GENERAL ASSEMBLY
HALTS SESSIONS TO
ATTEND DEDICATION

Fish and Game Law
Probably to Be Pre-
sented Tonight; The
Vehicle Light Law Re-
ported Favorably

Raleigh, Jan. 23.—The legislative wheels were at a standstill this morning while members of the General Assembly and state officials attended the dedication of Manning Hall, the University of North Carolina's new law school building at Chapel Hill.

The legislators left for the Hill in special busses shortly after nine o'clock. A number of them were accompanied by their wives.

The General Assembly was to get back into action again tonight when the Senate reconvenes at 7:30 and the House at eight.

Two important measures are likely to be introduced tonight. One by Senator Samps would amend the constitution with reference to canvassing of the vote by the state following each general election. The other backed by members of the State Game League would include a code of statewide game laws and place enforcement under the State Fisheries Commissioner with its name changed to the State Fish and Game Commission.

Senator Samps, in discussing today his proposed amendment to the constitution stated that when the constitution was drawn there was no election board and it was the duty of the General Assembly to canvass the vote. Now, however, he declared, the board of elections may perform this duty and thus the election result could be declared sometimes before the General Assembly meets and the governor and other state officers could be sworn in either prior to or on the first day of the session. He contended this would give the executive an opportunity to frame his message to the legislature and would thus avoid the waste of time by the General Assembly while awaiting the initial message of the chief executive.

Several reports on statewide bills are ready to be submitted. The Roads Committee of the House voted favorably on the bill introduced by Representative W. W. Neal which provides that all horse-drawn vehicles traveling the public highways at night shall carry a light. The committee deferred action on the bill providing for liability insurance for drivers of motor vehicles.

There have been no further developments on the bills introduced yesterday calling for additional bond issues of \$35,000,000 to complete the State Highway system and the increase of a cent a gallon in the gasoline tax as an aid in taking care of this issue. Members consulted as to their views on this piece of legislation expressed desire today not to be quoted.

FATE OF POSTAL PAY
BILL IN SENATE NOW
HANGS IN BALANCE

Senate Asked to Vote
On Point of Order
Eliminating Sections
Providing for Rate In-
creases

Washington, Jan. 23.—The fate of the Postal Pay and Rate Increase Bill in the Senate today on a point of order to eliminate the proposed rate advances. The vote to eliminate the entire half of the bill carrying the rate increases was brought over from yesterday's session after the point of order had been raised by Senator Swanson, Democrat of Virginia, that all revenues raised by legislation must originate in the House under the constitution. He was supported by Democratic Senators in his contention both yesterday afternoon and today's debate.

Should the point of order be sustained in the Senate this afternoon the legislation will carry only the pay increase provisions leaving it in the same form as the bill previously given the veto of President Coolidge which was sustained by the Senate.

Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, in charge of the legislation bill indicated that in the event the point of order was sustained by the Senate he would not press the bill from approval.

NEW LAW BUILDING
OF UNIVERSITY WAS
DEDICATED TODAY

Josephus Daniels Ac-
cepts Manning Hall
From State for the
University Trustees

Chapel Hill, Jan. 23.—Duty of lawyers is to place the just administration of the laws above the acquittal or triumph of their clients, it was declared by Josephus Daniels here today in accepting on behalf of the trustees, the Manning Memorial Building at the University of North Carolina.

The Raleigh editor added that he hoped in the new building would be trained men who would go out with the high sense of responsibility "guided by high ethics which show respect for the tribunal set up to protect life and property."

The dedication ceremonies were attended by a large number of prominent persons from all parts of the state. The General Assembly attended in a body but the Governor was unable to be present. Lieutenant-Governor J. Elmer Loug, acting for the governor, presented the building to the trustees.

The building is a memorial to the late Dr. John Manning who was professor of law at the University in the early eighties.

