FINES AND ROAD SENTENCES FEATURE MONDAY'S COURT

Monday's Session of County Court Consumes Entire Day; Several Defendants Appeal

Monday's session of County Court, W. A. Darden, presiding consumed the entire day and the following cases were disposed of:

George Hopkins, was adjudged guilty of a assault and was sentenced to 60 days in jail to be assigned to work on roads.

Hardy Lee Washington, Eli Coward and Robert Joyner, were found guilty of gambling. Joyner was sentenced to 90 days in jail to be assigned to work on roads. Defendant appeals to Superior Court under bond of \$100.00.

Defendant Eli Coward was fined \$10.00 while Washington was fined \$25.00 and half cost each.

The case against Leon Patrick charged with receiving, transporting and having liquor in possession for purpose of sale, was continued until Feb. 1st.

The case against Bill Colville charged with selling crop without consent was not proceeded with no cost against county.

Sid Morgan was adjudged guilty of driving car while drunk and was sentenced to 4 months in jail to be assigned to work on roads. Defendant appeals to Superior Court under bond of \$250.00.

Estie Forber, charged with selling liquor, was found not guilty.

Will Brown, Noah Strong, charged with manufacturing liquor. Brown was adjudged not guilty while Strong was found guilty and sentenced to 4 months in jail to be assigned to work on roads. Defendant appeals to Superior Court under bond of \$200.00.

JUDICIARY COM. TO AGAIN DISCUSS THE STONE NOMINATION

Friends of Attorney General Say He is Ready to Answer the Charges Regarding Action in Wheeler Case

Washington, Jan. 27.—The nomination of Attorney General Stone to be Supreme Court Justice again repeated today with the Senate Judiciary Committee where the next step to be taken in respect to matters which have delayed the confirmation.

The committee, to which the matter was referred by unanimous consent yesterday, has been called to meet tomorrow and it is understood will invite Attorney General Stone to make a statement before it regarding the effort of the Department of Justice to return a second indictment here against Senator Wheeler, Democrat, of Montana.

Friends of the Attorney General say he is ready to reply to charges in the Senate that the course of the Justice Department constitutes persecution of Senator Wheeler and also is a violation of long recognized legal principles by seeking to try Montana Senator here instead of in his own state, where an indictment is already pending against him. In this connection the Justice Department officials are represented as viewing the two cases as entirely independent of each other although both relate to land questions.

Although Attorney General Stone and Senator Wheeler both favor arrangements for the early trial of the Senator in his home state and steps are being taken to that end, the exact time of the proceedings remains uncertain.

New York, Jan. 27.—Harry M. Daugherty, former United States Attorney General, appeared today to testify for the defense in the trial of Thomas B. Felder and Gaston B. Means, former Department of Justice agent, in Federal court here. He was accompanied by William J. Burns, former chief of the Department of Justice investigation bureau.

Daugherty was refused permission by Federal Judge Lindley to tell the details of the "situation" existing at Washington during the events leading up to the indictment of the defendants. Mr. Daugherty said that for some time the state of affairs in Washington had been such there were men in the Capitol "Hellbound" and "Spellbound."

"I would like at this time to tell the true story of that situation if I am permitted to do so," he said.

Judge Lindley, however, refused permission.

Mr. Daugherty denied that Thomas B. Felder, one of the defendants, ever talked to him about the indictments then pending against the Cragger System Company, manufacturers of glass caskets.

Felder and his former client, Gaston B. Means are being tried on charges of conspiring to bribe high government officials including Daugherty in an attempt to quash the glass casket indictments.

NOTED CHINESE POLITICAL LEADER IS DEAD

Canghai, China, Jan. 27.—Dr. Sun Yat Sen, one of China's most noted political leaders is dead at Peking according to a dispatch received here this afternoon from the semi-official Japanese news agency.

The noted Chinese leader is said to have died of cancer of the liver.

INTENT TO BE MAIN FACTOR IN TRIAL OF BAILEY BROS. CORP.

Taking of Real Evidence in Trial of 41 Officials and Salesmen Gets Under Way This Morning

Greensboro, Jan. 27.—The question of intent was injected into the trial of 41 officials and stock salesmen of Bailey Brothers, Incorporated, here early this morning during the cross examination of R. H. Hanes, vice-president of the Wachov Bank and Trust Company. That government witnesses in the case, charging misuse of the mails as a result of Bailey Brothers stock selling campaign. The government was advised by attorneys for the various defendants that they would depend largely upon the question of intent to defraud through wrongful use of the mails.

