CONVICTED FORGER BUYS PARDON FROM THE GOVERNOR'S SON

Affair Revealed by Kansas City Paper. Governor Declares it a frame-up by Political Enemies.

Topeka, Kansas, Jan. 10.—A bomb shell was dropped in Kansas today with the revelation that Russell G. Davis, 28 year old son of Governor Johnathan M. Davis, had accepted \$1,250 and delivered a pardon to Fred W. Pollman, former bank president and convicted forger.

The transaction took place in a room at the National Hotel here and was exposed by the Kansas City Journal whose reporters in conjunction with Pollman had set a trap for the governor's son.

Governor Davis, whose term expires Monday, admitted his son had been "inveigled" into accepting money and asserted the affair was a "frame-up" by his political enemies to "get me."

Young Davis accepted \$1,000 from Pollman while the two reporters listened in an adjoining room by the aid of a telephonic device hidden behind the curtains in Pollman's room said the Journal's story. Receiving the \$1,000 payment the governor's son left the hotel and returned with the pardon and then received \$250 more the newspaper said. Then confronted by the Journal reporters and witnesses with the pardon and threatened with arrest he returned the \$250 he had received upon delivery of the pardon and then left the hotel returning later with the \$3,000.

Young Davis asserted his father had no knowledge of the transaction. Governor Davis said his son told him of the affair last night when he came home. "Somehow they inveigled my son into accepting the money but when he realized why they had given it to him he took it back to them. At the same time he delivered the pardon which I had already decided to grant," said the governor. Declaring that he had aided Pollman at his trial in April 1921 and later had appealed to former Governor Henry Allen in Pollman's behalf when the convicted forger was seeking a parole which he received. Governor Davis declared Pollman had capitalized his friendship by plotting to gain a pardon through young Davis and frame the governor.

Washington Girls Defeat Local Girls Game of Basketball

COOLIDGE OPPOSES ELEVATION OF GUNS ON CAPITAL SHIPS

President by his Stand Hopes to Strengthen Policy of Non-Competition in Naval Armaments.

Washington, Jan. 10.—The proposal before Congress for elevation of guns on American capital ships is regarded by most of official Washington today as being practically dead in view of President Coolidge's positive stand against such alterations. The Senate and House Naval Committees have been withholding action on the guns elevation proposal for some time with indication that no attempt would be made to press the project if administration opposition should be made known.

The president's position was made unmistakably clear last night at the White House. The technical right of the United States, to elevate her guns and the question of the cost the work would entail are looked upon by the president as minor considerations. However, in announcing himself against further elevations Mr. Coolidge hopes to strengthen the policy of non-competition as enunciated in the arms limitations treaty, it was said by the White House spokesman.

GENERAL ASSEMBLY SEEK FINAL VOTE ON HOUSE MAY VOTE ON DECLARES RECESS MUSCLE SHOALS BILL OVER THE WEEK END IN TODAY'S SESSION

Sessions Today Nothing More than Formal opening and adjournment. Only Three Bills Presented

Raleigh, Jan. 10.—Due to the absence of many members who are spending the week-end at their respective homes the sessions of the House and Senate today were scarcely more than the formal opening and adjournment. Each branch will convene at eight o'clock Monday night to launch into the second week of the session. However, little action may be expected at that time. There would have been no sessions today but for the law which requires daily sittings, Sunday included, during the approximate two months devoted to each biennial session.

In today's short session three local bills were introduced in the House and no bills were introduced in the Senate. Legislators present were anxious to leave for their homes and before mid-day the Senate and House lobbies were emptied of the law makers.

Representatives Franklin, of Swain County, introduced a bill in the House that would authorize Bryson City to issue \$50,000 bonds for construction of an electric light plant. The bill was referred to the Committee on Counties, Cities and Towns.

A bill creating the office of recorder at Cherryville was introduced by Representative Dellinger, of Gaston county, while Swain county under the terms of a bill introduced by Representative Franklin would be exempted from the state wide dog-tax law.