Claim and Delivery
Papers Issued for
Body of Negress

Wilmington, Jan. 23.—Claim and delivery papers for the body of Henrietta Jackson, negress, have been issued here by Justice W. A. McGowan to J. W. Davis.

Justice McGowan, in commenting on the procedure, stated that Henrietta Jackson raised two children, neither of which were her own—Davis' wife and Son McNeal. He said that the demand for the claim and delivery papers was accompanied by the information that Davis and his wife had paid insurance premiums on the old woman's life and that they wished to use the full amount of money for her burial. However, it was said that McNeal was in possession of the body and declined to let his foster sister and her husband proceed with their plans. The papers have been placed in the hands of Constable George Smith. The replevy bond was fixed at \$10.

SCIENTISTS WILL
STUDY ECLIPSE OF
SUN TOMORROW

Make Elaborate Plans
for Observations From
Land and Air to Wrest
Secrets From Sky

New York, Jan. 23.—Such eastern states so fortunate to be in the path of totality were ready and waiting today for the phenomenon which will sweep out of the west tomorrow morning and plunge the section into temporary darkness, during the first total eclipse of the sun in 450 years.

Fair weather is predicted for the hour of the eclipse but scientists pointed out today that such a prediction is no assurance the phenomenon will be visible from the ground as even one cloud properly placed might easily blot out the spectacle. To prevent such an occurrence and spell the many preparations made by scientific organizations to study the eclipse with the hope of wresting secrets from the skies which are hoped to attain at any other time, plans to make observations from widely separated points, both from land and the air are being made. The giant dirigible Los Angeles will sail aloft during the eclipse with a band of scientists who will photograph the phenomenon from different localities while similar observations will be made from army airplanes from Mitchell field with huge telescopic cameras.

The progress of the eclipse as it rushes through the east will be broadcast over radio under the auspices of the Scientific American which will receive telephone and telegraph reports from strategic points along the line of the rushing shadow's path.

OPIUM CONFERENCE
NOW APPEARS TO BE
DESTINED TO FAIL

Conference Between
British and American
Representatives Fails
to Produce the Needed
Money

Geneva, Jan. 23.—A private meeting today between Representative Stephen G. Porter, of the United States, and Viscount Cecil, of Great Britain, in an attempt to save the opium conference from a breakdown, resulted in failure.

Mr. Porter stated that unless conditions changed radically he would return to the United States within a few days.

"I consider the situation has reached such a state that my continued presence would imperil the Hague's opium convention," Lord Cecil told Mr. Porter he had not looked favorably upon the proposals by some of the smaller states to adjourn the conference for a year but said his decision on this point was not final. He asked the American representative to remain until completion of the narcotics and drug convention leaving the question of opium smoking for further treatment in the future. Porter declined this proposal because he believes the two to be inseparable. Other efforts to save the conference will continue this afternoon.

Tokio, Jan. 23.—1,700 persons are reported to be dead as the result of an influenza epidemic in greater Tokyo started about 20 days ago.

CONNECTICUT FIGHTS FOR CHAPMAN.

In the meantime he has been returned to the Federal prison in Atlanta, Ga., from which he escaped while serving a twenty-five-year sentence for a \$2,400,000 mail robbery in New York City. GOVT. WILL RELEASE
CHAPMAN TO FACE A
CHARGE OF MURDER

Notorious Robber Will
Be Transferred From
Atlanta to Connecti-
cut State Courts for
Trial for Life

Washington, Jan. 23.—Unless legal technicalities prove as bars the doors of the Atlanta Federal Prison will release Gerald Chapman, notorious robber, for one more adventure in his checkered career of crime—a trial with a death penalty.

Federal officials have agreed to turn Chapman over to Connecticut authorities for trial on indictments charging first degree murder in connection with a store robbery in New Britain last October. Chapman is charged with killing James Skelly, an officer, during the robbery.

Chapman was serving a 25 years sentence for his \$2,400,000 New York mail truck hold-up in October, 1921 when he escaped from Atlanta a year ago. He was recently recaptured in Muncie, Indiana, and was returned to Atlanta yesterday.