Judge Webb, presiding over the special term of Federal court stated that intent was a very important factor. This was the outstanding development of the first day's taking of real evidence in the case. This brought from Mr. Hanes certain financial facts concerning Bailey Brothers together with a statement that the bank had during the period following the sale of the stock issue, advised investors that the Bailey company had a good reputation and was reliable and was managed by the same men who had directed its affairs for 30 years.

ROCKEFELLER GIVES \$700,000 TO BAPTISTS

Washington, Jan. 27.—An outright gift of \$250,000 and a conditional gift of \$450,000 by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., toward meeting the budget requirement, of the Northern Baptist Church for the fiscal year ending April 30 was announced today at a meeting here of leaders of the Baptist denomination.

AUTOMOBILE LAWS FEATURE TODAY'S SESSION ASSEMBLY

Vehicle Light Law, Increased Speed Limit and Repeal of Crossing Stop Law Now Before Legislature

Raleigh, Jan. 27.—The introduction of two bills in the upper house affecting motorists; a new workmen's compensation law and a bill designed to repeal the statewide stop law in the House of Representatives and the introduction of a number of local bills in both branches featured today's short sittings of the General Assembly. Before noon both the Senate and House had recessed until tomorrow morning but many members were to be busy this afternoon on committee meetings.

During the morning session in the House Speaker Pharr advised the members that during the first 16 days of the regular session of 1917 700 bills had been introduced in the House and during the same period of the special session of 1921 390 bills had been introduced while at the end of 16 days of the present session only 240 bills had been introduced. He made no comment on this information.

The bill requiring horse drawn vehicles to carry a light on the highway at night was again deferred this morning that members might be heard who desire to have their counties exempted from the provisions of the law.

One of the bills introduced by Senator Mendenhall would increase the state speed limit from 30 miles per hour to 40 m.p.h. per hour and on uncongested city streets to 25 miles per hour while the rate of speed on congested districts would be restricted to 15 miles per hour. Senator Mendenhall's other measure provide for the general supervision and state inspection of brakes and lights of automobiles.

A bill to repeal the law requiring vehicles to stop before crossing railroad tracks was introduced by Representative K. A. Pittman, of Pitt county.

Representative Wade introduced a proposed workmen's compensation bill which he said was a separate measure from that introduced in the Senate last night.

Representative Erwin of Buncombe county, introduced a bill to repeal the law now governing the examination of nurses and otherwise regulating and standardizing the licensing of regular nurses placing the authority in an examining board of five members instead of as present.

A bill introduced in the upper branch of the legislature by Senators MacKethan and Clark provides for an election by the voters of Fayetteville on the question of extending the city limits. Another was also introduced by Senators Clark and MacKethan relative to the charter of Fayetteville.

COOLIDGE SPEAKS TO GOVT. OFFICIALS LAST NIGHT'S MEET

Urges More Work With Fewer Employees if Hope for Further Tax Reduction is to Be Realized

Washington, Jan. 27.—A program of further reduction in the tax payer's burden through reduced government expenditures will be a guiding policy of the four years of administration upon which President Coolidge enters on March 4.

Addressing the regular semi-annual meeting of executives and administrative officials of the government last night he placed upon them and Congress the responsibility for so measuring disbursements that further steps in the tax reduction program may be taken next fall. Only the closest adherence of Congress to the current budget recommendations, the president warned, would make possible the realization of \$273,000,000 surplus now expected for the fiscal year 1926 and which he believed would be a basis for proposing further tax reductions.

Laying down a policy of getting more work done with fewer workers, the president warned that prospective increases in revenue due to business prosperity should not be looked upon as a license for unwarranted increases in governmental expenditures. As to the current fiscal year Mr. Coolidge reiterated his desire to bring expenditures within the \$3,000,000,000 exclusive of those for the public debt.

Brigadier General H. M. Lord, director of Budget, who also addressed the meeting assured the president that the necessary reduction of \$62,000,000 from the original budget estimate could be accomplished to realize this goal and laid this down as the immediate task of the government officers.

Meeting of American Foresters to Be Held in Asheville in Feb.

Asheville, Jan. 27.—A meeting of the Southern Appalachian section of the Society of American Foresters will be held here February 12, according to an announcement made by C. F. Korstan, secretary of the section.

The meeting will be given over entirely to a business session and was called on February 12 because the Southern Appalachian Forest Research Council will meet on February 13. Just prior to the meeting of the council on February 13 a section of the paper and pulp manufacturers of the south will hold a conference, it is stated. The program for that conference has not yet been announced.

