FIGHT VS. FIRE HAS
BEEN LAUNCHED IN
N. C. LEGISLATURETwo Measures Designed
to Decrease Fire
Hazards Introduced
House of Representatives

Raleigh, Jan. 16.—A fight against the great destructive demon fire, has been launched in the North Carolina legislature.

Two measures designed to decrease the fire hazards in the state have been introduced in the House of Representatives by Representative David P. Dellinger, of Gaston. One would require hospitals to be built of fire-resistant materials and the other would increase the stringency of the present statute regarding electrical wiring. The last measure would make it necessary for all persons doing electrical wiring work to secure a license to be granted only after he has shown that he is capable in this line.

The main clause of the bill contains the following:

"That all hospitals, sanatoriums and asylums and other buildings used for the treatment of, preservation or restoration of sick, wounded, insane or infirm persons, hereafter erected in this state, shall be so constructed of fire resistant materials throughout as to afford reasonable safety to all occupants of such buildings."

The Insurance Commission, who is ex-officio fire marshal, would be charged with the duty of inspecting all plans for new hospitals.

Hospitals already erected should be required to conform to the clause quoted above as far as practicable in the opinion of the Insurance Commissioner within three years and all hospitals to be built from existing buildings also would be required to conform with that clause.

Failure to comply with the law would be classed as a misdemeanor, punishable by a fine of not less than \$25 nor more than \$50 for each day's neglect.

The Insurance Commission also would have supervision over the proposed regulation of electricians. He would pass on applications for licenses in many cases. However, electricians, licensed by some city or town would not have to secure another license from the State. The fee for a state license would be \$1.

An examining board to pass on applicants for license as electricians would be created in each town, consisting of the local electrical inspector, one wireman, one contractor, the mayor or his representative and an appointee of the Insurance Commissioner.

The law would not apply to employees of an electric light or power company, or street railway company engaged in the installation of machinery or wiring on its own premises.

Both of the new fire prevention measures are in the hands of the House committee on insurance.

Officers Raid
House and Store
of Leon Patrick

Chief of Police Lester Jones with four other officers, on yesterday, raided the home and store of Leon Patrick, colored man residing on First street, and found two and one-half gallons of whiskey in the house and a small quantity in the store. In addition to the whiskey all paraphernalia necessary for the manufacturing and selling of whiskey was found. Patrick succeeded in making his getaway.

Patrick is an old violator of the law having been caught by the officers three times prior to the raid yesterday. Every effort is being made to apprehend him.

Would Create Civil
Economic Bureau

Washington, Jan. 16.—A bureau of Civil Economics would be created in the Department of Justice under a bill reported today by the House Commerce Committee.

NATION'S DEBT HAS
MULTIPLIED SEVEN
TIMES IN TEN YEARSPer Capita Debt of the
United States in 1922
Was \$283.80 as Compared
to \$49.97 in
1912

Washington, Jan. 16.—The public debt of the United States including federal government and all its subdivisions, multiplied seven times between 1912 and 1922 it was shown today by the Census Bureau figures. At the end of December 1922 the total was \$30,845,626,000 while at the same period in 1912 it was \$1,850,460,000.

While the greatest increase appeared in the federal debt because of the war the debt increase of the states was nearly three fold and that of municipalities and other subdivisions doubled.

The federal government in 1912 owed \$1,028,564,000 while in 1922 it owed \$22,155,880,000.

The total state indebtedness in 1922 was \$345,942,000 while in 1912 it was \$935,544,000. Other civil divisions owed \$3,475,945,000 in 1912 and \$7,154,196,000 in 1922.

All the figures represented the net debt the bureau explained, sinking funds and cash assets in possession of the indebted units of the government having been subtracted from the total of their obligations outstanding.

The total debt of 1922 made the per capita obligation of each citizen of the United States, adult and child, \$283.80. In 1912 the indebtedness per capita was \$49.97.