Assistant Attorney General Donovan consented to Chapman's transfer from federal to state jurisdiction yesterday. State Attorney Alcorn has assured him that evidence against Chapman for murder is indisputable and complete.

State College to
Be Represented At
Poultry Contest

Raleigh, Jan. 23.—North Carolina State College will be represented at the Inter-Collegiate Poultry Judging Contest, which is to be held in New York tomorrow, in connection with the Madison Square Garden Poultry Show, by J. F. Bullock, of Hester, C. F. Parrish, of Climax, and J. S. Moore, of Gulf, with W. W. Keever, of Lincoln, according to an announcement made by Prof. B. F. Kaupp, head of the poultry department of State College.

The team will be accompanied to New York by Professor Kaupp and W. F. Armstrong. Mr. Kaupp will address the educational section of the show tomorrow night.

Three members of the team, Bullock, Moore and Keever are junior poultry students at State College and Parrish is a senior poultry student.

CHARTER PRESENTED
PAMPTICO DISTRICT
COUNCIL BOY SCOUTS

Regional Scout Execu-
tive Makes Presen-
tation to Tri-County Or-
ganization Here Last
Night

The Pamptico District Council of Boy Scouts, embracing Beaufort, Martin and Pitt counties, on last night was presented a charter from the National Council of Boy Scouts of America, by Regional Scout Executive, O. H. Hunter of Atlanta, Ga. The meeting was held in the high school auditorium here and was attended by members of the council executive committee and representatives from the various towns throughout the three counties. There were also present scout executives and officials of nearby scout councils including Goldsboro, Kinston and Wilson.

Mr. Hunter in addressing those present explained the scout movement and what it means to the community and stressed community's duty to the boys and girls of today. The purposes of the scout movement, he said, are to make secure the future of our nation and the world by training them upon whose shoulder, soon will fall the duties of citizenship to be qualified for that position. Every scout takes an oath to be true to his duties to God, country, others and himself and it is the teaching of these duties in such a way as to keep the boy interested that the scout movement is being devoted. The little mind can find plenty of wrong to do while in the mind that is filled with wholesome thoughts there is no place for the great temptations, he added.

Following his address Mr. Hunter presented the charter to Mr. J. E. Winslow, of this city, president of the Pamptico Council. The acceptance address was made by Mr. R. H. Wright at the request of Mr. Winslow and was an inspiration to all those present to renew their efforts in behalf of the boys of today and the future that the world might be a better place in which to live.

Appropriate songs, for the occasion led by Mr. Colin Stokes, of Ayden, and Prof. J. H. Rose, of this city, added to the enjoyment of the meeting.

Following the charter presentation ceremonies there was a brief business session of the executive committee of the council at which a program for immediate operations of the council and other business matters were discussed.

On motion of Mr. Frank Kugler, of Washington, the committee adopted resolutions urging members of the present General Assembly to use their influence to have enacted at the present session, suitable laws for the protection and conservation of fish and game throughout the state.

Inclement Weather
Continues to Have
Effect Employment

Raleigh, Jan. 23.—The inclement weather continues to have its effect upon employment conditions throughout the state, especially in regard to unskilled labor, according to the report of the State-Federal Employment Service issued here today for the week ending January 17.

In some sections of the state, according to the report, the supply and demand for common labor is about equal with a surplus of domestic workers in others. Clerical workers and truck drivers are also said to exceed the demand.

Prospects for improvement in the general situation are said to be good, providing the weather clears up and outdoor work can be resumed.

A total of 394 persons, 144 men and 250 women were placed by the Service in the state during the week, according to the compiled report. The workers placed, according to the various classifications were: skilled 94; unskilled 319; clerical and professional 58; industrial 2; domestic 121.

