ANGUS WILTON McLEAN INAUGURATED GOVERNOR NORTH CAROLINA TODAY

Son of Robeson County Takes Oath as Chief Executive in Presence of Record Inaugural Gathering

Raleigh, Jan. 14.—Standing behind a bank of palms and in the presence of more than five thousand North Carolinians who filled the auditorium to capacity, Angus Wilton McLean, of Lumberton, took the oath of office as Governor of North Carolina today at 12:30 o'clock. He was sworn in by Chief Justice W. A. Hoke after having been formally presented by Cameron Morrison, retiring chief executive.

Governor McLean's inauguration followed the formal installation of other state officials elected last November.

While thousands packed the auditorium, hundreds of others stood outside the building being unable to gain admittance on account of the vast crowds inside. Long before the hour for the beginning of the exercise, which was 12 o'clock, the streets leading to the auditorium were swarmed with people all going in the same direction.

This was the beginning of another quadrennium in North Carolina, a shifting of official scenes. The band played "America" as the officials filed down the aisle. Already all seats had been taken and the fight for standing room had begun. There was a demand for passage space for the approaching dignitaries of the state.

A cheer burst forth. North Carolina, that was represented, was welcoming its new chief.

When the minister who offered the invocation, the Reverend J. E. Purcell, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Knoxville, Tenn., formerly of Wilmington and kinsman of Governor McLean, arose he lifted his hand over a sea of bowed heads and invoked the blessings of God on the occasion.

Robeson county was fully represented. The hundreds who came from there last night and this morning by train and through the country, occupied a section in the auditorium within easy hearing distance of the stage.

Senator Johnston, of Robeson county, who had presented the other officers to the Associate Justice who swore them in, presented Governor Morrison who introduced the new executive. As Governor Morrison responded he was greeted by prolonged applause, the audience standing.

The retiring governor in brief words presented the new executive. Facing the Chief Justice, the man, who was, about to assume the obligation of state headship four years, stood, his hand resting on the Holy Bible. Then the Chief Justice repeated the prescribed oath. Angus Wilton McLean kissed the Bible and was Governor of North Carolina.

Another round of applause rang out through the auditorium and Governor McLean delivered his inaugural address.

Raleigh, Jan. 14.—Education, agricultural development and rural betterment, economy in government and taxation were the outstanding topics discussed by Governor McLean, in his inaugural address today. Definite recommendations to General Assembly were reserved for future messages to that body.

"I expect to discuss other subjects of public concern in later messages," said the incoming Governor. "Among the subjects which I have in mind are: The executive budget, administrative reform, the banking laws, the issuance and sale of stocks and other securities, conservation and development, freight rates and water transportation, reform in judicial procedure, the regulation of commercial traffic on the highway regulating the holding of primaries and elections, the treatment of labor, increase of crime, law enforcement, and other measures which may contribute to the sensible and more effective solution of our economic and welfare problems generally."

Throughout his address, Governor McLean stressed economy in government.

SOUTH CAROLINA REJECTS CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT

Columbia, S. C., Jan. 14.—The proposed Twentieth Amendment to the Constitution relative to child labor was rejected by the legislature of South Carolina today. First the Senate and then in a short time the House adopted a resolution refusing to ratify the amendment. In each case the vote was unanimous.

GOVERNOR ARRIVES AHEAD OF SCHEDULE

Governor McLean, Due in Raleigh Today, Arrived Unannounced About Midnight Last Night

Raleigh, Jan. 14.—Angus Wilton McLean arrived in Raleigh rather unexpectedly about midnight last night for his inauguration at noon today as Governor of North Carolina. He was not due to arrive until 11 o'clock this morning. The only explanation for his early arrival was that he "just stole a march on everybody."

The legislative inaugural committee knew nothing of his coming last night but to the surprise of its members he came on ahead of the special train that was to bring him from Lumberton this morning.

"It was very characteristic of him," remarked one person closely acquainted with the new governor.

Mr. McLean's three children accompanied him.

