C. Greene, Cecil Garrenton, J. D. Hemingway, A. M. Schultz. Dr. Thompson, of the Pitt Community hospital was made an honorary member. The session was featured by the election of officers and other matters of vital importance to the society.

After the meeting had been called to order, expressions of regret at the absence of Dr. E. T. Dickinson were made and a telegram of New Year's greeting was sent him by the society.

Dr. Charlie Outland, Pitt County Health officer, introduced resolutions asking that a committee be appointed to see that Greenville have a pure milk supply. The committee is composed of Dr. L. C. Skinner, chairman, G. G. Dixon and J. C. Green.

Dr. C. O'H. Laughinghouse made a most inspiring and interesting talk on our excellent system of county government, quoting frequently Dr. E. C. Brooks who on last week addressed the county commissioners praising them for having the best system of county government which had come under his observation during his tour of the state. Dr. Laughinghouse in the course of his remarks complimented Dr. W. W. Dawson, chairman of the county commissioners, for the wonderful part which he had played in perfecting the county system of government. After his talks the Medical Society gave Dr. Dawson a rising vote of thanks.

In response to Dr. Laughinghouse, Dr. W. W. Dawson made a beautiful speech of appreciation, telling of the co-operation which he had received from the members of the Board of County Commissioners, the county officials and the citizens of the county. He also expressed his appreciation to the members of the Medical Society for their interest in the government of the county and thanked them for their many expressions of appreciation.

Dr. W. W. Dawson, the newly elected president, appointed the following health committee to act on health matters, Dr. L. C. Skinner, chairman; Dr. C. J. Ellen and Dr. A. M. Schultz. Superintendent Wheeler, of the Farmville graded schools will be requested to make public the report concerning the results of the medical attention given the children of Farmville who recently had their defects corrected. The work shows wonderful results and the Medical Society is anxious for the public to know the outcome of the health work which is being accomplished throughout the county. The following officers were elected: President, Dr. W. W. Dawson, who succeeds Dr. J. C. Greene; vice president, Dr. J. D. Hemingway, of Bethel; who succeeds Dr. W. I. Wooten. Dr. A. M. Schultz, the efficient secretary and treasurer, was re-elected for his fourth term.

Dr. G. G. Dixon, of Ayden, was appointed as a delegate to the State Society which will meet in Pin-hurst in April. Dr. C. O'H. Laughinghouse was elected alternate.

The February meeting will be held in Bethel, with Drs. Cecil Garrenton and J. D. Hemingway, hosts. Every success is predicted for the Pitt County Medical Society for the ensuing year. It accomplished many wonderful things during the past year and is planning to "carry on" this year to greater service for humanity.

More "Murder" Hints in McClintock Case



Investigation into the death of William Nelson McClintock, youthful Chicago millionaire, took a sensational turn in the Windy City when Chief Justice Harry Olson, of the Municipal Court, demanded that the probe be extended into the death of Mrs. Emma Nelson McClintock, Billy's mother, and Dr. Oscar Olson, Billy's brother, physician to the McClintock and Shepherd families. Judge Olson reported that his brother, long-time friend of the McClintock family, had been seen with William D. Shepherd, foster father and heir of Billy, shortly before his death.

ISAAC M. MEEKINS IS APPOINTED TO SUCCEED CONNOR

Appointment of Republican Gubernatorial Candidate Brings End to Spirited Contest.

Washington, Jan. 9. — Isaac M. Meekins was nominated by President Coolidge today to be Federal Judge for the Eastern North Carolina District.

Meekins was the Republican candidate for governor in North Carolina in the November election and one of the three urged for the appointment to the vacancy in the eastern district of that state.

His nomination brings to an end a spirited contest between supporters of the various candidates the president having conferred with three special groups of North Carolina citizens regarding the nomination.

Meekins was formerly connected with the office of Federal Alien Custodian and his nomination was approved by Senator Simmons, of North Carolina.

