SEEKS TO INCREASE ANNUAL PENSION CONFEDERATE VETS

Burleson Bill Would Double Present Rate; Miss Alexander Wants School for Delinquent Negro Girls

Raleigh, Jan. 17.—A bill in the House of Representatives introduced by Miss Julia Alexander, of Mecklenburg, to establish a state institution for delinquent negro girls and a bill in the Senate by Senator Burleson, of Mitchell, to increase the pensions of Confederate veterans and their widows, featured today's brief sessions of the legislature.

Miss Alexander's measure was the first of an extensive program sponsored by the State Legislature Council of Women. The bill provides for an appropriation of \$25,000 to establish the proposed delinquent girls' institution, the foundation of which already exists. It is the plan to take over the private institution developed in recent years by a group of negro women of the state at Afriland, in Orange county.

Senator Burleson's bill would more than double the Confederate pensions. At present there are 8,330 Confederate veterans who draw \$120 each annually from the state and 5,055 Confederate widows who are paid an equal amount. There are 190 veterans and widows in the first, second and third classes who receive amounts ranging from \$325 to \$105 each year. The Mitchell County Senator's measure provides for paying all Confederate veterans or widows \$295 a year split up into quarterly payments.

Representative N. A. Townsend, chairman of the House Finance Committee, paved the way to clear up difficulties concerning certain state bonds which Treasurer B. R. Lacy was unable to sign, because of his recent illness, before the adjournment of the term of Governor Cameron Morrison. The Finance Committee chairman introduced a bill that would validate the bonds with the signature of the State Treasurer attached after the date on which the governor under whom they were issued had gone out of office. The measure was referred to the Finance Committee and probably will be reported back to the floor of the House early next week. The amount of the bonds affected by the measure is about \$4,000,000.

A measure designed to strengthen the State Banking Laws was introduced in the upper house by Senator Carroll, of Alamance. The bill proposes to make bank stock holders liable personally in case the sale of their stock for the purpose of meeting a deficit in the bank's funds does not furnish a sufficient amount to pay the shareholder's quota of the deficit.

The House was in session only a few minutes convening at 10:30 o'clock while the Senate convened at 11 o'clock for a 15 minutes period. Under a joint resolution adopted in the House yesterday and the Senate today, adjournment was taken until 7:30 Monday night when the two houses will reconvene and then immediately adjourn in order to pay a tribute of respect to General Robert E. Lee whose birthday anniversary is Monday. A memorial meeting will be held in the Senate chamber Monday night.

Merchant's Ass'n. To Hold Convention In Charlotte May 26-28

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 17.—The annual convention of the North Carolina Merchant's Association will be held in Charlotte, N. C. on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, May 26, 27 and 28, instead of the third week in June as previously announced, according to a notice that has been sent out by the state secretary. The change is made it is stated, in order that the convention may not conflict with other state and national meetings in which the merchants are interested. The change was also requested by the Charlotte Merchant's Association, the host of the convention.

The Charlotte Merchant's Association is making elaborate plans for the convention and committees have been named to work out plans of entertainment, program, etc. A number of features will be introduced at the convention.

It is expected that the attendance this year will be the largest in the history of the association. The merchants of South Carolina will be invited to attend the convention as special agents of the North Carolina Association.

WILD BOAR SENDS INVALID TO WORK

Bourges, France, Jan. 17.—Pursued by hunters, a wild boar dashed into a private home in the village of Grand Mallevy near here and made his way into a bedroom where an invalid had been lying for a month. The sick man shrieked for help, arose and jumped out of the window. The boar was finally killed and the invalid returned to work.

DEMANDS PROBE OF COURT MARTIALS

Charges Lower Naval Officers Forced to Decide Cases According to Dictates of Superiors

Norfolk, Jan. 17.—Demands for investigation into conditions surrounding court martial at the Naval Base here were contained in telegrams sent to the secretary of the Navy, Judge Advocate of the Navy and President of the American Bar Association today by Ralph H. Doughton, local attorney.

Doughton bases his demands upon evidence which he claims to have in his possession which he asserts demonstrates that lower ranking officers at bases who are appointed to summary court, are threatened with "smeering" unless they follow the dictation of the higher officers in the punishment meted out to those on trial.

