GOVERNOR McLEAN TAKES UP OFFICIAL DUTIES AT CAPITOL

State Offices Present Scene of Much Activity as Many Changes Are Put Into Effect Today

Raleigh, Jan. 15.—Governor Angus W. McLean today entered upon the first official duties of the position of chief executive of the state. Arriving at the capitol early this morning, the new head of the state government plunged into the detail work awaiting his attention.

He expected to begin at once formulating his first message to the legislature, in which he is expected to define the policies that will govern throughout his administration. It is expected that he will address the legislature probably next week.

Charles H. England, of Greensboro, was on hand to fill the position of private secretary to the governor. Miss Mamie Turner, who for several years has been pardon clerk of the governor's staff also was at the capitol. Governor McLean having appointed her to serve in that capacity during his administration.

A new executive secretary to succeed Miss Margaret Willis who returns to Charlotte as private secretary to former Governor Morrison, had not been announced today but it is expected Governor McLean will make an appointment in the near future.

Roach Farrar, janitor and messenger of the executive staff during many years was performing his same duties today, having been re-appointed by the governor. In other offices of the capitol where new heads were taking over the work there was much activity. M. L. Shipman, retiring commissioner of Labor and Printing, was showing Frank D. Grist, his successor, "the ropes."

Dennis G. Brummitt was being initiated into the duties of Attorney General by retiring Attorney General James S. Manning and Assistant Attorney General Frank Nash, who served under Manning and will continue as assistant to Brummitt.

Governor McLean for the present will not occupy the Mansion but will maintain a suite at the Sir Walter hotel probably until Mrs. McLean recovers sufficiently from her illness to take charge of the Mansion.

N. C. Anti-Saloon League to Meet in Raleigh Jan. 22-23

Raleigh, Jan. 15.—The North Carolina Anti-Saloon League will hold its annual convention in this city on Thursday and Friday, January 22 and 23, according to an announcement made by R. L. Davis, superintendent of the league. Mr. Davis has mailed out notices of the meeting to all ministers in the state and expects a large attendance at the convention.

The sessions of the convention will be held in the Tabernacle Baptist church, the first session to be held January 22 at 2 p. m. The convention will come to a close Friday afternoon.

The program committee is busily engaged in completing details of the meeting. Among the speakers slated for Thursday afternoon are Mayor E. E. Culbreth of this city, Joseph Daniels, Mrs. Charles G. Doak, A. B. Coltrane, Federal Prohibition Officer, R. W. A. Stanbury and A. F. Evans. Dr. J. M. Templeton, of the State Board of Health, is also slated for an address. Senators Simmons and Overman, Democrats, North Carolina, presented the name of A. J. Maxwell, member of the Corporation Commission of North Carolina.

Senators Underwood and Heflin, of Alabama, and members of the House delegation of that state, asked the president to appoint M. M. Caskey, of Montgomery, a rate expert now connected with a shipping organization.

The president took under consideration the two recommendations without disclosing his intentions with respect to filling the vacancy.

ENGLAND RENEWS FORMER PROPOSAL SETTLE WAR DEBTS

Will Require of Her Allies Only Enough to Meet Payment on Her Debts to America

Paris, Jan. 15.—Official renewal of the proposal to settle the inter-allied debt contained in the Balfour note of 1922 is made by the British Cabinet in the reply Winston Churchill, Chancellor of Exchequer, has given a recent letter Finance Minister Clementel on that subject. The British Cabinet thus only proposes to demand from its allies the amount by which Great Britain's payments to the United States for her debt exceeds the amount received from Germany. The Churchill letter says negotiations necessary between the two governments should be in the same spirit of comradeship that united them during the war.

HOUSE AGAIN TAKES UP FIGHT ON MUSCLE SHOALS QUESTION

After Four Years' Discussions Problem of Disposition of Property Comes Back to Starting Point

Washington, Jan. 15.—The Muscle Shoals problem came back to the House today where the four years old fight over the disposition of the property started.

It was returned by the Senate in the form of the Underwood private leasing bill adopted as a substitute for the House measure providing for lease of the property to Henry Ford.

When the bill reached the House at the opening of the session it was held on the speaker's table pending the reaching of an agreement as to whether it should be sent to a conference or back to the Military Committee which many months ago reported the bill authorizing acceptance of Henry Ford's bid for the Muscle Shoals property.

