

DRAINAGE MEN IN SPLENDID MEETING HERE THIS MORNING

Prominent Speakers Emphasize Importance of Real Drainage for Eastern Carolina

The meeting held in Greenville, today, called by the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, for the purpose of discussing a section wide drainage program for Eastern North Carolina, was well attended, even though the weather has been very inclement for the past few days.

John W. Holmes, of Farmville, President of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce, presided over the meeting. Secretary N. G. Bartlett, of the Eastern Carolina Chamber, acted as secretary of the meeting. In his opening remarks, President Holmes emphasized the importance of real drainage program for Eastern North Carolina, stating that much land, now productive, within a few years, unless the water is taken care of, will be useless. Attorney Frank Wooten of Greenville, who has had quite a good deal of actual experience with putting drainage districts through in Pitt county, outlined in a very clear cut manner, just how the projects are put over. Mr. Wooten stressed the fact that this is an economic problem, in that the real wealth of the people is at stake. Other, who took part in the discussion, giving excellent ideas as to the importance of the project, were, Engineers Rivers, Rogers and Lupton.

Mr. Hodges from Beaufort county expressed his full belief that drainage pays, and pays handsomely. Mr. Whitehurst of Bethel, who is interested in the big project now in course of construction near Bethel, was very enthusiastic. W. J. Manning, another resident of the Bethel district, stated that while many were opposed to that project before it started, they are all for it now.

The main address was made by Hon. Brent S. Drane, director Geological and Economic Survey of the state, who outlined the importance of the project, yet at the same time cautioned those present to be conservative in their undertaking. Mr. Drane has had several years of actual drainage projects, not only in Eastern Carolina but in New Mexico. He is thoroughly conversant with every phase of the work.

A resolution was passed authorizing the President to appoint a committee of 9 who will be the Ways and Means committee to work out a definite program to follow. This program to be submitted to a general meeting to be held in Washington, N. C., February 3, at 11 o'clock. This committee is composed of John W. Holmes, Farmville; J. E. Winslow, Greenville; Fred Latham, Belhaven; Kader Crawford, Williamston; W. B. Rodman, Jr., Washington; F. M. Wooten, Greenville; B. S. Drane, Raleigh; W. W. Griffin, New Bern; John H. Small, Washington. Secretary Bartlett was made an ex-officio member of the committee. This committee will meet in Greenville, next Tuesday at 11 o'clock to begin the work of formulating a program for the big meeting to consider at the meeting in Washington, Feb. 3.

DUTCH AVIATOR PROPOSES FLIGHT TOUCHING 5 CONTINENTS

Amsterdam, Jan.—An ambitious project of a world flight embracing all five continents is planned for early in 1926 by Lieutenant G. A. Koppen, chief instructor at the Soesterberg military airbase. TESTIMONY DRAWS SENATOR EDWARDS INTO RUM SCANDAL

Government Agents Declare New Jersey Senator is Link Between Bootleg Buyers and Ring Head

Jersey City, Jan. 20.—Senator Edward I. Edwards of New Jersey was mentioned today in the Weehawken rum scandal during the trial of twelve persons indicted for prohibition law violation when two government dry agents testified that the Senator served as a link between the bootleg buyers and William F. Griffin, alleged "master mind" of the conspiracy.

Charles Hurburt, prohibition agent under Divisional Chief Merrick, of New York, testified that on November 14, 1923, he had given Senator Edwards \$3,800 which was to be held for payment to Griffin for such whiskey as was delivered to him. Griffin became suspicious and the deal did not go through and the money was returned, the agent testified. John Milton, prosecuting attorney said that at the conclusion of the trial he would give very serious consideration of presenting to the grand jury the evidence implicating Senator Edwards.

Another witness, Arthur Vantasell, also a dry agent, agent, later corroborated the testimony declaring he had seen Hurburt and Wilson, another dry agent, in conference with a man believed by him to have been Senator Edwards, who is president of the First National Bank of New Jersey. Hurburt also testified he and Wilson called on the Senator in his office in the bank on November 14 and had a half hour conference with him on the matter of the liquor deal.

Washington, Jan. 20.—Senator Edwards, of New Jersey, today declined to comment on the testimony given in Jersey City bringing his name into the Weehawken rum scandal.

The Senator told the Associated Press that he would reply to the charges at the proper time and added that anyone who undertook to quote him as commenting on the affair did so entirely without authority.

