## DISTRICT GOVERNOR ADDRESSES ROTARY CLUB ON LAST NIGHT

### He Says Golden Rule Should Be Practiced By Rotarians; Teachers to Be Entertained Next Meeting

The address of Mr. Gene Newsom, of Durham, governor of the Thirty-Seventh District of Rotary International, was the principal feature of last night's meeting of the Greenville Rotary Club.

Beginning with a few complimentary remarks on the real Rotary spirit he had found on his tour of the clubs of eastern North Carolina, the speaker followed with a report as to the records being made by the clubs, especially the Pitt county clubs, and then launched into the subject of real Rotary and its ultimate aims. In his report on the club contests which have been conducted for the past few months it was made known that each of the Pitt county clubs, Ayden, Farmville and Greenville had won attendance records over their competitors with whom they had been paired, each of the clubs making an average attendance record of above ninety per cent for the period. He also gave a brief outline of the wonderful growth of the organization of Rotary International now composed of nearly 1,000 clubs in 28 countries of the world.

Speaking on the subject of Real Rotary, Governor Newsom declared that one of the basic methods of Rotary was its unique membership out of which grew acquaintance, fellowship and finally an intensive friendship. This intensive friendship, he declared, is one of the ultimate aims of Rotary for it is through this and this alone that the teachings of Christ can be accomplished. Business, the speaker said, controls the universe and as Rotary is an organization creating friendship between business and professional men of every nationality it is through this means that each will in time be enabled to see the viewpoint of the other. When we as individuals become better acquainted with other individuals we invariably find that they are as we are and are ever willing to meet our friendship and the same is true, he declared, between communities, states and nations. As Rotary expands the nations are becoming to know each other better and it is through this channel eventually that a bond of friendship will prevail throughout the world and peace on earth will be assured.

The motto of Rotary, "Service Above Self," has never been reached by a living man save Our Redeemer, he said, and so long as we are human we cannot hope to reach such a goal but we can follow His teachings by doing unto others as we would that they should do unto us and the daily practice of this teaching should be the aim of every Rotarian.

The speaker followed his address with remarks about the District Conference to be held in Richmond March 26 and 27 and the International Conference to be held in Cleveland in June. He assured a good time to all who attended these conferences, and urged that as many as possible go.

Before conclusion of the meeting "On to Richmond" and "On to Cleveland" committees were appointed to make arrangements for those of the local club who should attend the conferences.

The next meeting of the club, January 26 is to be Teachers Night, at which time the faculties of the city schools are to be the guests of the club and every member is looking forward to the occasion which is an annual event.

Guests at last night's meeting in addition to District Governor Newsom, were Rotarians G. G. Dixon of Ayden; Charli Flynn, Washington, and Joe Raspberry, Farmville.

Giving as his reason a desire to retire to the private practice of law, Secretary of State Charles Evans Hughes, of New York, has resigned, effective March 4, and President Coolidge has appointed in his place Frank B. Kellogg, of Minnesota, at present Ambassador to Great Britain. Mr. Coolidge also appointed Charles Beecher Warren, of Michigan, former Ambassador to Japan and to Mexico, Attorney-General, succeeding Harlan F. Stone, of New York, appointed to the Supreme Court bench. There are persistent rumors in Washington that Mrs. Mabel Walker Willbrandt, of California, Assistant Attorney-General, may be named by President Coolidge as the first woman Judge on a Federal bench in the United States.

## POISONED WHISKEY B. R. LACY REPORTED KILLS TWO MEMBERS AS SERIOUSLY ILL OF WEDDING PARTY

### Metal Polish Mixed With "Gin" Causes the Death of Two and Serious Illness of Four Others

Pottsville, Pa., Jan. 13.—A Ligon, now believed to have been metal polish, drunk through mistake for gin at a wedding party near here, last night caused the death of two of the guests and the serious illness of four others.

The county coroner and state police said today some of those at the wedding feast expressed belief that the poison liquid had been mixed with the liquid deliberately while others said it was done as a joke by one of the guests, who did not know it to be poison, while still others said a member of the wedding party had gone to a nearby saloon and picked up the bottle of metal polish believing it to be gin. The bride and groom did not partake of the fatal poison.