KILLS MOTHER, THEN
GOES TO WILD PARTYSixteen Year Old Girl
Admits She Shot Her
Mother in Flare of
Anger and Then Went
to Dance

San Francisco, Jan. 16.—Pleasure loving Dorothy Ellington, 16 years old confessed slayer of her mother, Mrs. Anna Ellington, maintained today her smiling mask of indifference characteristic of her attitude since she was arrested yesterday charged with the murder. Emerging from twelve hours of questioning today the girl still was "the life of the party" just as she had been after the murder when she danced in the apartment of a friend while her mother lay dead in her home, shot to death during a flare of anger.

Police today had rounded up three of the seventeen young men for whom warrants were issued for contributing to the delinquency of a minor. They included the man in whose apartment Dorothy said she attended a party a few hours after the death of her mother. More arrests are expected during the day.

The father and brother confronted the girl in the city prison yesterday, the former lovable and pleading and the brother stern and unforgiving. The brother repudiated the advances of his sister when she sought to embrace them in her cell, with a cry "Don't touch me, you killed my mother" and pushing her from him.

The shooting came as a climax of a long series of family differences over the girl's actions. The father and mother quarrelled because of the life the daughter admits she lived. The mother defended the daughter and the father left home.

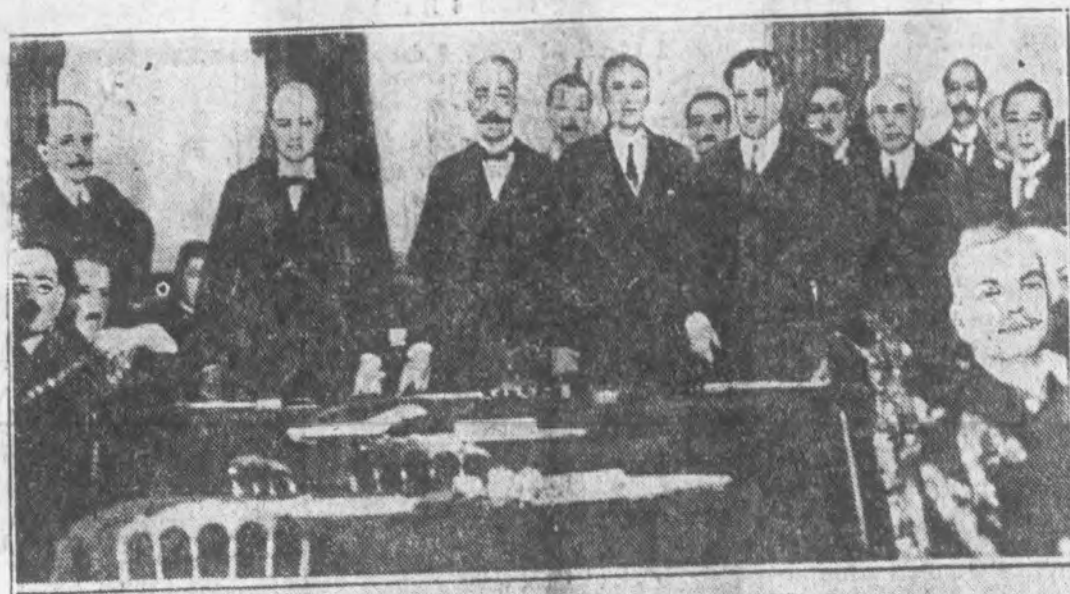
After the girl shot her mother, according to her confession, she took \$45 from a purse in the same room and went on a "wild party."

HOVER DECLINES
TRANSFER TO DEPT.
AGRICULTURE POSTSecretary of Commerce
Believes He Can Be of
Greatest Service in His
Present Position

Washington, Jan. 16.—President Coolidge tendered the post of Secretary of Agriculture to Secretary Hoover today but Mr. Hoover replied that he desired to remain in the Commerce Department.

Washington, Jan. 16.—Although the transfer of Secretary Hoover from the Commerce Department to the Department of Agriculture has been urged upon President Coolidge no such change in the Cabinet lineup now seems likely.

The White House is understood to have received information that Mr. Hoover, himself, is not favorably inclined toward acceptance of the agriculture post which becomes vacant on March 4.