The Southern Appalachian Section will discuss business matters, including the forest type committee's report of the section and a special paper by A. C. Shaw, assistant supervisor of Pisgah National Forest, on "Appalachian Forest Types in Management Plans."

ELECTRIC RAILROADS COORDINATE SERVICE BY OPERATING BUSES

New York.—Service extensions by both rail and bus lines totaling more than 3,000 miles throughout the United States were made by electric railways during 1924. J. N. Shannahan, president of the American Electric Railway Association, announced today. Most of this extension was made by the railways supplementing their service with buses, but the 312 miles of new rail construction was the most since 1918, Mr. Shannahan said. He added that the coordination of buses and cars into single transportation units in communities was proceeding rapidly and improving service.

"Electric railways generally throughout the United States held their own during 1924," Mr. Shannahan declared. "In the face of severe industrial depression early in the year, which in some communities decreased traffic ten percent, and an increase of 2,065,590 in pleasure automobiles, the record is remarkable. Final figure for the year indicate total passengers carried will be within two percent of the 16,000,000,000 total for 1923 which set an all time record."

"Today the traffic trend on electric railways is upward, and indication for a banner year during 1925 are good. The electric railway curve in variously follows the general business trend."

"Perhaps the most encouraging feature of the electric railway business today is the gradual but definite coordination of electric lines and buses. Electric railway managements throughout the country are steadily assuming control of all local transportation including both rail and motor lines and coordinating it under one head. One hundred and seventy electric railway companies now are operating a total of 2,500 buses in the extension of passenger service into suburban territories whose traffic does not warrant the extension of rail lines, and in supplementing established rail service. The bus has replaced a few car lines which probably never should have been built, but nowhere has it succeeded in supplying an entire city of any considerable size with complete transportation. Where public officials, citizens and companies are cooperating in an endeavor to establish the best possible car-bus service the wildest bus and jitney is rapidly disappearing through local and state legislation. The pleasure automobile is far more serious competitor of electric railways than buses."

"Underlying conditions with electric lines are sound, as evidenced by the way the industry withstood the early part of the year. An increase of only one percent is shown in operating costs, although wages alone were up two percent. There were 65 wage increases, 13 decreases and 60 renewals without change. The average fare increased from 7.31 in January 1924 to 7.43 in January 1925, or about 1.5 per cent."

"Only 13 lines, representing 162 miles of track and with outstanding securities of \$75,000,000, went into receivership. Twenty-two companies representing 1650 miles of track and \$176,000,000 of securities, were discharged from their financial difficulties."

"A total of 312 miles of new track the most since 1918, was constructed and 712 miles reconstructed. A total of \$342,000,000 will be spent in 1925 for new plant and equipment, maintenance, material and supplies, an increase of 39 per cent over the amount spent for similar purposes in 1924."

Next Automobile Race Charlotte Speedway Be Held On May 11

Charlotte, Jan. 26.—The date for the next 250 mile automobile race at the Charlotte Speedway is Monday, May 11, according to an announcement that has been made by Osmond Barringer, manager.

This announcement followed the action of the Speedway directors recently when they endorsed the date that had been offered them by the Contest Board of the American Automobile Association through Richard Kennerdell, chairman.

FAMOUS PUGILIST OF 35 YEARS AGO ROUNDS OUT LIFE TAILOR

Colusa, Cal., Jan. 26.—George La Blanche who in 1880 knocked out Jack Dempsey, the Nonpareil, with the famous pivot punch, and surprised the pugilistic world, has been working here as a tailor for more than a year. It was not learned until recently that he was the fighting marine of the eighties who was accorded the honors of a champion.

He is known in Colusa as George Ferguson, his real name. He is 74 now and looks hearty.

After his victory over Nonpareil he joined a party headed by John L. Sullivan and toured Australia. In his late years he reverted to the occupation his father taught him.