## Government Requested Name Valuation On Property Fort Caswell

Raleigh, Jan. 13.—Secretary of State W. M. Everett has addressed an inquiry to Secretary of War Weeks, asking that the government name the valuation on property at Fort Caswell, N. C., which is to be sold in the near future. In his letter Mr. Everett calls attention to a provision of law that gives to the state, county or city first option on government property that is to be sold, and asks that Secretary Weeks communicate with him at once in order that a bill may be presented during the present legislative session authorizing the purchase of the property.

Secretary Everett states that in a former conversation with Colonel B. F. Cheatham, assistant secretary of war, he was told that the original valuation of the property was \$50,000 and that "the government is not anxious to make money on the property."

## B. R. LACY REPORTED State Treasurer Stricken While Attending to Official Business in New York

New York, Jan. 13.—Benjamin R. Lacy, 70 years old State Treasurer of North Carolina, is seriously ill at the Hotel Pennsylvania, here, with pulmonary congestion, it became known today.

Dr. Joseph D. Nagel, house physician, said Mr. Lacy had passed a rather poor night and that although the patient had pulled through similar attacks in the past he could not say whether he would recover from his present illness because of his age. Mr. Lacy came here from Raleigh with Governor Morrison a week ago to sign an issue of North Carolina highway bonds sold to a New York syndicate. Governor Morrison finished his work and returned to North Carolina last week. Although quite ill since arriving here Mr. Lacy insisted upon completing his task which required him to affix his signature to 15,000 certificates. As a result of overtaxing his strength while in a weakened condition, it was said Mr. Lacy was forced to take to his bed two days ago.

## Dr. Paschal Begins History Wake Forest

Wake Forest, Jan. 12.—Dr. G. W. Paschal, registrar of Wake Forest College, has a 7,000 word article in the current Bulletin, college quarterly, which begins a history of Wake Forest College. Other articles will follow in succeeding issues of the "Bulletin." Upon completing the series, Dr. Paschal hopes to issue the work in book form.

With many footnotes and scholarly in its exactness, Dr. Paschal has managed to brighten it with light touches, interesting anecdotes, and all kinds of things that sometimes withers historical works. At the same time, however, he has been careful not to sacrifice historical value to fine writing. The work represents much research work by the Wake Forest professor.

In the opening article he gives himself to laying the background for the ones that are to follow, first concerning himself with the social, economic, and educational conditions out of which it (Wake Forest) arose. In doing this, he concerns himself with North Carolina in general and then with the early Baptists of the State in particular.

## Submarine Aground Reports Position Is Dangerous One

Chatham, Mass., Jan. 13.—The submarine S-19 which ran aground early today on the outer bar at the entrance to Orleans harbor sent out a message shortly after nine o'clock that her position was dangerous due to heavy seas. Waves were breaking over the bridge of the submarine which had a list of 20 degrees.

Chatham, Mass., Jan. 13.—Two Coast Guard Cutters are standing by the submarine S-10 which ran aground on a bank off Orleans outer harbor early today.

The Cutter Tampa which rushed to the aid of the submarine with the cutter Acushnet, as soon as the plight of the S-19 became known, reported at noon that conditions seemed favorable for pulling the vessel off.

## SENATE SOUNDS DEATH KNEEL FOR UNDERWOOD BILL

### Jones Substitute to Refer Shoals Question to Commission Adopted by Vote of 46 to 33

Washington, Jan. 13.—The Jones substitute for the Underwood Muscle Shoals bill was adopted in the Senate today.

The substitute provides that the entire matter be referred to a commission which is to report back to Congress. The Secretary of War is authorized to dispose temporarily of the power development at Muscle Shoals while the commission is making its study and also to construct dam number three in the Tennessee River.

The vote was 46 to 33. No lease could be considered by the commission for more than 50 years in length and the production of nitrate for ammunition and fertilizer is declared to be the primary purposes of the Muscle Shoals development under the Jones substitute.