TEXAS RANGERS NOW FACE ELIMINATION

That Ranger Law in Effect for Nearly Century is Unconstitutional

Austin, Texas, Jan. 17.—The Rangers, heroes of past history and fiction for the last 90 years, are threatened with elimination. Under a district court ruling the Ranger law, dating from 1835, is unconstitutional. The decision was appealed to the Supreme court but meanwhile the rangers will be idle for the first time since the organization of that band to mold from the wilderness of the southwest a peaceful place for the Republic of Texas. Through various vicissitudes the Lone Star State has been seen a Mexican dependent, a rebel nation, a republic and a state and the rangers have kept peace with the progress, for with fearless, untiring, straight shooting men devoted to their task they preserved order.

The rangers originally numbered 150 but now they only number about 50 yet that little band has inherited and kept growing the traditions so gloriously that the appearance of that little handful of rangers in the most disturbed community has been sufficient to bring order from chaos. During the 1922 strikes it required a company of state militia to control one town while these 50 rangers divided 40 towns among themselves.

From the ranger's slogan of "Get your man," a state official said today, was evolved the plan for the Canadian Royal Northwest Mounted Police as well as various state constabulary forces.

Congress Goes Back to Appropriations Today

Washington, Jan. 17.—After a week devoted to other legislation the House today took up again its program of appropriation bills. The independent office supply measure was the first of the annual supply bills to be considered at the opening of the measure and a season of debate of a general nature took place during the first hour. The bulk of funds provided for in the bill is for the Veterans Bureau and the Shipping Board.

MRS. BILL HART SUES FOR RELEASE FROM SEPARATION PACT

Wife of "Two Gun" Hero Filmseeker Seeks Repeal of Clause Which Excludes Her From the Movies

Los Angeles, Jan. 17.—Mrs. Winifred Hart, wife of William S. Hart, the two-gun hero of Western films, wants to resume work in the movies because she finds \$752.50 monthly insufficient for the needs of herself and her infant son. A trust fund established by Hart in the separation pact in 1922 yields that amount.

James Stewart, banker and custodian of the fund, testified yesterday in the hearing of Mrs. Hart's suit to have set aside the clause in the agreement which prevents her appearance before the camera. Testimony was completed yesterday and argument will be heard Monday.

From Mrs. Hart's lips fell the denial of widely circulated stories that "Big Bill" had struck her and dragged her by the hair and the movie star could not conceal his exultation at the respite from the yam which he said had caused him dejection for three years.

"It is not true that my husband ever pulled me around by my hair," testified Mrs. Hart. "It is not true that he ever struck me."

Local Tobacco Market Sells 27,504,968 Lbs. During This Season

The Greenville Tobacco Market, according to a report of K. W. Cobb, secretary and treasurer, has sold during the season 27,504,968 pounds for \$6,680,179.62, average \$24.28. For the season the market has sold 300,304 pounds for \$65,476.53 at an average of \$21.80. The market will close for the season on Friday, Jan. 30.

The sales during the past week have been very light. The prices, however, have been good considering the quality of tobacco offered. All roads leading to the paved roads have been had on account of the heavy rains and this is thought to be responsible for the light sale.

The farmers are urged to sell their tobacco as early as possible as there are only two more weeks before the market closes.

HAYNES MAY RETIRE POST AS DIRECTOR OF DRY ENFORCEMENT

Information From the White House is to Effect Haynes Will Retire But He Denies Knowledge of It

Washington, Jan. 17.—The sixth year of National Prohibition has been ushered in with reported changes in both the personnel and methods of federal enforcement corps.

Roy A. Haynes, field marshal of the enforcement forces since early in the Harding Administration, seemingly likely to be replaced by someone who heretofore has viewed the government's prohibition activities from a distance and who will bring to the service an enforcement opinion of his own. A report from the White House today to the effect that Mr. Haynes would probably submit his resignation was met by Haynes' statement that "it's news to me, I know nothing about it."

Meantime it has been revealed at the White House in a most authoritative manner that President Coolidge (Continued on page four).

JACK DEMPSEY WILL DROP HEAVYWEIGHT CROWN NEXT JUNE

Heavy Weight Champion Boxer to Give Up Ring for Housekeeping Career as Husband of Movie Actress

Los Angeles, Cal., Jan. 17.—Jack Dempsey will abdicate the heavy weight boxing throne next June and set up housekeeping as the husband of Estelle Taylor, motion picture actress whom he is now serving as business manager and publicity man, he announced here last night.

Who will pick up the crown when he drops it will have to be decided by an elimination tournament, Dempsey said, but his personal choice would be Tommy Gibbons, of St. Paul.