The Commerce Secretary today declined to discuss the matter but friends pointed out that he is now engaged in reorganization work within the Commerce Department which he regards as highly important and that in his relation with business he has always felt he could be of greatest service at his present post.

The president's desire, it was said, was to place at the head of the Agriculture Department a man familiar with modern business methods and it was for that reason his attention was turned to Secretary Hoover as a possible successor to Howard M. Gore upon the latter's retirement March 4 to become governor of West Virginia.

Mr. Hoover, however, two years ago declined a transfer to the Interior Department when Fred H. Harding was seeking a man to place that department on a sound business basis.

U. S. DOMINATES MARKET
FOR AUTOS IN ARGENTINA

Buenos Aires.—The United States practically absorbed the importation of automobiles and motor trucks to Argentina in 1923; according to a report just issued by the Motorcar Importers Association. The report, which is based on official records, shows that out of a total of 30,034 motorcars that entered Argentina during the last year, 29,294 were of North American manufacture. The value of the cars amounted to 13,201,114 gold pesos, and to this sum must be added a further 3,750,779 gold pesos which is the value of motorcar accessories imported during the same period.

The report dwells on the considerable development of the automobile trade in Argentina during the last year, saying that the increase of the importation was 53.2 percent over 1922, when the trade reached its highest level. In the city of Buenos Aires there are at present 19,222 motorcars, compared with 5,824 in 1915.

POSTAL INCREASE BILL
TO COME UP THURSDAY

Washington, Jan. 16.—The Senate vote today to give the administration's measure proposing an increase in postal salaries and rates right of way next Thursday. Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, asked that a date be set for consideration of the double barreled measure and the proposal was supported by administration leaders as well as most of the Democrats.

The vote was 66 to 10. Among those opposing the bill was Senator Overman, of North Carolina.

Indigent Hospital
Committee Holds
Splendid Meeting

A meeting was held yesterday afternoon at the court house of the Indigent Hospital committee of Greenville Township. Those attending the meeting were: Mrs. Richard Williams, treasurer; K. T. Furell, secretary; Mrs. N. S. Fulford, Rev. J. E. W. Cook, A. B. Ellington, Rev. W. S. Harden, Prof. H. E. Austin, Prof. C. M. Eppes and H. Stevenson.

The meeting was called to order by Prof. H. E. Austin, chairman. Minutes of last meeting were read and a report of work accomplished was read by the secretary. This report showed that 13 colored people received assistance from the fund while 9 white people had been given medical or hospital attention.

Mrs. Williams, treasurer, showed, by her report, that 16 organizations of white people had contributed \$474.50 while six organizations from the colored people had contributed a total of \$68.40 making a grand total of \$542.90 received for hospital and medical attention. Of money expended \$205.00 was expended for colored people while \$326.20 was expended for white people.

A motion was moved and unanimously carried to call a meeting for Jan. 29 at 4:00 at court house. At this meeting representatives from every church, white and colored, from every organization, white and colored are requested to be present. The purpose of this meeting is to inform everyone of the nature of work being done and to thoroughly stabilize the work for 1925. The secretary and treasurer were authorized to put in concrete form all facts and figures of work completed to date for the meeting on Jan. 29.

The committee went on record yesterday as highly pleased with the indigent hospital work and strongly endorsing a continuance of the work for 1925.

TWENTY-SEVEN CHILDREN
WERE MADE FATHERLESS
BY EXPLOSION YESTERDAY

Providence, R. I., Jan. 16.—Twenty-seven children were made fatherless late yesterday when an explosion at Diamond Coal Mine number 1 cost the lives of six miners who composed the power gang. One miner escaped. All the bodies have been recovered.

THREE PERSONS DIE
IN AUTO ACCIDENT,
ELEVEN INJUREDFour of Injured Suffered
Fractured Skulls
and Are Reported in
Serious Condition

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 16.—Three persons were killed in one motor accident here early today and 11 were hurt in another.