Cross Word Puzzles Absorbing Spare Time Legislature's Pages

Raleigh, Jan. 15.—Cross word puzzles are absorbing most of the spare time of the Legislature's pages especially those in the senate.

What's this and what's that in three, four or seven letters beginning with "x" and ending in "it," the pages are continually asking while they are off duty. This is particularly true in the Senate chamber before that house has convened in the morning.

Investigation among the young messengers brought to light the reason for the lively interest in the day's most absorbing fad. That reason is a daily prize of 25 cents offered by Senator E. R. McKeithan, of Cumberland county, to the first page to hand him each morning the correct solution of the cross word puzzle carried in the morning paper.

The youngsters, some of them not more than 10 years old, have become adept at the game and frequently Mr. McKeithan is besieged by several of them at the same time all of whom have worked out the morning's "brain twister" long before he appeared in the Senate chamber for the day's session.

Price of Gasoline Goes Up Two Cents

SLEMP TO GIVE UP JOB AS SECRETARY TO THE PRESIDENT

Congressman Sanders, of Indiana, Becomes Secretary to Chief Executive After March 4

Washington, Jan. 15.—C. Bascom Slemph will retire March 4 as secretary to President Coolidge and will be succeeded by Representative Everett Sanders, of Indiana.

The decision of Mr. Slemph, who has been secretary to Mr. Coolidge since he entered the White House, became known today after he returned from a trip to New York.

Representative Sanders will retire from the House on March 4 not having been a candidate for re-election. He was director of the Republican National Committee's speakers' bureau during the campaign and is a member of the House Steering Committee.

Mr. Slemph's decision to retire was due to several factors including his desire to return to the direction of his extensive business interests. It had been the intention of Mr. Sanders to return to the practice of law in Indiana but he was prevailed upon to accept the post by President Coolidge.

In the successor to Slemph the president will have as a secretary a man similarly equipped with knowledge of Congressional matters as Sanders is rounding out eight years as a member of the House. He will be 43 years old on March 8.

Several Cases Given Hearing in Tuesday's Wednesday's Court

Granting of divorces again featured Tuesday and Wednesday's sessions of Superior Court for the trial of civil cases. Several judgments were also rendered.

In the case of Beulah Spencer, colored, woman of Farmville, asking for the custody of her child, Lorene Spencer, the court rendered judgment in favor of John Sander, and wife who have cared for the child since infancy. According to facts brought out in the hearing, Beulah Spencer gave her child to her uncle, and aunt who cared for her during her infancy providing for her a good home. After all evidence was in, judgment was rendered in favor of the Sanders with the mother being given permission to visit the child.

The following divorces were granted: Richard Evans vs. Georgia Annan Evans; Louis Vines vs. Benjie Vines; Charlie Price vs. Lucy Price; Allen Smith vs. Jennie Smith. The case of State and Dora Chaney vs. John Tripp, resulted in non suit.

The case R. Wingate, and son vs. J. B. Stocks, having been compromised, was dismissed with the administrator W. L. Stocks being required to pay costs.

James Elliott Smith vs. R. D. Harrington resulted in non suit and action against plaintiff dismissed. Plaintiff taxed with cost.

High Point May Not Have Baseball During '15 Season

High Point, Jan. 15.—Unless the subscribers to the \$1,500 guarantee fund, which was posted with the president of the Piedmont League on January 1, pay their pledges immediately, there will be no baseball in High Point during 1925, according to an announcement that has been made by J. Harvey Burgess, president of the club.

In an official statement Mr. Burgess said that \$800 of the guarantee fund had been paid by the subscribers and that \$700 is now due. "If I have to pay this \$700 out of my pocket I will move the franchise elsewhere," said Mr. Burgess.

Goldboro, it is understood, is making a bid for the franchise. Three citizens of that city state that they have \$5,000 in cash to offer for the franchise, but President Burgess is withholding his answer, pending the action of the delinquent subscribers of the fund.

LEADER TAMMANY HALL DIES TODAY IN NEW YORK HOSPITAL

Thomas F. Foley, Known as "Al Smith's Political Grandfather" Was Long Time Power in Tamany

New York, Jan. 15.—Thomas F. Foley, veteran Tammany Hall leader and one of the political sponsors of Governor Al Smith, died at the Rockefeller Institute today of pneumonia.