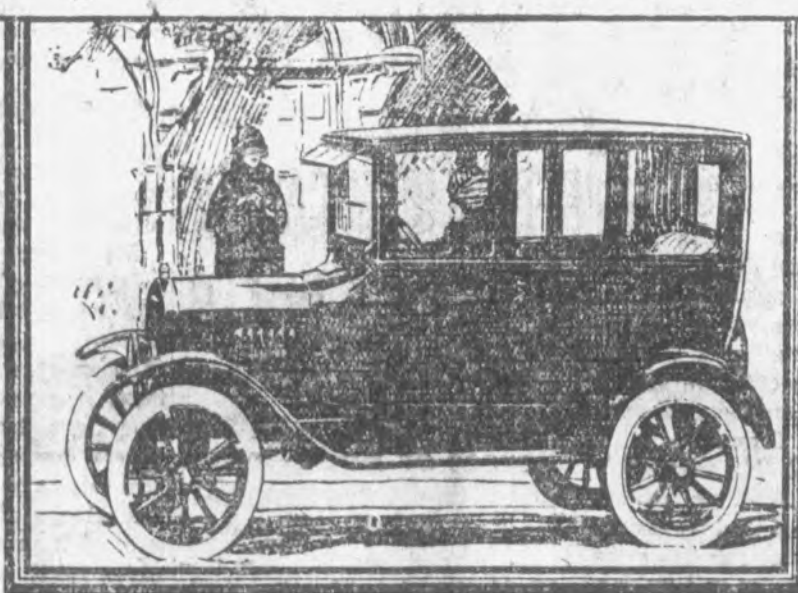

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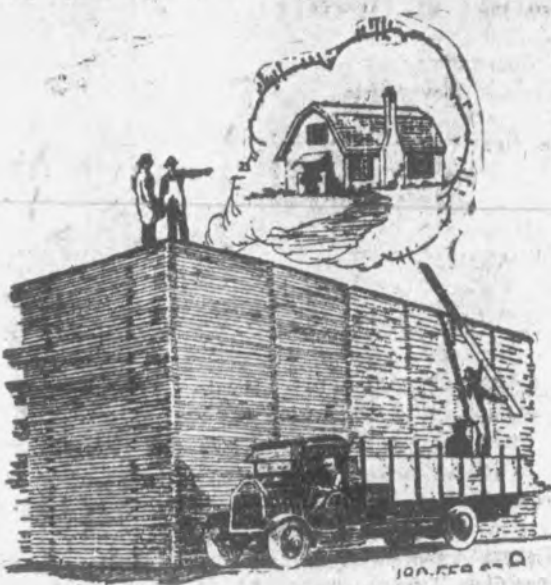

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SEEKERS OF THRONE CALLS HIGH HEAVEN TO SUPPORT CLAIMS

Coburg Germany, Jan.—Mysticism and the alleged manifestations of Heaven figure so extensively in the communications of rival claimants for the Russian throne, a throne which no longer exists, that central and west ern Europe generally regard the family row of the Romanoffs as an uncanny and useless performance.

Since his original manifesto declaring himself the rightful czar of all the Russias, Grand Duke Cyril has remained silent in his Coburg villa, and there are indications that he and his supporters will keep the Russian court and its doings well under cover because of the Communist efforts to have the self-styled czar expelled from republican Germany.

There is something so fatalistic and Asiatic in all the actions of the Romanoffs that liberal-minded people of the west cannot take them seriously. Even the aged Marie Feodorovna, mother of the murdered Czar Nicholas, Danish princess though she be and sister of Alexandra, England's queen dowager, sounds this same note. She has never believed her son is dead and, in denying the claims of all successors, especially of Grand Duke Cyril, she talks of the divine rights of rulers as if the world were plunged back into the Middle Ages.

It is the "hand of God" which moved Cyril to proclaim himself the ruler of all the Russias, if one is to believe the statements of this Romanoff, whose manifesto sounds no more modern than the documents of Ivan the Terrible. His supporters, of whom his wife, who has recently been in the United States, seems to be far the most active, would have one believe it was divine providence which saved Cyril from drowning when his ship was destroyed in Pacific waters during the Russo-Japanese war that he might eventually take over the Russian throne.

But the monarchists among the Russian exiles who are supporting the claim of Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholasovitch are not at all inclined to admit that divine providence ever had anything to do with Cyril, and adduce scores of reasons in their brochures why nobody should pay any attention to such a pretender. On the other hand they have proofs which are entirely satisfying to them that Heaven has designated Nicholas Nicholasovitch to sit upon the throne which nearly everybody in the world, except the old Russian monarchists, has forgotten.

The old officials about the Czar's court, and the fragments of Russian royalty, find it difficult to divorce themselves from the idea of imperial Russia, and a few of them find their way Grand Duke Cyril to talk things over.

Cyril lives in a villa just across the street from the house that shelters ex-King Ferdinand of Bulgaria. In an old-fashioned market square in the center of the provincial town of 20,000, which is still living back in pre-war days and is apparently in almost complete oblivion to the changes the world has undergone in the last 11 years stands a statue of Prince Albert, the husband of the Late Queen Victoria, whose marriage to the English queen resulted in Saxe-Coburg Gotha becoming aligned with practically all the ruling families of Europe.