At first it was thought that Mr. McLean's advance arrival would upset plans of the local committee to stage a big military welcome for him at the union station. However, later in the morning General Albert Cox, chairman of the committee, said it would make no difference at all as Mr. McLean had motored to Carey this morning to board the special gubernatorial train at that point.

PSEUDO INSPECTORS ROB ILLINOIS BANK

So Clever Was Masquerade of Robbers That Bank President Helped Them to Count the Cash

Bloomington, Ill., Jan. 14.—Bank robbers, so successfully masqueraded as inspectors that they kept J. F. Kelly, president of the Farmers State Bank of Chenoa, busy helping them count cash and check accounts three hours yesterday until after all bank employees had gone home and then bound and gagged the executive and drove away with \$75,000 in cash and bonds.

A third masquerader gave the sign for the robbery. Dressed as a mechanic he entered the bank to report to the pseudo inspectors that repairs to their automobile had been completed. They then immediately bound Kelly.

The bank president released himself about an hour later and gave the alarm, but no trace of the robbers had been found today.

Murderer of Five Is Electrocuted Today

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 14.—Ben Burdick, convicted slayer of his wife and four others at Bristol, Tenn., November 26, 1922, was electrocuted at dawn today in the Tennessee state prison here.

He went to the chair at 5:50 a. m. and was pronounced dead in six minutes. Burdick faced death calmly and reiterated to the end his declaration of innocence.

Cooper Trial Is Continued Until March Term Court

Wilmington, Jan. 14.—The trial of Thomas E. Cooper, former president of the Liberty Savings Bank, on charges growing out of the failure of the bank, was continued today in Superior Court here until the March term. He was to have faced trial on two felony and four misdemeanor charges.

Cooper's attorneys pleaded that they had not had sufficient time to prepare their case.

AMERICANS GAINED 11TH HOUR VICTORY IN FINANCE CONFAB

Cause Limiting America's Claim to \$350,000,000 Eliminated From Text of Agreement

Paris, Jan. 14.—Preeceded by an eleventh hour victory for the American delegation the Inter-Allied Finance Conference closed today with the signing of the agreement as to distribution among the various powers of reparations annuities received from Germany under the Dawes plan.

At almost the last moment the Americans obtained the elimination from the text of the clause limiting to \$350,000,000 the amount of America's war damage claim to be paid from the Dawes receipts. As the revised text stands the United States will receive its tow and one quarter per cent of the annuities until here entire claim is paid.

The agreement as signed constitutes a mass of details, gathers up the scattered ends of the accounts among the Allies, liquidates the Ruhr occupation, limits future outlay for military occupation of the Rhineland and fixes the running expenses of the reparations commission as well as attend to various details among the governments participating.

Paris, Jan. 14.—All the powers represented in the Inter-Allied Finance Conference today signed the agreement regarding distribution of the Dawes plan annuities.

Romania and Italy signed with reservations.

Limitation of the American war damage claims to \$350,000,000 was stricken out. This was the only change made in the text of the agreement before affixing the signatures.

U. N. C. Glee Club Presents Splendid Program E.C.T.C

Before a large and appreciative audience in the auditorium of the East Carolina Teachers College, the University of North Carolina Glee Club with Jerome Swinford, Baritone, as Guest Artist, gave Tuesday evening, the first program of its winter trip.

The club deserves unstinted praise for the new departure it has made in Glee Club work. Every number was a classic and was musically worth while. Nothing except music of the highest class was offered, and the reception given these members by the audience should have satisfied the most exacting of performers.

The program was of excellent finish and good balance, was of wide variety, and was marked by intelligent interpretation.

The voices of the club are remarkably good and their stage presence striking.

The singers show an ease and natural dignity that is very pleasing in effect. Beautiful pianissimos, good ensemble, unity, uniform attacks and releases, together with fine tone quality and rhythm were outstanding features of the artistically rendered program.

