WOULD GRANT GOV'R RIGHT TO APPOINT CERTAIN OFFICERS

Governor and Certain State Boards Would Appoint Respective Officers Under New Bill in Legislature

Raleigh, Jan. 31.—Taking it easy after yesterday's rush of business, both Houses of the General Assembly held brief sessions today at which the principal matter of importance centered in introduction of two bills to provide for the appointment of certain state officers by the governor and two governing boards, doing away with the election by the people. Another new bill, which attracted interest was jointly introduced in both houses by Representative Simpson, and Senator Sharp, both of Rockingham county, to amend the statutes governing the department of Public Welfare so as to exempt orphanages operated by religious denominations and fraternal orders from that section which gives the department power to issue and revoke license of such institutions.

Both of the bills relative to the appointment of certain state officers were introduced by Senator Foushee, of Durham. One would amend the section of the constitution necessitating election before ratification, so that the governor could appoint the Attorney General, State Auditor, and State Treasurer. This bill also would provide for appointment of Superintendent of Public Instruction by the State Board of Education.

Senator Foushee's other measure would amend the consolidated statutes so that the State Board of Agriculture could appoint the commissioner of Agriculture.

The bill by the Senator and Representative from Rockingham follows on the heels of another measure of the State Board of Public Welfare in regard to orphanage supervision instead of decreasing them as proposed in today's bill. The measure to increase the power of the department was reported favorable last week, but was referred back to the committee for a public hearing.

The Senate Committee today filed a report recommending the passage of the bill inculcating the changes proposed by the bus investigation.