When the sedan in which they were returning from a dance was struck by a freight train at a grade crossing on the Buffalo road, Mrs. Lillian De Ruyser, 40; Thomas Offer, 48 and Oscar J. Kallfleisch, 57, were killed. Miss Bertha Mc-Bowell, 47, who was riding in the rear seat escaped unhurt. A west bound freight had just passed the crossing before the east bound train crashed into the auto. The machine was tossed against a telegraph pole and the wreckage caught fire.

Eleven other persons, were injured, four of them seriously, when two automobiles crashed at a street corner here and were hurled over the curb into a grocery store. The of the injured sustained fractured skulls.

New York Will Be in
Darkness From Eclipse

New York, Jan. 16.—For two minutes New York will be in darkness during the eclipse of the sun Saturday morning January 24, Professor Ernst W. Brown, of Yale University, stated today. He advised bank messengers and pay roll cashiers to keep in doors during that period.

Some of the banks will not open until after the greater part of the eclipse is over about 9:30 o'clock.

Federal Prohibition
Five Years Old Today

Washington, Jan. 16.—Federal Prohibition Enforcement began five years ago today and Commissioner Haynes in his anniversary announcement believed accomplishments during that period warranted a fair degree of satisfaction when taking all things into consideration. The campaign against illicit liquor had been marked by many advances, and not a single retreat, he declared.

BERLIN SCHOOLS ADOPT
COURSES IN ATHLETICS

Berlin, Jan. 16.—The schools of Berlin are becoming increasingly interested in athletics and eugenics. The movement for making gymnastic training obligatory is gaining headway. This is contemplated, as soon as the facilities can be provided, to compel all school children to learn to swim.

During the past summer over 2,000 school children were given instruction in swimming and within the next few months the privilege is to be extended to 10,000 young people by getting aside the natoria in the various parts of the city for their specific use.

Another form of sport that is to be given encouragement this winter is bob-sleighing and skiing. Pushball and medicine ball, comparatively little known in Germany before the war, have also come into vogue in the public schools.

DECLARES NO SURE
CURE TUBERCULOSIS
YET BEEN FOUNDDenounces Practice of
Newspapers Giving
Unlimited Space to
Sensational Fake Dis-
coveries

Washington, Jan. 16.—Unaccuracies and even falsehoods in medical stories published in newspapers and the attitude of the press in giving almost unlimited space to the sensational and untrue news of alleged discoveries of cures for tuberculosis and cancer, were denounced here today by Dr. Morris Fishbein, editor of the Journal of the American Medical Association in an address before the National Society of Newspaper Editors which opened its convention here today.

Dr. Fishbein said that five alleged cures for cancer had been announced through the press during the past year and that there is not the slightest scientific evidence that anyone is a specific treatment or cure of the disease concerned in anything even remotely resembling the degree to which diphtheria anti-toxin is specifically for diphtheria.

"Of the five cures for tuberculosis one was carbon dioxide gas as is used in soda water," said Dr. Fishbein, "one was the inhaling of a certain amount of mixed soot and lime, one was a vaccine, designed by a Swiss named Spahlinger, one a vaccine designed by an Englishman named Dreyer and then there was Prof. or Moelgaard's gold cure of only a few days ago. It was an able year for the poor consumptive but there he lies just about as bad off as before," said Fishbein.

HAS DIFFICULTY IN
FORMING CABINETMeeting of German
Reichstag Set for To-
day Postponed Until
Monday Pending the
Completion of Cabinet

Berlin, Jan. 16.—Presentation to the Reichstag of the new German Cabinet, headed by Dr. Hans Luther as chancellor, and the government's declaration of policies set for today has been postponed until Monday afternoon as Dr. Luther is experiencing difficulty in finding ministers to take the posts of Finance and Justice.

Laymen Presbyterian
Synod to Meet in
Greensboro, Feb. 19

Greensboro, N. C., Jan. 16.—A meeting of the laymen of the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina will be held here February 19 and 20 for the purpose of organizing a layman's organization in the State within the Presbyterian church. Delegates from every Presbyterian church in the State are expected to attend this meeting, it is stated.