Mr. Swinford, Baritone Soloist, is unqualifiably good. He has even legato, clear enunciation, good control, a fine voice of wide range and good stage presence. He was at his best in "The Wreck of the Julie Plant," by O'Hara and "A Plainsman's Song," by Bliss.

Mr. Fitch, tenor soloist, sang his way straight to the hearts of his audience in his first number, "Summer Evening," a Finnish folk song arranged by Palmgren. It was a gem. Mr. Fitch is the possessor of a beautiful, mellow, flexible voice.

"Wait Till I Put On My Crown," Reddick's arrangement, "Ma Fitch Banjo," Richmond, by the club were popular favorites. "Nicerone Nidous," Allegri, was also a favorite.

It was an uplifting and inspiring program, and too much praise can be given Mr. Weaver, the director. The evident training the men have had, the choice of numbers for the program, and Mr. Weaver's quiet and unobtrusive manner, and the ease with which he directs his men makes him an artist.

He is doing a great piece of musical work when he presents such a program. East Carolina Teachers College considers herself fortunate in having heard this organization.

CARTER-COBB GARAGE IS DESTROYED BY FIRE IN EARLY MORNING HOURS

Total Loss and Damage May Exceed \$75,000; Approximately 60 Automobiles Burned Up

Fire, early this morning completely destroyed the Hines building on Fifth street, occupied by the Carter-Cobb Motor Company, the entire stock and equipment of the automobile concern together with about sixty automobiles being a total loss. The total loss and damage was estimated this morning to exceed \$75,000 and was only partially covered by insurance.

Of the number of automobiles destroyed several were new cars for sale by the motor concern, many were those of Greenville people who had placed them in the garage for repairs and many belonged to traveling salesmen who had stored them for the night.

The fire, which was discovered about six o'clock gained rapid headway and within a few minutes the entire structure was ablaze and the flames leaped out toward adjacent buildings.

Following the arrival of firemen in answer to the first alarm a second alarm was turned in followed within a few minutes by a general alarm as the flames threatened to envelope the entire block. Aided by high pressure made possible by the engine pumps the firemen fought with determination and two hours later their efforts to prevent the spread of the fire had been successful, blaze being confined to the building in which it originated. Only slight damage was done to nearby buildings.

The building destroyed was the property of the Coca-Cola Bottling Company and Mr. James M. Hines of this city, while Messrs. E. V. Carter and C. H. Cobb were proprietors of the Carter-Cobb Motor Company.

It was estimated that pending completion of new quarters here cars for delivery would be obtained from the Kinston branch of his firm and that operations of their garage here would be resumed as soon as possible.

Boston—Arizona cotton pnyma No. 2 unchanged at sixty cents pound. Shanghai—About 75 per cent of arrivals of Tungchow cotton is being sought by Jap mills. Lamera, Tex.—Dry all over entire plains section. Slim prospects for next year's crop. Exports from Houston 15,000, making 20,000 so far vs. 7,000 from all last year. Kingsville, Southwest Texas.—Some rain here but not enough new crop preparations backward. Liverpool (By Mail).—We do not consider the crop at around 13 half millions a bearish feature, as we think the world's consumption will be greater this year than in any year since the boom. The basis on good staple cotton remains steady and owing to the apparent scarcity of this quality, is likely to continue so. High grade shorts are plentiful and the basis here is easy. On the whole we take a very optimistic view of business prospects in the new year as far as the merchant is concerned the premium on forward months is helping considerably. Export markets are gradually reopening for spinners, and we may soon see a return to pre-war conditions of our exports far in excess of our imports.

GRAIN

The move uneasy in the wheat trade last night were said to be those who have higher prices but had none bought. The leading interests were more confident of their position and regarded everything shaping in favor of their interests. It is the belief of a few larger operators that the U. S. wheat crop has been over estimated, as the high prices not selling out in volume they say the farmers have marketed their wheat more closely than usual. Corn is coming for more attention from speculators and a more friendly attitude toward the buying side was noted.