There is reaction in the air at Coburg. Wagner is played at the opera and films from the Wagner operas are shown at the moving picture house. It is an ideal place for Cyril and Ferdinand and the rest of the dislodged royalty which has taken refuge here. There are a few industries and consequently little to upset the medieval quilt of the well-improved village above which hovers the Coburg Veste, a magnificent Gothic fortified castle which houses marvelous collections of arms and armor borne by German princes in the Crusades.

Parsifal would be quite at home in Coburg, if it were possible for the young knight to take on human form. There is a make-believe atmosphere about the place. It is unreal to visitors from centers where the modern spirit prevails. The big motor cars of ex-King Ferdinand and Grand Duke Cyril are the most discordant note. These men should ride on armored horses if they wish to fit into the picture and keep in harmony with the spirit which they are endeavoring to perpetuate.

St. Louis Joins Cities Which "Say It With Architecture"

New Masonic Edifice Expresses City's Higher Aims

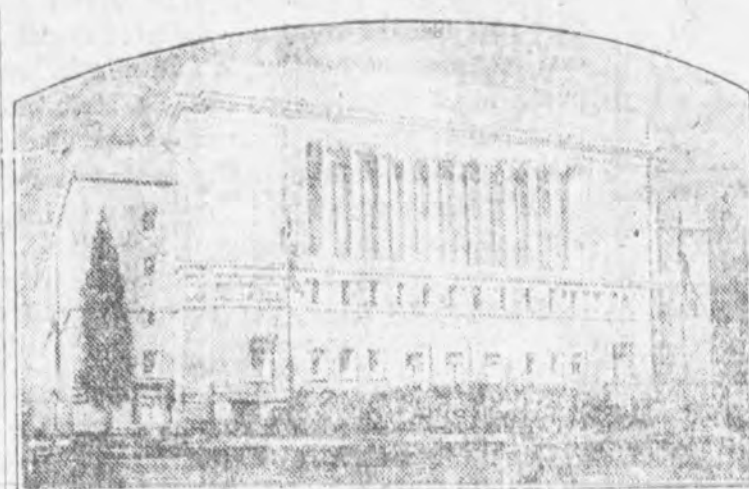
ANOTHER evidence of America's determination to "say it with architecture," and one of the most impressive, is in the erection of the new Scottish Rite Cathedral for the Valley of Missouri at St. Louis.

In design, plan and choice of materials the cathedral is in harmony with huge edifices planned in New York, Chicago, Pittsburgh and elsewhere to express the spirit of American cities and institutions.

Mammoth Interior

An auditorium that will seat three thousand persons, a kitchen and dining room that recall the spacious days of mediaeval Europe in their capacity for feeding thirty-five hundred persons at once, gigantic offices, corridors and initiation chambers are physically astounding. They are declared by the Masons to be merely incidental to the real purpose of the building, which is to "point to the growing interest in the higher life."

The Cathedral, faced with Bedford stone, looms 104 feet high and 235 feet wide on Lindell Boulevard. It is five stories high, but there is no way of telling this from the exterior.



The stories are each ten feet high. Above the third story, whose windows are recessed in a sculptured frieze 110 feet along the front, ten Ionic columns, like for thirty-six feet. The surrounding lines of the building, as can be seen in the illustration, are classic Greek.

Tapestry Glass Vestibules

Sublimity speaks from the inside of the building as from the outside. Mounting the spreading granite steps, the visitor enters vestibules of tapestry glass, to emerge upon a corridor 165 feet long and 23 feet wide. To the left and right are offices of the functionaries of the order, whose names appear blasted onto the luxurious surface of the same sort of glass as that used in the vestibules immediately ahead is the auditorium.

Cost \$2,000,000

The auditorium strikes the keynote of the entire interior. Massive, serene, dignity and sublimity are preserved throughout.

The cost of the building will be more than \$2,000,000 by the time its last detail is finished.