Those sponsoring the movement say that the February meeting will be the first of its kind to be attempted by Presbyterians in the State. The meeting will be addressed by a number of the leading churchmen of the denomination in this and other states.

Three One Act Plays
Be Staged Dramatic
Club of N. C. C. W.

Greensboro, Jan. 16.—Three one-act plays, "Suppressed Desires," "The Knave of Hearts" and another yet to be selected, will be staged by the Dramatic Club of the North Carolina College for Women on February 7, according to an announcement made by W. R. Taylor, director of dramatics. Rehearsals are now in progress and the casts are composed of talent selected from the student body.

WOULD GIVE BUDGET
COMMISSION MORE
POWER OR ABOLISHGuilford County Sena-
tor Announces Serious
Consideration of In-
troducing Such Meas-
ure

Raleigh, Jan. 16.—Senator O. W. Mendenhall, of Guilford, announced today following another session of the legislature, characterized by little action, that he was considering introducing a measure either to increase the power of the Budget Commission or to abolish the commission altogether.

A joint resolution had just been passed allowing this body an extension of time until January 31 to report its appropriation bill which was supposed to be submitted within 10 days after the convening of the General Assembly. The legislature also adopted a resolution extending the time for submission of the revenue bill by the State Board of Assessments until January 31. This measure originated in the House, and the spokesman for the board said it had drafted its bill and could report at this time, if necessary adding however, that the board preferred to wait until later so it would have opportunity to correlate its bill with that of the Budget Commission.

Both houses adjourned shortly after the noon hour out of respect for the late Governor W. W. Kitchen who died last November.

The House again led today in the number of new bills going beyond the one hundred mark for the session so far while the Senate still has less than 50 measures before it. Most of the new bills in the House related to minor and local matters however. One of the most important of the new House measures provides for four new judicial district judges, this being the third measure introduced concerning the state's judicial system.

The most important of the Senate's new bills was that of Senator E. R. McKelhan, of Cumberland, which would make it unlawful to issue insurance policies on children under 12 years of age. A measure introduced several days ago would regulate such an issue but the Cumberland Senator thought the former bill not sufficiently stringent.

In the House was also introduced a measure which would appoint Governor McLean as head of a committee to designate the remaining carvings to go on Stone Mountain representing North Carolina. Governor McLean, together with four vice chairmen, would select 75 citizens of the state to aid them in making their selection.

Contracts Construction
State Highway Nos. 642
234 To Be Let Jan. 27

Raleigh, Jan. 16.—Contracts for the construction of state highway projects Nos. 642 and 234 will be let on January 27, according to an announcement made by the State Highway Commission Thursday. Bids are now being received from contractors and they will be opened and the contract awarded at a meeting of the commission to be held Tuesday morning, January 27 at ten o'clock.

Project 234 is between Goldsboro and the Wilson county line and is 13.77 miles in length. The bond required for this project will be approximately \$15,000.

Project 642 is the highway between Turnersburg and the Yadkin county line, a distance of 11.14 miles. The bond required for this project will be approximately \$15,000.

NO "GOOD FIRES"

Fire protection is everybody's personal problem; not only the obligation to go and help in an actual conflagration, but also to help in preventing fires.

The United States pays approximately \$500,000,000 every year for fires; 75 per cent of which are needless. Almost \$5.00 per capita goes up in smoke every year—the price of six months fuel or a months rent for the average family of five. There are no "good fires" every one is a devouring monster. Every item of property burned is that much human labor and savings destroyed and the nation is that much poorer.

If America could reduce her fire losses 50 per cent much property not now covered by insurance would secure fire insurance protection. The public would benefit by reduced rates and insurance companies would benefit by doing a larger net business because of fewer fire losses to pay.