Declares South is Going Forward by Leaps and Bounds

Raleigh, Jan. 9. — "The whole south is going forward educationally by leaps and bounds," said State Superintendent of Public Instruction, upon his return to Raleigh from Gulfport, Miss., where he attended a two-day conference of state superintendents from 14 southern states. "I believe, though," he said, "that North Carolina is taking the lead in its educational endeavors. The Gulfport conference, while it was not a large affair, that is, from a numerical standpoint, was inspirational. I believe that all of us who attended got many ideas which will be of service."

Superintendent Allen was given an appointment on the committee on teacher training.

Abernethy's Home Damaged by Fire

New Bern, Jan. 9.—Fire caused by a defective flue this afternoon heavily damaged the home of Congressman Charles L. Abernethy. The blaze, said to have originated in the basement, at its way through a flue up to the attic before it was discovered.

Mr. Abernethy was at home at the time. The damage, it is said, will amount to several thousand dollars.

NEW BUDGET BOARD WILL HAVE CHARGE FOR NEXT TWO YRS.

Walter Murphy, of Salisbury, is only Member of old Budget Commission in New Body

Raleigh, Jan. 9.—The State Budget Commission for the next two years will be composed of Governor Angus W. McLean, chairman; Walter Woodron, of Salisbury, chairman of the Senate Appropriations Committee; P. H. Williams, of Elizabeth City, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee; Walter Murphy, of Salisbury, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee; N. A. Townsend, of Dunn, chairman of the House Finance Committee, and a Republican to be appointed by Governor McLean. The only old member of the commission will be Mr. Murphy.

The Budget Commission is made up of four ex-officio members, namely the governor, who is the chairman, and the chairman of the House and Senate Appropriations and Finance Committees. Until 1921 all were ex-officio members. At that session, however, a bill was passed giving the minority party representation on the commission. Governor Morrison appointed T. M. Jenkins, of Graham county, at that time a member of the House of Representatives. There is no indication as to who will be appointed by Governor McLean.

The Budget Commission makes up the estimates of all appropriations and submits them to the General Assembly for their guidance when the appropriations bills come up for consideration.

HOUSE APPROVES A PART WAR DEBT BILL

Rivers and Harbors Improvement, Muscle Shoals Work and Flood Control Included in an Approved Sections.

Washington, Jan. 9.—The House today approved a section of the War Department bill allotting \$40,000,000 for work during the coming year on rivers and harbors improvements.

Approval was also given for the \$10,000,000 fund for flood control on the Mississippi River and \$500,000 for similar work on the Sacramento River in California.

Another section approved sets aside \$3,040,290 for continuation of work on dam number 2 at Muscle Shoals.

N. C. State College to be Put to Test Track Team Producer

Raleigh, Jan. 9.—North Carolina State College is going to be put to the test in its ability as a track team producer during the month of April and the early part of May, for there are some real track team producing schools on its schedule as announced here.

The Techmen will meet Virginia Military Institute and Washington and Lee, both of which have produced good track teams and Duke University, which has a record as a track team college, under the name of Trinity, especially in cross country running. This will be the first time that Duke University and State have met in the past two years.

State will also try out his skill on group athletics when he takes part in the Southern Conference meet during the early part of May.

The track schedule for State as announced follows:

April 4, Virginia Military Institute at Raleigh.

April 11, Duke University at Durham.

April 15, Washington and Lee at Lexington, Va.

April 25, Carolina at Chapel Hill.

May 2 and 3, State Meet at Durham.

9 and 10, Southern Conference Meet—(location to be announced later).

MORRISON MAKES FINAL ADDRESS TO GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Extemporaneous Address of Ten Minutes Breaks all Previous Records for Gubernatorial

Raleigh, Jan. 9.—"In office or out I shall live ever ready to break a lance for North Carolina and her people against any foe which beset their interests."

