STONE DECLARES WHEELER CASE IS INDEPENDENT ONE

Says Department's Case Charges Conspiracy to Defraud Government by Acts Committed at Capital

Washington, Jan. 28.—Attorney General Stone told the Senate Judiciary Committee today the Justice Department was fully determined to go ahead with the its new case here against Senator Wheeler of Montana.

Called before the committee to make a statement in connection with the controversy which was delaying his confirmation as a Justice of the Supreme Court, Mr. Stone declared the case to be brought here was entirely independent of the Montana procedure in which Senator Wheeler is under indictment.

The Attorney General said the proceedings here involved a case of conspiracy to defraud the government out of oil and mineral lands through violating of permits held by the Gordon Campbell syndicate.

"The principal acts were performed at the capital," Stone said. "Much of the evidence is of a documentary character and is located in the Interior Department. This case could not be submitted to the grand jury without developing Senator Wheeler's connection." Because of this, Mr. Stone said, he had directed that in all fairness Mr. Wheeler should be given an opportunity to explain before the grand jury.

"Numerous overt acts," the Attorney General said, had been committed in the District of Columbia and added that the evidence could not be reviewed without giving the impression of the possible connection of Senator Wheeler with these acts.

Washington, Jan. 28.—Attorney General Stone was invited today by the Senate Judiciary Committee to appear before it at a public session and make a statement relating to the controversy which is delaying his confirmation as a Justice of the Supreme Court.

The principal subject of discussion was the effort of the Justice Department to secure a second indictment here against Senator Wheeler, Democrat, of Montana, while already he is under indictment in Montana charged with accepting money for practicing before a government department.

Ceremonies of Sudan Temple To Be Held In Wilson Soon

Wilson, N. C., January 28.—Local committees are busy engaged in making plans for the forthcoming ceremonial of Sudan Temple, and it is stated that the event will be one of the most enjoyable ever held.

The local Shrine club has assumed charge of the plans and are planning to entertain at least four thousand visitors on the day of the ceremonial.

Boxing Bouts To Be Held at Fort Bragg On February 20

Fayetteville, N. C., January 28.—Several boxing bouts will be held at Fort Bragg on February 20, according to an announcement that has been made by Frederick E. Coyne, Post Recreation Officer. The program will include several heavyweights, lightweights, and welter weights. Regimental championship bouts will also be held.

Ireland to Seek Tourists.

Dublin.—The Free State government has decided to take part in the movement for popularizing Ireland as a tourists resort. The minister of commerce has summoned a conference of the various hotel, railway and other interests involved, and it is hoped to bring public bodies in the north into co-operation with the movement.

Speeder Offers Car for \$33 Fine. Pasadena, Cal.—When a fine of \$33 was levied against George Urborn on a charge of speeding in Pasadena, he pleaded:

"Judge, won't you please take the car instead? I paid only \$40 for it." The court thereupon remitted \$25 of the \$33 fine. Urborn decided the car was worth \$8, so he paid up and drove away.

DOG TEAMS RACING AGAINST DEATH OVER SNOW COVERED PATH.

Epidemic of Diphtheria In Nome, Alaska, Necessitates Hurried Journey Through 400 Miles of Snow

Anchorage, Alaska, Jan. 28.—Moving on 400 miles of snow covered path the fastest and most faithful dog team in this district were on the road to Nenana, Alaska today in their race against advance of the epidemic of diphtheria which is raging at Nome. The team carried 300,000 units of anti-toxin to be used in fighting the epidemic. Four deaths have been reported there since the outbreak.

The serum which left for Nenana was supplied by Dr. J. B. Bee on who made 600 miles by dog team in a race to Iditarod in 1920 with diphtheria anti-toxin.

The United States Signal Corps issued a call this week for dog teams throughout the subarctic regions and many mushers responded, and it was reported today were ready to enter their teams in the relay.

When the serum reaches Nenana it will be transferred to a team of nine dogs owned by William Shannon who expects to make the first 60 mile leg of the dash to Tolovana in one run. Succeeding teams will follow to Tanana River, Yukon River, thence to Nulato, 100 miles east of Norton Sound, cut across Norton Bay and overland to Nome in their race against death and disease.