Death came as a surprise for announcement yesterday said that he was, on the road to recovery.

The governor came here from Albany last week when he learned that his old friend was ill but he returned to the capital this week announcing that "we pulled through."

Foley was born in Brooklyn in 1851 and has long been a power in Tammany Hall. He was usually referred to as "Al Smith's political grandfather" as it was he who started the unknown East Side boy on the road that eventually led to the governor's chair.

Campaign to Raise \$150,000 Catawba College Be Launched

Saltbury, Jan. 15.—A campaign to raise \$150,000 for Catawba College will be launched in Rowan county early in February, according to J. York Peeler, County Chairman. This amount has been deemed necessary by the trustees of the college in order that the institution may resume its sessions in the fall.

An organization of more than one hundred and fifty workers is being perfected for the purpose of carrying out the plans of the campaign, and the county chairman feels sure that the campaign will be a success. Should the endowment of \$150,000 be raised it is planned to make Catawba College a standard institution, its graduates to receive diplomas that will receive full recognition by any other college or university in the nation. Should the endowment not be raised the college will not be re-opened, it is said.

High Point, Jan. 15.—A joint meeting of the Guilford College, Clubs of Greensboro, High Point and Winston-Salem will be held at Guilford during the second week in February. Committee chairman have been appointed as follows: Reception committee, R. J. M. Hobbs; arrangements committee, Miss Emma King; publicity committee, Dr. Edward G. Perisho. The presidents of the three club will compose the publicity committee.

Washington, Jan. 15.—A bill to make prison sentences mandatory upon conviction for violation of the prohibition laws was reported today by the House Judiciary Committee.

CONDITION TREAS. B.R. LACY REPORTED AS MUCH IMPROVED

Veteran State Treasurer Returns to Raleigh Today; Legislature Will Validate Unsigned Bonds

Raleigh, Jan. 15.—The condition of Benjamin R. Lacy, veteran treasurer of North Carolina was said this morning to be considerably improved. Mr. Lacy arrived here on an early train today from New York where he was stricken with pulmonary congestion while attending to business for the state.

It was said at Mr. Lacy's home today that he would probably rest up for a few days before resuming his office duties. The date on which he will take the oath of office of treasurer for the next four years depends upon the time he returns to his duties.

C. B. Maesslich, New York counsel of the State of North Carolina, who accompanied Mr. Lacy from New York, conferred today with state officials relative to the situation created by the change of governors before Mr. Lacy completed the signing of the bond issue of \$15,000,000 for roads. Approximately 25 per cent of the issue is undersigned and it was said it probably would be necessary to pass a special act of legislation to validate the issue, with former Governor Morrison's signature as Mr. Lacy was unable to complete the signing during Morrison's administration.

WITNESS DECLARES HE PAID \$65,000 QUART OF WHISKEY

President of Stock Selling Organization Says Means Took Money and Didn't Shield Them

New York, Jan. 15.—A bottle of "Post-Volstead" Whiskey was all that he and his associates got for \$65,000 which they were led to believe was to have been used for bribing government officials, Samuel F. Safir, former president of the Crager System, a stock selling organization, testified in Federal Court today at the trial of Gaston B. Means, former Department of Justice agent, on charges of conspiracy to obstruct justice.

Safir and other witnesses testified they had been induced to pay Means \$65,000 on representations that he would use it to bribe the then Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty and others to prevent their prosecution. Means, it was testified, sent Safir and his friends to the law offices of Thomas B. Felder, his attorney, where the \$65,000 was paid over.

"Means called on us at our hotel that night," Safir testified. "He brought a bottle of whiskey, cracked a few jokes, helped us drink the liquor and went away. That was all we ever got for the \$65,000. We went on trial a few days later and most of us were convicted."

Gibbons Asks \$75,000 To Fight Luis Firpo

New York, Jan. 15.—Tommy Gibbons, St. Paul boxer, today demanded a flat guarantee of not less than \$75,000 with an additional \$3,000 for traveling expenses to box Luis Angel Firpo under the auspices of the National Sporting Club in London.