The commission will be composed of the Secretary of War, the Secretary of Agriculture and a third person to be named by President Coolidge and the commission will be instructed to report not later than the first Monday in December 1925.

Adoption of the Jones substitute sounded the death knell for the Underwood measure and means that the Muscle Shoals problem will be referred to a commission authorized to make recommendations to Congress for disposal of the property.

Sixteen Democrats supported the Jones substitute and a like number Republicans voted for the Underwood proposal. After the vote on the Jones substitute Senator Norris, Republican, Nebraska, introduced a new substitute.

## Finance Conference Will End Tomorrow

Paris, Jan. 13.—The final session of the Conference of Finance Ministers will be held at nine o'clock tomorrow for the purpose of ratifying the agreements reached by the various delegations regarding the apportioning of the reparations under the Dawes plan, it was announced today.

Scores Lose Lives in German Train Wreck

Berlin, Jan. 13.—More than a score of lives are known to have been lost when the Berlin to Cologne express crashed into a train standing at the station at Herne early today. Three cars were completely demolished, killing or injuring many persons.

## HOUGHTON CHOSEN SUCCEED KELLOGG AT COURT ST. JAMES

### Definite Decision Has Been Reached to Transfer Berlin Ambassador to London Post

Washington, Jan. 13.—Alanson B. Houghton, of New York, now Ambassador to Germany, has been definitely selected by President Coolidge to succeed Ambassador Kellogg at London.

Mr. Houghton has attended many of the conferences in the work of rehabilitation and has first hand knowledge of practically all the European problems in which this country has an interest.

He is 61 years of age and was born in Cambridge, Mass. Mr. Houghton has served in Congress and before entering that body he was a glass manufacturer in New York. He was educated in the universities of Paris and Berlin.

Although Mr. Houghton's appointment is considered practically certain there is no indication when his nomination will be sent to the Senate.

Mr. Kellogg still must serve in London until he is prepared to return for his new duties, and his nomination as Secretary of State also will have to be passed upon. Formal action in the case of Mr. Kellogg may be delayed until after March 4 in which case he will be given a recess appointment pending the assembling of the new Congress in December.

Berlin, Jan. 13.—Ambassador Houghton today, it was understood, had signified in a telegram to Washington his willingness to accept the post at the Court of St. James in succession to Ambassador Kellogg.

## C. H. ENGLAND TO BE SECRETARY McLEAN

### Present Secretary of Governor-Elect Will Take Up Duties in Executive Office Tomorrow

Lumberton, Jan. 13.—Charles H. England, of Greensboro, will be secretary to Angus W. McLean after his inauguration as governor tomorrow it was announced here today. England has been with Mr. McLean for a year and was active in his campaign.

He was secretary to Governor W. W. Kitchin from 1904 to 1909 and later was secretary to Claud Kitchin, in Congress. For a time he was secretary to Congressman Stedman and in 1918 was chief clerk of the House Ways and Means Committee of Congress.

## Edenton Barbecue Been Postponed

Edenton, Jan. 13.—Owing to the governor's inauguration and the inability of speakers to reach here from the state capital on Tuesday, January 15, the big Edenton barbecue has been postponed until Tuesday, January 20.

Thousands of persons from all parts of the state are expected to be in attendance for the big celebration.

## Confessed Run Runner Is Charlotte Lawyer

Raleigh, Jan. 13.—The self-confessed run runner who operated between Charleston, South Carolina, and this city, in the sale of alleged rye and Scotch whiskey was identified this morning in city court here as L. C. Whitener, well known young attorney of Charlotte, and son of Colonel A. M. Whitener, of Hickory.

The young man has been missing from relatives and friends since last Thanksgiving. Whitener, whose father was Republican nominee for United States Senate in opposition to Senator F. M. Stammers in the last election, pleaded guilty of the charge against him and was found \$500 in court here today.