He was loyal to his friends and a sociable, quick to recognize a fault within himself; slow to speak of the faults of others; quick to recognize virtue in his fellow-man; generous to a fault in forgiving others.

Many of his virtues were hid to many by reason of a rather brusque manner that was natural to him, not cultivated. No one doubted this more, than he, for at heart he was lovable and craved the love and esteem of his fellow-men.

To us, who at such times as these are wont to estimate and pass judgment on the life, of our fallen companions, the following lines from the very human poet Robert Burns are worthy of our attention:

"Who mads the heart, 'tis He alone
Decidedly can try us;
He knows each chord, its various
tone,
Each spring, its various bias;
Then at the balance let's be mute;
We never can adjust it;
What's done we partly can compute.
But know not what's resisted."

Angu Milton McLean Inaugurated Governor North Carolina Today

(Continued from page 1)
ment. He brought this principle into play in dealing with every subject touched upon.
The speaker committed himself unqualified to the cause of education. It was the first topic which he definitely discussed. He linked it with agricultural improvement and rural betterment, declaring: "If I should be asked to say what I found to be the outstanding needs in North Carolina, as I visualized them during my travels covering some forty thousand miles, in ninety-eight counties in the past twelve months, I would unhesitatingly reply: Agricultural improvement and rural betterment, declaring: 'If I be asked to suggest what I considered the prime remedy for supplying this need I would say: More education, both academic and vocational. When I refer to vocational education in this connection I mean training in scientific and practical agriculture.'"
Further, he made an urgent plea for continued equalization of school facilities among rural children. "I hope the day will soon come," he said, "when every boy and girl in the most remote rural sections of the state will have the opportunity for at least a high school education. We must constantly strive to reach this goal."

During his discussion of economy in government, Governor McLean declared that sound economic principle, should be applied to government as well as to private business. He urged a policy that will call for the greatest service at a minimum cost. "The ultimate goal for which we should constantly strive," he asserted, "is to see that the government is administered wisely, honestly, efficiently and economically."
The debt of the state and its subdivisions, individually and collectively, was discussed by the new governor at some length. He declared that it is time to call a halt, to take stock. The total debt of the state and all its subdivisions, he pointed out, is now more than three hundred million dollars. "If taxes are too heavy," he warned, "the efficiency of government is destroyed." He continued: "Public service becomes first a handicap and then an intolerable burden. Confidence is weakened and co-operation made impossible. The wise traveler, he declared, rests a while at the wayside inn before continuing his journey. Let us follow this example by resting for a little while on our journey for the purpose of refreshing ourselves and starting again with a fresh impulse and renewed strength in the form of increased wealth and tax paying power, in order that we may reach the end of the journey in safety."

Governor McLean was unstinted in his praise of what the state has done in the construction of highways. He said: "It is plain he does not want the state highway crippled. But he was not ready at this time to make definite recommendations as to the further financing of the state highway system. He reviewed several proposed plans and ventured the assertion that under whatever future money-raising plan the state adopts, highways will be taken into full consideration.
During the course of his inaugural address, Governor McLean declared: "I am opposed to levying any tax for state purposes upon real estate or personal property. It must be apparent to every thinking man that real estate, especially farm lands, is already bearing a heavy burden in many counties, a burden none the less heavy because incurred for local taxation and local schools."
Governor McLean declared that institutions for the unfortunate and defective must not be crippled.
He urged the Legislature to make a survey of the present system of local taxation and to enact general legislation looking toward the elimination of any inequalities that may exist.
"It is my earnest desire," said Governor McLean, "to give to the state an efficient business administration. But let me tell you what I think is the business of government and what I mean by business administration." He then mentioned some of the principles of economy he had in mind. "There are to be sure, two kinds of economy," he said, "one of present day profits and limitless use of the state's resources, including the taxing power, which I should call false and disastrous, and an economy of husbanding our resources to the end that they may gradually reach their fullest development. I favor the latter form of economy, because I believe it is wise and durable."
Concluding his address, the new executive declared:
"I shall try always to remember that the real greatness of any commonwealth, like that of any individual, rest upon two inherent forces, the one material, the other spiritual, a member in the house of representatives. But I do not want to forget nor do I want you to forget, nor do I want you to let me forget, that the greatest of these is spiritual."