Having made this dedication Cameron Morrison, for the past four years governor of North Carolina, left the hall of the House of Representatives at 12:15 o'clock this afternoon following a ten minutes address. This was his last appearance before the General Assembly as governor.

"I wish I could give the rest of my life to the public service," he declared, "but there is no opportunity open. I have enjoyed being governor. Although the labors incident to the office have been great and although the difficulties through which I have passed have often seemed greater than I could endure, yet something has turned the suffering into joy."

"I am very sorry indeed to go and I am deeply grateful to Almighty God and to the people of North Carolina for the opportunity that the office of governor has afforded me to serve humanity and to glorify my Creator."

"With the dignity of a simple Democrat and with the heart of Christian faith as interpreted by the Presbyterian Church, I leave it to my fellow countrymen to pass upon my administration."

The governor began his brief address at 12:05 o'clock and concluded at 12:15. He stated at the outset that he had not come to make any recommendations.

The joint session was held in the hall of the House of Representatives as is customary. The usual formalities were gone through with as members of the Senate filed in. The doors were then closed to await the approach of the governor which was duly announced by the Sergeant-at-Arms. The session was presided over by W. H. S. Burgwyn, president pro tempore of the Senate. Members of the governor's family occupied seats near the rostrum. The retiring executive was greeted with applause as he entered the hall accompanied by the legislative committee appointed to escort him from the governor's office. The gallery was crowded with spectators.

ACTION DEFERRED ON APPOINTMENT STONE AS JUSTICE

Chairman of Subcommittee Declines to Reveal Names of those Making Statements Secret Hearing.

Washington, Jan. 9.—Action on the nomination of Attorney General Stone to succeed associate Justice McKenna on the Supreme Court bench was deferred today by Senate Judiciary sub-committee after a secret hearing. Statements were heard from several persons whose names were not disclosed.

Chairman Sterling refused to discuss the matter "We do not care to say at this time who was heard," the chairman said.

Sitting with Chairman Sterling in the hearing were Senators Butler, Republican, Massachusetts, and Overman, Democrat, North Carolina.

Another Egg Record Claimed. Tacoma, Wash.—The best official egg laying record ever established by a heavy hen is claimed for a Rhode Island Red owned by Mrs. R. G. Covey, of Toppenish, Wash. This hen was entered in the recent laying contest conducted by Washington State College. It laid 300 eggs in a year.

BILL WOULD REPEAL FOREIGN STOCK TAX EXEMPTION STATUTE

Much Interest Centers Around Effort to Set Aside Hard Won Victory of Last Session.

Raleigh, Jan. 9.—A bill to repeal the law exempting foreign stock from taxation in North Carolina was introduced in the House of Representatives this morning by Representative King, of Guilford county. It was referred to the committee on Finance.

The law exempting foreign stocks from taxation was enacted after a hard fight in the 1922 session of the legislature.

Mr. King's repealer bill promises to be one of the centers of interest of the session on account of the agitation that has been going on throughout the state many months centering about the 1923 measure.

Both House and senate convened at 11 o'clock this morning. The Senate session lasted but seven minutes and that of the house was only 10 minutes longer. Both Houses then adjourned until mid-day when they met in joint session and heard the address of Governor Morrison.

During the brief morning session five measures were introduced in the Senate and 12 new bills were presented in the House. Lieut. Governor-Elect J. Elmer Long also announced the appointment of the committee on Insurance, Public Roads and Salaries and Fees in the Senate.

When the Senate reconvened after the recess Senator Jones introduced a bill to increase the number of judicial districts from 20 to 27. Two other bills, both of a minor importance were also presented.

CURLEY APPOINTED RALEIGH DIOCESE

Baltimore Arch Bishop to be Apostolic Administrator of new Diocese until Bishop Installed.

Baltimore, Jan. 9.—Arch Bishop Michale J. Curley has been appointed apostolic administrator of the newly created Catholic Diocese in Raleigh, North Carolina by Pope Pius.