After the three bills had been introduced, Speaker Pharr entertained a motion to adjourn until Monday night and the House followed the example of the Senate which had adjourned a few minutes earlier.

Washington, Jan. 10.—Senator Curtis, Republican leader, said he hoped to keep the Senate in session today until a vote was obtained on the Underwood Muscle Shoals bill. The bill was up for consideration when the session started at noon.

Senator Morris, Republican, Nebraska, who has been leading the fight against the Alabama Senator's measure, said he would use his influence to get the final vote on Muscle Shoals today. He declared he had completed his fight and was ready for a vote.

ENGLAND BUILDING NEW BATTLESHIPS

London Papers Say new Type Vessel Marks New Era in Fighting Craft Construction.

London, Jan. 10.—The design of battleships Nelson and Rodney now being built by Great Britain under the provisions of the Washington naval treaty is so revolutionary according to the Daily Express that it marks the end of the dreadnaught era just as the dreadnaught marked the end of previous types. The new ships will be entirely different from any other in the world, the paper says.

Both will be floating fortresses and airdromes and will have a radius action covering thousands of miles. Nine 16 inch guns will be mounted on each of three turrets all forward. There will be no guns on the after part which will constitute a flight deck and the ship will carry their own flight planes.

Another feature the Express says is that there probably will be no funnels the product of the funnels being discharged through pipes running along side the stern. The destruction of the army also will be revolutionary. The magazines like the guns being all forward, the usual armor belt extending for three-fourths of the ship's length will be unnecessary and the weight saved on the side can be added to the deck.

Washington, Jan. 10.—A final vote on the McFadden banking bill before the week-end adjournment was the objective of House leader, today as they got under way with the session shortly after noon. They were confronted, however, with two more hours of general debate before the measure could be considered under the five minute limit rule with amendments in order.

Ability to reach a final vote depended, it was admitted, on the action of those in charge of the bill toward limiting the discussion on some of the controversial sections.

ACTION ON STONE'S PARIS CONFERENCE NOMINATION HELD UP BY OPPOSITION FINANCE MINISTERS NOW AT STANDSTILL

Subcommittee will Not Be able to Report Monday. Warren Mentioned for Cabinet Post.

Washington, Jan. 10.—Unexpected opposition is today delaying action by the Senate Judiciary subcommittee on the nomination of Attorney General Stone, to be Justice of Supreme Court. At the same time the name of Charles B. Warren, of Michigan, was being mentioned as a possible successor to the cabinet vacancy which will be created by the Stone resignation.

Developments at the White House shortly before noon today indicated that there was increasing evidence that President Coolidge expected to name Warren to succeed the Attorney General. The president is known to hold Warren the highest regard and has frequently conferred with him and acted as a host in a more social way at the White House. One of these conferences was held yesterday and later the president called Senator Couzens, of Michigan, and then Mr. Stone.

Warren's desire to be a private citizen after serving in many other high official government capacities has served, however, to cause mention of many other names for the cabinet offering. Among these are James M. Beck, Pennsylvania, Solicitor General; William J. Donovan, New York, Assistant Attorney General; Governor Groesbeck, Michigan, and Chief Justice Ruggs, of Massachusetts Supreme Court.

Opposition to Stone's appointment to the Supreme Court developed yesterday when the judiciary subcommittee considering the nomination received the files of court records dealing with a suit in which he appeared as counsel before the Supreme Court for the estate of the late J. Pierpont Morgan. The records were filed by James A. Owen, of Colorado, but formerly of Buncombe county, North Carolina, who lost the decision in the suit, and Chairman Stirling expressed opinion today that study of the documents would make impossible the subcommittee's report on the nomination to the entire committee as had been planned for next Monday.

Meetings Proceed at Slow Speed While awaiting Approvals or Disapprovals from various Capitals.

Paris, Jan. 10.—The Anglo-American negotiations on the subject of reparations claims appeared from surface indications today to have reached an acute stage.

