Moe Turman, twenty-seven-year-old Brooklyn man, has been arrested on charges of swindling in connection with a "frenzied finance" scheme that, his victims say, would have rivalled Ponzi in another few months. At least \$1,300,000 in unsecured loans, and forged notes totalling \$1,500,000, with net losses of \$400,000, are reported. He is said to have promised his dupes 300 per cent return. Turman declared he started ten years ago on \$100 borrowed capital and ran it into millions.

STATE OF WASHINGTON
BONUS GIVEN 58,011
EX-SERVICE MEN

Tacoma, Wash.—The state bonus to veterans of all branches of the service in the World War amount to \$12,500,000, it has been announced by C. W. Chausse, state auditor.

The bonus, figured at the rate of \$15 for each month of service, has been paid to 58,011 residents of the state.

The first bonus claims were paid in March, 1921. Of those who received the state's check, 48,925 still were residents of the state. 7,885 lived in other states, including every state in the union, 225 were in territories and possessions of the United States, and 376 had migrated to foreign lands.

N. C. State Baseball Schedule Announced

Raleigh, Jan.—North Carolina State College of Agriculture and Engineering will play 16 baseball games next Spring, according to the revised baseball schedule of the college just announced. 208,335,430 Pounds Tobacco Sold In State This Season

Raleigh, Jan. 24—Tobacco sold in North Carolina during the past season, which ended December 19, in the eighty-eight warehouses reporting, is placed at 208,335,430 pounds according to a report compiled by the United States and North Carolina Departments of Agriculture.

The tobacco sold for an average of \$23.60 per hundred pounds, as compared with \$26.28 for 262,233,695 pounds sold in 1923. The total crop produced last year, according to the report, is 278,320,000 pounds as compared with 409,500,000 produced in 1923.

Markets

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, Jan. 24.—The under-tone of the market was better today, there being less pressure and more desire to buy at the decline, causing values to recover somewhat.

Cables were about as due, with a fair business in spots at Liverpool and Egyptian futures there were 330 points higher.

Private cable advices report to effect that the India estimates are being reduced with the quality inferior owing to damaging rains.

About one month ago the India Government estimated this year's crop at 5,069,000 of 500 pounds gross weight, private cables of late lowered their estimates to slightly larger than last year's production and estimated placing the probable yield at slightly less than last year's 4,947,000 bale which is a big shrinkage compared with the Government's early forecast.

The recent further sharp decline in American markets and the further rise in foreign markets, especially in Egyptian, makes the value of American cotton relatively all the more cheaper compared with the value of foreign growths.

Private advices from the interior are generally to effect that spots are not following the decline, holders are refusing to sell.

A sustaining feature of today's season was the continuance of dry weather in Texas, which unfavorable for plowing for the next crop, preparations but which in that state are backward.

As ginnings to Jan. 16 show, Texas, on the basis of a total ginning for the season for the whole belt, about 13,600,000, made about 35 per cent of last year's entire crop for the whole belt.

Last year, notwithstanding favorable weather for chalking the weevil all states east of the Mississippi river, which include, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, Virginia and Tennessee see only made a little more than Texas or about 5,154,000 ginned to Jan. 16 against 4,671,000 ginned in Texas to the same period.

It is evident, therefore, that unless Texas makes another big crop, prospects will be unfavorable for another good crop this year, especially if weevils are more destructive this year or if Texas fails to received the needed moisture to put a good season in the ground.

Southern spots yesterday were 15 to 60 lower. Texas markets 15 to forty lower; sales at told 18,458 vs. 18,820 Thursday.

Compared with last year, stock on shipboard at Galveston yesterday was 70,000 vs. 42,000, at New Orleans 52,000 against 42,000.

Rumored Livermore sold sixty thousand bales yesterday and is bearish on wheat and cotton for present.

Talent seems against market for the time being and may try to force values lower.

Sentiment apparently more bearish than otherwise for the moment.

Think trade buying will be encountered on any further decline of importance.