Arch Bishop Curley will continue in the office of apostolic administrator until such time as a bishop shall have been installed in the diocese.

The Arch Bishop will leave for a visit to the new diocese in the near future having just received notice of his appointment from Rome.

New Bern Negro Draws Five Years Sentence Manslaughter Charge

New Bern, Jan. 9.—John Godette, Negro, yesterday convicted of manslaughter in connection with the death of Edna Williams, 12 years old Croatan school girl whom he ran over with his automobile, was today sentenced by Judge Barnhill in Superior Court to five years in State Prison. Attorneys for the convicted man previously had announced that there would be no appeal.

HONDURAN BANDITS LOOT MAIL SACKS FROM AMERICA

Tegucigalpa, Honduras.—American business interests in Honduras are concerned over the utter carelessness which has characterized the handling of mail matter within Honduran territory, from the United States. Serious losses and much inconvenience have resulted.

It seems that some 150 sacks of mail from America accumulated recently at Pico Solo, near Cals Yojoa, in a wooden building. Mail carriers came that way, and as the sacks were unguarded, they looted them all. Letters, documents, checks, drafts, invoices, etc., were scattered about in the fields, and the mail sacks themselves carried off to be used as rain coats.

DEATH OF SWINDLER BRINGS DRAMATIC CAREER TO AN END

Leo Koretz, \$2,000,000 Bayano Oil Bubble Swindler, Died in Illinois Prison Last Night.

Stateville, Ill., Jan. 9. — Leo Koretz, \$2,000,000 Bayano oil bubble swindler, paid his debt to society when he died in the state penitentiary hospital here last night, 34 days after he started his sentence one to ten years.

The man, whose chief victims were relatives and intimate friends, died alone. His three brothers and his son heard the news in the warden's office and his wife, whom he left destitute when he fled with several hundred thousand dollars in his pockets, arrived too late to see him alive.

Apprehended in Halifax, Nova Scotia, last month, Koretz willingly returned to Chicago for trial. Suffering from diabetes, he maintained that a prison sentence would be tantamount to a death sentence. His attorneys sought clemency because of his condition and obtained it to the extent that three sentences were imposed to run concurrently. He would have been eligible for pardon after 11 months.

BIG PROBLEMS OF FINANCE EXPERTS NOW BEFORE GOVTS

Communication by Representatives with Respective Governments Leads to Belief Agreement Near.

Paris, Jan. 9.—The principal problems in connection with division of German reparations payments which the finance ministers and diplomats of the Allies, and associated powers came here to solve, are today apparently in the hands of the various governments for solution.

Winston Churchill, British Chancellor Exchequer, remained all the morning at the British Embassy and has been in telephonic communication with London. The American delegation sent a long and important cable message to Washington while Finance Minister Clementel of France was in a lengthy and serious consultation with Premier Herriot.

These were the obvious developments of the first day in which this ill was supposed to have been nailed down tight on the proceedings of the financial conference. Interpretation of the suddenly expressed desire for secrecy and the fact that the principal delegations were consulting their governments, is that negotiations have reached a point where decision of moment must be taken. There is a tendency in French political circles to attribute the silence of the negotiators to the desire of the French government to keep ammunition from the opposition press.

The fact, it was said, that it was M. Clementel who asked for secrecy, is much commented upon and is constructed by the opposition as meaning that France once more is at the point of giving ground on some leading question in the conflict.

Delegates declined to indicate to-day what was the program for the immediate future.

Paris, Jan. 9.—Important cablegrams are on their way to Washington regarding the progress of negotiations between the American and British financial conference delegates over the contended of the United States to share in the Dawes plan proceeds.

Frank B. Kellogg, Ambassador to Great Britain, who is here for the conference, conferred this morning with James A. Logan, Jr., also of the American delegation, before the telegrams were dispatched.

