

LEGISLATURE WILL HONOR THE MEMORY OF ROBT. E. LEE TONIGHT

SLAYING OF MOTHER BY GIRL OF SIXTEEN STARTS A CLEAN UP

M'KEITHAN WOULD HAVE STATE CARRY ITS OWN INSURANCE

Following Brief Session Lee Birthday Program Will Be Presented By United Daughters of the Confederacy

Raleigh, Jan. 19.—Memories of the "Old South" centered about the life of its military leader, General Robert E. Lee, will supercede legislative activity tonight.

Following a brief session of both houses of the General Assembly which will be called at 7.30, the hall of the House of Representatives will be turned over to the Johnson-Peddie Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy for a Lee's Birthday program. The principal address on this occasion will be delivered by Senator Hamilton C. Jones, of Mecklenburg county. W. H. S. Burgwyn, Senator of Northampton and president pro tempore of the upper house will preside.

Following adjournment of the General Assembly tonight a number of members of both houses will leave for Edenton where tomorrow they will attend a rally to be held under the auspices of the Coastal Highway Association. Delegations are expected from 10 counties at rally in the interest of a bridge across Chowan River.

No important legislation is expected until after the delivery by Governor McLean of his message Wednesday at noon. There are no bills pending involving the fiscal policy of the state due to the delay in submission of the revenue bill and the extension of time allowed the Budget Commission to report. Members of the commission this morning reiterated their previous assertion that there can at this time be no definite forecast made available for the coming biennial period or just how much of an increase will be necessary to meet the appropriations.

Women's Organizations of San Francisco Will Wage Campaign Against "Vamps" and "Sheiks"

San Francisco, Jan. 19.—The Women's Clubs and civic organization have started a campaign here against the activities of women designated as "Vamp," and men called "Sheiks" as a result of official disclosures touching on the night life of Dorothy Ellingson, 16, who shot her mother to death when the parent objected to the company and hours her daughter was keeping.

Police today questioned three men, all musician, and friends of the girl under arrest. They are charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

The slaying of Mrs. Ellingson was the subject of much pulp comment yesterday. The discussions stressed the need for more solidarity in the home and society.

Until yesterday the girl's age was accepted as 16. Mrs. Eric A. Bloom, who claimed to have had charge of Dorothy in December, 1912 and the early part of 1913, yesterday notified police here she was positive her former charge was more than 16 years old. The child in response to this stated yesterday that she would be 17 next April. Police announced that if it were disclosed that the girl was 18 she could be held liable under death penalty instead of life imprisonment although no woman has ever been subjected to capital punishment in California.

Cumberland Senator Declares He is Considering Introduction of Such Measure At Present Term

Raleigh, Jan. 19.—Senator E. R. McKeithan, of Cumberland, announced today that he is considering introducing a bill in the present session to provide for the state to carry its own fire insurance.

"The State of North Carolina," he declared, "is now paying out its practically fireproof buildings \$50,000 in insurance premiums. This risk should be carried by the state just as is now carried by the United States and has been carried by a number of other states for a long period of years."

"Had this sum gone into an apportionment fund for the last 10 years it would now amount to well over half a million dollars. The amount saved by this one item alone in two years to come would nearly pay for the expenses of the legislature."

"Think of it," Senator McKeithan added. "Here we are paying heavy fire insurance premiums on this old stone building—the capitol—and you couldn't burn it down in a week with torches."

Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover has declined to accept the post of Secretary of Agriculture in President Coolidge's Cabinet after March 4, and will remain in the Commerce post. It is reported from Washington that Roy A. Haynes, Federal Probation Commissioner, is to be superseded. Allan A. Ryan, one of America's richest men, has withdrawn his suit for \$1,000,000 against the New York Stock Exchange for expelling him for his famous corner in 1920. John J. Kelly, oldest employee in the point of service in the New York City post office, has been nominated for the New York postmastership by President Coolidge, succeeding the late Edward N. Morgan.