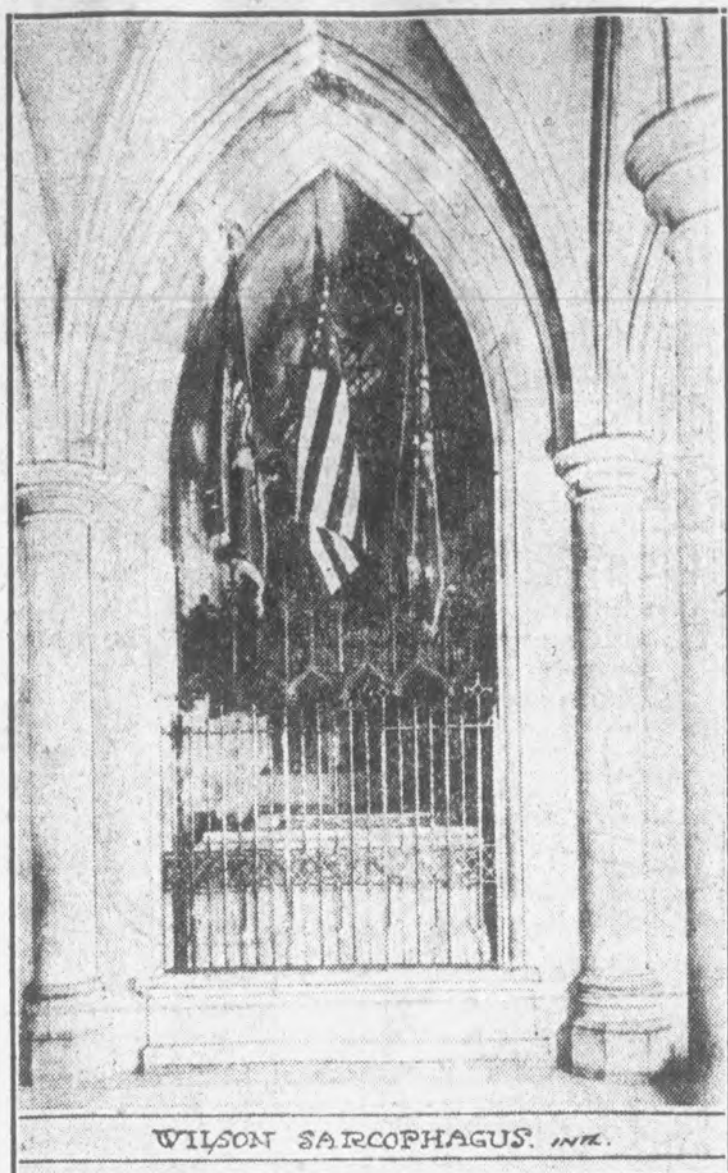

FIVE PERSONS LOSE LIVES APARTMENT HOUSE FIRE TODAY

Hundred Thinly Clad Occupants Forced Into Below Zero Weather as Flames Sweep Building

Chicago, Jan. 31.—Five persons were killed and four injured when fire destroyed a four-story apartment building at 59th street and Blackstone Avenue early today. Two others of the approximately 100 persons who occupied the building are missing.

The identified dead are Anthony Hardee, age 24, and his 22 year old wife, and their baby, and Loretta Pryor, age 16. The body of another woman could be seen in the debris, and it was believed to be the mother of Miss Pryor.

The women were killed when they leaped from the third story window. The building was old, dating from World's Fair days, and was consumed quickly.

The occupants had no time to dress in the below zero weather.

New York Editor Sentenced to Serve Six Years in Prison

New York, Jan. 31.—Stephen G. Clow, editor of Broadway Brevities, was convicted of using the mails to defraud, and was sentenced to serve 6 years and one day in the Atlanta prison. He was also fined \$6,000.

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Odds Against Cattle Thieves.

Buenos Aires.—The police authorities of Santiago del Estero are planning to use airplanes in the pursuit of cattle thieves in that province of north Argentina. Cattle stealing there is made easy by the lack of roads and the impossibility of rapid pursuit over extensive uninhabited districts.

FORBES, THOMPSON DRAW PRISON TERMS FOR CONSPIRACY

First Criminal Trial of War Fraud Cases Ends After 10 Weeks of Testimony and Argument

Chicago, Jan. 31.—Charles R. Forbes, former director of Veterans' Bureau, and J. W. Thompson, wealthy Chicago and St. Louis, Contractor, today faced sentences in the penitentiary not to exceed two years.

The two men were found guilty last night of conspiracy to defraud the government on contracts for soldiers' hospitals. The federal jury took 12 ballots and deliberated for five hours. Motion was immediately made by the defense for a new trial and the hearing was set for February. Sentence was reserved pending the hearing.

NEGOTIATING FOR MONEY SETTLEMENT BETWEEN CHAPLINS

Attorneys for 16 Years Old Wife of Film Comedian Declares the Settlement Has Nothing to Do With Separation

Los Angeles, Jan. 31.—Attorneys are negotiating a financial settlement between Charles Chaplin, motion picture comedian, and the 16 year old bride of marriage in Mexico last November, says the Los Angeles Times today.

That Mrs. Chaplin, formerly Miss Lita Gray, leading woman for the comedian, had joined members of her family, became known, according to the Times, upon the arrival here a week ago of Edwin McMurray, San Francisco, an uncle of the bride.

McMurray today is quoted by the Times as admitting that the financial settlement was the cause, although declaring that there is no connection between these negotiations and any contemplated action for separation or divorce.

Chaplin, himself, has avoided interviews, and efforts to communicate with him have met with no success. Many efforts to obtain personal interview with Mrs. Chaplin were met with refusal also.

AMERICAN ORDERED TO LEAVE RUMANIA

Baptist Teacher Given 15 Days to Make His Departure Under New Law Banishing Undesirables

Bucharest, Roumania, Jan. 31.—Roumanian authorities have given Dr. Daniel Hurley, American citizen, 15 days to leave the country. No charges against him were preferred, but the order was issued under a recent ruling that all undesirable foreigners could be forced to leave the country.

