A BILL TO REVISE N. C. CONSTITUTION PRESENTED HOUSE

Proponents of Measure Declare Present Con- stitution is Confusing and Antiquated

Raleigh, Jan. 29. — Out standing among new bills introduced in the General Assembly today one was dropped into the House hopper which would provide for a Constitutional Convention for the purpose of revising the state constitution to better suit modern needs. Considerable agitation in this respect has developed in several quarters, proponents of the measure who declare the constitution now with its numerous amendments is confusing and antiquated.

Senator Johnson, of Robeson, sent forward in the upper house a measure which would make it harder to secure absolute divorce in this state. The measure would require parties to the divorce to live under an interlocutory decree for one year fulfilling conditions set forth by the court in granting separation before a judgment of absolute divorce could be rendered.

The Senate passed on its final reading, the committee's substitute for the House bill providing for a new salaries scale for clerks and other employees of the legislature. The substitute provides for payment of \$8 per day to principal clerks and \$4 per day to principal clerks. Practically the only change over the original House bill is the increase of \$1 per day for principal clerks. The clause in the House bill eliminating the old policy of giving bonuses at the end of the session is retained. Senator Johnson, of Anson declared when the bill was sent forward that it would save the state \$42 per day during the session.

The House of Representatives after an extended debate tabled the bill sponsored by the State Department of Insurance which would repeal the law requiring medical examination by insurance companies prior to the issuance of life insurance policies. The House also tabled another Insurance Department measure. This would have required license, by persons doing electric wiring for the public.

Meetings Held in Iredell to Promote Building Fertile Soils

Statesville, Jan. 29. — To promote the building of more fertile soils in Iredell county by growing and plowing under a legume crop, R. W. Graeber, farm agent for the State College extension division at work in this county, has just closed a week's intensive campaign. During this campaign a total of seventeen meetings were held in the various sections of the county. Approximately 700 of the leading farmers of the county attended these meetings. Bad weather during the early part of the week prevented a larger attendance.

At the close of each meeting those farmers interested in the planting of lespedeza were asked to hand in their names to the county agent and 101 agreed to plant an acre or more as a soil improving crop during the month of February and March. A number of other farmers have come into the office of the county agent in Statesville, since the meetings were held and have agreed to plant some of their fields to this soil improving crop, says Mr. Graeber.

Mr. Graeber further states that many hundreds of other farmers will plant red clover this year. However, the campaign was especially put on to promote the planting of lespedeza in that this crop grows well on poor soils, may be sown over the small grain at this season of the year and will make its best growth after the grain has been cut. This obviates the necessity of summer plowing at a time when farmers are very busy. Mr. Graeber also states that the interest created by this campaign will continue to grow and will direct much attention to the importance of planting soil improving crops. He says that indications now are for more than 200 farmers of Iredell county to grow lespedeza for the first time this year.

ORPHEUM THEATRE IN GREENSBORO IS DESTROYED BY FIRE

Estimate of Loss and Damage of Morning Fire in Business Dis- trict Not Yet Made Public

Greensboro, Jan. 29. — The Orpheum Theatre building located in the center of the business and amusement district was, practically destroyed by fire early this morning. The blaze, gave the firemen their hardest fight in years and the extreme cold taxed their efforts to a great extent.

The origin of the fire is as yet undetermined but firemen believe it to have been caused by defective wiring on the second floor. The building was owned by the Greensboro Banking and Trust Company and was on the site partially occupied by the McAdoo hotel which was burned 10 or twelve years ago in one of the worst fires in the history of the city.

It was stated that the loss had not been estimated as adjoining buildings suffered heavily from damage by water and fire in addition to the loss of all property of the stock company which was playing the theatre.

VETERANS' BUREAU CONSPIRACY CASE NEARING THE END

Case Against Charles R. Forbes and J. W. Thompson Will Prob- ably Go to Jury This Afternoon

Chicago, Jan. 29. — The Veterans' Bureau conspiracy trial is near at its end today after more than two months. Only the final argument of government counsel, which began after the opening of this morning's session and the court instructions remained for the session with indications that the case would be given to the jury early this afternoon. Counsel for all parties concerned expressed opinion that a verdict would be rendered within a short while.

Charles R. Forbes, former Director of the Veterans' Bureau, and J. W. Thompson, wealthy contractor of Chicago and St. Louis, have been on trial for two months on charges of conspiracy to defraud the government through Veterans' Bureau hospital contracts. The defendants are the first persons brought to trial under criminal proceedings as a result of the far flung Senate investigations which crowded the history of 1923 and 1924. Thirty three overt acts were specified in the indictment on which the trial was based. Among the charges are conspiracy to prevent free competitive bidding, favoritism in certain contracts for contemplated projects and the passing of confidential information relating to selection of sites.