## Governor Davis's Son Accused of Bribe

Newspapers in Kansas charge that Russell Davis, son of the retiring Governor Jonathan M. Davis, received from Fred W. Polkman, convicted of fraud in a bank failure, \$1,250 for a pardon made out by Governor Davis. The bribe is said to have been paid in the presence of witnesses in a Topeka hotel.

## COURT OF APPEALS DECIDES IN FAVOR GOLDSBORO BANK

### Institution Not Responsible for \$6 and Later Raised to \$8,470.50

Richmond, Jan. 13.—Decision of the United States District Court at Raleigh declines to place responsibility on the National Bank of Goldsboro, North Carolina, for a raised draft of \$8,470.50 negotiated here through the Savings Bank of Richmond, was affirmed today in a decision handed down by the United States Circuit Court of Appeals.

The Richmond bank sought to recover the sum when it was claimed by the bank at Goldsboro that the draft for \$8,470.50 had been issued by G. A. Norwood, president of the latter bank, to N. L. Massie as a draft for \$6 on the first National Bank of New York and payment refused. It was charged by the bank here that the original draft had been drawn on non-sensitized paper and had not been protected and when presented for negotiation by Massie it was for \$8,470.50. It was claimed that the paper bore every appearance of genuineness but after Massie had received a cashier's check for the amount he disappeared.

## Americans to See Total Eclipse Sun Saturday, Jan. 24

Washington, Jan. 13.—Millions of Americans will see, on Saturday, January 24, something they probably never will see again, a total eclipse of the sun in some places and a partial eclipse over the greater part of the United States. There will not be another in more than a century.

Those who live within a belt 100 miles wide and 5,000 miles long ranging from northern Minnesota across northern Wisconsin and Michigan, the Great Lakes to New York, Long Island, Connecticut and Rhode Island, parts of Pennsylvania, New Jersey and Massachusetts will see the flaming sun blotted out on the morning of the twenty-fourth. Those who live near this path across the country—a path that ends at sunset near the north of Scotland—will see the sun shadowed in part, the extent depending on how near they are to this belt.

In Duluth, Buffalo, New York City, New Haven and many other large cities the eclipse will be total. The partial eclipse will be very large, nearly total, in some of the larger cities including Boston, Providence, Albany, Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington and Chicago. As far south as New Orleans, and as far west as St. Louis and Omaha, the partial eclipse will be large.

Current and gooseberry bushes are chief factors in the spread of blight rust to white pine trees.

## HOUSE QUESTIONS RIGHT OF TURNER TO SEAT IN BODY

### Resolution Authorizes Investigation Alleged Charges; Cooper Presides Over Senate Last Time

Raleigh, Jan. 13.—A committee was appointed at the session of the House today to investigate the eligibility of F. J. Turner, Republican Representative from Mitchell county, for a seat in that body.

Outside this matter the House did very little. After a joint session with the Senate at noon at which the result of the November election was ratified in so far as the state officers are concerned, a resolution was adopted inquiring of Clerks of Superior Court throughout the state as to the condition of their dockets. The body then adjourned.

This information, it is said, is desired in order that the General Assembly might be able to handle intelligently the proposed legislation for increasing the number of Superior Court districts.

In the Senate two bills were introduced, one of which would require automobiles to have both front and license tags and another dealing with the issuance of bonds by the town of Pantego.

The Senate also had before it for consideration today the measure which passed the house last night, providing a new wage scale for legislative clerks and other employees. The measure which would increase the regular salaries of clerks, pages and laborers employed by that body, 25 per cent but do away with the bonus at the end of each session of 50 per cent was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Fees.

Senator Frank W. Lenoir, Jr., announced that on tomorrow he would set a date for a hearing by the Senate Road Committee on the Bus Commission bill providing for supervision by the State Corporation Commission of the automobile transportation business in the state.

The charges in the House against Turner were made on the floor and chief among them was the alleged improper practices on his part charged by W. W. Edwards of Mitchell county, that Turner in 1895 solicited from Edwards a portion of his salary as clerk for influence alleged to have been used by Turner in getting the appointment for Edwards. The matter after some discussion was referred by Speaker Pharr to the Committee on Privileges and Elections.