The law ostensibly was intended to control Communist propaganda. Mr. Hurley was sent to Roumania about a year ago by the Southern Baptist Mission Board as teacher in the seminary organized here by the American Board. The American Consul has requested Roumanian authorities to revoke their order concerning Dr. Hurley.

Export Trade Canned and Dried Fruits Successful Last Year

Washington, Jan. 31.—According to the figures covering export trade of 1924 in canned and dried fruits just released by the United States Chamber of Commerce the year has been unusually successful. Excepting the extraordinary exports of some of these commodities immediately after the war, records for volumes of business have been made in 1924.

The rate of increase of exports over 1923 has varied from 3.8 per cent in the case of evaporated milk to 273 per cent in the case of dried prunes. Prune exports have been almost double those of any previous year. All canned and dried fruits exports in 1924 show considerable growth, states the report.

Comparison with pre-war years is not considered satisfactory, it is said, since in these years only value of exports were tabulated. Taken as a class, however, the trade has reached pre-war levels and shows a prospect of continued advances in the coming years.

M'LEAN DECLARES QUARTER BILLION NEEDED FOR ROADS

Says Present Program Will Necessitate \$250,000,000 on the Basis of 6,500 Miles Hard Surfaced Highways

Raleigh, Jan. 31.—"It will take at least \$250,000,000 to complete North Carolina road program, that is on the basis of 16,500 miles of hard surface highways," said Gov. McLean in his statement this afternoon. "I am in no wise opposed to a continuance of our road program. On the contrary I am in favor of preserving it and carrying it on. For that reason I am opposed to issuing more than \$20,000,000 in bonds at the present time. I am a staunch advocate of good roads, and I do not want to be understood as opposing them. If \$35,000,000 were all that will be needed I should probably be for that amount but it is not, and I want us to proceed on a safe and sound basis."

Greenville Boy Passes State Bar Examination

The list of the 60 successful applicants of the 97 who took the recent examination for licenses to practice law in North Carolina made public yesterday by the Clerk of Supreme Court of North Carolina, contained the name of Mr. William Lipscomb Whedbee of this city.

Mr. Whedbee, the son of Judge and Mrs. Harry W. Whedbee and is a graduate of the University of North Carolina.

U. S. Gift at Peace Palace.

The Hague.—A statue of Justice, the gift of the United States government, has been received at the Peace Palace, and has been placed under the dome over the grand staircase. The statue is the work of Andrew O'Connor of Paxton, Mass. A formal presentation is to be made shortly by Richard M. Tobin, American minister to the Netherlands.

REVENUE INCREASE WILL BE NECESSARY TO MEET EXPENSES

If Recommendations of Budget Commission Are Followed Approximately \$6,000,000 More in Revenue Must Be Raised

Raleigh, Jan. 31.—An annual increase in the revenue of the state of close to \$6,000,000 will have to be met if the appropriation recommended by the Budget Commission yesterday is to be followed. The Commission recommended annual appropriation, for the next two fiscal years of \$13,849,710 and \$14,181,132. These figures, while they represent large increases over the revenue of the state during the last biennial period, at the same time were greatly under the request made of the commission by the state institutions and departments for maintenance and administration.

In addition to the recommendations for appropriation from the general fund, the commission recommended \$3,700,000 for permanent improvements at state institutions, a decrease by approximately \$14,000,000 over the request made by the institutions.

The commission also went into an explanation of the deficit in the general fund, which it estimates, by June 30, 1925, would reach \$9,515,788.63. It explained that in its opinion this deficit was largely caused by the change in the system of taxation of the state four years ago when 11 months passed without any appropriations being made for expense of that period, thus causing an accumulated deficit.

Permits Issued for Construction Work For the Past Year

Richmond, Va., Jan. 31.—Although 1923 was a record breaking year in construction work, both the number and estimated valuation of permits issued for new work in 1924 exceeded the figures of the previous year, according to a report issued here today by The Federal Reserve Bank of Richmond. The figures given apply to the Fifth District. The total number of permits issued in the reporting cities during 1924 was 25,191, with estimated valuation amounting to \$162,566,001, compared with 23,940 permits and a valuation of \$149,399,911 issued during 1923, says the report.