History of Bath Oldest City in North Carolina

Bath, Jan. 13. — Bath or Bath Town is the oldest city in the state of North Carolina, having been established in 1695 and formally incorporated, or as it was called at that time, "boroughed," in 1705.
In 1711 a missionary who had returned to England after visiting Carolina, reported to the head of his church that the town of Bath had about 12 houses. Though the oldest town in the state, it has made little progress in commercially or otherwise and the population now is estimated at "approximately 250."
According to records in the State Historical Commission office, there are 38 towns in the United States that are named Bath, but Bath, or Bath Town, North Carolina is the oldest of this group of so named cities. The town is located on the Pamlico river and took its name from the well-known port of Bath, England.
History seems to surround the county of Bath more than it does the town of Bath. The county being one of the earliest provinces established in this territory under the rule of the Lords and proprietors, who were granted the land by the then reigning king of England. The county has since been divided into many counties and finally the name of Bath county was changed and Bath County is remembered only as the "Grandmother of numbers of other counties."

Despite its apparent lack of importance Bath Town has been called to the public eye every now and then since its founding.
Recently this town was the center of a large celebration in which the highest officials of the Episcopal Church and as well as many of those in public life participated with hundreds of the folk of the public as witnesses. This was on June 19, 1924 when the North Carolina Historical Commission dedicated a marker at the St. Thomas Episcopal Church of Bath, the oldest church in the entire state. It was founded in 1734, more than 190 years ago.
The inhabitants of this town are considered among the most lovable and perfect living people in the country. They make no pretensions at growth and appear to have no desire to make anything of their Town of Bath other than just what it has been for the past century. "It is like going into another world to go to Bath," say those persons who have visited the town, for there the people adhere to the old customs of years ago and maintain the curfew bell law, live simply, do practically all of their own work, and are most gallant and cordial in their speech and salutations. They are also very religious and their church services and its work are among the most enjoyable of activities.

They live upon tradition and still look with pride upon the "Marie House" (a government house) that was erected there in 1734 by a French architect, Monsieur Coutanche.
The people of this little town did not get their individuality by mere chance. It is an inherent quality which their forefathers possessed or made themselves possess by development and opposition to the oppression of the lords and proprietors who had charge of the territory in the early days under the land grant system of the king.
These oppositions followed the victory that the inhabitants had won over the Indians which was a great terror of that entire territory adjacent to the Albemarle Sound and Pamlico river and other northeastern counties. Many white lives were lost in these engagements with the Indians before the white man finally became master of the country.
In 1724 an order from the Council was issued calling for a laying off of the land in Bath County at three shillings "quit rent" for the one hundred acres and requiring all who purchased under this rule, to settle the land within two years.
That very same year a report came from the Town of Bath that the land conditions were very bad and explaining that the land office in that town had been closed for several months and that the lords and proprietors had forbade the Governor to issue land grants to anyone for less than twenty pounds of sterling for each 1,000 acres.
The king finally bought Carolina from the lords and proprietors in 1728 and conditions began to improve. But after a brief period, it had little effect upon the growth of the town of Bath.
Governor Burrington made a statement that the town of Bath had made little progress and that the law required that a town have at least 60 houses before it could have