Greenville High Defeated By Kinston

The Kinston High School basketball team defeated the Greenville High School team last night in the Central warehouse, Kinston, by a score of 20 to 9.

At the end of the first half the Greenville team was leading by a score of 9 to 6, but the Kinston team showed a complete change in the second half with the above results. The game proved most enjoyable and was largely attended.

RADIO SENDING TO ENGLAND FOILED BY INTERFERENCE

London.—Either a number of malicious amateurs or a European country deliberately tried to jam the reception of American wireless stations by British listeners in during the International Radio Week, E. C. Davies, wireless expert, has charged.

Radio Week, Mr. Davies says, was a failure because virtually every station in America was interfered with. The programs were ruined by continuous Morse or a piercing whistle which began every night just at the time when the American stations were due to begin broadcasting. The Morse contained no message and sounded as if some one were playing about with a key, and there was generally more Morse during this week than any time during the previous six months.

COLD WAVE SWEEPS OVER STATE LAST NIGHT AND TODAY

Mercury Drop of Nearly 60 Degrees to Be Low Freezing is Accompanied by Sleet and Snow

Charlotte, Jan. 28.—Forcing the mercury down with plummet like speed the cold wave today has descended upon North Carolina bringing the temperature well below freezing point whereas for days most of the state had been experiencing springlike weather.

Relief is forecast for tomorrow but meanwhile the thermometer continues its steady descent. Drops in the temperature have been reported from a number of places. In Charlotte the weather bureau recorded a drop of 23 degrees in one hour the mercury falling from 61 above to 38 above and with the thermometer reading 22 degrees at nine o'clock. Greensboro reported a fall of 52 degrees in 20 hours, from 67 at noon yesterday to 15 this morning. Raleigh reported a drop of 49 degrees from 66 yesterday afternoon to 17 this morning while in Winston-Salem and Salisbury the thermometer dropped 40 degrees over night.

Snow and sleet accompanied the drop in many places with rain falling early last night turning into ice in some sections. Sleet was reported from Wilmington while Raleigh reported icy snow laden streets.

GOVERNMENT SEEKS TO KNOW VALUE OF BAILEY PROPERTY

Testimony Today in the Trial of 41 Officials and Salesmen Shows Difference in Earnings and Tax Returns

Greensboro, Jan. 28.—The trial of 41 officials and stock salmen of Bailey Brothers, former Winston-Salem tobacco manufacturing concern, on charges of using the mails to defraud in connection with the sale of stock in that concern was featured today by the introduction of evidence by the government as to value of real estate, personal property, equipment and other holdings of the corporation.

William Rueter, public accountant, was the first witness and the outstanding feature of his testimony was the concern's net earnings over a period of four years from 1919 to 1922 inclusive.

H. C. Vaughan, Winston-Salem auditor and purchasing agent gave the report of Bailey Brothers Corporation returns for taxes. It was shown by the return to the Revenue commissioner at Raleigh, given by J. D. Schofield, deputy commissioner, that the corporation had earned a much lesser amount in each year than was reported by Auditor Rueter.

M. A. Hodgkin, building manager of the Wachovia Bank and Trust Company of offices being rented there and asserted that stock selling licenses had not at first been required of Bailey Brothers salesmen.

The corporation was not authorized to sell but \$600,000 stock in all.

Turbulent Portugal

Lisbon, Jan.—The uncertainties of politics in Portugal, and turbulence in the life of the state, are pointed out by a local newspaper which recounts 20 armed uprisings in the country since 1911. Also seven attempted assassinations were successfully resisted.

In the nine years since 1915 Portugal has had seven presidents, and 40 different cabinets.

Hypnotism Used in Operations.

Dorpat, Lithuania.—Prof. A. Wannach has recently performed a number of surgical operations at the Dorpat University Hospital which have attracted much attention because hypnotism was substituted for narcotics. The patients are alleged to have suffered no pain.