Regardless of who wears the cloak of ring supremacy next, however, Dempsey is sure he is going to let it fall from his shoulders on his wedding day. "And when I'm through there will be no re-entering into the ring once I step out," he declared.

Rumor had discussed the approaching marriage of Dempsey and Miss Taylor several months but until today the two had had no comment to make.

There is still a possibility of Dempsey defending his title before his withdrawal from the ring but he admits there is no chance of another bout unless some contender makes a particularly good showing between now and June.

Teachers and Officers Methodist Church In Council Meeting

The Teachers and officers of the Jarvis Memorial Methodist Sunday School held their regular monthly Council meeting on night last week. There were thirty eight present. The meeting was held in the dining room at the church and lasted from 8:30 until 8:30, supper being served by one of the circles of the Missionary Society. The feature of the program was a round table discussion led by Rev. Harry M. North, pastor of First Church, Rocky Mount. Mr. North is delegated to scope all the schools in the Washington District, in order that the schools may find out what they need to do in order to secure the highest rating. After going over in detail the work of the school for the past year, it was found out that the local school was up to standard in a number of things, but in others was much below standard. Particularly was it noted, that the school had no library of any kind for teachers or pupils, nor has it ever held a Standard Training School for its teachers. NORWAY TO PREVENT SHIPS FROM RUM RUNNING TO U. S.

Oslo, Norway, Jan. 17.—The Norwegian government is considering legislation to prevent Norwegian ships from participating in the rum running trade to the United States which is characterized as "a discredit to the flag." The foreign office through its legation in Washington has obtained the names of 10 Norwegian vessels identified as among those on rum row and the list has been sent to the Ship Owners Association and the Ministry of Justice for further action.

MEANS TRIAL BEING RUSHED TO A CLOSE

Judge Lindley Limits Number of Defense Character Witnesses to 10; Hearing Resumed Monday

New York, Jan. 17.—Determined to press to a speedy conclusion the trial in court here of Gaston B. Mean, former Department of Justice agent, and Thomas B. Felder, his former attorney, on charges of conspiring to bribe government officials, Federal Judge Lindley made a ruling today limiting to 10 the number of character witnesses to be allowed the defense.

The trial will be resumed Monday. Judge Lindley's ruling is the second measure taken to speed up the trial, the first being the selection of the jurors who were largely passed on by the judge himself.

STEAMERS COLLIDE OFF CAPE COD TODAY

Cutter and Destroyer Go to Rescue in Response to Call; Vessels Not in Immediate Danger

Chatham, Mass., Jan. 17.—The steamers Munalo and Robin Adair were in collision early today off Handkerchief Light shoal south of here near the elbow of Cape Cod. The revenue cutter Acushnet and the destroyer Cassin sped to the assistance of the two vessels after receipt of radio calls.

It was reported that neither ship was in immediate danger. The Chatham station of the Radio Corporation of America received a message, saying the Munalo was anchored in 35 feet of water and that her fore peak was flooded.

Apparently the ship, met nearly head on since both report damage, to their fore hold and starboard side. A message from the Robin Adair reported "forty foot hole abreast number two hatch; small leaks in number one hold; five feet water in hold; anchored five miles southwest Handkerchief Shoal's light ship; heavy fog." The Adair added that her suction pipes on the starboard side were put out of commission. This message gave the time of the collision as 1:50 this morning.

Conference on Cause and Cure of War Be Held Washington

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 17.—The conference on the Cause and Cure of War, called by eight national women's organization, of the United States, will meet in Washington, D. C. January 18-24. It is announced by Miss Mabel K. Howell, Secretary of Oriental Missions of the Woman's Department, Board of Missions of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, who is a delegate.

It is expected that upwards of 1,000 women interested in a program in behalf of world peace will attend from all parts of the country.

According to representative women leaders, the conference has been called because women have recognized the futility of war as a means of settling international difficulties, and the women's organizations which have been working through their respective programs in behalf of peace, believe the time has come for all women to unite to study the cause of war and its remedies.

HOUSE HOLDS UP THE REFERENCE SHOALS BILL TO CONFERENCE

Leaders Desire to Consult Senate Leaders First as to What Action the Conference Might Take

Reference of the Underwood Muscle Shoals bill to conference was prevented in the House today by objection raised by Representative Longworth, Republican leader. Representatives McKenzie, of the Military Committee, sought unanimous consent to send the measure to a conference but Mr. Longworth contended that it should be left for a few days on the speaker's table. The Republican leader said he hoped action on the proposed reference of the bill to a conference would be taken next week. Meanwhile efforts will be made to reach an agreement with Senate leaders as to what action will be taken by the conference.