GOVERNMENT CASE AGAINST MEANS NOW IN ITS LAST STAGES

Spectators Crowd the Court Room to Capacity as Frank P. Walsh Addresses Jury in Be- half of Defendants

New York, Jan. 29. — The trial of Gaston B. Means and Thomas B. Felder for conspiracy to bribe government officials entered into its last stages today with all the spectators the federal court here would hold trying to get a glimpse of the defendants as Frank P. Walsh began to exhort the jury in behalf of Felder. Counsel for Means had already summed up its case while Special Prosecutor Todd divided his time into two parts had delivered half of his address to the jury yesterday and was to follow Walsh with the remainder today.

The jury may get the case today. Walsh's defense for Felder, who is Means's attorney is alleged to have tried to bribe government officials in the Crago System Glass casket mail fraud case, was based upon three contentions. He held that Felder was accepting only a legitimate fee when he received \$47,000 from 65 alleged stock swindlers in the Crago case; that Means was not present when the fee was paid and that Felder did not share in or even know about the \$10,000 telegraphed from the Crago case defendants to Elmer Jarnecke, secretary to Means.

COLDER WEATHER IS FORECAST FOR EAST

Rain, Snow and Sleet Was Prevalent Thru- out State Last Night

Charlotte, Jan. 29. — North Carolina generally today lay under a coat of sleet or snow that made travel difficult and caused virtual suspension in many places of automobile traffic. From every section of the state came reports of sleet, snow or rains which froze upon the ground. The general prediction was that the weather would warm up in the western and central sections during the day but in the east colder weather was expected.

DR. SU YAT SEN IS STILL ALIVE

Peking, China, Jan. 29. — Dr. Sun Yat Sen, leader of the former government of Southern China, who underwent an operation for cancer recently, spent a comfortable night according to reports today.

Dr. Sun was reported dead Tuesday in dispatches received in Tokyo from a Japanese news agency. After Dr. Sun was operated upon it was expected his illness would prove fatal within 10 days.

SENATE AUTHORIZES SURVEY PROPOSED NATIONAL PARK SITE

Secretary of Interior Is Empowered to Ap- point Commission to Study Advisability of Creating Parks

Washington, Jan. 29. — The House Public Lands Committee today reported favorably a bill authorizing the Secretary of Interior to investigate sites of three proposed national parks in the southern Appalachian Mountains and other such territories in the region as might be suitable for park purposes.

The measure would direct the Secretary to gather full information on all aspects of the proposed sites and report back to Congress such recommendations as he might deem advisable. Specifically the bill calls for a survey of proposed sites in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia and the Smoky Mountains of North Carolina and Tennessee and the Mammoth Cave region in Kentucky. To carry out the survey the Secretary is empowered to appoint a commission of five members and an appropriation of \$20,000 would be authorized to defray the expenses. It was pointed out that the bill does not definitely recommend the creation of any park and provides only for the full collection of data together with what co-operation could be expected from states interested in the proposed national parks.

Connie Mack's Son To Head Athletics

Philadelphia, Jan. 29. — Manager Connie Mack, of the Philadelphia American League baseball club, announced today that his son, Earl Mack had been appointed Captain of the Athletics to succeed Danny Murphy.

Young Mack formerly managed a team in the Carolina Association.

Twenty Killed In Effort to Disarm Defeated Troops

Shanghai, Jan. 29. — Twenty persons were killed and 20 were injured in a thickly settled section of the Chinese district when a small group of victorious troops representing the central government were resisted when they attempted to disarm 1,000 defeated Kiangsu troops.

Shoots Fiancee and Then Takes Own Life

Clarksburg, W. Va., Jan. 29. — Neeron C. Woods, 22, a freshman in the law school of Yale University shot and killed himself here early today after he had fired two shots into body of Mrs. Georgia Warder, 25 years old widow of Bridgeport, W. Va.

Tragedy is believed to have been caused by Mrs. Warder's refusal to marry Woods.

Belgium to Hold Centennial Fair. Brussels. — A world's fair is to take place in Belgium in 1930, in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the founding of the kingdom. Brussels and Antwerp, which at first were rivals for the honor of being selected as the seat of the fair, have buried the hatchet and agreed on a compromise by which exhibitions are to take place in both cities.