NOTED SCULPTOR SPEAKS GENERAL ASSEMBLY TODAY

Address of Gutzon Borglum, Sculptor Stone Mountain Memorial is Feature of Today's Session

Raleigh, Jan. 15.—Gutzon Borglum, noted sculptor, addressed the General Assembly of North Carolina today at noon in response to a resolution adopted by both houses at the opening of today's sessions. Mr. Borglum's address furnished the outstanding feature of today's brief sessions in both houses and after the joint session when he spoke the General Assembly adjourned until tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock.

In the House Representative Pool, created a mild sensation when he dropped a bill into the hopper immediately following the opening of the morning session, which provides for a reduction in the salaries of judicial circuit solicitors from \$4,500 to \$4,000 and their traveling allowance from \$700 to \$500.

Four former Speakers of the House were present this morning and were extended the courtesies of the chamber. They were John G. Dawson, Kinston, now Democratic State Chairman; Harvey P. Grier, Statesville; Dennis G. Brummitt, Oxford, now Attorney General; and S. M. Gattis, of Hillsboro.

In the Senate the session was perfunctory and lasted but a few minutes. After receiving and adopting the House resolution inviting Borglum to address the session at noon, three local bills were introduced.

Inclement Weather Has Effect Upon the Employment in State

Raleigh, Jan. 15.—The inclement weather had its effect upon the employment conditions throughout the state during the week ended Saturday, January 10, but the conditions vary in the different sections, according to the weekly report of the State-Federal Employment Service issued here today.

While the weather has held down the calls for both common and skilled labor the condition is fair throughout the state with a demand for domestic help, nearly every branch office of the service reporting many calls for domestic help.

Prospects for an improvement in the general employment situation, and especially in the building lines, with the clearing up of the weather are said by the compiled report to be good.

A total of 570 persons, 419 men and 151 women, were placed by the service in the state during the past week, it is shown. There were 761 registrations of which 553 were men and 208 women with the request, for help numbered 473 and 179, men and women respectively, or a total of 652. The service referred 455 men and 171 women, a total of 626.

Asheville reported conditions well balanced and prospects for big demand for common labor with the coming of clear weather.

Charlotte had a surplus of skilled labor and clerical workers but the common labor is well balanced.

In Wilmington all line, were slow except common labor which was put in demand with the opening of a fertilizer factory during the week. Raleigh and Greensboro both had demands for domestics.

Winston-Salem had a falling off in the demand for common labor due to the bad weather with the skilled labor conditions improving over the previous week. There was a heavy demand for good domestic help.

Placements were classified as follows: Skilled, 87; unskilled, 315; clerical and professional 33; industrial 4; and domestic, 4. City placements were Asheville 126; Charlotte, 90; Greensboro, 103; Raleigh, 66; Wilmington, 116; Winston-Salem 69.

EUROPEAN 'CHANGE' GETTING TO NORMAL UNDER DAWES PLAN

New York. — The marked improvement in foreign exchange this year was generally construed by bankers as a reflection of the progress made in the economic rehabilitation of Europe through the adoption of the Dawes plan.

Three European currencies, Swedish crowns, Swiss francs and Dutch guilders, returned to parity, and were occasionally quoted at a small premium. The Canadian dollar also was quoted at a premium for the first time since 1922.

Sterling exchange, which had been quoted as low as \$4.24 1/2 last January, rose above \$4.70 this month to within a couple of cents of the peak price established in the winter 1922-23, which was the nearest approach to parity since the war. The final stage of this advance, coming at a time when the normal course of exchange is downward, due to unusually heavy grain and cotton shipments represented the return of British capital, which had migrated to America when the labor government came into power in England through fear of adverse legislation on moneyed capital and during the numerous crises that developed over the reparations problem, prior to the adoption of the Dawes report. Shifting of funds from New York to London to take advantage of the higher interest rates in the British capital also was a factor in the advance.

French exchange, which touched 3.42 cents in March, the lowest price in recent history, rallied to 6.55 cents in the next six weeks, following the announcement that J. P. Morgan & Co. had placed a credit of \$100,000,000 at the disposal of the Bank of France in order to permit it to combat the offensive against the franc, which had been launched by speculative interests, taking advantage of France's vulnerable financial position. So rapid was the advance in this currency that the Bank of France found it necessary to sell francs and go short of its own currency in order to prevent the disruption of French export business. Towards the close of the year the rate seemed established between 5.14 and 5.12 cents.