Washington, Jan. 17.—Republican House leaders will seek an understanding with the Senate leaders as to the final form of Muscle Shoals legislation before any move is made in the House to send the Underwood Shoals bill to a conference.

President Coolidge, is said today to have indicated his agreement with this course after a conference yesterday with Representative Longworth, of Ohio, Republican leader of the House, and Chairman Snell, of the House Rules Committee, in order that the legislation would not be tied up in conference and might be able to pass during this session.

House leaders are hopeful a full understanding will be reached in the advance joint discussion of the matter.

Convention Sunday School Ass'n Expected To Be Great Success

Greensboro, Jan. 17.—The annual convention of the North Carolina Sunday School Association, to be held here April 28, 29 and 30, is expected to be one of the largest gatherings of Sunday School leaders ever held in the State. Reports from members of the association are to the effect that the full quota of delegates will be sent to attend the sessions of the convention.

A number of Sunday School workers of National repute will take part in the program. Among those that have been announced are: Miss Meme Brockway, Philadelphia, Pa., Secretary of Children's Division Work in the Northern Baptist church; Dr. Percy R. Hayward, Chicago, Ill., Superintendent of the Young People's Division for the International Council of Religious Education; Mr. Charles Darsie, St. Louis, Mo., Supt. of Adult and Teachers Training Work for the Christian Disciples Church; Thomas S. Evans, New York, General Secretary of the International Daily Vacation Bible School Association.

Basketball Regulations State-Wide H. School Contests Announced

Chapel Hill, Jan. 17.—Regulations governing the annual state-wide high school basketball contest were announced here yesterday following a meeting of the executive committee of the State High School Athletic Association.

The new regulations provided for scholarship and residence requirements. The committee voiced its determination that professionalism in any form will not be tolerated in the contests. A change in the eligibility rules makes it necessary for a student participating in the contests to be in a grade as high as the eighth instead of the seventh, as heretofore.

The committee drew up regulations along the same line to govern the high school contests in baseball, track and tennis. The committee also drew up tentative football regulations for the 1925 contest, these to be sent to the schools for an expression of opinion before the final regulations are adopted. A report by Secretary Rankin revealed that there are now 140 schools holding membership in the State High School Athletic Association.