HOW NOT TO DEAL WITH MUSCLE SHOALS

If more proof were needed that the Senate does not know its own mind about Muscle Shoals, the Senate has supplied it. First, Mr. Underwood's plan for a lease is voted down

and Mr. Jones's plan for a commission of inquiry is adopted. Then Mr. Jones's plan is voted down and Mr. Norris's plan for Government operation is voted in its place. Then Mr. Norris's plan is side-tracked by one more vote on a point of order, which permits Mr. Underwood again to come to the front with his plan for a lease. The Senate boxes the compass and is back where it started. Then, on the day following, it adopts the Underwood plan all over again.

What confidence can any one have in the face of this performance that the Senate knows what it is doing? The Senate's own indecision, its complete disagreement over facts, its merry-go-round changes of policy overnight, present an effective argument for Mr. Jones's plan of referring the Shoals to a commission.

It does not seem to The World that the commission plan would either delay seriously the use of the Shoals or take the ultimate decision of how to use it out of the hands of Congress. Only Dam No. 2 will be completed in 1925—and that not until next fall. Dam No. 3 is still a diagram on paper.

As for the authority of Congress: The commission provided in Senator Jones's amendment would have signed no contracts but simply proposed a plan of operation for Congress to consider. There was no reason why it could not have proposed half a dozen plans—one based definitely on the principle of Government operation, one on the principle of private operation, one stressing nitrates, one stressing water-power, and so forth, but all sound in their engineering. Congress could still have chosen the theory upon which it wished to utilize the public's investment in the Shoals. But it would have several completed "Dawes plans" from which to pick and choose, rather than the difficulty which ninety-six many-minded men necessarily encounter when they themselves attempt, as they have attempted recently, to constitute a Dawes committee.

The Underwood bill has passed the Senate, but it is a totally different bill from the Muscle Shoals Bill passed in the last session in the House and it may encounter another deadlock in the House and Senate conference. Congress, before the issue is settled, may yet turn to the commission plan.—N. Y. World.

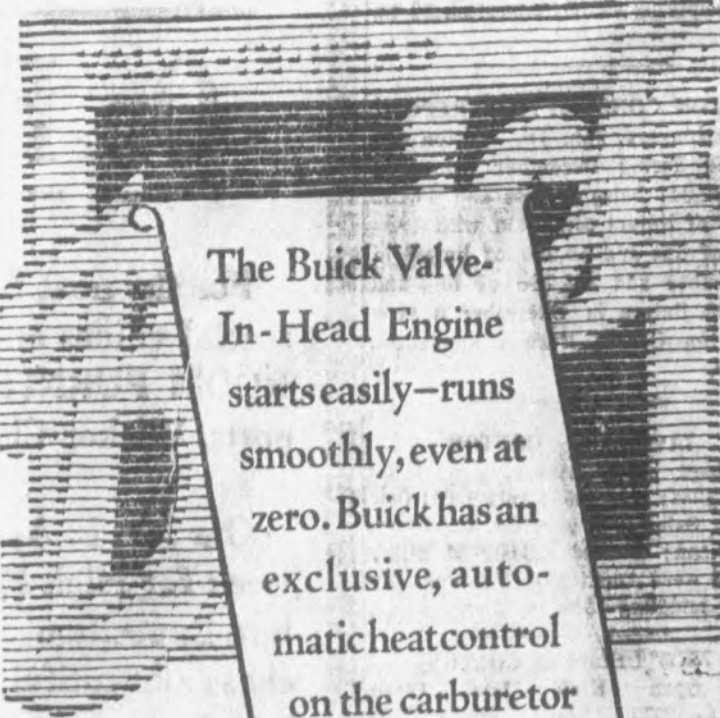

POTENTIALITIES OF HAITI

TO BE VIEWED BY EXPERT

Port-Au-Prince, Haiti.—Desiring to bring before the American public a true picture of economic conditions in Haiti, and the possibilities in an agricultural way of its wonderful soil, General Russell, the American High Commissioner, made certain specific recommendations to Washington. As a result E. Verne Richardson, of the American consular service, was assigned the task of making an economic survey of the republic, and is already at work.