The only important new coin to make its appearance in international trading was the Polish zloty, quoted around 19.15 cents. Germany has adopted a new coin known as the reichsmark for domestic purposes, and local dealers continued to quote the old paper marks, which were stabilized at 23.45 cents a trillion, although there was little actual business in that currency, the bulk of the business with Germany being done in dollars, sterling, Swiss francs or the Scandinavian currencies.

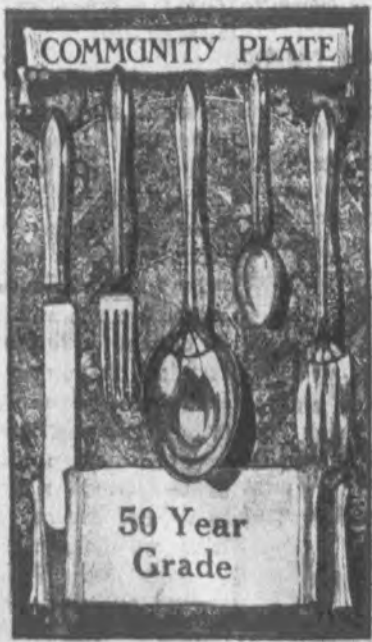

Employment Situation Held Up Well During Month of December

Raleigh, Jan. —Despite the help-up in the employment of workers throughout the state during the holidays, the employment situation held up well during the month of December, according to the monthly report of the State-Federal Employment Service for that month made public here today.

There was a dropping off in the number of placements made during the last two weeks of the month but the high averages made during the first two weeks of December held the last month of the year well up in the high average months of the twelve month period.

Total placements for the month ending December 31, 1924 numbered 2,037 of which 1,969 were men and 668 were women, the report shows.

The greatest number of one class placements was in the unskilled labor which totaled 1,546 persons put to work while domestic help was second with 571 and skilled labor third 359. Clerical followed with 149 and industrial with 22.

Asheville led the cities in number of placements with 591 all told and Wilmington was second with 546 placements and Charlotte came third with 430. The others in order were Greensboro 375, Winston-Salem, 373 and Raleigh, 322.

While the first week of the new year was comparatively slow in the placement of workers of all kinds throughout the state, the various branch offices look for an early pick-up in the situation and especially in the unskilled labor class, which will be greatly prompted by good weather, the report.