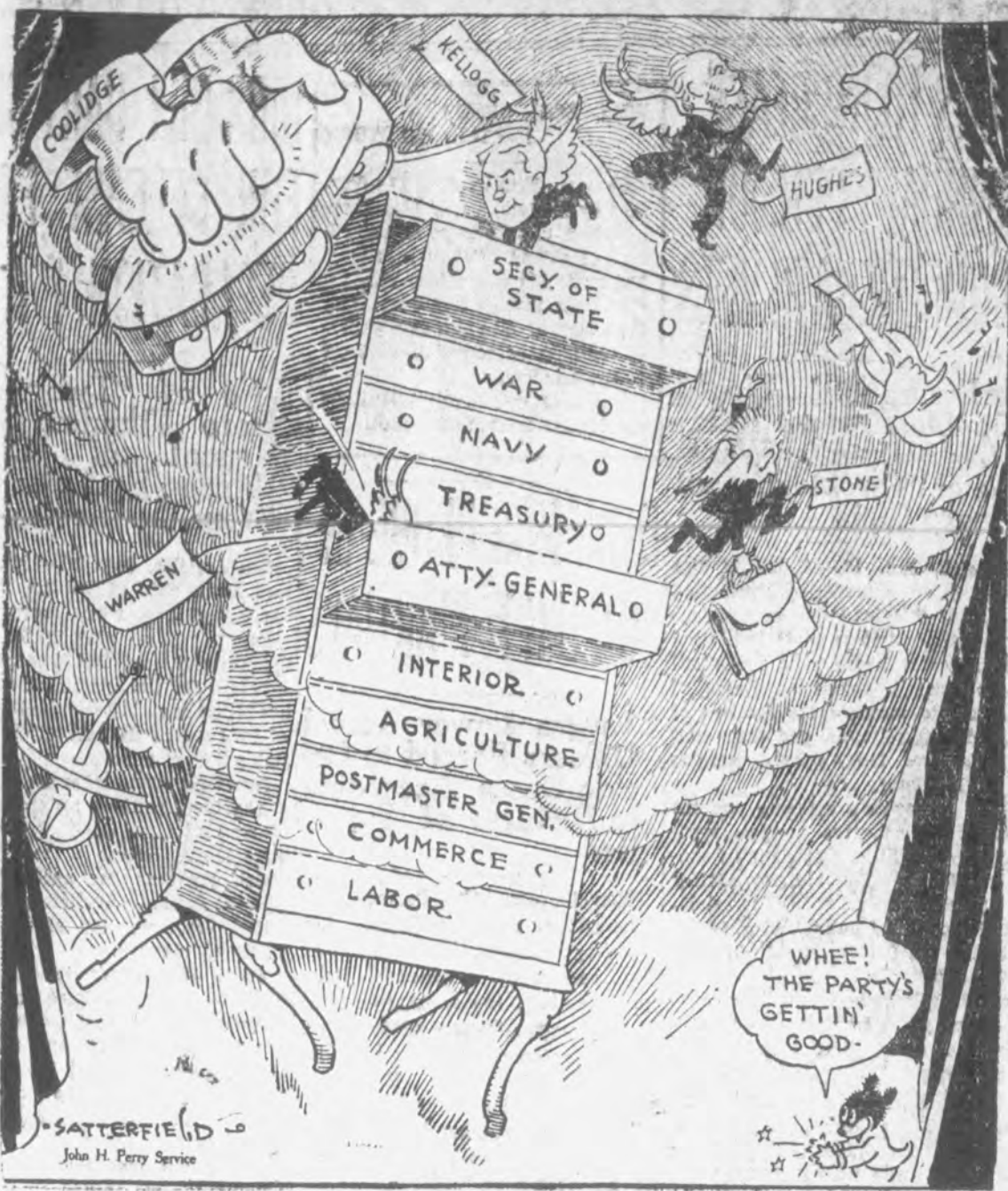

CONSERVATIVES MOVE QUICKLY IN SCRAPPING PLANS

London.—The change from Labor ideas to those which characterize the Conservative party has been no less speedily accomplished in the details of operation of the governmental department than has been the change in the attitude toward international and domestic problems.

One of the most noteworthy changes is the return of the elaborate departmental intercommunication system used by Marquess Curzon while he was chief at the foreign office and which the Laborites immediately scrapped on assuming office. The system required corps of clerks but was so operated that each official in each department and all the ministers knew at all times everything that was going on between Great Britain and other countries. The Labor government went back to the older system of communicating by note from chiefs to their assistants, but employees are back on the job again carrying out the Curzon methods.

Asheville, Jan. 12.—Four hundred million dollars is the estimated amount that will be spent by American golfers during the year 1925, according to a compilation of figures made by Henry Westall, a golf enthusiast of this city.

This sum includes the equipment used in play, the construction of golf links and club houses, and the expenses incidental to the game. The expenditure for golf balls alone, says Mr. Westall, will amount to \$30,000,000 while the matter of dues will cost players an estimated amount of \$100,000,000 which is the highest item on the list of expenditures. The next highest item is golf apparel marked up for \$50,000,000. Pay for caddies come next, the bag carrying boys receiving \$40,000,000 all told during the coming year.

"The average golfer will probably spend in the neighborhood of \$1,000 a year for his games and incidental expenses," says Mr. Westall, "so that the immense figure, prepared would give a total of 400,000 golfers in the United States. With the development of civic links, on which the expenses are very small, it can hardly be doubted that golfers in America will number 500,000 during the year 1925."

GAMBLING AMONG ENGLISH WOMEN ON INCREASE

London.—Betting and gambling are increasing enormously among the women of England and the "spirit of gambling seems to be in the very blood of our people," J. C. Meggitt, of Barry, declared at a recent conference here on "Sweepstakes, Betting and Gambling," promoted by the Young People's Department of the Congregational Union of England and Wales.

Mr. Meggitt said the newspapers are largely responsible for the growth of gambling because they foster it as a commercial proposition to increase their sales. Supporting this contention, another speaker said he had found in ten weekly papers he had examined at random 21 gambling competitions, offering nearly \$100,000 in prizes.

Rome Gets Ready for Pilgrims

Rome.—The big square in the shadow of the castle of St. Angelo has been leased by the municipal authorities to a Genoese restaurateur for the construction of a huge popular-priced restaurant to accommodate thousands of Holy Year pilgrims to Rome during 1925. The plot of ground, comprising about two acres, is now occupied by an amusement park, a miniature Coney Island, but all these gaudy trappings will be removed and open air restaurants pavilions installed where meals will be served at a flat rate of nine lire, about 40 cents, including a bottle of wine.