UNDERWOOD URGES NEW CONFEREES ON SHOALS QUESTION

Alabama Senator Says Members of Agriculture Committee Would Not Reflect Sentiment of Senate

Washington, Jan. 28.—On motion of Senator Underwood, Democrat, Ala., the Underwood bill authorizing the lease of Muscle Shoals was today laid before the Senate with request for appointment of conferees to consider the bill in conference between the Senate and House.

The Alabama Senator declared that since the ranking members on the Senate Agriculture Committee who under the custom would constitute the conferees were opposed to the bill and that these Senator's action in passing on it could not reflect the sentiment of the Senate in the conference. Therefore he asked that a special committee whose members he presented be appointed as the conference committee.

Epworth League to Meet in Salisbury June 30 - July 3

Salisbury, Jan. 28.—The Western North Carolina Epworth League conference will meet in this city June 30 to July 3, inclusive, according to an announcement that has been made by President B. L. Lunsford, of Marion. It has also been announced that T. Frank Hudson, of this city, will be in charge of the entertainment of the delegates. His appointment followed a conference of leaders held here recently, at which time Rev. Loy D. Thompson, pastor of the First Methodist church and J. C. Kesler, chairman of the board of steward, discussed the meeting with President Lunsford.

Representatives from over 300 chapters in the Western part of the State are expected to be represented at the conference and it is estimated that between 600 and 700 delegates will attend the sessions. President Lunsford states that he is sure that the conference will be one of the largest yet to be held and is well-pleased with Mr. Hudson's acceptance as chairman of the entertainment committee.

The conference was held in Greensboro last year and the June meeting will be the first visit of the assembly to this city in several years. A faculty of 12 or more competent instructors will be in attendance at the meeting. They will give a series of courses along the lines of Epworth League work and credit will be given in these courses towards a Christian culture certificate.

It is also stated that Rev. L. A. Falls, President of the Epworth League Board, will attend the conference. Dr. J. H. Barnhardt, pastor of the Tryon Street Methodist Church in Charlotte will deliver the closing address of the conference, it is stated.

The presiding elders from the Wayneville, Marion, Salisbury, Shelby, Statesville, Mt. Airy, Winston-Salem, North Wilkesboro and Greensboro districts will be on hand and will assist in the work of the conference, according to the preliminary plans. Preiding Elder T. F. Marr, of the Salisbury district, will also have a part in the meeting.

The program committee is now busily engaged in mapping out the course of study, selecting the speakers, etc., and an announcement of the complete program will be made within a few weeks it is said.

PRES COOLIDGE ASKS IMMEDIATE ACTION FARM RELIEF BILL

In Message to House Urges Enactment of Commission Report Into Law at Earliest Possible Date

Washington, Jan. 28.—President Coolidge today asked Congress to enact into law at the "earliest possible date" the measure recommended by the Agriculture Commission.

The Federal co-operative marketing board, as proposed in the report, would enable co-operatives to develop without governmental interference or domination, but would adopt a "fostering attitude" toward them. The commission said it had considered various proposed measures in Congress dealing with co-operative marketing but found that no pending bill "presents a completely satisfactory program."

Stressing that the "present problems of agriculture rest upon the ability of the farmer to market his goods at a profit," the commission recommended that legislation should follow six "general principles," to be applied upon voluntary action by community marketing organizations, producers and distributors. The government should not interfere with development of the co-operatives, the report said, "except for the very proper police powers lodged with the Secretary of Agriculture under the Capper-Volstead Act." It added, however, that "leadership and assistance through the authority of the government is essential."

Referring to the cattle industry as suffering through lack of tariff protection, the report and such protection also was needed on certain oil-bearing products of plant or animal origin and for certain phases of the dried fruit industry. The commission refrained from making specific recommendations as to the tariff but "nevertheless wishes to be understood as sympathetically recognizing the need of protecting our agricultural commodities."