The report shows that there was a total of 808 registrations during the week, 589 men and 219 women, and the Service received 625 requests for help, 457 of which were for men, and 163 for women. The number referred is placed at 657, with 481 and 176, men and women respectively.

UGLY ARCHITECTURE DESTROYING BEAUTY OF FAMOUS OXFORD

Oxford, Eng.—The Roebuck on the Cornmarket, famous in the days of coaching and well known to American tourists as one of the old houses of Oxford, is to be torn down to make way for a Woolworth store. This is but one of the changes Oxford is seen to know, for many of the old houses will soon expire and the stately timbered houses of the Broad and Holywell, with their carved facades and overhanging upper stories, will be replaced by modern shops and garages. Oxford is no more the quiet retreat of the scholar, but a busy and dirty trading and manufacturing town, noted for the production of marmalade, beer and cheap motor cars. The university which once held complete sway, enforcing order with its own police and bullying all mere tradesmen, is now becoming a secondary interest. The town has fought the town for 600 years, often in pitched battles with swords and bludgeons, but at last the town has won.

From being one of the most beautiful cities in Europe Oxford bids fair to become the ugliest. English architecture, and especially public and commercial architecture, has created very little of beauty in the past 200 years, and is not now changing its habits. In Oxford even the best efforts of noted modern architects have created only ugly and ill-proportioned piles of stodgey Renaissance and holo-and-corner Gothic, while the suburbs are one dreary wall of the worst brick and gingerbread.

The noise of street traffic has become a great nuisance to students who want to work. Time was when a noisy carter or drayman was pretty sure to become the target of cloth-yard arrows shot from the windows of frugal scholars, but today a regulation forbids the use of bows and arrows except for innocent sport, and now the motorist may honk his loudest in safety.

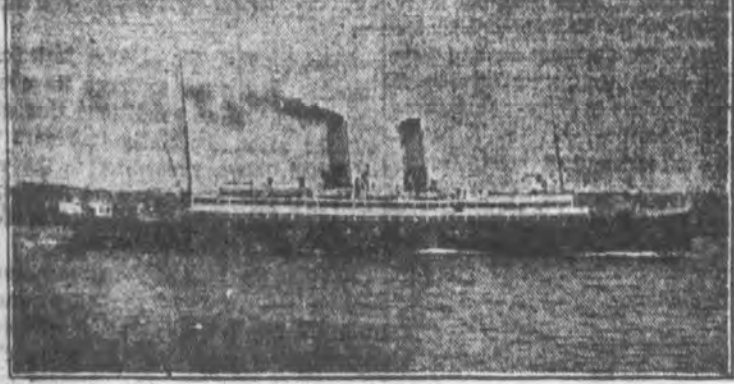

MISFORTUNE STALKS MEN OF EDUCATION IN AUSTRIAN CAPITAL

Vienna. — The hosts of cripples who for years after war molested the frequenters of Vienna cafes and restaurants for alms have of late diminished in number. The majority of them contracted consumptions from exposure and have died.

The place, however, of these mendicants have been taken by hundreds from among the thousands of bank-clerks who lost their jobs as a result of failures of many little banks and the reduction of the staffs of the remainder.

The number of banks in Vienna began to increase with the issue of each successive loan during the World War and broke all records (one bank to every 1000 inhabitants) for a country with only 6,500,000 population when the period of inflation was at its height. At this time many hundreds of students at colleges and universities were talked over into abandoning their studies and accepting handsomely paid situations in the dozens of banks cropping up every week.

The financial slump of the past summer deprived these youths of their positions with the result that they are now to be met in every possible and impossible nook and corner seeking relief. Some are learning to become chauffeurs or are conductors on street cars, while a great many spend the day hawking note-books, pencils, calendars and even matches in cafes and restaurants. All of them are men of higher education but this avails them naught. Four thousand of them were let out during the last four months, and many more are to be discharged with the beginning of 1925.