The volume of the construction work, according to the report, was scattered quite generally throughout the District, only one city, Charleston, S. C., falling behind its 1923 figures. Among the cities reporting increased operations in 1924, Asheville and Spartanburg stand out on percentage gain, and an enormous amount of work was undertaken in Baltimore, Richmond and Washington.

During the month of December, 1924, the number of permits for new structures issued in North Carolina cities, as stated in the report, are as follows:

Asheville, 26; Charlotte, 40; Durham, 18; Greensboro, 36; High Point, 35; Raleigh, 42; Salisbury, 6; Wilmington, 8; Winston-Salem, 41.

A DANGEROUS PRACTICE

During yesterday two children on roller skates were run down by automobiles here through no fault of the motorists. Each of the accidents was caused by the skater darting across the street just ahead of the approaching vehicles.

It is a common occurrence to see many children skating about the streets of the city and apparently they pay little or no heed to the passing traffic. Many of the youngsters have begun the practice of trailing or hanging on to motor and other vehicles as they pass along the streets and sooner or later this dangerous practice will result in either death or serious injury to some child and then will be too late to begin to take precautionary measures.

While we believe in wholesome fun and

recreation for the children they should not be allowed to endanger their lives amid the traffic of our streets. If they must skate out of doors let them use the sidewalks and take their chances among the pedestrians rather than with the vehicles on the streets.

Parents should caution their children against these dangers and should this not procure the desired results the city authorities should take steps to prohibit all street skating now, before it is too late to save some child's life.

HOT AIR WILL NOT PAY THE DEFICIT

Despite of all that has been said there still appears to be a deficit in the state's finances which argument and debate will not remove. The auditors report and that of the budget commission both declare that a deficit exists and the satisfying of political or personal grievances through debate or mud slinging will in no way help the situation.

Instead of discord among officials and others interested in affairs of the state it seems that the best policy to pursue would be one of hearty co-operation by all toward more economical government and elimination of waste in an effort to overcome the existing deficit.

ALL MUST PAY

After 10 weeks of trial Charles R. Forbes and J. W. Thompson, the first two persons brought to trial in connection with war frauds, have been found guilty. Almost simultaneously Gaston B. Means and Thomas B. Felder were convicted on charges of conspiracy to bribe government officials. Soon others will no doubt be brought to task for the government is determined that graft and corruption in office must cease.

VAST SUMS OF GOLD DISAPPEAR YEARLY IN FARAWAY LANDS

New York, Jan. 30.—What becomes of all the gold produced by the mines of the world, is a frequent inquiry, particularly with the growing importance of gold shipments, and the question may be answered as follows:

Colony among civilized nations, which accounts for about one-fourth of the production; use in industrial arts; waste, a five-dollar gold piece, for example, losing 1 1/2 per cent in weight after one year's use; hoarding, by which millions of dollars are mysteriously swallowed up annually among primitive peoples; and loss, as through fire, shipwreck and similar causes.

Gold mining in this country has fallen off because the industry has found it hard to turn a profit at post-war prices. The price of gold has long been fixed by the government at \$20.67 an ounce. Year in, year out, regardless of supply and demand, it remains "pegged" at this figure.

The purchasing value of gold, meanwhile, varies, fluctuating with price levels. A bunch of gold economists compute, purchases perhaps only 60 percent as much now as before the war. Mine cost, in consequence, could not be realized on many lower-grade workings and many have shut down.

Yet gold the world over continues to come from the earth at a rate estimated in 1923 at about \$20,000,000,000 worth a year. Gold bullion priced at \$250,000,000 was on deposit last year in the vaults of the U. S. Assay Office in Wall Street, which is regarded as the most important clearing station in this country for monetary gold and gold used in fine arts.