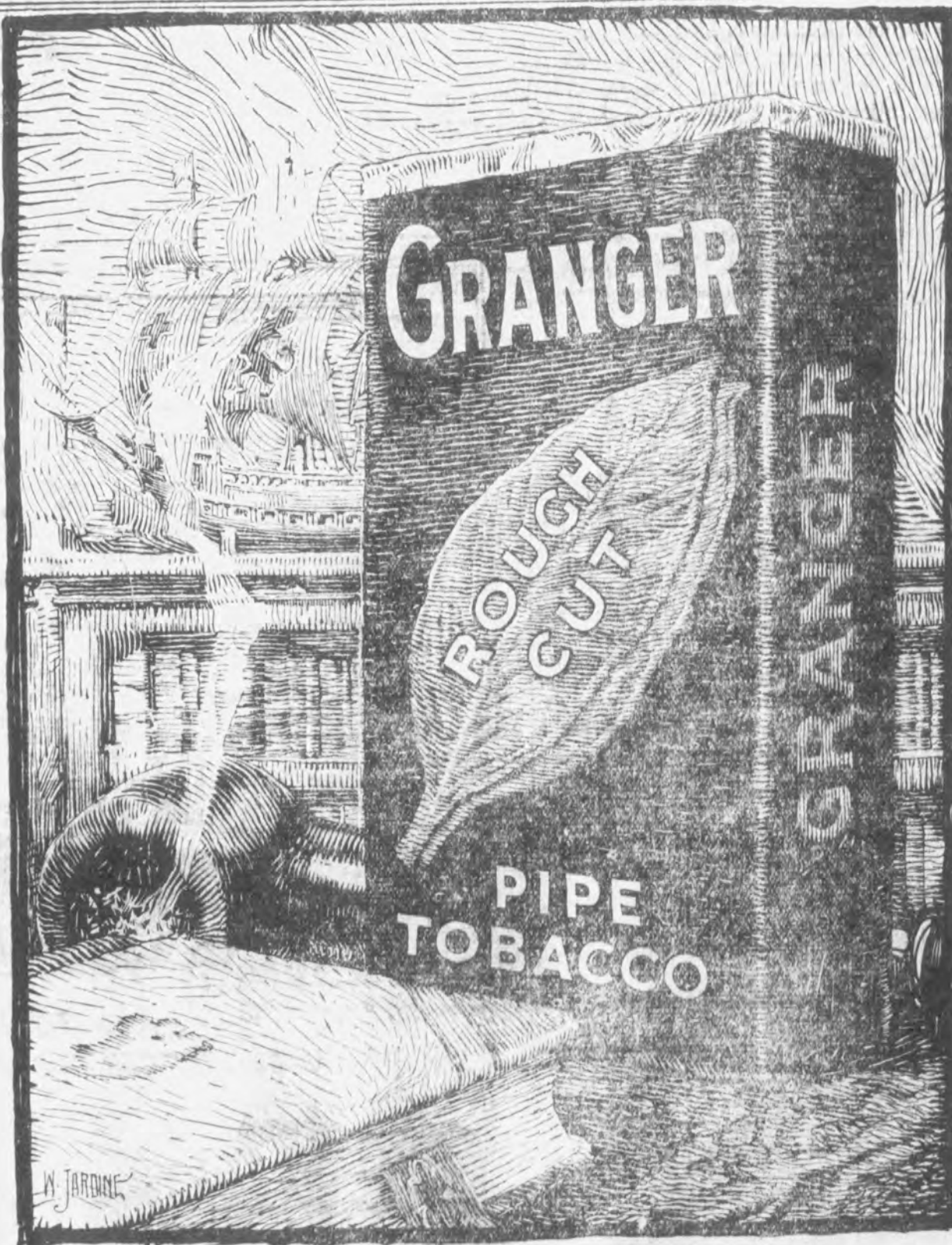

WHY NOT THE WHOLE STATE?

The vehicle light law is held up temporarily to allow hearing to those counties whose desire it is to be exempted from the necessity of every animal drawn vehicle displaying a light when traveling the highways at night. We do not see how this law would bring the desired results should a portion of the counties be exempt, on the other hand it would lead to frequent disobedience of the law by drivers of the animal drawn vehicles and be a source of greater danger to the autoist. Should there be a light law for the whole state every automobile driver would be able to know at all times if there were an animal drawn vehicle ahead while should the law be applicable to only a portion of the counties the automobile drivers must be familiar with every county in the state and its status or else in traveling from a lighted into an unlighted county they may fail to observe the unlighted animal drawn vehicle and accidents would result. Likewise the farmer from an unlighted county would be prohibited from crossing into a county where the light law is enforced without first lighting his vehicle.