DEPARTMENT STORE PROMINENT FIGURE DESTROYED BY FIRE WILMINGTON TODAY

Damage Resulting From Early Morning Conflagration is Es- timated at \$75,000

Wilmington, Jan. 29. — Damage estimated at \$75,000, was done by fire here early today which destroyed the Fitch department store and damaged an establishment to the rear of the building. One fireman was overcome by smoke and was taken to a local hospital.

Firemen fought desperately for nearly two hours before the flames, which were discovered about 2 o'clock, were brought under control. Every piece of fire-fighting equipment in the city was called out and a crew of volunteers from the Coast Guard Cutter, Modoc, aided the firemen.

GAS TAKES TOLL OF SIX LIVES TODAY

Entire Family Wiped Out as Result of the Fumes From Broken Gas Main

Seranton, Pa., Jan. 29. — Illuminating gas from a main thought to have been broken from a surface accident today took a toll of six lives in the family of Louis Testino in West Seranton. The dead are Mr. and Mrs. Testino, Stanley age 5; Upolia, 8; Margaret, 3, and another daughter one year old. Many other families in the neighborhood were affected by the gas but managed to escape to the open air.

A passerby early today smelled the escaping gas, and unable to arouse those within the Testino residence, called for help and forced open the door. Upon discovering the family lying in their beds in the gas-filled rooms several physicians with pumpmeters were rushed to West Seranton. All attempts to revive the victim, proved in vain.

Funeral Services of S. Glenn Young, Slain Ku Klux Klan Dry Leader in Illinois Con- ducted This After- noon

Herrin, Ill., Jan. 29. — The last chapter in the life story of S. Glenn Young, Ku Klux Klan dry leader, was written today.

Thousands assembled to pay last tribute to the man whose feats during the last thirteen months have frequently forced his name upon the front pages of newspapers. So great was the crowd that it was necessary to hold simultaneous services in several churches and in the Masonic temple. Young's body rested in the Baptist Church to which it was taken after the killing Saturday night. At the church today the ordinary funeral services of the Baptist Church took place, but at the cemetery the Ku Klux Klan took charge of the service.

Meanwhile the inquest into the tragedy was due to end today and a verdict of the coroner's jury is probable tonight.

Pat Crawford Busy Mapping Schedule Baseball, Football

Gastonia, Jan. 29. — Pat Crawford, of the Gastonia High School, is now engaged in mapping out a tentative schedule for baseball and football games with high schools of the state. Games will be played with Charlotte and Shelby, it is stated, and games are pending with the Monroe High School.

Railroad Worker Killed By Train

High Point, Jan. 29. — James Padgett, 23, of Saluda, S. C., a railroad section worker, was fatally injured when struck by a Southern passenger train at a crossing here this morning.

Padgett was working on the track and apparently failed to hear the approaching train. He was taken to a hospital with a fractured skull and other injuries, from which physicians said he would not recover.

MORRISON WOULD DEBATE FINANCES WITH JOS. DANIELS

Former Governor Chal- lenges Raleigh Editor to Joint Debate as Re- sult of Comment On State Affairs

Charlotte, Jan. 29. — Josephus Daniels, former Secretary of Navy and editor of the Raleigh News and Observer, has been challenged by former Governor Cameron Morrison to a joint debate on the finances of North Carolina. The letter was made public here last night by Mr. Morrison.

"Your attacks upon the fiscal policies of the late administration have been most misleading and unjust to your brother Democrats responsible for that administration, as well as harmful to the interests of the state," said the letter.

In conclusion, the letter said, "I am prepared to sustain the proposition that the financial affairs of North Carolina are, in splendid shape and that the assaults which you and others are making upon the state's financial condition are unfounded in fact, are based upon theories of accounting which are not recognized by business men anywhere, and are unjustly hurting the fair name of the state and injuring its credit."

Raleigh, Jan. 29. — Josephus Daniels, editor of the Raleigh News and Observer, received today former Governor Morrison's challenge to a joint debate on state finances.

Mr. Daniels indicated last night he would not accept the invitation and suggested that the former governor challenge Governor McLean to the debate on the subject.

After receiving the letter today he had nothing further to add to his brief statement of last night. He indicated, however, he would reply to Mr. Morrison's letter this afternoon.

Six Ribbons Won In North Carolina At Poultry Show

Raleigh, Jan. 29. — A record of winning never before established by farm poultry grown and finished by rural club boys and girls, was made by poultry from North Carolina at the Madison Square Garden Poultry Show in New York City last week, reports Allen G. Civer, Poultry Extension Specialist for the State College of Agriculture. Mr. Oliver has just returned to Raleigh from New York where he attended this show, bringing with him four first ribbons, on third and one fifth ribbon.