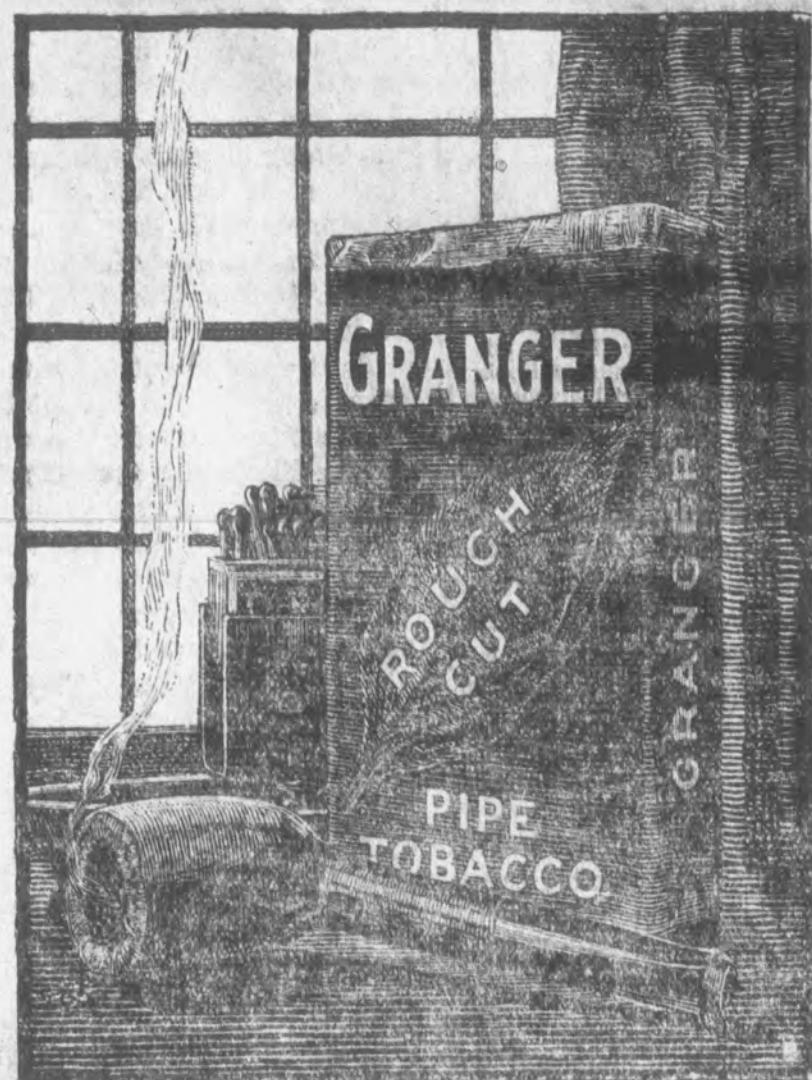

OFFICERS' RESERVE CORPS

The statement has been made that when a citizen enrolls in the Officers' Reserve Corps, he surrenders his right to express himself on civic and political questions. In answer to this criticism the Secretary of War issued the following statement, under date of November 26, 1924:

"A Reserve Officer, except when on active duty, is not subject to the Articles of War which govern the Armies of the United States, and it is not, and never has been, the policy of the War Department to prevent, in any manner, the expression of his views, or to limit his activities. Should any such activities proceed to the point where they may be inimical to the constituted government or be of such a nature as to cause scandal or disgrace to the uniform, no alternative is left but to cause an investigation of the facts to be made

with a view to ascertaining the suitability of the officer in question to retain his appointment in the Officers' Reserve Corps."

This would seem to be a complete answer to the contention that freedom of speech is denied officers of the Reserve Corps.

STOP WORRYING

A lot of people seem to be worried these days about the future of the Democratic party. Such worry is useless and needless. Now and then the so-called leaders veer in the wrong direction and the great old party goes on the rocks and some people say she is a total wreck, but she always comes out seaworthy and ready for the next voyage. She has survived worse treatment than she received in 1924, and she will survive that.

Be it remembered that the party was founded on the idea that the Federal government is one of limited powers, fixed by a written constitution and that all powers not granted to it in that instrument are reserved in the states; that all human government is designed to fix certain rules by which the game of civil life is played and that such rules provide equal and exact justice to all with special privilege to none. These principles are the bedrock of this great republic. The party which represents them will never be wrecked unless the republic itself is wrecked.

We have been swinging away from these principles in recent years. We have been granting too much power and authority to federal government and divesting the states of their rights and powers. It is the business of the Democratic party to call its sons and daughters once more to the standard of these imperishable principles. We must stop veering to every wind of socialism and communism, that tickles our fancies or seems to serve expediency. It is better to be right than temporarily victorious.