The British delegation is understood to have found the representatives of the United States rather indifferent to argument on subjects that apply to the Allies because America is free from some of the complications in which the Allies are entangled. Detachment of America from the general allied differences was evidenced today by the fact that American representatives were absent from the meeting held at the Ministry of Finance and attended by finance ministers of Great Britain, France and Belgium. There is unconcealed apprehension in certain quarters lest the Americans who have no other interests here except the question of receiving a share of the Dawes plan receipts might find it unnecessary to return to the full conference if they are unable to reach what is regarded as a reasonable understanding with the British.

Paris, Jan. 10.—The Inter-Allied conference failed today to maintain the pace it started with and this morning things were said to be only normal. Even the Anglo-American negotiations are still progressing only slowly and a number of details have yet to be settled and the approval of the Washington governments as to what has already been accomplished before a satisfactory conclusion can be reached.

The principal difficulty confronting the conference this morning was that of Belgium's share in the reparations from Germany. After arguing all yesterday afternoon the finance members of the powers finally gave it up and turned the problem over to the experts of all the nations who spent the greater part of the night trying to decide how much Belgium should receive under her priority privilege. The experts were faced this morning with four different sets of figures and no one seemed to be able to agree with the other after a considerable debate.

Washington, Jan. 10.—The trend of the Paris negotiations relative to American claims against Germany is causing no concern in official circles here. Official advice from Paris have given no hint that anything approaching a deadlock has developed. Until the general principles of proposed agreements have been sanctioned at the various interested capitals, however, it is impossible for the conference to proceed rapidly with the details.

BUENOS AIRES NEARS 2,000,000 POPULATION

Buenos Aires.—The population of this the largest city of the southern hemisphere, is approaching the 2,000,000 mark. Although no census has been taken since 1914, when the population was 1,575,000, statistics based on births, deaths, immigration and other factors, kept by the municipality give a population on August 31 last of 1,817,000.

Clergymen Face Hard Times

Folkestone.—Recent years have not been at all easy for many of the clergy of the church of England from a financial point of view, according to the Rev. W. H. Elliott, the vicar of the local church here. Times have been so hard for some of them that one parson had no new clothes for 20 years. Mr. Elliott cited another case, where at the tea-table at a clergyman's house there was never butter, milk or sugar; it was just a meal of bread and tea.

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PROTECTION ON HIGHWAYS

Now that the General Assembly has settled down to work it would be well if that body should devote a portion of its time to enacting legislation that would make the public highways of our state more safe for travel.

Four of the present day dangers of highway travel in this state are the Speeder, the Unlighted Vehicle, the Inability to Collect Damages from Irresponsible Persons, and the greatest of all the Drunken Driver.

In the case of a speeder we already have sufficient laws provided that same were properly enforced.

In the case of animal drawn vehicles there is no statute requiring them to display a light while traveling the highways at night and during the past year the unlighted vehicle has proved a great menace to night travel many serious accidents accompanied with loss of life having resulted.

At present there are hundreds of persons driving automobiles on the highways of this state who are financially irresponsible and from whom it is impossible to collect for damages caused by them. Such a condition should not longer be allowed to exist and the legislature should make provision that every auto-

mobile for which a license is issued should be covered by some form of property damage liability insurance as a protection against any loss that may be caused by said automobile.

Last but not least, the drunken driver is the greatest menace to the public as a whole. While at present there is a state law imposing a fine for the drunken driver the penalty has not proved sufficient protection for the public and this law should be made more stringent. In many states the law covering this form of crime has been given additional teeth and in most cases is obtaining the desired results. This state might do well to double its present fine of \$50 for this offense and add to the penalty a suspended jail sentence for a given period during which time the offender is not allowed to operate an automobile within the state. It is only by some such drastic measure that the state can free itself from the evil of drunken automobile drivers for records of the past year show that our present laws covering this evil are insufficient.