STATE BUDGET COM. SAYS AGREEMENT TO REQUEST CHANGE IN PRESENT SYSTEM DOES NOT OBLIGATE OUR GOVERNMENT

Body Will Recommend Placing of All Departments on Budget and Consolidation of Appropriations

Raleigh, Jan. 19.—The Budget Commission in making its report will recommend that state departments which heretofore have been drawing on the treasury without restriction be put on the budget basis, it was stated by a member of the commission today.

"Since we recessed last week," said the member "we have been busy trying to ascertain what amount it takes to run these departments. We have been going over the figures carefully. It will be remembered that Governor McLean in his campaign expressed himself as favoring a strict budgetary system for all departments. In order that this policy may be put into effect we have been making a careful survey with a view to making recommendations when our report is ready."

"Some departments in the past have not been subject to budgetary finding but it is the view of the budget commission that in order to establish a sensible financial policy for the state all departments should be put on a budget basis and not allowed to go over the amount allotted them each biennial period."

It was stated that a survey will have to be made to determine the exact needs of each department of the government and it is further intended that the commission as far as possible will endeavor to get all minor appropriation measures consolidated into one law so that the general appropriation bill will cover everything. At present, it is said, there are close to 75 laws under which money is allocated from the State Treasury and it is the commission's idea that these laws should be consolidated into one.

Secretary Hughes Declares Paris Agreement Imposes "No Obligation Legally Or Morally" On United States

Washington, Jan. 19.—Secretary Hughes issued today a formal statement that the agreement reached at the Paris conference of Allied Finance Ministers imposed "no obligations, legally or morally" on the United States and that this country remains as free from commitments in European matters as it ever was.

The statement said the full text of the agreement signed by Ambassador Kellogg and other American representatives would be made public as soon as it was received here. The resolution asking for a copy of the agreement, proposed by Senator Johnson, of California, is pending in the Senate with the approval of others of the irreconcilable veterans of the Versailles Treaty. From those and other quarters the State Department heard charges that the Paris agreement signed by Ambassador Kellogg had drawn the United States officially into involvement against which it has guarded itself ever since the close of the war.

Suggestions that the Paris agreement require submission to Congress are not regarded by administration leaders as valid. They take the view it has been the immemorial policy of the Washington government that the executive deals with all matters relating to the collection of claims against other nations.

The State Department reiterated today its denial of the story that Ambassador Kellogg sought to qualify the American signatures to the agreement with reservations involving the United States from any obligation or commitments in connection with the agreement. It was explained by the department that such a procedure was regarded as unnecessary. With approval the department regards the Paris negotiations as a closed incident. Mr. Hughes' statements said that officials have the full approval of President Coolidge who is said to have been fully advised as to all angles of the controversy.

No Ticks By '25 Is Slogan of N. C. Dept. Agriculture

Raleigh, Jan. 19 — "No ticks by '25" is the slogan of the North Carolina Department of agriculture according to a statement issued by the state Veterinarian Dr. William Moore. At the request of William A. Graham, commissioner of agriculture who has recently received a number of inquiries on the tick situation in North Carolina, Dr. Moore gave out the following statement:

"In 1906 the line of demarcation was at the foot of the Blue Ridge mountains. Today ticks have been eradicated in all but seven counties which are Columbus; Brunswick, Onslow Jones, Craven, Pamlico and Cartaret. In these vats have been built and the tick must go by next year.

"The law of 1923 divided the then remaining tick territory of 19 counties into three districts. The work was laid out for 1923, 1924 and 1925. The first two years' work has been completed and we are starting on the home stretch."

Commissioner Graham a member of the senate in 1923 when the law was passed was chairman of the committee on agriculture and fostered the bill.