Washington, Jan. 9.—Successful completion of the Paris claims negotiations is expected in Washington although officials decline to comment in any way on the official reports they have received. Details of the discussions were not made public.

There has been an intimation, however, that the ultimate status of the Livianian and other German ships seized by the United States during the war will play a part in the settlement. It was learned today that if the American government is permitted to retain title to three vessels she is willing to make corresponding deductions from her total claims.

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DON'T CUT THE C. M. T. C.

The severe cut in the citizens' military training camps recommended by the budget values much greater than the education in military men are expected at the camps next year. The budget allowance of \$2,320,000 will provide for only 29,000 men.

In 1921 about 10,000 young Americans went to these camps; in 1922 there were 22,000; in 1923 there were 25,000, and in 1924 about 34,000 men. Next year at least 40,000 should be provided for. The cut to 29,000 men and a saving of \$660,000 is not worth the cost in military efficiency and physical and social welfare that the extra training will bring.

The citizen's military training camps have values much greater than the education in military technique which their name suggests. They are training schools of citizenship and social discipline. This fact should be considered in apportioning the budget. They should be charged not merely to the military

system but to the general national welfare.

AN IMMIGRATION EVIL

When the United States opened its doors to the oppressed of every nation, the invitation was to those who wished to find in the New World an opportunity for freedom, a place where equality and justice ruled. In the early days those who came from overseas came to become citizens and to stay. There came a time when some had no purpose but to make enough money to return to Europe. There were others who became citizens in name but loved some other country better than the one which gave them their bread and butter. It, therefore, became necessary to reduce the immigration.

Dr. Laughlin, of the Carnegie Institute, has been investigating the sort of immigrants who come in under the new law. He reports that those who come from Italy under the 40,000 allotment yearly are selected by the Italian authorities. It is well organized and none come except those who will return their wages to Italy, or who will themselves return to Italy with what money they have saved. Dr. Laughlin truly thinks that immigration "should be determined on the ground of its contributions to the future race of America and for that reason should be selected by this country rather than by the nations which export labor."

The United States should do the selecting and have its agents in Europe. Only those of sound mind and body who wish to become real Americans should be accepted. Those coming to pay a visit with the mind to return will never help America. The door should be closed to them. All living here should become real citizens, those here for a time being given temporary permits. There are too many people here who come to trade and make no return in service, in tax, in devotion to our flag. —News & Observer.