The government has been petitioned to contribute funds towards the erection of sheds wherein these men may find shelter when rendered homeless. What makes their lot in Austria most distressing is that there is not ghost of a chance for any of them to get new births in banks. Business is at a standstill. Then the Austrian laws forbid any man to work at any trade to which he has not been apprenticed. This makes it impossible for these unfortunates to do anything but hawk goods or sweep the streets. But both of these occupations likewise are crammed full.

A large crowd of members of the Tobacco Growers Co-operative Association and The N. C. Cotton Growers Co-operative Association met yesterday in their tobacco warehouse here, for the purpose of forming a Credit Group in order to secure money for members of the two associations in this section who will need to borrow some, through The N. C. Agricultural Credit Corporation of Raleigh, N. C.

A group was formed which will be known as the "Greenville, N. C. Credit Group" and stock subscribed for in the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Columbia, S. C. to the amount of \$4,000.00 by members of the associations present which makes available for use by members in this immediate section the amount of \$10,000.00 on terms of six to nine months. The N. C. Agricultural Credit Corporation putting up ten times the amount of stock subscribed locally. The amount of capital in this group will be increased from time to time as the applications for loans by the associations members may demand.

Other like Credit Groups are being formed in other sections of this county, and in fact throughout the three states, in order to assist the members of the two associations secure cash at a fair rate of interest and buy their fertilizers and other supplies on a cash basis, which will mean thousands of dollars saving for them.

METHODS OF PREVENTING TOBACCO INFECTION FOUND BY EXPERIMENTS

(By Dr. F. A. Wolfe, Division of Plant Diseases, State College of Agriculture)

As the result of several years' experimentation, it is found that the most destructive diseases of tobacco are preventable. Such diseases as wildfire, angular leafspot, mosaic and frogeye are infectious and have their origin in the plant bed. It seems reasonable, therefore, to expect that preventable measures should be centered in the proper preparation of the plant bed with a view of producing disease-free plants for setting in the field.

If tobacco growers can be made to appreciate the fact that there are several sources of infection in the plant bed, it will be evident to them that account must be taken of all of these sources if satisfactory results are to be secured. Infection in the plant bed may become established by any one of the following means:

1. The use of contaminated seed from infected pods.
2. The use of cloths or covers that have been used on infected beds in previous years.
3. The use of the same plant bed in successive years or the location of the new bed close to old tobacco fields.
4. The use of manure or trash which contains refuse from a diseased tobacco crop.
5. The transfer of the germs from diseased plant beds to clean ones on the hands, shoes or clothing of men.

In order, therefore, to insure the health of the seedlings for transplanting in the field, the following preventive measures should be employed:

1. The plant beds should be made up each year on new ground, and should be so situated that they will not become contaminated by drainage water from any old tobacco fields or beds.
2. Avoid the use of poles and boards that have been used previously on plant beds and of manure containing the refuse from a tobacco crop.
3. Select seed from disease-free plants. If there is any reason to suspect that the seed are contaminated, they should be treated before planting.
4. Treat seed by soaking them in disinfectant for exactly ten minutes. Either formaldehyde (one tablespoonful to a pint of water) or corrosive sublimate (one part to 100 parts of water) is equally effective as a disinfectant. Treat as follows:
a. Put seed into cloth sack.
b. Prepare disinfectant in fruit jar.
c. Soak seed for ten minutes in disinfectant.
d. Rinse the sack of seed immediately in running water or in tub of water.
e. Spread the seed out in thin layer to dry as soon as possible.
f. If seed are not to be planted within a few hours store where they are not subject to recontamination. Be sure to treat for ten minutes only and to wash well after treating otherwise some of the seed will be slow to

germinate, and other may fail to germinate.

5. Use new covers for the plant bed each year. If old cloths are used they should be boiled at least ten minutes.

6. Avoid contaminating the beds while weeding, while pulling plants or by visiting the neighbor's plant beds. The disease germs may be carried on the hands and shoes of workers.

