro Tem Senator Burgwyn the Senate gavel. He will preside until the inauguration of Lieutenant Governor-elect J. E. Elmer Long on January 14.

Representative Thompson presented to the House the report of the Committee on Rules. The reported rule against the employment of newspaper men as clerks was not contained in the report and with but one or two minor exceptions the rules are the same as those used at the special session in August.

Representative Poole, of Hoke county, introduced a resolution designed to prohibit the teaching of Darwinism in the public schools, of the senate. Speaker Pharr referred the resolution to the Committee on Education.

Miss Julia Alexander, representative of Mecklenburg county and the only woman in the General Assembly, introduced her first bill today. It provides for the erection on the Capitol Square of a monument to the late Chief Justice Walter Clark and calls for a public memorial service to him at joint session of the House and Senate.

Representative Dellinger, of Gaston, introduced a proposed amendment to the constitution increasing the pay of legislators to \$600 with \$200 compensation for extra sessions.

VIENNA YIELDS TO RADIO AND GROCERS SELL SETS

Vienna. — Although it has been slow in coming, radio has finally invaded Vienna and the people are succumbing in droves.

A dozen or more Austrian firms make receiving sets and in the beginning their prices were high. Some public benefactor, however, conceived the idea of popular lectures to tell the amateur how to make his own set, and the result of this procedure has been two-fold, the makers are cutting prices, and some 200 small firms are manufacturing parts.

Receiving sets are now sold all over the city, tailors, grocers and florists joining in the competition. There are some 60,000 receivers in the city, but only a very few can do more than pick up the local broadcasting station. This station attempts to collect, but with indifferent success, a monthly charge of 28 cents from each listener.

RECORDS SHOW STEADY INCREASE USE OF TELEGRAMS BY KOREANS

Seoul, Korea. Although the telegraph of Korea is still used chiefly by the Japanese officials and residents of the country, the natives are making an increasing use of the telegraphs and in their own language, according to statistics published by the communications bureau of the Korean government-general.

Ten years ago telegrams delivered to Koreans were only 11 percent of the total, and of these practically none were in the Korean language. During the present year 27 percent of telegrams delivered are for Koreans, and of these more than half are written in Korean.

VICTORIAN GOVERNMENT MAY RELIEVE WORKERS OF TAXES

Melbourne, Australia. — Sixty thousand persons will cease to be tax payers if the budget of the first Victorian Labor Government is carried through. The government practically proposes to take the burden of taxation from the small wage earner, and transfer it to the big salary men. This has formed two camps of opinion. The workers believe that the millennium is appreciably nearer; others believe nothing of the sort.

The program calls for increasing income tax reductions to \$1,000, with an extra \$500 for the wife of a taxpayer, and the allowance for children to be increased from \$150 to \$250. Concessions for wives and children would be limited to taxpayers with incomes below \$40,000.

Present indications are that Labor will carry the proposal.

According to the announcement, the program will include two platform meetings each day, at which time internationally known figures will speak. Group conferences will be held each afternoon and on February 2, denominational meetings will be held to consider the best plan carrying back to the churches the results of the convention.

R. V. A. C. Zumbrennen and Miss Mabel K. Howell of Asheville, are issuing credentials to Southern Methodist delegates, as admission to the conference will be by card only. Dr. E. H. Rawlings and Mrs. H. R. Steele of the Board of Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South are members of the arrangements committee.

London.—"Pikeman's pot" styles in women's hats, designed after the steel helmets of the 17th century pikemen, represented in the collection of arms and armor of the Tower of London, are the latest sensation in fashionable London millinery.

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THE INDUSTRIAL BANK

The completion of the organization of the Hood Industrial Bank for Greenville and the setting of a date for the beginning of operations of the institution adds another great asset to Greenville that as time goes on will be felt more and more by the entire community.

The industrial bank fills a gap between the operations of a building and loan association and a commercial bank and will supply a long felt need in Greenville. Through the industrial bank the "little man" heretofore unable to borrow for personal needs will be able to obtain necessary funds while the

merchants and other business men of the community will prosper from the fact that the masses will be enabled to pay for goods purchased.

During the past nine months the Hood System Bank in Elizabeth City has made a wonderful record as an institution and according to reports from that city has proved a great benefit to the community as a whole. Similar reports have been received from Goldsboro and other places where industrial banks have been established and that Greenville will benefit from its new enterprise is a foregone conclusion.