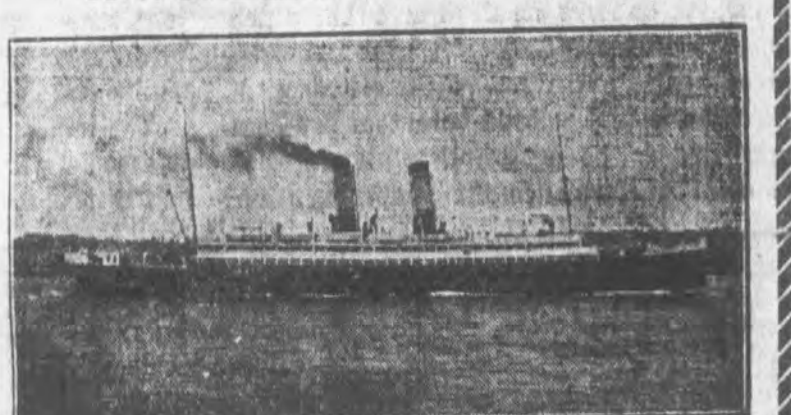

So far as the average citizen is concerned the job of the volunteer fireman is a thankless one, yet he risks his all to save that which belongs to others and receives as recompense, seldom praise and often unjust criticism.

Both white and colored volunteer fire companies are to be congratulated upon their wonderful performance this morning and

every citizen of Greenville should be proud to boast of such organizations.

TEACHERS' SALARIES

We usually get what we pay for, whether we buy teaching services or potatoes. For either article, even when there is a large supply, a fair price has to be paid for superior goods.

We want teachers of superior innate ability, trained, cultured, traveled, full of initiative and self-respect, with a broad outlook and understanding of life so that they may interpret life correctly for our boys and girls, says Margaret M. Altucker in The Journal of the N. E. A. We can have such teachers when we are willing to pay for them. We will pay the necessary price only when we understand the value of the teacher's service to individual and community life—when we appreciate the worth of the teacher.

When we buy teaching services, to a large extent, we buy our children's outlook on life. The teacher who is trained civic affairs gives more to her pupils than is contained in the civics textbook. The teacher who reads the best professional books and magazines brings to her classroom invaluable teaching helps so that her pupils learn more in less time. The teacher who has a standard of living which permits her to live in comfortable quarters brings to her classroom vigor, enthusiasm, self-respect, and initiative. To succeed, the teacher must have the respect of the community; and it is a part of human nature not to respect that which is purchased too cheaply.

Professional training, travel, books, and magazines, a standard of living conducive to physical and mental efficiency require money. Teachers possess these only when they are paid adequate salaries. Teachers, when dissatisfied, can shift to other lines of work, but the law compels children to stay in school. The welfare of boys and girls should be the motive for increasing teachers' salaries.

The important point is this: Our children and society are the losers when teachers are poorly prepared for their work.

Plans Under Way Make Catawba College Grade A College

Salisbury, N. C. Jan. 12—Plans are under way now to make Catawba College located here a grade A college when it opens its doors here next September. A local committee headed by H. A. Rouzer, has just been appointed to conduct the drive in this city and the surrounding counties to raise \$250,000 and other committees are seeking enough money elsewhere to increase the endowment fund to the size required by the Southern Association of Colleges to be classes as a grade A college.

The plant of the school situated on the Mocksville road, is said to be worth approximately \$400,000. The officials

state that with the \$200,000 that Dr. Elmore Rhodes Noke, president of the college is raising in the northern states the \$250,000 expected to be raised in the counties surrounding the school, and the \$150,000 already donated to the institution by the Reform Church of which denomination the school is a part, that the endowment fund will be sufficiently largely for the grade A rating and that it expects that the school will open next September as full as accredited grade A college.

According to the president the school will carry the A. B. and B. S. courses and will have one of the best facilities in the state. He also expressed the opinion that students should not specialize in any subject until they had received a general training and said that for that reason he had recommended that only the general course be included in the curriculum of the institution when it first opened.

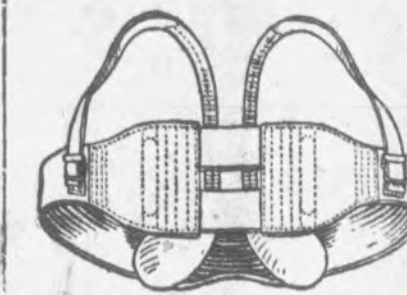