SAN FRANCISCO MAY EXTEND ITS BOUNDARIES TO SAN MATEO

San Francisco—San Francisco's population will be increased by about 50,000 if plans under way for consolidation of San Mateo county with the city go through. It is San Francisco's first attempt at annexation.

With its oak-studded, rolling foothills that merge into the Coast Range, San Mateo is one of the show places of California. Thousands of San Francisco business men and workers live in the suburban towns of Burlingame, Hillbore, San Mateo and Menlo Park.

The cities across the bay, Oakland, Berkeley and Alameda, together with the San Mateo communities, combine to give San Francisco and its environs a population estimated at 1,500,000.

MRS. FERGUSON IS INAUGURATED GOV. OF TEXAS TODAY

Woman Governor of Texas Says She Will Invite Number of Women to Take Part in Administration

Austin, Texas, Jan. 20.—Mrs. Miriam Amanda Ferguson today was inaugurated as the first woman governor of Texas, the ceremony took place at noon in the hall of the home of Representative, where 10 years ago her husband, James E. Ferguson, was sworn into office and where nearly three years later he was impeached and removed from the governor's chair.

The induction program was brief and simple. Chief Justice C. M. Cureton using the Bible dating back to the induction of the first governor of Texas administered the oath to Mrs. Ferguson. A three inch gun mounted at the entrance of the capitol fired a salute of honor to the new executive after the oath had been taken.

To Mrs. Ferguson the inauguration represents the final stepping stone to her long endeavor to clear the family name of the stigma of her husband's impeachment.

Team work will be the motto of her administration, Mrs. Ferguson declared in her inaugural address. Progress in matters of spiritual as well as material will be striven for, she said, the first woman governor of the state and advised that she expected to invite a number of women to take part in her administration.

NOBLES IS FOUND "NOT GUILTY" OF ASSAULT ON DIXON

State vs. J. L. Nobles Consumes First Day's Session; Several Cases On Docket

A verdict of "not guilty" in the case of State vs. J. L. Nobles charged with assault with deadly weapon on W. C. Dixon, consumed yesterday's and this morning's session of Pitt County's Superior Court for the trial of criminal cases.

The case grew out of charges against Nobles when he attempted to arrest W. C. Dixon several weeks ago. According to evidence produced by the state Nobles used too much force, in his attempt to arrest Dixon, while the defendant contended that Dixon resisted him to the extent that he was compelled to use force, arresting him. Several witnesses appeared for both sides and much evidence was produced.

TWO CHILDREN DIE IN FIRE; FOUR ARE THROWN TO SAFETY

Mother and Daughter Hurl Children From Second Window as the Flames Cut Off Other Escape

Providence, R. I., Jan. 20.—Two children perished and four others were saved from death by being hurled from a second story window in a fire early today. Marion Browning, 16, eldest of six children discovered the fire in the tenement and awakened her mother. Together they took two small children, four and six years of age, from their beds and dropped them from the window 30 feet to the frozen ground after finding the two stairways enveloped in flames. A fifteen years old boy was also assisted to the window and pushed out. All three children escaped without serious injury.

The mother and daughter then attempted to reach the room occupied by George and Walter, 12 and 13, but were driven back by the flames. Finally losing hope the mother and daughter jumped from the window and received severe injuries in the fall. The two boys left in bed suffocated. The father was a railroad employee and was at work at the time of the tragedy.

State College and N. C. Poultry Clubs Be Represented N. Y.

Raleigh, Jan. 19.—State College and the Boy and Girls Poultry Clubs of North Carolina will be represented at the Madison Square Garden Poultry Show that is to be held in New York during the week of January 19, according to an announcement made by F. H. Jeter, Agricultural Editor of the North Carolina Extension Division.

The poultry clubs will have an exhibit of farm-raised poultry, and these birds will be entered against birds grown by poultry fanciers all over the United States. Allen G. Oliver, Poultry Extension Specialist of the State College of Agriculture has assisted the club members in selecting the birds to be shown, and they come from Wake, Anson and Catawba counties.

The Madison Square Garden Poultry show, it is stated, is the world's largest poultry show and the number of exhibits this year is said to be larger than ever before. North Carolina has participated in shows in the past and it is said, has never yet placed an exhibit without winning several valuable prizes.

A team of three students, and one alternate, selected from the class in poultry science at State College, will attend the show and will compete in an inter-collegiate poultry judging contest. The poultry department is under the direction of Dr. B. F. Kaupp and he will accompany the team to New York.

Dr. Kaupp, who is recognized as a national authority on poultry, has been invited to address the educational section of the show on Friday night, January 23. Dr. Kaupp has announced that he will speak on the "Control of Diseases and Pests."