At this closely-guarded crossroads from the gold field to the bank vault, the incoming alloyed gold is melted as much as five times in refining; five to seven assays are made from samples; the whole weighed and reweighed, checked and rechecked.

Platinum is a most valuable by-product of the refining at the Assay Office. As much as 1,500 ounces of it have been recovered in 12 months, all velvet for the government, an. quoted from \$250 to \$300 an ounce, worth from \$375,000 to \$450,000.

Gold in bars was bought last year from the Assay Office by American makers of fine art subjects at a monthly average of \$5,000,000, according to one outside estimate. The Director of the Mint from such data as he had available, calculated the gold used in industry in the calendar year 1923 was \$69,292,245, of which \$40,013,175 was new material.

The far east and Africa are held responsible for the disappearance of much of the world's gold. India is called "a great sink for the precious metal," and in the last half century it is estimated to have made away with at least one and one half billion dollars in gold. Gold is used there in decoration, ornaments and textiles and hoarded and buried by owners who die, in many cases, without revealing the location of their caches. This drain is put at several million dollars annually.

China is said to be even more of a sponge for gold while in Africa the gold is paid in wages to Kaffir laborers at the mines goes with them to their kraals and somehow never returns, it is said. Trading posts well in the heart of the Dark Continent also report a lively demand for gold coins of whatever currency. Native chiefs, headmen and even braves covet the shining tokens to lavish upon their women for coin necklaces and bangles.

THE WEATHER

Moderate temperatures prevailed over belt, no rains anywhere. Forecast: Entire belt generally fair excepting Oklahoma, increasing cloudiness warmer eastern and central belts. Colder Sunday in west Texas with rain or snow.

COTTON

Cotton was stone deaf to themes of either the bearish or the bullish key and ended practically unchanged especially on the old crop. Weekly statistics were bullish, spots were active, exports for the week 26,000 bales, more than last week, for the month the total is 1,068,000 bales.

COTTON LETTER

New Orleans, Jan. 31.—A revival in the demand for spots in south, the continuance of dry weather in Texas, with no let-up in large exports to Europe, were sustaining feature of the market the past week in the face of the British Master Spinners Federation recommending a return to shorter working hours by English mill using American raw cotton. The revival in the demand for spots in the south may be to fill end of January commitments, but if the demand is extended into February, it will likely continue to prove a sustaining influence.

As yet there is no let-up in the demand for export, shipments of which, thus far, this season, are very large. Indications are that exports from the United States will remain large in the near future, as there is a large quantity of cotton on shipboard awaiting to be exported. Last year's acreage in cotton was the largest on record of 41,300,000 acres from which a yield of about 13,000,000 were realized exclusive of linters or a total crop of about 14,100,000 bales.

Of late the market has been sustained partly by the belief that the cotton acreage would be decreased this year owing to the very high price for grain, which will make the growing of cotton this year very expensive owing to the high cost of grain, provisions and labor.

The South would likely make a big mistake in not reducing this acreage for cotton as in event of another large crop being made lower prices would probably be inevitable.

HAWAII PLANS TO

FEATHERED HERO OF
VERDUN WHO WON HIGH
HONORS DIES OF OLD AGE

Tours, France. — A hero of the war, cited in an order of the army and decorated for exceptional bravery and gallantry at Verdun, has just died of old age. He was ten years old.

His name was Carrier Pigeon No. 183-14 AF and attached to one of his legs he proudly wore a ring, equivalent to the Medaille Militaire, awarded to him in June, 1916, with the following citation:

"On three different occasions, during the battle of Verdun, under heavy fire ensured the rapid transport of very important messages. In particular carried to headquarters the communications of Major Raynal, defender of Fort Vaux, on June 3, 1916, at a time when the major's troops, completely surrounded, were deprived of any other means of communications. The flights were done under most unfavorable atmospheric conditions."

Since the Armistice the pig had been kept as an honored guest in the army dovecoats.