Johnny Lee to Manage Kinston Baseball Club

Kinston, Jan. 19. — Johnny Lee, of Augusta, Ga., has been secured to manage the Kinston club in the Virginia League during the 1925 season, according to an announcement that has been made by the management of the Kinston Baseball Association. Lee will begin the task of assembling the players for the 1925 team at once, it is said.

WILL INTRODUCE A BILL TO ABOLISH STATE PRIMARY LAW

Raleigh, Jan. 19.—Representative W. W. Neal, of McDowell county, stated today he would tonight introduce a bill in the House of Representatives, designed to repeal the statewide primary law.

ENGLISH BATTLESHIP IS LED TO HER DOOM

Plymouth, England, Jan. 19.—Doomed to be destroyed by February 1, under the Washington Naval Agreement, the battleship Monarch was towed from her berth today at Plymouth breakerwater and taken to sea in sort of a funeral procession to a point 300 miles off Scilly Islands where she will be battered by the guns of the British Atlantic fleet.

The sinking will be the occasion of experimental tests by the Admiralty.

Clerical Forces of Railroads to Get An Increase in Wages

Chicago, Jan. 19 — The Railroad Labor Board decided today to grant increases in wages of approximately \$3,740,000 to clerical employees on 43 railroads in all sections of the country. Employees affected do not include those taken care of by the

INHERITANCES FROM AMERICA PROTECTED IN GALICIA'S COURTS

Warsaw.—The distribution of inheritances coming from America is the subject of a circular letter which the minister of justice has sent to all courts in Galicia.

The ministry learned that in many cases these courts, instead of paying over the money in compliance with the instructions of Polish consular officers in the United States based on verdicts given by American courts, re-opened proceedings and distributed legacies according to their own decisions.

The Polish courts are now forbidden to interfere in any way with the decisions of the United States courts as to the distribution of legacies, and the circular adds that though no legal convention between Poland and the United States exists, the decision of the American courts are to be respected by the officers of justice.

Say Submarine Being Used as Rum Runner

New York, Jan. 19.—Prohibition authorities are investigating reports that a submarine manned by a German crew has been bringing in from 1,000 to 3,000 cases of liquor during the last two weeks.

A tramp steamer acting as the mother ship of the submarine is said to be stationed 50 miles south of the patrol boats that surround the rum fleet off the New Jersey coast. It is reported to be disposing, by way of the submarine, of its cargo of 75,000 cases of whiskey to small craft hovering near the New Jersey shore.

MR. C. M. TUCKER, JR. DIED THIS MORNING

Prominent Farmer Dies After Three Weeks' Illness; Interment Tuesday Afternoon in Family Burying Ground

Mr. Charlie M. Tucker, Jr., 36, died in the Pitt Community hospital today after an illness of three weeks. Funeral services will be conducted from his late home Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock by the Rev. Leland W. Smith, interment following in the family burying ground.

Charlie M. Tucker was born on June 13th, 1888, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie M. Tucker who reside about three miles from Greenville. In December 1922, he was married to Miss Mary Hart of this city. Since their marriage they have been making their home with Mr. Tucker's parents. About three weeks ago he suffered an attack of influenza and despite all medical attention continued to grow weaker. He was brought to the hospital yesterday and died at 8:15 o'clock this morning.

The deceased was one of Pitt county's most successful farmers and for the past tobacco season held a position with Forbes and Morton. He was held in high esteem by a host of friends and was popular in tobacco circles. During the World War Mr. Tucker served his country most efficiently. He possessed a splendid character and will be greatly missed not only by friends in his community but by people throughout the county.

The deceased is survived by his wife, an infant daughter, Mary, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Tucker, two sisters, Mrs. S. I. Dudley and Miss Louise Tucker, one brother, Mr. Lloyd Tucker. He is also survived by a large number of relatives.

Buncombe County To Dispense With Community Fairs

Asheville, Jan. 19.—Buncombe county will dispense with the community fairs for the period of next fall at least, it was announced in a statement issued here by Dale Trash, County Agent. Efforts will be concentrated upon the Agricultural Exposition of the Western North Carolina, incorporated, which will be held early in November and communities will be urged to enter exhibit, at this time.