Charlotte Mayor Is Seriously Ill

Charlotte, Jan. 20.—Harvey W. Moore, mayor of Charlotte, is in a serious condition in a hospital here. He was seized by an attack of stomach trouble while returning from New York with Mrs. Moore. An operation was performed yesterday.

RAINS CAUSE LOSS LIFE AND PROPERTY THROUGH SOUTH

Ten Persons Known to Have Lost Lives and Heavy Property Damage Resulted From Recent Rains

Atlanta, Jan. 20.—With the list of dead standing at 10 with railroad and motor traffic demoralized and heavy property loss sustained the crest of the flood which has been acute in several southern states since Saturday night, early today is believed to be passing.

In southern Georgia where the menace and damages have probably been greatest many streams were receding and fair weather was promised for today. Because of predicted continued rain along the tributaries, in north Georgia, however, it is expected the recession will be gradual. No estimate of the property damage was available early today although the amount is expected to be large.

Three of the dead were trainmen died in wrecks attributed to the flood in Georgia and Alabama Sunday. Two white men disappeared near Albany, Ga., Saturday night and four negroes were drowned at Hammond, La., and one negro at Columbus, Ga.

Fair weather was promised today in Mississippi, Alabama and Louisiana as the streams began to return to their beds. Every stream in southern Georgia is out of its banks and rivers normally no wider than 100 feet extend over the lowlands to a width of one to five miles.

Charlotte, Jan. 20.—Scores of tourists bound for Florida being held up here and in other surrounding cities and towns as a result of the heavy rains which have flooded streams to the south and made roads virtually impassable.

Some are storing their cars here and continuing their trip by rail while others are remaining at hotels pending a let up in the heavy rains.

A total of 1.19 inches of rain fell here yesterday bringing the total for January up to 6.31 inches.

Piedmont Council Boy Scouts Led During Year 1924

Gastonia, Jan. 20.—The Piedmont Council of Boy Scouts of America, covering Gaston, Cleveland, Lincoln and Ruthford counties, with headquarters in this city, led the entire South Atlantic states during the year 1924 with the largest growth in membership of full-fledged scouts and was one of the honor Councils in the South with the least financial support, according to an announcement that has been made by Scout Executive Robert M. Schiele, supervisor of the council.

The Piedmont Council was organized one year ago, states Mr. Schiele, with a handful of scouts and scout executive, as a nucleus. Today there are over 700 scouts and 300 scoutmasters, commissioners, executives and court of honor judges, bringing the total above the one-thousand mark.

Kay Dixon, president of the local organization, R. V. George R. Gillespie, local commissioner and Scout Executive Schiele headed the organization, and, it is stated, in the face of a "serious financial difficulty, with no funds on hand to guarantee a continuance of the work," they have established a successful council.

At the meeting last week of the North and South Carolina scout officials, in Charlotte, the Piedmont Council had its usual exhibit of scout craft on display. It was proclaimed by the Regional Executive of Scouting in America as the best collection in the entire South. Executive Schiele states that the North Carolina State Fair Association has asked that the exhibit be entered at the State Fair next fall.

Prospects for Averting Coal Mine Strike Slim

Scranton, Pa., Jan. 20.—Prospects of averting the threatened strike tomorrow of 60,000 coal miners in district number one of the United Mine Workers here appeared dim today. Agents today continued their efforts to prevent the general walkout.

Among other speakers scheduled at this time are Willis Alton Park, district Representative of the Playgrounds and Recreation Association of America, of Charlotte and A. W. Honeycutt, superintendent of schools at Hendersonville, N. C. Mr. Honeycutt will speak on the "Progress of Physical Education in North Carolina." CHINA SEEKS AMERICAN AID IN ORGANIZING LIBRARIES

Chicago. — Dr. Arthur E. Bostwick of St. Louis will visit China early in 1925 to confer with Chinese librarians, educators, and public officials on the Chinese public library movement. He will go as the official representative of the American Library Association which made the appointment in response to a request from the Chinese National Association for the Advancement of Education.

Dr. Bostwick will visit important libraries in the principal cities and universities and will seek conferences with people acquainted with library history and development. Chinese educators believe that Dr. Bostwick's long experience in library administration in America and his observations of the Chinese situation will enable him to make an important contribution to their plans for the popularizing of libraries in China.

Dr. Bostwick is a distinguished librarian. He has been president of the American Library Association, the American Library Institute, the New York State Library Association, and the Missouri Library Commission.