7. If possible, avoid planting in fields which have grown a diseased crop during the previous year. Rotations are always advisable. The danger of growing tobacco after tobacco is largely eliminated if the tobacco stalks are plowed under as soon as possible after harvest. Disease-free plants set in such a field are not likely to become seriously diseased.

8. Do not set plants that are manifestly diseased nor buy or exchange plants with a neighbor unless they are known to be disease-free.

9. Inspect the field soon after transplanting, remove and destroy all diseased plants and reset with healthy ones.

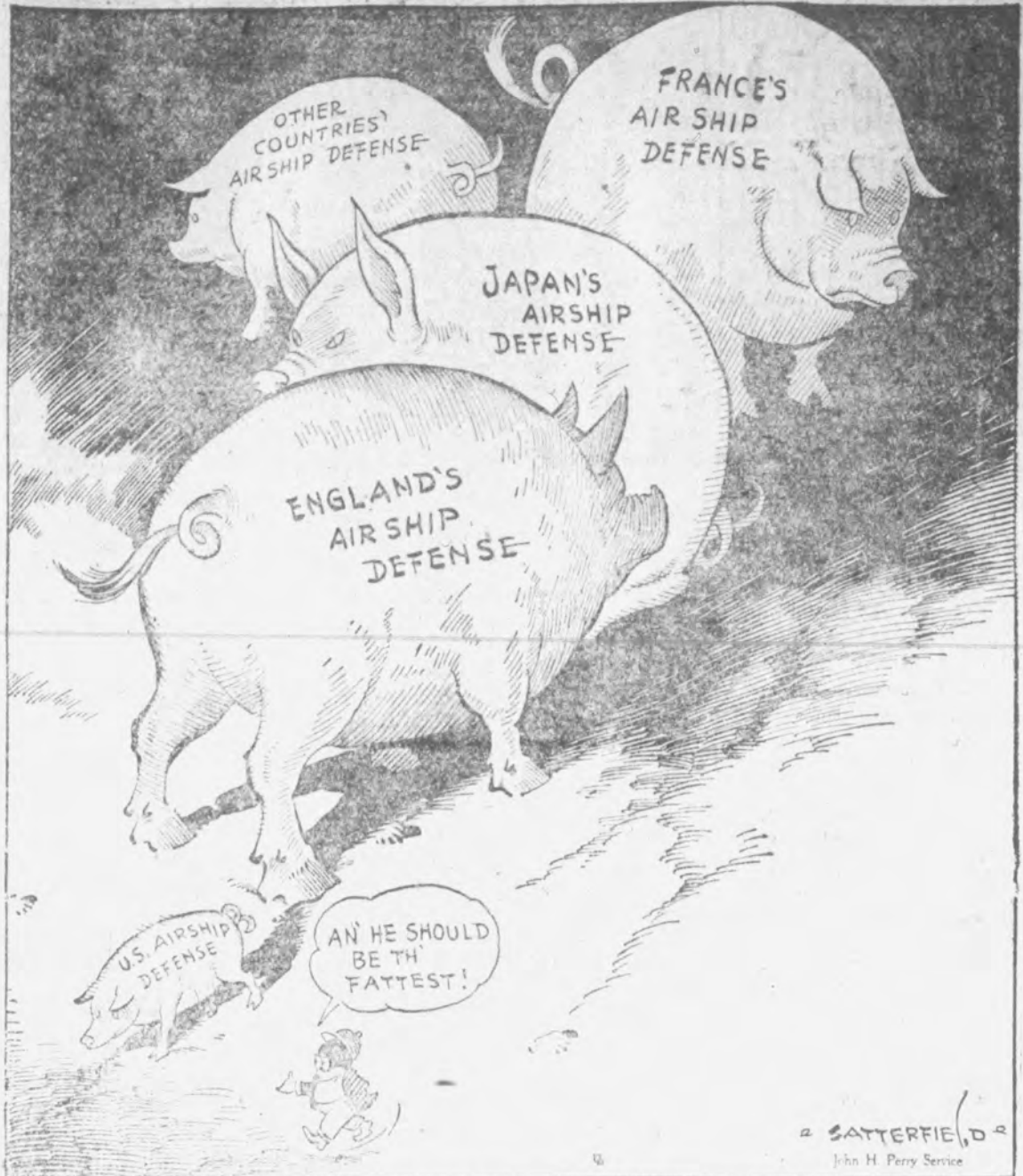

Report of Local Work Dept. Woman's Missionary Society M. E. Church

The Local Work Department of Jarvis Memorial Methodist Church held ten meetings during the past year. The meeting for May was called off, on account of exercises at the college and in October, this Department gladly gave over the hour to Mrs. C. L. Steidly, of Gastonia, who brought us an inspirational message. The Department was divided into smaller circle groups, than for the previous year and ten chairmen were secured to take charge of the ten respective circles. At the beginning of the year 1924 we had 167 members, lost 11 by removal and gained 12 new ones. One faithful member answered the "Last Call" in the early summer, Mrs. E. B. Allsbrook. Each circle was given as a "prayer special" one of the new missionaries sent out by our church during 1924. A reward of \$5.00 was offered to the circle having the largest total yearly attendance at the meetings of the Local Work Department, which was won by Circle No. 3, Mrs. J. H. Keel, chairman.

Each circle chairman drew a month of the Year, (Jan. and Dec. excluded, but otherwise provided for) during which time they kept flowers in the church and raised as much as was possible, by the serving of suppers, etc., which amount was added to their ledger money.

May Midgette, who has been one of our wards at the orphanage, graduated in June, so a contribution of \$50.00 was sent to her, to use as Mrs. Jenkins thought best, and Circle No. 7 sent her bed linen that would be required for college entrance. Our women respond so lovingly and beautifully to the orphan's call, so we asked for another girl in May's place, making two that we support.