Outlines of the plans for the exposition will be made at the meeting of the board of directors of the exposition which will be held Wednesday, January 21, at which time officers for 1925 will also be chosen and committees appointed.

The growing of soy beans for seed this year will be urged upon the farmers with the Haberlandt being advised as the standard variety, according to the plans of the county agent, who states that during the past year several soy bean harvesters placed in the county during the past year period started in 1921.

Alleged to Have Dynamited Saltville Dam Causing Loss of Nine Lives When Lime Muck Flooded Valley

Bristol, Va., Jan. 19. — Roy Patrick, 29, held without bail in the county jail at Marion on a charge of having dynamited the dam at Saltville on Christmas Eve that cost the lives of 19 persons and caused tremendous property damage, reiterated his innocence of the charge today and maintained he would be able to prove an alibi.

Authorities claim to be in possession of evidence that Patrick planted several sticks of dynamite under the dam to dislodge the mountain of lime muck that swept down Holston River valley nearby and killed a number of persons.

Work of N. C. C. W. Be Handicapped Unless Given Appropriations

Greensboro, Jan. 19.—Work of the North Carolina College for Women located here will be greatly handicapped should the General Assembly fail to make the request for appropriations, is the expressed opinion of Dr. J. I. Faust, president of the College. He asserted that the estimates were made carefully and that they kept as low as possible.

According to the announcement, the college is asking for \$1,170,124 for maintenance for the next two years of which \$533,862 would be used the first year and \$636,262 the second year.

Under the appropriation, if made, the college plans to make needed repairs to old buildings at a cost of \$150,000; improve the campus streets for \$75,000; and erect several new buildings including an auditorium, education building, dining hall and dormitory. These all come under the building program of six year period started in 1921.

DYNAMITE SUSPECT IN RECENT TRAGEDY HELD WITHOUT BAIL

Will Meet to Discuss Ways and Means Secure Better Drainage for Farm Lands Eastern Carolina

The East Carolina Chamber of Commerce will hold a meeting in Greenville, tomorrow, Tuesday, January 20th, 1925, at 11 o'clock a. m. to consider ways and means to secure better drainage for farm lands in Eastern North Carolina.

This meeting will bring to Greenville, perhaps three, or four hundred people, for one day. It is hoped that the men of Greenville will devote the day in entertaining our visitors and in helping forward the purpose of this meeting. It is urged that the business men of the town meet at the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 10:30 o'clock tomorrow a. m., and make detail arrangement, for entertaining these guests for the day.

Mr. Bartlett, secretary of the East Carolina Chamber of Commerce, and others, including Dr. Brent S. Drain, State Geologist will be present. It has been suggested that our National Government is interested in this work and is giving consideration to a substantial appropriation for drainage in this section.

Mr. John Bridgers, father of Mr. S. L. Bridgers, of this city, died at his home in Elrod, Robeson County, at 10 o'clock last night, a victim of pneumonia. He was 80 years of age.

Mr. Bridgers was one of the most prominent farmers of Robeson County, a Confederate Veteran and an official member of the Presbyterian church. He is survived by his widow and nine children: Messrs: J. L. Bridgers, of Dillon, S. C.; J. E. and H. C. Bridgers, of Elrod; G. A. Bridgers, of Norfolk, Va.; A. V. Bridgers, of Florence, S. C.; N. D. Bridgers, of Colfax; S. L. Bridgers, of Greenville; Mrs. Edyth Barnard, of Dillon, S. C.; Mrs. R. H. Lee, of Norfolk, Va.

Funeral services were conducted this afternoon at 3 o'clock with burial taking place in the family burying ground.

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THE MODEL COUNTY GOVERNMENT

Pitt county indeed occupies a coveted position among the counties of the state from the standpoint of its county government, a fact that should be a source of great satisfaction to our citizens.