If the animal drawn vehicle light law is a good one for some counties in the state it is good for all and we see no reason why matters should be further complicated and made more dangerous by exempting certain counties from enforcement of the law. If we are to have such a law for the state let it be for

the entire state so as to make our highway safe for night travel and if it is not to be for the entire state let the matter stand as it now is and let each person who travels the highway at night do so with a prayer that he might not be the victim of the demon that lurks in the darkness.

With the report of the highway commission showing that a large portion of the accidents on the public highways during the past few months were due to unadulterated carelessness it seems that in addition to laws governing the automobile traffic a state-wide educational program to impress upon automobile drivers their duties to others as well as themselves might go a long way in helping to relieve this deplorable condition.

REAL TAX RELIEF FOR EARNED INCOMES

First individual tax payments on income for 1924 are revealing so much ignorance of the rate reductions effected by the Revenue Bureau has issued a statement warning taxpayers not to overpay. It further calls their attention to certain provisions of the law which have never been applicable before. These provisions draw a distinction between incomes as earned and unearned. Incomes from salaries and wages are earned; those from interest on investments and profits in business are unearned. But for purposes of easier administration all net income up to \$5,000 is treated as earned, even though much of it may be from profits in business. All net income above \$10,000 is treated as unearned even though the salaried income alone is above \$10,000. And the new law not only cuts the rate by 25 per cent on all incomes but for earned incomes it makes a further cut of 25 per cent—making for such incomes a total rate reduction of 50 per cent from the figures in force prior to last year.

Thus the wage and smaller-salaried income tax payers will find in the new law very substantial relief indeed. It is evidently greater than many of them had come to expect. They had probably been more or less misled by President Coolidge's and Secretary Mellon's great dissatisfaction with the new law because it did not also make special reductions in surtax rates on unearned incomes from great wealth. Mr. Mellon still considers the new law as hardly a tax-reform measure at all. But it will not so strike the mass of income-tax payers.—N. Y. World

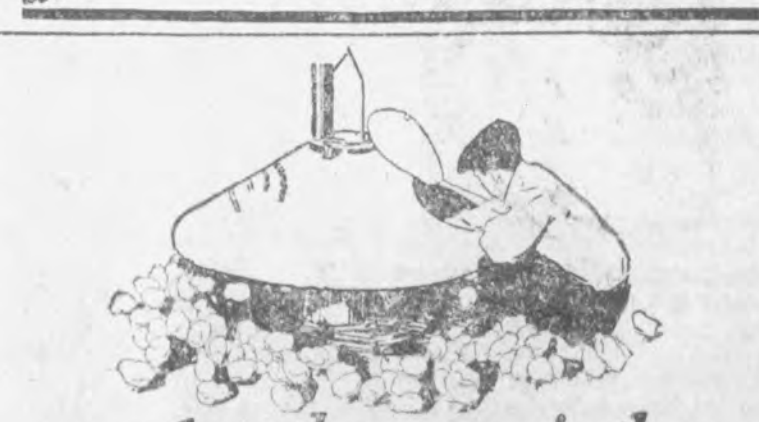

Rio De Janeiro. — A local newspaper has published some sarcastic comments on public speaking in contrasting the lucidity and directness of certain public speakers of North America to the wandering vagueness, under similar conditions, of well-known Brazilians.

The writer says that in Brazil the public orator, as a rule, has no idea of time or progress. In order to tell a simple fact he piles up adjectives, brings rows of verbs into line, creates confusion by abusing the use of details, metaphors and imagery. And this not being enough, he makes his voice quiver in order that the phrase and the speech be lengthened.

OLD ENGLISH SILVERWARE OFFERS GOOD DIVIDENDS

London, Jan.—There is a great boom at the moment in antique silver over here, and genuine examples of the art of the old English silversmiths are at present fetching high prices in the sale rooms. Quite recently a standing salt cellar which weighed only ten ounces brought \$11,500, or 50 times its weight in gold.

The keenest buyers are said to be foreigners and colonialists, and quite recently enormous quantities of fine old silver have been shipped to the United States. Asked for the reason for the increased demand for old silver, a well known expert said that it was an excellent investment. The longer it was kept the more valuable it became, and collectors were buying it with that in mind. Faking in connection with old silver is very rare nowadays, the expert added, as the penalty had been made so great that what was to be gained from the deception was scarcely worth the risk.

TRENCHANT SPEECH OF M. P. AMUSEN WOMAN MEMBER

London, Jan.—Ellen Wilkinson, Labor's sole woman representative in the House of Commons, made her maiden speech in that house recently. Dressed in black, which set off her auburn hair, she spoke vivaciously and earnestly and made a good impression. The little lass, as she is called by her constituents because of her diminutive size, is expected to speak often on subjects affecting the welfare of women.