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, Jan. 17.—As recently noted by the report by the British Board of Trade and census reports, denoting large shipments of cloth and yarns from the United Kingdom and a large consumption by American mills during December, as well as the increasing takings of American cotton by the world, the textile business on both sides of the Atlantic continues to improve. Further more, the strength of the stock market reflects confidence in the future as to general trade conditions.

The United States continues to be drawn against heavily for raw cotton for shipment to England and the Orient, total shipments from America up to yesterday were 4,763,000 bales vs. 3,708,000 to corresponding date last season and the amount of cotton on shipboard at all United States ports yesterday awaiting to be exported was 218,000 bales vs. 86,000 one year ago. Including the quantity on shipboard at all United States ports, exports from the United States so far this season total nearly five million gales already or 4,981,000 vs. 3,692,000 last year. American mill stocks at the close of December were only 1,312,000 vs. 1,628,000 last season and as domestic mills have yet to buy largely for their future requirements and since exports from the United States promises to continue large, indications are that there will be no cotton left on this side of the Atlantic next summer, perhaps but little more than was on hand last summer when stocks were reduced to the minimum, the larger crop than last year by about three million bales notwithstanding.

For the present, however, these features of the situation are not fully appreciated. In fact they appear to be ignored for the time being more consideration being paid to the possibility of the next census showing report due January 23, showing 150,000 to 250,000 bales larger than the Government December Crop estimate or about 13,300,000 to 13,400,000 vs. 13,133,000.

While it is possible for market to work lower in event of liquidation continuing in advance of the census ginning report, an additional of 200,000 bales or so would not alter the general situation.

Meanwhile too much rain is falling in the central and eastern portions of the belt and not enough in Texas.

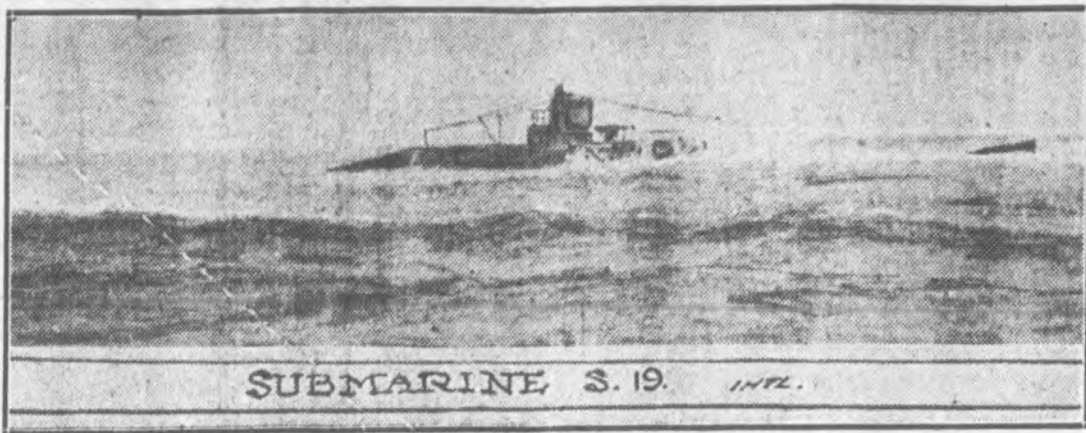

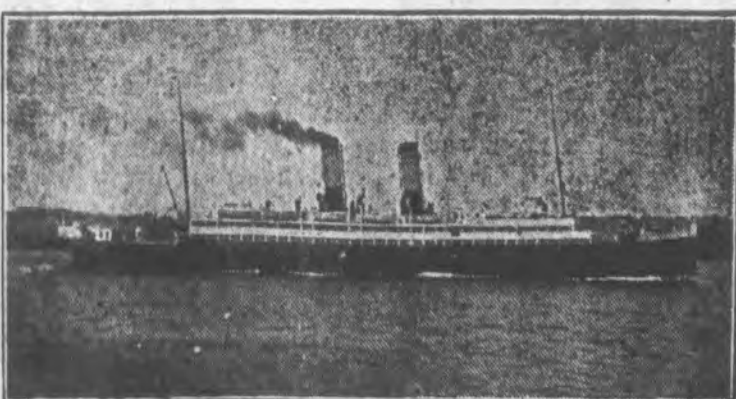