These ribbons were won by farm grown poultry and exhibited by farm boys and girls, under the leadership of Mr. Oliver. The winners were made by representatives of the Wyandotte, Leghorn and Sussex breeds, grown in Wake, Anson and Catawba counties. One first place went to Norris Jeffery of Wake county with an entry of Sussex poultry. Catawba county won three first ribbons and the third and fifth places went to Anson county.

Mr. Oliver states that credit for the showing made by these club birds must be largely given to the county agents of the extension division who have worked with the young folks in developing good flocks of pure bred birds. The entries competed against the world and some of the best known fanciers of the country had their birds on exhibit. Over 5,700 birds were shown, states Mr. Oliver, and more would have been entered except for the fowl plague quarantine which prevented many shippers from sending their birds to New York.

Mr. Oliver expressed himself as highly gratified at the fine showing made by these club boys and girls, stating that the good work with poultry in this State is beginning to bear fruit.

Extends Time for On Action of Norris Power Industry Probe

Washington, Jan. 29. — The Senate today extended to February 5 the time within which the Interstate Commerce Committee must act on the resolution of Senator Norris, Republican of Nebraska, requiring the Federal Trade Commission to investigate the power industry.

DISCORDANT SOUND MAY BE MASTERED BY NEW INVENTION

Iowa, City, Ia., Jan.—By causing successive waves of sound to interfere with each other's transmissions, Dr. G. W. Stewart, a professor of physics at the University of Iowa, has perfected a device which he believes in time may be used to eliminate undesirable noises and to adjust sounds to an individual's aesthetic taste.

The establishment of quiet zones for hospitals and the requirement of mufflers for automobiles testify to the penetrating nature of sound waves. They will pass, Dr. Stewart says, through most minute cracks and even through an apparently solid wall. With the theory that sound waves would expend themselves were they placed in conflict with one another, Dr. Stewart worked out his device which he calls an acoustic wave filter.

The results are obtained, Dr. Stewart explains, not by placing obstructions in the path of sound, but by setting up a sort of battle between the various waves, thus causing a disordered transmission.

A brass cylinder tube one-half inch in diameter and six inches long, containing nothing but air and open at both ends is caused to transmit all tones on a piano up to certain note and above this to transmit no audible sound. With another and slightly different tube, the tones below this same or any other note, will be refused transmission, whereas all higher tones pass freely.

"Other equally remarkable results of a similar nature can be obtained," said Dr. Stewart in explaining his device. "The tubes, while entirely open and free from obstructions, have, at regular intervals, branching tubes and chambers. At each branching point waves are reflected backward through the tube. The design of the branches can be made in such a manner as to produce a backward reflection and an interference of almost any group of tones."

Dr. Stewart explained that he considered the device truly a filter. It is a new basic method of manipulating sound waves and may find application in many acoustic devices in use today. "The telephone the phonograph and even musical instruments themselves may sooner or later profit by this new device," Dr. Stewart said. "In fact, there is opened to the imagination the possibility of elimination of undesirable noises and the enjoyment of sounds adjusted to an individual aesthetic taste."

Labor Conditions Remain About Same For Past 2 Weeks

Raleigh, N. C., Jan. 29.—Labor conditions in North Carolina during the week ending January 24, were about the same as on the preceding week, with the supply and demand about equal, according to the weekly report made public here today by Frank D. Grist, Commissioner of Labor and Printing.

In some sections the bad weather was reported as having a bad effect on employment, but in most instances, according to the report, the outlook with the coming fair weather is optimistic. In other sections a surplus of clerical workers is reported, while the demand for unskilled labor is about balanced.

During the week a total of 843 people registered with the six bureaus in the state, and of this number 639 were men and 204 women. The requests for help are given as 711, 520 men and 172 women. A total of 703 applicants were referred, 525 men and 178 women.

The number of placements during the week were 490 men and 158 women, making a total of 648, as shown by the report. Those reported as placed are classified in the report as follows: Skilled, 79; unskilled, 385; clerical and professional, 56; industrial, 1; domestic, 127.

Employment conditions as they exist at bureau points in the state are summed up in the report as follows:

Ashville: Situation well balanced. However, there has been a surplus of skilled labor and domestic workers during the past week.

Greensboro: More applications from drifting men have been reported during the past week than usual. There is not sufficient work at the present time to keep unskilled labor employed. The domestic help situation is about normal. There has been an increase in the number of calls for

Winston-Salem: A demand for unskilled labor is noted. There is no demand for clerical workers and good domestic help is easily placed. It seems that a lot of white boys are leaving the farms and seeking employment in the city, and because they have no trade it is almost impossible to place them.