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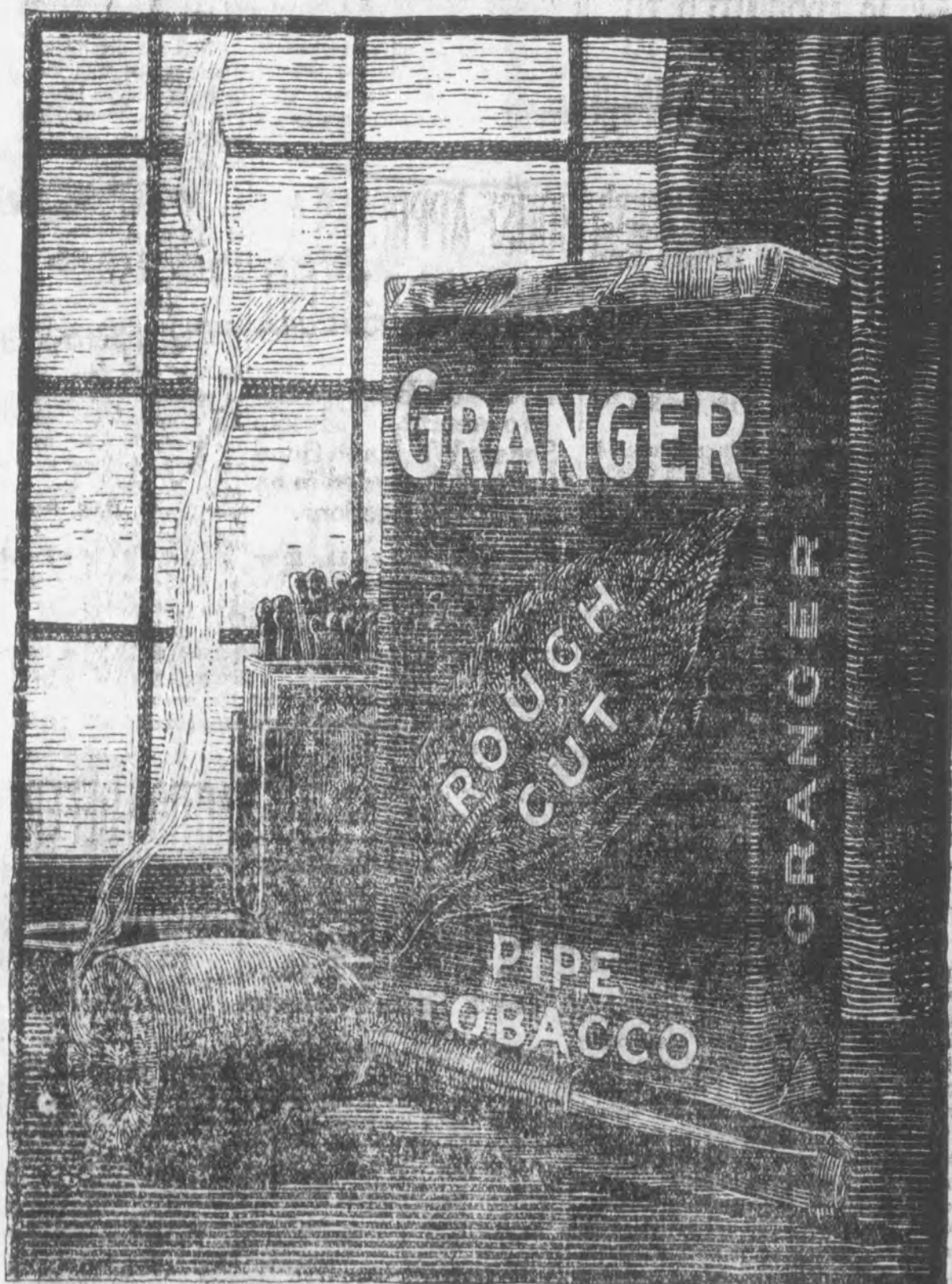

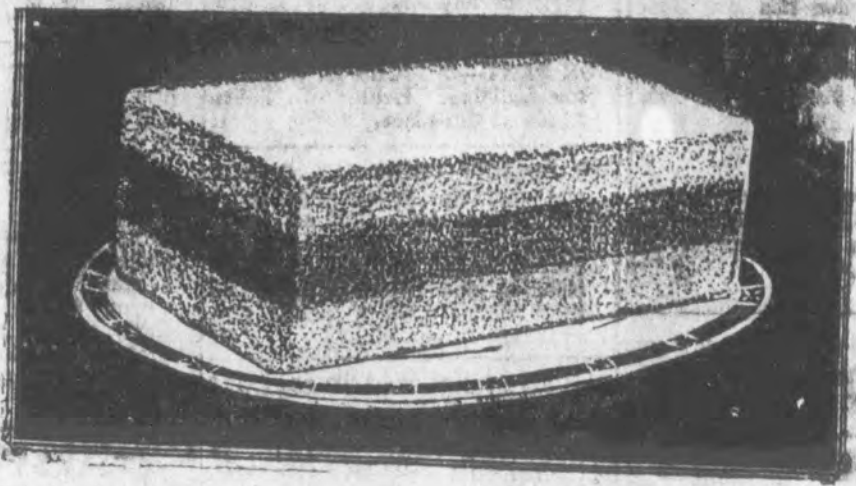