Raleigh, Jan. 13.—Lieutenant Governor W. R. Cooper presided over the North Carolina Senate this morning for his last time. Just before adjournment was taken for the day he addressed in a few words the body over which he had presided for two regular and two special sessions and announced he would not be able to attend the inaugural exercises here tomorrow.

## Exploration of King Tut's Tomb Will Be Resumed

London, Jan. 13.—Howard Carter, the Egyptologist, has reached an agreement with the Egyptian government under which work will be resumed in the tomb of Tut-Ankh-Amen, the exploration of which Carter took over upon the death of Lord Carnarvon, a dispatch from Cairo this afternoon said.

## Murdered and Robbed On Lonely Road Short Distance of Charlotte

Charlotte, Jan. 13.—The body of A. L. Manney, 50, of Crouse, North Carolina, produce merchant was found today lying near a lonely country road four miles south of Charlotte with a bullet hole in his head. The body had been robbed of all valuables.

Manney is said to have had about \$70 in cash in his pockets beside other valuables. He had been in Charlotte yesterday, according to rural police and had been drinking. Late yesterday he was locked up by city police who released him shortly after midnight.

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### BONDHOLDERS GET THE BENEFIT

"Municipals are selling far closer to taxable bonds today than they ever did in pre-income tax days," says The Bond Buyer editorially in comparing municipal and taxable bond yields. It is a recognized national authority on municipal bonds. Its statements prove that borrowing municipalities do not reap the principal benefit from tax exemption of bonds. The real beneficiaries are wealthy investors liable for surtaxes in the higher brackets. It says editorially:

"Every one concedes that tax exemption has been the principal appeal of State and city bonds to certain individual investors since high surtax rates were imposed. Every municipal bond man has clients who did not know what a municipal bond was until the income tax collector began to take a big share of the year's receipts.

"Municipals for many years fluctuated around 3 1-2 per cent while rails were worth a 4 1-2 per cent basis and industrials yielded 5 1-2 per cent. Today, with municipals on a 4 1-8 per cent basis, the same rails are only a half a point away at about a .65 per cent basis and the industrials yield slightly less than 5 per cent. In other words, the spread has been cut down to less than one-half of what it was back in 1890 and 1900.

"And this in spite of the tax exemption enjoyed by municipals which feature, in theory, should add three-quarters of one per cent to the normal differential assuming the average investor is taxed on an income of only \$30,000.

"Municipals today command, over the best grade rails and industrials, only about one-half the premiums they did 20 years ago. The reasons for this are (1) the tremendous increase, actual and relative, in the issuance

of such bonds and (2) the resultant lowering of their credit rating among investors. As to the tax exemption feature, that has been an important offset to the influence of the two factors just mentioned, but its effect is waning rapidly.

"Were the income tax to be repealed tomorrow, in long run we fail to see any reason why bonds of our states and cities would not continue to sell on a yield basis fully as much below other classes of securities as they do at this time."

Read this again and see how public treasures are losing money simply because a worn out practice is not corrected.

### SOMETHING TO THINK ABOUT

President Coolidge has announced his intention to call a conference of commissioners of revenue of the several states to consider problems presented by the federal and state inheritance, estate or succession taxes. In the United States 46 states now impose such taxes. There is striking lack of uniformity in the laws. Overlapping of taxes, resulting in double and triple taxation, and many problems of tax theory and administration are scheduled for discussion.

An inheritance tax is primarily a tax upon capital as opposed to income and therefore, as taxing authorities are consumers and not producers of wealth, any subtraction from the capital wealth of the nation is a subtraction from the common wealth. In other words the same objections apply as to a capital levy.

Excessive estate taxes discourage accumulation of fortunes and lessen reservoirs of wealth from which spring extensive employment and investments necessary to initiate new enterprises and develop the country. Continuation of high estate taxes would inevitably pare away wealth of a people to point of economic impoverishment.

States are already beginning to relax on drastic inheritance tax laws as they see that such measures strike at the root of productive industry and employment and lessen the permanent taxable assets of a state.