FILLING A GREAT PUBLIC OFFICE

Mr. Coolidge is considering the appointment of a successor to Harlan Fiske Stone as Attorney General of the United States, and no doubt M. Coolidge has plenty of people calling at the White House with advice. The famous Ohio crowd probably has small hope that he will choose another Daugherty, but the White House steps will echo with the tread of self-appointed counselors who urge the President to use this office to take care of somebody beaten in the last election or to strengthen the party in a doubtful State or to confer new honors upon a second-rater.

We hope Mr. Coolidge will have none of it. We hope that he will not only refuse to appoint a Daugherty but that he will also refuse to appoint a mediocrity without broad sympathies, real ability and an open mind. The office of Attorney General is an important office, closer, perhaps, to the every-day interests of the public than any other office in the Cabinet. It deserves another occupant as independent and as able as Mr. Stone was known to be before appointment and as he proved himself in office. —N. Y. World.

Editor Reflector,

Some days ago a statement appeared in the News & Observer giving the amount of the bonded indebtedness of our various counties and towns, and in which Greenville was listed at \$300,000. On the strength of this statement you wrote a very complimentary editorial, for which we wish to thank you.

However, as this statement was erroneous or at least misleading, and although complimentary to those responsible for the financial condition of the town, we feel that the public should be given the real facts.

On January 1st, 1925, the Town of Greenville had an outstanding bonded indebtedness of \$875,000.00. Against this our assets allowed as deductions by all financial institutions, such as the Water and Light Plant, other city properties and uncollected pavement assessments, amount to \$325,000.00, thus leaving what is financially known as our net debt, at \$550,000.00. But the actual outstanding bonded indebtedness is \$875,000.00, and this does not include the \$200,000.00 bonds issued in 1924 for the Greenville Graded

School District, of which Greenville is the principle part. Therefore this sum or the principle of same is also chargeable against us in financial ratings. Thus it will readily be seen that the statement appearing in the News & Observer was in error as to our actual bonded indebtedness, though substantially correct if it referred only to our net debt.

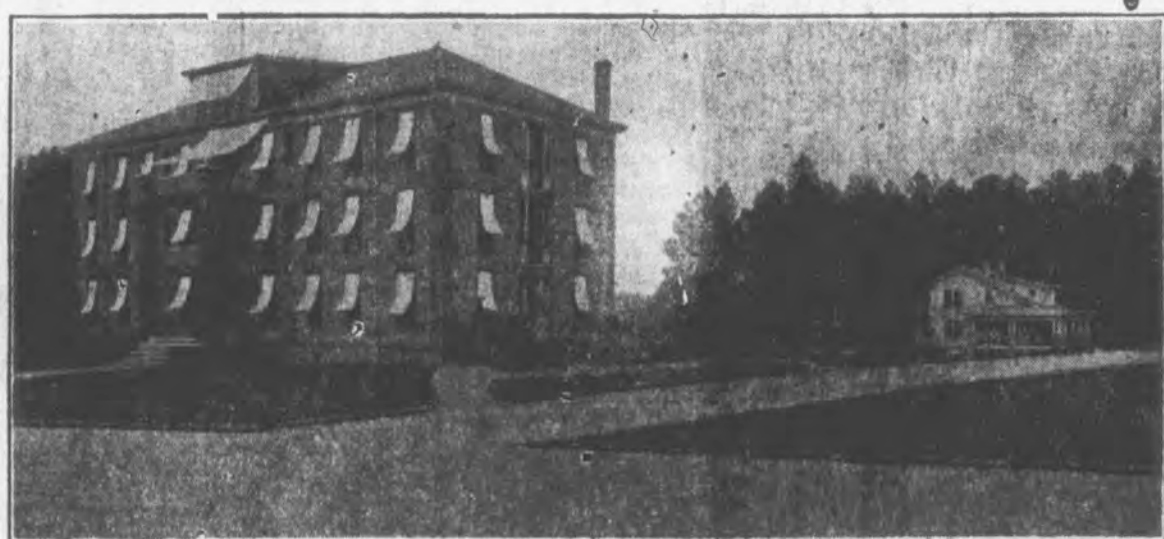