Wilmington: Calls for help have been below normal on account of the bad weather. An improvement in the situation in regard to skilled and unskilled labor is expected with the coming of fair weather.

Charlotte: The supply and demand for unskilled labor is about equal. There is a shortage of common labor, but a surplus of clerical and professional workers and domestic help is reported.

Raleigh: The situation in this city is reported as dull. A surplus of clerical workers is reported.

LONDON TO HAVE A REAL BROADWAY MOVIE PALACE

London, Jan.—London's newest moving picture theatre, the Capitol, which is to provide the British capital with entertainment of the sort furnished at Broadway's great movie palaces, will seat 2,000 persons and will house two ballrooms and a huge restaurant.

The theatre, situated in the Haymarket, is built on the first floor above the street. Valued at \$1,850,000 the house has been leased for 50 years at an annual rental of \$100,000.

The Capitol will have an orchestra of 50 persons.

AMERICAN GOVERNOR BANS SAMOAN CHIEFTAIN TITLE

Apia, Samoa.—The title of "Tui-manu" of the Manua district of American Samoa has been prohibited by the governor, Capt. Edward S. Kellogg. U. S. N. Manuans who claim the right to bestow the title are aggrieved.

The governor explained that he would not allow the title to be held for the reason that it was equivalent to a kingship, and under the American government there could be no king.

A large number of Samoan titles are designated as "Tui." The word is Tongan, introduced into the Samoan language. A dictionary of the Samoan language defines it as "high chief" or "king." But the Samoan word for king is "Tupu."

A Tuimanoa does not exercise any political power, but his person is considered sacred and he commands the highest respect.

BB OF GOLDEN TIDE PLANTERS GIVEN MAY MEAN SOUNDER MONEY IN EUROPE

New York, Jan.—Year-end figures make available today a clearer picture of whether Europe's mortgage, pre-war gold deposit here has definitely begun to go back home, and if so, to what extent.

A remarkable outbound movement of the yellow metal amounting to \$40,242,000 in the first 27 days of December produced the first surplus of exports over imports in a single month since August, 1920. More gold went out during this short period than during the entire 12 months of either 1923 or 1924. Its impetus obviously developed under the cumulative pressure of foreign loans amounting to \$1,023,696,000, which American banks turned back into depleted but premium-paying reservoirs abroad in 1924, some \$350,000,000 of which were arranged in the last three months. Whether foreign loans in the new year of 1925 will make up at the extraordinary rate the gold left off is expected to determine whether this new export phase in the gold is to be continuous and permanent.

Some bankers would reserve decision and, for the time being, average the closing month's spirited ebbs with the 12 months as a whole. Comparison of 1924 and 1923, with figures for 1924 as yet approximate, reveals:

1924, \$622,226,478 315,048,387 253,437,909
1923, 28,643,417 322,715,812 294,072,395

Thus it seen that where the United States received across the international counter in 1923 11 times as much monetary gold as paid out, in the year 1924 it received only five times as much. Export shipments for the past 12 months are seen to have doubled. Net imports fell off one-seventh.

Meanwhile the United States still holds two-fifths of all the \$10,000,000,000 in monetary gold in the world. This stock, according to some financial observers is twice as much as is required to support the credit and currency facilities adequate to trade needs. They would like to see gold continue to ebb in proportion sufficient to take up the slack.

They further welcome a growing gold demand abroad as an earnest of increasing sound money sentiment among other nations. This would bring them out of the wilderness of paper money and depreciated currencies and back under the gold standard. It would also save the United States from the threat of any general repudiation of gold, of which it holds the greatest single portion. Were the world at large to turn its back upon gold as a basis for monetary systems it would leave the United States with its gold stock like a white elephant on its hands.

G. Berlin, Jan.—There are today so many places of amusements in the German capital that they interfere with each others' business, and but few of them do well financially. Most marked in recent years has been the development of the opera and the revue. While before the war Berlin had two operas, it now has four; while it boasted of one revue in 1914, six are now competing with each other.

Not included in the 51 theatres running today are the movie houses and the cabarets. There were hardly any cinemas in Berlin before the war; now there are 320 of them, supplying for the most part American films. In 1914 the idea of a cabaret was associated with but two institutions, the "Linden" and the "Black Cat." Now there are 63 of them. When a restaurant has difficulties in maintaining itself, it promptly installs a cabaret in the hope of attracting guests.

Berlin counts also six vaudeville houses and 11 dance palaces.