EVENTUALLY

While there appears to be much opposition on the part of property owners adjoining the city, to the proposed extension of the city limits these property owners should take into consideration the fact that most of the property now within the limits of the city proper is already developed and that sooner or later their property will be the sites of residences and industries. Already there are numbers of so-called citizens of Greenville residing outside the city limits, yet they receive the same benefits offered by the city as persons living within the city and paying the taxes.

There is no question to the fact that further development of the city must be on that property now outside the limits and this property should be made to bear its part of the city's expenses by extending the limits of the city to include these suburbs.

PUBLIC FORUM

To the Editor of the Reflector, and the Citizens and Electors of the Town of Greenville:

Having a deep and abiding interest in the welfare and prosperity of my home town and community, and believing that my experience as a public servant and my knowledge of public affairs, have in a large measure fitted me for a special service to my people and community and believe that the citizenship of Greenville demands a strong progressive administration of public affairs based on a sound, sane, and business-like economy, I take this opportunity and method of declaring myself a candidate for the office of Mayor of the Town of Greenville.

Greenville has a splendid future before it. The town is growing. Strong healthy business conditions exist everywhere, in our little city. We must keep moving upward and onward with steady progress, yet we must not lose sight of the fact that all enduring progress must be based on sound and business-like economy. This is my theory of city government and these two factors to-wit: Progress and Economy, shall be the ruling idea of my administration if elected to this responsible position.

The older and middle-aged citizens of Greenville have known me from young manhood, but there are many younger citizens of this growing and progressive town who are not familiar with the early conditions back yonder in the years when we were recovering from the Civil War and for this reason it occurs to me to be very fitting that I recount some of the experiences of my career leading from my early manhood to the present time.

In April 1864, the seventeen-year-old boys were called upon to enter the army. I was at Horner's Military School at Oxford, my age 16-1-2 years. President Davis sent a circular letter that all boys over 16 well drilled enough for drill masters would begin a First Lieutenant (Commission) and assignments to duty. Sam Selby, Cad Capthart and myself accepted the call and went to Richmond to see the Secretary of War and got our commissions. I was sent to a Regiment of North Carolina boys. After three months of hard drilling I was changed to Adjutant and later was made Captain of Company H, 71st North Carolina Troops, four days before I was 17 years old. Our hard service began the 28th of December, 1864, when 15,000 of us under Wade Hampton whipped Hancock's Core of 45,000 and drove them back from Bellfield, Va. (We were then sent to Hokes Division Johnson's Army and were in the battles of Kingston and Bentonville.) After the war was over the 14th Amendment enfranchising the negroes and the carpet baggers and scallawags took the negroes under control through the Union Leagues. We were living in such terror that the Ku Klux Klan began in Tennessee and spread like wildfire throughout the South. In November 1868 I organized a Ku Klux Klan in Washington, N. C., and in thirty days drove out of the county the last carpet baggers and silenced the scallawags and closed the Union Leagues. (In January 1869 I came back to Pitt County and organized a Klan of 80, all ex-Confederates. We soon duplicated what had been done in Deaford. Later in life I served as Chairman of Board of Magistrates that levied all of our taxes. Later I served with Captain Fred Harding and Col. R. R. Cotten as a member of your County Court for four years, 1903-1909 as a member of State Board of Agriculture, 1909-1913 as Superintendent of North Carolina Prison and Farm. The dykes were re-built, 2,000 acres of land reclaimed and the prison and farms that had never paid over 140,000, paid \$90,000 each of the four years. The farm got back to a productive state raising 1000 bales of cotton instead of 800, 8000 barrels of corn instead of 3000, 15,000 bushels of peanuts instead of 10,000 and reducing the number of escapes from 41 to 17. Later as a member of your Legislature I was the author of the passenger fare bill from 3-1-4 to 2-1-2; this saved the travelling public \$1,315,000. Another important measure making the minimum punishment for carrying concealed weapons \$50.00 fine or six months on the roads. Taking it from the 100 counties it adds another half million to the school fund.

I refer to the varied experiences of my career, because I feel it gives me special fitness to serve my people and community. I have always been close to the people. I have known and understood their needs. I have always believed in progress, and have always practiced strict business economy, and in my maturer manhood I shall be glad to give my town and people the very best there is in me to a progressive administration based on sound business-like economy which is the safest guarantee for the growth of our town and the prosperity of all its citizens.

In making this announcement of my candidacy for the office of Mayor of Greenville, I shall be glad to have some responses or expressions of opinion from any of our citizens who are interested in the growth and prosperity of our town.