Miss Wilkinson finds the dignity of the Commons to her liking, and regards the dull black clothes of members as in keeping with their heavy responsibilities. Also she has been impressed with the polite way in which men can say cutting things. They have developed, she says, to the highest degree, the art of being thoroughly nasty with perfect politeness.

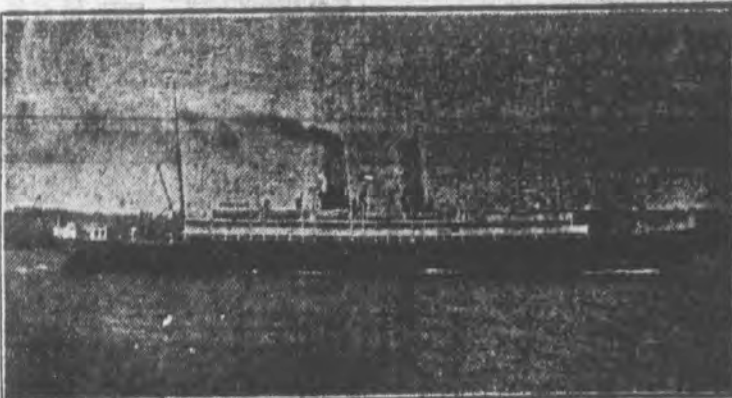

Following the conference here the party will go to Knoxville, Tenn. for a conference with five forest supervisors of other southern national forests.

British Road to Spend Millions.
London.—Nearly \$70,000,000 will be spent in the near future on an elaborate program of work to be carried out by the London, Midland and Scottish Railway. Provision is also to be made for new sleeping cars, vestibule and corridor cars of the most comfortable type, kitchen and dining cars and other rolling stock.

RADIO BRINGS SWEDEN CLOSER TO AMERICA
Stockholm, Jan.—For the first time in the history of communications between Sweden and America, Swedes have been able to send direct New Year's greetings through the air to their friends and relatives in the United States. This is due to the opening of the new radio station at Grimon, and they have made extensive use of this privilege.

Messages from the most remote places in Sweden now reach New York in the average time of half an hour, and more than 1,000 were sent during the seven days following the opening of the service.

UNIVERSITY OF IRELAND TAKES POWER FORMERLY VESTED KING

Dublin, Jan.—The senate of the National University of Ireland, established by statute in 1908, of which Eamon De Valera, Republican leader, is chancellor, has decided to take steps to have altered the charter which gives to the king the right of appointing the board of visitors which hears appeals against the removal of professors.

By a vote of 50 to 20 a resolution was carried to vest this power in the university itself. Francis Burke, who moved the resolution, declared he did so without consulting either Mr. De Valera or President Cosgrave of the Free State.

PATRIOTIC WOMEN PURCHASE HOME OF BETTY WASHINGTON

Fredericksburg, Va., Jan.—America's newest national shrine, Kenmore, the mansion that was the home of Betty Washington Lewis, sister of George Washington, is to be dedicated May 1 and President Coolidge has been asked to attend the ceremony.

In the drawing room of the historic house a simple ceremony, on Jan. 1, marked the transfer of the last \$1,000 of the purchase price of \$30,000 to the former owners, and the property passed into the possession of the Kenmore Association, a national organization with headquarters here.

Three years ago the property was about to be cut up into building lots and sold when a group of women, representing the Washington Lewis Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution, conceived the idea of purchasing the estate and preserving it for posterity. Accordingly the Kenmore Association was organized and an active campaign was carried to every state in the union.

Kenmore was built in 1752 by Colonel Fielding Lewis to be the home of his bride, and it was there that he and Betty Washington lived for many years. At that time the mansion house of an 800-acre farm, it now occupies a quiet and dignified spot in the residential section here. Stately and imposing without, its interior walls are adorned with stucco work which George Washington himself designed and had executed at his orders by Hessian prisoners of war.

True to the older type of colonial buildings, there is no veranda, or porch; steps lead directly into the front entrance. toasted the victories won.

Vagrant King Offered Home
Bagdad, Jan.—The suggestion that former king Hussein of the Hedjaz might find a home in Iraq, where his son Faisal is king, may be the solution of the homeless exmonarch's problem.

The Bagdad Times learns on good authority that this question has been discussed by the council of ministers. The decision arrived at was that there would be no objection to Hussein's taking up residence in Basrah provided he came to Iraq as a private individual not as a monarch.