Two Automobiles Are Damaged When They Collide on the Bridge

Miss Myrtle Brogdon, County Supervisor, is suffering from shock which she received today when her car collided with another car on the county bridge. Both cars were badly damaged but the occupants escaped without serious injury.

Miss Brogdon was going in the direction of Bethel when she met a car coming from Rocky Mount going to Washington.

The bridge on account of the freezing weather was a perfect sheet of ice. Both Miss Brogdon and the driver of the other car put on their brakes but to no avail and in spite of all they could do the cars collided.

Considering the weather conditions and the distance of the bridge from the ground it is almost a miracle that both drivers escaped without serious injury.

AMERICA INSISTS THAT SHANGHAI BE KEPT AN OPEN PORT

Commander of American Patrol Ordered to Protect Movement of Merchant Marine Ships in Face of Fort Guns

Washington, Jan. 28.—American war vessel, in Shanghai waters have been ordered to escort American and British merchant ships, desiring to leave Shanghai at night even in the face of the guns of Woosung fort commanded by General Wang.

Among the ships which the American naval craft are guarding is the steamer Beland which has 400 American tourists aboard.

General Wang has advised Rear Admiral McVay, commander of the patrol forces, that the Woosung fort will not fire upon foreign vessels entering or departing from Shanghai during daylight and Admiral McVay replied that his government desired that Shanghai be kept open to commercial ship, and that he will furnish convoys at any hour.

Second Term Gaston Co. Schools Applied Stewardship be Held

Gastonia, Jan. 28.—Sessions of the Gaston County Schools of Applied Stewardship held out a second chance for education to those who wasted or missed their chance during youth," declared Dr. Walt N. Johnson, of this city, who has just announced that the second session of this institution will open in Gastonia, Bessemer City, Belmont, and other cities and towns in Gaston county February 9.

Dr. Johnson stated that four sessions have been planned for 1925. The first session will begin February 9 and end March 21. Following the first vacation the second session will open on April 30 and continue through May 23. The summer session will be held in June and the winter term will begin December 13. The teachers in this school, it is stated, are taken from the local public schools and Sunday schools and are paid a small honorarium for part-time work. Experts in various lines of commerce make-up the faculty under the superintendent.

Concerning his new idea of applied Christianity and Stewardship, the organizer says, in part:

"These schools are thoroughly Christian. They are held in the Sunday School rooms of churches; they are manned by Christians who yearn to help others along in life; they make willingness to be trained as stewards of God in the use of their earnings a condition of admission to all applying students; prayer and praise to God enlivens every meeting of Teacher and Students. They are open on the same terms to all denominations."

BILL WOULD ABOLISH THE DEATH PENALTY IN NORTH CAROLINA

Another Measure in Legislature Would Re- quire 15 Days Notice Before Procuring Li- censes for Marriage

Raleigh, Jan. 28.—A bill designed to abolish capital punishment in North Carolina was introduced today in the House of Representatives by Mr. Wade of New Hanover county. The measure is said to be sponsored by Clarence A. Darrow, of Chicago, noted criminal lawyer who is opposed to capital punishment.

In the Senate a mild sensation was caused when a joint resolution was introduced requesting that the State Auditor obtain within ten days from all departments of the state and all state institutions a report as to the amounts paid in salaries, and the number of automobiles bought by each department or institution and the cost thereof. The information is for the finance committee of the body to aid in framing financial legislation.

Senator Howard sent forward a measure which provides for creation of additional emergency judges for a period of eight years. A number of local bills were also introduced.

The session today was short in the Senate and before midday a number of members of the upper body had left the hall to attend committee meetings.

In the House, however, the session continued for more than two hours and for the first time debate took place on several measures among them that which would require regulation of lights on the highways of North Carolina.

Representative Whitaker, of Guilford county, introduced a measure of state-wide importance which would require 15 days notice of intent to the register of deeds before marriage licenses could be obtained. A bill was also brought forward which would make the use of nitroglycerin or other high explosives in robbing banks a felony.