It would be a godsend to our country if every child 16 or 18 years old could have enough steady work to form habits of industry instead of habits of idleness.

Fire protection is everybody's personal problem; not only our obligation to go and help in an actual conflagration, but also to help in preventing fires.

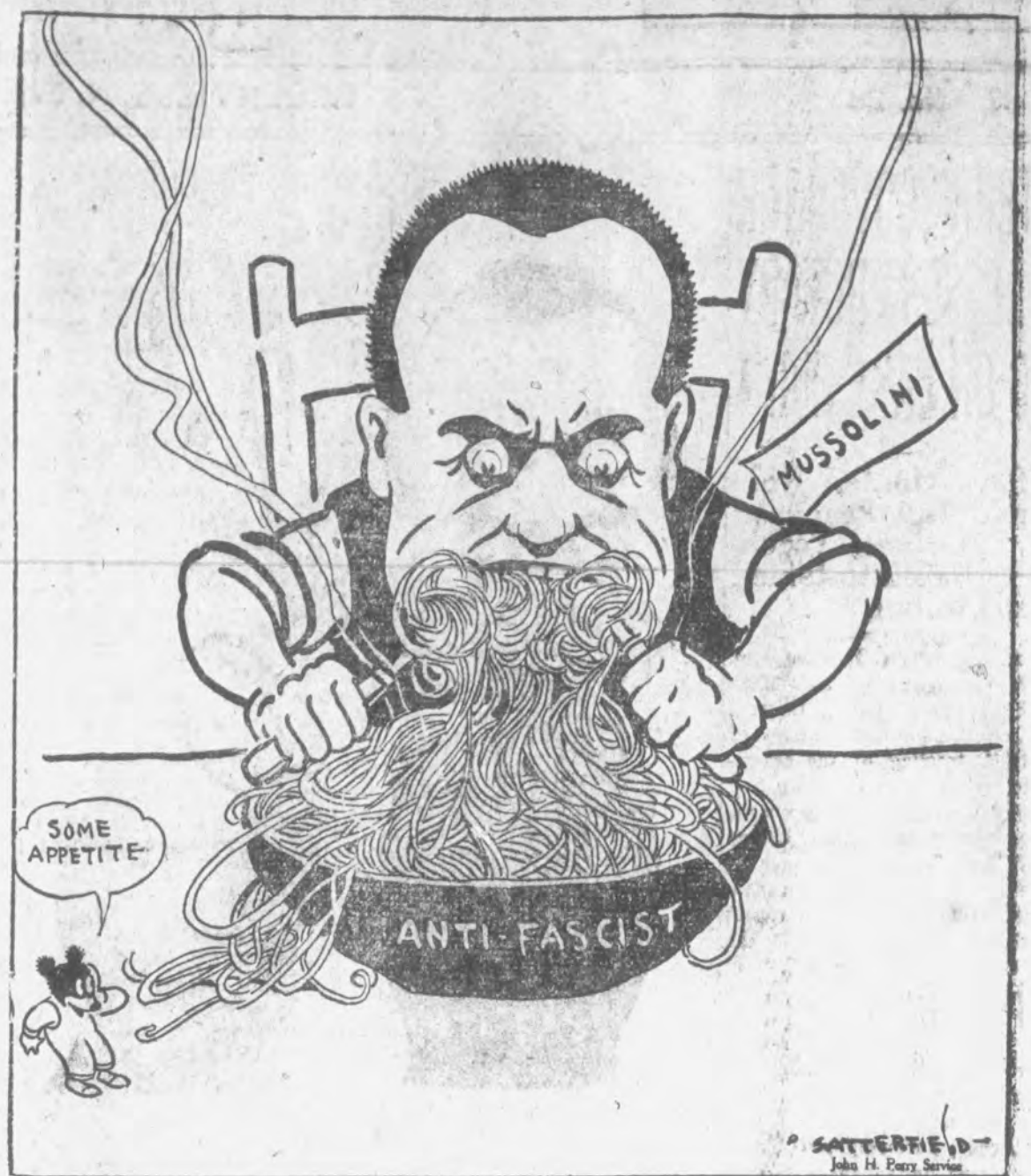

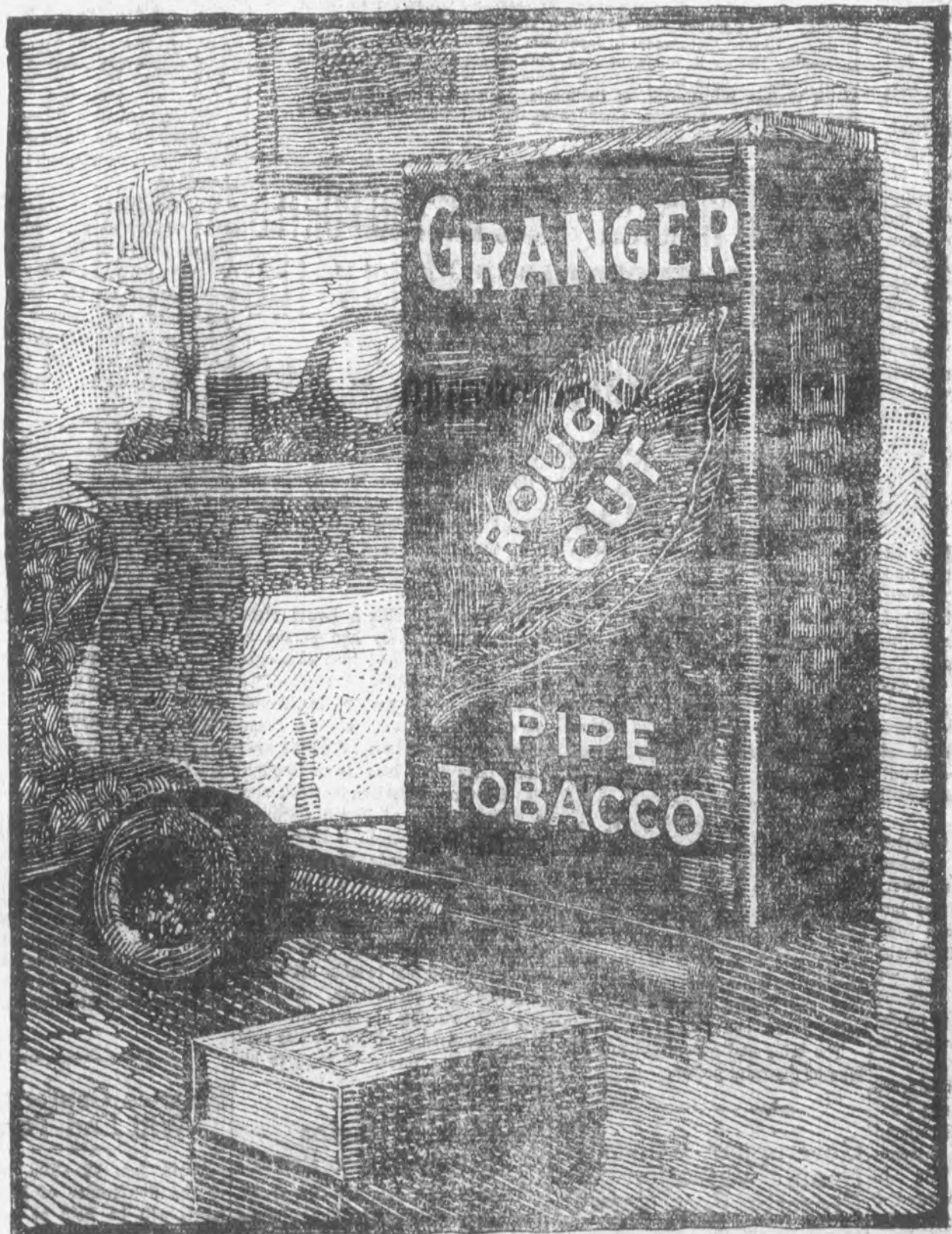