In urging better systems of county government throughout the state, Dr. E. C. Brooks, president of State College, has taken for his model Pitt County's government and yesterday's News and Observer carried a page article by Dr. Brooks in which he praised officials of this county for their keen insight into business methods and practice in their administration of affairs and likewise pays tribute to citizens of the county for their expression of intelligence in the selection of the Board of County Commissioners.

Describing Dr. Brooks's discourse as "the most constructive article of the New Year" the News and Observer says editorially:

There has been much discussion upon how to improve county government and much of it has been characterized by utter hopelessness. Much more has been predicated upon the theory that improvement must be preceded by radical, if not revolutionary, legislations, discarding all the present machinery and adopting entirely new formulas and agencies. It is not so much in plans as in wise operation that reforms are secured. Pope

uttered words of wisdom when he said:

For forms of government let fools contest;
Whate'er is best administered is best;
For modes of faith let graceless zealots fight;
His can't be wrong whose life is in the right.

One successful object-lesson is worth a ton of theory. Dr. Brooks tells the story of what has been done in the county of Pitt—not what has been suggested or talked about—but what practical, sensible men wholly devoted to the public weal have actually accomplished. The men responsible for the improved government in Pitt county had no special training, they are not supreme. They are just sensible citizens who saw the need of business methods and who carried them into effect. What has been done in Pitt can be done in every county in North Carolina if devotion to the public duty is the chief aim of all officials. Petty policies and selfish interests alone stand in the way. Undoubtedly legislation could give aid and direction, but the need is to secure the right conception of government and to elect men who have an eye single to the public weal.

LEE'S EXAMPLE

The South today celebrates the 117th anniversary of the birth of General Robert E. Lee, whose character, courage and ideals formed the foundation upon which the Greater South has been built above the ruins resulting from the strife between the states.

Despite his almost penniless condition following the war, the Great General refused flattering offers that would have assured him personal wealth and comfort, to devote his life to the education and uplift of his people. He was a dreamer of dreams and labored unceasingly to make these dreams come true having foremost in mind the preservation of the Union against which he had lifted the sword in a cause which he had believed to be just.

The memory of this great leader is close to the hearts of his people and the following of his example of untiring, unselfish service is leading ever toward the goal of the greater accomplishments of which he dreamed.

CHARTERS GRANTED

Baleigh, N. C. Jan. 19.—Mrs. Edith Vanderbilt, T. W. Raoul, J. F. A. Cecil and J. G. Adams, all of Biltmore Forest, Biltmore, are among the incorporators named in a certificate of incorporation issued by Secretary of State W. N. Everett. The corporation will be known as the Biltmore Forest Horse Show Association and is a non-stock organization.

The object of the corporation, according to the charter, is to promote and foster interest in horses and to conduct horse shows in Western North Carolina. The charter is granted for an unlimited period and the corporation will be operated on a non-profit basis, the net income of the association to be used in furthering the purposes of the association.

Other certificates of incorporation issued included the following:

GERMANY SEEKS TRAVELERS TO USE ITS RAILROAD CARS

Duesseldorf.—The German Railway Administration is introducing American efficiency methods.

The bureaucracy, inherited from imperial times, is giving place to business methods. Various subdivisions, such as divisional chiefs are

being given much wider latitude of decision and their initiative is thus being strengthened. By way of reducing operating expenses, the administration is negotiating for the acquisition of saw mills, steel works, etc., in which much of the equipment needed is to be made.

The change of spirit is most noticeable in connection with advertising methods. A comprehensive scheme has been mapped out for popularizing travel on the railways of the Reich through folders, maps, moving picture films, and travel agencies maintained in foreign centers.

So long as the railway system was merely a department of government there was little done to make active propaganda for the roads. A trained advertising staff is now at work to change this.

Just as soon as the railway administration is on its feet financially, more comfortable cars are to be constructed and put into service.