Governor Tom J. Herral Boosts North Carolina at Meeting

Raleigh, Jan. 28.—"We have a great State, one of which I am proud. It is not necessary for me to state that Arkansas has the only diamond mine. It would be useless for me to rehearse that Arkansas has a good food production, and is a great timber State, that Arkansas is making progress at a rapid rate, but my whole heart's desire is to make the school situation better in the State and to make Arkansas another Carolina."

That is the boost given North Carolina by Governor Tom J. Herral in welcoming the Southern Forestry Congress when it assembled for its recent annual session at Little Rock, Arkansas, according to J. S. Holmes, State Forester of the North Carolina Geological and Economic Survey, one of the representatives from North Carolina attending the meeting. That the Governor's words were not merely oratorical, said Mr. Holmes, was proved by his endorsement of the aims of the Congress as set forth in a bill to inaugurate a system of forest fire prevention, reforestation and State forests, which is to be organized largely along the lines of the forest fire prevention service of North Carolina.

Mr. Holmes, who retired as president of the Congress, is now a member of the executive committee. Its membership is composed of a number of forestry experts, large land owners and representatives of lumber interests in all the Southern and several of the Southwestern states. The newly elected president, who will serve for one year, is H. L. Tilghman, of Marion, S. C., who has large timber interests. The program of the recent meeting, said Mr. Holmes, included papers from a number of authorities on such subjects as reforestation, timber management, forest fire prevention and paper making in the South.

motorists and others upon the highways and this should be followed up by rigid enforcement of the statutes.

The suggestion set forth by the Raleigh News and Observer that every person should be required to pass examination before being licensed to drive an automobile and severe punishment for those who are wilfully reckless or careless is no doubt a partial solution to our present problem and our legislators would do well to incorporate such provisions in the motorists laws now before that body.

Commenting editorially upon the recent report the News and Observer says:

"Since September, 27 persons were killed and 344 injured in automobile accidents in North Carolina. Careless and reckless driving caused 113 of the 421 accidents, speeding caused 89, intoxicated drivers caused 34, driving on wrong side of the road resulted in 16 collisions, while 19 accidents were due to faults in the car. Three children on roads or streets were killed and speeders killed eight persons.

"These figures should give pause to people who drive cars and to public officials. Greater care should be exercised, there should be examination and license of all who drive, and speeders and reckless and drunken drivers should be punished and they should not be permitted to drive cars within a year. This in addition to prison sentences when recklessness and drinking are proved. Small fines will never result in reducing these almost murders and unnecessary maimings."

BILL PROVIDING FOR BUREAU OF IDENTIFICATION BE GIVEN HEARING TUESDAY

A bill providing for the establishment of a "State Bureau of Identification for the purpose of gathering and disseminating criminal intelligence of police information," which was introduced by Senator Everett, of this city, will be given a hearing before the Senate judiciary committee No. 1, on Tuesday Feb. 3, at 3 o'clock.

It also provides for the installment of the "Henry System" of finger print identification.

If the measure is adopted the Governor will be directed to employ a fingerprint expert to operate the Identification Bureau within 90 days after ratification. 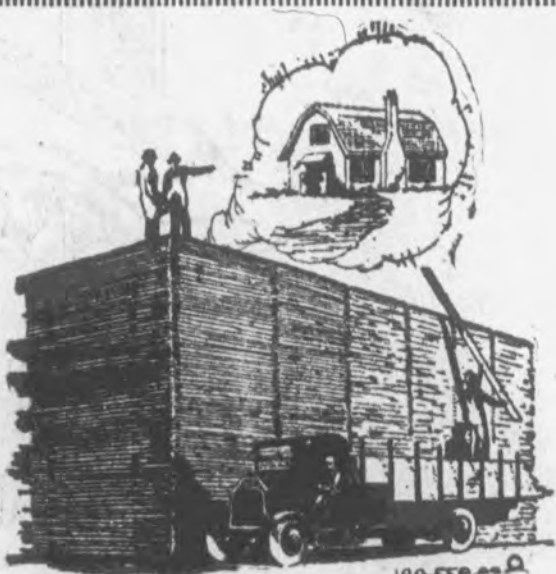