The E. C. T. C. girls were entertained in groups, once in the various circles early in the year and in the fall they were entertained collectively. One important service that our Department renders the Sunday School is that of serving meals to the Sunday School Teachers Council once each month, for the sum of 35c and it is surprising what an appetizing meal is served for this small amount. It is not there's a spirit of egotism, but with the real hope that these deeds of love may be an incentive to service, to other auxiliaries, that I pause to enumerate some of the work that has been accomplished during 1924.

All circles have been active in visiting strangers, sick and shut-ins. \$100 donated to the Belle Bonnet Memorial Fund.
\$100 donated to the Superannuate Fund.
Boxes sent, the orphanage valued at \$300.

To add a bit of cheer to the lives of those at Samracand, a box of books were donated, also books to the hospital.
\$10.00 given the Bible Pub. House toward distribution of Bibles.

A number of poor families were pounded during the year and hospital supplies given to those in need of same.

During the Ham-Ramsay revival our women served on nursery committees for the care of babies, allowing the mothers to attend services.

A little later we assisted in finding homes among our members for 14 delegates attending an Episcopal Convention here.

In the early part of the year linen was purchased for our dining room and later in the year a committee was given authority to purchase enough additional silverware to serve 100 guests and enough extra China for 150.

A splendid box of clothes was sent Mr. and Mrs. Ipock, the former being one of our disabled ministers.

A miscellaneous shower and check for \$25 was given Mrs. Rumley, the wife of a Methodist preacher, and a beloved former resident of Greenville.
Elizabeth Bags, in training for a Missionary, was remembered in a financial way amounting to \$25.00.

\$5.00 sent in answer to a call from Maysville Church.

\$10.00 to Mr. Futrell for Welfare Work.

\$5.00 to Scarritt for a table cloth.

\$5.00 to Mr. Scoville for charity.

\$10 to Mrs. Scoville for Parsonage.

Three circles feeling a call to service, served dinner two consecutive days to the teachers attending the Educational Association held at the College.