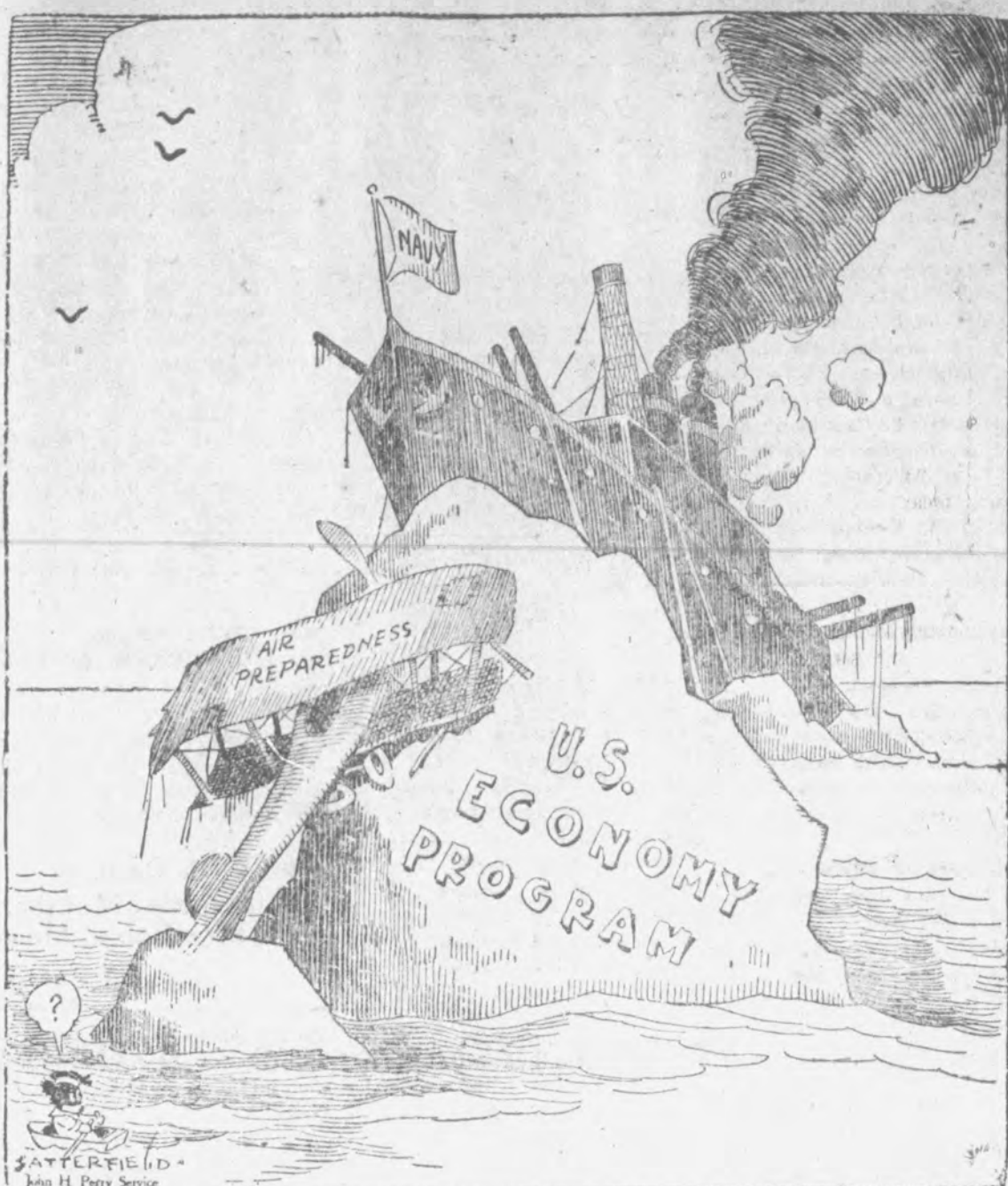

SANDWICH PEDDLERS FEED BUSY BERLINERS WITH NO LOST TIME

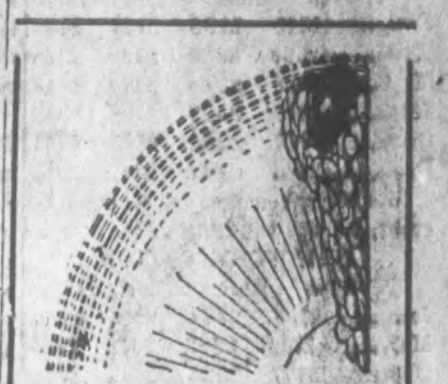

The speculative attempts recently made to advance the market, based principally for strength in the stock and grain markets have met with sufficient volume of hedge selling on all rallies to check any enthusiasm in this direction and while we do not look for any move of importance, we are inclined to think that prices will continue with a heavy dragging tendency.

Reports from the dry goods market indicate that there is a better feeling spreading with more inquiry. It is the general belief that better business will be doing in the near future.

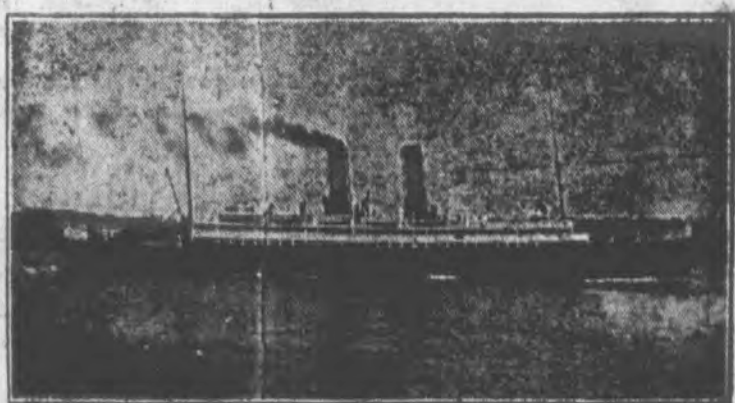