While the productivity of Haiti's soil is vaguely known to the people

of the United States, few are aware that 70,000,000 pounds of the finest coffee are harvested annually from plants growing in a wild state and that amount represents less than two-thirds of the berries that could be harvested by intelligent picking. Long staple cotton nearly the equal of sea island and superior to that grown in the United States, flourishes in a wild state and produces annually about 3,000,000 pounds. Alligator pears grow wild and they are large and have an excellent flavor.

Haiti has the soil, climate and cheap labor to produce vegetables for the winter months to supply the east coast of the United States; all it needs is American capital and energy.

Prussia Shelves Co-Education

Berlin, Jan.—The secondary schools of Prussia have decided against co-education on the ground that girls are generally superior mentally to boys up to the time they are 16. Thereafter the boys surpass the girls in general intelligence. This inequality of intelligence, it is argued, puts both the boys and the girls at a disadvantage if they are compelled to attend the same classes.

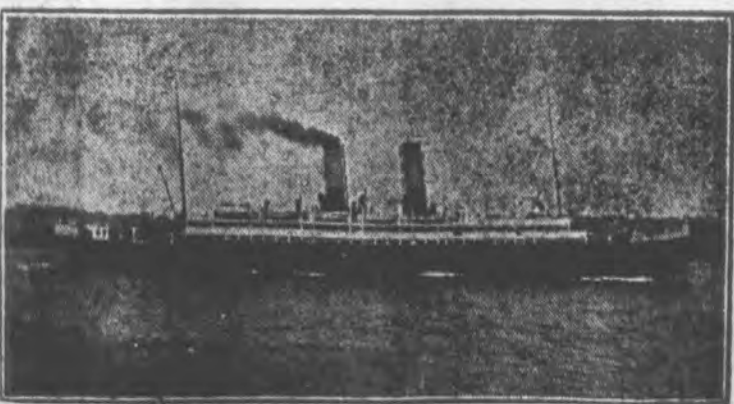

CLOTHES DESIGNED IN PARIS

Tokio, Jan.—Women bus conductors have proved so satisfactory that the Tokio street railway has decided to employ them. Five hundred will be installed June 1 and will gradually replace men conductors. Their uniforms will be of foreign style, designed by a Paris tailor.

Japan Colonizing Waste Land.

Tokio.—The government is making a strong effort to colonize and develop the waste lands of Hokkaido Island for the 40,000 to 50,000 government employees who will be let out by the first of the year under the retrenchment plan. These men are to be given a substantial bonus upon discharge, and the promoters of the idea believe it will be sufficient to enable them to make a good start on land allotments. About 240 families will be sent to Hokkaido this year and 400 next year under government aid.

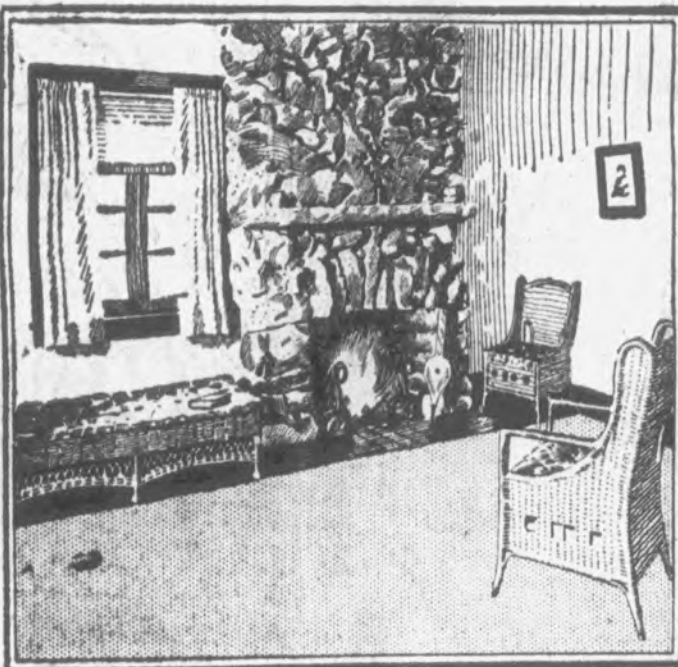
